#### ORDER.

#### RADIO-ACTIVE SUBSTANCES, LUMINOUS BODIES AND ORES.

The Minister of Munitions, in exercise of the powers conferred upon him by the Defence of the Realm Regulations, and all other powers enabling him, hereby orders and gives notice as follows:—

1. The substances, bodies and ores to which this Order applies are all radio-active substances (including actinium, radium, uranium, thorium and their disintegration products and compounds), luminous bodies in the preparation of which any radio-active substance is used, and ores from which any radio-active substance is obtainable, except uranium nitrate and except radio-active substances at the date of this Order forming an integral part of any instrument, including instruments of precision or for timekeeping.

2. As from the date hereof until further notice no person shall offer to purchase, purchase or take delivery of any substance, body or ore to which this Order applies, except under and in accordance with the terms of a licence issued on behalf of the Minister of Munitions by the Controller of Optical Munitions, or offer to sell, sell, supply or deliver any such substance, body or ore to any person other than the holder of such licence, and in accordance with the terms thereof.

3. All persons shall furnish returns to the Controller of Optical Munitions at the times and in the manner from time to time prescribed by him of all such substances, bodies and ores to which this Order applies as may for the time being be held in stock or dealt with in any manner by them.

4. This Order may be cited as the Radio-active Substances Control Order, 1918.

or supply of certain drugs to or for any

member of His Majesty's Forces except subject to certain conditions. Now the Army Council in pursuance of the said powers and all other powers them thereunto enabling hereby order as follows:—

There shall be added to the Schedule of the said Order dated the 5th day of June, 1918, the drugs Acetanilidum and Phenacetinum and any salts preparations derivatives or admixtures prepared from or with either of the above mentioned drugs.

##### THE LEATHER (SHIPMENT TO OR FROM IRELAND) AMENDMENT ORDER, 1918.

To the County Councils of the several Administrative Counties in ENGLAND and WALES :—

To the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the CITY OF LONDON, in Common Council assembled ;—

To the Councils of the several Metropolitan Boroughs, Municipal Boroughs, and other Urban Districts in ENGLAND and WALES ;—

To the Councils of the several Rural Districts in ENGLAND and WALES ;—

To THE COUNCIL of the Isles of Scilly ;—  
 And to all others whom it may concern.

Whereas by Regulation numbered 2j of the Defence of the Realm Regulations it is among other things provided that We, the Local Government Board, may, by arrangement with the Food Controller, confer and impose on any local authorities and their officers any powers and duties in connection with the enforcement of certain of the Defence of the Realm Regulations, and any powers and duties necessary to provide for the due discharge of any functions assigned to local authorities by any Order made by the Food Controller under the said Regulations ;

And whereas by the Local Authorities (Food Control) Order (No. 2), 1918 (hereinafter referred to as "the Principal Order"), made in pursuance of Regulation numbered 2j of the

Defence of the Realm Regulations, We conferred and imposed upon every Local Authority as therein defined, and upon such of their officers as they might designate or appoint for the purpose, the powers and duties necessary to provide for the due discharge within their District, in conformity with the Defence of the Realm Regulations, of the functions assigned to Local Authorities by the National Kitchens Order, 1918, made by the Food Controller;

And whereas the Food Controller has, in pursuance of the said Regulations, made an Order bearing even date herewith, amending the National Kitchens Order, 1918, so as to include County Councils within the scope of that Order in such cases as the Food Controller may approve:

Now therefore, in pursuance of Our powers in that behalf, and by arrangement with the Food Controller, We hereby Order as follows:—

ARTICLE I.—The expression "Local Authority" as defined by Article I of the Principal Order shall be extended to include the County Council of an Administrative County, the expression "District" as defined by that Article shall be extended to include, in relation to a County Council, the area subject to the jurisdiction of the County Council as the local education authority for the purposes of Part III of the Education Act, 1902, and a reference to the National Kitchens Order, 1918, as amended as aforesaid, shall be substituted in Article II of the Principal Order for the reference to the National Kitchens Order, 1918, and subject to the provisions of Article II of this Order the Principal Order shall be construed and have effect accordingly.

ARTICLE II.—Any expenses incurred by a County Council in the execution of the Principal Order as amended by this Order shall be charged and defrayed in like manner as expenses incurred by a County Council as local education authority under the Education (Provision of Meals) Acts, 1906 and 1914, are required to be charged and defrayed.

ARTICLE III.—This Order may be cited as "the Local Authorities (Food Control) Order (No. 3), 1918."

#### ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 9TH AUGUST 1918.)

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

The restrictions on movement of swine imposed by the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908 and the Norfolk (Swine-Fever) Order of 1915 shall not apply

to the movement of swine from the sale mentioned in the Schedule hereto to any premises in Great Britain not being in a swine-fever infected place, if the swine are accompanied by a licence in the Form F set forth in the First Schedule to the said Order granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the place of destination is situated and subject to the following conditions:—

(i.) The swine shall be moved to the place of destination specified in the licence and not elsewhere and shall be there detained and isolated from other swine for twenty-eight days, unless they are slaughtered on such premises before the expiration of that period, or are moved under and in accordance with the conditions of a licence in the Form C set forth in the said First Schedule to a bacon-factory or slaughter-house in the same Scheduled Area.

(ii.) The swine shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay, and during the movement shall, so far as is practicable, be kept separate from all swine not being moved with a licence under this Order.

(iii.) After completion of the movement the licence shall forthwith be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest police-station in the same District by the person in charge of the swine at the time of completing such movement.

A licence under this Order shall for the purposes of the above-mentioned Order of 1908 be treated as a licence under that Order.

#### CORN PRODUCTION ACT, 1917. AGRICULTURAL WAGES BOARD (ENGLAND AND WALES).

RATES OF WAGES FIXED FOR MALE WORKMEN IN BUCKINGHAMSHIRE TO COME INTO FORCE ON THE 19TH AUGUST, 1918.

The Agricultural Wages Board (England and Wales), duly established and constituted under Section 5 (1) of the above Act and the Regulations made by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, dated the 8th November, 1917, having given the notice prescribed by the said Act, and having considered all objections duly

lodged with them and having had regard to the provisions of sub-sections (6) and (7) of the said Section, hereby give notice, as required by Section 5 (4) of the above Act, and by paragraph 4 of the Agricultural Wages Regulations, 1918, that they have fixed the following differential rate for overtime employment, as hereinafter defined, for male workmen of 18 years of age and over employed in agriculture for time-work in the area comprising the administrative county of Buckingham, and have defined for the purpose of the application of such differential rate for overtime the employment which is to be treated as overtime employment, that is to say:

1. The differential rate for overtime shall be as follows, namely, 9d. per hour.

2. For the purpose of the application of the above differential rate for overtime the following employment is defined as overtime employment, that is to say:

A. On week-days:

(1) In summer, where on one day in each week the hours of regular employment do not exceed  $6\frac{1}{2}$  working hours—all employment on such days in excess of  $6\frac{1}{2}$  working hours and all employment on any other day in excess of  $9\frac{1}{2}$  working hours.

(2) In winter, where on one day in each week the hours of regular employment do not exceed  $5\frac{1}{2}$  working hours—all employment on such day in excess of  $5\frac{1}{2}$  working hours, and all employment on any other day in excess of  $8\frac{1}{2}$  working hours.

(3) In cases not covered by clauses (1) and (2) above:

(a) In summer all employment on any day in excess of 9 working hours.

(b) In winter all employment on any day in excess of 8 working hours.

B. On Sundays:

All employment.

5. For the purpose of the above rates the hours of work shall not include mealtimes, but shall include any time during which by reason of weather conditions an employer has prevented from working a workman who was present at the place of employment and ready to work.

6. For the purpose of the application of the above rates the expression "confined man" shall mean a workman who is under contract of service other than by the week.

#### PROPOSAL TO FIX MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR ANGLESEY AND CARNARVON.

The Agricultural Wages Board (England and Wales), duly established and constituted under Section 5 (1) of the above Act and the Regulations made by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, dated the 8th November, 1917, having had regard to the provisions of sub-sections (6) and (7) of the said Section, hereby give Notice, as required by sub-section (4) of the said Section, and by paragraph 4 of the Agricultural Wages Regulations, 1918, that they propose to fix the following minimum rates of wages and the following differential rates for overtime employment, as hereinafter defined, for male workmen employed in agriculture for time-work in the area comprising the administrative counties of Carnarvon (except the parish of Llysfaen) and Anglesey, and to define for the purpose of the application of such differential rates for overtime the employment which is to be treated as overtime employment as follows, that is to say:—

1. The wages payable for employment of any male workman of 18 years of age and over employed wholly or mainly as a horseman, cowman, shepherd or hwsmon (bailiff)



shall be not less than wages at the rate of 36s. for 63 hours.

2. The wages payable for employment of all other male workmen in agriculture shall be not less than wages at the minimum rates set forth in the following table for 56 hours in summer and 51 hours in winter, viz. :—

Age.	Minimum rate.
18 and over ... ..	31 6
17 and under 18 ... ..	26 0
16 and under 17 ... ..	22 0
15 and under 16 ... ..	18 0
14 and under 15 ... ..	14 0
Under 14 ... ..	12 0

3. Provided that where a whole-time workman is employed by the week or any longer period the wages payable to him for the hours of work agreed between him and the employer in any week (excluding hours of overtime employment) shall be not less than the respective amounts set out in Clauses 1 and 2 above, notwithstanding that those hours are less than—

(a) 63 in the case of any workman of 18 years of age and over employed wholly or mainly as a horseman, cowman, shepherd or hwsmon (bailiff); or

(b) 56 in summer or 51 in winter in the case of any other male workman employed in agriculture.

4. The differential rates for overtime employment shall be as set forth in the following table, viz. :—

5. Provided that in the case of a male workman of under 18 years of age the minimum rates and overtime rates shall, during the first two months of his employment in agriculture, be 20 per cent. less than the rates which, but for this provision, would be applicable to him under the provisions of the preceding clauses of this Order.

6. For the purpose of the above rates the following employment is defined as overtime employment, that is to say :—

(a) In respect of a workman of 18 years of age or over employed wholly or mainly as a horseman, cowman, shepherd or hwsmon (bailiff);

(1) All employment in excess of 63 hours in any week (including Sunday).

(b) In respect of other workmen :

(1) All employment in excess of 56 hours in any week (excluding Sunday) in summer.

(2) All employment in excess of 51 hours in any week (excluding Sunday) in winter.

(3) All employment on a Sunday.

7. For the purpose of the above rates employment in summer shall be deemed to be employment during the period commencing on the first Monday in March and terminating on the last Sunday in October; and employment in winter shall be deemed to be employment during the rest of the year.

8. The above rates shall apply (according to the terms above set forth) to all male workmen who are wholly or partly employed in agriculture within the meaning of Section 17 (1) of the Corn Production Act, 1917, in the above-mentioned area during such time as they are so employed.

9. For the purpose of the above rates the hours of work shall not include meal times, but shall include any time during which, by reason of weather conditions, an employer has prevented from working a workman who was present at the place of employment and ready to work.

10. The Board further propose three months after the general cessation of hostilities or on the withdrawal by the Food Controller of all restrictions upon food consumption (whichever event shall first occur) to proceed to give notice of a proposal under the above-mentioned Regulations that employment in excess of 6½ hours on one day in each week (other than a Sunday) shall be defined as employment to which differential rates for overtime shall apply.

The Agricultural Wages Board, as required by Section 5 (4) of the above Act and by paragraph 4 of the above-mentioned Regulations, will consider any objections to the above rates and definition of overtime employment which may be lodged with them within one month from the date of this notice. The objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.
