At the Council Chamber, *Whitehall*, the 27th day of *August*, 1918.

By the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

WHEREAS it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation or Order in Council made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, as amended by the Act now in recital, may, whilst a state of war exists, be varied or added to by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade:

And whereas it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation made under Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, may, whether the proclamation was made before or after the passing of the Act now in recital, be varied or added to, whilst a state of war exists, by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade:

And whereas by a Proclamation, dated the 10th day of May, 1917, and made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue

Act, 1879, and Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, and Section 1 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, the exportation from the United Kingdom of certain articles to certain or all destinations was prohibited:

And whereas by subsequent Orders of Council the said Proclamation was amended and added to in certain particulars:

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Board of Trade to the following effect:—

That the Proclamation, dated the 10th day of May, 1917, as amended and added to by subsequent Orders of Council, should be further amended by making the following additions to the Schedule to the same:—

That the following headings should be added:—

Notes of the Bank of France to all destinations except to destinations in France.

Notes of the United States Government and United States Bank Notes to all destinations except to destinations in the United States.

Now, therefore, Their Lordships, having taken the said recommendation into considera-

tion, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the same be approved.

Whereof the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs and Excise, the Director of the War Trade Department, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

The KING has been pleased to award the Albert Medal in each of the following cases in recognition of gallantry displayed in saving life in France:—

Second Lieutenant (temporary Captain) William Neilson, 7th Battalion, Scottish Rifles, attached 10th Battalion, King's Royal Rifle Corps.

On the 24th February, 1917, Captain Neilson was superintending men of his company at grenade-throwing at a Brigade Grenade School in France. A man threw a grenade from a trench while Captain Neilson was standing out of the trench behind him. The man slipped in the mud, and the grenade fell in the trench, in which several other men were standing. Captain Neilson jumped down, picked up the grenade out of the mud, and threw it over the parapet. The grenade exploded just after leaving his hand, and wounded him slightly in several places. By his promptitude and courage he undoubtedly saved his men from injury.

Captain Neilson died of wounds in November, 1917.

Second Lieutenant Guy Maddison Vaisey, 3rd Battalion (attached 10th Battalion), Gloucestershire Regiment.

On the 6th April, 1917, during bomb-throwing practice at a Divisional Bomb School in France, one of the men under instruction, having extracted the pin from a Mills grenade, allowed the grenade to slip out of his hand. Lieutenant Vaisey, seeing what had happened, dashed round a traverse in the trench from which the practice was being conducted, picked up the grenade, and threw it clear of the trench; it exploded almost immediately.

The action was performed at great personal risk, as the thrower was in his way and was dazed with fright. Lieutenant Vaisey by his

courage and prompt action undoubtedly prevented a fatal accident.

Lieutenant Vaisey died of wounds in April last.

The KING has been graciously pleased to make a posthumous award of the Decoration of the Albert Medal in recognition of the gallantry of Reginald Curtis Clayton, an apprentice in the Mercantile Marine.

In March last the steamship in which Mr. Clayton was serving was in collision, and a serious fire broke out on board. Mr. Clayton was aft, where the accommodation for the crew was situated. It was his fire-station duty to stand by the flood valve of the magazine; and, in spite of the whole of the deck being in flames, he groped his way through the fire, found the valve, and turned it on to "flood." He received such severe injuries that he succumbed in hospital four days later.

Those of the crew who survived no doubt owed their lives to the flooding of the magazine.

The KING has been graciously pleased to make a posthumous award of the Decoration of the Albert Medal in recognition of the gallant conduct of Mr. Robert Coulson, a second engineer in the Mercantile Marine.

The steamship in which Mr. Coulson was serving was struck by a torpedo in the stokehold. The engine-room became full of escaping steam, and Mr. Coulson and the fourth engineer were seriously scalded. Instead of making for safety, however, Mr. Coulson, in spite of his injuries, carried the fourth engineer, who was in a helpless condition, up the engine-room ladders to the top platform, out of immediate danger of steam and the inrush of water, and he then himself became exhausted.

The chief engineer, who had run to the engine-room from the bridge, assisted both the injured men out of the engine-room, and with help managed to get them into a lifeboat. After being landed they were taken to hospital, where both succumbed to their injuries.

ARMY COUNCIL ORDER.

DEFENCE OF THE REALM
REGULATIONS.REGULATION OF THE SALE OF HAY AND OAT
STRAW AND WHEAT STRAW IN IRELAND.

In pursuance of the powers conferred on them by the Defence of the Realm Regulations and all other powers enabling them the Army Council do hereby order:—

That on any sale of Hay, Oat Straw or Wheat Straw in Ireland the price shall not exceed such prices as are set out in the Schedules hereunder:—

SCHEDULE I.—Applicable to War Department Purchases only.

The following are the maximum prices which a Grower or Producer of hay may not exceed for hay or straw in the stack, and such prices shall in every case include the cost of carting to the nearest railway station or a distance equivalent thereto.

The first and second year ryegrass and seed mixtures, £8 per ton.

Oat straw, £3 15s. per ton.

Wheat straw, £3 per ton.

The above prices are for best quality only; inferior hay or straw will be graded according to quality.

To the above prices may be added interest at the rate of 10 per cent. per annum calculated from first of January, 1919, to date of completion of lifting.

SCHEDULE II.—Applicable to other than
War Department Purchases.

The following are the maximum prices of quantities exceeding 5 cwt., and are deemed to

include commission and all costs and charges incurred of whatever nature for hay and straw delivered to Consumer's or Purchaser's premises:—

First and second year ryegrass and seed mixtures, £8 per ton.

Hay of any description other than the above, £7 per ton.

Threshed hay, or hay certified by or on behalf of the Army Council as being of inferior quality, £6 per ton.

Oat straw, £4 15s. per ton.

Wheat straw, £4 per ton

SCHEDULE III.—Applicable to other than War Department Purchases.

The following are the maximum prices per stone of 14 lbs., for quantities not exceeding 5 cwt., and are deemed to include commission and all costs and charges incurred of whatever nature for hay and straw delivered to the Consumer's or Purchaser's premises:—

First and second year ryegrass and seed mixtures, 1s. 2d. per stone.

Hay of any description other than the above, 1s. 0½d. per stone.

Threshed hay, or hay certified by or on behalf of the Army Council as of inferior quality, 11d. per stone.

Oat straw, 9d. per stone.

Wheat straw, 8d. per stone.

In addition to the prices set out in Schedules II and III hereof interest may be added at the rate of 10 per cent. per annum calculated from 1st January, 1919, to date of sale.

N.B.—The prices set out in Schedules II and III hereof are subject to such alteration that may at any time be made by the Area Administrative Officer on behalf of the Army Council; the rate of interest shall not be liable to variation.

The Army Council Orders of the 17th July, 1917, and the 8th May, 1918, regulating the sale of hay and oat and wheat straw in Great Britain and Ireland and the Isle of Man are hereby cancelled so far as they relate to Ireland.

THE CLOTHING (RETURNS) ORDER.

2. Any particulars furnished under this Order shall be verified by the signature of a partner, or in the case of a Limited Company by the signatures of a Director and the Secretary.

3. Any person failing to comply with any provision of this Order or with any requirement or direction made or given hereunder shall be guilty of an offence against the said Regulations.

4. This Order may be cited as The Clothing (Returns) Order.

Provided that in the case of a male workman of under 18 years of age the minimum rates and overtime rates shall during the first two months of his employment in agriculture be 20 per cent. less than the rates which but for this provision would be applicable to him under the provisions of the preceding clauses of this Order.

6. For the purpose of the above rates the following employment is defined as overtime employment, that is to say:—

(a) All employment in summer in excess of 54 hours in any week (excluding Sunday).

(b) All employment in winter in excess of 48 hours in any week (excluding Sunday).

(c) All employment on a Sunday.

7. For the purpose of the above rates employment in summer shall be deemed to be employment during the period commencing on the first Monday in March and terminating on the last Sunday in October; and employment in winter shall be deemed to be employment during the rest of the year.

8. The above rates shall apply to all male workmen who are wholly or partly employed in agriculture within the meaning of Section 17 (1) of the Corn Production Act, 1917, in the above-mentioned area during such time as they are so employed.

9. For the purpose of the above rates the hours of work shall not include meal times, but shall include any time during which by reason of weather conditions an employer has prevented from working a workman who was present at the place of employment and ready to work.

10. The above rates shall come into operation on the second day of September, 1918.

**MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FIXED FOR MALE
WORKMEN IN YORKSHIRE TO COME INTO
FORCE ON THE 2ND SEPTEMBER, 1918.**

The Agricultural Wages Board (England and Wales), duly established and constituted under Section 5 (1) of the above Act and the Regulations made by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries dated the 8th November, 1917, having given the Notice prescribed by the said Act, and having considered all the objections duly lodged with them and having had regard to the provisions of sub-sections (6) and (7) of the said Section, hereby give Notice, as required by sub-section (4) of the said Section and by paragraph 4 of the Agricultural Wages Regulations, 1918, that they have fixed the following minimum rates of wages and the following differential rates for overtime employment, as hereinafter defined, for male workmen employed in agriculture for time-work in the area comprising the administrative counties of the East Riding, the North Riding, and the West Riding of Yorkshire, and the county boroughs of Kingston-upon-Hull, Middlesbrough, Barnsley, Bradford, Dewsbury, Halifax, Huddersfield, Leeds, Rotherham, Sheffield, Wakefield, and York, and have defined for the purpose of the application of such differential rates for overtime the employment which is to be treated as overtime employment as follows, that is to say:—

1. The wages payable for employment in summer (as hereinafter defined) of male workmen in agriculture shall be not less than wages at the following minimum rates, that is to say:—

For male workmen of 18 years of age and over, 35s. for 54 hours.

For male workmen of 17 and under 18 years of age, 30s. for 54 hours.

For male workmen of 16 and under 17 years of age, 25s. for 54 hours.

For male workmen of 15 and under 16 years of age, 20s. for 54 hours.

For male workmen of 14 and under 15 years of age, 15s. for 54 hours.

For male workmen under 14 years of age, 10s. for 54 hours.

2. The wages payable for employment in winter (as hereinafter defined) of male workmen in agriculture shall be not less than wages at the following minimum rates, that is to say:—

For male workmen of 18 years of age and over, 35s. for 51 hours.

For male workmen of 17 and under 18 years of age, 30s. for 51 hours.

For male workmen of 16 and under 17 years of age, 25s. for 51 hours.

For male workmen of 15 and under 16 years of age, 20s. for 51 hours.

For male workmen of 14 and under 15 years of age, 15s. for 51 hours.

For male workmen under 14 years of age, 10s. for 51 hours.

3. Provided that where a whole-time workman is employed by the week or any longer period the wages payable to him for the hours of work agreed between him and the employer in any week (excluding hours of overtime employment) shall not be less than

the respective amounts set out in Clauses 1 and 2 above, notwithstanding that those hours are less than 54 in summer or 51 in winter.

4. The differential rates for overtime employment shall be as follows:—

A. In respect of overtime employment on week-days:—

For male workmen of 18 years of age and over, 9½d. per hour.

For male workmen of 17 and under 18 years of age, 8½d. per hour.

For male workmen of 16 and under 17 years of age, 7d. per hour.

For male workmen of 15 and under 16 years of age, 5½d. per hour.

For male workmen of 14 and under 15 years of age, 4d. per hour.

For male workmen under 14 years of age, 3½d. per hour.

B. In respect of overtime employment on a Sunday:—

For male workmen of 18 years of age and over, 11½d. per hour.

For male workmen of 17 and under 18 years of age, 10d. per hour.

For male workmen of 16 and under 17 years of age, 8½d. per hour.

For male workmen of 15 and under 16 years of age, 6½d. per hour.

For male workmen of 14 and under 15 years of age, 5d. per hour.

For male workmen under 14 years of age, 3½d. per hour.

5. Provided that in the case of a male workman of under 18 years of age the minimum rates and overtime rates shall during the first two months of his employment in agriculture be 20 per cent. less than the rates which but for this provision would be applicable to him under the provisions of the preceding clauses of this Order.

6. For the purpose of the above rates the following employment is defined as overtime employment, that is to say:—

(a) All employment in summer in excess of 54 hours in any week (excluding Sunday).

(b) All employment in winter in excess of 51 hours in any week (excluding Sunday).

(c) All employment on a Sunday.

7. For the purpose of the above rates employment in summer shall be deemed to be employment during the period commencing on the first Monday in March and terminating on the last Sunday in October; and employment in winter shall be deemed to be employment during the rest of the year.

8. The above rates shall apply to all male workmen who are wholly or partly employed in agriculture within the meaning of Section 17 (1) of the Corn Production Act, 1917, in the above-mentioned area during such time as they are so employed.

9. For the purpose of the above rates the hours of work shall not include meal times, but shall include any time during which by reason of weather conditions an employer has prevented from working a workman who was present at the place of employment and ready to work.

10. The above rates shall come into operation on the second day of September, 1918.

ENGLAND, SOUTH COAST.

Former Notice.—No. 828 of 1918; hereby cancelled.

Notice is hereby given that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty and are now in force:—

(1) *Beachy Head to St. Albans Head—Traffic Regulations.*

I. REGULATIONS REGARDING TRADING, FISHING AND PLEASURE CRAFT.

1. The areas on the South Coast of England to which the following orders apply are:—

Area A.—Enclosed by a line from Beachy head to Owers light-vessel to Boulder bank buoy, then in a 315° (*N. 30° W. Mag.*) direction to the Portsmouth Defence area.

Area B.—Enclosed by a line from Culver Cliff to a point 3 miles, 90° (*S. 75° E. Mag.*), from Culver cliff, thence within the 3-mile limit to a point 3 miles, 180° (*S. 15° W. Mag.*), from Freshwater Gate, thence to Freshwater Gate.

Area C.—Enclosed by a line joining Chewton Bunny to Christchurch ledge buoy, thence to a point 3 miles, 180° (*S. 15° W. Mag.*), from Anvil point, thence to a point 3 miles, 180° (*S. 15° W. Mag.*), from St. Albans head, thence to St. Albans head.

2. The term craft as used herein includes ships, barges, boats and vessels of all descriptions, and the orders apply to all fishing and pleasure craft.

3. No craft are to go out in the specified areas between sunset and sunrise.

4. All craft from places within these areas are to be on shore or back in their harbour half an hour after sunset.

5. No craft are to put to sea during fog or thick weather, and any caught at sea by fog, &c., are to return to shore or harbour at once, if possible.

6. Craft unable to return to harbour owing to failing wind or fog, &c., are to anchor and show the regulation anchor lights at night. No bright lights are permitted. Fishing craft anchoring off Brighton or Hove are to anchor between the piers.

7. Craft found after dark in the areas detailed in paragraph 1 are liable to be fired upon.

8. Fishing is permitted during daylight hours in areas A, B and C except within the limits stated in paragraph 9, by all *bond fide* fishermen, provided they are in possession of a permit which can be obtained from the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, through their District Fishery Officers or the Coastguard. When applying for these permits, fishermen are to state the port from which they intend to work, and this will be entered on the permit. Permits for areas A, B and C are only issued to craft registered locally. Under no circumstances are fishermen allowed to carry passengers in their boats.

Permits will not be issued for vessels transferred from ports of registry outside areas A, B and C to ports of registry inside those areas, except in special cases approved by Commander-in-Chief, Portsmouth.

9. No small craft may anchor or be under way in the area bounded as follows:—

(a) *On the North.*—By the coastline between Seaford head and Crowlink Coastguard Station.

(b) *On the West.*—By a line drawn from Seaford head in a 158° (*S. 7° E. Mag.*) direction for a distance of $1\frac{8}{10}$ miles.

(c) *On the East.*—By a line drawn from Crowlink Coastguard Station in a 197° (*S. 32° W. Mag.*) direction for a distance of $1\frac{3}{10}$ miles.

(d) *On the South.*—By a line joining the southern extremities of limits (b) and (c).

10. All unregistered fishing craft must carry their permit number painted on each bow in figures not less than 12 inches in height. Vessels registered as British sea fishing boats are to comply with the statutory rules as regards lettering and numbering.

11. Night fishing is permitted by special permit in a portion of area A by craft for which a Board of Agriculture and Fisheries permit has been issued. Applications for these special permits to be made to Captain A. B. Purvis, D.C.W.O., Worthing, through Mr. Edward Page, Chief Fishery Officer, 61, Tamworth Road, Hove.

12. Fishing is absolutely prohibited for all steam, oil, or petrol-driven fishing vessels of over 50-ft. keel length.

13. The following orders regarding oil of all kinds and petrol are to be complied with:—

(a) Oil, motor spirit, petrol, or other goods may not be shipped on board craft of any description, whether coasting or foreign, either as stores for the equipment or navigation of the vessel or as merchandise, except at places which are under the supervision of a Customs Officer. Such goods must be properly pre-entered before shipment, and a clearance must be obtained from the Customs Officials in accordance with the Customs War Powers Act, 1915, pars. 1 to 3.

(b) In places where there are no Customs Officials, oil or petrol-driven craft cruising in pleasure areas, and oil or petrol-driven fishing craft of 50-ft. keel length and under, may

obtain their stores locally provided the Coast-Watching Officer as representing the Customs Officials is previously notified and a Stock Book giving particulars of quantities received and used is kept on board and open for inspection.

(c) Sailing vessels may not have on board a quantity of petrol, motor spirit, benzine, paraffin, petroleum or similar substances exceeding four gallons.

14. Owners of motor craft, pleasure craft, and small craft of all descriptions are to supply to the Coastguard Officer of the district lists of all their boats and vessels which they may place afloat, and they are to obtain from him permits for them. Without such permits these craft are not to be used. The number of the permit is to be painted on each bow in figures not less than 12 inches in height.

15. Motor craft, pleasure craft, and small craft of all descriptions are not to proceed outside of their ports, creeks or rivers, during the hours of official day, unless in possession of a permit which may be obtained from a Customs Official on personal application, or (in places where there is no Customs Official) from the Coastguard Officer of that district.

16. The areas within which pleasure craft with permits may move during daylight are as follows, and, except as provided for in paragraph 17, they are forbidden to move in any other areas:—

Seaford: Within three-quarters of a mile radius from Old Battery, Blatchington.

Newhaven: Within one mile radius from the end of the western breakwater.

Rottingdean: Within one mile radius of the slipway.

Brighton: Within one mile radius from eastern pier.

Hove: Within one mile radius from Coastguard station.

Shoreham: Within one mile radius from the end of western pier.

Worthing: Within one mile radius from the end of town pier.

East Preston: Within one mile radius of Coastguard boathouse.

Littlehampton: Within one mile radius from the end of western pier.

Bognor: Within one mile radius of green fishing light.

Pagham: Within one mile radius from the coast watching hut.

Selsea: Within one mile radius from Coastguard station.

Sandown Bay.—Inside the line joining Culver cliff and Dunnose head.

Ventnor: Within one mile of Ventnor pier.

Christchurch: Inside line joining Chewton Bunny to Christchurch ledge buoy, and thence to Christchurch head.

Christchurch head to Sandbanks: Within 500 yards of low water mark.

Note.—Boating off Bournemouth is permitted inside a line joining the Martello tower near Sugar Loaf chine and Southborne provided the boats are supervised and inspected by the Piermaster and Beach Inspectors in conjunction with the Coast-Watching Officer.

Poole harbour: Within line joining North and South havens.

Studland Bay: From opposite Studland

village to the old breakwater within 400 yards of low water mark.

Swanage bay: To the west of line joining Ballard and Peverill points.

17. At certain ports and places where pleasure cruising is permitted in areas A and C a strictly limited number of permits will be issued to amateur fishermen, who are residents and British born, to fish during daylight only in an extension of the pleasure cruising area. The conditions and regulations under which these permits are issued are printed on the permits and are to be strictly complied with. This relaxation of the rules has been made with the sole purpose of increasing the food supply.

Applications for these permits should be made:—

By residents of Newhaven to the Senior Naval Officer, Newhaven.

By residents of other places and ports in area A to Captain A. B. Purvis, R.N. Divisional Coast-Watching Officer, Lorne House, Broadwater Road, Worthing.

By residents of ports and places in area C to Captain A. L. K. Knapperton, R.N., Divisional Coast-Watching Officer, Rope Hill, Lympington.

18. Pleasure permits will be issued at the discretion of the Customs Official and Coastguard Officer subject to the following conditions:—

(a) No person shall receive a pleasure permit in respect of any craft for which he has been granted a Board of Agriculture and Fisheries fishing permit.

(b) Subject to par. (a), pleasure permits may be granted to private owners and to owners of craft for hire, on the strict understanding that no professional fisherman or boatman between the ages of 18 and 60 be employed either on shore or at sea in connection with such craft. Any infringement of this rule will lead to the immediate withdrawal of the permit.

(c) All persons who receive pleasure permits will be expected to do their utmost to increase the food supply by catching fish; but this does not give them authority to go outside the limits of the pleasure area.

(d) The pleasure permit is always to be carried by the person in charge of the craft when the craft is in use, and the owner of the craft is responsible that those using the craft understand the orders relating to pleasure cruising.

19. Trawling and other forms of bottom fishing with nets are prohibited within the following areas:—

(a) Within one mile radius of a position $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles, 154° (S. 11° E. Mag.), from Newhaven breakwater.

(b) Within one mile radius of a position $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles, 171° (S. 6° W. Mag.), from West pier, Brighton.

20. *Shipping of Amateurs as Crew on Commercial Fishing Vessels.*—Where it is proved that there is a shortage of *bonâ fide* fishermen to form the crews of fishing craft provided with Board of Agriculture and Fisheries fishing permits, permission may be granted to a limited number of approved amateur fishermen or yachtsmen enabling them to ship as crew on such craft. In cases where this is required application is to be made to the District Inspector of the Board of Agriculture and

Fisheries (Mr. E. S. Russell, Warblington Cottage, Havant).

21. No excursion traffic is allowed except with the written permission of the Commander-in-Chief, to be obtained for the season in regard to standing excursions, and on each occasion of special excursions.

22. No boat (except such boats as may be authorised by the Senior Naval Officer, Littlehampton), by whatever means propelled, shall be under way in Littlehampton Harbour between Runcorn Piles and the outer end of the Western breakwater between 2 hours before and 1 hour after high water. During these hours a red flag will be kept hoisted at the swing bridge and also at the flagstaff of the Littlehampton Motor Club.

23. Nothing in these orders shall affect the standing orders relating to the Defence Areas at Portsmouth, Newhaven, and Poole.

II. NEWHAVEN AND APPROACH— CAUTION WITH REGARD TO EX- TINCTION OF LIGHTS; TRAFFIC REGULATIONS; AREA WITHIN WHICH ANCHORING AND TRAW- LING IS PROHIBITED.

CAUTION WITH REGARD TO EXTINGUISHING OF LIGHTS.

Notice is hereby given that the following lights within the port are liable to be extinguished without further notice being issued:—

1. Light at South end of West pier.
2. Light at North end of West pier.
3. Light at end of Sea wall.
4. Red Leading Light on Packet wharf.

REGULATIONS FOR THE INTERNAL TRAFFIC OF THE PORT OF NEWHAVEN.

The port is now closed. Entry into the Port of Newhaven is prohibited to all merchant ships other than those on Government Service, and those which may have previously obtained special permission to enter from the Senior Naval Officer at Newhaven.

Until further notice, the following regulations are to be observed by all merchant shipping (including barges, boats and private vessels), moving within the limits of the Commercial Port of Newhaven.

Entrance into Port.

1. Shipowners and local agents are warned that their vessels should be directed to arrive at, and leave, the port as a general rule by daylight, and to conform to the following regulations.

2. Shipowners and local agents will facilitate the entry of their vessels by giving previous notice of probable time of arrival to the Senior Naval Officer, Newhaven (Telegraphic address:—Divisional Transports, Newhaven), with particulars of appearance, &c., so that they may be readily identified.

3. A vessel wishing to enter the port is to proceed to the Examination Anchorage marked on Admiralty Charts Nos. 2154 and 1652, and there anchor, unless previously met by the Examination Steamer. Instructions will be given to the Master by the Examining Officer as to entering.

4. The Examination Anchorage is westward of the breakwater. It is a square area, of which the sides are 888 yards long, the northern one being drawn in the direction 255° (*West Mag.*) from a point situated 255° (*West Mag.*)

and 800 yards from the Breakwater Light-house. (See Admiralty Charts Nos. 1652 and 2154.)

5. The Examination Steamer will be found at the seaward end of the entrance channel.

6. The Examination Steamer will be distinguished by the following means:—

By Day.—A white ensign, and at the foremast head a special pilot flag (white and red, horizontal, surrounded by a blue border). When the port is closed the Examination Steamer will, in addition, hoist three red balls, and three red balls will be similarly hoisted at the flagstaff at the West pier.

By Night.—Three lights vertically, six feet apart, conspicuously displayed at the end of the yard, so as to show an unbroken light round the horizon. When the port is closed, these lights will be red; when it is open, they will be white.

NOTE.—These lights are in addition to the ordinary navigation lights, and they will also be hoisted at the flagstaff at the West pier.

Leaving Port.

7. No vessel is to attempt to leave the port without having first received permission from the Senior Naval Officer.

Pilots.

8. At the discretion of the Chief Examining Officer small coasters and fishing vessels, whose masters are British subjects, or those transports whose masters are in possession of a pilotage certificate for the port, will be allowed to enter or leave the port without a pilot.

9. Subject to the above exemptions, pilotage is compulsory, and all merchant vessels must have a licensed local pilot on board before leaving or attempting to enter.

Traffic by Day.

10. The movements of all vessels, barges, or boats of any kind are subject to the direction of the Senior Naval Officer, whose orders are to be obeyed immediately.

11. Subject to the above, merchant shipping may move as usual within the port of Newhaven, taking care to keep clear of any H.M. ships which are being navigated in the port.

Traffic by Night.

12. All vessels, barges, and boats must display the regulation lights.

13. When anchoring care must be taken to be well clear of the fairway.

Approach to Government Vessels and Establishments.

14. No vessels or boats will be allowed to approach any Government ship, vessel, or lighter, or other Government craft, or any Government establishment, without special permission.

Warning.

15. Vessels disobeying these Regulations will be liable to be fired on.

AREA WITHIN WHICH ANCHORING AND TRAWLING IS PROHIBITED.

All vessels are prohibited from anchoring or trawling, or any other forms of bottom fishing with nets, in an area formed by lines joining the following positions:—

- (a) Birling gap.
- (b) Lat. 50° 38' 00" N., long. 0° 09' 00" E.
- (c) Lat. 50° 39' 00" N., long. 0° 02' 00" W.

(d) Lat. 50° 43' 00" N., long. 0° 02' 00" W.

(e) Seaford head.

See also paragraph 19 (a) of Part I. of this Notice.

III. SPITHEAD APPROACH—RESTRICTION OF TRAFFIC; PROHIBITED ANCHORAGE.

1. Passage of vessels between Noman's fort and the charted position of Warner light-vessel is entirely prohibited.

2. Vessels of all descriptions are prohibited from anchoring in St. Helen's roads to the westward of a line drawn in a 162° (S. 3° Mag.) direction from Noman's fort.

IV. POOLE BAY AND SOLENT APPROACH — RESTRICTION OF TRAFFIC.

No craft of any description, other than craft employed on Admiralty work, is to be under way to the northward of a line joining St. Catherine's point and Anvil point, between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise, or during fog.

(2) Portland Harbour Approach—Restriction of Traffic.

No vessels or boats of any description are to move in the area north of a line joining Portland bill with St. Albans head, by day or night, unless proceeding into Weymouth anchorage.

Variation.—15° W.

Note.

This Notice is a revision of the former Notice quoted above.

Caution.

This Admiralty Notice to Mariners is issued under the provisions of the Defence of the Realm Regulations, and failure to comply strictly with the directions contained in it will constitute an offence against those Regulations.

Any person found guilty of such an offence is liable to severe penalties both of imprisonment and fine.

Any person aiding or abetting the commission of such an offence is himself guilty of an offence against the Regulations.

Attention is also drawn to the fact that any infringement of the directions contained in this Admiralty Notice to Mariners is liable to result in the detention of the ship or vessel.
