WHEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-eighth day of November, nineteen hundred and fourteen, His Majesty was pleased to make regulations (called the "Defence of the Realm Regulations") under the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914, for securing the public safety and the defence of the realm:

And whereas the said Act has been amended by the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) Act, 1915, the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) (No. 2) Act, 1915, and the Munitions of War Act, 1915, and other enactments:

And whereas the said regulations have been amended by various subsequent Orders in Council:

And whereas it is expedient further to amend the said regulations in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following amendments be made in the said regulations:—

1. The following regulation shall be substituted for Regulation 9B:—

"9B. It shall not be lawful to hold any

race meeting, that is to say any meeting at which racing with horses, galloways or ponies which is open to the public, whether on payment or otherwise, takes place; and if an attempt is made to hold a race meeting in contravention of this regulation it shall be lawful to take such steps as may be necessary to prevent the holding thereof; and if any person takes part in the control management or organisation of any such meeting, or allows any horse, galloway or pony to run at such meeting, or brings any horse, galloway, or pony to a place where any such meeting is proposed to be held for the purpose of taking part in a race, he shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations:

"Provided that nothing in this regulation shall apply to a race meeting held in Great Britain under the authority of the Stewards of the Jockey Club or the National Hunt Committee in pursuance of any scheme or programme of racing sanctioned by the Army Council in consultation with the Board of Trade, or a race meeting held in Ireland in pursuance of any arrangements made by the Lord Lieutenant with the Irish Turf Club."

2. The following regulation shall be substituted for Regulation 11A:—

"11A. The Minister of Munitions, with a view to maintaining or increasing the supply of light, heat, or power for the purpose of the production, repair or transport of war mate-

rial or any other work necessary for the successful prosecution of the war, may

(a) by order direct that lights of any specified class or description shall be extinguished or their use restricted to such extent, between such hours, within such area, on such premises, and during such period, as may be specified in the order; or

(b) prohibit, restrict or otherwise regulate and control the supply, or means of supply, of electricity to, or its use in, any premises or class of premises, or any place or undertaking,

and if any person having control of any light, or occupying or having control of, or managing, or being in charge of, premises in on or in connection with which any light is used acts in contravention of any such order as to lights, or if any person fails to comply with or acts in contravention of any order or requirement hereunder as to the supply, or means of supply, or use of electricity he shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations:

"Provided that (i) this regulation shall not apply to any lights required to be kept lighted by a competent naval or military authority, or other officer authorized by him for the purpose, or under any order made under Regulation 11 by the Secretary of State, or the Secretary for Scotland; and (ii) no order or requirement shall be made for the closing of any power station belonging to any local authority or for the connection of any such power station with any other power station except with the concurrence of the appropriate Government Department, and if any question arises as to which Government Department is the appropriate Government Department the question shall be finally determined by the Treasury."

3. The following paragraph shall be inserted in Regulation 14B after the words "specified in the order" where they thirdly occur:—

"The Secretary of State may make any such order as aforesaid with respect to any alien in any case where in his opinion the making of the order is calculated to secure the safety of any British subject in any foreign country."

In the same regulation for "Provided that any such order" there shall be substituted the words "Provided that any order under this regulation."

4. In Regulation 21A "without lawful authority or excuse" shall be omitted, and after "not belonging to him" there shall be inserted the words "and without the authority of the owner."

5. The following paragraph shall be substituted for the 2nd paragraph of sub-section 13 of Regulation 56:—

"For the purposes of this regulation the expression 'press offence' means:—

(a) the publication in print, or communication for the purpose of publication in print, of any information in contravention of Regulation 18, or the having in possession any printed publication in contravention of that regulation;

(b) any offence under Regulation 27 in connection with any printed publication;

(c) any offence under Regulation 27A or 27AA, other than an offence under either of those regulations committed by means of a

public speech, and any offence under Regulation 27c;

(d) the attempting to commit, or the soliciting or inciting or endeavouring to persuade another person to commit, or the procuring aiding or abetting, or the doing of any act preparatory to the commission of, any offence which is a press offence within the meaning of paragraph (a), paragraph (b) or paragraph (c);

and where a person alleged to be guilty of an offence which is a press offence within the meaning of this provision is also alleged to be guilty of any other offence against these regulations in relation to the matter in respect of which the press offence is alleged to have been committed, that other offence shall also be treated as a press offence.

"The decision of the Director of Public Prosecutions, the Lord Advocate, or the Attorney-General for Ireland, as the case may be, that an alleged offence is, or is to be treated as, a press offence, shall be final and conclusive."

6. The following regulation shall be inserted after Regulation 64:—

"64A. Where by any order made under these regulations by any Government Department or authority and for the time being in force, any clauses or words are directed to be added to or omitted from a previous order so made by the same Government Department or authority, or to be substituted for any other clauses or words in such a previous order, then copies of that previous order printed under the authority of His Majesty's Stationery Office after such direction takes effect may be printed with the clauses or words so added omitted or substituted, and the clauses and paragraphs thereof numbered in accordance with such direction, and that previous order shall be construed as if it had, at the time at which such direction takes effect, or at such other time as may be directed by the amending order, been made with such addition, omission, or substitution."

position lights (two white lights vertical, 8 feet apart, hoisted at the Peak, or, if no gaff, hoisted abreast the maintop in the middle line of the ship *or on the Ensign Staff*) by night, as a general warning. The Pilot Jack shall also be hoisted by day, or position lights by night, on the Flagstaff at Mount Wise for the same purpose, and all other vessels under way in the Dockyard Port of Devonport or in the narrow waters of Plymouth Sound shall keep out of the way of the said vessel flying the Red Ensign over 'M' flag, or showing a red light at the foremast head; provided always that the said vessel shall be navigated with due care and at a moderate speed."

under the authority of the statutes hereinbefore mentioned, does not exceed 2 years' income of the See) should be provided by borrowing the same by way of mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands, tenements, and hereditaments, endowments or emoluments, which now belong or may hereafter belong to the Bishopric of Ely:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Frederic Henry, Bishop of Ely, (testified by his having affixed his signature and episcopal seal to this Scheme), We, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that the said Bishop be authorized to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and that the said Governors be empowered to lend under the provisions of the above-mentioned Acts, a sum not exceeding £200, and that as a security for the same the said Bishop do mortgage all and every part of the lands, tenements, and hereditaments, and endowments or emoluments, which now belong, or may hereafter belong, to his said See to the said Governors by deed for the term of 15 years, or until the said sum of £200 with the interest for the same as hereinafter mentioned, and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof, shall be fully paid and satisfied, and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in manner following, that is to say, during and in respect of the first period of 12 months of the said term of 15 years, computed from the day of the date of the mortgage, no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable, but the said Bishop, or his Successors, shall yearly at the end of the second period of 12 months, so computed, and at the end of every such like period of 12 months thereafter, pay to the said Governors, their Successors or Assigns, one-tenth part of the said principal sum until the whole thereof shall be repaid, and shall also at the end of the first and each succeeding period of 12 months, computed as aforesaid, pay interest at the rate of £4 per cent. per annum on the said principal sum, or so much thereof as shall, from time to time, remain unpaid, and if and when it shall happen that either the principal or the interest directed to be paid, as hereinbefore mentioned, shall be in arrear, and unpaid for the space of 40 days after the same shall have become due, it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors, their Successors and Assigns, to recover the same and the costs and charges attending the recovery thereof, by distress and sale in the like manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from their tenants, by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale, and that such Mortgage Deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be approved by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, and shall bind as well the said Frederic Henry, now Bishop of Ely, as every succeeding Bishop of Ely, until the principal money and interest, costs and charges, shall have been paid off and discharged.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 9TH SEPTEMBER 1918.)

CORNWALL AND DEVON (CONTROL OF DOGS) ORDER OF 1918.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, the Dogs Act, 1906, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Movement of Dogs out of Cornwall and Devon prohibited.

1. No dog shall be moved out of the area comprising the administrative counties of Cornwall and Devon and the county boroughs of Exeter and Plymouth: Provided that this Article shall not apply to:—

(a) the movement of a dog under a licence granted by the Board under the Importation of Dogs Order of 1914 to a port in Great Britain for shipment, or to a place of detention for the purpose of detention and isolation; or

(b) the movement of a dog through the said area by railway from a place outside the area to another place outside the area without unnecessary delay and without being re-booked within the area.

Control of Dogs in Scheduled District No. 1.

2. Every dog in the District described in the First Schedule hereto, herein referred to as the Scheduled District No. 1, shall at all times be kept under control by being—

(i) confined in a kennel or other enclosure from which the dog cannot escape; or

(ii) secured to some premises by a collar and chain; or

(iii) efficiently muzzled with an effective cage muzzle or led by a person with a collar and chain or other attachment.

Control of Dogs in Scheduled District No. II.

3. Every dog in the District described in the Second Schedule hereto, herein referred to as the Scheduled District No. II., shall at all times be kept under control by being—

(i) confined in a kennel or other enclosure from which the dog cannot escape; or

(ii) secured to some premises by a collar and chain; or

(iii) efficiently muzzled with an effective cage muzzle; or

(iv) accompanied by the owner or some person deputed by him and under effectual control.

Seizure, Detention, and Disposal of Uncontrolled Dogs.

4. (1) Any dog in the Scheduled District No. I. or No. II., which is not kept under control in manner prescribed by this Order, may be seized by the Local Authority or by the police, and any dog so seized shall be dealt with by the Local Authority as follows:

(i) If the dog is diseased or suspected, or has been bitten by a diseased or suspected dog, it shall be forthwith slaughtered.

(ii) If the dog has been exposed to the infection of rabies it shall be detained, slaughtered, or otherwise dealt with as the Local Authority think expedient, but so that the dog shall not, while detained by the Local Authority, be allowed to come in contact with any other animal.

(iii) In any other case the dog shall be treated as a stray dog seized under the powers conferred by section three of the Dogs Act, 1906.

(2) No dog so seized shall be given or sold for the purposes of vivisection.

(3) Every dog shall, for the purposes of this Article, be deemed to have been exposed to the infection of rabies which has been in the same shed, stable, building, kennel, field, or other place, or otherwise in contact with any diseased or suspected dog, or which has in any other way been exposed to the infection of rabies.

Offences.

5. (1) If a dog is moved in contravention of Article 1 of this Order, the owner of the dog, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the dog, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the dog is moved shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2) If any dog in the Scheduled District No. I. or No. II. is not kept under control in manner prescribed by this Order, the owner of the dog, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

6. In this Order—

“ The Act of 1894 ” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

“ Diseases ” means rabies, “ diseased ” means affected with rabies, and “ suspected ” means suspected of rabies.

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Rabies Order of 1897.

Local Authority to Enforce Order.

7. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Short Title.

8. This Order may be cited as the Cornwall and Devon (Control of Dogs) Order of 1918.
