

Lt. Kenneth William Junor, Can. M.G. Corps and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in aerial fighting. He destroyed two enemy machines and drove down two others out of control, which crashed on landing. He always showed the greatest courage, skill and resource.

Capt. (actg. Maj.) Eric Whidden MacDonald, D.S.O., Can. Inf.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When in command of a raiding party, he led it with such skill and energy that the hostile lines were successfully penetrated, valuable identifications secured and considerable casualties inflicted on the enemy. The success of the enterprise was entirely due to the careful preparation, good training and organisation of all ranks which this officer had ensured.

Lt. Frank George Rump, Can. Inf.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When in command of a group of a raiding party he entered a dug-out alone, where he killed one man, taking the remaining occupant prisoner, and thereby obtaining an important identification. At the time of the withdrawal of the assaulting party he personally superintended the blowing up of five dug-outs. His determination and cool and fearless conduct largely contributed to the success of the raid.

Lt. John Robert Smith, Can. Inf., E. Ontario R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in charge of the leading wave of a large raiding party. He supervised the cutting of gaps in the enemy's wire, and led forward his party, who inflicted heavy casualties on the enemy and bombed dug-outs and cellars. The success of the operation, in which valuable identifications and documents were secured, was largely due to his courageous and determined leadership.

Lt. William Martin Smith, Can. Inf., Manitoba R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in a raid on the enemy's trenches. When the raiding party came under heavy machine-gun fire from a flank he at once collected a few men and led them in an attack on the gun. His men killed the whole of the gun team, and he personally put the gun out of action. He showed splendid initiative and determination.

Lt. Edward Baring Smythe, Can. Inf., E. Ontario R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He was in charge of an outpost line through which two hostile raiding parties attempted to penetrate under cover of an intense bombardment. He showed a complete grasp of the situation, and by skilful control of his Lewis gun and rifle fire completely disorganised the enemy and broke up their attack. He showed splendid coolness and resource.

AUSTRALIAN IMPERIAL FORCE.

Lt. Harold Arthur Lancelot Binder, Aust. Inf.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When advancing during a raid on a hostile post he discovered that the wire in front of the post had been repaired. Having searched for and discovered a patrol track through the wire, he led two of his men through the gap, and charged the enemy post, capturing three prisoners. He then withdrew his party without suffering any casualties. His prompt decision and dashing action ensured the success of the enterprise.

Lt. Alwyn Robert Brierty, A.L.H.R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his troop with great courage and skill in an attack and captured some enemy trenches. Though his left arm and thigh were shattered, he continued fighting until exhausted.

Lt. Stanley Colless, D.C.M., Aust. Inf.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in a raid on the enemy's trenches. Strong opposition was encountered, and as he led the final rush his party came under heavy machine-gun fire. He attacked the gun with his party, and captured it, taking two of the gun team prisoners and inflicting heavy casualties on the enemy garrison. His men were attacked from the flank as they withdrew, but with seven men he covered the withdrawal of the remainder, causing further losses to the enemy. Owing to his splendid leadership and coolness the raiding party returned, having suffered only two casualties.

2nd Lt. Percy Muir Dun, M.M., Aust. Inf.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in a raid on the enemy's trenches. He led his men with great dash and determination, killing the crew of a machine gun and capturing the gun. Inspired by his splendid example, his party achieved considerable success.

Lt. James Alan Falconer, Aust. Inf.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Prior to a raid on the enemy's trenches he spent several nights reconnoitring "No Man's Land" and the enemy's wire at great personal risk. During the raid he showed great coolness, and the operation was successfully carried out with but few casualties, three prisoners being captured and a dozen of the enemy killed. The success of the enterprise was mainly due to his courage and resource.

Lt. Alfred Gordon Farleigh, Aust. Inf.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in a raid on the enemy's trenches. He led his men to the farthest limit of the area to be raided, fighting all the way. His party killed several of the enemy, obtained identifications, captured a machine gun, and destroyed a dug-out. He showed splendid courage and determination.

Capt. Harold Dunstan Gordon Ferres, Aust. Inf.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a raiding party against a
