By the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

**W**HEREAS it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation or Order in Council made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, as amended by the Act now in recital, may, whilst a state of war exists, be varied or added to by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade:

And whereas it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation made under Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, may, whether the Proclamation was made before or after the passing of the Act now in recital, be varied or added to, whilst a state of war exists, by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade:

And whereas by a Proclamation, dated the 10th day of May, 1917, and made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, and Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, and Section 1 of the Customs (Ex-

portation Prohibition) Act, 1914, the exportation from the United Kingdom of certain articles to certain or all destinations was prohibited:

And whereas by subsequent Orders of Council the said Proclamation was amended and added to in certain particulars:

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Board of Trade to the following effect:—

That the goods mentioned in the Schedule to the Proclamation of the 10th day of May, 1917, as amended and added to by subsequent Orders of Council and marked "(C)" which are at present prohibited to be exported to all destinations in European and Asiatic Russia and in other foreign countries in Europe and on the Mediterranean, except France and French Possessions, Italy and Italian Possessions, Spain and Portugal, and to all ports in any such foreign countries, should be prohibited to be exported to all destinations in European and Asiatic Russia and in other foreign countries in Europe and on the Mediterranean, except France and French Possessions, Italy and Italian Possessions, and Portugal, and to all ports in any such foreign countries.

Now, therefore, Their Lordships, having taken the said recommendation into considera-

tion, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the same be approved.

Whereof the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs and Excise, the Director of the War Trade Department, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

REVOCATION OF LICENCE TO APPLY ON BEHALF  
OF PERSONS ON THE STATUTORY LIST, FOR  
LETTERS PATENT, TRADE MARKS AND  
DESIGNS.

To all whom it may concern:—

Whereas by a Licence dated the 13th day of April, 1917, permission was given to every person or body of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, resident, carrying on business, or being in the United Kingdom, to apply, on behalf of any person or body of persons whose name then was or should thereafter be placed on the Statutory List of persons with whom trading is forbidden by any Proclamation issued under the Trading with the Enemy (Extension of Powers) Act, 1915, for the grant or for the renewal of the grant, of any Letters Patent, or for the registration, or for the renewal of the registration, of any Trade Mark or Design, in the United Kingdom or in certain parts of His Majesty's Dominions on the said licence specified, and, for that purpose, to transact all business necessary for the purposes of the application.

And whereas it appears to me that the matters and things allowed by the said licence should no longer be permitted:

#### WELFARE OF WORKERS IN FACTORIES AND WORKSHOPS.

The Secretary of State for the Home Department hereby gives notice that, in pursuance of the powers conferred on him by Section 7 of the Police, Factories, &c. (Miscellaneous Provisions), Act, 1916, of making Orders for securing the welfare of the workers employed in factories and workshops, he proposes to make an Order to require the provision of First Aid and Ambulance arrangements for the treatment of accidents at all factories or parts of factories employing 25 or more persons which are saw mills or in which articles of wood are manufactured.

THE PITWOOD ORDER, 1918, DATED 29TH JULY, 1918, MADE BY THE BOARD OF TRADE, PURSUANT TO REGULATIONS 2F AND 2JJ OF THE DEFENCE OF THE REALM REGULATIONS.

The Board of Trade deeming it expedient to make further exercise of the powers conferred upon them by Regulations 2F and 2JJ of the Defence of the Realm Regulations hereby order as follows:—

1. For the purposes of this Order, Great Britain shall be divided into areas called Pitwood areas of supply as defined in the First Schedule hereto.

The expression "Pitwood" means pitprops, sawn props and timber in the round which is intended for use in mines.

2. On and after the 12th day of August, 1918, no person shall deliver, move or consign or cause or permit to be delivered, moved or consigned pitwood from one area of supply to another except under and in accordance with the terms of a permit granted by the Controller of Timber Supplies or by a person duly authorised on his behalf.

3. From the date of this Order no person shall buy or sell or offer to buy or sell pitwood (whether in selected sizes or otherwise) at prices exceeding those set forth in the Second Schedule hereto; provided that the Controller of Timber Supplies by notice under his hand may from time to time alter such prices, and the prices as altered shall thereafter be the maximum prices at which pitwood may be bought or sold.

4. Where pitwood is sold for delivery into another area under a permit granted in accordance with paragraph 2 hereof the maximum price at which such timber may be sold shall be the price prevailing in the area to which the pitwood is delivered.

5. Home Grown pitwood shall be sold invoiced and consigned separate and apart from Imported pitwood.

6. Where pitwood is sold by weight in any area of supply other than No. 6 the price shall

not exceed the equivalent price per 100 lineal feet based on the prices set forth in the Second Schedule hereto.

7. Infringements of this Order are summary offences against the Defence of the Realm Regulations.

8. This Order may be cited as the Pitwood Order, 1918.

THE ROAD TRANSPORT (No. 2) ORDER, 1918, DATED JULY 26TH, 1918, MADE BY THE BOARD OF TRADE UNDER REGULATION 2JJJ OF THE DEFENCE OF THE REALM REGULATIONS.

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by Regulation 2JJJ of the Defence of the Realm Regulations the Board of Trade hereby order as follows:—

1. The Road Transport Board may issue instructions as to the collection and delivery of goods by vehicles and for road transport either generally or in any particular area, and may by such instructions limit the number of deliveries or collections which any one trader or owner of such vehicles may make in any period as respects any class or classes of goods or in any particular district, and may prescribe the conditions on which any goods may be carried by road.

2. Notice shall be given of such instructions by advertisement or by such means as the Road Transport Board shall deem best calculated to bring them to the notice of the owners of road transport vehicles in the district or districts for which they are made.

3. All persons shall obey any instructions issued by the Road Transport Board under this Order.

4. The Road Transport Board may appoint Officers to be known as Divisional Road Transport Officers for such districts of the United Kingdom, subject to the approval of the Board, as they may think fit, and such Officers shall be responsible for the enforcement of any instructions issued under this Order, and may prosecute offences against this Order.

Failure to obey any instruction issued under this Order is a summary offence against the Defence of the Realm Regulations.

This Order may be cited as the Road Transport (No. 2) Order, 1918.

**DEFENCE OF THE REALM (CONSOLIDATION) ACT, 1914, AND ORDERS MADE THEREUNDER.**

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by Regulation 45F of the Defence of the Realm Regulations, and of every other power enabling them in that behalf, the Army Council hereby order as follows:—

(1) Any members of a military force of an Ally may, if authorised by the proper military authority of that Ally, arrest and hand over to that authority any other member of the naval or military force of such Ally whom he finds committing or has reason to suspect of having committed an offence for which he is amenable to the naval or military courts of the Ally.

(2) Any police constable and any officer or non-commissioned officer of His Majesty's military forces may arrest any member of a naval or military force of an Ally whom he finds committing or has reason to suspect of having committed a civil offence, if the offence is such that if such man had been a member of His Majesty's military forces he could have arrested him.

(3) Any police constable and any officer or non-commissioned officer of His Majesty's mili-

tary forces may, on the request of the proper naval or military authority of an Ally or any person authorised by him, arrest any person whom he has reason to believe to be a member of a naval or military force of that Ally, and who is alleged by such authority to be guilty of an offence for which he is amenable to the naval or military courts of that Ally.

(4) Subject to any general or special agreement, any member of a naval or military force of an Ally arrested under this order by a police constable or by an officer or non-commissioned officer of His Majesty's military forces for any offence for which he is amenable to the naval or military courts of that Ally shall, as soon as practicable, be handed over to the proper naval or military authority of that Ally, whether within or without the United Kingdom, to be dealt with according to the law of that Ally applicable to the case, and in the meantime may be kept in civil or military custody.

(5) For the purposes of this Order the expression "Ally" shall include States acting in naval or military co-operation with His Majesty in the present war; and the expressions, "members of a military force of an Ally" and "members of a naval or military force of an Ally" shall include any persons, being subjects or citizens of that Ally, who are subject to the naval, or military, law of that Ally, as the case may be.

The Agricultural Wages Board (England and Wales), duly established and constituted

under Section 5 (1) of the above Act and the Regulations made by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, dated the 8th November, 1917, having given the Notice prescribed by the said Act, and having considered all Objections duly lodged with them, and having had regard to the provisions of sub-sections (6) and (7) of the said Section, hereby give Notice, as required by sub-section 4 of the said Section and by paragraph 4 of the Agricultural Wages Regulations, 1918, that they have fixed the following minimum rates of wages and the following differential rates for overtime employment, as hereinafter defined, for male workmen of 18 years of age and over employed in agriculture for time-work in the area comprising the administrative county of Derby and the county borough of Derby, and have defined for the purpose of the application of such differential rates for overtime the employment which is to be treated as overtime employment as follows, that is to say:—

1. The wages payable for employment in summer (as hereinafter defined) of male workmen in agriculture of 18 years of age and over shall be not less than wages at the minimum rate of 31s. for 54 hours.

2. The wages payable for employment in winter (as hereinafter defined) of male workmen in agriculture of 18 years of age and over shall not be less than wages at the minimum rate of 31s. for 48 hours.

3. Provided that where a whole-time workman is employed by the week or any longer period the wages payable to him for the hours of work agreed between him and the employer in any week (excluding hours of overtime employment) shall not be less than 31s., notwithstanding that those hours are less than 54 in summer and 48 in winter.

4. The differential rate for overtime shall be as follows, viz.:—9d. per hour.

5. For the purpose of the application of the above rates the following employment is defined as overtime employment, that is to say:—

(a) All employment in excess of 54 hours in any week (excluding Sunday) in summer.

(b) All employment in excess of 48 hours in any week (excluding Sunday) in winter.

(c) All employment on a Sunday.

6. For the purpose of the above rates employment in summer shall be deemed to be employment during the period commencing on the first Monday in March and terminating on the last Sunday in October; and employment in winter shall be deemed to be employment during the rest of the year.

7. The above rates shall apply to all male workmen of 18 years of age and upwards who are wholly or partly employed in agriculture within the meaning of Section 17 (1) of the Corn Production Act, 1917, in the above-mentioned area during such time as they are so employed.

8. For the purpose of the above rates the hours of work shall not include meal times, but shall include any time during which, by reason of weather conditions, an employer has prevented from working a workman who was present at the place of employment and ready to work.

9. The above rates shall come into operation on the fifth day of August, 1918.

1. The wages payable for employment in summer (as hereinafter defined) of male workmen in agriculture of 18 years of age and over shall be not less than wages at the minimum rate of 35s. for 54 hours.

2. The wages payable for employment in winter (as hereinafter defined) of male workmen in agriculture of 18 years of age and

over shall be not less than wages at the minimum rate of 35s. for 48 hours.

3. Provided that where a whole-time workman is employed by the week or any longer period the wages payable to him for the hours of work agreed between him and the employer in any week (excluding hours of overtime employment) shall not be less than 35s., notwithstanding that those hours are less than 54 in summer or 48 in winter.

4. The differential rates of overtime shall be as follows:—

(a) In respect of overtime employment on weekdays, 10d. per hour.

(b) In respect of overtime employment on a Sunday, 1s. per hour.

5. For the purpose of the application of the above rates the following employment is defined as overtime employment, that is to say:—

(a) All employment in excess of 54 hours in any week (excluding Sunday) in summer.

(b) All employment in excess of 48 hours in any week (excluding Sunday) in winter.

(c) All employment on a Sunday.

6. For the purpose of the above rates employment in summer shall be deemed to be employment during the period commencing on the first Monday in March and terminating on the last Sunday in October; and employment in winter shall be deemed to be employment during the rest of the year.

7. The above rates shall apply to all male workmen of 18 years of age and upwards who are wholly or partly employed in agriculture within the meaning or Section 17 (1) of the Corn Production Act, 1917, in the above-mentioned area, during such time as they are so employed.

8. For the purpose of the above rates the hours of work shall not include meal times, but shall include any time during which, by reason of weather conditions, an employer has prevented from working a workman who was present at the place of employment and ready to work.

9. The above rates shall come into operation on the fifth day of August, 1918.

(b) to a cottage with regard to which the District Wages Committee or any Sub-Committee to which such power is delegated, on an application by or on behalf of the workman shall at any time

(1) certify that the cottage is defective by reason of inadequate accommodation, want of repair, or sanitation (including water supply), and is of less value than a cottage which is free from such defects; and

(2) determine the amount by which the value of the cottage occupied is less than the value of such a cottage,

and in that case the value at which the occupation of the cottage may be reckoned as payment of wages in lieu of cash shall not exceed 3s. a week less the amount so determined by the Committee and also less any rent and rates which may be paid by the occupier.

3. The expression "cottage" in this

Order shall be taken to include any garden hitherto given or leased with the cottage.

The rates of wages fixed by the Board as applicable to employment in the area comprising the administrative county of Norfolk and the county boroughs of Norwich and Great Yarmouth, as set out in the Orders of the Board dated 11th May, 1918, the 23rd July, 1918, and the 30th July, 1918, shall not apply to any workman employed in the said area wholly or mainly as a Sheep-tender or Bullock-tender during such time as he is so employed.

2. The wages payable for employment of any male workman of 18 years of age and over employed in the said area wholly or mainly as a Sheep-tender or Bullock-tender during such time as he is so employed, shall be not less than wages at the rate of 35s. for a week consisting of the hours of employment, whether on week-days or on Sunday, customary in the said area in the case of a workman so employed.

3. For the purpose of the above rates the hours of work shall not include meal times.

The Agricultural Wages Board, as required by Section 5 (4) of the above Act, will consider any objections to the above proposed Order which may be lodged with them within one month from the date of this notice. All objections should be in writing, and should be addressed to the Secretary, the Agricultural Wages Board (England and Wales), 80, Pall Mall, London, S.W. 1. The objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.
