And whereas the said Act has been amended by the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) Act, 1915, the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) (No. 2) Act, 1915, and the Munitions of War Act, 1915, and other enactments:

And whereas the said regulations have been amended by various subsequent Orders in Council:

And whereas it is expedient further to amend the said regulations in manner hereinafter appearing: Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following amendments be made in the said regulations:—

- 1. The following provision shall be inserted at the end of Regulations 2B, 2E, 7, and 8CC:—
 - "and the Food Controller may by order direct that any action in contravention of, or failure to comply with, this regulation or any order or requirement made thereunder, shall, so far as it relates to the powers of the Food Controller, instead of being an offence, be a summary offence against these regulations, and this regulation shall have effect accordingly."
- 2. The following paragraph shall be added at the end of sub-section (4) of Regulation 2JJ:—
 - "Any order made by the Board of Trade under Regulations 2E or15c may direct that contravention or failure to comply therewith shall, instead of being an offence, be a summary offence against these regulations, and these regulations shall have effect accordingly."
- 3. Regulation 7s shall be amended as follows:—
 - (1) The following paragraphs shall be added to sub-section (1):—
 - (f) for prescribing the conditions on which tickets may be issued and passengers carried, either generally or in specified localities, or for journeys exceeding specified distances, and for enabling priority to be given on railways to any passengers or classes of passengers, and for enabling railway companies to refuse to carry passengers, and to refuse access to stations or trains in order to give priority to other passengers, and to remove passengers obtaining such access without authority:
 - (g) for removing any statutory or other obligation to issue season tickets and for limiting the number of such tickets that may be issued by prescribing the persons to whom or the conditions on which such tickets may be issued or renewed, subject to such exceptions as may be provided for in the order:
 - (h) for the calling in and cancellation of season tickets of any description:
 - (j) for restricting or prohibiting through booking facilities, and the issue of return tickets:
 - (k) for enabling railway companies to refuse to accept goods for carriage by rail where other means of transport exist, subject to such conditions as may be prescribed by the order:
 - (2) The following words shall be added to sub-section (3):—
 - "or part of a railway, or to any particular locality."
- 4. As from the twenty-seventh day of May, nineteen hundred and eighteen, Regulation 24c shall be revoked and Regulations 24 and 24s shall be amended in manner hereinafter appearing, that is to say:—

Regulation 24 shall be amended as follows:—

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- (1) For the words from "or (b) without a permit" to "enemy country" (both inclusive) there shall be substituted the following words:—
 - "(2) The Admiralty or Army Council may either—
 - (a) generally by order, or
 - (b) in the case of particular persons by written notice

(which order or notice may be varied from time to time), prohibit the despatch or conveyance from the United Kingdom, otherwise than through the post, of "

- (2) For the words "paragraph (a) does not apply" there shall be substituted the following words, "sub-section (1) does not apply, except with such permission or on such conditions as may be specified in the order or notice."
- (3) The paragraph beginning "The foregoing provisions" and ending "a Secretary of State" shall be made a separate subsection numbered (3).
- (4) Sub-section (2) shall be numbered subsection (4) and in that sub-section for the words "or fails to comply with any condition subject to which a permit under this regulation" there shall be substituted the words "or if any person affected by any such order or notice fails to comply therewith, or with any condition contained therein, or with any condition subject to which a permission thereunder"
- (5) Sub-section (3) shall be numbered sub-section (5).

Regulation 24B shall be amended as follows:-

- (1) For sub-section (1) down to and including the word "except" there shall be substituted the following words:—
 - "The Admiralty or the Army Council may either-
 - (a) generally by order, or
 - (b) in the case of any particular persons by written notice

(which order or notice may be varied from time to time), prohibit the despatch by post from the United Kingdom of postal packets of any class or description specified in the order or notice except with such permission or on such conditions as may be specified in the order or notice.

- "The foregoing provision shall not apply to—."
- (2) For sub-section (2) there shall be substituted the following sub-section:—
 - "(2) If any person affected by any such order or notice fails to comply therewith or with any condition contained therein, or with any condition subject to which permission thereunder has been granted, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations."
- (3) In sub-section (3) for the words "through the post any printed or written matter" there shall be substituted the words "any postal packet," and for the words "the printed or written matter" there shall be substituted the words "the matter contained in the postal packet."

And whereas by the Ministry of National Service Order, 1917, the powers and duties mentioned in the Schedule thereto were transferred to the Director-General as from the first day of November, 1917, subject to the provision contained in the said Order enabling the Director-General by order from time to time to postpone the operation of the said Ministry of National Service Order, 1917, either generally or as respects any particular area in the United Kingdom, or as respects the transfer of any particular power or duty to a date or dates not later than the first day of May, 1918:

And whereas by orders of the Director-General dated respectively the 31st October, 1917, the 20th December, 1917, and the 20th February, 1918, the operation of the Ministry of National Service Order, 1917, has been from time to time postponed as respects Ireland until the first day of May, 1918, but save as aforesaid the Ministry of National Service Order, 1917, came into operation on the 1st November, 1917:

And whereas it is expedient further to postpone the operation of the said Order as respects Ireland:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in pursuance of the powers conferred on Him by the said recited Acts and of other powers enabling Him in that behalf, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

- 1. Notwithstanding anything in paragraph 6 of the Ministry of National Service Order, 1917, the Director-General may by order appoint a date later than the first day of May, 1918, as the date on which the Ministry of National Service Order, 1917, shall come into operation either as respects Ireland or as respects any particular area in Ireland, and either generally or as respects any particular power or duty transferred under that order, and that order shall not come into operation as respects Ireland except as may be appointed by the Director-General under this provision.
 - 2. The Interpretation Act, 1889, applies to

the interpretation of this Order as it applies to the interpretation of an Act of Parliament.

3. This Order shall come into operation forthwith and may be cited as the Ministry of National Service Order, 1918.

"And whereas we consider the rate of payment per folio to be inadequate:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction payment at the rate of 9d. for each folio of 100 words (to cover both notes and transcription) the minimum payment to remain at 5s. 0d.

"The Lords Commissioners of Majesty's Treasury have signified their con-

currence in this proposal."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

order as follows:-1. The Charges at present in force for carrying merchandise between Great Britain and Ireland may be increased by amounts not exceeding those specified in the Schedule to this Order.

2. The increased charges authorised by this Order shall be in addition to those authorised by the Through Rates (Great Britain and Ireland) Order, 1917, and shall be allocated to the sea portion of the journey.

3. This Order shall come into force on the

6th day of May, 1918. 4. This Order may be cited as the Through Rates (Great Britain and Ireland) Order, 1918.

And whereas the Minister of Munitions considers it necessary to provide for equalising, so far as possible, the cost of distribution of the said Fertilisers by rail or water throughout the United Kingdom, and, for this purpose, to prohibit sales of the same by makers or producers for transport by rail or water, except upon a delivered basis and at delivered prices, including, in every case, a fixed sum per ton to cover the estimated average cost of distribution, and to be accounted for by the makers or producers to the Minister or any other Government Department nominated by him for the purpose, by whom any costs of distribution by rail or water in excess of such estimate will be borne.

Now, therefore, the Minister of Munitions, in exercise of the powers conferred upon him by the Defence of the Realm Regulations, and of all other powers enabling him, hereby orders

1. This Order shall take effect as on and from the 1st May, 1918.

2. For the purposes of this Order the maximum prices for Superphosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia, and Ground Basic Slag respectively shall (except as hereinafter otherwise

expressly provided) be as follows:

(a) In the case of sales of any of the said fertilisers for delivery in railway trucks at purchaser's or consumer's siding or nearest railway station, or free ex barge or ship at purchaser's or consumer's wharf or other available wharf approved by the purchaser, or, in the case of shipments to the Channel Islands or the Isle of Man, f.o.b. at port of shipment, or, in the case of shipments of Ground Basic Slag to Ireland, c.i.f. at Irish port, the following prices, namely:

(i) In the case of all sales (other than sales, by makers or producers, of smaller quantities than two tons) the respective prices specified in the first, second and third schedules hereto for Superphosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia and Ground Basic Slag respectively, according to the date on which, under the terms of the contract for sale, delivery is to be made, and to the description and quality of the fertiliser delivered, but with the addition, in the case of sales of Ground Basic Slag for delivery in Ireland (otherwise than c.i.f. Irish port), of all charges incurred in delivering the Ground Basic Slag from the ship in port of arrival in Ireland to place of delivery, any charges for cartage, haulage or warehousing of such Ground Basic Slag or other services to be charged at not exceeding local rates.

(ii) In the case of sales, by makers or producers, of any of the said fertilisers in smaller quantities than two tons, the same prices as those specified under paragraph (d) of this clause for sales of the same fer-

tiliser in similar quantities ex vendor's store or shop or ex warehouse.

(b) In the case of sales for delivery at maker's or producer's works free into road vehicles provided by the purchaser or consumer for conveyance direct by road to purchaser's or consumer's premises, the following prices, namely:

(i) In the case of all sales (other than sales, by makers or producers, of smaller quantities than two tons) the prices speci-

fied in sub-paragraph (i) of paragraph (a) above, less 10s. per ton.

(ii) In the case of sales, by makers or producers, of smaller quantities than two tons, the same prices as those specified under paragraph (d) of this clause for sales of the same fertiliser in similar quantities ex vendor's store or shop or ex ware-

- (c) In the case of sales for delivery direct by road from maker's or producer's works to purchaser's or consumer's premises in road vehicles provided by the maker or producer, the prices specified under paragraph (b) above with the addition of the cost of cartage or haulage from the works to the purchaser's or consumer's premises, to be charged at not exceeding local rates.
- (d) In the case of sales for delivery ex vendor's store or shop, or ex warehouse (other than maker's or producer's store or warehouse at point of manufacture), the prices specified under sub-paragraph (i) of paragraph (a) above, with the addition of the following amounts, according to the quantity of Superphosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia, or Ground Basic Slag (as the case may be) included in the sale:-

and with the addition also (in the case of sales for delivery ex vendor's store or shop, where such store or shop is distant more than two miles from the nearest railway station or wharf available for the delivery of the fertiliser in railway truck, ship or barge) of the extra cost of carting or hauling the fertiliser by road from such railway station or wharf to such store or shop over the cost of carting the same a distance of two miles, such cost to be charged at not exceeding local rates.

(e) In the case of sales for delivery ex railway goods yard or public wharf, the prices specified under sub-paragraph (i) of paragraph (a) above, with the addition of 2s. 6d. per ton in the case of sales of one ton or less, but without any addition in the case of sales of more than one ton.

(f) In the case of sales for delivery direct by road or barge from vendor's store or shop, or from warehouse, railway goods yard, or public wharf to consumer's premises, the prices authorised under paragraphs (d) and (e) above for sales of the same fertiliser in similar quantities ex such store, shop, ware-house, yard, or wharf, plus the cost of

cartage, haulage or barging, to be charged at not exceeding local rates.

The above prices (other than those authorised under paragraphs (b) and (c)) include, in every case, a sum of 12s. 6d. per ton to cover the estimated average cost which will be incurred by makers and producers in distributing the said fertilisers by rail or water throughout the United Kingdom (or in the case of Ground Basic Slag throughout England, Scotland, and Wales and to Irish ports), which sum of 12s. 6d. per ton shall be accounted for in every case by makers and producers receiving the same as hereafter provided.

3. On sales of two tons or upwards by makers or producers to Manure Mixers, Agricultural Merchants or Dealers, or Co-operative Companies or Societies incorporated or registered under the Industrial and Provident Societies' Act, or any other Act, the maximum prices fixed by clause 2 of this Order shall be reduced by a discount or allowance to the purchaser of

5s. per ton in the case of Superphosphate. 10s. per ton in the case of Sulphate of Ammonia.

5s. per ton in the case of Ground Basic Slag.

- 4. The maximum prices fixed by the foregoing provisions of this Order are net cash prices for Superphosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia, and Ground Basic Slag in maker's or vendor's bags, net weight excluding weight of bags. Where credit is given to the purchaser a reasonable extra charge may be made, provided that the discount allowed for net cash is quoted on the invoice and is such as to bring the net cash price within the maximum authorised. purchaser's bags or other packages are used, or the purchaser takes delivery in bulk without bags, a reasonable allowance shall be made to the purchaser. Where one ton or upwards is sold for delivery in bags containing less than 2 cwt. each, a reasonable extra charge may be made beyond the maximum prices which would otherwise have been authorised.
- 5. As on and from the date on which this Order takes effect no person shall sell or purchase, or offer to sell or purchase any Super-phosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia, or Ground Basic Slag, except for delivery as specified in one or other of the sub-paragraphs of clause 2 of this Order, and at a price not exceeding that prescribed by this Order and the first, second, and third schedules hereto respectively as the maximum price for such sale, having regard to the description and quantity of the fertiliser sold, quality, packages, and date for and terms of delivery; nor shall any maker or producer of Superphosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia, or Ground Basic Slag, sell any of the said fertilisers for delivery as mentioned in paragraphs (a) (d) (e) or (f) of clause 2 of this Order, without bringing into account and dealing with the sum of 12s. 6d. per ton (included in the prices authorised by such paragraphs to be charged on such sales) in manner specified in the scheme for equalising costs of distribution of Super-phosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia, and Ground Basic Slag, set out in the fifth schedule hereto. Provided that:
 - (a) A vendor of Superphosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia, or Ground Basic Slag shall not be liable to conviction for selling at a price in excess of the maximum price prescribed by this Order for such sale, if the invoice given to the purchaser, as required by clause

6 of this Order, states accurately within the limits of error specified in the fourth schedule hereto, the percentage of Phosphate rendered soluble in water, ammonia, or total phosphate (as the case may be), contained in the Superphosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia, or Ground Basic Slag sold, and the price charged and stated on such invoice does not exceed the correct maximum price on the basis that the percentage stated in such invoice is correct; and

(b) A purchaser of Superphosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia, or Ground Basic Slag shall not be liable to conviction for purchasing at a price exceeding the maximum price, unless the price agreed to be paid by him is to his knowledge in excess of the maximum price authorised for such purchase.

6. As on and from the date on which this Order takes effect no person shall sell any Superphosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia, or Ground Basic Slag, without giving to the purchaser, on or before or as soon as possible after delivery, an invoice stating accurately within the limits of error specified in the fourth schedule hereto:—

(a) In the case of Superphosphate the percentage (calculated in terms of tri-basic Phosphate of Lime) of Phosphate rendered soluble in water, contained in the Superphosphate delivered.

(b) In the case of Sulphate of Ammonia the percentage of Ammonia (NH₃) by weight contained in the Sulphate of Ammonia delighter and

livered; and

(c) In the case of Ground Basic Slag, the percentage (calculated in terms of tri-basic Phosphate of Lime) of total Phosphate contained in the Basic Slag delivered,

and also, in the case of all three fertilisers, stating the price charged, together with any further particulars required to be stated on such invoice by any of the provisions of this Order or the schedules hereto.

7. None of the foregoing provisions or restrictions of this Order as regards maximum prices chargeable or otherwise shall apply to—

- (a) Any sales of Superphosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia, or Ground Basic Slag, for export from the United Kingdom to any country other than the Channel Islands or the Isle of Man.
- (b) Any sales of any of the said fertilisers in quantities less than 14 lbs.

 (\hat{c}) Any sales of any of the said fertilisers for delivery prior to the 1st June, 1918.

- (d) Any sales of Sulphate of Ammonia for use in the manufacture of munitions of war or other industrial purposes.
- 8. As on and from the date on which this Order takes effect, the provisions of the scheme for equalising costs of distribution of Superphosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia, and Ground Basic Slag set out in the fifth schedule hereto, shall be binding upon all makers or producers of Superphosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia, or Ground Basic Slag, and upon the Minister of Munitions, or any other Government Department to which, by arrangement with the Minister of Munitions, the carrying out of the said scheme may be delegated; and any balances becoming payable by any such makers or producers to the Minister of Munitions, or any other such Government Department as aforesaid, under the provisions of such scheme shall be recoverable as Crown Debts.

- 9. As on and from the date on which this Order takes effect—
 - (a) No person shall sell (for delivery on or after the 1st June, 1918) any Sulphate of Ammonia which is to be used in the manufacture of munitions of war or for other industrial purposes, except under a license issued by or under the authority of the Minister of Munitions, and in accordance with any terms and conditions of such license as to quantity, price, mode of delivery, or otherwise.
 - (b) No person shall sell any Superphosphate or Ground Basic Slag, nor any Sulphate of Ammonia which is to be used for fertilising purposes, for delivery (on or after the 1st June, 1918) in railway trucks at purchaser's or consumer's siding or otherwise as mentioned in paragraph (a) of clause 2 of this Order, except under and in accordance with the terms and conditions of a license issued by or under the authority of the Minister of Munitions, or any other Government Department or body nominated by him for the purpose:

for the purpose:

(c) No maker or producer of Superphosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia, or Ground Basic Slag shall, except under and in accordance with the terms and conditions of a license issued as mentioned in paragraph (b) of this clause, either (i) sell to any person any Superphosphate or Ground Basic Slag, or any Sulphate of Ammonia which is to be used for fertilising purposes, for delivery (on or after the 1st June, 1918) ex railway goods yard or public wharf, or (ii) sell any of such fertilisers for delivery (on or after that date) as mentioned in paragraph (b) or (c) of clause 2 of this Order to any person other than a consumer purchasing the same for consumption on his own premises.

(d) No person shall, except under and in accordance with the terms and conditions of a license issued as mentioned in paragraph (b) of this clause, consign or despatch any Superphosphate or Ground Basic Slag, nor any Sulphate of Ammonia which is to be used for fertilising purposes, by rail (other than light railway) to or for delivery to any person in smaller quantities than four tons, otherwise than as part of a consignment of not less than four tons of goods made from the same point of departure to same final railway destination at the same time.

10. All persons engaged in producing, manufacturing, selling, distributing, or storing Superphosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia, or Ground Basic Slag, or in any manufacture in which the same or any of them are used, shall make such returns with regard to their businesses, and shall verify the same in such manner (including production of their books to any accredited representative of the Minister of Munitions), as shall from time to time be required by or under the authority of the Minister of Munitions.

11. This Order and the Fertilisers and Feeding Stuffs Act, 1906, shall operate and have effect independently of one another, and nothing contained in this Order shall be held to exempt any person from compliance with any of the provisions or requirements of such Act, or any Regulations made thereunder, applicable to sales or purchases of Superphosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia, or Ground Basic Slag: nor shall any of the provisions of the said Act or Regulations be held to govern or affect any

of the requirements or provisions of this Order, or any proceedings instituted in respect of any breach hereof.

12. This Order supersedes the Orders relating to Superphosphates, made by the Minister of Munitions on the 20th August, 1917, the 17th November, 1917, and the 28th March, 1918, respectively, so far as regards all sales of Superphosphate, for delivery on or after the 1st June, 1918, made on or after the date on which this Order takes effect.

13. For the purposes of this Order "Superphosphate" shall mean Superphosphate of Lime manufactured from mineral Phosphate, but shall not include Basic Superphosphate, Bone Superphosphate, Dissolved Bones, Bone Meal, Bone Compound, Guano, or Compound Manures; and Sulphate of Ammonia used for the manufacture of Compound Fertilisers shall be deemed to be used for fertilising purposes, and not for industrial purposes.

14. This Order may be cited as the Fertiliser

For Sulphate of Ammonia which is specially ground or pulverised at the request of the purchaser an extra charge (not exceeding 5s. per ton) may be made for special grinding, provided that such extra charge is separately stated on the invoice given to the purchaser as aforesaid.

The above increases or reductions in the maximum prices chargeable shall not apply to any sale of less than 2 cwt. of Sulphate of Ammonia.

FIFTH SCHEDULE.

Scheme for equalising costs of distribution of Superphosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia and Ground Basic Slag.

1. Each maker or producer of Superphosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia or Ground Basic Slag (hereinafter called "the maker") shall open with the Minister of Munitions or any other Government Department nominated by him for this purpose (hereinafter called "the Government") an account entitled "Delivery

charges on Fertilisers."

- 2. The Government shall be debited in such account with the costs of carriage incurred by the maker in delivering Superphosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia or Ground Basic Slag of his own manufacture sold by him at any time on or after the date on which the above Order takes effect for delivery between the 1st June, 1918, and the 31st May, 1919 (or such other date as may hereafter be fixed by the Minister), and actually delivered between those dates. Provided that except as otherwise expressly authorised by or under the authority of the Government from time to time, either generally or in the case of any particular sale on delivery by the maker:—
 - (a) The costs of carriage to be debited to the Government in the said account shall be

the actual costs incurred by the maker, after deducting all rebates, discounts and allowances whatsoever.

- ances whatsoever.

 (b) Nothing shall be debited to the Government in the said account in respect of costs of carriage on (i) sales for delivery as mentioned in paragraphs (b) and (c) of clause 2 of the above Order, or (ii) sales of any of the four classes specified in clause 7 of the above Order.
- (c) Only costs of carriage by rail or water shall be debited to the Government in the said account, and nothing shall be debited in respect of costs of loading or of cartage, whether from maker's works to railway station or wharf for putting on rail, barge, or ship, or at any other point of transit, except as otherwise expressly below mentioned.
- (d) The costs which may be debited to the Government shall include:—
 - (i) Demurrage incurred on railway wagons and vessels, if due to causes not within the control of the maker or the consignee;

(ii) In the case of carriage by water, insurance and shipping charges actually incurred, and also dock dues, if any;

(iii) In the case of transport partly by rail and partly by water, for which a through rate is not obtainable, any costs of cartage from rail to ship, or from ship to rail, and of putting on board or on rail at point of transfer;

(iv) In the case of sales for export to the Channel Islands or the Isle of Man the costs of putting on board at port of

shipment.

- (e) The cheapest available route by rail or water must be adopted for all consignments, and in default the maker may not debit the Government with any extra costs of carriage incurred.
- (f) No sales shall be made by the maker for delivery by rail or water in contravention of any general or special instructions or directions which may from time to time be given by or under the authority of the Government, or of any of the terms or conditions of the license under which the same is made, and should any such sales be made, no costs of carriage incurred in delivering the fertiliser may be debited to the Government in the said account.
- (g) In cases where Superphosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia, or Ground Basic Slag is consigned by the maker to his own local store for subsequent delivery or distribution:—
 - (i) The cost of carriage by rail or water between the works and the store may be debited to the Government, such debit to be made when the fertiliser has been sold and delivered.
 - . (ii) Where such store has been approved by the Government for the supply by such maker of Superphosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia and Ground Basic Slag, or any one or more of such fertilisers, to any particular district (but not otherwise), any further costs of carriage by rail or water incurred by the maker in delivering Superphosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia, and/or Ground Basic Slag (as the case may be) from such store to purchasers or consumers within such district, may be debited to the Government; and in addi-

tion, where the fertiliser is delivered into such store on or before the 31st December, 1918, the Government may also be debited with a further sum of 5s. per ton (in the case of Superphosphate and Sulphate of Ammonia) and 2s. per ton (in the case of Ground Basic Slag) to cover the cost of putting the fertiliser into and out of store, and

(iii) Where such store has been specially approved by the Government for this purpose (either generally or as regards one or two only of the said three fertilisers) there may also be debited to the Government costs (not chargeable purchaser under paragraphs (d) and (f) of clause 2 of the above Order) of cartage or haulage of the Superphosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia, and/or Basic Slag (as the case may be) into such store from the nearest or other approved railway station or wharf, provided that the same is delivered into such store on or before the 31st December, 1918.

(h) In the case of sales of Ground Basic Slag for delivery in Ireland, nothing may be debited to the Government in the said account in respect of any costs of transport from port of arrival in Ireland to place of

delivery.

3. The Government shall be credited in the said account with the sum of 12s. 6d. in respect of each ton of Superphosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia, or Basic Slag, of the maker's manufacture, sold by him, on or at any time after the date on which the above Order takes effect, for delivery as mentioned in paragraphs (a), (d), (e) or (f) of clause 2 of the above Order between the 1st June, 1918, and the 31st May, 1919 (or such other date as may hereafter be fixed by the Minister), and actually delivered between those dates, such credit to be made from time to time as and when the fertiliser is delivered. Provided that nothing shall be credited to the Government in respect of sales of any of the four classes specified in clause 7 of the above Order.

4. The said account shall be balanced as on the 31st July, 1918, and the last day of each second calendar month thereafter, ending with the 31st May, 1919, or such other date as aforesaid; and any balance shown by any such two-monthly account to be due, either from the Government to the maker or from the maker to the Government, shall be paid within twenty-eight days after the same is ascertained,

or otherwise as may be arranged.

5. The maker shall render to the Government an account for each two-monthly period aforesaid, in such form and containing such particulars as the Government may require, and shall produce to the Government's representatives, and, if so required, forward to them, together with each two-monthly account, the proper vouchers or certificates for all charges debited to the Government in such account. The maker shall keep (so far as practicable in separate books) true and accurate accounts and records of all costs of carriage incurred and paid by the maker in delivering Superphosphate, Sulphate of Ammonia or Basic Slag, and shall, whenever required, submit his books and all relevant documents for examination by the Government's representatives.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 29TH APRIL 1918.)

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:-

Application of the Sheep (Double Dipping) Order of 1914.

1.—(1) The provisions of the Sheep (Double Dipping) Order of 1914 (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order") are hereby applied to each of the Areas described in the Schedule hereto.

(2) While this Order remains in operation sheep in the Areas described in the Schedule hereto shall be exempt from the provisions of Article 3 of the Sheep Dipping (Scotland and North of England) Order of 1915 so far as they relate to dipping within the first prescribed dipping period.

Modification of Part I of the Principal Order.

2. Part I of the Principal Order shall, in its application to the Areas described in the Schedule hereto, be read and have effect as if paragraph (3) of Article 2 of that Order were omitted.

Period Prescribed as Double Dipping Period.

3. The dates between which all sheep in the Areas described in the Schedule hereto are to be dipped within the Areas by the owner or person in charge of the sheep under and in accordance with Part II of the principal Order, are hereby fixed to be the fifteenth day of July and the thirty-first day of August.

Commencement.

4. This Order shall come into operation on the seventh day of May, nineteen hundred and eighte**en**.

ADMIRALTY NOTICE TO MARINERS.

No. 530 of the year 1918

ENGLAND, EAST COAST.

River Humber and Approaches—Pilotage, Traffic and Fishing Regulations.

Former Notice.—No. 414 of 1918; hereby cancelled.

Mariners are hereby warned that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and are now in force:—

- 1. That portion of the Humber which lies between two straight lines, drawn from shore to shore, as follows:—(1) a line drawn 225° (S. 61° W. Mag.) through Spurn lighthouse, (2) drawn 344° (North Mag.) from the east side of Barrow haven, will be referred to as the "port" in these regulations.
- 2. Shipowners and local agents are warned that their vessels should be directed to conform to the following regulations:—
- (I) Except under exceptional circumstances merchant vessels will be free to enter or leave the port during the hours of Official day.
- (II) Before entering the port merchant vessels must receive permission and the necessary instructions from the Examination steamer, and before leaving they must obtain permission through the Collector of Customs at Hull, Grimsby, or Goole, as the case may be
- (III) Shipowners and local agents are advised to time the arrival of their vessels at the port for daylight.
- (IV) Vessels desiring to enter the port from seaward are, unless previously met by the Examination steamer, to proceed to the Southern Examination anchorage (except during strong northerly or easterly winds, when they should proceed to the Northern Examination anchorage) and there anchor.
- (V) The Examination steamer will be met in the Examination area between Bull light-vessel and Chequer Shoal buoy.

The Examination steamer will be distinguished by the following means:—

By Day.—A white ensign, and at the foremast head the special flag mentioned in Part II of Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 170 of 1918. When the port is closed 3 red balls will be hoisted in addition to the special flag.

By Night.—Three lights vertically, 3 feet apart, conspicuously displayed at the end of a yard so as to show an unbroken light round the horizon. When the port is closed these lights will be red, when it is open they will be white.

Note.—These lights are in addition to the ordinary navigation lights.

(VI) There are two Examination anchorages. The northern is to be used in strong northerly and easterly winds. The southern is to be used under all other conditions.

The Northern Examination anchorage comprises those portions of Hawke road and Middle shoal included between the intersection of the following lines of bearing:—.

(1) Skeffling church bearing 18° (N. 34° E. Mag.).

- (2) Skeffling church bearing 4° (N. 20° E. Mag.).
- (3) Spurn lighthouse bearing 120° (S. 44° E. Mag.).
- (4) Extreme of Spurn point bearing 115° (S. 49° E. Mag.).

The Southern Examination anchorage comprises the area bounded as follows:—

- (1) On the north by the Bull sand.
- (2) On the south by the three fathom contour line northward of Tetney haven.
- (3) On the east by the line joining the Bull light-vessel and entrance to Tetney haven.
- (4) On the west by a line parallel to and 7 cables from the eastern limit (3).

Note.—When the Southern Examination anchorage is full of shipping further arrivals should anchor eastward of and as near to it as possible.

The Examination area is that portion of the river enclosed by an irregular line drawn from the Bull light-vessel to the extreme of Spurn point, thence to the Chequer shoal buoy, thence to a point 210° (S. 46° W. Mag.) of and distant 7 cables from Bull light-vessel and thence to Bull light-vessel.

- 3. All pilotage certificates granted to masters and mates for the whole or any part of the Humber Pilotage district are suspended, and further all vessels (irrespective of draught, size, or nationality, but with the exception of those provided for in paragraph 4) bound to or from any place on the Humber must be conducted by licensed pilots over the whole or any part of the waters between Hull and the Outer Pilotage station of the Humber Pilotage district, which station, until further notice, will be situated in the neighbourhood of the Bull light-vessel.
- 4. In the case of lighter inter-dock traffic and of small British vessels engaged in local traffic above Immingham, pilotage by licensed pilots is not compulsory.
- 5. During the hours of official night, and during fog with visibility of less than half-amile, no traffic is permitted to move on the Humber below Paull point.
- 6. Every vessel shall endeavour to approach the Humber in sufficient time to enable such vessel to obtain a pilot and arrive at her destination, or at a position in which she is permitted to anchor, before the commencement of official night, but, should occasions arise when a vessel is delayed through unforeseen or unpreventable circumstances from arriving in time, she is to obtain instructions from the Examination steamer as to where to anchor until the end of official night. The Examination steamer will be found in the neighbourhood of the Bull light-vessel after the commencement of official night. In the event of an incoming vessel being unable immediately to find the Examination steamer in these circumstances, she is to remain in the vicinity of the Bull light-vessel, but shall not cross the line drawn 225° (S. 61° W. Mag.) through Spurn lighthouse without permission. Outward-bound vessels shall not pass Hawkins point later than 45 minutes before the commencement of official night.
- 7. Vessels when leaving the Humber must proceed direct to sea. Should it be necessary

to wait for the weather to moderate or clear, they must remain inside the river at an authorised anchorage.

The pilot lobbies will be notified when the existence of fog outside the river is known.

8. All vessels proceeding into or out of the Humber must be navigated by way of Hawke and Sunk roads passing to the northward of the Bull light-vessel, except those outward-bound from Grimsby, which may cross the Middle shoal passing at once into the channel north of the Middle.

Note.—The five-fathom channel through the Sunk and Hawke roads is very narrow at the western entrance and also at a point north of the Middle light-vessel; deep-draught vessels steaming against the tide when approaching the buoys marking these portions of the channel should endeavour to avoid passing other vessels between them by easing engines to allow ships with the tide under them to get through first. Smaller vessels outward-bound should pass close to the southward of the buoys marking the south side, and those inward-bound close to the northward of the buoys marking the north side, of the narrow portions of the channel, provided always that their draught of water and the state of the tide will admit.

- 9. Sailing vessels of 50 tons register and upwards when entering or leaving the Humber must be towed through the Boom Defence gateways. Should tugs not be available, inward-bound vessels may anchor north-westward of the No. 2 Lower Middle light-float at a distance of not more than $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from it, but they must not bring the before-mentioned light-float to bear to the southward of 128° (S. 36° \tilde{E} . Mag.).
- 10. All vessels entering or leaving Grimsby docks must pass to the southward of the No. 4 Lower Burcom buoy except those making use of the channel southward of the Burcom shoal (hereinafter called the Burcom channel), which are exempted from this condition, but no vessel may cross the Burcom shoal between the No. 5 Middle Burcom and No. 4 Lower Burcom buoys. Vessels using the Burcom channel must pass into and out of its western end to the eastward of No. 6 Upper Burcom buoy, and through a gateway at its eastern end 220 feet wide, each side of which is marked by a dolphin surmounted by a black triangle supported on a white pole. No vessel is permitted to tow more than two craft at one time through this gateway.

Vessels making use of this gateway are cautioned to keep well in the middle of the opening and are subject to the following regulations:—

- (1.) Vessels navigating against the tide must in all cases give way to those navigating with the tide.
- (2.) No vessel must approach the defences in this part of the river nearer than a quarter of a mile except to pass through the beforementioned gateway or to enter or leave the docks or old outfall.
- (3.) No vessel may tow more vessels at one time than she can safely navigate through the gateway, and under no circumstances is the tow to comprise more than two craft.
- (4) Distant signals will be shown from the flagstaff on the West Pier at the Grimsby Dock entrance as follows:—

- (a) Two black balls will denote that the gateway is open.
- (b) Three black balls will denote that the gateway is closed.
- (c) No signal being hoisted denotes that traffic is suspended.

When signal (b) three black balls is hoisted, no vessel may approach the gateway, and when traffic is suspended no vessels, other than H.M. Ships on special duty, may use the gateway.

- 11. Prohibited Anchorage areas:-
- (I.) Anchorage is prohibited for all vessels between two lines:—
 - (a) Joining Stone Creek Coast Guard flagstaff and the eastern extremity of the eastern jetty at Immingham.
 - (b) Joining the riverward beacon of the two centre measured mile beacons on Sunk island and the northernmost of two clumps shown southward of Stallingborough on Admiralty Chart No. 109. The latter line passes through the position of No. 6 Upper Burcom buoy.
- (II.) No merchant vessel shall anchor (except when granted special permission) between the before-mentioned prohibited anchorage area (I.) and the line of transit of the eastern measured mile beacons on Sunk island produced to the Lincolnshire shore or (except as provided for in paragraph 9) to the northward of the line of the Killingholme leading lights or within 1½ cables of any of the Admiralty mooring buoys.
- (III.) Anchorage is prohibited between the following lines:—
 - (a) A line joining New Clee railway station and Patrington church.
 - (b) A line joining Middle light-vessel and No. 4 Lower Burcom buoy, extended to both banks of the Humber.
- (IV.) Anchorage is prohibited to merchant vessels to the southward of a line joining No. 4 Lower Burcom buoy and Spurn lighthouse, or to the eastward of a line joining Cleethorpes pier pavilion and Skeffling church, except so far as the Examination anchorages are concerned
- (V.) No vessel of any description may anchor on the south side of the Bull sand between the western limit of the Southern Examination anchorage described in paragraph 2 of this notice and a line drawn through the Cleethorpes Sewer outfall beacon (on which a red light is exhibited in peace time) in a direction 60° (N. 76° E. Mag.), passing through a point 299° (North-west Mag.) distant 7 cables from Spurn lighthouse; nor on the north side of the Bull sand between the before-mentioned line of bearing passing through the Cleethorpes Sewer outfall and a line joining Spurn lighthouse and the Bull light-vessel produced to the Bull sand; nor within 3 cables of the No. 4 Lower Burcom buoy.
- 12. No neutral vessel may lay alongside any of the piers or jetties in the Humber at night without special permission.
- 13. No merchant vessels or boats, etc., will be allowed to approach within a quarter of a mile of any defence work (except to pass through the Boom gateways or to enter or leave the old outfall or docks at Grimsby) or to go alongside any Government ship, vessel, lighter or any other Government craft, or any Government craft,

ment establishment, without special permission. All vessels proceeding up and down the Humber are to pass at a distance at least three cables from H.M. Ships, if the depth of water and circumstances of navigation permit.

- 14. All vessels employed in laying moorings, raising wrecks, etc., must be passed at slow speed, propelling engines being eased at least 300 yards before reaching such vessels, and so continued for 150 yards after passing them. While the said mooring or wreck raising craft are at work they will each fly a red flag.
- 15. Anchor lights are to be reduced in power and screened as prescribed in Part V. of Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 373 of 1918.

Vessels anchored in the Humber westward of a line joining Cleethorpes pier pavilion and Skeffling church are to exhibit anchor lights as mentioned above, except that between Immingham and the before mentioned line they are to be reduced in brilliancy so as to be invisible at any greater distance than half-amile. All vessels at anchor outside the Eastern Boom and in the Southern Examination anchorage are to exhibit anchor lights during official night, such lights to be screened from overhead and reduced in brilliancy so as to be invisible at any greater distance than half-amile

This order will not absolve the Masters of craft at anchor from keeping a sharp look-out and giving warning on the approach of any craft under way.

Anchor lights authorised by these orders are never on any account to be extinguished; the order "Out Lights" will not apply to them.

Bow and masthead steaming lights are to be as prescribed in Part V. of Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 491 of 1918.

Other lights are to be as prescribed in Part V. of Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 373 of 1918, and this order also applies to vessels in dock or alongside quays and jetties. Notwithstanding anything in these orders, dredgers may be permitted to work at Hull and Immingham at night provided all their lights are extinguished within half-an-hour of issue of the general order "Out Lights."

The above orders apply to vessels of every description, other than H.M. ships. The latter should, however, comply so far as the visibility of anchor lights eastward of Immingham is concerned.

- 16. No vessel is permitted to tow more than three craft at one time through a gateway of the Boom defence or more than two through the gateway in the Burcom channel described in paragraph 10. Owners of tugs may apply to the Humber Conservancy Board for pilot licences for the masters of their vessels which will enable them to pilot their own vessels and river craft comprising their tow (in certain parts of the river). The number of craft towed will be restricted according to the power of the tug.
- 17. Humber Rule No. 18 is to be strictly enforced. No sound signals other than navigation signals authorised by the Regulations for preventing Collisions at Sea, and by Humber Rules Nos. 14 to 16 (inclusive) at all times of the day or night, and No. 17 during the day only), are on any account to be used by vessels in any part of the Humber, the Old Harbour

at Hull, or within any of the docks at Hull, Immingham and Grimsby.

- 18. Owners of small vessels plying in the vicinity of the Humber are instructed not to paint their craft light grey, and are hereby directed to have any vessels so coloured repainted. They are warned that small vessels painted grey run a great risk of being fired upon in mistake for submarines. Vessels painted black run the least risk.
- 19. Fishing in the Humber.—No vessel is allowed to fish in the Humber below Hull without a permit from the Admiralty port officer; all fishing, shrimping, trawling or whelking in this portion of the river in areas other than those for which permits are granted is prohibited.

Pleasure boats will be granted fishing permits on application to the Admiralty Port Officer. The holding of these permits will remove the restriction as to the limits within which pleasure boats may ply for hire contained in paragraph 20 below, provided they do so with the object of catching fish.

No registered fishing boat or mechanically propelled craft will be granted a pleasure permit except for the purpose of fishing, but when they cannot fish their owners may apply to the Admiralty Port Officer for special permission to ply for hire providing that the succeeding clause of this Notice is complied with.

No able-bodied professional fisherman or boatman between the ages of 18 and 60 may be employed on land or sea in connection with any boat for which a pleasure permit has been issued.

Nothing in this notice will exempt vessels from any obligation to register or procure licences as now required by local authorities.

20. Pleasure boats of every description on the Humber must be provided with permits to be provided by the Admiralty Port Officer, Dock Offices, Immingham.

Regulations affecting small craft in the vicinity of Cleethorpes:—Pleasure boats may ply for hire at Cleethorpes only between the Eastern and Western Sewer Outfall beacons, and must keep within a distance of one mile from the shore, except under the conditions stated in paragraph 19. Notwithstanding anything in these orders, rowing boats may pass along the shore at Cleethorpes, but they must keep within 400 yards of the high-water mark of spring tides.

- 21. Excursions by Water.—Excursions by water are limited to the River Humber above Hull, and Rivers Ouse and Trent. Excursion steamers will not be allowed to ply without a permit from the Admiralty port officer, Dock Offices, Immingham, and in no case are they to pass to the eastward of an imaginary line joining Victoria Dock entrance, Hull, and the east beacon on Skitter Ness.
- 22. Patrol of Internal Waterways.—The internal waterways of the port will be policed by Naval patrol vessels and by the Humber Conservancy Board under the direction of the Naval authorities.

Captains and Masters of Merchant Vessels and persons in charge of barges or boats of any kind are hereby warned to observe any orders which may be given to them by Naval Patrol vessels or the duly authorised officers of the Humber Conservancy Board.

23. All instructions given by Officers in command of H.M. ships, Patrol vessels or Examination steamers, or the duly authorised officers of the Humber Conservancy Board, are to be implicitly and promptly obeyed even should they conflict with these orders.

24. Warning.—Warning is hereby given that vessels disobeying the above regulations will be liable to be fired on.

Variation .- 16° W.

Note.—This Admiralty Notice to Mariners is a revision of the former Notice quoted above.

Caution.

This Admiralty Notice to Mariners is issued under the provisions of the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, and failure to comply strictly with the directions contained in it will constitute an offence against those Regulations.

Any person found guilty of such an offence is liable to severe penalties both of imprisonment and fine.

Any person aiding or abetting the commission of such an offence is himself guilty of an offence against the Regulations.

Attention is also drawn to the fact that any infringement of the directions contained in this Admiralty Notice to Mariners is liable to result in the detention of the ship or vessel.
