THE GOLD THREAD ORDER, 1918, DATED 9TH DAY OF JULY, 1918, MADE BY THE BOARD OF TRADE UNDER REGULATIONS 2F AND 2J OF THE DEFENCE OF THE REALM REGULATIONS.

The Board of Trade, deeming it expedient to exercise the powers conferred upon them by Regulations 2F and 2J of the Defence of the Realm Regulations for the purpose of main-

taining and regulating the supply of Gold Thread, hereby order as follows:—

1. From and after the date of this Order no person shall without the licence of the Board of Trade place any gold lace, gold embroidery or gold thread on any garment, hat or cap which is not a part of the uniform of one of His Majesty's Services or of the dress of an officer in the Mercantile Marine.

2. No person shall without the licence aforesaid use or wear any gold lace, gold embroidery or gold thread on any garment, hat or cap which is not a part of the uniform of one of His Majesty's Services or of the dress of an officer in the Mercantile Marine unless such lace embroidery or thread was in his possession at the date of this Order.

3. No person shall without the licence aforesaid buy or sell any gold lace, gold embroidery or gold thread except for use on such uniform or dress as aforesaid.

4. Infringements of this Order are summary offences against the Defence of the Realm Regulations.

5. This Order may be cited as the Gold Thread Order, 1918.

#### TRADING WITH THE ENEMY.

##### FEES AND AGENTS' CHARGES IN RESPECT OF PATENTS, DESIGNS AND TRADE MARKS.

Whereas by a Licence dated 7th day of December, 1915, the Board of Trade, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by certain Royal Proclamations relating to Trading with the Enemy, authorised all persons in the United Kingdom or in any part of His Majesty's Dominions to pay any fees necessary for obtaining the grant, registration or renewal of Patents, Designs or Trade Marks in an enemy country and to pay to enemy agents their charges and expenses in relation to such matters and also to pay on behalf of an enemy fees payable in the United Kingdom or in His Majesty's Dominions on applications for the grant, registration or renewal of Patents, Designs or Trade Marks and to pay the charges and expenses of agents in relation thereto;

And whereas the said Licence was amended by a further Licence of the Board of Trade dated 5th September, 1917;

And whereas it appears to the Board of Trade that such payments as aforesaid should no longer be authorised;

Now, therefore, the Board of Trade hereby revoke the said Licences and give notice that all such payments as aforesaid are from the date hereof prohibited under the Proclamations relating to Trading with the Enemy.

#### HOUSEHOLD COAL DISTRIBUTION ORDER, 1917.

##### MAXIMUM PRICES OF COAL AND GAS COKE—METROPOLITAN FUEL DISTRIBUTION AREA.

1. The maximum prices of coal per ton, shown in Article 2 of the Rules of the 21st

January, 1918 (published in the London Gazette of 22nd February, 1918), shall be increased by 5s. 6d.

2. The reduction in the maximum prices of coal per ton, supplied for resale to Licensed Coal Retailers or Registered Coal Dealers, set out in paragraph 1 of Article 4 of the Rules of the 21st January, 1918, shall be increased to 5s.

3. The maximum trolley prices of coal per cwt., set out in Article 6 of the Rules of the 21st January, 1918, shall be increased by 4d.

4. The maximum prices of gas coke delivered shall be:—

Unbroken, 2s. 3d. per cwt., 44s. per ton.

Broken, 2s. 4d. per cwt., 45s. 8d. per ton.

These increases shall come into force on and from the 8th July, 1918, and will apply to all coal and gas coke delivered on and from that date.

**ARMY COUNCIL ORDER.**

**THE FORMALDEHYDE (DEALINGS) ORDER,**  
1918.

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by the Defence of the Realm Regulations,

the Army Council hereby order as follows :—

1. No person shall purchase, sell or make, or take delivery of or payment for any Formaldehyde (40 per cent. solution) at any price other than £150 per ton delivered free on rail; provided that upon any sale of any quantity exceeding ten gallons and not exceeding one barrel an addition of 7d. per lb. may be made; and provided that upon any sale of any quantity exceeding five gallons and not exceeding ten gallons an addition of 7½d. per lb. may be made; and provided that upon any sale of any quantity not exceeding five gallons an addition of 8d. per lb. may be made; and provided further that upon any sale of any quantity less than one barrel additional charges may be added to the sale price in respect of carriage and containers, such charges to be limited to any expenses actually incurred by the vendor, subject to an addition of 1d. per container in the case of containers holding less than one-half gallon.

**REGULATIONS RESPECTING OPEN COMPETITIVE EXAMINATIONS FOR THE SITUATION OF FEMALE WRITING ASSISTANT IN THE GENERAL POST OFFICE, IN LONDON, IN THE OFFICE OF THE PUBLIC TRUSTEE, AND IN THE NATIONAL HEALTH INSURANCE COMMISSIONS FOR ENGLAND AND SCOTLAND.**

*These Regulations are liable to alteration from time to time.*

1. The limits of age for these situations are 16 and 18. If an examination begins in one of the first six months of any year, Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of February in that year. If an Examination begins in one of the last six months of any year, Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of August in that year.

2. Candidates will be required to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners—

(a) That they are duly qualified in respect of health and character.

(b) That they are natural - born or naturalised British subjects.

A Candidate who was not born or whose father was not born within the British Dominions, or whose mother was at any time before marriage of enemy nationality, will not be eligible for admission to examination for appointment to the Post Office unless she has obtained the special permission of the Civil Service Commissioners to compete.

3. At each Examination the number of Candidates to be selected will be such as may from time to time be fixed.

4. The Examination will be in the following subjects, viz. :—

1. English Composition.
2. Handwriting.
3. Spelling.
4. Arithmetic.

5. No Candidate will be admitted to examination who does not, at such time as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners, produce an undertaking, signed by her parent or Guardian, that she will, if successful, reside either with her parents or guardians, or with relations or friends approved by such parents or guardians.

*Candidates who fail to obtain such an aggregate number of marks as may indicate in the judgment of the Civil Service Commissioners a competent amount of general proficiency will not be regarded as qualified.*

6. Candidates for the Post Office Service must be at least five feet in height.

7. Persons holding situations in the Civil Service must obtain the permission of the authorities of their Department to attend the examination, dated before the commencement of the competition.

8. Persons who have entered upon or completed a course of education or training for the occupation of teacher, on account of which grants are payable from the Exchequer, will not be qualified to receive appointments until the consent of the Board of Education in England, the Committee of Council on Education for Scotland, or the Commissioners of National Education, Ireland, as the case may be, given in conformity with rules sanctioned by the Lords of the Treasury, has been notified to the Civil Service Commissioners.

9. Application for permission to attend an Examination must be made at such times and in such manner as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners.

10. A fee of 7s. 6d. will be required from every Candidate attending an Examination.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competitive Examination for situations as Female Writing Assistant in certain Public Departments will be held, under the foregoing Regulations, in London, Bristol, Leeds, Edinburgh, Aberdeen, Glasgow, Dublin, Belfast, Cork and Londonderry, commencing on the 19th September, 1918.

**ORDER OF THE BOARD OF

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

*Application of Sheep (Double Dipping) Order of 1914.*

1.—(1.) The provisions of the Sheep (Double Dipping) Order of 1914 (hereinafter



referred to as "the principal Order") are hereby applied to the Area described in the Schedule hereto, subject to the modifications contained in this Order.

(2.) While this Order remains in operation sheep in the Area described in the Schedule hereto shall be exempt from the provisions of Article 3 of the Sheep Dipping (Scotland and North of England) Order of 1915 so far as they relate to dipping within the first prescribed dipping period.

*Modification of Part I of the Principal Order.*

2. Part I of the Principal Order shall, in its application to the Area described in the Schedule hereto, be read and have effect as if paragraph (3) of Article 2 of that Order were omitted.

*Provision for Movement through Area by Road.*

3. For the purposes of the Principal Order and this Order, sheep shall not be deemed to be moved out of the Area described in the Schedule hereto, where they are moved through the Area without unnecessary delay from a place outside the Area to another place outside the Area by the main road from Forres to Grantown-on-Spey.

*Period Prescribed as Double Dipping Period.*

4. The dates between which all sheep in the Area described in the Schedule hereto are to be dipped within the Area by the owner or person in charge of the sheep under and in accordance with Part II of the Principal Order, are hereby fixed to be the nineteenth day of July and the first day of September in each year.

*Commencement.*

5. This Order shall come into operation on the twentieth day of July, nineteen hundred and eighteen.

The benefits or advantages which may be reckoned as payment of wages in lieu of payment in cash for the purpose of any minimum rate of wages for time-work fixed or to be fixed under the above Act, are hereby defined to include the provision by an employer for a workman employed by him of (a) lodging and (b) food and drink (not being intoxicating).

2. The said Board hereby delegate to each District Wages Committee established under the District Wages Committees Regulations, 1918, so far as regards the area for which such District Wages Committee acts, the powers and duties of the said Board under Section 12 (1) (b) of the above Act of defining the values at which the above-mentioned benefits and advantages are to be reckoned for the purpose aforesaid, but subject to the following conditions (namely):—

(i) that in defining the said values each District Wages Committee shall have regard to the current prices or values within their area of the commodities included in the said benefits and advantages, and to the normal or average values at which, under current contracts for employment in agriculture within their area, the said

benefits and advantages appear to be reckoned; and

(ii) that any decision by the District Wages Committee shall be reported as soon as may be to the said Board (in a form prescribed by them), and that the said Board may vary or annul the decision but not so as to affect or prejudice anything done or suffered under or by reason of the decision of the District Wages Committee before it is varied or annulled.

3. The said Board hereby authorise each District Wages Committee to delegate to a sub-committee or to sub-committees thereof, subject to the provisions of paragraph 18 of the District Wages Committees Regulations, 1918, the above-mentioned powers and duties delegated to the District Wages Committee.

The Agricultural Wages Board, as required by the Regulations, will consider any objections to the above Proposed Order which may be lodged with them within one month of the date of this notice. **PROPOSAL TO FIX MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES  
FOR SURREY.**

The Agricultural Wages Board (England and Wales), duly established and constituted under Section 5 (1) of the above Act, and the Regulations made by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, dated the 8th November, 1917, having had regard to the provisions of sub-sections (6) and (7) of the said Section, hereby give notice, as required by sub-section 4 of the said Section, and by paragraph 4 of the Agricultural Wages Regulations, 1918, that they propose to fix the following minimum rates of wages and the following differential rates for overtime employment, as hereinafter defined, for male workmen employed in agriculture for time-work in the area comprising the administrative county of Surrey, the county borough of Croydon, and that part of the administrative county of London situate South of the River Thames, which formerly constituted part of the geographical county of Surrey, and to define for the purpose of the application of such differential rates for overtime the employment which is to be treated as overtime employment as follows, that is to say:—

1. The wages payable for employment in summer (as hereinafter defined) of male workmen in agriculture shall be not less than wages at the following minimum rates, that is to say:—

For male workmen of 21 years of age and over, 33s. for 54 hours.

For male workmen of 18 and under 21 years of age, 31s. for 54 hours.

For male workmen of 17 and under 18 years of age, 26s. for 54 hours.

For male workmen of 16 and under 17 years of age, 22s. for 54 hours.

For male workmen of 15 and under 16 years of age, 18s. for 54 hours.

For male workmen of 14 and under 15 years of age, 14s. for 54 hours.

For male workmen under 14 years of age, 10s. for 54 hours.

2. The wages payable for employment in winter (as hereinafter defined) of male workmen in agriculture shall be not less than wages at the following minimum rates, that is to say:—

For male workmen of 21 years of age and over, 33s. for 48 hours.

For male workmen of 18 and under 21 years of age, 31s. for 48 hours.

For male workmen of 17 and under 18 years of age, 26s. for 48 hours.

For male workmen of 16 and under 17 years of age, 22s. for 48 hours.

For male workmen of 15 and under 16 years of age, 18s. for 48 hours.

For male workmen of 14 and under 15 years of age, 14s. for 48 hours.

For male workmen under 14 years of age, 10s. for 48 hours.

3. Provided that where a whole-time workman is employed by the week or any longer period the wages payable to him for the hours of work agreed between him and the employer in any week (excluding hours of overtime employment) shall not be less than the respective amounts set out in clauses 1 and 2 above, notwithstanding that those hours are less than 54 in summer or 48 in winter.

4. The differential rates for overtime employment shall be as follows:—

A. In respect of overtime employment on week-days:—

For male workmen of 21 years of age and over, 9d. per hour.

For male workmen of 18 and under 21 years of age, 8½d. per hour.

For male workmen of 17 and under 18 years of age, 7d. per hour.

For male workmen of 16 and under 17 years of age, 6d. per hour.

For male workmen of 15 and under 16 years of age, 5d. per hour.

For male workmen of 14 and under 15 years of age, 4d. per hour.

For male workmen under 14 years of age, 3d. per hour.

B. In respect of overtime employment on a Sunday:—

For male workmen of 21 years of age and over, 11d. per hour.

For male workmen of 18 but under 21 years of age, 10d. per hour.

For male workmen of 17 but under 18 years of age, 8½d. per hour.

For male workmen of 16 but under 17 years of age, 7½d. per hour.

For male workmen of 15 but under 16 years of age, 6d. per hour.

For male workmen of 14 but under 15 years of age, 4½d. per hour.

For male workmen under 14 years of age, 3½d. per hour.

5. Provided that in the case of a male workman of under 18 years of age the mini-

imum rates and overtime rates shall during the first two months of his employment in agriculture be 20 per cent. less than the rates which but for this provision would be applicable to him under the provisions of the preceding clauses of this Order.

6. For the purpose of the above rates the following employment is defined as overtime employment, that is to say:—

(a) All employment in summer in excess of 54 hours in any week (excluding Sunday).

(b) All employment in winter in excess of 48 hours in any week (excluding Sunday).

(c) All employment on a Sunday.

7. For the purpose of the above rates employment in summer shall be deemed to be employment during the period commencing on the first Monday in March and terminating on the last Sunday in October; and employment in winter shall be deemed to be employment during the rest of the year.

8. The above rates shall apply to all male workmen who are wholly or partly employed in agriculture within the meaning of Section 17 (1) of the Corn Production Act, 1917, in the above-mentioned area during such time as they are so employed.

9. For the purpose of the above rates the hours of work shall not include meal times, but shall include any time during which by reason of weather conditions an employer has prevented from working a workman who was present at the place of employment and ready to work.

10. The Board further propose three months after the general cessation of hostilities or on the withdrawal by the Food Controller of all restrictions upon food consumption (whichever event shall first occur) to proceed to give Notice of a Proposal under the above-mentioned Regulations that employment in excess of 6½ hours on one day in each week (other than a Sunday) shall be defined as employment to which the above differential rates for overtime shall apply.

The Agricultural Wages Board, as required by Section 5 (4) of the above Act, and by paragraph 4 of the above-mentioned Regulations, will consider any Objections to the above rates and definition of overtime employment which may be lodged with them within one month from the date of this Notice. The Objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

For male workmen of 14 and under 15 years of age, 14s. for 54 hours.

For male workmen under 14 years of age, 10s. for 54 hours.

3. Provided that where a whole-time workman is employed by the week or any longer period the wages payable to him for the hours of work agreed between him and the employer in any week (excluding hours of overtime employment) shall not be less than the respective amounts set out in Clauses 1 and 2 above, notwithstanding that those hours are less than 57 in summer or 54 in winter.

4. For the purpose of the above minimum rates employment in summer shall be deemed to be employment during the period commencing on the first Monday in March and terminating on the last Sunday in October; and employment in winter shall be deemed to be employment during the rest of the year.

5. The above minimum rates shall apply to all male workmen of 18 years of age and upwards who are wholly or partly employed in agriculture within the meaning of Section 17 (1) of the Corn Production Act, 1917, in the above-mentioned area during such time as they are so employed.

6. For the purpose of the above rates the hours of work shall not include meal times, but shall include any time during which by reason of weather conditions an employer has prevented from working a workman who was present at the place of employment and ready to work.

7. The above rates shall come into operation on the twenty-second day of July, 1918.

(a) In respect of overtime employment on week-days, for the first six hours in any week (excluding Sunday), 8½d. per hour, and for any hours in excess of six, 9d. per hour.

(b) in respect of overtime employment on a Sunday, 9d. per hour.

5. For the purpose of the application of the above rates the following employment is defined as overtime employment, that is to say:—

(a) All employment in excess of 54 hours in any week (excluding Sunday) in summer.

(b) All employment in excess of 48 hours in any week (excluding Sunday) in winter.

employment whether on weekdays or on Sunday customary in the above area in the case of a workman so employed.

2. The wages payable for employment of all other male workers in agriculture of 18 years of age and over shall be not less than wages at the following minimum rates, that is to say:

(a) In respect of employment in summer (as hereinafter defined), 31s. for 54 hours.

(b) In respect of employment in winter (as hereinafter defined), 31s. for 48 hours.

3. Provided that where a whole-time workman (other than a workman employed wholly or mainly as a Carter, Dairyman, Cowman, or Shepherd) is employed by the week or any longer period, the wages payable to him for the hours of work agreed between him and the employer in any week (excluding hours of overtime employment) shall not be less than the respective amounts set out in Clause 2 (a) and (b) above, notwithstanding that those hours are less than 54 in summer or 48 in winter.

4. The differential rates for overtime employment shall be as follows, that is to say:

(a) In respect of overtime employment on weekdays, 8½d. per hour.

(b) In respect of overtime employment on a Sunday, 10d. per hour.

5. For the purpose of the above rates the following employment is defined as overtime employment, that is to say:

(a) In respect of a workman employed wholly or mainly as a Carter, Dairyman, Cowman, or Shepherd, all employment in excess of the hours of employment customary in the area in the case of a workman so employed.

(b) In respect of other workmen—

(1) All employment in excess of 54 hours in any week (excluding Sunday) in summer.

(2) All employment in excess of 48 hours in any week (excluding Sunday) in winter.

(3) All employment on a Sunday.

6. For the purpose of the above rates employment in summer shall be deemed to be employment during the period commencing on the first Monday in March and terminating on the last Sunday in October; and employment in winter shall be deemed to be employment during the rest of the year.

7. The above rates shall apply (according to the terms above set forth) to all male workmen of 18 years of age and over who are wholly or partly employed in agriculture within the meaning of Section 17 (1) of the Corn Production Act, 1917, in the above-mentioned area during such time as they are so employed.

8. For the purpose of the above rates the hours of work shall not include meal times, but shall include any time during which by reason of weather conditions an employer has prevented from working a workman who was present at the place of employment and ready to work.

9. The Board further propose three months after the general cessation of hostilities or on the withdrawal by the Food Controller of all restrictions upon food consumption (whichever event shall first occur) to proceed to give Notice of a Proposal under the above-mentioned Regulations that employment in excess of 6½ hours on one day in each week (other than a Sunday) shall be

defined as employment to which differential rates for overtime shall apply.

At a Special General Meeting of the Fellows and Associates of the Institute of Actuaries, duly convened and held at Staple Inn Hall, on Thursday, the 23rd day of May, 1918, and at a subsequent Special General Meeting of the said Fellows and Associates, also duly convened and held at the same place, on Monday, the 17th day of June, 1918, the following portions of Bye-laws 30, 32, 34, and 35 were rescinded, viz. :—

30. The portion comprising the words "*shall be elected every year at the Annual General Meeting from the Fellows of the Institute. He*"

32. The portion comprising the words "*and shall be elected every year at the Annual General Meeting from the Fellows of the Institute.*"

34. The portion comprising the words "*shall be elected every year at the Annual General Meeting from the Fellows of the Institute. He*"

35. The portion comprising the words "*shall be elected every year at the Annual General Meeting from the Fellows of the Institute. They*;"

and Bye-laws 4, 5, and 73 were also rescinded, and in substitution thereof the following Bye-laws, to be numbered respectively 4, 5 and 73, were duly made, passed and confirmed, viz. :—

"4. (a) The President, the four Vice-Presidents, the Treasurer and the Honorary Secretaries shall go out of office as such at the close of the Annual General Meeting of the year for which they were elected, and, except as provided by Bye-laws 30, 32, 34 and 35, shall be eligible for re-election.

"(b) The Council shall, at a Council Meeting to be held not less than fifty days before the Annual General Meeting in each year, elect from the then Members of the Council the President, the four Vice-Presidents, the Treasurer and the Honorary Secretaries for the ensuing year. Such election shall be conducted in such manner as the Council may, from time to time, prescribe."

"5. (A) At every Annual General Meeting five Members of the Council (which number shall include any ceasing to hold office as Members of the Council under Bye-law 7) shall retire and five Fellows shall be elected in manner hereinafter provided to fill the vacancies so arising. The Members so to retire (apart from any ceasing to hold office as Members of the Council under Bye-law 7) shall be chosen by the Council at a Meeting to be held not less than fifty days before such Annual General Meeting, and the Members so chosen shall not be eligible for re-election before the Annual General Meeting next following that at which they go out of office,

but any Members ceasing to hold office as Members of the Council under Bye-law 7 shall be eligible for re-election.

"(B) The Council shall, not less than forty days before each Annual General Meeting, send to each Fellow and Associate, at his usual or last known address, a list containing the names of those Members of the Council who will retire under Section A of this Bye-law and under Bye-law 7, distinguishing those eligible and those not eligible for re-election.

"(c) The Fellows and Associates shall be entitled to nominate any Fellow or Fellows for election to the vacancies in the Council arising by retirement under Section A of this Bye-law, or under Bye-law 7 or otherwise, but no nomination shall be valid unless it be signed by not less than seven Fellows or Associates (of whom not fewer than four shall be Fellows) and lodged at the Offices of the Institute not less than twenty-one days before the date of the Annual General Meeting.

"(d) If sufficient nominations to fill up all the vacancies in the Council, arising as aforesaid, are not so lodged the Council shall nominate a Fellow or Fellows to fill up any remaining vacancies.

"(E) The Council shall, not less than seven days before each Annual General Meeting, send to each Fellow and Associate, at his usual or last known address :—

"(a) A list containing the names of those Fellows elected under Bye-law 4 to the offices above mentioned, and

"(b) A list containing the names of the Fellows duly nominated as aforesaid to fill the vacancies in the Council arising as aforesaid.

"(F) If the names in the last-mentioned list shall exceed the number of vacancies as aforesaid such list shall be the balloting list for the election at the Annual General Meeting of Fellows to fill the vacancies in the Council, and at such Meeting each Fellow and Associate may vote for as many candidates as there are vacancies to be filled, and, if he shall vote for more candidates than there are vacancies to be filled, his balloting paper shall be rejected by the Scrutineers.

"(g) The Scrutineers shall be two or more in number to be chosen previous to the balloting for election from those present by those present at the Meeting, and they shall receive the votes and report the result of their scrutiny to the Chairman before the close of the Meeting."

"73. At the Annual General Meeting there shall be elected in manner provided by the Bye-laws the Members to fill the vacancies in the Council arising under Section A of Bye-law 5 or under Bye-law 7 or otherwise, and the Auditors for the ensuing year."
