PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-eighth day of November, nineteen hundred and fourteen, His Majesty was pleased to make regulations (called the "Defence of the Realm Regulations") under the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914, for securing the public safety and the defence of the realm:

And whereas the said Act has been amended by the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) Act, 1915, the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) (No. 2) Act, 1915, and the Munitions of War Act, 1915, and other enactments:

And whereas the said regulations have been amended by various subsequent Orders in Council:

And whereas it is expedient further to amend the said regulations in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the follow-

ing amendments be made in the said regulations:—

1. Regulation 2L shall be amended as follows:—

(1) In sub-section (1) there shall be inserted after the words "cultivate the land" the words "or use the land (including any buildings or erections thereon) for the keeping or breeding of live-stock, poultry, or bees" and after the word "cultivation" the words "or use as aforesaid".

(2) In sub-section (2) for the words "or for adapting the land to cultivation including fencing" there shall be substituted the words "or its use as aforesaid or for adapting the land to cultivation or to such use as aforesaid including the erection of fences or buildings," and for the words "such fencing or work of adaptation" there shall be substituted the words "fence, building or other work erected or constructed under this provision."

(3) In sub-section (3) after the word "cultivates" there shall be inserted the words "or uses," and the word "twenty" shall be substituted for "nineteen".

(4) In paragraph (ii) of sub-section (3) there shall be inserted after the words "the

land or any part thereof" the words "or use the land (including any buildings or erections thereon) or any part thereof for the keeping or breeding of live-stock, poultry or bees" and after the word "cultivation" the words "or use as aforesaid."

2. After Regulation 8D the following regulation shall be inserted:—

"8DD. (1) Notwithstanding anything in the Motor Car Act, 1903, a licence limited to the driving of a motor car other than a heavy motor or a public service vehicle may be granted under that Act to a male person who has attained the age of sixteen years but has not attained the age of seventeen years, if the authority granting the licence are satisfied that he is competent to drive such a motor car.

"(2) The provisions of the Motor Car Act, 1903, and the regulations made thereunder which relate to the licensing of a motor car driver and a licence to drive a motor car shall apply to the licensing of a driver and a licence granted in pursuance of this regulation subject to such modifications as are required to render the said provisions and regulations applicable to a licence limited as aforesaid.

"(3) For the purpose of this regulation—

(a) the expression 'heavy motor car' means a motor car exceeding two tons in weight unladen; and

(b) the expression 'public service vehicle' means any motor car licensed to ply for hire as a hackney carriage or stage carriage."

3. In paragraph (a) of sub-section (1) of Regulation 9AA the words "(including fairs and markets)" shall be inserted after the word "assemblies."

4. In Regulation 13A after the words "His Majesty's Forces" there shall be inserted the words "or of the forces of any of His Majesty's Allies."

5. After Regulation 14G the following regulation shall be inserted:—

"14H. (1) A person not being a natural born British subject shall not for any purpose assume or use, or purport to assume or use, or continue after the nineteenth day of August, nineteen hundred and eighteen the assumption or use of, any name other than that by which he was ordinarily known at the date of the commencement of the war, and if he does so, he shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations.

"(2) Where any such person as aforesaid carries on, or purports or continues to carry on, or is a member of a partnership or firm which carries on, or which purports or continues to carry on, any trade or business in any name other than that under which the trade or business was carried on at the date of the commencement of the war he shall for the purpose of this regulation be deemed to be using, or purporting or continuing to use, a name other than that by which he was ordinarily known at the date of the commencement of the war.

"(3) A Secretary of State may, if it appears desirable in any particular case, grant an exemption from the provisions of this regulation.

"(4) Nothing in this regulation shall—

(a) affect the assumption or use, or continued assumption or use, of any name in pursuance of a Royal Licence; or

(b) affect the continuance of the use, until the decision of the Secretary of State has been given, of a name in respect of which an application for exemption is made before the nineteenth day of August, nineteen hundred and eighteen; or

(c) prevent the assumption or use by a married woman of her husband's name."

6. After Regulation 30A the following regulation shall be inserted:—

"30AA. If any person without lawful authority incites or induces any other person whether or not such other person is in the United Kingdom to do any act outside the United Kingdom calculated to increase the cost in the United Kingdom of war material, he shall, unless he proves to the satisfaction of the court that the act was not intended to increase the cost, be guilty of an offence against these regulations."

7. In Regulation 35c, after the words "His Majesty's Forces," wherever those words occur, there shall be inserted the words "or of the forces of any of His Majesty's Allies."

8. After Regulation 39E the following regulation shall be inserted:—

"39EE (1) The Shipping Controller, after consultation with a Secretary of State and the Board of Trade, may, in so far as it appears necessary so to do for the purpose of providing and maintaining an efficient supply of shipping and thereby furthering the successful prosecution of the war, make orders modifying or suspending the operation of any such provisions contained in any bye-laws made under the Petroleum Acts, 1871 to 1881 as prohibit, or in any manner restrict, whether directly or indirectly, the discharge of petroleum from a ship by means of the ship's own steam.

"(2) Any order made under this regulation may contain provisions requiring the master and members of the crew of a ship from which petroleum is being or is to be discharged and any other persons in any way engaged or concerned in the discharge of petroleum from a ship to comply with such rules as may be specified in the order, and if any person, being a person required to comply therewith, fails to comply with any such rules, he shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations.

"(3) Any order made under this regulation may be revoked, extended, or varied as occasion requires.

"(4) In the application of this regulation to Scotland, the Secretary for Scotland, and in the application of this regulation to Ireland the Lord Lieutenant, shall be substituted for a Secretary of State."

9. In Regulation 40D after the words "His Majesty's Forces," wherever those words occur, there shall be inserted the words "or of the forces of any of His Majesty's Allies."

10. Regulation 41AA is hereby revoked.

11. In Regulation 51C after the words "are being" there shall be inserted the words "or are about to be."

WHEREAS, by the Aliens Restriction Order, His Majesty, in exercise of the powers conferred by the Aliens Restriction Act, 1914, has been pleased to impose restrictions on aliens and to make various regulations for carrying those restrictions into effect:

And whereas it is expedient to extend the provisions of that Order in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to Order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The following Article shall be inserted after Article 20D:—

“ 20E. (1) An alien (wherever resident) shall have in his possession an identity book obtained in pursuance of this Order and duly filled in and attested:

“ Provided that—

(a) a Secretary of State may exempt from the provisions of this Article any class of aliens, where he is satisfied that satisfactory means are provided for their identification, other than the possession of an identity book; and

(b) an alien coming from any place out of the United Kingdom and landing in the United Kingdom without an identity book may, subject to the provisions of this Order, be allowed to proceed to his destination in the United Kingdom if the passport or other document with which he is required to be furnished on landing in the United Kingdom contains, or if he supplies, such of the particulars required to be contained in an identity book as may be required by an aliens officer; but any such alien shall proceed directly to his destination, and on arriving there shall, within twenty-four hours, comply with all the provisions of this Order which are applicable to him; and

(c) this Article shall not apply to an alien who appears to be under the age of eighteen and is in the care of some other person who is over that age.

“(2) The provisions contained in the Third Schedule to this Order shall have effect with respect to identity books.

“(3) If any person uses for the purposes of this Order an identity book relating to any person other than himself, or, in filling in or attesting the particulars in an identity book, or for the purpose of obtaining an identity book, whether for himself or any other person, makes any false statement or false representation, he shall be deemed to have acted in contravention of this Order.

“ Any person who purports to attest the particulars in an identity book when any of the relevant particulars in the book have not been filled in and signed shall be deemed to have made a false representation in attesting the particulars in an identity book.

“(4) If any alien to whom an identity book has been issued, or who is required to be in possession of an identity book under this Order fails without reasonable excuse to produce his identity book when so required by an officer, or by a soldier, sailor or airman engaged on

sentry patrol or other similar duty, or by any aliens officer or police constable, he shall be deemed to have acted in contravention of this Order, and may, without prejudice to any other penalty, be detained pending the making of inquiries as to his identity, and while so detained shall be deemed to be in legal custody.”

2. Sub-section (1) of Article 18B, and the whole of Article 18C are revoked and the sub-sections in Article 18B shall be re-numbered accordingly.

3. This Order shall have effect as from the first day of October, nineteen hundred and eighteen.

“ Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being, or having been, an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are, from time to time, directed by Order in Council:

“ And whereas we consider that the position of the Senior Schoolmasters, Royal Marines, should be improved:

“ We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the following proposals, with effect as from the 11th March, 1918, viz.:—

(a) Commissioned Warrant Rank to be instituted for this Class, with the title of Chief Schoolmaster, Royal Marines, the number of such Commissioned Warrant Officers not to be more than 2, unless it is necessary to exceed this number in order to provide for promotions under Clause (c).

Such promotions to be regarded as additional to the Establishment, and no further promotions to be made, except under the 15 years' rule in Clause (c), until the number of Chief Schoolmasters is again reduced below 2.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 16th day of July, 1918, in the words following, viz. :—

"Whereas by Section 88 of the Naval Discipline Act it is enacted that Your Majesty's Land and Air Forces, when embarked on board any of Your Majesty's Ships, shall be subject to the provisions of that Act to such extent and under such Regulations as Your Majesty, by Order in Council, shall direct:

"And whereas we are of opinion that it is expedient to make Regulations for the discipline of Your Majesty's Air Forces when embarked as passengers in any of Your Majesty's Ships, together with tables of summary punishments for Airmen and of punishments for Non-Commissioned Officers who may commit any act against the good order and discipline of the Ship in which they are embarked:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to direct that the following Regulations shall be established:—

"1. Whenever any of Your Majesty's Air Forces shall be embarked as passengers in any of Your Majesty's Ships, the Officers and Airmen shall, from the time of embarkation, strictly observe the Laws and Regulations established for the government and discipline of Your Majesty's Navy, and shall, for these purposes, be under the command of the Commanding Officer of the Ship, as well as of the Senior Naval Officer present; and all Air-Force Officers or other persons under the equivalent rank of Captain of Your Majesty's Navy taking passages, and all Air-Force Officers in actual command for the time being of any Body of the Air Force embarked, through whom orders to that Body (given by the Officer of the Watch) are required to pass, shall be under the command of the Officer of the Watch:

"2. Any act against the good order and discipline of the Ship shall be deemed an act to the prejudice of good order and Air-Force discipline under Section 40 of the Air Force Act, unless the breach of discipline constitutes some other Air-Force offence for which provision is otherwise made in the said Act.

"3. Whenever an Air-Force Officer or Airman commits any act against the good order and discipline of the Ship, the Commanding

Officer of the Ship may, by his own authority, and without reference to any other person, cause him to be put under arrest or confined as a close prisoner; and may, if he thinks the case requires it, order the prisoner to be disembarked at the first convenient opportunity, transmitting a report in writing, through the Senior Naval Officer present, to the Senior Air-Force Officer in command of the Air Forces, in order that the offender may be brought before an Air-Force Court-Martial.

" 4. The Commanding Officer of the Ship shall have full power, on his own authority, to order an offender, whether Air-Force Officer or Airman, to be placed in either naval or air-force custody, as he shall consider most desirable, observing that in all cases where an offender is to be disembarked for trial by Air-Force authority, he must be placed in Air-Force custody on board the Ship.

" 5. If any Air-Force Officer or Airman commits any act which, in the opinion of the Commanding Officer of the Body of the Air Force embarked, can only be adequately dealt with by a General or District Court-Martial, the offender shall, with the concurrence of the Commanding Officer of the Ship, be disembarked on the first opportunity for the purpose of being proceeded against according to Air-Force law.

" 6. If any Airman shall commit any act against the good order and discipline of the Ship which, in the opinion of the Commanding Officer of the Ship, requires the infliction of any summary punishment for which a warrant is required by the Summary Punishment Table attached hereto, and which he is hereby authorized to award, the Commanding Officer of the Ship shall confer with the Commanding Officer of the Body of the Air Force embarked as to the nature and amount of such punishment, if any, to be inflicted, and on their concurrence the Commanding Officer of the Ship shall, by warrant under his hand, which should also bear the signature of the Officer commanding the Body of the Air Force embarked as concurring, sentence the offender to suffer such punishment accordingly. In the event of the Commanding Officer of that Body not concurring with the Commanding Officer of the Ship, the Commanding Officer of the Ship is to cause

the offender to be placed under arrest or confined as a close prisoner, until the case can be referred to superior Air-Force authority.

" 7. The Commanding Officer of the Body of the Air Force embarked, on his taking command of that Body, will receive from the Captain of the Ship authority under his hand, and in the established form, to award such summary punishments as are specified in the Summary Punishment Table for the Air Force, but such authority will not deprive the Captain of his right to withdraw the original authority, given; in the latter case, however, he should report to the Admiralty the circumstances which induced him to deviate from the general rule.

" 8. All orders to the Body of the Air Force embarked are, so far as may be practicable, to be given through their own Officers and Non-Commissioned Officers, and the Commanding Officer of the Ship is to bear in mind that although the discipline of all on board is under his entire control, he is nevertheless to leave the Body of the Air Force embarked to the management of their own Officers so far as may be consistent with the order and discipline of the Ship.

" 9. In special and exceptional cases, where the Commanding Officer of the Ship may deem it necessary for the good order or discipline of the Ship to give such orders as may interfere with existing Regulations, or may affect the internal economy and discipline of the Body of the Air Force embarked, he is to make a special report of the circumstances to the Admiralty.

" 10. When any Airmen of Your Majesty's Air Forces are embarked as passengers in any of Your Majesty's Ships, and there is no Commissioned Officer of the Air Forces on board, the Commanding Officer of the Ship shall possess and may exercise in regard to any such Airmen all the powers conferred upon him by Article 6 in the case of Airmen without conferring with or obtaining the concurrence or signature of any Officer of Your Majesty's Air Forces.

" 11. All summary punishments for Airmen embarked on board Your Majesty's Ships shall be in strict accordance with the Summary Punishment Table appended hereto.

" The Air Council have signified to us their concurrence in these proposals.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 33rd and 34th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 39, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 113, the Act of the 4th and 5th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 39, and the Act of the 31st and 32nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 114, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 30th day of May, 1918, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 33rd and 34th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 39, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 113, the Act of the 4th and 5th years of Her

said late Majesty, Chapter 39, and the Act of the 31st and 32nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 114, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the Church and Cure (hereinafter called 'the said Benefice'), of Milton Clevedon, in the County of Somerset, and in the Diocese of Bath and Wells:

"Whereas the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Milton Clevedon is vested for an estate in fee simple, free from incumbrances, in certain Trustees upon trust in the first place for the Right Honourable Giles Stephen Holland, Earl of Ilchester, (hereinafter called 'the said Earl of Ilchester'), during his life, and the said Earl of Ilchester is therefore the Patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the said Benefice in case the same were now vacant:

"And whereas the said Earl of Ilchester is desirous that the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Milton Clevedon should be

transferred to and be vested in the Right Reverend George Wyndham, now Bishop of Bath and Wells, and his Successors in the same Bishopric:

"And whereas the said George Wyndham, Bishop of Bath and Wells, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness, and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the Diocese which, by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited, or by some or one of them, is made necessary, he, the said George Wyndham, Bishop of Bath and Wells, has executed this Scheme as hereinafter mentioned:

"And whereas the transfer of the Patronage of the said Benefice of Milton Clevedon, which is hereinbefore mentioned, and hereinafter recommended and proposed, will, in our opinion, tend to make better provision for the Cure of Souls in the Parish or District in or in respect of which the right of Patronage or Advowson, so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid, arises or exists, that is to say, in the Parish of Milton Clevedon:

NOTE (1).—All persons or firms resident, carrying on business or being in the United Kingdom are prohibited from having, with any person or firm mentioned in this List, or

in any List issued under the Trading with the Enemy (Statutory List) Proclamation, any dealings other than such as are expressly authorised by paragraph 5 of the Proclamation. A List (The Consolidated List, No. 56A) consolidating all previous Lists, up to and including that of the 31st May, 1918, together with List No. 57 of 14th June, 1918, List No. 58 of 28th June, 1918, List No. 59 of 12th July, 1918, and the List herewith annexed, contain all the names which up to this date are included in the Statutory List.

Additions to and variations in these Lists will be published at intervals approximately of two weeks.

The Lists are published in the London Gazette and reproduced in the Board of Trade Journal, and separate copies of all Lists may be obtained at a small cost from the Superintendent of Publications, His Majesty's Stationery Office, Imperial House, Kingsway, W.C.

NOTE (2).—Where a person or firm mentioned in the List has more than one address in the country or group of countries under which the name of the person or firm appears, all dealings in that country, or in any country in the group, with such person or firm are prohibited, even in cases where one only of the addresses or one only of the countries is specifically mentioned.

NOTE (3).—Trading is prohibited under the Trading with the Enemy Proclamations of 25th June, and 10th November, 1915, with any person or firm of enemy nationality resident or carrying on business in China, Siam, Persia, Morocco, Liberia or Portuguese East Africa. Persons or firms in the United Kingdom are therefore prohibited from trading with any person or firm of enemy nationality in any of those countries, even though such person or firm is not mentioned by name in the Statutory List.

NOTE (4).—In order to minimise as far as possible any inconvenience which may be caused to British traders by the dislocation of export trade owing to the inclusion in the Statutory List of a former connection, the Foreign Trade Department is collecting and classifying the names of non-enemy firms who may be able to act as substitutes for firms mentioned in the Statutory List. A considerable amount of information is already available at the Foreign Trade Department, and it is in many cases possible to suggest the names of satisfactory substitutes for individual firms on the Lists, without the necessity of referring the matter abroad. The Department is, however, prepared on application to enquire of His Majesty's Representatives abroad for the names of suitable substitutes. When the applicant wishes this done by telegraph he is required to undertake to pay the cost of telegraphic correspondence. It would greatly facilitate the work of the Foreign Trade Department if applicants in making enquiries would specify the particular trade or trades for which substitutes are required. *General enquiries for new connections abroad should be addressed to The Comptroller General, Department of Overseas Trade (Development and Intelligence), 73, Basinghall Street, London, E.C. 2.*

NOTE (5).—The Statutory List for each country is telegraphed, on the day of issue, to His Majesty's Representative in that country, who is instructed to notify accordingly British

Consular Officers, to whom persons abroad should apply for information as to names on the List. Persons and firms in the United Kingdom with agencies or branches abroad would, however, be well advised to furnish such agencies or branches with issues of the List as they appear. The names on the Lists for all countries in Central or South America are also notified to His Majesty's Ambassador at Washington, who transmits them to H.M. Consul-General at New York and to other centres in the United States likely to be interested.

NOTE (6).—It is not unusual for firms in Holland and the Netherland East Indies to be registered under the names commencing with descriptive terms such as "Handel Maatschappij" (Trading Company) or "Naamlooze Venootschap" (Limited Liability Company). In such cases it has been found more convenient to publish the firm under its proper name, followed by the general descriptive term "Handel Maatschappij" or "Naamlooze Venootschap" (N.V.), as in the case of an English company. For instance Handel Maatschappij van den Berg & Company, and Naamlooze Venootschap de Komeet v/h Dumonceau Frères will be found under "Berg" and "Komeet" respectively, and not under "Handel" or "Naamlooze."

THE RAILWAY WAGONS CENSUS ORDER, 1918, DATED 25TH JULY, 1918, MADE BY THE BOARD OF TRADE, UNDER REGULATION 7B OF THE DEFENCE OF THE REALM REGULATIONS.

Whereas under Regulation 7B of the Defence of the Realm Regulations orders may be made for enabling the Board of Trade to take possession of any private owner's wagons, and to use those wagons in such manner as they think best in the interests of the country as a whole;

And whereas, to enable the Board to exercise the said powers it is necessary that particulars of such wagons should be furnished to the said Board;

Now, therefore, the Board of Trade, in exercise of their said powers, and of all other powers enabling them, hereby order as follows:—

1. This Order applies to all railway wagons (including tank wagons) which are not owned by a railway company.

2. Any person who, on the first day of August, 1918, is for the time being in possession of a railway wagon to which this Order applies shall, on or before the fourteenth day of August, 1918, make a return to the Board of Trade in the form set out in the schedule hereto, giving the information specified in such form with regard to every such wagon in his possession.

3. The owner of any such wagon shall supply the person liable to make a return in respect thereof with any information relating thereto which such person may require to enable him to make such return.

4. Where any person who, on the first day of August, 1918, is in possession of any such wagon has hired the same from any other person for a less period than three calendar months, such person shall, in lieu of making such return as aforesaid, furnish to the Board of Trade the name of the person from whom he has hired the said wagon, and the distinguishing number thereof, and the return relating to such wagon shall be furnished by the person by whom such wagon has been let on hire.

5. Failure to make a return, or the making of an untrue return, or the supplying of false information, are summary offences against the Defence of the Realm Regulations.

6. This Order may be cited as The Railway Wagons Census Order, 1918, and does not apply to Ireland.

AGRICULTURAL WAGES BOARD
 (ENGLAND AND WALES).

PROPOSAL TO FIX MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR PEMBROKE, CARMARTHEN AND CARDIGAN.

The Agricultural Wages Board (England and Wales), duly established and constituted under Section 5 (1) of the above Act, and the Regulations made by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, dated the 8th November, 1917, having had regard to the provisions of sub-section (6) and (7) of the said Section, hereby give notice, as required by sub-section 4 of the said Section, and by paragraph 4 of the Agricultural Wages Regulations, 1918, that they propose to fix the following minimum rates of wages and the following differential rates for overtime employment, as hereinafter defined,

for male workmen employed in agriculture for time-work in the area comprising the administrative counties of Pembroke, Carmarthen and Cardigan, and to define for the purpose of the application of such differential rates for overtime the employment which is to be treated as overtime employment as follows, that is to say:—

1. The wages payable for employment in summer (as hereinafter defined) of male workmen in agriculture shall be not less than wages at the following minimum rates, that is to say:—

For male workmen of 21 years of age and over, 31s. for 54 hours.

For male workmen of 18 and under 21 years of age, 30s. for 54 hours.

For male workmen of 17 and under 18 years of age, 26s. for 54 hours.

For male workmen of 16 and under 17 years of age, 22s. for 54 hours.

For male workmen of 15 and under 16 years of age, 18s. for 54 hours.

For male workmen of 14 and under 15 years of age, 14s. for 54 hours.

For male workmen under 14 years of age, 10s. for 54 hours.

2. The wages payable for employment in winter (as hereinafter defined) of male workmen in agriculture shall be not less than wages at the following minimum rates, that is to say:—

For male workmen of 21 years of age and over, 31s. for 48 hours.

For male workmen of 18 and under 21 years of age, 30s. for 48 hours.

For male workmen of 17 and under 18 years of age, 26s. for 48 hours.

For male workmen of 16 and under 17 years of age, 22s. for 48 hours.

For male workmen of 15 and under 16 years of age, 18s. for 48 hours.

For male workmen of 14 and under 15 years of age, 14s. for 48 hours.

For male workmen under 14 years of age, 10s. for 48 hours.

3. Provided that where a whole-time workman is employed by the week or any longer period the wages payable to him for the hours of work agreed between him and the employer in any week (excluding hours of overtime employment) shall not be less than the respective amounts set out in Clauses 1 and 2 above, notwithstanding that those hours are less than 54 in summer or 48 in winter.

4. The differential rates for overtime employment shall be as follows:—

A.—In respect of overtime employment on weekdays:

For male workmen of 18 years of age and over, 8½d. per hour.

For male workmen of 17 and under 18 years of age, 7d. per hour.

For male workmen of 16 and under 17 years of age, 6d. per hour.

For male workmen of 15 and under 16 years of age, 5d. per hour.

For male workmen of 14 and under 15 years of age, 4d. per hour.

Under 14 years of age, 3d. per hour.

B.—In respect of overtime employment on a Sunday:

For male workmen of 18 years of age and over, 10d. per hour.

For male workmen of 17 and under 18 years of age, 8½d. per hour.

For male workmen of 16 and under 17 years of age, 7½d. per hour.

For male workmen of 15 and under 16 years of age, 6d. per hour.

For male workmen of 14 and under 15 years of age, 4½d. per hour.

Under 14 years of age, 3½d. per hour.

5. Provided that in the case of a male workman of under 18 years of age the minimum rates and overtime rates shall during the first two months of his employment in agriculture be 20 per cent. less than the rates which but for this provision would be applicable to him under the provisions of the preceding clauses of this Order.

6. For the purpose of the above rates the following employment is defined as overtime employment, that is to say:—

(a) All employment in summer in excess of 54 hours in any week (excluding Sunday).

(b) All employment in winter in excess of 48 hours in any week (excluding Sunday).

(c) All employment on a Sunday.

7. For the purpose of the above rates employment in summer shall be deemed to be employment during the period commencing on the first Monday in March and terminating on the last Sunday in October, and employment in winter shall be deemed to be employment during the rest of the year.

8. The above rates shall apply to all male workmen who are wholly or partly employed in agriculture within the meaning of Section 17 (1) of the Corn Production Act, 1917, in the above-mentioned area during such time as they are so employed.

9. For the purpose of the above rates the hours of work shall not include meal times, but shall include any time during which by reason of weather conditions an employer has prevented from working a workman who was present at the place of employment and ready to work.

10. The Board further propose three months after the general cessation of hostilities or on the withdrawal by the Food Controller of all restrictions upon food consumption (whichever event shall first occur) to proceed to give notice of a proposal under the above-mentioned Regulations that employment in excess of 6½ hours on one day in each week (other than a Sunday) shall be defined as employment to which the above differential rates for overtime shall apply.

The Agricultural Wages Board, as required by Section 5 (4) of the above Act and by paragraph 4 of the above-mentioned Regulations, will consider any objections to the above rates and definition of overtime employment which may be lodged with them within one month from the date of this Notice. All objections should be in writing, and should be addressed to the Secretary, The Agricultural Wages Board (England and Wales), 80, Pall Mall, London, S.W. 1. The objections should

state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

ENGLAND AND WALES, SOUTH AND WEST COASTS.

Portland Bill to Bardsey Island—Traffic Regulations.

Former Notice.—No. 576 of 1918; hereby cancelled.

Notice is hereby given that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty and are now in force:—

I.—REGULATIONS RESPECTING SMALL CRAFT AND AMATEUR FISHING.

The following regulations are to apply to all small craft (exclusive of bona-fide commercial fishing boats, sailing under fishing permits) from Portland Bill on the east to Bardsey Island on the west.

2. Discretionary power is granted to Divisional Coast Watching Officers to grant exemptions in cases where it can be shown that exceptional hardship to individuals, or interference with recognised means of communication across estuaries, &c., would be caused by a strict interpretation of the regulations.

3. The following regulations with regard to pleasure permits are now in force:—

(i) No fisherman, boatman or waterman under 60 years of age may be granted a permit. Fishermen, boatmen or watermen over 60 years of age may receive a permit for one pleasure or waterman's boat (which may be let out on hire), provided that the boat has not been granted a fishing or amateur permit.

(ii) Persons, other than fishermen, boatmen or watermen, who own boats may receive permits on the strict understanding that no professional fisherman, boatman or waterman under the age of 60 is employed either on shore or at sea in connection with such craft. Any infringement of this rule will lead to the immediate withdrawal of the permit.

Boats thus licensed are to comply strictly with the following navigational directions:—

(a) They are not to be under way at night, i.e., between half an hour after sunset and half an hour before sunrise, or during fog, but are to remain at their moorings. If caught out by fog they are to return to the shore at once.

(b) Subject to any special exceptions that have been or may hereafter be made, they are not to proceed to a distance of more than three miles in any direction from the port, creek or river to which they belong.

Applications for permits should be made to the Divisional Coast Watching Officer through the Station Officer of the nearest Coast Guard station. No boat or vessel may be used without a permit. Permits must always be carried while under way, and may be withdrawn at any time at the discretion of the Officer by whom they were issued.

4. Through the above-mentioned channel, and with the concurrence of the Fishery Authorities, British born amateurs desirous of fishing for food may obtain amateur permits, subject to the following provisions:—

(a) The crew of the boat—and if desired an alternative crew for each—shall be named on the permit, which shall be signed by each of those persons, and no person other than those named may be at sea in the boat. The permit must always be carried in the boat while under way.

(b) Boats sailing under amateur permits shall not carry as members of their crew bona-fide fishermen holding, or qualified to hold, fishing permits.

(c) Amateurs and visitors who propose to hire boats for periods of not less than one week, and whose credentials are satisfactory, may obtain amateur permits in the same manner as amateur boat-owners. The period of such permits, together with the holder's home address, shall be stated on it, and it shall be given up to the Station Officer at the end of that period.

(d) Subject to local modifications, boats sailing under amateur permits may proceed to a distance of not more than three nautical miles in any direction from their port or estuary, and may be under way from one

hour before dawn till two hours after sunset. They are not to put to sea during fog, and if caught out by fog are to return to port. In no case may the holders of amateur permits fish or be at sea in contravention of fishing regulations or orders. Special local regulations are in force for defended areas and ports, comprising Portland, Plymouth, Falmouth, Milford Haven, Cardiff and Barry, and Swansea.

(e) Amateurs returning to port later than half an hour after sunset are to report forthwith at the Coast Guard station, or otherwise, as directed.

(f) A return of fish caught is to be made after each trip to the Station Officer or other designated person, on forms provided by, and in the manner laid down by, the Fishery Authorities.

(g) With the sanction of the Naval and Military Authorities, amateurs may form an approved local Food Fishing Association, the Secretary of which may then perform the duties of a Station Officer under these regulations in respect of recommending members for permits, checking boats ashore, and taking returns of fish landed.

(h) The right is reserved by the Fishery Authorities to direct the manner in which fish caught under amateur permits shall be disposed of.

5. Amateur permits may be endorsed, suspended or withdrawn by the Naval or Fishery Authorities, by whom, acting in conjunction, the provisions as to fishing may be modified locally.

6. Questions relative to permits should be referred to the Divisional Coast Watching Officer through the Station Officer; questions in regard to fishing or to the formation of Local Food Fishing Associations, to the Inspector of Fisheries for the area. The conditions under which amateurs may ship as working hands in bona-fide fishing boats can also be obtained from the Inspector of Fisheries.

7. Excursion traffic, defined as advertised trips wholly or chiefly for the pleasure of the passengers, is allowed only within ports, creeks or rivers, and by written permission of the Commander-in-Chief, Plymouth. Such permission may be obtained through the Divisional Coast Watching Officer, and will only be given provided that—

(a) The entire trip is within the harbour.

(b) The boat or vessel is not under weigh at night, i.e., between half an hour after sunset and half an hour before sunrise, or during fog.

(c) One person is responsible for the party, and

(d) The permission is applicable only to the trip specified.

8. Regular ferry boats may obtain special permission from the Divisional Coast Watching Officer, to run to a specified hour according to circumstances.

9. Oil, motor spirit, petrol, or other goods may not be shipped on board craft of any description, whether coasting or foreign, either as stores for the equipment or navigation of the vessel, or as merchandise, except at places which are under the supervision of a Customs Officer. Such goods must be properly pre-entered before shipment, and a clearance must be obtained from the Customs Officials in accordance with the Customs War Powers Act, 1915. Sailing vessels may not have on board a

quantity of petrol, motor spirit, benzine, paraffin, petroleum, or other similar substances, exceeding 4 gallons.

II.—REGULATIONS WITH REGARD TO COMMERCIAL FISHERMEN.

The following Regulations are to be complied with by all fishing vessels and boats from Portland Bill on the east to Bardsey Island on the west (hereinafter referred to as the South-Western Area).

2. Fishing vessels authorised by fishing permits signed by the local Fishery Officer, are allowed to be at sea day and night, except as stated below.

3. The laying of nets, or of crab or any other pots, trawling, drifting, fishing with longlines or anchoring is prohibited, by day and by night except as stated in the succeeding paragraphs, within the area bounded:—

On the North: By a line joining the following points, viz.:—The Longships—the Runnelstone—a point one mile 164° (*South Mag.*) from Lizard head—a point half a mile 164° (*South Mag.*) from Black head—a point 2 miles 164° (*South Mag.*) from Dodman point—Rame head—Mewstone buoy—a point one mile 164° (*South Mag.*) from Bolt head—a point one mile 164° (*South Mag.*) from Prawle point—a point one mile 119° (*S. 45° E. Mag.*) from Start point—Skerries bell-buoy—and Berry head—and the parallel of lat. $50^{\circ} 30' N$.

On the South: By a line from Wolf rock to a position in lat. $49^{\circ} 46' N$., long. $5^{\circ} 12' W$.—thence to a position in lat. $50^{\circ} 06' N$., long. $4^{\circ} 16' W$.—thence to a position in lat. $50^{\circ} 05' N$., long. $3^{\circ} 22' W$.

On the East: By the meridian of long. $3^{\circ} 22' W$.

On the West: By a line joining the Longships and Wolf rock.

4. Between the meridians of Portland bill and Start point all fishing is prohibited at a distance of more than 5 miles from the coast, unless the fishing vessels are with one of the two organised fishing fleets working from the Port of Brixham.

Fishing vessels from other ports between Portland bill and Start point wishing to fish at a distance of more than 5 miles from the coast may be granted special permission to do so on application to the Inspector of Fisheries for the South-western Area, such vessels will then be strictly subject to the conditions laid down in paragraph 7 below.

Fishermen are warned that they are responsible that their nets do not drift into any area in which fishing or drifting nets are prohibited. Any fishing gear found in prohibited areas will be confiscated pending inquiry.

5. *Mount's Bay.*—All fishing is prohibited to the southward of a line drawn from the Runnelstone to a position 4 miles 164° (*South Mag.*) from St. Michael's Mount Tower, and thence to a position one mile 164° (*South Mag.*) from the Lizard.

6. Anchoring for the purpose of hand-lining and fishing with longlines may take place within a circular area with a radius of $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles around the Eddystone.

7. Special permission may be granted to vessels fishing out of Brixham, Plymouth, Looe, Polperro, Mevagissey, Newlyn and Mousehole, and such other fishing ports as may be hereafter determined, to engage in certain forms of fish-

ing from time to time within specified portions of the prohibited area. This permission may be obtained only from the Inspector of Fisheries for the South-Western Area, through the Port Fishery Officer of the port concerned, to whom application should be made in the first place.

It must be clearly understood that this concession will be at once withdrawn unless the terms of the permission as regards (i) locality, (ii) nature of fishing authorised, and (iii) dates and times, are strictly complied with in every respect.

When such permission is granted, one boat in each fleet is to act as picket or Commodore boat, and is to carry a copy of the orders under which the fleet is sailing; this copy to be produced for inspection whenever required by any of H.M. ships or Patrol vessels.

8. *Whitsand Bay.*—

(a) No fishing at night is to take place east of a line drawn 231° (*S. 67^{\circ}* *W. Mag.*) from Rame head, and no boat is to cross this line at a distance of less than 10 miles from the Breakwater light during the hours of official night.

(b) Except on Sundays, no night fishing is to take place within three miles of the coast between Tregantle and Portwrinkle up to the hour of 12 midnight, or such later hour as may be ordered.

9. *Bigbury Bay.*—During the herring season, drifting for herring may take place at night in Bigbury bay (inshore of prohibited area) to the eastward of the meridian of Revelstoke point.

10. By night no vessel is allowed to fish or to be within 10 miles of the entrance of any defended port, except as may be provided for in the special local regulations of such defended port. The defended ports comprise Portland, Plymouth, Falmouth, Cardiff and Barry, Swansea, and Milford Haven.

Special local regulations are also in force in Mount's bay.

11. Charts of the above areas may be inspected by fishermen at the offices of the Collectors of Fishery Statistics at Brixham, Plymouth and Newlyn.

12. *Warning — Mines.* — Fishermen are warned to give mine-sweepers a wide berth, and to exercise the greatest caution when fishing. In particular, a sharp look-out for mines should be kept when hauling gear. Extreme care is necessary in cases where torpedoes, mines, shells or bombs are found in trawl or other nets, as they may still be dangerous after being in the water a long time. (See also General Notices and General Warnings contained in the "Green Book," issued by the Marine Department, Board of Trade.)

13. The fishing permit, made out to the skipper actually in charge and for the boat in question, must at all times be carried by a fishing vessel at sea, and it must be produced on demand to any officer or other authorised person. Failure to comply with this regulation will render the offender liable to prosecution.

In the case of a new skipper taking charge of a boat, or of a skipper taking charge of a boat not specified on his permit, a new permit must be obtained, or the necessary alterations made on the old permit. No alterations to permits will be recognised unless signed and dated by the Permit Issuer.

14. Oil, motor-spirit, petrol, or other goods may not be shipped on board fishing craft of any description, either as stores for the equipment or navigation of the vessel or as merchan-

dise, except at places which are under the supervision of a Customs Officer. Such goods must be properly pre-entered before shipment, and a clearance must be obtained from the Customs Officials in accordance with the Customs War Powers Act, 1915.

Sailing vessels may not have on board a quantity of petrol, motor-spirit, benzine, paraffin, petroleum or similar substances, exceeding four gallons.

Notes.

Fishing vessels are only to include bona-fide professional fishing craft, manned by bona-fide fishermen. Doubtful cases for fishing permits are to be referred to the nearest Divisional Coast Watching Officer.

Amateurs and pleasure craft out fishing are to be regarded as coming under Section I. of this notice, and must comply with the Regulations contained therein.

Fishing vessels, having a fishing permit and desiring to carry passengers, *i.e.*, persons other than their bona-fide crew, must obtain separate permits in accordance with Section I. of this notice, and when such passengers are on board, the vessel will become strictly subject to the regulations therein laid down. In the event of non-compliance, both permits may be withdrawn by the Divisional Coast Watching Officer or Fishery Officer concerned.

Fishery Officer means an officer of the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, or of the Local Sea Fisheries Committee within whose district the fishing port in question lies, or other person duly appointed to issue fishing permits.

Permits may be withdrawn, suspended or endorsed at the discretion of the Divisional Coast Watching Officer or of a Fishery Officer.

Availability of permits.—South-Western Area fishing permits are available over the whole area, when and where fishing is permitted by these regulations, but boats moving from port to port within the area should, in order to avoid delay, notify their arrival and departure to the Local Fishery Officer or Permit Issuer.

Visiting boats from ports outside the South-Western Area must, before fishing in this area, obtain from the local Permit Issuer a South-Western Area fishing permit, either—

(a) In exchange for their former permit (re-exchanging on departure), or,

(b) By previous application through the Local Fishery Officer;

otherwise they will be detained in port until their credentials have been verified. In all cases visiting boats must give up their South-Western Area fishing permits on leaving the South-Western Area.

Charts of the restricted areas off the Devon coast can be seen by Fishermen at the Harbour Master's office, Brixham, the Fish Inspector's office, Plymouth Barbican, and the Fishery Collector's office, Newlyn Harbour.

Complaints on the part of the fishing community, and questions of doubt, should be referred in the first instance to the Local Fishery Officer, or to the Inspector of Fisheries attached to the area.

III.—PLYMOUTH.

No vessels other than those of British Nationality or those of the Allied Nations are permitted to enter the Port of Plymouth until further notice.

PART I.—ENTRANCE TO THE PORT.

Notification of Time of Arrival.

1. Shipowners and shipping agents will

facilitate the entry of their vessels by giving previous notice of the probable time of arrival to the King's Harbour Master for Plymouth, Longroom, Stonehouse (Telegraphic address: Tidal, Plymouth), with particulars of appearance, &c., so that they may be readily identified.

Instructions for Ships Approaching the Port.

2. All ships may be brought in at night as well as by day. This does not apply to fishing vessels and small craft, as they cannot be allowed to enter at night.

Endeavour will be made to bring vessels in from sea during a fog even though movements inside the port are prohibited (*see* paragraph 11). If, however, the fog is so dense as to make this dangerous, the vessel must wait in the outer examination anchorage (Cawsand bay) or at sea until it lifts sufficiently.

When once ships are anchored they are not to move under any circumstances without previously obtaining permission from the King's Harbour Master for Plymouth.

Vessels of every description, including fishing vessels and small craft, are forbidden to enter or leave the port by the eastern entrance. They may only do so by the western entrance.

The Devil's Bridge is entirely closed.

All orders and instructions given by the Examining Officers are to be implicitly obeyed, otherwise ships will be liable to be fired upon.

Distinguishing Signals of Examination Steamers.

3. The Examining Steamer will be found in the neighbourhood of Penlee point, and will *by day* be distinguished by the Examination Flag (white and red horizontal surrounded by blue border), and will fly the Blue Ensign.

By night the Examination Steamer will be distinguished by three white lights.

Signals Indicating Port Closed.

4. The following signals will be employed to indicate that the Port is closed:—

By Day.—Three red balls hoisted vertically by the Examination Steamer and at the flagstaff on Breakwater fort.

By Night.—Three red lights, six feet apart, hoisted vertically by the Examination Steamer, and at the flagstaff on Breakwater fort.

In this case the Examination Vessel will not lead ships in further than Cawsand bay, where they must anchor or remain at sea.

Vessels must on no account proceed further in than Cawsand bay unless met by the Examination Steamer and led in or given the special signal to proceed into the sound.

Ships anchored in Cawsand Bay.

5. Vessels are not to attempt to leave the anchorage under any circumstances, or to communicate with other vessels, or with the shore without previously obtaining permission from the Chief Examining Officer.

Fishing Vessels and Small Craft.

6. Fishing vessels, barges, boats, yachts, and small private vessels of any kind are only to enter the port by day and should approach the western entrance only, where the patrol boats will give them instructions as to proceeding into harbour.

If obliged to shelter at night from stress of weather or other cause, Shipowners, Masters, and Local Agents are advised to direct their vessels to proceed to a sheltered anchorage in

the vicinity, such as Salcombe, The Yealm, Looe or Fowey, until daylight.

Lights of Ships.

7. The normal condition in regard to lights of ships at anchor in the sound, Cawsand bay, Cattewater, or Hamoaze at night is that no lights whatever are to show from the outside. When, however, during dark hours, a vessel is under way, anchor lights are to be exposed until the vessel is anchored; or, in the case of ships leaving, until they are clear of the breakwater, when lights are again to be obscured. It is expected that masters of vessels and others concerned will see that this order, which is given for their own protection, is carried out; any infringement of it will entail more stringent measures being taken.

Anchor lights, bow and masthead steaming lights, and other lights, are to be as prescribed in Part 5 of Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 872 of 1918.

Pilotage.

8. Pilotage is compulsory for all vessels in the whole of the waters comprising Plymouth Sound, Hamoaze, Cattewater and Sutton pool, inside a line joining Penlee point on the west through the Shagstone to the coast on the East, as far as Laira bridge to the eastward and Saltash bridge to the westward, with the following exceptions:—

- (a) Ships belonging to His Majesty;
- (b) Pleasure yachts and sailing boats under 30 feet in length on the water line and under 10 feet draught.
- (c) Fishing vessels;
- (d) Sailing vessels trading coastwise of less than 75 tons net register;
- (e) Ships of less than 50 tons gross tonnage not carrying passengers;
- (f) Motor barges and boats habitually used exclusively within the limits of the Port of Plymouth.
- (g) Steam tug boats registered at the Port of Plymouth.

NOTE.—This order does not apply to ships changing moorings unless the shift entails going through or into the channel.

If necessary, the Examining Officer will place a licensed local Pilot on board all incoming merchant vessels, or they will be led in by one of the Examination Vessels which have licensed Pilots on board.

All vessels proceeding from the Cattewater or Sutton pool to Plymouth sound and *vice versa* are to pass between the Mallard shoal and Mount Batten breakwater.

PART II.—MOVEMENTS WITHIN THE PORT.

9. The movements of all merchant ships, fishing vessels, or boats of any kind, are subject to the direction of the King's Harbour Master, Plymouth, for the Sound, and the King's Harbour Master, Devonport, for the Hamoaze, whose orders are to be immediately obeyed.

Disobedience of such orders will render vessels liable to be fired upon.

Pilotage.

10. Pilotage is compulsory under the same conditions as stated in paragraph 8 above.

Night and During Fog.

11. During the hours of official night, or during fog, no merchant vessels (including fishing craft, barges, boats, yachts, or private vessels of any kind) will be allowed to be under way in the sound and adjacent waters, except

with special permission, which should be obtained from the King's Harbour Master for Plymouth, at Longroom, Stonehouse.

During the hours of official night no vessel, barge, or boat of any kind, will be allowed to be under way in the Hamoaze or creeks and coves adjoining, including the Lynher river and the Tamar river above Saltash as far as a line joining Skinham and Warren points, except with special permission, which should be obtained from the King's Harbour Master, for Devonport, at His Majesty's Dockyard, Devonport.

All traffic within the port is absolutely prohibited during a state of fog.

Approach to Government Vessels and Establishments.

12. No merchant vessels (including fishing craft, barges, boats, yachts, or private vessels of any kind) will be allowed to approach any Government ship, vessel, lighter, or other Government craft, or any Government Dockyard or Establishment, without special permission.

Subject to the above, merchant shipping may move as usual within the Ports of Plymouth and Devonport, taking care to keep clear of any of His Majesty's ships which are being navigated in the Ports. (See paragraph 23, Part IV. of this Section.)

Patrol of Internal Waterways and Approaches of the Port.

13. The internal waterways of the port, as well as the approaches thereto, will be patrolled by Naval patrol boats, or other Government vessels. Captains and Masters of merchant ships, and persons in charge of fishing vessels or boats of any kind, are hereby warned to observe any orders which may be given by the Naval patrols. Merchant ships, fishing vessels, and boats will be subject to inspection and search, and will be liable to be fired upon in the event of disobedience to the orders given them by the patrols.

Regulation Lights to be shown at Night.

14. All vessels, barges, or boats, that have received permission to be under way, must display the regulation lights at night. (See also paragraph 7.)

Caution as to Anchoring.

15. When anchoring, care must be taken to be well clear of the fairway.

Prohibited Areas.

16. No vessel, boat, or craft of any kind, is at any time allowed within the following areas:—

The Eastern Channel.—The area defined as follows:—On the north by the line of Torpedo range targets; on the west by the line joining Breakwater fort with Shagstone beacon; and on the south by a line joining Shagstone beacon with Reny rocks.

The Bridge.—The area defined as follows:—On the north by a line joining Ravenness point to Drake's island north-west buoy; on the east by a line joining Drake's island north-west buoy to Melampus light-buoy; and on the south by a line joining Melampus light-buoy to Fort Picklecombe pier.

Mount Batten Breakwater.—All small craft are warned they should not approach within 200 yards of Mount Batten Breakwater, it being necessary to keep this area clear for seaplanes going out and returning.

No fishing boat or sailing vessel engaged in coast trade shall be admitted into Cawsand bay during the night, or be allowed to lie at anchor there during the night. No fishing boat or sailing vessel engaged in coast trade shall approach Cawsand bay so late in the evening as to make it impossible for them to enter the Cattewater before dark.

Fishing is now permitted by night in Whitsand bay, subject to the following regulations:—

(a) No fishing at night is to take place east of a line drawn in a 231° (*S. 67^{\circ} W. Mag.*) direction from Rame head, and no boat is to cross this line at a distance of less than ten miles from the Breakwater light during the hours of official night.

(b) Except on Sundays, no night fishing is to take place within three miles of the Coast between Tregantle and Portwrinkle up to the hour of 12 midnight, or such later hour as may be ordered.

The above regulations are to be strictly complied with and any infringement of them will entail severe penalties.

Paragraph 3 of Section II. of this Notice is modified to the extent stated above as regards the defended Port of Plymouth.

No yacht, &c., or pleasure boat may proceed to the westward of a line joining the west end of West Hoe Terrace, the Asia and Melampus light-buoys, nor may they proceed more than two miles outside the breakwater.

With the above exceptions, yachts, &c., and pleasure boats, may cruise in the waters of the sound as laid down in the Public Traffic Regulations. All persons going afloat in charge of yachts or boats are to make themselves thoroughly acquainted with these orders, the Public Traffic Regulation, and the notices that have been published from time to time in the public press defining prohibited areas.

Special notice is drawn to the following points in the regulations:—

No yacht or boat may be under way after dark; there can, therefore, be no traffic after dark between yachts at their moorings and the shore.

Although it is only laid down that no craft may leave or enter by the East channel, no craft is to approach anywhere near the East channel buoys, as such action would be likely to draw the fire of the forts.

All Excursion Steamer Traffic is Prohibited in the Sound.

Note.—Yachts that are only fitting out at Plymouth, and that may wish to proceed to their Summer base harbour, must obtain permission to leave for that purpose.

A limited number of moorings for yachts may be laid in the following places and nowhere else:—

On West Hoe—on application to King's Harbour Master, Plymouth; in the Cattewater above Turnchapel—on application to the Harbour Master of Cattewater.

Hamoaze.—Within the limits in the Harbour of Devonport mentioned in paragraph (4) below, all small craft, motor boats, steam boats, pulling boats, punts, &c., are to be moored in one of the following areas, viz.:—Saltash, Pottery quay, North corner, Mutton cove, Cremyll hard, Torpoint, Stonehouse creek (or be hauled up and secured above high-water mark in an approved position), where they will remain under Police supervision, and

only be allowed out on the production of a permit. (See paragraph (4) below.)

(2) With the exception of steam or motor ferry boats which have obtained special permits, no craft of any description is to be under way during the hours of official night. Any craft under way between these times may be fired on by the Naval patrol boats or H.M. ships in harbour without notice.

(3) During fog or thick weather, no craft of any description is to be under way, with the exception of the Chain Ferry bridges at Torpoint and Saltash.

(4) All traffic is prohibited in the waters of the Harbour of Devonport within the following limits, *viz.*:—Between lines joining Skinham and Warren points in the Tamar river, and the Boom at Devil's point, including the Lynher river as far as St. Germans, Millbrook lake, and all the creeks and coves adjoining, subject to the following provisions:—

During daylight, i.e., outside the hours of official night, all craft of any description engaged by their owners in the prosecution of their business, or used by them as a means of obtaining their livelihood, may be permitted to be under way within the above limits on obtaining a permit for the purpose. These permits to be obtained for steam, motor, or other self-propelled craft from the King's Harbour Master, Devonport, and for sailing or pulling craft from the Superintendent of Dockyard Police; such permits to be produced when called for by the person in charge of any patrol boat, police boat, or boat of H.M. ships.

Persons owning craft of any description which they may wish to use for pleasure purposes will be allowed to remove the same to approved places outside the above limits.

No permits will be granted for use of pleasure craft within the limits defined.

(5) With the undermentioned exception at ** the following areas are prohibited to all craft of every description:—

Coombe bay, Kiln bay, Wilcove lake, Thanckes lake, south of Gravesend point to Pound at Torpoint, St. John's lake, Millbrook lake (inside a line from Palmer point to Little Southdown).

** With regard to Millbrook lake inside the line specified, special permits will be given to steam or motor ferry craft, for public traffic only, and for sailing and pulling craft conveying market produce or provisions and coal, at the discretion of the King's Harbour Master, Devonport.

(6) No craft of any description is to approach or is to communicate with any of H.M. establishments or ships without having permission and calling the attention of the guard before they close. Craft disobeying this order may be fired on without notice.

(7) The foregoing provisions do not apply to any of H.M. craft or boats, or to vessels in Government employ.

(8) No excursion steamers will be permitted in the Hamoaze between the boom at Devil's point and Saltash pier. Subject to special arrangements, facilities will be granted during the summer months only for excursions in the Rivers Tamar and Tavy above Saltash, permits for which must be obtained by the owners of Excursion Steamers from the King's Harbour Master, Devonport.

Special Warning to Boatmen and those who Hire Out Yachts or Boats.

Great care must be taken that yachts and boats are only hired out to persons who are

thoroughly acquainted with these regulations, as any infringement of the orders will, amongst other things, lead to the detention of the offending yacht or boat.

PART III.—VESSELS LEAVING THE PORT. Prohibition.

17. No fishing vessels, barges, boats, yachts, or private vessels of any kind, are permitted to leave the Dockyard Port of Plymouth during the hours of official night or during fog.

18. Merchant vessels (including those engaged in the coastal trade) must on no account leave the Dockyard ports of Devonport and Plymouth without permission.

Vessels in the Hamoaze must obtain such permission from the King's Harbour Master, Devonport, at his office in the Dockyard; those at berths in the waters of the sound, Cawsand bay, Cattewater, Sutton pool, or Millbay docks, must obtain permission from the King's Harbour Master, Plymouth, at Longroom, Stonehouse.

It is also necessary for ships to obtain permission from the Collector of Customs, at the Barbican, Plymouth.

Fishing Vessels and Small Craft.

19. Fishing vessels, boats, and small craft generally may leave the Port during daylight without any formalities, but such craft are liable to inspection and search by the Naval patrol boats.

Pilotage.

20. Pilotage is compulsory under the same conditions as stated in paragraph 8 of Part I. above.

PART IV.—BOOM DEFENCE.

21. A boom defence is in position across the entrance to the Hamoaze and should be approached with caution.

The gate of the boom will always be closed during the hours of official night and during fog, and may be closed during the day.

The following signals will be displayed:—
BY DAY.

When the Gate is open.—On each side of the gateway on the hulk to which the end of the gate is secured, the signals displayed by wreck-marking vessels, *viz.*:—Two black balls vertical on one yard-arm and one black ball on the opposite yard-arm. Vessels to pass on the side showing two balls.

When the Gate is closed.—On each side of the gateway of the boom a blue burgee.

This signal is also shown from Mount Wise signal station; Harbour Master's flagstaff, Longroom, Stonehouse; and South dockyard flagstaff.

BY NIGHT.

The Gate is closed and no signals will be shown.

22. _____

23. Vessels are warned to pay strict attention to Clause 9, Second Schedule of Order in Council, 14th October, 1915, Regulations for the Dockyard Ports of Plymouth and Devonport, and no merchant vessel, whether navigating with or against the tide, is to attempt to pass a man-of-war in the "Narrows" when she is flying the "O" Flag at the fore truck.

Vessels are required not to pass other vessels in the gateway of the boom, and a vessel navigating against the tide should ease her engines and wait until any other vessel going with the tide has passed clear.

The following signals are hoisted at Mount Wise, Longroom, and South dockyard signal station:—

Signal and Signification.

Ball over Red Burgee.—Large ships coming from sound to Hamoaze; all traffic outwards between Rubble bank and Melampus light-buoy is to cease while this signal is flying.

Red Burgee over Ball.—Large ships coming from Hamoaze to sound; all traffic inwards between Melampus light-buoy and Rubble bank is to cease while this signal is flying.

Ordinary Port Regulations.

24. The ordinary Regulations of the Port, except as affected by this Notice, are to be strictly adhered to.

IV. BRISTOL CHANNEL.

1. All alien vessels navigating in the waters of the Bristol channel to the northward and eastward of a line drawn from Pwll-du head to the Scarweather light-vessel and thence to Sker (Scar) point must be conducted by Pilots licensed by either the Swansea Harbour Trustees or the Port Talbot Pilotage Board.

All alien vessels navigating in the waters of the Bristol channel to the eastward of a line drawn from Breaksea point to Watchet must be conducted by Pilots licensed by either the London Trinity House, the Barry Pilotage Board, the Cardiff Pilotage Board, the Newport Pilotage Board, the Corporation of Bristol or the Gloucester Pilotage Board.

2. The passage of vessels through the channel southward of the Breaksea light-vessel is entirely prohibited. Vessels contravening this regulation are liable to be fired upon.

3. No vessel is allowed to anchor to the westward of a line drawn from Nells point to Breaksea light-vessel, except during foggy weather when inward bound.

Only vessels waiting to enter Barry harbour are permitted to anchor in Barry roads; all other shipping should anchor to the eastward of West Cardiff light-buoy.

Variation.—16° W.

Note.—This Notice is a revision of the former Notice quoted above.

Caution.

This Admiralty Notice to Mariners is issued under the provisions of the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, and failure to comply strictly with the directions contained in it will constitute an offence against those Regulations.

Any person found guilty of such an offence is liable to severe penalties both of imprisonment and fine.

Any person aiding or abetting the commission of such an offence is himself guilty of an offence against the Regulations.

Attention is also drawn to the fact that any infringement of the directions contained in this Admiralty Notice to Mariners is liable to result in the detention of the ship or vessel.

ENGLAND—EAST COAST.

Former Notice.—No. 39 of 1918; hereby cancelled.

Notice is hereby given that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and are now in force:—

(1) Southwold to Newcome Sand—Prohibited Anchorage.

Anchorage is prohibited within the following area:—

Limits:

(a) On the North.—By a line drawn from Kessingland, about 2 miles northward of Covehitheness, in a 90° (S. 76° E. Mag.) direction for a distance of 2½ miles from the shore.

(b) On the South.—By a line drawn from Walberswick Railway station, near Southwold, in a 109° (S. 57° E. Mag.) direction for a distance of 3 miles 6½ cables from the shore.

(c) On the East.—By a line drawn from the eastern extremity of limit (a) in a 181° (S. 15° W. Mag.) direction for a distance of 9 cables, thence in a 193° (S. 27° W. Mag.) direction for a distance of 3 miles 9 cables, thence in a 200° (S. 3½° W. Mag.) direction to the eastern extremity of limit (b).

(2) Lowestoft—Traffic of Neutral Vessels Prohibited.

No vessels other than those of British Nationality or those of the Allied Nations shall enter the Port of Lowestoft until further notice.

(3) Yarmouth—Traffic Regulations; Prohibited Anchorage.

I.—TRAFFIC REGULATIONS.

1. No vessels other than those of British Nationality or those of the Allied Nations shall enter Yarmouth haven until further notice.

2. No vessels, other than H.M. ships, are to move in Yarmouth roads between half an hour after sunset and half an hour before sunrise until further notice.

II.—PROHIBITED ANCHORAGE.

Limits:

(a) On the North.—By a line drawn from St. Nicholas light-vessel in a 270° (N. 76° W. Mag.) direction to the shore.

(b) On the East.—By a line drawn from St. Nicholas light-vessel in a 180° (S. 1½° W. Mag.) direction for a distance of 9½ cables.

(c) On the South.—By a line drawn from the southern extremity of limit (b) in a 270° (N. 76° W. Mag.) direction to the shore.

(d) On the West.—By the short line enclosed between limits (a) and (c).

(4) The Wash, Boston—Compulsory Pilotage at Night.

1. No vessel shall proceed through Clay Hole to Boston (or vice versa) at night without having on board a duly licensed Pilot.

2. For the purposes of this Order "Night" shall begin half an hour after sunset and shall terminate half an hour before sunrise.

(5) *River Tyne Boom Defence—Entrance Signals and Traffic Regulations.*

The following signals will be displayed to indicate that the Boom is *Open to Traffic*:—

By Day - 2 Black balls, vertical.

By Night - 2 *White* lights, vertical.

The above signals will be hoisted on board H.M.S. *Satellite* and at the following Distant Signal stations:—

(a) For Incoming Traffic.—At the light-house on the end of the North arm of the breakwater.

(b) For Outgoing Traffic.—At Ballast hill. Shipping at Dunstan and Tyne docks should ascertain by telephone from H.M.S. *Satellite* whether they can proceed down river. A telephone for this purpose is kept at the Staith Master's office, Dunstan, and at the Dock Master's office, Tyne docks.

The absence of these signals will denote that the Boom is *Closed to Traffic*.

Vessels entering or leaving the Tyne, after passing the pier heads when bound inwards, and after passing Hay Hole point when bound outwards, are to so regulate their speed that until the line of the Boom is passed they shall not come within a distance of 200 yards from their stem to the stern of the next vessel ahead proceeding in the same direction. Whilst navigating between Hay Hole point and the pier heads, no vessel should attempt to overhaul and pass ahead of another vessel proceeding in the same direction.

When crossing the line of the Boom, all vessels are to preserve a mid-channel course as far as is consistent with safe navigation. Vessels of 25 feet draught and above are to stop their engines when crossing the line of the Boom at or about the time of low water.

Incoming and outgoing vessels must not cross the line of the Boom at the same time. Vessels proceeding against the tidal stream must so regulate their speed that any vessels proceeding with the tide shall first pass the obstruction.

No vessel is to anchor in the area bounded as follows:—

(a) *On the West*.—By a line drawn from the south-west corner of Dockwray square to the east end of Salmons quay;

(b) *On the East*.—By a line drawn from Prior's Stone to the Volunteer Life Brigade house;

provided only that a vessel proceeding to the oil jetty at South Shields may let go her anchor, if necessary, within the line of moorings off the said jetty; such vessels, however, are not to anchor to the eastward of a line drawn from Lloyd's Hailing and Signal station to the Life-boat house and slip on Commissioner's wharves.

With the above exceptions, the Rules and Regulations for the Navigation of the Tyne are to be adhered to.

Variation.—14° W.

Note.—This Notice is a revision of the former Notice quoted above.

Caution.

This Admiralty Notice to Mariners is issued under the provisions of the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, and failure to comply strictly with the directions contained in it will constitute an offence against those Regulations.

Any person found guilty of such an offence is liable to severe penalties both of imprisonment and fine.

Any person aiding or abetting the commis-

sion of such an offence is himself guilty of an offence against the Regulations.

Attention is also drawn to the fact that any infringement of the directions contained in this Admiralty Notice to Mariners is liable to result in the detention of the ship or vessel.

Railway No. 2 (1 mile 2 furlongs 9 chains or thereabouts in length), commencing by a junction with the intended Railway No. 1 in the said parish of Little Sutton at a point in the field numbered 22 in that parish on the $\frac{1}{25000}$ Ordnance Map (edition of 1911), Cheshire Sheet XXXI. 2, 135 yards or thereabouts measured in a westerly direction from the south-easterly corner of the said field numbered 22, and 135 yards or thereabouts measured in a south-westerly direction from the north-easterly corner of that field, and terminating in the parish of Netherpool, in the said urban district of Ellesmere Port and Whitby, at a point in the field numbered 23 in that parish on the $\frac{1}{25000}$ Ordnance Map (edition of 1911), Cheshire Sheet XXIII. 14, 200 yards or thereabouts measured in a north-westerly direction from the easternmost corner of the said field numbered 23 and 250 yards or thereabouts measured in a south-easterly
