Displayed conspicuous courage and presence of mind on the occasion of an air raid, when the school in which she was teaching was struck by a bomb.

Andrews, Gertrude, Sorting Clerk and Telegraphist.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Anslow, William.

For courage and devotion to duty in remaining at his work at an acid factory,

although suffering from the effects of severe burns.

Arthur, Laura May.

For courage and presence of mind in averting a serious explosion in a filling factory.

Austin, Beatrice May.

For courage in returning to work in the same factory after receiving injuries by an explosion, in which she lost the sight of one eye.

Baillie, John, Assistant Clerk of Works.

For courage and presence of mind on the occasion of an explosion at a national filling factory.

Baker, Harry, Skilled Labourer.

For courage displayed in saving at great personal risk the life of a workman who had come in contact with a live electric wire.

Balcomb, Samuel.

For great courage and self-sacrifice in twice exposing himself to showers of sulphuric acid from leaking pipes, at grave personal risk, in order to stop the leakages and keep the plant running.

Baldwin, Charles, Surgery Attendant.

For courage and self-sacrifice shown during an air raid,

Balkan, Minnie.

For courage in helping to subdue a serious fire at a filling factory.

Barlow, Ada Annie.

For courage and resource shown on the occasion of a fire at a munitions factory.

Barnes, Elsie.

For courage in helping to subdue a serious fire at a filling factory.

Barratt, Frederick William.

For great courage and presence of mind in assisting to extinguish a fire in a filling factory.

Bartholomew, James Alfred.

For an act of great courage. He jumped off the locomotive which he was driving and succeeded in pulling a man off the lines, thereby saving his life at grave personal risk.

Beck, Edith Amy, Telephonist.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Beddall, Samuel.

For great courage. At grave personal risk, he twice entered a burning room in a filling factory and rescued three workers, in spite of dense fumes and personal injuries.

Bentley, George P., Special Constable.

Endeavoured, at great personal risk, to rescue injured persons from a demolished building on the occasion of an air raid.

Berkley, Dr. Ernest James.

Displayed great courage and devotion in rescue work on the occasion of a Zeppelin raid.

Berry, Alexander.

For courage in removing a large quantity of picric acid at very great personal risk during a fire.

Berry, Sapper George, No. 2 Emergency Section, R.E.

For courage and devotion to duty in connection with the rescue of persons injured by air raid.

Beverley, Lilian Alice, Supervisor, Telephones.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Binding, Phillip.

For courage and self-sacrifice in continuing to work for 36 hours with a broken thumb, so that important work might not be delayed.

Binns, Mary Alice (Mrs.), Acting Caretaker Operator, Telephones.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Birks, John, Able Seaman, R.N.V.R.

For brave conduct in rescuing a seaman from a burning ship at great personal risk.

Bobin, Frederick Godfrey, Cable Hand.

For courage in connection with submarine cable work in dangerous waters.

Boyes, Anthony.

For courage in assisting to extinguish a fire at an explosives factory.

Bradman, William Alfred.

For courage in removing a large quantity of picric acid at very great personal risk during a fire.

Brightwell, John.

For great courage and resource on the occasion of a fire. He made several journeys up an iron ladder in his efforts to put out the fire, though his hands were badly burnt in doing so.

Brooke, John Warwick.

For courage and devotion to duty. Has carried on his work as official photographer

in circumstances of great difficulty and danger.

Brooks, Ernest.

For courage and devotion to duty. Has carried on his work as official photographer in circumstances of great difficulty and danger.

Brown, Annie Maria.

For courage and presence of mind shown at an outbreak of fire in a munitions factory.

Brown, Charles William, Acting Company Sergeant-Major, R.E. (I.W.T.).

Whilst in command of a War Department Tug showed great courage and perseverance in difficult and dangerous circumstances in rescuing a ship in distress.

Brown, Private George Alexander, Expeditionary Force Canteens.

While an air raid was in progress showed great presence of mind in removing wounded officers from a hut which had been wrecked by a bomb.

Brown, Sapper William, No. 2 Emergency Section, R.E.

For courage and devotion to duty in connection with the rescue of persons injured by air raid.

Bull, George, Chief of Factory Fire Brigade.

For courage on several occasions involving risk to his life, and particularly in extinguishing fire arising out of an explosion.

Bullions, Annie Dorothy Scott, Telephonist.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during aid raids.

Burt, Elsie May, Sorting Clerk and Telegraphist.

Displayed exceptional courage and devotion to duty at a dangerous position during air raids and bombardment.

Burton, Sapper Frank, 1st London Emergency Section, R.E.

For courage and devotion to duty in connection with the rescue of persons injured by air raids.

Busuttil, Emmanuele, Assistant Fitter, Malta Dockyard.

For meritorious service performed in one of H.M. ships while in action.

Calrow, Grace.

For courage and devotion to duty at a fire at a filling factory, when she was on duty continuously for forty-eight hours in circumstances of very great danger.

Campbell, Duncan, Farmer and Coastwatcher.

For courage in rescuing a man from a torpedoed vessel who had climbed into an extremely perilous position on the face of a cliff.

Campbell, Joseph, Skilled Workman.

Displayed great zeal and courage in carrying out telegraph work under dangerous conditions.

Camilleri, Carmelo, Assistant Fitter, Malta Dockyard.

For meritorious service performed in one of H.M. ships while in action.

Carpenter, Ada Elizabeth, supervisor, Telephones.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Carruthers, John Dudley, Sergeant, G.L. (I.W.T.).

As master of a deep sea tug displayed zeal, courage, and loyalty in the performance of duties of an arduous and dangerous nature.

Caton, John, Boiler Attendant, Power House.

Remained on duty the whole time during a severe fire and explosion at a national filling factory in spite of great danger.

Chamberlain, Alexander, Shift Engineer, Power House.

Displayed conspicuous courage and devotion to duty on the occasion of a very serious fire and explosion at a munition factory.

Chapman, Gertrude.

For courage in helping to subdue a serious fire at a filling factory.

Churchill, Frederick, Schoolkeeper.

For courage and presence of mind on the occasion of an air raid, when he averted panic among a large number of persons who had taken refuge in the school.

Coates, Serjeant-Major William, Expeditionary Force Canteens.

For courage and devotion to duty while carrying on canteen work under shell fire.

Codman, Trooper Sydney Bert, 1st Life Guards.

For courage at a fire caused by an air raid. He picked up a burning incendiary bomb and placed it in a bucket of water.

Coe, Tom.

For conspicuous courage at a fire at an explosives factory. At great personal risk he succeeded, with another man, in rescuing a fellow-worker, although he was twice knocked down by the force of the explosion.

Coles, William.

For great courage and presence of mind in preventing a dangerous accident from a runaway truck.

Cope, Nurse Lily, Factory Nursing Staff.

Behaved with great courage on the occasion of a severe fire and explosion at a national filling factory, performing her duties quietly and without regard to personal safety.

Copland, Lawrence, Sergeant-Major, G. L. (I.W.T.).

As master of a deep sea tug displayed zeal, courage, and loyalty in the performance of duties of an arduous and dangerous nature.

Cowell, Elsie, Telephonist.

For great courage and devotion to duty under circumstances of grave personal danger.

Cox, Serjeant George Henry, 1st London Emergency Section, R.E.

For courage and devotion to duty in connection with the rescue of persons injured by air raids.

Cross, Charles, Ex-Confidential Civilian Clerk to General Staff Officer (Naval) at Singapore.

For meritorious and prompt action, taken on his own initiative, which resulted in the avoidance of a situation of much danger.

Cunnington, Mary Philomena (Mrs.), Assistant Mistress.

Displayed conspicuous courage and presence of mind on the occasion of an air raid, when the school in which she was teaching was struck by a bomb.

Cuthbert, Ivy, Telephonist.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Dalmedo, Antonio, Hired Leading Stoker, Yard Craft.

For courage in volunteering for service in victualling craft in a danger area.

Darch, Joseph.

For courage shown on the occasion of an explosion at a filling factory.

Davies, Lily.

For courage and high example on the occasion of an explosion at a chemical works.

Denner, Frank, Headmaster.

Displayed conspicuous courage and presence of mind on the occasion of an air raid, when the school in which he was teaching was struck by a bomb.

Derricut, William.

For conspicuous courage at a fire at an explosives factory. At great personal risk he succeeded, with another man, in rescuing a fellow-worker, although he was twice knocked down by the force of the explosion.

Disberry, William, Pump Attendant.

Although 70 years of age, he remained at his fire pumps the whole night on the occasion of a severe explosion and fire at a national filling factory. The position was one of great danger throughout.

Donovan, Eileen Annie, Telephonist.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Drew, Sapper Albert Thomas, No. 2 Emergency Section, R.E.

For courage and devotion to duty in connection with the rescue of persons injured by air raids.

Dunn, James.

For courage and high example in continuing at his work under circumstances of grave danger.

Egglesstone, William.

For courage in fighting a fire at an explosives factory, at very grave personal risk.

Enefer, Ellen Hilda, Telephonist.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Evans, William.

For great courage. He crawled through a flue and removed a blockage, at imminent risk of his life from acid and chemical fumes.

Everard, Ethel Roy, Supervisor, Telephones.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Fakeley, Ethel Emily, Telephonist.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Ferguson, Agnes.

For high example and courage on the occasion of three explosions in a filling factory.

Field, Lance-Corporal Herbert, 1st London Emergency Section, R.E.

For courage and devotion to duty in connection with the rescue of persons injured by air raids.

Fletcher, Elizabeth.

For courage shown on several occasions of fire in a munitions factory.

Foster, Robert Baldwin.

For great courage and presence of mind in assisting to extinguish a fire in a filling factory.

Frederico, Arthur Oscar, Hired Chief Engineer, Yard Craft.

For courage in volunteering for service in victualling craft in a danger area.

Frost, Albert.

For great courage and resource shown on the occasion of a fire at a munitions factory, at grave personal risk.

Gardner, James, Ex-Air Mechanic I., R.N.A.S.

For courage and presence of mind in extinguishing, at great personal risk and with difficulty, a fire on a loaded ammunition lorry.

Garth, Richard, Sergeant, Lancaster Fire Brigade.

Behaved with great gallantry on the occasion of a severe fire and explosion at a national filling factory.

Gatenby, Arthur.

For courage and resource in helping to extinguish a fire at an explosives factory at grave personal risk.

Gibson, Mary, Munition Worker.

For courage and devotion to duty. Although severely burned by the explosion of a fuse, she carried it outside the magazine away from contact with other explosive matter.

Gillen, Robert, Skilled Workman.

Displayed great zeal and courage in carrying out telegraph work under dangerous conditions.

Gittings, Phyllis, Telephonist.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Gorman, Harry.

For courage. At grave personal risk he twice descended a shaft and attempted to rescue two workmen who were overcome by sewer-gas. On his second descent he was himself overcome and was with difficulty extricated.

Grasham, Lilian Florence, Telephonist

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty on the occasion of a serious explosion.

Greengrass, E., Sergeant, 24th London Regiment.

For conspicuous courage and devotion to duty while on special service in Russia and Roumania.

Gunn, Private Francis George, Expeditionary Force Canteens.

For courage and devotion to duty while carrying on canteen work under shell fire.

Hacquoil, John Walter, Acting Regimental Sergeant-Major, R.E. (I.W.T.).

Whilst in command of a War Department tug, on passage with and considerably hampered by a tow of barges, gallantly went to the assistance of a vessel steaming in company with him which had been sunk by enemy action, and by promptness and good seamanship succeeded in rescuing nearly all the crew.

Hall, William Joseph, Quartermaster.

For courage in connection with submarine cable work in dangerous waters.

Harley, Robert Richard.

For courage and presence of mind in helping to subdue a fire under circumstances of great danger.

Harris, Harold Baker, Stoker.

For courage in connection with submarine cable work in dangerous waters.

Harrison, Rosa Eleanor (Mrs.), Telephonist.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Hauxwell, Marshall.

For courage in assisting to extinguish a fire at an explosives factory in very dangerous circumstances.

Hawkes, Albert Edward (D.S.M.), Sergeant, Royal Marine Depot, Deal.

For courage and presence of mind during bomb practice, when a live bomb fell into a trench full of men. He ran to the bomb, picked it up, and threw it out of the trench.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Haynes, Edith Mary (Mrs.), Supervisor, Telephones.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Heald, William, Feed Pump Attendant, Power House.

Remained on duty the whole time during a severe fire and explosion at a national filling factory, in spite of great danger.

Healey, Francis, Chargeman of Electrical Fitters.

For courage in performing meritorious service on one of H.M. ships in action.

Henbrey, Emily Mary, Sorting Clerk and Telegraphist.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Higgins, Dennis, Able Seaman, R.N.V.R.

For cool and courageous conduct on the occasion of a fire in the neighbourhood of a ship's magazine.

Higgins, William.

For prompt and courageous action in helping to extinguish a fire at a filling factory at great personal risk, thereby preventing very serious damage.

Hodgson, Tom Alfred, Fitter, Messrs. Earle's Shipbuilding and Engineering Co., Hull.

For courage and self-sacrifice in saving the life of a drowning man in circumstances of great danger.

Hollamby, Rosetta Elizabeth, Telephonist.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Honnor, Herbert Thomas.

For courage and high example in rescuing, at great personal risk, two fellow-workers on the occasion of a fire in a filling factory.

Hornby, Frederick.

For courage in assisting to extinguish a fire at an explosives factory at great personal risk.

Howe, Isabel Louisa, Telephonist.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Hunter, Agnes Kerr, Telephonist.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids, and especially when in a position of responsibility and grave danger on the occasion of a serious explosion.

Hutchinson, George, Boiler Fireman, Power House.

Remained on duty the whole time during a severe fire and explosion at a national filling factory in spite of great danger.

Hutton, Sergeant-Major Harry, Expeditionary Force Canteens.

For courage and devotion to duty while carrying on canteen work under shell fire.

Jackson, Alice.

For courage in continuing work of a dangerous nature in a filling factory. Two accidents occurred in which workers were killed, but she continued at her work and encouraged those under her to do the same.

Jackson, Thomas.

Endeavoured, at great personal risk, to rescue injured persons from a demolished building on the occasion of an air raid.

Jamison, Mary Jane, Supervisor, Telephones.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Johnson, Arthur.

For courage and presence of mind in subduing a fire in a magazine at an explosives factory, and in removing a number of grenades.

Johnson, Ernest Walter, Youth, Engineering Dept.

For great courage and devotion to duty in carrying out telegraph work in a dangerous area.

Johnson, Jilbert, Works Constable.

Behaved with coolness and resource on the occasion of a severe fire and explosion at a national filling factory.

Johnstone, Mary Dott, Supervisor, Telephones.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Jones, Anita Myfanwy, Telephonist.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Jones, James.

For courage in removing a large quantity of picric acid, at very great personal risk, during a fire.

Kendall, Sydney Frank.

For courage and presence of mind in helping to subdue a fire under circumstances of great danger.

Kenny, Patrick Michael.

On several occasions, at risk of his life, conveyed food and messages to a party of troops who were cut off and isolated by hostile forces.

Kerridge, Harold.

For courage and resource in subduing a fire at great personal risk. Age 16.

Kimbell, Harold Richard.

For courage in removing a large quantity of picric acid at very great personal risk during a fire.

Kirk, Evelyn.

For courage on the occasion of an imminent explosion at an explosives factory.

Kirkham, Herbert.

For courage and high example in continuing at very dangerous work, although seriously injured on two separate occasions.

Knott, Nelly.

For great courage in stopping a machine and thus saving the life of a fellow-worker at grave risk to her own life.

Lancaster, Amelia.

For courage and high example in time of grave danger. Her example of returning to work at the earliest opportunity after a severe shock caused by an explosion at a filling factory had an excellent influence on other workers.

Landregan, Sapper Harry Humphrey, No. 2, Emergency Section, R.E.

For courage and devotion to duty in connection with the rescue of persons injured by air raids.

Last, Stanley George, Skilled Workman.

For courage and high example in continuing work in a gas-laden atmosphere at great personal risk.

Law, Frank.

For self-sacrifice and devotion to duty. Twice, after suffering from very severe burns, he resumed dangerous work in an acid factory.

Lawrence, George.

For courage and high example shown on the occasion of an explosion at a filling factory.

Lightbody, Jessie, Telephonist.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Lindsay, Janet.

For courage and resource on the occasion of an explosion in a detonator magazine at a filling factory.

London, Staff-Sergeant Edward, Expeditionary Force Canteens.

For courage and devotion to duty while carrying on canteen work under shell fire.

McDonnell, James, Skilled Workman.

Displayed great zeal and courage in carrying out telegraph work under dangerous conditions.

McDowell, John Benjamin.

For courage and devotion to duty. Has carried on his work as official photographer in circumstances of great difficulty and danger.

Mackern, Joan.

For courage in carrying out her duties under circumstances of grave personal danger.

Malins, Geoffrey Herbert.

For courage and devotion to duty. Has carried on his work as official photographer in circumstances of great difficulty and danger.

Manclark, James, Factory Engineer.

At great risk to his life displayed conspicuous courage on the occasion of an explosion, another explosion being imminent.

Mann, Ernest William, Store Porter.

For great courage and self-sacrifice in unremitting attention to duty under circumstances of danger.

Mansley, William, Skilled Workman.

Displayed great courage in maintaining telephone service during a series of explosions.

Marchant, Kitty.

For courage in helping to subdue a serious fire at a filling factory.

Marlow, Ethel Violet, Telephonist.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Messiter, Florence Ethel.

For self-sacrifice and high example in continuing at her work in a filling factory after her health was seriously impaired by her work there.

Middleton, Gertrude (Mrs.), Assistant Mistress (Infants' Department).

Displayed very conspicuous courage and presence of mind on the occasion of an air raid, when a bomb burst in the classroom in which she was teaching.

Milne, John Donaldson, Inspector, Engineering Dept.

For courage, devotion to duty, and high example under circumstances of danger.

Mitchell, Ivy.

For courage and high example shown on the occasion of an accident at an iron works.

Mitchell, Lilian, Supervisor, Telephones.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Moore, Dr. Athol Raymond.

Displayed great courage and devotion in rescue work on the occasion of a Zeppelin raid.

Morrison, Robert, Farmer and Coastwatcher.

For courage in rescuing a man who had been cast ashore from a torpedoed vessel and who had crawled into a dangerous position on the rocks.

Morrisroe, Catherine, Telephonist.

Remained at her post until relieved on the occasion of a very serious explosion at munition works, although the explosions were almost continuous and the police advised the officers on duty to leave the building.

Moxon, George.

For great courage and resource on the occasion of fire in an explosives factory.

Nelms, Thomas William, Stoker.

For courage in connection with submarine cable work in dangerous waters.

Nerrinck, Cyrille.

For courage and presence of mind in helping to subdue a fire under circumstances of great danger.

Newton, Olive.

For courage and resource in attempting to rescue a fellow-worker on the occasion of an explosion at a filling factory.

North, Alfred Herbert, Caretaker of Urban District Council and Education Offices.

Displayed great courage in attending to persons wounded on the occasion of an attack by enemy aircraft. He rendered first aid in the midst of gas escaping from a burning main, and worked continuously for 72 hours.

Nutt, George, Boiler Attendant, Power House.

Remained on duty the whole time during a severe fire and explosion at a national filling factory, in spite of great danger.

Ody, Robert.

For courage and resource in preventing an explosion and fire at grave personal risk.

Patterson, Angus McKay.

For courage and high example at a fire in a filling factory. Though suffering from burns, he rendered important assistance to several women who were in great danger.

Perring, Alfred Eli, Petty Officer, R.N.

For brave conduct in rescuing a seaman from a burning ship at great personal risk.

Perritt, Grace Priscilla, Telephonist.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Petrie, William, Inspector, Engineering Dept.

For courage, devotion to duty, and high example under circumstances of danger.

Philbrick, Beatrice Sarah, Supervisor, Telephones.

For devotion to duty and high example in a position of great responsibility.

Phillpott, Thomas Henry, Cable Hand.

For courage in connection with submarine cable work in dangerous waters.

Poole, Arthur, Postman.

For devotion to duty under especially difficult and dangerous circumstances.

Prater, William Francis, Engineer of Dredger, Portsmouth.

For courage and self-sacrifice in descending to his engines and shutting off steam when his ship was in danger of capsizing as a result of enemy action.

Price, Ada, Telephonist.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Prout, A.R., Serjeant, Machine Gun Corps.

For conspicuous courage and devotion to duty while on special service in Russia and Roumania.

Punton, William.

For prompt and courageous action in helping to extinguish a fire in a filling factory at great personal risk, thereby preventing very serious damage.

Quinn, William Ridgway.

For courage and high example in subduing a fire in a filling factory. He assisted in saving life and plant in spite of being badly gassed.

Raymond, Henry Charles.

For courage and devotion to duty. Has carried on his work as official photographer in circumstances of great difficulty and danger.

Reed, Staff Sergeant John Curtis, Expeditionary Force Canteens.

For courage and devotion to duty while carrying on canteen work under shell fire.

Reynolds, George.

For courage and resource in preventing an explosion and fire at grave personal risk.

Richardson, William, Metropolitan Police Constable.

Displayed coolness and courage on the occasion of an air raid.

Robinson, Arthur.

For great courage and resource at an explosion at a chemical works in extinguishing several fires, at imminent peril to his life.

Rose, John.

For devotion to duty and great skill and resource in examining and shoring up factory buildings partly collapsed as the result of an explosion.

Savage, Henry, Night Telephonist.

Displayed great courage and devotion to duty during air raids.

Saville, Rosina.

For courage in helping to subdue a serious fire at a filling factory.

Seamer, Doris Emily, Supervisor, Telephones.

For devotion to duty and high example in a position of great responsibility.

Seery, William, Works Constable.

Displayed courage and resource on the occasion of a severe fire and explosion at a national filling factory. He was thrown down and injured by an explosion.

Shepherd, Kitty.

For courage in helping to subdue a serious fire at a filling factory.

Shepherd, Nurse Maisie J., Factory Nursing Staff.

Behaved with great courage on the occasion of a severe fire and explosion at a national filling factory, performing her duties quietly and without regard to personal safety.

Shepherd, William James, Quartermaster.

For courage in connection with submarine cable work in dangerous waters.

Silburn, Ernest.

For great courage and presence of mind in assisting to extinguish a fire in a filling factory.

Sims, Gordon, Electrical Fitter.

For courage in saving at great personal risk the life of a workman who had come in contact with a live electric wire.

Smethurst, Corporal James.

For great initiative and courage displayed on the occasion of a fire.
