WITHDRAWING IN THE ISLE OF MAN CERTAIN CERTIFICATES OF EXEMPTION FROM MILITARY SERVICE.

GEORGE R.I.

HEREAS by Sub-section (1) of Section three of the Military Service (Isle of Man), No. 2 Act, 1918, it is provided that His Majesty may, by Proclamation declaring that a national emergency has arisen, direct

that any certificates of exemption, other than certificates expressed to be granted or renewed solely on the ground specified in paragraph (c) or on the ground specified in paragraph (d) of Sub-section (1) of Section two of the Military Service (Isle of Man) Act, 1916, granted or renewed to any class or body of men specified in the Proclamation, or to men of any class or description so specified shall, as from the date specified in the Proclamation cease to have effect, and all certificates to which the Proclamation applies shall as from that date cease to be in force:

And whereas by Sub-section (2) of Section three of the Military Service (Isle of Man) No. 2 Act, 1918, it is provided that while any such Proclamation remains in operation no application shall, except in so far as the Proclamation provides for the making of applications in any special cases, be entertained for the grant or renewal of the certificates mentioned in that Sub-section:

And whereas a national emergency has arisen:

Now, therefore, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, in pursuance of the said Act and all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby direct that, as from the 11th. day of September, 1918, the certificates of exemption from military service specified in the First Schedule to this Our Royal Proclamation shall cease to have effect:

And in pursuance of the powers aforesaid We do hereby further direct that, notwith-standing that this Our Royal Proclamation is in operation, applications for certificates of exemption may be made in the special cases and subject to the provisions specified in the Second Schedule hereto.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

All certificates of exemption granted or renewed in the Isle of Man to men born in the years 1895, 1896, 1897, 1898, and 1899, exclusive of:—

- (1) Certificates held by men who pursuant to their last authorised medical examination are at the date of this Proclamation:—
 - (a) In medical category C 2, B 3 or C 3 or in Grade 3, or
 - (b) In medical category B 1, B 2, B 3, C 1, C 2, or C 3, or in Grade 2 or Grade 3 if in their case they are at the date of this Proclamation whole time employed on a farm in farm work and are duly registered pursuant to the National Registration (Isle of Man) Acts, 1915 and 1918, as being occupied on agricultural work.
- (2) Certificates granted or renewed on grounds of employment by Colliery Recruiting Courts to persons employed in or about coal mines.
- (3) Certificates granted or renewed on grounds of employment by Port Labour Committees to men who at the date of this Proclamation are pursuant to their last authorised medical examination in a medical grade or category other than Grade 1 or Category A.
- (4) Certificates granted or renewed to persons who at the date of this Proclamation are duly qualified medical practitioners.
- (5) Certificates expressed to be granted or renewed solely on the ground specified in paragraph (c) or on the ground specified in paragraph (d) of Sub-section (1) of Section two of the Military Service Act (Isle of Man), 1916. that is to say, on the grounds of ill-health or infirmity or of a conscientious objection to the undertaking of combatant service.

SECOND SCHEDULE.

A. Application may be made to an Appeal Tribunal for the grant or renewal of a certificate of exemption solely on the ground specified in paragraph (a) of Sub-section (1) of Section two of the Military Service (Isle of Man) Act, 1916, in respect of a man who has established to the satisfaction of the Manx Board of Agriculture that he is a highly skilled agricultural worker, whole time employed on a farm in farm work, and that he is irreplaceable and essential to the cultivation of the farm, provided that the application is lodged in accordance with the Regulations for Tribunals not later than the 30th day of September, 1918.

- B. Application may be made to a Tribunal for the grant or renewal of a certificate of exemption:—
 - (i) Solely on the ground specified in paragraph (b) of Sub-section (1) of Section two

of the Military Service (Isle of Man) Act, 1916, in respect of a man who establishes to the satisfaction of the Tribunal that he is the last surviving son of a widow, of whom at least one son has died as a result of wounds received in, or sickness contracted by, service with Our Armed Forces during the present War; or

(ii) Solely on the ground specified in paragraph (d) of Sub-section (1) of Section two of the Military Service (Isle of Man) Act, 1916, in respect of a man whose certificate was expressed to be granted or renewed on such ground in addition to a ground specified in paragraphs (a) or (b) of that Sub-section; provided that such application is lodged, in accordance with the Regulations for Tribunals, not later than the 23rd day of September, 1918.

(3) Certificates granted or renewed on grounds of employment by Port Labour Committees to men who at the date of this Proclamation are pursuant to their last authorised medical examination in a medical grade or category other than Grade 1 or Category A.

(4) Certificates expressed to be granted or renewed solely on the ground specified in paragraph (c) or on the ground specified in paragraph (d) of Sub-section (1) of Section two of the Military Service (Isle of Man) Act, 1916, that is to say, on the grounds of ill-health or infirmity or of a conscientious objection to the undertaking of combatant service.

SECOND SCHEDULE.

Application may be made to an Appeal Tribunal in respect of a man born in the year 1900 for the grant or renewal of a certificate of exemption:—

(i.) Under the Munitions of War Acts, 1915 to 1917.

WHEREAS by section three of the Munitions of War Act, 1915, as amended by the Munitions of War (Amendment) Act, 1916, it is provided that the differences to which Part 1 of the first-mentioned Act applies are differences as to rates of wages, hours of work, or otherwise as to terms or conditions of or affecting employment on munitions work, and also any differences as to rates of wages, hours of work, or otherwise as wages, hours to terms or conditions of or affecting employment on any other work of any description, if that Part of that Act is applied to such a difference by His Majesty by Proclamation, on the ground that in the opinion of His Majesty the existence or continuance of the difference is directly or indirectly prejudicial to the manufacture, transport, or supply of Munitions of War; and it is also provided that the said Part of the said Act may be so applied to such a difference at any time, whether a lock-out or strike is in existence in connection

with the difference to which it is applied or not: Provided that if in the case of any industry the Minister of Munitions is satisfied that effective means exist to secure the settlement without stoppage of any difference arising on work other than on munitions work, no Proclamation shall be made under the said section with respect to any such difference:

And whereas a difference within the meaning of the said section exists between the persons employed by the Industrial Co-operative Societies, wholesale and retail, of England and Wales, and the Committees of Management of the said Societies as to rates of wages, hours of work, and otherwise as to terms and conditions of or affecting employment on the work carried on by such persons:

And whereas the Minister of Labour and the Minister of Food have investigated the matter, and the Minister of Munitions, having considered the results of the investigation made by the Minister of Labour and the Minister of Food, and their representations to the Minister of Munitions, is not satisfied that effective means exist to secure the settlement of the said difference without stoppage, being a difference arising on work other than munitions work:

And whereas in Our opinion the existence or continuance of the said difference is directly or indirectly prejudicial to the manufacture, transport, or supply of Munitions of War:

Now, therefore, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, are pleased to proclaim, direct, and ordain, that Part 1 of the Munitions of War Act, 1915, shall apply to the said difference.

HEREAS by the Military Service (Conventions with Allied States) Act, 1917, it is provided that His Majesty may by Order in Council, signifying that a convention has been made with a country allied to or otherwise acting in naval or military co-operation with His Majesty in the present war (hereinafter referred to as an allied country) which imposes a mutual liability to military service on British subjects in that country and subjects of that country in the United Kingdom, direct that the said Act shall have effect with respect to that allied country and the subjects of that allied country, but that no such Order in Council shall be made unless the following conditions are fulfilled, that is to

(a) Unless the convention secures to His Majesty's Ambassador or other public Minister in the allied country power to grant to British subjects in that country exemption from military service;

(b) Unless the convention contains provisions to the effect that British subjects in the allied country and subjects of the allied country in the United Kingdom shall before being liable to military service have an opportunity if they make an application for the purpose of returning to the United Kingdom or the allied country as the case may be;

and it is further provided that no such Order in Council shall be made until the expiration of thirty days from the date on which the convention is laid before Parliament:

And whereas a convention dated the third day of June, nineteen hundred and eighteen, has been concluded between His Majesty and the President of the United States of America respecting the liability to military service of British subjects in the United States of America and citizens of the United States of America in Great Britain, and was ratified and came into operation on the thirtieth day of July, nineteen hundred and eighteen, and the said agreement complies with the conditions aforesaid:

And whereas the said agreement was laid before Parliament on the said thirtieth day of July:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to signify, and it is hereby signified, that such a convention as is mentioned in the said Act has been made with the United States of America, and His Majesty is further pleased, by and with the like advice, to direct, and it is hereby directed, that the said Act shall have effect with respect to the United States of America and citizens thereof.

And whereas by Order in Council dated the 14th day of September, 1915, His Majesty was pleased to order that no steps should be taken to put the Government of Ireland Act, 1914, into operation until the expiration of eighteen months from the date of the passing of that Act, unless the present War had previously ended, nor, if at the expiration of those eighteen months the present War had not ended, until such later date, not being later than the end of the present War, as might hereafter be fixed by Order in Council:

And whereas His Majesty was pleased, by Order in Council dated the 29th day of February, 1916, to extend by six months the time mentioned in the said Order of the 14th day of September, 1915, and by Order in Council dated the 7th day of September, 1916, to extend that time by a further period of six months, and by Order in Council dated the 13th day of March, 1917, to extend that time by a further period of six months, and by Order in Council dated the 22nd day of August, 1917, to extend that time by a further period of six months, and by Order in Council dated the 27th day of February, 1918, to extend that time by a further period of six months:

And whereas it is expedient to extend further the time mentioned in the said Orders:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that:—

No steps shall be taken to put the Government of Ireland Act, 1914, into operation until the expiration of a period of six months after the termination of the eighteen months and five periods of six months mentioned in the recited Orders, unless the present War has previously ended, nor, if at the expiration of that period the present War has not ended, until such later date, not being later than the end of the present War, as may hereafter be fixed by Order in Council.

WHEREAS in pursuance of the Bishoprics Act, 1878, and the Bishoprics of Bradford and Coventry Act, 1918, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, on the 1st day of August, 1918, certified to His Majesty, under their Common Seal, that the annual value of the Endowment Fund of the Bishopric of Coventry, together with the annual sum which will ultimately be derived, in pursuance of the above-mentioned Acts, from the endowment or income of the Bishopric of Worcester (when calculated in the manner directed by the said Bishoprics Act, 1878, as modified by the First Schedule to the said Bishoprics of Bradford and Coventry Act, 1918) was not less than Two thousand five hundred pounds, and that an Episcopal Residence had not yet been provided for the said Bishopric of Coventry, but that a capital sum (in addition to the sum necessary to produce the annual value so certified as aforesaid) sufficient in their opinion for providing a fitting Episcopal Residence for the said Bishopric had been contributed for that purpose:

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the abovementioned Acts, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order and declare as follows:—

- (1) The Bishopric of Coventry is hereby founded.
- (2) The Diocese of the said Bishopric shall consist (subject to the provisions contained in the First Schedule to the Bishoprics of Bradford and Coventry Act, 1918, as to rearrangement of

boundaries) of the Archdeaconry of Coventry, and the Archdeaconry of Warwick (except the Rural Deaneries of Blockley, Evesham, Feckenham, and Pershore) all now in the Diocese of Worcester.

- (3) The Parish Church of St. Michael, Coventry, in the County of Warwick, subject to the rights of the Patron and Incumbent of such Church, shall be the Cathedral Church of the said Bishopric.
- (4) The Bishop of Coventry is constituted a Body Corporate, and is hereby invested with all such rights, privileges, and jurisdictions as are possessed by any other Bishop in England, and is subjected to the metropolitan jurisdiction of the Archbishop of Canterbury.
- (5) This Order shall come into operation on the date of the publication of the same in the London Gazette.

WHEREAS it is expedient that a National Standard Uniform shall be adopted for the British Mercantile Marine:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

- (1) The Uniform of the British Mercantile Marine shall be such as is set forth in the Schedule to this Order: Provided that where, at the date when this Order comes into operation, the Masters and Officers of the Ships belonging to any Company or Firm are accustomed to use a cap with a distinctive badge, that badge may, if the Company or Firm so desire, be substituted, in the case of persons whilst serving on board, or employed on the business of, Ships belonging to that Company or Firm, for the cap badge prescribed in the said Schedule.
- (2) The persons entitled to wear the Uniform so prescribed shall be Masters and Officers of the Mercantile Marine holding certificates from the Board of Trade, Uncertificated Junior Officers of the Mercantile Marine qualifying for their first certificate, and Surgeons, Pursers, Wireless Operators, Cadets, and Apprentices of the Mercantile Marine, and Petty Officers and other Ratings of the Mercantile Marine specifically mentioned in the said Schedule, but no other person whosoever.
- (3) The Uniform to be worn by any person whilst employed in any position or rank on board any Ship shall be the Uniform appropriate to that position or rank, without reference to the class of certificate which he may hold.
- (4) A member of the Mercantile Marine employed ashore, or temporarily unemployed, shall be entitled to wear the Uniform appropriate to the highest rank in which he has at any time been previously employed.
- (5) No person entitled to wear the Uniform shall, when on board Ship, in port, or on shore, be dressed partly in Uniform and partly not in Uniform.

(6) This Order shall apply only as respects persons who are or who have been employed on British Ships registered at ponts in the British Islands.

(7) This Order shall come into operation on the day of the promulgation thereof.

(8) This Order may be cited as "The Mercantile Marine (Uniform) Order, 1918."

Schedule.

MERCANTILE MARINE STANDARD UNIFORM. A. FOR MASTERS, OFFICERS, CADETS, AND APPRENTICES.

1. DISTINCTION LACE OR RANK STRIPES.

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in in width on each side of the stripe.

(4) Masters and Chief Engineers will wear two interlaced chevrons, one pointing upwards and one downwards, and formed by the two inner of the four rows of the distinction lace. Other (deck and engineer) Certificated Officers, together with Surgeons and Assistant Surgeons, Senior Pursers, Pursers, and Assistant Pursers, will wear one diamond of 1/2-inch plain gold lace (or black mohair), and First Wireless Operators one diamond of 1-inch gold Russia braid (or black braid), with open centre, and an outside measurement (angle to angle) of 1½ inches, imposed on the distinction lace. Uncertificated Junior Officers (deck and engineer) will wear a single chevron pointing downwards and formed by the single row of distinction lace. The foregoing chevrons should have an outside measurement of $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches at the base.

(5) Chief Refrigerating Engineers, holding 1st class certificate, should wear the same

uniform as a 2nd Engineer.

Second Refrigerating Engineers, holding 2nd class certificate, should wear the same uniform as a 3rd Engineer.

Refrigerating Engineers, if uncertificated, to be classed Uncertificated with Engineers.

Boilermakers and Electricians should wear the Uniform of Uncertificated Junior Engineers.

2. GREAT COAT.

For all Officers—but not Cadets or ${f Apprentices}.$

Blue cloth. Length to come to 14 inches from the ground. Double breasted. Six buttons on each side to button four buttons, the bottom button not to come below the level of hips. plait down the back with an opening at the bottom 18 inches long with a fly and three small plain buttons. A cloth strap behind with a buttonhole at each end, and two corresponding uniform buttons to confine the waist to required Stand and fall collar with hook and eye in collar seam. Edges of coat to be double stitched; the shoulders fitted with straps for rank stripes.

3. FROCK COAT.

For all Officers—but not Cadets or ${f Apprentices}.$

Blue cloth, double breasted, with padded turn-down collar; cut for six buttons, but to have five buttons on each breast, to button four buttons, the width of lapel to be 3 inches at fourth button, tapering to $2\frac{1}{4}$ inches at waist seam; two buttons on the hips with side edges in plait of skirt extending half-way down the skirt, with a button at bottom of each side edge; for Officers 5 feet 9 inches in height,

length of coat 38 inches, with a proportionate variation for difference in height. The proportionate variation in length of skirt for each inch of difference in height is 1 of an inch. Lining, black material. Round cuffs, and rank stripes on the sleeves. A black morocco leather belt 1½ inches wide with gilt buckles of same design as standard cap badge can be worn optionally.

4. Undress Coat.

For all Officers, Cadets, and Apprentices. Blue cloth, with padded turn-down collar; the length to be sufficient to cover the hips; double breasted with five buttons at equal distance on each side, to button four buttons. Pockets without flaps at the sides, in line with the lower button, and one outside left breast pocket. An opening 5 inches long at the bottom of each side seam.

Round cuffs; rank stripes on the sleeves.

5. Working Undress Jacket.

Blue serge, single breasted, stand collar, with hook and eye at neck, five buttons at the front, and an opening at bottom of each side seam 5 inches long. A patched pocket on each breast without flaps. Shoulder straps for rank stripes in black mohair.

6. WHITE UNDRESS COAT.

White drill, single breasted, stand collar, with hook and eye at neck, five buttons at the front, and an opening at bottom of each side seam 5 inches long. A patched pocket on each breast, without flaps. Shoulder straps for rank stripes.

7. MESS JACKET.

Blue cloth, double breasted, six buttonholes in each row, four on the turn and two below, padded turn-down collar; slightly reached over the hips with a rounded peak behind; two pockets with welts at the sides. Round cuffs with rank stripes.

8. White Mess Jacket.

White linen of the same shape as the blue jacket but with a roll collar, two buttons in each row, and two buttonholes on either side to correspond with the buttons, to be worn linked with two No. 2 size buttons connected by a ring. Shoulders fitted with straps for rank stripes.

9. Shoulder Straps. For all Officers—but not Cadets or Apprentices.

Blue cloth with rank stripes and coloured cloth, according to rank or branch. Straps to be 5 inches long, 21 inches wide, and to have a No. 3 button on top.

10. TROUSERS.

CAP BADGE.

Gold Naval Crown over silver anchor (without cable); the anchor on red oval cushion with gold rope rim, surrounded below and at the sides by gold oak-leaves and acorns. The whole on a backing of Navy Blue cloth. (Registered Design, No. 664,377.)

15. FOUL WEATHER COAT AND HAT. A black oilskin and sou'-wester of the usual pattern.

16. Neckties and Comforters.

As for Officers, but without the rope rim. Gilt for Boatswains, Carpenters, Quartermasters, and equivalent Petty Officers, horn for Boatswain's Mates and equivalent Ratings.

Usual Navy pattern, four buttons.

12. Distinguishing Arm Badges, in Gilt or RED (ON SERGE) OR BLUE (ON DUCK).

Boatswain-Crossed anchors.

Boatswain's Mate-Single anchor.

Carpenter-Crossed axes.

Carpenter's Mate-Single axe.

Donkeyman or Chief Stoker-Propeller with star above.

Greaser or Leading Stoker—Propeller.

That the Patronage of the said Rectory Stella is vested in His Most Gracious Majesty King George the Fifth, and in me, the said Bishop of Durham, in right of my Bishopric, alternately, and the Reverend Edwyn Vaughan Simpkinson is the present Rector thereof:

"That there is also in the said County and Diocese of Durham the Vicarage of Swalwell, the Parish whereof immediately adjoins the said Parish of Stella, and contains according to the last census a population of 5,200 people:

"That the net annual value of the Benefice

of Swalwell is £340:

That the patronage of the said Vicarage of Swalwell is vested in the Reverend Charles Edward Little, Rector of Whickham, in the said Diocese, by virtue of his said Rectory, and the Reverend Alexander Dunn is the present Vicar thereof:

"That the Patrons and Incumbents are consenting Parties to the separation and annexation herein-after proposed, and the matters and things in the Scheme hereto annexed stated and

proposed:

"That it appears to me, the said Lord

"That it appears to f the said Parish of Bishop, that the portion of the said Parish of Winlaton, immediately adjoining the said Parish of Stella, which is shown on the *Plan* annexed hereto, and coloured *blue* thereon, containing a population of 1,050 people or thereabouts, may, under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament passed in the 1st and 2nd years of the Reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 106, and the 2nd and 3rd years of the same Reign, Chapter 89, be separated from the said Parish of Winlaton and be annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the said Parish of Stella, and that the portion of the Parish of Stella which is shown in the said Plan, and is coloured yellow thereon, and containing a population of 200 people, may, under the same provisions, be separated from the said Parish of Stella and be annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the said Parish of Swalwell which it immediately adjoins:

"That it is proposed, if this Scheme be carried into effect, it shall not affect the present state of the Patronage of the said three Benefices of Winlaton, Stella and Swalwell:

"That pursuant to the direction contained in Section 26 of the said first-mentioned Act of Parliament, I, the said Lord Bishop, have drawn up a Scheme in writing, appended to this Representation, describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alterations above proposed may be best effected, and how the changes consequent upon such alterations may be made with justice to all parties interested, and I, the said Lord Bishop, submit the same to your Grace to the intent that your Grace may, if on full inquiry you shall be satisfied with the said Scheme, certify the same and such consents to His Majesty in Council.

"That the Inhabitants of the said portions, so separated and annexed as aforesaid, shall have the same rights as to Pews, and the performance of all Offices and Services of the Church, at the respective Parish Churches of Stella and Swalwell and otherwise in relation to the same Churches and the Parishes thereto respectively belonging as the other Inhabitants of the Parishes of Stella and Swalwell aforesaid respectively.

"That the fees for all such offices and ser-

"That the fees for all such offices and services performed for the Inhabitants of the said portions of the Parishes of Winlaton and Stella, so separated and annexed as aforesaid, respectively, or arising within the limits of the same, and usually payable to the Incumbent of a Benefice, shall belong to the Incumbents of the Benefices of Stella and Swalwell respectively.

"That no alteration shall be made in the Patronage of any of the said three Benefices affected by this Scheme."

Now, therefore, Their Lordships, having taken the said recommendation into consideration, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered,

That the Statutory List be varied and added to as set forth in the Schedule hereto.

Note (1).—All persons or firms resident, carrying on business or being in the United Kingdom are prohibited from having, with any person or firm mentioned in this List, or in any List issued under the Trading with the Enemy (Statutory List) Proclamation, any dealings other than such as are expressly authorised by paragraph 5 of the Proclamation. The Consolidated List, No. 61a) consolidating all previous Lists, up to and including that of the 9th August, 1918, is in press and will shortly be published. This consolidated List, together with List 62 and the List herewith annexed, contains all the names which up to this date are included in the Statutory List.

Additions to and variations in these Lists will be published at intervals approximately of two weeks.

The Lists are published in the London Gazette and reproduced in the Board of Trade Journal, and separate copies of all Lists may be obtained at a small cost from the Superintendent of Publications, His Majesty's Stationery

Office, Imperial House, Kingsway, W.C.
Note (2).—Where a person or firm mentioned in the List has more than one address in the country, or group of countries under which the name of the person or firm appears, all dealings in that country, or in any country in the group, with such person or firm are prohibited, even in cases where one only of the addresses or one only of the countries is specially mentioned.

Note (3).—Trading is prohibited under the Trading with the Enemy Proclamations of 25th June, and 10th November, 1915, with any person or firm of enemy nationality resident or carrying on business in China, Siam, Persia, Morocco, Liberia, or Portuguese East Africa. Persons or firms in the United Kingdom are therefore prohibited from trading with any person or firm of enemy nationality in any of those countries, even though such person or firm is not mentioned by name in the Statutory List.

Note (4).-In order to minimise as far as possible any inconvenience which may be caused to the British traders by the dislocation of export trade owing to the inclusion in the Statutory List of a former connection, the Foreign Trade Department is collecting and classifying the names of non-enemy firms who may be able to act as substitutes for firms mentioned in the Statutory List. A considerable amount of information is already available at the Foreign Trade Department, and it is in many cases possible to suggest the names of satisfactory substitutes for individual firms on the Lists, without the necessity of

referring the matter abroad. The Department is, however, prepared on application to enquire of His Majesty's Representatives abroad for the names of suitable substitutes. When the applicant wishes this done by telegraph he is required to undertake to pay the cost of telegraphic correspondence. It would greatly facilitate the work of the Foreign Trade Department if applicants in making enquiries would specify the particular trade or trades for which substitutes are required. General enquiries for new connections abroad should be addressed to The Comptroller General, Department of Overseas Trade (Development and Intelligence), 73, Basinghall Street, London, E.C. 2.

Note (5).—The Statutory List for each country is telegraphed, on the day of issue, to His Majesty's Representative in that country, who is instructed to notify accordingly British Consular Officers, to whom persons abroad should apply for information as to names on the List. Persons and firms in the United Kingdom with agencies or branches abroad would, however, be well advised to furnish such agencies or branches with issues of the List as they appear. The names on the Lists for all countries in Central or South America are also notified to His Majesty's Ambassador at Washington, who transmits them to H.M. Consul-General at New York and to other centres in the United States likely to be interested

Note (6).—It is not unusual for firms in Holland and the Netherland East Indies to be registered under names commencing with descriptive terms such as "Handel Maatschappy" (Trading Company) or "Naamlooze Venootschap" (Limited Liability Company). The KING has been pleased to award the Albert Medal to Lieutenant Leonard Harper, Cheshire Regiment, T.F.R., in recognition of his gallantry in saving life in August of last year. The circumstances are as follows:—

On the 5th August, 1917, a melting-pot, used for refining high explosives at an explosives factory, was being freed from a deposit of sediment which had accumulated. During the absence of Lieutenant Harper (one of the managers of the factory) a foreman attempted to break away the sediment, which was of a highly explosive nature, with an iron bar. The mixture fused, giving off fierce flames and thick fumes. On his arrival, Lieutenant Harper at once crawled with a hose underneath the pot, which was raised about three feet from the ground, and directed water at the flames immediately above him.

It was not until five or six hoses had been brought to bear on the pot for some time that the burning mixture was cooled down. Meanwhile there was imminent risk of an explosion, which would certainly have killed Lieutenant Harper and must have involved other buildings near by where 25 tons of high explosives were stored. Had such an explosion occurred, great loss of life and material damage must inevitably have resulted.

ORDER.

CHLORINE AND CHLORINE COMPOUNDS.

The Minister of Munitions, in exercise of the powers conferred upon him by the Defence of the Realm Regulations, and of all other powers enabling him, hereby orders as follows:-

1. For all purposes of this Order, "chlorine" shall mean elementary chlorine, either in gaseous or in liquid form, and "chlorine compound" shall mean and include bleaching powder, sodium hypochlorite, all descriptions of chlorine bleach liquor, and all other compounds of or products containing chlorine which are commonly manufactured direct from chlorine, whether in gaseous or in liquid form. And for the purposes of Clauses 2, 4 and 5 of this Order, the weight of any chlorine compound shall be deemed to be the weight of the chlorine contained in the same.

2. As on and from the 16th September, 1918, until further notice, no person shall produce or manufacture any chlorine or chlorine compounds in quantities exceeding in the aggregate one ton during any one calendar month except under a licence issued by or under the authority of the Minister of Munitions and in accordance with the terms and conditions of such licence as to the quantities to be manufactured or otherwise.

3. As from the date of this Order all persons producing or manufacturing chlorine or any chlorine compound, or engaged in any manufacture, trade or business in which chlorine or any chlorine compound is used, shall carry out and comply with all instructions and directions which may be given by or on behalf of the Minister of Munitions with a view to avoiding loss or waste of chlorine.

As on and from the 16th September, 1918, no person producing or manufacturing chlorine or any chlorine compound shall, except under and in accordance with the terms and conditions of a licence issued by or under the authority of the Minister of Munitions, use more than one ton in all of such chlorine or any chlorine compounds during any one calendar month for the purposes of all other manufactures, trades and businesses carried on by him.

5. As on and from the 16th September, 1918, no person shall supply chlorine or any chlorine compound to any person (whether in pursuance of a contract existing at the date of this Order or otherwise), except under and in accordance with the terms and conditions of a licence issued by or under the authority of the Minister of Munitions. Provided that no licence shall be required by any person to supply not more than 56 lbs. of chlorine or chlorine compounds to any one person during any one calendar month.

6. As on and from the day following the date of this Order, no person shall sell or purchase or offer to sell or purchase any liquid chlorine or bleaching powder at a price exceeding the maximum price specified for the same in the schedule hereto. Provided that such maximum prices shall not apply to—(a) any sale of liquid chlorine or bleaching powder for export from the United Kingdom to any country other than the Channel Islands or the Isle of Man; nor (b) any sale of less than 56 lbs. of liquid chlorine or less than one ton of bleaching

7. All persons engaged in producing, manufacturing, selling, distributing or storing

chlorine or any chlorine compound, or in any manufacture, trade or business in chlorine or any chlorine compound is used, shall make such returns with regard to their business, and shall verify the same in such manner (including production of their books to any accredited representative of the Minister of Munitions being a chartered or incorporated accountant) as shall from time to time be required by or under the authority of the Minister of Munitions. And in particular all such persons shall, within fourteen days from the 1st October, 1918, make to the Minister of Munitions returns of all stocks of chlorine and chlorine compounds in their possession or under their control on that date, such returns to be sent to the Department of Explosives Supply, Storey's Gate, Westminster, S.W.1, and to be verified and authenticated by the signature of the person making the same, or, where such person is a firm or company, of a partner, director or other responsible officer. Provided that no return shall be required from any person whose stock of chlorine and chlorine compounds on the 1st October, 1918, does not exceed in the aggregate 1,000 lbs.

8. This Order may be cited as the Chlorine and Chlorine Compounds Order, 1918.

DEFENCE OF THE REALM REGULA-TIONS.

REGULATION OF THE SALE OF HAY AND STRAW AND CHOPPED HAY AND STRAW IN SCOTLAND.

pursuance of the powers conferred on them by the Defence of the Realm Regulations and of all other powers enabling them, the Army Council hereby order:-

That on any sale of hay, threshed hay, straw, chopped hay, chopped threshed hay or chopped straw in Scotland, the prices shall not exceed such prices as are set out hereunder:-

SCHEDULE 1.

The following are the maximum prices which a producer or grower may receive for hay or straw in the stack, but such prices shall in every case include the cost of carting to the nearest railway station or a distance equivalent thereto:-

Hay, per ton, £8.

Threshed Hay, per ton, £5.

Oat Straw, Rye Straw, Barley Straw, Bean Straw, Pea Straw, and Threshed Tares, per ton, £3 15s.

Wheat Straw, Revit Wheat Straw, Buckwheat Straw, and Mustard Straw, per ton,

The above prices are for best quality only; inferior hay or straw will be graded according to quality.

In addition to the above prices interest at the rate of 5 per cent. per annum will be added, calculated from the 31st October, 1918, if the application to inspect (as mentioned in the Army Council Order of 21st August, 1918, prohibiting the lifting of hay and straw in Scotland) is received in the office of the D.P.O.S. on or before that date, to date of completion of lifting, and calculated from the date such application to inspect is received in the office of the D.P.O.S. when received after the 31st October, 1918, to date of completion of lifting.

Further, if lifting is completed subsequent to 31st December, 1918, interest at the rate of 10 per cent. per annum will be added, calculated from 1st January, 1919, to completion of lifting, computed on the prices set out in the above Schedule.

SCHEDULE 2.

1. All hay and straw mentioned in Schedule 1 hereof, sold for civilian purposes, whether sold to a Wholesale Dealer or Retailer, will be invoiced to such Wholesale Dealer or Retailer by the Area Administrative (Scotland) Officer at stack price plus buying and establishment charges.

2. To such invoiced price the Wholesale Dealer may add the following charges where

applicable:

(a) For establishment charges, 5s. per ton.

(b) For baling (not behind the threshing drum) with two or more wires, 12s. 6d. per

(c) (1) The actual cost of transport by rail or boat and of delivery off rail or boat or from store to the Consumer, at rates ob-

taining at the time of delivery.

(2) For carting by the Producer or Grower, 2s. 6d. per ton for each mile in excess of the distance to the nearest available railway station, but not exceeding a total of 10s. per ton.

(d) Where conveyed by rail or water, for

loss of weight in transit, 5s. per ton.

(e) In the case of straw baled or bunched with two or more wires or strings, behind the threshing drum, instead of the sum mentioned in para. 2 (b) above, the sum of 7s. 6d. per ton.

- 3. In addition to the above sums per ton, a Wholesale Dealer who is also a Distributor, or a Distributing Dealer or Producer Distributor may add the following charges where applicable:
 - (a) For establishment charges and profit, 6s. per ton.

(b) For storage, 2s. 6d. per ton.

- 4. Manufacturers of chopped hay and straw may make an additional charge of £2 per ton to cover all costs incidental to manufacture; provided that when the Consumer or Purchaser supplies sacks or bags, such charge shall not exceed £1 10s, per ton.
- 5. Distributors may charge for quantities not exceeding 10 cwt. an additional sum of £1 6s. 8d. per ton, provided that where a would-be Purchaser gives an order for a quantity exceeding 10 cwt. (such quantity being reasonable according to his normal requirements), and owing to a shortage of supplies or other reason, the seller does not fulfil such order in one delivery, then the price shall not exceed that laid down in Schedule 2, para. 2, hereof, excepting that the seller may charge in addition to the price laid down in Schedule 2, para. 2, aforesaid, the actual cost of delivery for each delivery after the first until the full amount of the Purchaser's order has been fulfilled: in all such cases an invoice or bill in respect thereof must be delivered to the Purchaser indicating the charges made for delivery as separate items from the price of the goods delivered.
- 6. In all cases indicated in Schedule 2, paras. 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5, the seller must deliver to the Purchaser when rendering accounts an invoice setting out the price and how such price is made up, and the latter in the case of a re-sale must also deliver to the person purchasing from him an invoice setting out the price at which he received the goods, and, in addition, must show such prices as he is entitled to charge as are set out in Schedule 2, paras. 2, 3, 4, or 5 as the case may be.

CORN PRODUCTION ACT, 1917. AGRICULTURAL WAGES BOARD (ENGLAND AND WALES).

PROPOSAL TO FIX MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR FEMALE WORKERS IN NORTHUMBERLAND.

Agricultural Wages Board (England and Wales), duly established and constituted under Section 5 (1) of the above Act and the Regulations made by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, dated the 8th November, 1917, having had regard to the provisions of subsections (6) and (7) of the said Section, hereby give Notice, as required by sub-section 4 of the said Section, and by paragraph 4 of the Agricultural Wages Regulations, 1918, that they propose to fix the following minimum rates of wages and the following differential rates for overtime employment, as hereinafter defined, for female workers employed in agriculture for time-work in the area comprising the administrative county of Northumberland (including the Borough of Berwick-upon-Tweed) and the county boroughs of Newcastle-upon-Tyne and Tynemouth, and to define for the purpose of the application of such differential rates for overtime the employment which is to be treated as overtime employment as follows, that is to say:

- The wages payable for employment in agriculture of whole-time female workers of 18 years of age and upwards who are employed by the week or any longer period shall be not less than wages at the rate of 22s. 6d. per week of 54 hours in summer (as hereinafter defined) and 48 hours in winter (as hereinafter defined).
- 2. Provided that where a whole-time female worker of 18 years of age and upwards

- is employed by the week or any longer period, the wages payable to her for the hours of work agreed between her and the employer in any week (excluding hours of overtime employment) shall be not less than 22s. 6d., notwithstanding that those hours are less than 54 in summer and 48 in winter.
- 3. The differential rate for overtime employment for female workers to whom Clause 1 of this Order applies shall be 6d. per hour on weekdays and $7\frac{1}{2}d$. per hour on Sundays.
- 4. For the purpose of the application of the above rates the following employment is defined as overtime employment, that is to

(a) All employment in summer in excess of 54 hours in any week (excluding Sunday)

(b) All employment in winter in excess of 48 hours in any week (excluding Sunday)

(c) All employment on a Sunday.

5. The wages payable for employment in agriculture of all female workers other than workers of 18 years of age and upwards who are employed by the week or any longer period shall be not less than wages at the rates following, that is to say:

Minimum Rates per Hour for Female Workers of the Ages Mentioned Below.

18 years of age and over, 5d.

17 and under 18 years of age, 44d.

16 and under 17 years of age, 4d. 15 and under 16 years of age, 3½d. 14 and under 15 years of age, 3d.

Under 14 years of age, $2\frac{1}{2}d$.

6. The differential rates for overtime em-

ployment for female workers to whom Clause 5 of this Order applies shall be as follows:—Overtime Rates per Hour for Female Workers of the Ages Mentioned Below.

18 years of age and over: On weekdays, 6d.; on Sundays, 7½d.

17 and under 18 years of age: On week-

days, 5½d.; on Sundays, 7d.

16 and under 17 years of age: On week-days, 5d.; on Sundays, 6d.

15 and under 16 years of age: On week-

days 4½d.; on Sundays, 5d.

14 and under 15 years of age: On week-days, 4d.; on Sundays, $4\frac{1}{2}$ d.

Under 14 years of age: On weekdays, 3d.;

on Sundays, 4d.

- 7. For the purpose of the overtime rates specified in Clause 6 of this Order the following employment is defined as overtime employment, that is to say:—
 - (a) All employment on a Sunday.

(b) All employment on a weekday before the hour of 7.0 a.m. or after the hour of 5.0 p.m.

(c) All employment on a weekday in excess of $8\frac{1}{2}$ hours in summer and of 8

hours in winter.

- 8. For the purposes of this Order "summer" shall be deemed to be the period commencing on the first Monday in March and terminating on the last Sunday in October; and "winter" shall be deemed to be the rest of the year.
- 9. The rates mentioned in the preceding Clauses shall apply to all female workers who are wholly or partly employed in agri-

culture within the meaning of Section 17 (1) of the Corn Production Act, 1917, during such time as they are so employed.

- 10. Provided that the minimum rates and overtime rates shall, during the first three months of a female worker's employment in agriculture, be less by one halfpenny perhour than the rates which, but for this provision, would be applicable to her under the preceding Clauses of this Order.
- 11. For the purpose of the above rates the hours of work shall not include meal times, but shall include any time during which, by reason of weather conditions, an employer has prevented from working a worker who was present at the place of employment and ready to work.

The Agricultural Wages Board, as required by Section 5 (4) of the above Act and by paragraph 4 of the above-mentioned Regulations, will consider any objections to the above proposed Order which may be lodged with them within one month from the date of this Notice. Provided that in the case of a female worker the minimum rates and overtime rates shall during the first three months of her employment in agriculture be less by one halfpenny per hour than the rates which but for this provision would be applicable to her under the preceding clauses of this Order.
- 4. For the purposes of the above rates the following employment is defined as overtime employment, that is to say:—
- (1) In all the areas described in the Schedule to this Order.
 - (a) All employment on a Sunday.
 - (b) All employment on a weekday before the hour of 7 a.m. or after the hour of 5 p.m.
- (2) In the areas hereinafter mentioned all employment on a weekday in excess of the number of hours hereinafter specified, that is to say:—

- 5. For the purpose of the above rates the expressions "summer" and "winter" shall, as regards any area above-mentioned, bear the same respective meanings as they bear in the Order of the Agricultural Wages Board fixing minimum rates of wages for male

workmen employed in agriculture in that area.

6. The above rates shall apply (according to the terms above set forth) to all female workers who are wholly or partly employed in agriculture within the meaning of Section 17 (1) of the Corn Production Act, 1917, in any of the areas above-mentioned, during such time as they are so employed.

7. For the purpose of the above rates the hours of work shall not include meal times, but shall include any time during which, by reason of weather conditions, an employer has prevented from working a worker who was present at the place of employment and ready to work.

- (3) The differential rates for overtime in the case of employment of any workman to whom this notice applies shall, in lieu of any differential rates which would otherwise be applicable, be as follows:—

(a) In respect of overtime employment

on weekdays, 10d. per hour.

(b) In respect of overtime employment

on a Sunday, 1s. per hour.

ORDER AS TO BENEFITS AND ADVANTAGES WHICH MAY BE RECKONED AS PAYMENT OF WAGES IN LIEU OF PAYMENT IN CASH.

The Agricultural Wages Board (England and Wales) duly established and constituted

under Section 5 (1) of the above Act, and the Regulations made by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, dated the 8th November, 1917, in pursuance of the powers given to them by Section 12 (1) (b) of the above Act and by the Agricultural Wages Regulations, 1918, and of all other powers enabling them, and having given the Notice prescribed by the lastmentioned Regulations, and having considered all objections duly lodged with them, do hereby Order as follows, that is to say:

- 1. The benefits or advantages which may be reckoned as payment of wages in lieu of payment in cash for the purpose of any minimum rate of wages which may be fixed under the above Act, are hereby defined to include the provision by an employer for a workman employed by him of-
 - (1) Milk, including skimmed or separated milk.
 - (2) Potatoes.
 - (3) Lodging, except in any case in which the District Wages Committee shall determine that the lodging accommodation provided is so defective as to be injurious to health.
 - Board, including any meals, but not including intoxicating drink.
 - (5) A Cottage, including any garden hitherto given or let with the cottage, except where the cottage is one in regard to which the Medical Officer of Health has reported that it is in a state so dangerous or injurious to health as to be unfit for human habitation.
- 2. The values at which the said benefits or advantages are to be reckoned for the purpose aforesaid are hereby defined to be-
 - (1) In the case of milk the current producers' wholesale price (to be ascertained and determined by the District Wages Committee as hereinafter provided).
 - (2) In the case of potatoes the current producers' wholesale price (to be ascertained and determined by the District Wages Committee as hereinafter provided) at the time at which the maincrop of potatoes is lifted.

Provided that where any payment is made by the workman for the provision of the milk or potatoes, an equivalent de-duction shall be made from the value at which the benefit or advantage is to be reckoned.

- (3) In the case of lodging, such weekly sum as the District Wages Committee shall determine.
- (4) In the case of board, such weekly sum as the District Wages Committee shall determine.
- 5) In the case of a cottage, three shillings per week, less any rent or rates which may be paid by the occupier, and so that the said value shall in no case exceed three shillings per week.

Provided that this definition of the value of the provision of a cottage shall not apply-

(a) to cottages in the area of a District Wages Committee or in any defined part thereof when the said Committee shall have determined that the average value customarily attached to cottages occupied by workmen employed in agriculture and free from defects of accommodation, repair sanitation (including water supply) in. that area or part is less than 3s., and in that case the value at which the pro-vision of a cottage may be reckoned as payment of wages in lieu of payment in. cash shall be such less sum as the said. Committee shall determine; or

(b) to a cottage with regard to which the District Wages Committee on an: application by or on behalf of the work-

man shall at any time

- (i) certify that the cottage is defective by reason of inadequate accommodation, want of repair, or sanitation (including water supply), and is of less value than a cotttage which is free from such defects; and
- (ii) determine the amount by which the value of the cottage occupied is less than the value of such a cottage,. and in that case the value at which the provision of the cottage may be reckoned as payment of wages in lieu of payment in cash shall not exceed 3s. a week less the amount so determined. by the Committee and also less any rent and rates which may be paid by the occupier.
- 3. (1) Subject to and for the purposes of this Order every District Wages Committee shall from time to time in respect of their area or any defined part of their area:
 - (a) ascertain and determine the current. producers' wholesale prices of milk and potatoes and
 - (b) determine the amounts of the weekly sums at which the values of the provision of lodging and board are to be reckoned.
- (2) In determining the amounts of the said. weekly sums a District Wages Committee may specify sums varying according to the character of the lodging accommodation and meals provided, and shall have regard to the current prices within their area or the defined. part thereof of articles included in such accommodation and meals and to the normal or average values at which under current contracts for employment in agriculture within such area or part such accommodation and meals appear to be reckoned.
- 4. Every determination of a District Wages Committee under this Order shall be reported as soon as may be to the Agricultural Wages Board, who may vary such determination in any case and shall publish or notify the same (including such variation, if any) in such manner as they think fit with a view to bringing the same so far as practicable to the knowledge of the persons affected thereby.
- 5. (1) In this Order the expression "District Wages Committee" means any District Wages Committee established under the District Wages Committee's Regulations, 1918.
- (2) Any power or duty of a District Wages Committee under this Order may be delegated to a sub-Committe or sub-Committees thereof subject to the provisions of Clause 18 of the District Wages Committee's Regulations, 1918.
- 6. Except as in this Order provided no benefit or advantage shall be reckoned as

payment of wages in lieu of payment in cash for the purposes of any minimum rate of wages fixed under the Corn Production Act, 1917.

7. This Order shall come into operation on the ninth day of September, 1918.

ADMIRALTY NOTICE TO MARINERS.

No. 1034 of the year 1918.

ENGLAND, SOUTH COAST.

(1) Falmouth Harbour Approach—Traffic Regulations.

Former Notices.—Nos. 88, 151, 317, 452, 551, 673, 794 and 922 of 1918.

All vessels bound to or from Falmouth harbour must pass between the two light-buoys situated at a distance of about 3 miles southwestward from St. Anthony point lighthouse as shown on charts, and maintain a course 0° (N. 17° E. Mag.) and 180° (S. 17° W. Mag.), respectively, for a distance of a quarter of a mile from the light-buoys.

Any instructions given by the patrol vessels should be strictly observed. Vessels proceeding eastward must obtain instructions as to the route to be followed before attempting to leave the anchorage.

Inward-bound vessels will have priority over outward-bound vessels in respect of passage through the ship-passage. Vessels entering Falmouth harbour must close the Drifter, stationed about half a mile to the southward of the two light-buoys defining the ship-passage.

This Drifter regulates inward-bound and cutward-bound traffic. When no signals are exhibited by day or night by this Drifter, inward-bound traffic may proceed to pass through the ship-passage.

To indicate that the ship-passage is clear for outward-bound vessels, the Drifter will display by day a black shape and by night two horizontal white lights.

During fog three long blasts on the steam whistle, repeated at intervals of five minutes, will indicate that the ship-passage is clear for outward-bound traffic.

Vessels approaching Falmouth in foggy weather should be careful to sound the regulation fog-signal and to proceed with great caution when within a depth of 30 fathoms at all states of the tide.

When the ship-passage is clear for inward-bound traffic, no outward-bound vessel may approach within half a mile of the ship-passage; and when the signals indicate that outward-bound traffic may pass through the ship-passage no inward-bound vessels may approach within half a mile of the ship-passage.

During the hours of darkness all vessels entering or leaving Falmouth harbour must

exhibit their side-lights.

(2) Penzance Bay-Traffic Regulations.

All vessels bound to or from Penzance bay must pass between the two light-buoys situated at a distance of about 1½ miles southeastward from St. Paul church, north-westward of Mousehole, as shown on charts, and maintain a course 0° (N. 17° E. Mag.) and 180° (S. 17° W. Mag.), respectively, for a distance of a quarter of a mile from the light-buoys.

Vessels approaching from the eastward must keep to the southward of the parallel of lat. 50° 02′ N., until reaching a position about 3 miles southward of the ship-passage, which

should then be steered for.

Any instructions given by the patrol vessels

should be strictly observed.

Inward-bound vessels will have priority over outward-bound vessels in respect of passage through the ship-passage.

Vessels entering Penzance Bay must close the Drifter, stationed about half a mile to the southward of the two light-buoys defining the

ship-passage.

This Drifter regulates inward-bound and outward-bound traffic. When no signals are exhibited by day or night by this Drifter, inward-bound traffic may proceed to pass through the ship-passage.

To indicate that the ship-passage is clear for outward-bound vessels, the Drifter will display by day a black shape and by night two hori-

zontal white lights.

During fog three long blasts on the steam whistle, repeated at intervals of five minutes, will indicate that the ship-passage is clear for outward-bound traffic.

Vessels making Mounts bay in foggy weather should be careful to sound the regulation fogsignal and to proceed with great caution when within a depth of 25 fathoms at all states of the tide.

When the ship-passage is clear for inward-bound traffic, no outward-bound vessel may approach within half a mile of the ship-passage; and when the signals indicate that outward-bound traffic may pass through the ship-passage, no inward-bound vessel may approach within half a mile of the ship-passage.

within half a mile of the ship-passage.

During the hours of darkness, all vessels entering or leaving Penzance bay must exhibit

their side-lights.

Before attempting to leave Penzance bay, outward-bound vessels must obtain instructions as to the route to be followed.

Notice is hereby given that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and are now in force:—

(1) Pentland and Moray Firths—Restriction of Traffic; Pilotage and Traffic Regulations.

The following regulations have been made with a view to safeguarding the interests of shipping in the Pentland and Moray firths:—

I.—RESTRICTION OF TRAFFIC.

- 1. No vessel, either British, Allied or Neutral, is to be in the shaded area on the accompanying portion of Admiralty Chart No. 2, from half an hour after sunset to half an hour before sunrise, unless at anchor. No vessel, however, is to anchor:—
 - (a) Anywhere along the coast between Tarbet ness and North Sutor, except within one mile radius of Balintore;
 - (b) Anywhere off the south shore of the Moray firth between the meridians of Port Gordon and Burghead, except within three-quarters of a mile of the low-water mark;

(c) Outside a distance of one mile of the coast in any other portion of the shaded

Notwithstanding the above order a limited number of fishing drifters are allowed to fish at night by special permit within certain areas in the Moray firth.

2. Vessels proceeding to ports in the Moray firth should endeavour to enter the firth in time to reach their destinations not later than half an hour after sunset. Should they not reach their destinations by that time they are to anchor, weather permitting, subject to the restrictions given in clause I.

restrictions given in clause 1.

3. Any vessel contravening the foregoing regulations will run the gravest risk of being

sunk

Caution.—Neutral or Allied vessels are particularly warned that the passage through the Pentland firth presents very grave risks to a Westbound vessel and are strongly advised not to take it.

II.—Cromarty and Inverness and Approaches —Pilotage and Traffic Regulations.

Port of Cromarty and Approaches.

1. Pilotage is compulsory at the port of Cromarty for all vessels (including fishing vessels) which have a draught of over eight feet, and it is highly dangerous for any vessel to enter or leave without a pilot. Fishing and other small vessels having a draught of over eight feet are to assemble at the Pilotage stations, and will be conducted into and out of the port in groups.

Vessels bound for Cromarty will be led through the defences from a position off Tarbet ness by a pilot boat. They should follow directly astern of her.

· Local arrangements for leading vessels through the defences will be made for vessels leaving Cromarty.

2. It is dangerous for any vessel to be under

way to the south-westward of a line joining Tarbet ness and Findhorn without a pilot.

3. No vessels of any description other than H.M. Ships and Auxiliaries are to be under way betwen sunset and sunrise in the waters contained between a line drawn from Tarbet ness to Findhorn, and a line drawn from Fort George to Chanonry point.


Port of Inverness and Approaches.

1. All Merchant Vessels, including Fishing craft, are to speak the Examination vessel off carefully observe the rule of the road whilst

keeping out of the way of larger vessels.

4. No vessel (other than H.M. Ships and allied Men-of-War) or boat shall without special permission move in or approach the Port during the hours of official night, and no boat (other than those belonging to H.M. Ships and allied Men-of-War) shall without special permission approach the shore or go alongside any pier or wharf in the Port of Inverness.

5. Pilotage is compulsory for all vessels of



Cromarty, and are to obtain permission from her to proceed into the Port of Inverness, the seaward entrances to which are dangerous.

2. Merchant vessels shall obey all orders given them by the Naval Port Authorities as regards anchoring or shifting berth.

3. Vessels proceeding in the same direction must not attempt to overtake and pass a vessel ahead in any of the channels in the Firth, or within the seaward entrances of the North and South channels.

This is not intended to apply to small fishing craft, and vessels of similar size, which must 8 feet draught and over (other than H.M. Ships and allied Men-of-War) entering or leaving the Port of Inverness, unless otherwise ordered by the Naval Authorities.

6. Vessels, when cleared, shall wait for the orders from Naval Authorities before leaving.

7. Drifters engaged on Inverness Pilotage duty will fly the Pilot flag and will be stationed at the Examination anchorage off Cromarty and all vessels arriving are to close the drifter flying this flag, after speaking the Examina-tion vessel, and obey any orders they may receive.

8. Incoming and outgoing traffic will be regulated by signals hoisted at Fort George and on the Control vessel stationed seaward of the entrance to the port.

Traffic signals are to be strictly obeyed, and no vessel shall approach the entrances when the signals displayed are not in her favour, and no outgoing vessel is to approach Chanonry point within half a mile whilst the

signals are against her.

10. Vessels proceeding with the tidal stream will, as a rule, be given priority over those proceeding against the tidal stream, but the signals are equally applicable to all vessels, entering or leaving the harbour, and they are only to use the channel between the lightbuoys defining the ship passages.

11. Incoming and outgoing vessels shall not pass through the ship passages simultaneously. If through any misunderstanding an outgoing and an incoming ship are approaching the ship passages simultaneously, then the ship proceeding against the tidal stream shall give way

and wait until the entrance is clear.

12. Vessels are to pass through the ship passages at a speed not exceeding 12 knots.

13. Inward-bound vessels, with special permission to be under way in Inverness firth and approaches during the hours of official night, when within 3 miles of the whistlebuoy off Cromarty and until they arrive at their anchorage within the Port of Inverness are to exhibit navigation lights (with the exception of a stern light, which is not to be shown), dimmed as provided for in Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 872 of 1918, or any subsequent revision or republication thereof.

Outgoing vessels are to carry similar lights which are to be extinguished as soon as they

are past Cromarty.

- 14. All vessels under way within the limits of the Port of Inverness are to exhibit navigation lights during the daylight hours, when owing to mist or other weather conditions the visibility is sufficiently low to render such a course desirable.
- 15. Vessels at anchor in the Port of Inverness and approaches are to obey all orders given them by the Naval Authorities as to the exhibition or obscuring of riding lights and darkening of ships.

(2) Orkney Isles—Traffic Regulations.

I.—Scapa Flow and Approaches.

1. All entrances are dangerous, and entry is absolutely prohibited by any of them except as provided in succeeding paragraphs.

- 2. Examination services have been established in the entrances to Hoxa and Hoy sounds; vessels directed to enter must communicate with the Examination vessel and follow the instructions received from her very
- 3. No vessel is permitted to approach the entrance to Hoxa sound within a radius of 5 miles under any circumstances whatever, except when actually ordered to Scapa Flow.

4. The only vessels permitted to enter Hoy sound from the westward are those ordered to

5. Vessels are not permitted to enter Hoxa or Hoy sounds by night or in thick weather.

6. Passage through Cantick sound is entirely prohibited.

- II .- PORT OF KIRKWALL AND APPROACHES.
- 1. The port of Kirkwall shall comprise all enclosed waters of the Wide Firth and Kirkwall bay to westward of Thieves holm.
- 2. Merchant vessels shall obey all orders given them by the Admiralty Port Officer as regards anchoring or shifting position.
- 3. No vessel other than H.M. Ships shall enter or leave the Port of Kirkwall during hours of darkness, i.e., between half an hour after sunset and half an hour before sunrise, except in special circumstances with special permission from the Admiralty Port Officer.
- 4. During foggy and thick weather, traffic in and out of the port is stopped, and no vessel shall approach the boom from either direction.
- 5. No vessel other than H.M. Ships or boat shall move in the harbour during hours of darkness as aforesaid. And no boat other than those belonging to H.M. Ships shall approach the shore or go alongside any pier in the Port of Kirkwall.
- 6. All vessels other than H.M. Ships entering or leaving the Port of Kirkwall shall be piloted in and out by a Pilot drifter, and are prohibited from entering or leaving harbour unless so piloted, save and except only, (1) in the case of such British vessels as have a written exemption therefrom, issued by the Admiralty Port Officer, (2) when a liner is entering the harbour, the Pilot may at his discretion, when circumstances of tide and sea render it advisable, direct such liner to enter the harbour without being piloted, provided always that the gate is open for incoming traffic.
- 7. Vessels, when cleared, shall wait for the Pilot vessel to conduct them out of port, or proceed as directed by the Naval Authorities.
- 8. Drifters engaged on pilot duty will fly the pilot flag (white and red, horizontal).
- 9. Incoming and outgoing traffic will be regulated by signals hoisted at the yardarm of the Boom trawler and repeated at the Hellier holm lighthouse.
- 10. Traffic signals are to be strictly obeyed, and no vessel shall approach the entrance against the signal.
- 11. The following Traffic signals will be displayed at the Boom and at Hellier holm:-

Gate "Open for Incoming Traffic":

By day—Two balls, vertical.

By night—A red light.

Gate "Open for Outgoing Traffic":

By day—A cone, point upwards.

By night—A green light.

Gate closed:

By day—Three balls at Hellier holm. By night—Three red lights at Hellier

holm. 12. Vessels entering will, as a rule, be given priority over those leaving.

- 13. All outgoing vessels shall pass round the Turning buoy (red and white striped, spherical) moored approximately 285° (N. 56° \overline{W} . Mag.), one mile from the entrance.
- 14. Incoming vessels will not pass round the Turning buoy, but will shape course as requisite for the anchorage on entering.
- 15. No outgoing vessel shall pass the Turning buoy, unless the signal for outgoing traffic is up. If the signal is against it, such vessel shall

stop and wait in the neighbourhood of the Turning buoy.

- 16. No incoming vessel shall pass Hellier holm, unless the signal for incoming traffic is up at Hellier holm. If the signal is against it, such vessel shall wait in Shapinsay sound.
- 17. Incoming and outgoing vessels shall not pass through the gate simultaneously. If, through any misunderstanding, an outgoing and an incoming ship are approaching the gate simultaneously, then the outgoing ship shall give way and shall turn round, and return to the Turning buoy and there wait till such time as the entrance is clear.
- 18. As a rule only one ship will be conducted out at a time, but under exceptional circumstances, in the event of two ships being conducted out, then the pilot will give instructions as to which ship is to go first and the rear ship shall then keep a full half mile directly astern, and is on no account to close or overhaul or attempt to pass the ship ahead.
- 19. Caution.—Caution is necessary when approaching the boom, as the tidal stream does not set fairly through the opening and attains considerable velocity especially on the ebb or west-going stream, which sets in a north-westerly direction.

Variation.—19° W.

(3) Shetland Isles—Traffic of Neutral Vessels Prohibited.

No vessels other than those of British Nationality or those of the Allied Nations, except vessels calling for the purpose of Examination, shall enter any ports or harbours in, or anchor off any part of, the coasts of the Shetland Isles until further notice.

Note.—Special traffic regulations for the Port of Lerwick and approaches will be found in Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 767 of 1917.

Tor Bay Approaches—Traffic Regulations. Former Notices.—Nos. 795 and 923 of 1918.

Two ship-passages have been established as follows:—

Northern ship-passage, 600 feet wide, marked by light-buoys on either side, situated $5\frac{3}{4}$ cables, 142° (S. 22° E. Mag.), from the Ore Stone \triangle . This ship-passage is to be used by:—

(1) All vessels approaching Tor Bay from the eastward.

Such vessels should make a position one mile, 44° (N. 60° E. Mag.), from the ship-passage and enter on a course 224° (S. 60° W. Mag.) till half a mile beyond the ship-passage.

(2) All east-bound vessels leaving Tor Bay. Such vessels should steer so as to pass through the ship-passage on a course 44° (N. 60° E. Mag.) and should continue on this course for one mile, when course is to be altered to join the route in force.

Southern ship-passage, 600 feet wide, marked by light-buoys on either side, situated 7 cables, 84° (S. 80° E. Mag.), from Berry Head light-house. This ship-passage is to be used by:—

(1) All vessels approaching Tor Bay from the southward and westward.

Such vessels should make a position one mile, 144° (S. 20° E. Mag.), from the ship-passage, and enter on a course 324° (N. 20° W. Mag.) till half a mile beyond the ship-passage.

(2) All south and west-bound vessels.

Such vessels should steer so as to pass through the ship-passage on a course 144° (S. 20° E. Mag.) and should continue on this course for a mile beyond the ship-passage, when course is to be altered to join the route in force.

Caution is necessary when entered southern ship-passage as the stream sets obliquely across the entrance. A drifter regulates traffic through each ship-passage, and when no signal's are displayed by these drifters by day or by night the ship-passage is open for incoming traffic.

To indicate that the ship-passage is open for outgoing traffic these drifters will display:—

By day, a black shape.

By night, two horizontal white lights.

No outgoing vessel is to approach within half a mile of the ship-passage unless this signal is displayed and permission has been given to proceed.

Priority will be given to incoming vessels over outgoing vessels in respect to passage through the ship-passages, but incoming vessels are not to approach within half a mile of the ship-passages while they are open to outgoing vessels. All vessels entering or leaving Tor Bay during darkness must exhibit their side lights.

During fog three long blasts on the steam whistle repeated at intervals of five minutes will indicate that the ship-passages are clear for outgoing vessels.

Vessel's approaching Tor bay in foggy weather should sound the regulation fog-signal and proceed with great caution.

Anchorage Regulations.

All orders given by the patrols are to be strictly carried out.

Vessels entering Tor bay anchorage in order

to bunker at Brixham, and westbound vessels in ballast which are weather-bound and unable to round Start Point are to anchor as directed in Brixham roads to the westward of a line drawn in a 0° (N. 16° E. Mag.) direction from Brixham breakwater light, and to the southward of a line drawn in a 90° (S. 74° E. Mag.) from Goodrington.

Sailing vessels are to anchor as directed on the inshore side of a line drawn in a 219° (N. 45° W. Mag.) direction through Brixham breakwater light, clear of the fairway into Brixham harbour.

All other vessels are to anchor as directed on entering.

REGULATIONS FOR BRIXHAM FISHING VESSELS.

No fishing vessel is on any account to attempt to pass through the ship-passages during the hours of darkness.

Fishing vessels are not to leave Brixham harbour until permission has been obtained from the Port Fishery Officer. The three organised fleets working from Brixham are to follow the motions of the Admiral of their fleet in respect to leaving harbour.

The conduct of these fleets is dealt with by local orders.

In addition to the restrictions to fishing laid down in Admiralty Notices to Mariners:—

Trawling or drifting is prohibited within two miles of the obstruction in any direction.

The laying of nets, crab or any other pots, or anchoring for the purpose of fishing with hand lines is entirely prohibited within half a mile of the obstruction in any direction.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING SMALL CRAFT AND PLEASURE BOATS.

The following regulations are to apply to all small craft and pleasure boats (exclusive of bona fide commercial fishing craft sailing under fishing permits) using the harbours of Brixham, Paignton and Torquay.

No small craft or pleasure boat will be permitted to go outside the ship-passages.

Small craft with amateur fishing permits can obtain special permission to pass through the ship-passages between the hours of sunrise and sunset provided they keep within the three-mile limit from their port. Such permission must be obtained from the Senior Naval Officer, Torquay, through the Station Officer of the Coastguard Station.

Small craft must not go alongside, or hold communication with any vessel in the anchorage unless special permission from the Senior Naval Officer has been obtained to do so.

- 1. Two light-vessels and four light-buoys have been established to mark a gateway in the Dover channel off Folkestone, as shown on the charts.
- 2. Shipping is hereby warned that the only passage for traffic proceeding between the Downs and Dungeness is between the North-East and South-East gate light-buoys and then between North and South Folkestone gate light-vessels shown on the chart, and between North-West and South-West gate light-buoys and vice versa, and that Article 25 of the Collision Regulations must be complied with, that is to say, East-bound traffic must keep to the Southern side of the passage and West-bound traffic must keep to the Northern side. Ships disregarding this warning will do so at their own peril.
- 3. Caution.—Mariners are warned to exercise great caution when approaching the ships' passage between the Folkestone gate light-vessels, as the tidal streams may at times set obliquely across the passage. - 7. British Merchant vessels approaching the Straits of Dover are to hoist their number in the International Code.
- 8. Caution.—Mariners are warned that light-buoys which are not shown on the chart may be met with between the parallels of lat. 51° 04′ N. and 51° 20′ N.

A ship-passage, 500 feet in width, has also been established at the entrance to South channel. This ship-passage is marked on its western side by a light-buoy situated about 63 cables south-eastward from Stone on Kingscross point as shown on chart.

All vessels bound for Lamlash must approach by the Northern channel, and maintain a course 244° (S. 82° W. Mag.) for a distance of a quarter of a mile on either side of the light-buoy, which should be left on the starboard hand at a distance not exceeding

75 yards.
Vessels must not attempt to enter by the Southern channel unless they have been definitely ordered by their route instructions or a Clyde Patrol vessel to do so, when they must maintain a course 329° (N. 13° W. When using the Northern channel, inwardbound vessels will be given priority over those outward bound.

Vessels entering are to close the drifter, which will be lying off the ship-passage, for instructions. Any instructions which may be given by Patrol vessels in the outer reaches of the Clyde must also be strictly observed.

The drifter regulates the traffic both inward and outward bound as follows:

To indicate the ship passage is clear for inward-bound traffic, she will display at both yard-arms:

By day—Two black balls hoisted vertic-

By night—One red light.

To indicate that the ship-passage is clear for outward-bound traffic, she will display at both yard-arms:

By day-One black cone, point up. By night—One green light.

During fog or thick weather, she will sound three long blasts on her steam whistle at intervals of five minutes to indicate that the ship-passage is clear for outward-bound traffic.

There will be no sound signal for inwardbound traffic.

No vessel, either inward or outward bound, is to approach within half a mile of the ship-passage unless the drifter is displaying the traffic signal in her favour.

In foggy or thick weather, vessels approaching are to sound the regulation fog-signals,

and proceed with great caution.
All vessels entering Lamlash by night are

to burn side lights.

Vessels entering Lamlash by day are to anchor to the southward of a line joining the new Pier head and the north end of Holy

Vessels entering during the night may anchor to the northward of this line until the morning.

Before attempting to leave Lamlash, all vessels must obtain instructions as to the route to be followed.

A ship-passage has been established on the northern side of the entrance to Belfast lough, about 8 cables south-eastward from Cloghan The ship-passage is marked by two light-buoys as shown on the charts.

When making for this ship-passage, vessels must maintain a course of 201° (S. 40° W. Mag.) or 21° (N. 40° E. Mag.) for a distance of a quarter of a mile on either side of the ship-

passage.

The Gobbins head light-and-whistle-buoy, exhibiting a flashing red light, situated in lat. 54° 48′ 10″ N., long. 5° 38′ 20″ W., approximately, serves as an additional aid to vessels.

Vessels approaching Belfast must be careful to look out for and close the Patrol vessels off the port, and strictly observe any instructions communicated to them by the Patrol.

A Drifter will be stationed at a distance of about half a mile north-eastward of the ship-

passage.

This Drifter regulates inward-bound and outward-bound traffic. When no signals are exhibited by day or night by this Drifter, inward-bound traffic may proceed to pass* through the ship-passage.

Inward-bound vessels will be given priority over outward-bound vessels in respect of pas-

sage through the ship-passage.

To indicate that the ship-passage is clear for outward-bound vessels the Drifter will display by day a black shape and by night two horizontal white lights.

During fog three long blasts on the steam whistle, repeated at intervals of five minutes, will indicate that the ship-passage is clear for outward-bound traffic.

Vessels approaching Belfast lough in foggy weather should be careful to sound the regula-tion fog-signals, and to proceed with great caution when within a depth of 30 fathoms at all states of the tide.

When the ship-passage is clear for inwardbound traffic, no outward-bound vessel may approach within half a mile of the ship-passage; and when the signals indicate that outwardbound traffic may pass through the ship-passage, no inward-bound vessel may approach within half a mile of the ship-passage.

During the hours of darkness, all vessels entering or leaving must exhibit their sidelights.

Before attempting to leave Belfast lough, outward-bound vessels must obtain instructions as to the route to be followed.
