1. The wages payable for employment in agriculture in the several areas shortly described in column 1 of Table I., hereinafter set forth and more fully described in the Schedule to this Notice, of male workmen of the respective ages mentioned in column 3 of the said Table shall be not less than wages at the respective minimum rates mentioned in the said column 3 for the number of hours of employment specified in column 2 of the said Table, and the differential rates for overtime employment in the case of the said workmen, respectively, shall be the rates per hour mentioned in column 2 of Table II. hereinafter set forth.

2. Provided that where a whole-time workman to whom this Notice applies is employed by the week or any longer period the wages payable to him for the hours of work agreed between him and the employer in any week (excluding hours of overtime employment) shall not be less than the amount set out in column 3 of the foregoing Table I. and applicable to him notwithstanding that those hours of work are less than the hours mentioned in column 2 of the said Table.

3. Provided also that in the case of a workman to whom this Order applies the minimum rates and overtime rates shall, during the first two months of his employment in agriculture, be 20 per cent. less than the rates which but for this provision would be applicable to him under the preceding clauses of this Notice.

4. For the purposes of the above rates the following employment is defined as overtime employment, that is to say:—

(a) All employment in summer in any week (excluding Sunday) in excess of the number of hours of employment in summer specified in column 2 of the said Table I. in relation to the area in question.

(b) All employment in winter in any week (excluding Sunday) in excess of the number of hours of employment in winter

specified in the said column 2 in relation to the area in question.

(c) All employment on a Sunday.

5. For the purpose of the above rates the expressions "employment in summer" and "employment in winter" shall, as regards any area above-mentioned, bear the same respective meanings as they bear in the Order of the Agricultural Wages Board fixing minimum rates of wages for male workmen of the age of 18 years and over employed in agriculture in that area.

6. The above rates shall apply (according to the terms above set forth) to all male workmen under the age of 18 years who are wholly or partly employed in agriculture within the meaning of Section 17 (1) of the Corn Production Act, 1917, in any of the areas above-mentioned, during such time as they are so employed.

troller of all restrictions upon food consumption (whichever event shall first occur) to proceed to give notice of a proposal under the above-mentioned Regulations that employment in excess of 6½ hours on one day in each week (other than a Sunday) shall be defined as employment to which differential rates for overtime shall apply.

For male workmen of 15 and under 16 years of age, 18s. for 54 hours.

For male workmen of 14 and under 15 years of age, 14s. for 54 hours.

For male workmen under 14 years of age, 10s. for 54 hours.

2. The wages payable for employment in winter (as hereinafter defined) of male workmen in agriculture shall be not less than wages at the following minimum rates, that is to say:—

For male workmen of 21 years of age and over, 31s. for 48 hours.

For male workmen of 18 and under 21 years of age, 30s. for 48 hours.

For male workmen of 17 and under 18 years of age, 26s. for 48 hours.

For male workmen of 16 and under 17 years of age, 22s. for 48 hours.

For male workmen of 15 and under 16 years of age, 18s. for 48 hours.

For male workmen of 14 and under 15 years of age, 14s. for 48 hours.

For male workmen under 14 years of age, 10s. for 48 hours.

3. Provided that where a whole-time workman is employed by the week or any longer period the wages payable to him for the hours of work agreed between him and the employer in any week (excluding hours of overtime employment) shall not be less than the respective amounts set out in Clauses 1 and 2 above, notwithstanding that these hours are less than 54 in summer or 48 in winter.

4. The differential rates for overtime employment shall be as follows:—

A. In respect of overtime employment on weekdays:

For male workmen of 18 years of age and over, 8½d. per hour.

For male workmen of 17 and under 18 years of age, 7d. per hour.

For male workmen of 16 and under 17 years of age, 6d. per hour.

For male workmen of 15 and under 16 years of age, 5d. per hour.

For male workmen of 14 and under 15 years of age, 4d. per hour.

For male workmen under 14 years of age, 3d. per hour.

B. In respect of overtime employment on a Sunday:

For male workmen of 18 years of age and over, 10d. per hour.

For male workmen of 17 and under 18 years of age, 8½d. per hour.

For male workmen of 16 and under 17 years of age, 7½d. per hour.

For male workmen of 15 and under 16 years of age, 6d. per hour.

For male workmen of 14 and under 15 years of age, 4½d. per hour.

For male workmen under 14 years of age, 3½d. per hour.

5. Provided that in the case of a male workman of under 18 years of age the minimum rates and overtime rates shall during the first two months of his employment in agriculture be 20 per cent. less than the rates which but for this provision would be applicable to him under the provisions of the preceding clauses of this Order.

6. For the purpose of the above rates the following employment is defined as overtime employment, that is to say:—

(a) All employment in summer in excess of 54 hours in any week (excluding Sunday).

(b) All employment in winter in excess of 48 hours in any week (excluding Sunday).

(c) All employment on a Sunday.

For male workmen of 15 and under 16 years of age, 18s. for 54 hours.

For male workmen of 14 and under 15 years of age, 14s. for 54 hours.

For male workmen under 14 years of age, 10s. for 54 hours.

2. The wages payable for employment in winter (as hereinafter defined) of male workmen in agriculture shall be not less than wages at the following minimum rates, that is to say:—

For male workmen of 21 years of age and over, 34s. for 48 hours.

For male workmen of 18 and under 21 years of age, 31s. for 48 hours.

For male workmen of 17 and under 18 years of age, 26s. for 48 hours.

For male workmen of 16 and under 17 years of age, 22s. for 48 hours.

For male workmen of 15 and under 16 years of age, 18s. for 48 hours.

For male workmen of 14 and under 15 years of age, 14s. for 48 hours.

For male workmen under 14 years of age, 10s. for 48 hours.

3. Provided that where a whole-time workman is employed by the week or any longer period the wages payable to him for the hours of work agreed between him and the employer in any week (excluding hours of overtime employment) shall not be less than the respective amounts set out in Clauses 1 and 2 above, notwithstanding that those hours are less than 54 in summer or 48 in winter.

4. The differential rates for overtime employment shall be as follows:—

A. In respect of overtime employment on weekdays:—

For male workmen of 21 years of age and over, 9d. per hour.

For male workmen of 18 and under 21 years of age, 8½d. per hour.

For male workmen of 17 and under 18 years of age, 7d. per hour.

For male workmen of 16 and under 17 years of age, 6d. per hour.

For male workmen of 15 and under 16 years of age, 5d. per hour.

For male workmen of 14 and under 15 years of age, 4d. per hour.

For male workmen under 14 years of age, 3d. per hour.

B. In respect of overtime employment on a Sunday:—

For male workmen of 21 years of age and over, 11d. per hour.

For male workmen of 18 but under 21 years of age, 10d. per hour.

For male workmen of 17 but under 18 years of age, 8½d. per hour.

For male workmen of 16 but under 17 years of age, 7½d. per hour.

For male workmen of 15 but under 16 years of age, 6d. per hour.

For male workmen of 14 but under 15 years of age, 4½d. per hour.

For male workmen of 19 years of age and over, 38s. a week.

For male workmen of 18 and under 19 years of age, 35s. a week.

For male workmen of 17 and under 18 years of age, 30s. a week.

For male workmen of 16 and under 17 years of age, 25s. a week.

2. The wages payable for employment of all other male workmen in agriculture shall be not less than wages at the following minimum rates, that is to say:—

In respect of employment in summer (as hereinafter defined) for 54 hours, and in respect of employment in winter (as hereinafter defined) for 48 hours:—

For male workmen of 19 years of age and over, 36s.

For male workmen of 18 and under 19 years of age, 33s.

For male workmen of 17 and under 18 years of age, 28s.

For male workmen of 16 and under 17 years of age, 23s.

For male workmen of 15 and under 16 years of age, 18s.

For male workmen of 14 and under 15 years of age, 14s.

For male workmen under 14 years of age, 10s.

Provided that where a whole-time workman to whom these rates apply is employed by the week or any longer period the wages payable to him for the hours of work agreed between him and the employer in any week (excluding hours of overtime employment) shall not be less than the respective amounts set out in this clause, notwithstanding that those hours are less than 54 in summer or 48 in winter.

3. The differential rates for overtime employment shall be as follows:—

For male workmen of 19 years of age and over, 10d. per hour on weekdays, 1s. per hour on Sundays.

For male workmen of 18 and under 19 years of age, 9d. per hour on weekdays, 11d. per hour on Sundays.

For male workmen of 17 and under 18 years of age, 8d. per hour on weekdays, 9½d. per hour on Sundays.

For male workmen of 16 and under 17 years of age, 6½d. per hour on weekdays, 7½d. per hour on Sundays.

For male workmen of 15 and under 16 years of age, 5d. per hour on weekdays, 6d. per hour on Sundays.

For male workmen of 14 and under 15 years of age, 4d. per hour on weekdays, 4½d. per hour on Sundays.

For male workmen of under 14 years of

age, 3d. per hour on weekdays, 3½d. per hour on Sundays.

(b) In respect of other workmen:—

8. For the purpose of the above rates the hours of work shall not include meal times, but shall include any time during which by reason of weather conditions an employer has prevented from working a workman who was present at the place of employment and ready to work.
