A PROCLAMATION

WITHDRAWING CERTAIN CERTIFICATES OF
EXEMPTION FROM MILITARY SERVICE.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS by Sub-section (1) of Section three of the Military Service (No. 2) Act, 1918, it is provided that His Majesty may, by Proclamation declaring that a national emergency has arisen, direct that any certificates of exemption, other than certificates expressed to be granted or renewed solely on the ground specified in paragraph (c) or on the ground specified in paragraph (d) of Sub-section (1) of Section two of the Military Service Act, 1916, granted or renewed to any class or body of men specified in the Proclamation, or to men of any class or description so specified shall, as from the date specified in the Proclamation cease to have effect, and all certificates to which the Proclamation applies shall as from that date cease to be in force:

And whereas by Sub-section (2) of Section three of the Military Service (No. 2) Act, 1918, it is provided that while any such Proclamation remains in operation no application shall, except in so far as the Proclamation provides for the making of applications in any

special cases, be entertained for the grant or renewal of the certificates mentioned in that Sub-section:

And whereas a national emergency has arisen:

Now, therefore, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, in pursuance of the said Act and all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby direct that, as from the Eighth day of June, 1918, the certificates of exemption from military service specified in the First Schedule to this Our Royal Proclamation shall cease to have effect:

And in pursuance of the powers aforesaid We do hereby further direct that, notwithstanding that this Our Royal Proclamation is in operation, applications for certificates of exemption may be made in the special cases and subject to the provisions specified in the Second Schedule hereto.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

All certificates of exemption granted or renewed to men born in the year 1900 exclusive of:—

(1) Certificates held by men who, pursuant to their last authorised medical examination, are at the date of this Proclamation in medical grade 3.

(2) Certificates granted or renewed on grounds of employment by Colliery Recruiting Courts to persons employed in or about coal mines.

(3) Certificates granted or renewed on grounds of employment by Port Labour Committees, or the London Shipowners and Transport Workers Military Service Committee to men who at the date of this Proclamation are pursuant to their last authorised medical examination in a medical grade or category other than Grade 1 or Category A.

(4) Certificates expressed to be granted or renewed solely on the ground specified in paragraph (c) or on the ground specified in paragraph (d) of Sub-section (1) of Section two of the Military Service Act, 1916, that is to say, on the grounds of ill-health or infirmity, or of a conscientious objection to the undertaking of combatant service.

SECOND SCHEDULE.

Application may be made to an Appeal Tribunal in respect of a man born in the year 1900 for the grant or renewal of a certificate of exemption:—

(i) Solely on the ground specified in paragraph (b) of Sub-section (1) of Section two of the Military Service Act, 1916, in respect of a man who establishes to the satisfaction of the Tribunal that he is the last surviving son of a widow, of whom at least one son has died as a result of wounds received in, or sickness contracted by, service with Our Armed Forces during the present war; or

(ii) Solely on the ground specified in paragraph (d) of Sub-section (1) of Section two of the Military Service Act, 1916, in respect of a man whose certificate was expressed to be granted or renewed on such ground in addition to a ground specified in paragraphs (a) or (b) of that Sub-section; provided that such application is lodged with the appropriate Appeal Tribunal in accordance with the Regulations for Tribunals for the time being in force.

Explanatory Notes.

NOTE 1.—This Proclamation operates to withdraw only certificates of *exemption* granted by Tribunals and by Government Departments under Section 2 of the Military Service Act, 1916. It does not affect *protection* certificates issued under the Schedule of Protected Occupations M.M. 130 (Revised), namely, Forms 3476A, 3476B, and 3476 W.M.V., to men employed on Admiralty, War Office, or Munitions work, or protection certificates issued to men employed by Railway Companies, or agricultural vouchers issued by County Agricultural Executive Committees in England and Wales, or by the Board of Agriculture for Scotland in Scotland.

NOTE 2.—Certificates of *exemption* to which this Proclamation applies cease to be in force on the 8th June, 1918. The holder of such a certificate must forthwith transmit the certificate, together with a notification that it

has ceased to be in force, to the Local Office of the Ministry of National Service for the area in which the holder of the certificate is registered under the National Registration Acts, 1915 and 1918. If any man fails without reasonable cause or excuse to do so he is guilty of an offence under the Military Service (No.2) Act, 1918.

A PROCLAMATION

RELATING TO THE IMPORTATION OF CERTAIN ARTICLES INTO THE UNITED KINGDOM.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS by Section forty-three of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876, it is provided that the importation of arms, ammunition, gunpowder, or any other goods may be prohibited by Proclamation:

And whereas by certain Proclamations entitled Prohibition of Import Proclamations the importation of certain goods has been prohibited accordingly:

And whereas it is expedient that the importation into the United Kingdom of certain other goods should be prohibited:

Now, therefore, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, in pursuance of the said Act and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby proclaim, direct and ordain as follows:—

As from and after the date hereof, subject as hereinafter provided, the importation into the United Kingdom of the following articles is hereby prohibited, viz. —

Cheese.

Fuses, fuse components and parts.

Motor spirit (including aviation spirit), kerosene (including white spirit), gas oil, fuel oil and distillates from which any of the preceding can be produced.

Sugar cane.

Treadle lathes of 3-in. centres and over.

Provided always, and it is hereby declared, that this prohibition shall not apply to any such goods which are imported under licence given by or on behalf of the Board of Trade, and subject to the provisions and conditions of such licence.

This Proclamation may be cited as the Prohibition of Import (No. 25) Proclamation, 1918.

WHEREAS under the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) (No. 3) Act, 1915, His Majesty has power by Order in Council to define any area wherein it appears to His Majesty on the grounds specified in the said Act to be expedient for the purpose of the successful prosecution of the present War that

the sale and supply of intoxicating liquor should be controlled by the State, and to apply to such area so defined the Regulations issued by His Majesty in pursuance of the said Act under the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914:

And whereas His Majesty in Council in pursuance of the said first-mentioned Act has issued the Defence of the Realm (Liquor Control) Regulations, 1915, under the said last-mentioned Act:

And whereas it appears to His Majesty that it is expedient for the purpose of the successful prosecution of the present War that the sale and supply of intoxicating liquor in the respective areas defined and specified in the Schedule hereto should be controlled by the State on the grounds that War material is being made, loaded, unloaded and dealt with in transit therein, and that men belonging to His Majesty's Naval and Military forces are assembled therein:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

The Defence of the Realm (Liquor Control) Regulations, 1915, and any Regulations amending the same shall be, and are hereby applied to the respective areas defined and specified in the Schedule hereto.

1. The West Norfolk Area, being the area comprising so much of the County of Norfolk as is not comprised in the Eastern Area as defined and specified in the Schedule to an Order in Council, dated the 18th day of August, 1916.

2. The Lincoln Area, being the area comprising the City of Lincoln, the Borough of Boston, and the Petty Sessional Division of Kirton and Skirbeck, in the administrative County of the Parts of Holland; the administrative County of the Parts of Kesteven (excepting the Petty Sessional Division of Bourne); and the administrative County of the Parts of Lindsey, in the County of Lincoln (excepting so much of the last-mentioned administrative County as is comprised in the Humber Area as defined and specified in the Schedule to an Order in Council, dated the 13th day of April, 1918).

And whereas it is expedient to extend the provisions of that Order in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

The following subsection shall be substituted for subsection (1) of Article 25B:—

"(1) A registration officer may, subject to the general or special instructions of a

Secretary of State, grant to a Turkish subject resident in his registration district who is proved to his satisfaction to fulfil any conditions as to race, religion, origin or otherwise, which may be specified in such directions, and to be opposed to the Turkish régime and well disposed towards the interests of His Majesty and His Allies, a certificate of exemption from all or any of the provisions of this part of this Order except such as apply to alien friends."

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council bearing date the 8th day of August, 1917, to approve of Climate Allowance at the following rates being granted during the period 1st April to the 30th September of each year to Officers and Men employed in the tropical region of the West Coast of Africa, viz.:—

3s. a day to Commissioned Officers.

1s. a day to Warrant Officers,

6d. a day to the rest of the Ship's Company:

"And whereas the climate in the Gulf of Guinea remains of a very trying and unhealthy nature throughout the whole of the year, and we are therefore of opinion that Climate Allowance should be paid continuously in this locality:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the continuous payment of Climate Allowance at the above rates to Officers and Men serving in Ships stationed in the Gulf, *i.e.*, between the coast and a line drawn from Cape Palmas, in Liberia, to Cape Padron, on the South of the Congo River, with effect from the 1st October, 1917.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

"And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council bearing date the 26th day of October, 1914, to authorize the payment of an allowance of 1s. a day to Lieutenant-Commanders and Lieutenants who have not qualified as Gunnery Officers, but are appointed to perform Gunnery Duties in Ships in which a Gunnery Lieutenant is allowed but not borne:

"And whereas it is at times necessary to employ Sub-Lieutenants as Gunnery Officers of Your Majesty's Ships, and we are of opinion that when so employed they should receive a similar Allowance:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction, as from the 6th May, 1918, the payment of an allowance of 1s. a day to Sub-Lieutenants when appointed to perform Gunnery Duties in Ships in which a Gunnery Lieutenant is allowed but not borne.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Com-

missioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by Section 13 of the Air Force (Constitution) Act, 1917, it is provided that His Majesty may, by Order in Council, apply, with the necessary modifications and adaptations, in relation to the Air Council, the President of the Air Council, and the Air Force, and the Officers and Men thereof, and Air Force Property or Institutions, any of the Enactments relating to the Army Council, the Secretary of State for the War Department, the Army, or the Officers and Soldiers thereof (including Enactments conferring any powers, rights, exemption or abatement from taxation or immunities, or imposing any duties or disabilities on such Officers or Soldiers), or to Military Property or Institutions:

And whereas by the Air Force (Application of Enactments) (No. 1) Order, 1918, and the Air Force (Application of Enactments) (No. 2) Order, 1918, certain Enactments have been applied in relation as aforesaid, and it is expedient so to apply the further Enactments mentioned in the first column of the Schedule to this Order:

And whereas the provisions of Section 1 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The Enactments mentioned in the first column of the Schedule to this Order, being Enactments relating to the Secretary of State for the War Department, or the Officers and Soldiers of the Army, shall apply in relation to the President of the Air Council, and the Officers and Men of the Air Force, subject to the modifications and adaptations specified in the second column of that Schedule.

2. This Order may be cited as the Air Force (Application of Enactments) (No. 3) Order, 1918.

WHEREAS by Section 80 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1906, power is given to His Majesty, by Order in Council, to make Regulations as to the manner in which Government Ships may be registered as British Ships under the Merchant Shipping Acts:

And whereas by the said Section it is provided that those Acts shall, subject to any exceptions or modifications which may be made by Order in Council, either generally or as respects any special class of such Ships, apply to such Ships when registered in accordance with such Regulations:

And whereas the provisions of Section 1 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act, or otherwise, in Him vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following Regulations shall have effect as regards any Government Ships in the Service of the War Department.

1. An application for registry of a Government Ship in the service of the War Department shall be made in writing under the hand of the Secretary of the War Office. Such application shall contain the following particulars:—

(1) A statement of the name and description of the Ship.

(2) A statement of the time when, and place where, the Ship was built; or, if the Ship was foreign built, and the time and place of building are unknown, a statement to that effect, and of her foreign name.

(3) A statement of the nature of the title to the said Ship, whether by original construction by or for the War Department, or by purchase, capture, condemnation, or otherwise; and a list of the documents of title, if any, in case she was not originally constructed by or for the War Department.

(4) A statement of the name of the Master.

2. The Registrar, on receiving such application in respect of a Government Ship in the service of the War Department, shall:—

(1) Enter the Ship in the Register Book as belonging to "His Majesty, represented by the War Department," and shall also enter therein:—

(2) The name of the port to which she belongs.

(3) the particulars stated in the application for registration.

(4) the details comprised in the Surveyor's Certificate.

3. On the registry of a Government Ship in the service of the War Department, the Registrar shall retain in his possession the Surveyor's Certificate and the application for registry, and any documents of title mentioned in such application.

4. Upon the transfer of a registered Government Ship in the service of the War Department by Bill of Sale the War Department shall be the transferor, and the Bill of Sale shall be in Form A. in the proper form prescribed

under the Principal Act, omitting the covenant therein contained. Any such Bill of Sale shall be signed by the Secretary of the War Office on behalf of the War Department.

5. The application for a Certificate of Sale referred to in Sections 39 to 42 and Sections 44 to 46 of the Principal Act, may be made in respect of a Government Ship in the service of the War Department by the Secretary of the War Office on behalf of that Department.

6. The person to whom the management of any Government Ship in the service of the War Department is entrusted by the War Department shall be registered as provided by Section 59 (2) of the Principal Act.

7. Government Ships in the service of the War Department registered in pursuance of the provisions of this Order in Council are hereby excluded from the category of Ships belonging to His Majesty within the meaning of Sections 557 to 564 of the Principal Act.

8. Where any Section of the Merchant Shipping Acts which, by virtue of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1906, and this Order in Council, is applicable to Government Ships in the service of the War Department imposes any duty or liability or confers any right or power upon or contemplates any act being performed by the owner of a Ship such duty, liability, right or power shall, subject always to the other provisions of this Order in Council, be carried out, borne, or exercised by the War Department on behalf of His Majesty.

9. In this Order in Council the term Merchant Shipping Acts shall mean and include any of the Merchant Shipping Acts, any provision of which is by virtue of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1906, and this Order, applicable to Government Ships.

10. Section 1 and Sections 8 to 12 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, shall not apply to Government Ships in the service of the War Department registered in pursuance of the provisions of this Order in Council. Provided always that no provision of the Merchant Shipping Acts which, according to a reasonable construction, would not apply in the case of Government Ships in the service of the War Department shall be deemed to apply to such Ships by reason only that its application is not hereby expressly excluded.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council bearing date the 4th day of July, 1908, His late Majesty King Edward the Seventh, by virtue and in exercise of the power in that behalf by Section 737 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, in His Majesty vested, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to direct that the taking of depositions under the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1906, and the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, which is under those Acts authorized to be done by or before a British Consular Officer might be done in the places specified in the first column of the Schedule to the said Order by or before any Officer for the time being acting in the office or offices

respectively named in the second column of the Schedule to the said Order, and set opposite to the places so specified :

And whereas by an Order of His Majesty in Council, bearing date the 22nd day of November, 1913, and known as the Nigeria Protectorate Order in Council, 1913, the Protectorates of Northern Nigeria and Southern Nigeria were formed into one Protectorate under the name of the Protectorate of Nigeria :

And whereas it is expedient to alter the first and second items of the Schedule to the first hereinbefore recited Order in Council :

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the power in that behalf by Section 737 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to direct that the first and second items in the Schedule to the Order in Council of the 4th day of July, 1908, shall be amended by the substitution of the words "Protectorate of Nigeria" in the first column in place of the words "Northern Nigeria" and "The Protectorate of Southern Nigeria," and in the second column by the substitution of the words "The Police Magistrate or other Commissioner of the Supreme Court at each Port within the local limits of the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court" for the words "The Cantonment Magistrate at Lokoja" and "At Calabar and Warri the Police Magistrate, and at other ports of the Protectorate the District Commissioner of the District," and that the words so substituted shall be numbered "1" in each column of the said Schedule respectively, and that the succeeding items in the said Schedule shall be renumbered as "2," "3," "4," "5," "6" and "7" in both columns accordingly.

WHEREAS by the Colonial Courts of Admiralty Act, 1890, it is, amongst other things, provided that the Legislature of a British Possession may, by any Colonial Law, confer upon any inferior or subordinate Court in that Possession such partial or limited Admiralty Jurisdiction under such Regulations, and with such appeal (if any), as may seem fit :

And whereas by the said Act it is further provided that every Colonial Law which is made in pursuance of the said Act shall, unless previously approved by His Majesty through a Secretary of State, either be reserved for the signification of His Majesty's Pleasure thereon, or contain a suspending Clause providing that such Law shall not come into operation until His Majesty's Pleasure thereon has been publicly signified in the British Possession in which it has been passed :

And whereas a certain Bill passed by the Legislative Council and the Legislative Assem-

bly of the State of Western Australia (being one of the States constituting the Commonwealth of Australia) entitled "An Act to confer limited Admiralty Jurisdiction upon the Local Court at Broome, and for other relative purposes" has been transmitted for the signification of His Majesty's Pleasure thereon :

And whereas the said Bill, so transmitted as aforesaid, has been laid before His Majesty in Council, and it is expedient that the said Bill should be assented to by His Majesty :

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in pursuance of the said Act, and in exercise of the powers thereby reserved to His Majesty as aforesaid, doth, by this present Order, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, declare His assent to the said Bill.

WHEREAS by the Isle of Man (War Legislation) Act, 1914, His Majesty has power to extend to the Isle of Man any Act which, in the opinion of His Majesty, was passed for the purpose of meeting any emergency created by the present War, subject to adaptations for the purpose of making the Act applicable to the Isle of Man :

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Courts (Emergency Powers) Act, 1917, shall extend to the Isle of Man, subject to the following adaptations :—

1. In Section 1, Sub-section 2, after the words "Act of Parliament," wherever the same occur, there shall be read the words "or Act of Tynwald."

2. In Section 3 before the words "any Government Department" and the words "appropriate Government Department" there shall be read the words "the Lieutenant Governor or."

3. For the words "Increase of Rent and Mortgage Interest (War Restrictions) Act, 1915," wherever the same occur, there shall be substituted the words "Increase of Rent and Mortgage Interest (War Restrictions) (Isle of Man) Act, 1918."

4. For the words "passing of this Act," wherever the same occur, there shall be substituted the words "date of the Order in Council extending this Act to the Isle of Man."

5. For the words "passing thereof" in Sub-section (1) of Section 5, there shall be substituted the words "date of such Order," and in Sub-section (2) of such Section for the words "summary conviction" there shall be substituted the words "conviction before a High Bailiff or two Justices of the Peace."

TRADE BOARDS ACT, 1909.

SUGAR CONFECTIONERY AND FOOD
PRESERVING TRADE BOARD (Great
Britain).

PROPOSAL TO VARY CERTAIN MINIMUM RATES
OF WAGES FIXED FOR FEMALE WORKERS IN
THE SUGAR CONFECTIONERY AND FOOD PRE-
SERVING TRADE IN GREAT BRITAIN.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the above Act by the Board of Trade, and dated the 27th April, 1910, the Trade Board established under the above Act and the Trade Boards Provisional Orders Confirmation Act, 1913, for certain branches of the Sugar Confectionery and Food Preserving Trade in Great Britain as defined in the Regulations made by the Board of Trade and dated the 23rd December, 1913, hereby give notice as required by Section 4 of the above Act, that they propose to vary the following minimum time rates of wages for female workers at present fixed and set out in Schedule I of their Notice dated 6th October, 1917, as follows:—

FEMALE WORKERS.

1. For Female Workers of 18 years of age and upwards (and others to whose employment the minimum rate of 19s. 6d. per week is applicable under the terms of Section 1 of Schedule I of the Notice issued by the Trade Board dated the 6th October, 1917) from 19s. 6d. to 21s. 8d. per week.

2. For Female Workers of 18 years of age and upwards who have been employed in the trade for an aggregate period of less than 12 months and cannot suitably be engaged on piecework, and to whom the Trade Board shall have issued a certificate on the ground that the employment is not merely temporary or seasonal, from 17s. 6d. to 19s. 6d. per week.

3. For Female Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, from 16s. to 18s. per week.

4. For Female Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, from 13s. to 14s. 6d. per week.

5. For Female Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, from 10s. to 11s. per week.

6. For Female Workers under 15 years of age, from 7s. to 7s. 6d. per week.

The above proposals are on the basis of a week of 52 hours, the rates being subject to a proportionate deduction or increase according as the number of hours actually spent by the worker in the factory or workshop under contract of employment in any week is less or more than 52.

No variation is proposed in respect of the other provisions of the above-mentioned notice issued by the Trade Board, dated 6th October, 1917.

The Trade Board will consider any objections to the above Proposals to Vary which may be lodged with them within three months from 3rd June, 1918. Such objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address) and should be sent to the Secretary of the Sugar Confectionery and Food Preserving Trade Board (Great Britain), 5, Chancery Lane, London, W.C. 2.

It is desirable that the objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

COMPOUND FERTILISERS.

The Minister of Munitions, in exercise of the powers conferred upon him by the Defence of the Realm Regulations, and of all other powers enabling him, hereby Orders as follows—

1. This Order shall take effect as on and from the 5th June, 1918.

2. For the purpose of this Order and the Schedules hereto, the following expressions shall have the following meanings:—

“Potash” shall mean compounds of Potassium calculated as Potassium Oxide soluble by the methods prescribed by the Fertiliser and Feeding Stuffs (Method of Analysis) Regulations, 1908.

“Compound Fertiliser” shall mean any fertiliser, or substance intended or sold for use as a fertiliser (however described or named) which is manufactured or made by mixing or compounding together, artificially, any two or more separate substances. Provided that the product obtained by treating with sulphuric acid, or any similar reagent, a single substance containing nitrogen phosphates and potash, or any one or more of such constituents, shall not be regarded as a compound fertiliser for the purposes of this Order.

“Unit” shall mean 1 per cent. by weight in 1 ton of Fertiliser

“Maker of Compound Fertilisers” shall mean a Mixer or Compounder of any Compound Fertiliser as above defined.

3. For the purposes of this Order the maximum prices for Compound Fertilisers shall be as follows:—

(a) In the case of sales for delivery free on rail cart barge or ship at maker's works, the basis price for Compound Fertiliser of the description sold to be arrived at as provided in Clause 7 of this Order with the addition of a charge for mixing or compounding, bags and bagging, not exceeding 25s. per ton, and with the addition also (in the case of sales of less than two tons) of the extra distribution charges authorised under paragraph (b) (i.) of this clause in the case of sales of similar quantities ex vendor's store or shop or ex warehouse.

(b) In the case of sales for delivery elsewhere than at maker's works the maximum prices authorised under paragraph (a) above for sales of quantities of two tons and upwards for delivery free on rail at maker's works with the following additions, namely.

(i.) In the case of sales for delivery *ex* vendor's store or shop or *ex* warehouse (other than maker's store or warehouse at point of manufacture) the following extra distribution charges according to the quantity of Compound Fertiliser included in the sale, namely —

Quantity sold.	Additional price authorised.
1 ton and over ...	10s. per ton
2 cwts and over but less than 1 ton ...	1s per cwt.
1 cwt. and over but less than 2 cwts ...	2s. per cwt.
28 lbs. and over but less than 1 cwt ...	3s. per cwt.
Over 14 lbs but less than 28 lbs ...	4s. per cwt.

(ii) In the case of sales for delivery *ex* railway goods yard or public wharf, an extra distribution charge at the rate of 2s. 6d. per ton of Compound Fertiliser included in the sale. Provided that this additional charge shall not be made in the case of sales of more than 1 ton.

(iii.) In the case of all sales for delivery elsewhere than at maker's works all costs of transport of the Compound Fertiliser from maker's works to place of delivery, any cartage or haulage to be charged at not exceeding local rates.

4. On sales of two tons and upwards by makers to Agricultural Merchants and Dealers or to Co-operative Companies and Societies incorporated or registered under the Industrial and Provident Societies' Acts or any other Act the maximum prices fixed by clause 3 of this Order shall be reduced by a discount or allowance to the purchaser, such discount to be 5s. per ton where the maximum price of the Compound Fertiliser (after deduction of such discount) is less than £6 per ton, and 7/6 per ton where the maximum price (after deduction of a 5/- discount) is £6 per ton or upwards.

5. The maximum prices fixed by this Order are net cash prices for Compound Fertiliser in maker's or vendor's bags or other packages, net weight excluding weight of bags. Where credit is given to the purchaser a reasonable extra charge may be made, provided that the discount allowed for net cash is quoted on the invoice, and is such as to bring the net cash price within the maximum authorised. If purchaser's bags or other packages are used or the purchaser takes delivery in bulk without bags

a reasonable allowance shall be made to the purchaser. Where Compound Fertiliser is sold for delivery in bags (other than paper bags) containing less than 2 cwt. each, an extra charge of 4d. per bag may be made beyond the maximum price which would otherwise have been authorised.

6. The maximum prices fixed by the foregoing provisions of this Order are for sales of Compound Fertilisers for delivery during December, 1918. In the case of sales of Compound Fertilisers for delivery during other months, the maximum prices are in each case to be reduced or increased 1s. 6d. per ton per month, according as the month for delivery precedes or is subsequent to December, 1918, but with a maximum decrease and increase of 7s. 6d. per ton, *e.g.* the maximum prices for sales of Compound Fertilisers for July, 1918, delivery will be 7s. 6d. less per ton, while the maximum prices for sales for May, 1919, delivery will be 7s. 6d. more per ton than the maximum prices fixed as above for sales for December, 1918, delivery.

7. For the purposes of clauses 3 and 9 of this Order the basis price for any Compound Fertiliser shall be the aggregate value of the Nitrogen, Phosphates and Potash contained in the Compound Fertiliser when valued at the respective unit rates specified in the first schedule hereto, and distinguishing in the case of Nitrogen between the two classes of Nitrogen, and in the case of Phosphates between the three descriptions of Phosphates, also specified in the first schedule. In arriving at such basis price nothing shall be allowed or added for the value of any constituents of the Compound Fertiliser other than Nitrogen, Phosphates and Potash.

8. As on and from the date on which this Order takes effect no person shall sell or purchase or offer to sell or purchase any Compound Fertiliser at a price exceeding that prescribed by this Order as the maximum price (having regard to quantity, composition, packages, date for and terms of delivery) for such sale. Provided that—

(a) A Vendor of Compound Fertiliser shall not be liable to conviction for selling at a price in excess of the maximum price prescribed by this Order if the invoice given to the purchaser, as required by clause 9 of this Order, states accurately within the limits of error allowed by that clause the percentages of the different constituents therein referred to contained in the Compound Fertiliser sold and the price charged and stated on such invoice does not exceed the correct maximum price on the basis that the percentages stated in such invoice are correct; and

(b) A Purchaser of Compound Fertiliser shall not be liable to conviction for purchasing at a price exceeding the maximum price unless the price agreed to be paid by him is to his knowledge in excess of the maximum price authorised for such purchase.

9. As on and from the date on which this Order takes effect, no person shall sell any Compound Fertiliser without giving to the purchaser on or before or as soon as possible after delivery an invoice stating:—

(a) The percentage contained in such Compound Fertiliser of each of the following constituents contained therein, namely:—(i) Class I, Nitrogen; (ii) Class II, Nitrogen; (iii) Water Soluble Phosphate; (iv) Citric Soluble Phosphate; (v) Insoluble Phosphate; and (vi) Soluble Potash, all as more

particularly defined in the First Schedule hereto (such percentages to be stated accurately in the case of each constituent within the limits of error specified in the second schedule hereto);

(b) The maximum unit rates authorised to be charged for each of such constituents as specified in the first schedule hereto;

(c) The basis price for such Fertiliser in which may, however, be included any charge made for credit;

(d) All addition made to such basis price in arriving at the actual price charged for such Fertiliser (including the maker's charge, not exceeding 25s. per ton, for mixing or compounding, bags and bagging); and

(e) The price charged for the Compound Fertiliser, and where such price includes an extra charge for credit, the discount allowed for net cash.

10. None of the foregoing provisions or restrictions of this Order as regards maximum price or otherwise shall apply to:—

(a) Any sale of any Compound Fertiliser for export from the United Kingdom to any country other than the Channel Islands or the Isle of Man.

(b) Any sale of any Compound Fertiliser in quantities not exceeding 14 lbs.

(c) Any sale of Compound Fertiliser in quantities exceeding 14 lbs., where the Compound Fertiliser is sold for horticultural purposes, packed in special bags, tins, boxes or cartons, each branded or marked with the maker's or vendor's name and address, and the words "horticultural fertiliser," and containing not more than 14 lbs.

(d) Any sale of any Compound Fertiliser for delivery prior to the 1st July, 1918.

11. As on and from the 1st July, 1918, no person shall manufacture or produce any Compound Fertiliser, nor shall any maker of Compound Fertiliser sell any such Fertiliser, except under a licence issued by or under the authority of the Minister of Munitions, and in accordance with any terms and conditions of such licence.

12. All persons engaged in producing, making, selling, distributing or storing any Compound Fertiliser shall make such returns with regard to their businesses, and shall verify the same in such manner (including production of their books to any accredited representatives of the Minister of Munitions) as shall from time to time be required by or under the authority of the Minister of Munitions.

13. None of the foregoing provisions or restrictions of this Order shall apply to a sale, by a maker to a consumer, of two or more Fertilisers or substances, neither of which is by itself a Compound Fertiliser as defined by this Order, notwithstanding that it is one of the terms of the purchase that the Fertilisers or substances purchased are to be artificially mixed or compounded together by the maker before delivery, provided that such Fertilisers or substances are sold separately by description as such, and that an invoice is given to the consumer on or before or as soon as possible after delivery which states the quantity and price of each of the Fertilisers or substances included in the mixture or compound as delivered, and the charge made for mixing or compounding, bags and bagging

14. This Order and the Fertilisers and Feeding Stuffs Act, 1906, shall operate and have effect independently of one another, and

nothing contained in this Order shall be held to exempt any person from compliance with any of the provisions or requirements of such Act, or any Regulations made thereunder, applicable to sales or purchases of Compound Fertilisers; nor shall any of the provisions of the said Act or Regulations be held to govern or affect any of the requirements or provisions of this Order, or any proceedings instituted in respect of any breach thereof.

15. This Order supersedes the Orders relating to Compound Fertilisers made by the Minister of Munitions on the 13th October, 1917, and the 14th November, 1917, excepting only as regards sales or purchases of Compound Fertilisers made before or after the date of this Order for delivery before the 1st June, 1918.

16. This Order may be cited as "The Compound Fertilisers Order, 1918."

The Agricultural Wages Board (England and Wales), duly established and constituted under Section 5 (1) of the above Act and the Regulations made by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, dated the 8th November, 1917, having had regard to the provisions of sub-sections (6) and (7) of the said Section, hereby give notice, as required by Section 5 (4) of the above Act, and by Paragraph 4 of the Agricultural Wages Regulations, 1918, that they propose to fix the following minimum rates of wages and the following differential rates for overtime employment, as hereinafter defined, for male workmen of 18 years of age and over employed in agriculture for time-work in the area comprising the administrative county of Gloucester, the county boroughs of Bristol and Gloucester, and the parishes of Blockley, Cursdean, Daylesford and Evenlode in the administrative county of Worcester, and to define for the purpose of the application of such differential rates for overtime the employment which is to be treated as overtime employment, that is to say :—

1. The wages payable for employment in summer (as hereinafter defined) of male workmen in agriculture of 18 years of age and over shall be not less than wages at the minimum rate of 30s. for 54 hours.

2. The wages payable for employment in winter (as hereinafter defined) of male workmen in agriculture of 18 years of age and over shall be not less than wages at the minimum rate of 30s. for 48 hours.

3. Where the employment of a workman is for a week or longer period, and the conditions of the employment provide for the working hours in each week being either generally or, in certain events, less than 54 in summer or 48 in winter, the minimum rates of wages set out in paragraphs 1 and 2 above (hereinafter referred to as the normal rates) shall not apply, and in lieu thereof the minimum rates of wages for the employment of the workman on time-work shall be such increased rates as will secure to the workman wages for employment on time-work during the lesser number of hours provided for by the conditions of his employment equal to the wages payable at the normal rate for 54 hours in summer or 48 hours in winter, as the case may be.

4. The differential rates for overtime shall be as follows :—

(a) In respect of overtime employment on week-days, 8½d. per hour.

(b) In respect of overtime employment on a Sunday, 10d. per hour.

5. For the purpose of the application of the above rates the following employment is defined as overtime employment, that is to say :—

(a) All employment in excess of 54 hours in any week (excluding Sunday) in summer.

(b) All employment in excess of 48 hours in any week (excluding Sunday) in winter.

(c) All employment on a Sunday.

6. For the purpose of the above rates employment in summer shall be deemed to be

employment during the period commencing on the first Monday in March and terminating on the last Sunday in October, and employment in winter shall be deemed to be employment during the rest of the year.

7. The above rates shall apply to all male workmen of 18 years of age and upwards who are wholly or partly employed in agriculture within the meaning of Section 17 (1) of the Corn Production Act, 1917, in the above-mentioned area, during such time as they are so employed.

8. For the purpose of the above rate meal times shall not be included in the period of employment.

9. The Board further propose three months after the general cessation of hostilities or on the withdrawal by the Food Controller of all restrictions upon food consumption (whichever event shall first occur) to proceed to give notice of a proposal under the above-mentioned Regulations that employment in excess of 6½ hours on one day in each week (other than a Sunday) shall be defined as employment to which the above differential rates for overtime shall apply.

The Agricultural Wages Board, as required by Section 5 (4) of the above Act, and by Paragraph 4 of the above-mentioned Regulations, will consider any objections to the above rate and definition of overtime employment which may be lodged with them within one month from the date of this Notice. The objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons what is objected to.

5. The above minimum rates shall apply to all male workmen of 18 years of age and upwards who are wholly or partly employed in agriculture within the meaning of Section 17 (1) of the Corn Production Act, 1917, in the above-mentioned area, during such time as they are so employed.

6. For the purpose of the above minimum rates meal times shall not be included in the period of employment.

The Agricultural Wages Board, as required by Section 5 (4) of the above Act, will consider any Objections to the above rates which may be lodged with them within one month from the date of this Notice.
