PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by Section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that "Whereas in some instances Tithings, Hamlets, Chapelries, and other Places or Districts may be separated from the Parishes or Mother Churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and Places altogether extra-parochial may, in some instances, with advantage, be annexed to Parishes or Districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted Separate Parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own Diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any Diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop, that any such Tithing, Hamlet, Chapelry, Place or District within the Diocese of such Archbishop, or the Diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any Parish or Mother Church, and either be constituted a Separate Benefice by itself or be united to any other Parish to which it may be

more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining Tithing, Hamlet, Chapelry, Place or District, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a Separate Parish or Benefice, or that any Extra-Parochial Place may with advantage be annexed to any Parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a Separate Parish for ecclesiastical purposes, and the said Archbishop, or Bishop, shall draw up a Scheme in writing (the Scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Glebe Lands, Tithes, Rent-charges, and other Ecclesiastical Dues, Rates and Payments, and in respect to Patronage and Rights to Pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested, and if the Patron or Patrons of the Benefice or Benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such Scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such Scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such Consent as aforesaid, by his Report

to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such Scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect: "

And whereas by Section 8 of the Church Building Act, 1839, it is, amongst other things, further enacted: "That when by any Order of His Majesty in Council, as aforesaid, a Separate Parish for ecclesiastical purposes is constituted, the same shall, on registration thereof, and with the consent in writing of the Incumbent or Incumbents of the Benefice or Benefices to be thereby affected, become a Perpetual Curacy and Benefice, and the Minister thereof duly nominated and licensed thereto, and his Successors, shall be a body politic and corporate, with perpetual succession, and may receive and take to himself, and his Successors, all such Lands, Tenements, Tithes, Rent-charges, and Hereditaments as shall be granted unto him or them, and such Perpetual Curate shall thenceforth have, within the limits of the District Parish formed under the Church Building Acts for the Church of such Perpetual Curacy, sole and exclusive Cure of Souls, and shall not in anywise be subject to the control or interference of the Incumbent or Incumbents of the Benefice or Benefices to be affected by such Order, if he or they shall have consented to such Order as aforesaid: "

And whereas the Right Reverend Edward, Lord Bishop of Winchester, hath made a Representation, in writing, dated the 29th December, 1917, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"I, Edward, by Divine permission Bishop of Winchester, do, in pursuance of the 26th Section of the Act of Parliament of the 1st and 2nd years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 106, hereby represent to your Grace as follows:—

"That there is in my Diocese of Winchester, in the County of Hants, (a) the Rectory and Parish of Newnham with the Chapelry of Mapledurwell annexed, the limits and boundaries of which Chapelry are well known and defined, (b) the Rectory and Parish of Nately Scures adjacent to which is the Extra-Parochial Place of Andwell, which belongs to Nately Scures but is served by the Incumbent of Basing with Up Nately, (c) the Vicarage and Parish of Basing with Up Nately, (d) the Vicarage and Parish of Odiham:

"That the said Chapelry of Mapledurwell contains an ancient Consecrated Church dedicated to St. Mary, distant from the Parish Church of Newnham 3 miles or thereabouts, having accommodation for 140 persons:

"That the Church at Newnham has accommodation for 170 persons:

"That according to the Census of 1911 the population of the Parish of Newnham is 572, that of the said Chapelry of Mapledurwell is 180, that of the Parish of Nately Scures is 355, of the Parish of Basing with Up Nately is 1,400, and of the Parish of Odiham 2,674:

"That there is a House of Residence belonging to each of the said Benefices of Newnham with Mapledurwell, and Nately Scures:

"That the net annual value of the said Benefice of Newnham with Mapledurwell is £450 or thereabouts arising chiefly from Tithe and Glebe:

"That the net annual value of the said Benefice of Nately Scures is £150 or thereabouts arising from Tithe:

"That the boundaries of the Extra-Parochial Place of Andwell are well known and defined, and also those of a small Extra-Parochial Place at the southern end of the Chapelry of Up Nately; Both places are contiguous to the Chapelry of Mapledurwell:

"That there is also a piece of the Parish of Nately Scures lying at a distance from that Parish, and contiguous to the western side of the Chapelry of Mapledurwell:

"That there are five pieces or portions of the Parish of Nately Scures which lie within the boundaries of the Chapelry of Up Nately:

"That it appears to me that under the provisions of the said Act of Parliament, and of the Act of the 2nd and 3rd years of the same Reign (C. 49), the said Chapelry of Mapledurwell may be advantageously separated from the said Parish of Newnham, that the said isolated piece of Nately Scures may be likewise separated from the said Parish of Nately Scures, and that the said Chapelry (together with the said piece of Nately Scures, the said Extra-Parochial Place of Andwell, and the said small Extra-Parochial Place at the southern end of Up Nately) may be constituted a Separate Parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a Perpetual Curacy and Benefice to be called the Perpetual Curacy of Mapledurwell.

"That two triangular pieces of the Parish of Newnham lying to the south of the London and South Western Railway may be advantageously separated from the Parish of Newnham and be annexed to the Parish of Nately Scures to which they are contiguous.

"That the said five pieces of the Parish of Nately Scures which are within the boundaries of the Chapelry of Up Nately may be advantageously separated from the said Parish of Nately Scures and be annexed to and become part of the Chapelry of Up Nately, which Chapelry is held with and belongs to the Parish of Basing.

"That certain parts of the most easterly portion of the Parish of Nately Scures, which are to the east of and contiguous to the Parish of Newnham, and also a contiguous portion of the Parish of Odiham, may be advantageously separated from their respective Parishes and annexed for ecclesiastical purposes only to the said Parish of Newnham.

"That the Provost and Scholars of Queen's College, in the University of Oxford, are the Patrons of the said Benefice of Newnham with Mapledurwell, that the Lady Dorchester is the Patron of the said Benefice of Nately Scures, that I, by virtue of my Bishopric, am the Patron of the said Benefice of Odiham, and that the President and Fellows of Magdalen College, in the University of Oxford, are the Patrons of the said Benefices of Basing with Up Nately.

"That the Reverend William Hipwood Mowat is the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Newnham with Mapledurwell, the Reverend Charles Herbert Roberts is the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Nately Scures, the Reverend James Pilkington Baynes is the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Odiham, and the Reverend Thomas Trotter Blockley is the present Incumbent of Basing with Up Nately.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the said 26th Section of the first-named Act of Parliament I, the said Lord Bishop, have drawn up a Scheme in writing, appended to

this Representation, describing the mode in which it appears to me that the several separations may best be effected, and how the changes consequent thereon in respect to Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Glebe Lands, Tithes, Dues, Rates, and Payments, and in respect to Patronage and Rights to Pews may be made with justice to all parties interested, and I do hereby submit the same to your Grace, together with the Consents thereto in writing of the said Patrons and Incumbents of the said several Benefices, to the intent that if your Grace shall on full consideration and inquiry be satisfied with such Scheme you may certify the same and such Consents as aforesaid to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Bishop, and the Consents referred to in the said Representation, are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

1. "It is proposed (a) to separate from the Parish of Newnham the Chapelry of Mapledurwell, the boundaries of which are well known and defined; the Chapelry is shown on the *Map* or *Plan* marked 'A' hereto annexed, and is thereon coloured *blue*; (b) to separate the isolated piece of the Parish of Nately Scures which is coloured *green* on *Plan* 'A' and is marked X; (c) to constitute the said Chapelry of Mapledurwell, together with the aforesaid separated piece of Nately Scures, the Extra-Parochial Place of Andwell, coloured *yellow* on *Plan* 'A,' and the small Extra-Parochial Place at the southern end of Up Nately, also coloured *yellow* on *Plan* 'A,' a Separate Parish for ecclesiastical purposes, and a Benefice by the name and style of the Perpetual Curacy of Mapledurwell, of which the said Church or Chapel of the said Chapelry of Mapledurwell shall be the Parish Church. The said Separate Parish so constituted is verged *red* on the said *Plan* marked 'A.' The said Separate Parish and Benefice shall be subject to the same Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction as the said Parish of Newnham, and the Incumbent of the said Separate Parish and Benefice shall have sole and exclusive Cure of Souls within the limits of the same.

"That the said Separate Benefice shall become and be entitled to a moiety of the Tithe Rent-Charge upon and arising within the said Chapelry of Mapledurwell, the particulars of which moiety are set out in the Schedule appended hereto, and such moiety shall henceforth belong to and be attached to the Separate Parish and Perpetual Curacy of Mapledurwell for ever, and be held received and enjoyed by the Incumbent thereof for the time being.

"That Baptisms, Churchings, Marriages, and Burials, for persons residing within the said Separate Benefice shall be performed in the Church of the Benefice to be constituted as aforesaid, and that the Fees for all such Offices performed within the limits of the said Separate Benefice, and all Ecclesiastical Dues, Offerings, and other Emoluments arising from or in respect of the said Benefice, and usually payable to the Incumbent of a Benefice, shall belong to the Incumbent for the time being of the said intended Benefice or Perpetual Curacy of Mapledurwell.

"That two Churchwardens shall be appointed in the usual way for the said Separate Benefice of Mapledurwell.

"That the Inhabitants of the said Separate Benefice of Mapledurwell shall not be entitled to any accommodation in any Church other

than that of the said Separate Parish and Benefice of Mapledurwell, except nevertheless any person or persons possessing a legal right by Faculty or otherwise and who may not be willing to relinquish the same, nor shall the Inhabitants of the said Parish of Newnham be entitled to any accommodation in the said Church or Chapel of Mapledurwell, and the Inhabitants of the said Separate Benefice of Mapledurwell shall be exonerated from all liability for the repair of any other Church than that of Mapledurwell, but shall be entitled to accommodation in the Church of the said Separate Parish of Mapledurwell, and shall be liable (subject to the provisions of the Compulsory Church Rate Abolition Act, 1868) to the repairs of the same.

"The Patronage or Right of Nomination of or to the said proposed Separate Benefice of Mapledurwell shall belong to and be vested in the Provost and Scholars of Queen's College, in the University of Oxford.

2. "It is further proposed to separate from the Parish of Nately Scures, and to annex to the Chapelry of Up Nately, the five pieces of the said Parish of Nately Scures which lie within the area of the said Chapelry, and are coloured *green* on the said *Plan* marked 'A.'

"That the Incumbent of the Parish of Basing with Up Nately shall have the sole and exclusive Cure of Souls within the said five portions of Nately Scures described in Section 2 of this Scheme.

"That the said pieces of Nately Scures shall become part of the said Chapelry of Up Nately, and the Inhabitants of the same shall be entitled to accommodation in the Church of Up Nately, but shall cease to be entitled to accommodation in the Parish Church of Nately Scures, except nevertheless any person or persons possessing a legal right by Faculty or otherwise to any pew or sitting in the said Church of Nately Scures who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the same.

"That Marriages, Baptisms, Churchings and Burials shall be solemnized and performed in the Church of Up Nately for the Inhabitants of the said five portions of Nately Scures, as aforesaid, to be annexed to Up Nately, and all Fees, Dues, Ecclesiastical Offerings, and Emoluments arising from the said five portions shall henceforth belong to the Incumbent of the Benefice of Basing with Up Nately.

3. "To separate (a) from the Parish of Nately Scures, and to annex to the Parish of Newnham, the piece of the Parish of Nately Scures which is contiguous to the Parish of Newnham, and which is bounded on the north and west by the Parish of Newnham, on the east by the Parish of Odiham, and on the south by the London and South Western Railway, and marked B on *Plan* 'B,' and also certain of the other eastern parts of the said Parish of Nately Scures, and also two pieces north of the said Railway on the west, all of which portions of the said Parish of Nately Scures are contiguous to the Parish of Newnham and are coloured *green* on the *Plan* hereto annexed marked 'B,' and are respectively marked C, D, E, F, and I; (b) To separate from the Parish of Odiham, and to annex to the Parish of Newnham, that part of the Parish of Odiham which is intersected by the London and South Western Railway and which lies to the south of and contiguous to Newnham and Nately Scures and to the north of Hook Common and Bartley Heath, and which is

coloured *pink* on the said *Plan* marked 'B' and marked *H*.

"That the Incumbent of Newnham shall have the sole and exclusive Cure of Souls within the said portions of Nately Scures and Odiham described in Section 3 (a) and (b) so annexed to Newnham.

"That the Inhabitants of the said portions of Nately Scures and Odiham shall be entitled to accommodation in the Parish Church of Newnham, but shall respectively cease to be entitled to accommodation in the Parish Churches of Nately Scures and Odiham, except nevertheless any person or persons possessing a legal right by Faculty or otherwise to any pew or sitting in either of the said Parish Churches of Nately Scures or Odiham who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the same.

"That Marriages, Baptisms, Churchings, and Burials shall be solemnized and performed in the Parish Church of Newnham for the Inhabitants of the said portions so as aforesaid annexed to the said Parish of Newnham, and all Fees, Dues, Ecclesiastical Offerings, and Emoluments arising from the said portions shall henceforth belong to the Incumbent of the Benefice of Newnham.

4. "To separate from the Parish of Newnham, and annex to the Parish of Nately Scures, the two triangular pieces of the Parish of Newnham which lie to the south of the London and South Western Railway, and

which are coloured *blue* on the said *Plan* marked 'B.'

"That the Incumbent of the Parish of Nately Scures shall have the sole and exclusive Cure of Souls within the said two triangular pieces of Newnham described in Section 4 of this Scheme.

"That the Inhabitants of the said pieces of Newnham shall be entitled to accommodation in the Parish Church of Nately Scures, but shall cease to be entitled to accommodation in the Parish Church of Newnham, except nevertheless any person or persons possessing a legal right by Faculty or otherwise to any pew or sitting in the said Church of Newnham who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the same.

"That Marriages, Baptisms, Churchings, and Burials shall be solemnized and performed in the Parish Church of Nately Scures for the Inhabitants of the said pieces of Newnham so, as aforesaid, to be annexed to the said Parish of Nately Scures, and all Fees, Dues, Ecclesiastical Offerings and Emoluments arising from the said pieces shall henceforth belong to the Incumbent of the Benefice of Nately Scures.

"That no other alteration except as aforesaid shall be made in the Emoluments of the said Benefices or either of them.

"That no alteration shall be made in the Patronage of the said Benefices or either of them.

(1) That the said Chapelry of Mapledurwell, shown and coloured *blue* on the *Plan* marked ‘A’ attached to the hereinafter mentioned Scheme of the said Lord Bishop appended hereto, may be advantageously separated from the said Parish of Newnham, that the said isolated piece of Nately Scures, coloured *green* on the said *Plan* and thereon marked *X*, may likewise be separated from Nately Scures, and that the said Chapelry (together with the said piece of Nately Scures, the said Extra-Parochial place of Andwell, coloured *yellow* on the said *Plan*, and the said small Extra-Parochial Place at the southern end of the Chapelry of Up Nately, also coloured *yellow* on the said *Plan*) may be constituted a Separate Parish for ecclesiastical purposes, and a Perpetual Curacy and Benefice, to be called the Perpetual Curacy of Mapledurwell, which said Separate Parish so constituted is verged *red* on the said *Plan*.

(2) That two triangular pieces of the Parish of Newnham, lying to the south of the London and South Western Railway, and coloured *blue* on the *Plan* marked ‘B’ attached to the said Scheme, may be advantageously separated from the Parish of Newnham and be annexed to the Parish of Nately Scures.

(3) That the five pieces of the Parish of Nately Scures which are within the boundaries of the Chapelry of Up Nately, and coloured *green* on the said *Plan* marked ‘A,’ may be advantageously separated from the Parish of Nately Scures and be annexed to and become part of the Chapelry of Up Nately.

(4) That the piece of the Parish of Nately Scures which is contiguous to the Parish of

Newnham, and which is marked *B* on the said *Plan* marked ‘B,’ and also certain of the other eastern parts of the said Parish of Nately Scures, and also two pieces of the said Parish north of the said London and South Western Railway on the west, all of which are coloured *green* on the said *Plan* marked ‘B’ and are respectively marked *C*, *D*, *E*, *F*, and *I* thereon, may be advantageously separated from the Parish of Nately Scures and be annexed to the Parish of Newnham.

(5) That that part of the Parish of Odiham which lies to the south of the Parish of Newnham and to the north of Hook Common and Bartley Heath, and coloured *pink* and marked *H* on the said *Plan* marked ‘B,’ may be advantageously separated from the Parish of Odiham and be annexed to the Parish of Newnham.

“ That pursuant to the directions contained in the said Pluralities Act, 1838, the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a Scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him that the several proposed alterations may best be effected, and how the changes consequent upon such alterations in respect of Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Glebe Lands, Tithe-Rent Charges, and other Ecclesiastical Dues, Rates, and Payments, and in respect to Patronage and Rights to Pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested, which Scheme, together with the Consents in writing of the Provost and Scholars of Queen’s College, in the University of Oxford, the Patrons or persons entitled to present to the Benefice of Newnham with Mapledurwell (in case the same were now vacant), The Reverend William Hipwood Mowat, the Incumbent of the same Benefice, the Lady Dorchester, the Patron or person entitled to present to the Benefice of Nately Scures (in case the same were now vacant), The Reverend Charles Herbert Roberts, the Incumbent of the same Benefice, the said Edward, Lord Bishop of Winchester, by virtue of his Bishopric the Patron or person entitled to present to the Benefice of Odiham (in case the same were now vacant), The Reverend James Pilkington Baynes, the Incumbent of the same Benefice, the President and Fellows of Magdalen College, in the University of Oxford, the Patrons or persons entitled to present to the Benefice of Basing with Up Nately (in case the same were now vacant), and The Reverend Thomas Trotter Blockley, the Incumbent of the same Benefice, has been transmitted to us for our consideration.

“ The Representation and Scheme of the said Lord Bishop, the Plans, and the Consents above referred to, are hereunto annexed.

“ And we, the said Archbishop, being on full consideration and inquiry satisfied with the said Scheme, do hereby pursuant to the said Pluralities Act, 1838, certify the same and such Consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council, to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may, in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do, make and issue an Order for carrying the said Scheme into effect.

The KING has been pleased to award the Albert Medal to Acting Flight Commander Paul Douglas Robertson, R.N.A.S., in recognition of his gallantry in endeavouring to save life in February last. The circumstances are as follows:—

On the 28th February, 1918, a Seaplane got out of control and spun to the ground. Acting Flight Commander Robertson, the Observer, jumped from the machine just before it reached the ground and landed safely, as the ground was marshy. The Pilot, Flight Lieutenant H. C. Lemon, was imprisoned in the Seaplane, which, on striking the ground, immediately burst into flames, and notwithstanding that the vicinity of the Seaplane was quickly a furnace of blazing petrol, and that heavy bombs, a number of rounds of ammunition, and the reserve petrol tank were all likely to explode, Acting Flight Commander Robertson returned and endeavoured to extricate the Pilot, and only desisted when he had been so severely burned in the face, hands and leg that his recovery was for some time in doubt.

He displayed the greatest gallantry, self-sacrifice and disregard of danger in his efforts to extricate the Pilot.

THE MOTOR SPIRIT (CONSOLIDATION) AND GAS RESTRICTION ORDER, 1918, AMENDMENT ORDER, DATED 15TH JUNE, 1918, MADE BY THE BOARD OF TRADE PURSUANT TO REGULATIONS 2F AND 2JJ OF THE DEFENCE OF THE REALM REGULATIONS.

The Board of Trade, deeming it expedient to make further exercise of the powers conferred upon them by Regulations 2F and 2JJ of the Defence of the Realm Regulations as regards motor spirit, hereby order as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Motor Spirit (Consolidation) and Gas Restriction Order, 1918, Amendment Order, and shall be read and construed together with the Motor Spirit (Consolidation) and Gas Restriction Order, 1918, hereinafter referred to as the Principal Order, and the two Orders may be cited together as the Motor Spirit and Gas Restriction Orders, 1918.

2. The several words, terms and expressions to which meanings are assigned in the Principal Order have the same respective meanings in this Order.

3. Paragraph 3D of the Principal Order relating to Motor Cabs is hereby revoked, and

in lieu thereof the following paragraph shall be substituted:—

3d. For driving a motor cab.

(a) For any purpose (except a purpose prohibited by paragraph 5 of the Principal Order) within the limits of the area where it is licensed to stand or ply for hire and to any place situate not more than 3 miles from the boundary of such area and for returning from such place.

(b) On any sudden or urgent necessity where life or limb is or may be endangered.

(c) For the conveyance of a sick or injured person for the purpose of receiving medical or surgical treatment or for the removal of such person from a hospital or nursing home or from one residence to another and for visits to a person who is dangerously ill.

4. Paragraph 3e (2) of the Principal Order is hereby revoked, and in lieu thereof the following paragraph shall be substituted:—

(2) The owner of every hire car shall keep a record of all lettings with the names and addresses of the hirers and particulars of the journey where the car was hired at the garage, office or place of business of the owner, and such record shall be open for inspection at all times by a police officer or an officer of the Board of Trade.

5. The words "or for conveying passengers on pleasure trips" in paragraph 4 of the Principal Order shall not apply to a motor boat used as a ferry boat, while plying to and fro across a ferry, where a boat was accustomed to ply between the same points in the month of October, 1917.

6. This Order shall come into effect on 24th June, 1918.

FLAX SEED (IRELAND) ORDER, 1918.

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon him by the Defence of the Realm Regulations the Minister of Munitions hereby orders as follows:—

1. It shall be the duty of every grower of Flax in Ireland during the season of 1918 to save the Seed from one-eighth of his crop of Flax, and to comply with any regulations that may be prescribed in this behalf by the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction for Ireland, provided that nothing in this Clause shall be deemed to apply to any grower having under flax in the year 1918 a total area not exceeding two statute roods, and provided further that nothing in this Clause shall be deemed to apply to flax of any variety other than a fibre variety.

2. No person shall:—

(i.) accept, receive into his possession, or take delivery of, whether for scutching or otherwise, any flax grown in Ireland in the season of 1918 otherwise than upon receipt of a declaration, made in such form as may be prescribed by the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction for Ireland, by the grower or owner of such flax, (a) that the

provisions of this Order have been complied with, or (b) that the grower had under flax in the year 1918 a total area not exceeding two statute roods, or (c) that the flax is not the produce of a fibre variety of seed.

(ii.) Take delivery of, or scutch, flax the property of any defaulter under this Order, after receipt from the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction for Ireland of notification of default.

3. No person shall, without a permit issued by the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction for Ireland, purchase, sell or offer for sale from or on behalf of any grower of flax or any other person, any flax on foot, or undeseeded flax straw saved for seed in compliance with the provisions of this Order.

4. Any person failing to comply with any provision hereof, or with any regulation or permit that may be made or issued hereunder, shall be guilty of an offence against the Defence of the Realm Regulations.

5. This Order may be cited as the Flax Seed (Ireland) Order, 1918.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 17TH JUNE 1918.)

Transfer of Area from one Scheduled Area to another.

1. From and after the commencement of this Order the Area described in the First Schedule hereto shall, for the purposes of the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908, and any Order amending that Order, form part of the Scheduled Area described in the Second Schedule hereto, and cease to form part of any other Scheduled Area.

Commencement.

2. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-second day of June, nineteen hundred and eighteen.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

Area Transferred.

AGRICULTURAL WAGES BOARD (ENGLAND AND WALES).

PROPOSAL TO FIX MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR DERBYSHIRE.

hereby give notice, as required by Section 5 (4) of the above Act, and by paragraph 4 of the Agricultural Wages Regulations, 1918, that they propose to fix the following minimum rates of wages and the following differential rates for overtime employment as hereinafter defined, for male workmen of 18 years of age and over employed in agriculture for time-work in the area comprising the administrative county of Derby and the county borough of Derby, and to define for the purpose of the application of such differential rates for overtime the employment which is to be treated as overtime employment, that is to say:—

1. The wages payable for employment in summer (as hereinafter defined) of male workmen in agriculture of 18 years of age and over shall be not less than wages at the minimum rate of 31s. for 54 hours.

2. The wages payable for employment in winter (as hereinafter defined) of male workmen in agriculture of 18 years of age and over shall be not less than wages at the minimum rate of 31s. for 48 hours.

3. Where the employment of a workman is for a week or longer period, and the conditions of the employment provide for the working hours in each week being either generally or in certain events less than 54 in summer or 48 in winter, the minimum rates of wages set out in paragraphs 1 and 2 above (hereinafter referred to as the normal rates) shall not apply, and in lieu thereof the minimum rates of wages for the employment of the workman on time-work shall be such increased rates as will secure to the workman wages for employment on time-work during the lesser number of hours provided for by the conditions of his employment equal to the wages payable at the normal rate for 54 hours in summer or 48 hours in winter, as the case may be.

4. The differential rate for overtime shall be as follows, viz., 9d. per hour.

5. For the purpose of the application of the above rates the following employment is defined as overtime employment, that is to say:—

(a) All employment in excess of 54 hours in any week (excluding Sunday) in summer.

(b) All employment in excess of 48 hours in any week (excluding Sunday) in winter.

(c) All employment on a Sunday.

6. For the purpose of the above rates employment in summer shall be deemed to be employment during the period commencing on the first Monday in March and terminating on the last Sunday in October, and employment in winter shall be deemed to be employment during the rest of the year.

7. The above rates shall apply to all male workmen of 18 years of age and upwards who are wholly or partly employed in agriculture within the meaning of Section 17 (1) of the Corn Production Act, 1917, in the above-mentioned area, during such time as they are so employed.

8. For the purpose of the above rates meal times shall not be included in the period of employment.

9. The Board further propose three months after the general cessation of hos-

tilities or on the withdrawal by the Food Controller of all restrictions upon food consumption (whichever event shall first occur) to proceed to give notice of a proposal under the above-mentioned Regulations that employment in excess of 6½ hours on one day in each week (other than a Sunday) shall be defined as employment to which the above differential rates for overtime shall apply.

The Agricultural Wages Board, as required by Section 5 (4) of the above Act, and by paragraph 4 of the above-mentioned Regulations, will consider any objections to the above rates and definition of overtime employment which may be lodged with them within one month from the date of this Notice. PROPOSAL TO FIX MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR CUMBERLAND, WESTMORLAND AND THE FURNESS DISTRICT OF LANCASHIRE.

The Agricultural Wages Board (England and Wales), duly established and constituted under Section 5 (1) of the above Act and the Regulations made by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, dated the 8th November, 1917, having had regard to the provisions of subsections (6) and (7) of the said Section, hereby give notice, as required by Section 5 (4) of the above Act, and by paragraph 4 of the Agricultural Wages Regulations, 1918, that they propose to fix the following minimum rates of wages and the following differential rates for overtime employment, as hereinafter defined, for male workmen of 18 years of age and over employed in agriculture for time-work in the area comprising the administrative counties of Cumberland and Westmorland, the county boroughs of Carlisle and Barrow-in-Furness, and the Petty Sessional Divisions of North Lonsdale and Hawkshead (including its detached part), in the administrative county of Lancaster, and to define for the purpose of the application of such differential rates for overtime the employment which is to be treated as overtime employment, that is to say:—

1. The wages payable for employment in summer (as hereinafter defined) of male workmen in agriculture of 18 years of age and over shall be not less than wages at the minimum rate of 35s. for 54 hours.

2. The wages payable for employment in winter (as hereinafter defined) of male workmen in agriculture of 18 years of age and

over shall be not less than wages at the minimum rate of 35s. for 48 hours.

3. Where the employment of a workman is for a week or longer period, and the conditions of the employment provide for the working hours in each week being either generally or in certain events less than 54 in summer or 48 in winter, the minimum rates of wages set out in paragraphs 1 and 2 above (hereinafter referred to as the normal rates) shall not apply, and in lieu thereof the minimum rates of wages for the employment of the workman on time-work shall be such increased rates as will secure to the workman wages for employment on time-work during the lesser number of hours provided for by the conditions of his employment equal to the wages payable at the normal rate for 54 hours in summer or 48 hours in winter, as the case may be.

4. The differential rates for overtime shall be as follow:—

(a) In respect of overtime employment on weekdays 10d. per hour.

(b) In respect of overtime employment on a Sunday, 1s. per hour.

5. For the purpose of the application of the above rates the following employment is defined as overtime employment, that is to say:—

(a) All employment in excess of 54 hours in any week (excluding Sunday) in summer.

(b) All employment in excess of 48 hours in any week (excluding Sunday) in winter.

(c) All employment on a Sunday.

6. For the purpose of the above rates employment in summer shall be deemed to be employment during the period commencing on the first Monday in March and terminating on the last Sunday in October; and employment in winter shall be deemed to be employment during the rest of the year.

7. The above rates shall apply to all male workmen of 18 years of age and upwards who are wholly or partly employed in agriculture within the meaning of Section 17 (1) of the Corn Production Act, 1917, in the above-mentioned area, during such time as they are so employed.

8. For the purpose of the above rates meal times shall not be included in the period of employment.

9. ADMIRALTY NOTICE TO MARINERS.

No. 719 of the year 1918.

ENGLAND, EAST COAST.

River Humber and Approaches—Pilotage, Traffic and Fishing Regulations.

Former Notice.—No. 530 of 1918; hereby cancelled.

Mariners are hereby warned that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and are now in force:—

1. That portion of the Humber which lies between two straight lines, drawn from shore to shore, as follows:—(1) a line drawn 225° (S. 61° W. Mag.) through Spurn lighthouse, (2) drawn 344° (North Mag.) from the east side of Barrow haven, will be referred to as the "port" in these regulations.

2. Shipowners and local agents are warned that their vessels are to conform to the following regulations:—

(1.) Except under exceptional circumstances merchant vessels will be free to enter or leave the port during the hours of Official day.

(II.) Before entering the port merchant vessels must receive permission and the necessary instructions from the Examination steamer, and before leaving they must obtain permission through the Collector of Customs at Hull, Grimsby, or Goole, as the case may be.

(III.) Shipowners and local agents are advised to time the arrival of their vessels at the port for daylight.

(IV.) Vessels desiring to enter the port from seaward are to close the Examination steamer. In the event of the Examination steamer being off her station they are to proceed to the Southern Examination anchorage (except during strong northerly or easterly winds, when they shall proceed to the Northern Examination anchorage) and there anchor.

(V.) The Examination steamer will be met midway between Bull light-vessel and Chequer Shoal buoy.

The Examination steamer will be distinguished by the following means:—

By Day.—A white ensign, and at the foremast head the special flag mentioned in Part II. of Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 170 of 1918. When the port is closed 3 red balls will be hoisted in addition to the special flag.

By Night.—Three lights vertically, 3 feet apart, conspicuously displayed at the end of a yard so as to show an unbroken light round the horizon. When the port is closed these lights will be red, when it is open they will be white.

NOTE.—These lights are in addition to the ordinary navigation lights.

(VI.) There are two Examination anchorages. The northern is to be used in strong northerly and easterly winds. The southern is to be used under all other conditions.

The Northern Examination anchorage comprises those portions of Hawke road and Middle shoal included between the intersection of the following lines of bearing:—

- (1) Skeffling church, 18° (N. 34° E. Mag.).
- (2) Skeffling church, 4° (N. 20° E. Mag.).
- (3) Spurn lighthouse, 120° (S. 44° E. Mag.).
- (4) Extreme of Spurn point, 115° (S. 49° E. Mag.).

The Southern Examination anchorage comprises the area bounded as follows:—

- (1) On the north by the Bull sand.
- (2) On the south by the three fathom contour line northward of Tetney haven.
- (3) On the east by the line joining the Bull light-vessel and entrance to Tetney haven.
- (4) On the west by a line parallel to and 7 cables from the eastern limit (3).

NOTE.—When the Southern Examination anchorage is full of shipping further arrivals should anchor eastward of and as near to it as possible.

Emergency Anchorage.—This comprises the area bounded as follows:—

- (a) On the North by the Middle shoal.
- (b) On the South by the Bull sand.
- (c) On the East by the bearing Cleethorpes Sewer Outfall beacon, 240° (S. 76° W. Mag.).
- (d) On the West by the bearing Skeffling church 4° (N. 20° E. Mag.).

3. All pilotage certificates granted to masters and mates for the whole or any part of the Humber Pilotage district are suspended, and further all vessels (irrespective of draught, size, or nationality, but with the exception of those

provided for in paragraph 4) bound to or from any place on the Humber must be conducted by licensed pilots over the whole or any part of the waters between Hull and the Outer Pilotage station of the Humber Pilotage district, which, until further notice will be situated in the neighbourhood of the Bull light-vessel.

4. In the case of lighter inter-dock traffic and of small British vessels engaged in local traffic above Immingham, pilotage by licensed pilots is not compulsory.

5. During the hours of official night, and during fog with visibility of less than half-a-mile, no traffic is permitted to move on the Humber below Paull point; also when these conditions prevail no vessel shall approach within a radius of five miles from Humber light-vessel.

6. Every vessel shall endeavour to approach the Humber in sufficient time to enable such vessel to obtain a pilot and arrive at her destination, or at a position in which she is permitted to anchor, before the commencement of official night, but, should occasions arise when a vessel is delayed through unforeseen or unpreventable circumstances from arriving in time, she may approach the Examination steamer, from whom she will receive directions as to anchoring until the end of official night. The Examination steamer will be found in the neighbourhood of the Bull light-vessel after the commencement of official night. In the event of an incoming vessel being unable immediately to find the Examination steamer in these circumstances, she is to remain in the vicinity of the Bull light-vessel, but shall not cross the line drawn 225° (S. 61° W. Mag.) through Spurn lighthouse without permission. Outward bound vessels shall not pass Hawkins point later than 45 minutes before the commencement of official night.

7. Vessels when leaving the Humber must proceed as directed by the Shipping Intelligence Officer. Should it be necessary to wait for the weather to moderate or clear, they must remain _____ at an authorised anchorage.

The pilot lobbies will be notified when the existence of fog outside the river is known.

8. All vessels proceeding into or out of the Humber must be navigated by way of Hawke and Sunk roads passing to the northward of the Bull light-vessel, except those outward-bound from Grimsby, which may cross the Middle shoal passing at once into the channel north of the Middle.

NOTE.—The five-fathom channel through the Sunk and Hawke roads is very narrow at the western entrance and also at a point north of the Middle light-vessel; deep-draught vessels steaming against the tide when approaching the buoys marking these portions of the channel should endeavour to avoid passing others between them by easing engines to allow ships with the tide under them to get through first. Smaller vessels outward-bound should pass close to the southward of the buoys marking the south side, and those inward-bound close to the northward of the buoys marking the north side, of the narrow portions of the channel, provided always that their draught of water and the state of the tide will admit.

9. Sailing vessels of 50 tons register and upwards _____ must be towed through

the Boom Defence gateways. Should tugs not be available, sailing vessels entering the Humber may anchor temporarily north-westward of the No. 2 Lower Middle light-float at a distance of not more than $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from it, but they must not bring the before-mentioned light-float to bear to the southward of 128° (S. 36° E. Mag.).

10. All vessels entering or leaving Grimsby docks must pass to the southward of the No. 4 Lower Burcom B.W.V.S. buoy, except those making use of the channel southward of the Burcom shoal (hereinafter called the Burcom channel), which are exempted from this condition, but no vessel may cross the Burcom shoal between the No. 5 Middle Burcom and No. 4 Lower Burcom B.W.V.S. buoys. Vessels using the Burcom channel must pass into and out of its western end to the eastward of No. 6 Upper Burcom B.W.V.S. buoy, and its eastern end by a passage of 220 feet wide, each side of which is marked by a dolphin surmounted by a black triangle supported on a white pole. No vessel is permitted to tow more than two craft at one time through this passage.

Vessels making use of this passage are cautioned to keep well in the middle of the opening and are subject to the following regulations:—

(1.) Vessels navigating against the tide must in all cases give way to those navigating with the tide.

(2.) No vessel must approach the defences in this part of the river nearer than a quarter of a mile except to pass through the before-mentioned passage or to enter or leave the docks or old outfall at Grimsby.

(3.) No vessel may tow more vessels at one time than she can safely navigate through the passage, and under no circumstances is the tow to comprise more than two craft.

(4.) Distant signals will be shown from the flagstaff on the West Pier at the Grimsby Dock entrance as follows:—

(a) Two black balls will denote that the passage is open.

(b) Three black balls will denote that the passage is closed.

(c) No signal being hoisted denotes that traffic is suspended.

When signal (b) three black balls is hoisted, no vessel may approach the passage, and when traffic is suspended no vessels, other than H.M. Ships on special duty, may use the passage.

11. Prohibited _____ areas:—

(I.) Anchorage is prohibited for all vessels between the following lines:—

(a) Joining Stone Creek Coast Guard flagstaff and the eastern extremity of the eastern jetty at Immingham.

(b) Joining the riverward beacon of the two centre measured mile beacons on Sunk island and the northernmost of two clumps shown southward of Stallingborough on Admiralty Chart No. 109. The latter line passes through the position of No. 6 Upper Burcom buoy.

(II.) No merchant vessel shall anchor (except when granted special permission) between the before-mentioned prohibited anchorage area (I) and the line of transit of

the eastern measured mile beacons on Sunk island produced to the Lincolnshire shore or (except as provided for in paragraph 9) to the northward of the line of the Killingholme leading lights or within $1\frac{1}{2}$ cables of any of the Admiralty mooring buoys.

(III.) Anchorage is prohibited between the following lines:—

(a) Joining New Clew railway station and Patrington church.

(b) Joining Middle light-vessel and No. 4 Lower Burcom B.W.V.S. buoy, extending to both banks of the Humber.

(IV.) Anchorage is prohibited to merchant vessels to the southward of a line joining No. 4 Lower Burcom B.W.V.S. buoy and Spurn lighthouse, or to the eastward of a line joining Cleethorpes pier pavilion and Skeffling church, except so far as the Examination anchorages are concerned.

(V.) No vessel of any description may anchor on the south side of the Bull sand between the western limit of the Southern Examination anchorage described in paragraph 2 of this notice and the line of bearing Cleethorpes Sewer outfall beacon (on which a red light is exhibited in peace time) in a direction 240° (*S. 76° W. Mag.*) nor on the north side of the Bull sand between the before-mentioned line of bearing of Cleethorpes Sewer outfall and a line joining Spurn lighthouse and the Bull light-vessel produced to the Bull sand; nor within 3 cables of the No. 4 Lower Burcom B.W.V.S. buoy.

(VI.) No merchant vessel of any description may enter, pass through or remain in the area bounded as follows, without special permission:—

(1) On the North by the bearing Skitter Haven No. 8 B.W.V.S. buoy 55° (*N. 71° E. Mag.*).

(2) On the South by the bearing Killingholme Oil Fuel jetty, 235° (*S. 71° W. Mag.*).

(3) On the East by a line joining the before-mentioned No. 8 buoy and Killingholme No. 7 light-boat.

(4) On the West by the Lincolnshire River bank.

12. No neutral vessel may lie alongside any of the piers or jetties in the Humber at night without special permission.

13. No merchant vessels or boats, etc., will be allowed to approach within a quarter of a mile of any defence work (except to pass through the Boom gateways or to enter or leave the old outfall or docks at Grimsby) or to go alongside any Government ship, vessel, lighter, or any other Government craft, or any Government establishment, without special permission. All vessels proceeding up and down the Humber are to pass at a distance at least three cables from H.M. Ships, if the depth of water and circumstances of navigation permit.

14. All vessels employed in laying moorings, raising wrecks, etc., must be passed at slow speed, propelling engines being eased at least 300 yards before reaching such vessels and so continued for 150 yards after passing them.

While the said mooring or wreck raising craft are at work they will each fly a red flag.

15. Anchor lights above Immingham and in the Northern Examination Anchorage are to be reduced in power and screened as prescribed in Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 689 of 1918.

Below Immingham (Northern Examination Anchorage excepted) they are to be screened as previously directed and further reduced in brilliancy so as to be invisible at any greater distance than half-a-mile.

This order will not absolve the Masters of vessels at anchor from keeping a sharp look-out and giving warning on the approach of any craft under way.

Anchor lights authorised by these orders are never on any account to be extinguished; the order "Out Lights" will not apply to them.

Bow and masthead steaming lights are to be as prescribed in Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 689 of 1918.

Other lights are to be as prescribed in Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 689 of 1918, and this order applies also to vessels in dock or alongside quays and jetties. Notwithstanding anything in these orders, dredgers may be permitted to work at Hull and Immingham at night provided all their lights are extinguished within half-an-hour of issue of the general order "Out Lights."

The above orders apply to vessels of every description, other than H.M. ships. The latter should, however, comply so far as the visibility of anchor lights eastward of Immingham is concerned.

16. No vessel is permitted to tow more than three craft at one time through a gateway of the Boom defence or more than two through the passage in the Burcom channel described in paragraph 10. Owners of tugs may apply to the Humber Conservancy Board for pilot licences for the masters of their vessels which will enable them to pilot their own vessels and river craft comprising their tow (in certain parts of the river). The number of craft towed will be restricted according to the power of the tug.

17. Humber Rule No. 18 is to be strictly enforced. No sound signals other than navigation signals authorised by the Regulations for preventing Collisions at Sea, and by Humber Rules Nos. 14 to 16 (inclusive) at all times of the day or night, and No. 17 during the day only, are on any account to be used by vessels in any part of the Humber, the Old Harbour at Hull, or within any of the docks at Hull, Immingham or Grimsby.

18. Owners of small vessels plying in the vicinity of the Humber are instructed not to paint their craft light grey, and are hereby directed to have any vessels so coloured repainted. They are warned that small vessels painted grey run a great risk of being fired upon in mistake for submarines. Vessels painted black run the least risk.

19. Fishing in the Humber.—No vessel is allowed to fish in the Humber below Hull without a permit from the Admiralty port officer; all fishing, shrimping, trawling, or whelking in this portion of the river in areas other than those for which permits are granted is prohibited.

20. Regulations affecting Pleasure Craft and Pleasure Fishing.—Pleasure boats of every description on the Humber must henceforth be provided with permits to be obtained from the Admiralty Port Officer; they may ply for hire at Cleethorpes only between the Eastern and Western Sewer Outfall Beacons, and must keep within a distance of one mile from the shore.

It being considered desirable to encourage *bona fide* efforts on the part of amateur fishermen to increase the national supplies of fish, pleasure boats will be granted fishing permits on application to the Admiralty Port Officer, the holding of which will remove the restriction as to the limits within which pleasure boats may ordinarily ply for hire, provided their object is to catch fish.

No able-bodied professional fishermen or boatmen between the ages of 18 and 60 may be employed on land or sea in connection with any boat for which a pleasure permit has been issued.

No registered fishing boat or mechanically propelled craft will be granted a pleasure permit except for the purpose of fishing, but when they cannot fish their owners may apply to the Admiralty Port Officer for special permission to ply for hire provided the foregoing paragraph having reference to the ages of the crews of craft to which pleasure permits have been issued is complied with.

Notwithstanding anything in these orders, rowing boats may pass along the shore at Cleethorpes, but they must keep within 400 yards of the High Water mark of Spring Tides.

21. Excursions by Water.—Excursions by water are limited to the River Humber above Hull, and Rivers Ouse and Trent. Excursion steamers will not be allowed to ply without a permit from the Admiralty port officer, Dock Offices, Immingham, and in no case are they to pass to the eastward of a line joining Victoria Dock entrance, Hull, and the east beacon on Skitter Ness.

22. Patrol of Internal Waterways.—The internal waterways of the port will be policed by Naval patrol vessels and by the Humber Conservancy Board under the direction of the Naval authorities.

Captains and Masters of Merchant Vessels and persons in charge of barges or boats of any kind are hereby warned to observe any orders which may be given to them by the Naval Patrol vessels or the duly authorised officers of the Humber Conservancy Board.

23. All instructions given by Officers in command of H.M. ships, Patrol vessels or Examination steamers, or the duly authorised officers of the Humber Conservancy Board, are to be implicitly and promptly obeyed even should they conflict with these orders.

24. Warning.—Warning is hereby given that vessels disobeying the above regulations will be liable to be fired on.

Variation.—16° W.

Note.—This Admiralty Notice to Mariners is a revision of the former Notice quoted above.

Caution.

This Admiralty Notice to Mariners is issued under the provisions of the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, and failure to comply strictly with the directions contained in it will constitute an offence against those Regulations.

Any person found guilty of such an offence is liable to severe penalties both of imprisonment and fine.

Any person aiding or abetting the commission of such an offence is himself guilty of an offence against the Regulations.

Attention is also drawn to the fact that any infringement of the directions contained in this Admiralty Notice to Mariners is liable to result in the detention of the ship or vessel.
