## BY THE KING. A PROCLAMATION

RELATING TO THE IMPORTATION OF CERTAIN  
ARTICLES INTO THE UNITED KINGDOM.

GEORGE R.I.

**W**HEREAS by Section forty-three of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876, it is provided that the importation of arms, ammunition, gunpowder, or any other goods may be prohibited by Proclamation:

And whereas by certain Proclamations entitled Prohibition of Import Proclamations the importation of certain goods has been prohibited accordingly:

And whereas it is expedient that the importation into the United Kingdom of certain other goods should be prohibited:

Now, therefore, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, in pursuance of the said Act and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby proclaim, direct and ordain as follows:—

As from and after the date hereof, subject as hereinafter provided, the importation into the United Kingdom of the following articles is hereby prohibited, viz.:—

Cassia lignea.  
Fibre flax seed for sowing.  
Pimento.  
Spectacles and eyeglasses complete.

Time-recording instruments of all kinds, and movements and parts thereof.

Watches and parts thereof.

Provided always, and it is hereby declared, that this prohibition shall not apply to any such goods which are imported under licence given by or on behalf of the Board of Trade, and subject to the provisions and conditions of such licence.

This Proclamation may be cited as the Prohibition of Import (No. 27) Proclamation, 1918.

Given at Our Court at *Buckingham Palace*, this Twenty-seventh day of *September*, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and eighteen, and in the Ninth year of Our Reign.

**W**HEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-eighth day of November, nineteen hundred and fourteen, His Majesty was pleased to make regulations (called the

"Defence of the Realm Regulations") under the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914, for securing the public safety and the defence of the realm:

And whereas the said Act has been amended by the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) Act, 1915, the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) (No. 2) Act, 1915, and the Munitions of War Act, 1915, and other enactments:

And whereas the said regulations have been amended by various subsequent Orders in Council:

And whereas it is expedient further to amend the said regulations in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following amendments be made in the said regulations:—

1. After Regulation 2E the following regulation shall be inserted:—

"2EE. (1) The Army Council may, with the concurrence of the Admiralty, the Minister of Munitions, the Board of Trade, the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, the Food Controller, and the Local Government Board, by order—

(a) regulate, prohibit, or give directions with respect to, the collection, preservation, sorting, separation, disposal, treatment, destruction, sale, purchase, delivery, or storage, of waste as defined for the purposes of this regulation or of the order, and may confer on any local authority such powers as appear necessary for the purpose of giving effect to the order; and

(b) authorise any local authority, upon an application by the authority, in any case where refuse is collected by the authority, to utilise any waste as so defined, and for this purpose to provide and use such plant as may be deemed necessary, and to combine upon such terms as may be mutually agreed upon with any other local authority for any purpose authorised in the order in accordance with their powers under this regulation; and

(c) define what articles and material are for the purposes of this regulation or any order made thereunder to be regarded as waste.

(2) If any person contravenes or fails to comply with any provision of any order made under this regulation he shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations.

(3) The Army Council may make arrangements with any other Government Department for the exercise by that Department on their behalf of the powers of the Army Council under this regulation and in such cases the Department shall have for such purpose the same powers as are by this regulation conferred on the Army Council, and the Local Government Board may, by arrangement with the Army Council, confer and impose on any local authorities and their officers any powers and duties for the purpose of the exercise of the said powers and duties of the Army Council.

(4) In the application of this regulation to Scotland the Secretary for Scotland shall be substituted for the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries and the Local Government Board.

(5) In the application of this regulation to

Ireland the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction for Ireland and the Local Government Board for Ireland shall respectively be substituted for the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries and the Local Government Board.

2. Regulation 9AA shall be amended as follows:—

(1) In sub-section (1) the word "and" at the end of paragraph (c) shall be omitted, and at the end of paragraph (d) there shall be inserted the following words:—

"and

(e) the having, keeping or using of a motor cycle by any person, other than a member of His Majesty's Forces or a police constable, without a permit from the competent naval or military authority, or from the chief officer of the police in the district in which the person resides."

(2) In paragraph (a) of sub-section (4) there shall be inserted after the words "military arms" wherever those words occur the words "motor cycles."

(3) At the end of paragraph (c) of sub-section (4) there shall be inserted the words "or any motor cycle used by or in the possession or custody of any person in contravention of any such order."

3. In Regulation 9B the words "sanctioned by the Board of Trade in consultation with the Army Council" shall be substituted for the words "sanctioned by the Army Council in consultation with the Board of Trade."

4. Regulation 19 shall be amended as follows:—

(1) After the words "making any such representation" the following words shall be inserted:—

"The Admiralty or the Army Council may by order prohibit any person from having in his possession, using, taking, or sending any photographic apparatus on board any vessel, either absolutely or otherwise than in accordance with such conditions as may be specified in the order."

(2) After the words "contravenes the provisions of this regulation" there shall be inserted the words "or of any order made thereunder."

5. The following regulation shall be substituted for Regulation 37c:—

"37c. With a view to better securing the safety of British ships and the persons on board them, the Admiralty, the Board of Trade or the Shipping Controller may give directions:—

(a) that the structure of any British ships shall be altered or modified in such manner as may be specified in the directions;

(b) that any such ships shall forthwith be, and continue to be, painted in such manner and fitted with such apparatus, contrivances or appliances as may be so specified;

(c) that such apparatus, contrivances, or appliances shall be kept in such a state or condition, and used in such manner as may be so specified;

(d) that the crews of such ships shall be properly instructed in the use of such apparatus, contrivances or appliances;

(e) that such other precautionary

measures as may be so specified shall be adopted in the case of any such ships;

(f) that such records of the observance of any of the requirements of the directions shall be kept, and such certificates thereof shall be given, as may be so specified.

If any ship with respect to which any such directions have been given puts to sea from any port in the United Kingdom without complying with the directions, the owner or master of the ship shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations, and if the ship is subsequently found at any port of, or in the territorial waters adjacent to, the United Kingdom, the ship may be seized and detained; and if whilst any such ship is at sea there is a failure to comply with any requirements of the directions which are to be observed whilst at sea, the master of the ship or other responsible officer shall be guilty of a like offence."

WHEREAS by the Military Service (Conventions with Allied States) Act, 1917, it is provided that His Majesty may by Order in Council, signifying that a convention or agreement has been made with a country allied to or otherwise acting in naval or military co-operation with His Majesty in the present war (hereinafter referred to as an allied country) which imposes a mutual liability to military service on British subjects in that country and subjects of that country in the United Kingdom, direct that the said Act shall have effect with respect to that allied country and the subjects of that allied country, but that no such Order in Council shall be made unless the following conditions are fulfilled, that is to say:—

(a) Unless the convention or agreement secures to His Majesty's Ambassador or other public Minister in the allied country power to grant to British subjects in that country exemption from military service;

(b) Unless the convention or agreement contains provisions to the effect that British subjects in the allied country and subjects of the allied country in the United Kingdom shall before being liable to military service have an opportunity if they make an application for the purpose of returning to the United Kingdom or the allied country as the case may be;

and it is further provided that no such Order in Council shall be made until the expiration of thirty days from the date on which the convention or agreement is laid before Parliament:

And whereas an agreement dated the day of August, nineteen hundred and eighteen, has been concluded between His Majesty's Government and the Government of His Majesty the King of the Hellenes respecting the liability to military service of British subjects in Greece and Greek subjects in Great

Britain or, in the event of the Military Service Acts, 1916 to 1918, being extended to Ireland, in the United Kingdom:

And whereas a period of thirty days from the date on which the said agreement was laid before Parliament has elapsed:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to signify, and it is hereby signified, that such an agreement as is mentioned in the said Act has been made with Greece, and His Majesty is further pleased, by and with the like advice, to direct, and it is hereby directed, that the said Act shall have effect with respect to Greece and Greek subjects.

WHEREAS by "The Dockyard Ports Regulation Act, 1865," it is enacted (among other things) that it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council, from time to time, by Order in Council to define the limits of a Dockyard Port for the purposes of that Act:

And whereas by the same Act it is also enacted that in relation to any Dockyard Port, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council, from time to time, by Order in Council, to make regulations for all or any of the purposes therein particularly mentioned, and for such other purposes as from time to time seem necessary with a view to the proper protection of His Majesty's vessels, dockyards, or property, or to the requirements of His Majesty's Naval Service:

And whereas in pursuance of the said Act, by Order in Council dated the 29th day of February, 1868, certain regulations were made with reference to the Dockyard Port of Deptford:

And whereas it appears expedient to repeal the said Order in Council and to substitute therefor this Order:

And whereas the provisions of Section 1 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf, by the said Act or otherwise in Him vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order shall take effect on the expiration of thirty days from its publication in the *London Gazette*.

2. On this Order taking effect the said Order of the 29th day of February, 1868, shall cease to operate.

3. The terms used in this Order shall have the same meaning as in the said Dockyard Ports Regulation Act, 1865.

4. No merchant or other private vessel shall be anchored, moored, or placed within the limits following, namely:—

Within sixty fathoms of the wharves of His Majesty's Victualling Yard at Deptford.

5. No merchant or other private vessel shall be anchored, moored, or placed within forty fathoms from the centre of any of His Majesty's moorings in any part of the Thames from the Nore upwards.

6. If at any time the anchor of any merchant or other private vessel hooks any of His Majesty's moorings, the Master of such vessel shall not proceed to unhook the same, but shall forthwith give notice to the King's Harbour Master, or to the Chief Officer of the nearest of His Majesty's dockyards, in order that aid may be given for clearing the mooring without doing any damage to the same.

7. No vessel laid by or neglected as unfit for sea service shall lie within the limits prescribed in Article 4 of this Order.

8. The Master of every Merchant or other private vessel to which this Order relates shall observe, and cause to be observed, the provisions of this Order, as far as relates to his vessel; and if any Master or other person acts in any respect in contravention of any of the provisions of this Order, or fails to observe or to cause the same to be observed, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding the sum of ten pounds.

And whereas in pursuance of the said Act by Order in Council dated the 29th day of February, 1868, certain regulations were made with reference to the Dockyard Port of Woolwich:

And whereas it appears expedient to repeal the said Order in Council:

And whereas the provisions of Section I of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf, by the said Act or otherwise in Him vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Order in Council dated the 29th day of February, 1868, shall cease to operate as from the 1st day of October, 1918.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 7th day of September, 1918, in the words following, viz.:—

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, and other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval and Marine Force to a person being, or having been, an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are, from time to time, directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas it is provided by the Regulations for the government of Your Majesty's Navy that Your Majesty is pleased to reserve to Yourself the consideration of the claims of Officers of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines for Pensions on account of having been wounded or disabled in Your Service, as their several cases shall be represented to Your Majesty by the Admiralty:

"And whereas we are of opinion that, owing to the increase in the number of Officers deserving of such Pensions, the time has come when it is desirable that the procedure now followed in giving effect to the existing Regulations should be simplified:

"And whereas Your Majesty has been pleased, by Your Warrant for the Pay, Appointments, Promotions and Non-Effective Pay of Your Army, to empower the Army Council to administer the grant of Pensions for Wounds in the case of Officers of Your Majesty's Army:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, similarly to authorize us to administer the grant of Pensions for Wounds and Disabilities in the case of Officers of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines under such scales as may be laid down from time to time."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 11th day of September, 1918, in the words following, viz.:—

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or

other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are, from time to time, directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas by Your Majesty's Orders in Council bearing dates the 10th day of January, and the 13th day of March, 1917, certain rates of Separation Allowance are prescribed for the benefit of wives, children, and other dependants of Warrant Officers and Ratings of the Royal Navy, Royal Marines, and Reserve Forces, borne on the books of Your Majesty's Ships during the period of the present War:

"And whereas we are of opinion that it is advisable for the remainder of the War to grant Separation Allowances to the wives, children, and other dependants of Commissioned Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy, Royal Marines, and Reserve Forces, borne on the books of Your Majesty's Ships:

"And whereas under present Regulations the grant of such an Allowance is normally contingent upon the declaration of an allotment by the Officer or Man in respect of whom the allowance is paid, which allotment is deducted from his pay for payment concurrently with the Allowance:

"And whereas we are further of opinion that it is desirable during the remainder of the present War to increase in certain cases the Separation Allowances payable under any of the said Orders or under this Order by a sum not exceeding 3s. 6d. a week, so as to enable the Officers and Men concerned, if they so desire, to reduce the amount of their allotments to their dependants without diminishing the weekly sum in course of payment by way of Separation Allowance and Allotment to, or for the benefit of, their wives, children, and other dependants:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction, with effect from the 4th October, 1917, and for the remaining period of the War, the payment from public funds of Separation Allowances to the wives, children, and other dependants of Commissioned Warrant Officers, borne on Ships' Books, at the rates prescribed for the wives, children, and other dependants of Warrant Officers, and the grant, at our discretion, to any person in receipt of Separation Allowance of additional Separation Allowances at rates not exceeding, in respect of any one man, those set forth in the Schedule hereto.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals.

#### " SCHEDULE.

"Commissioned Warrant Officers, Warrant Officers, Chief Petty Officers, Petty Officers, and Men of the Royal Navy, Commissioned Warrant Officers, Warrant Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers, and Men of the Royal Marines, and corresponding Ranks and Ratings of the Reserve Forces, borne on Ships' Books, 3s. 6d. a week.

"Boys of the Royal Navy, Royal Marines, and Reserve Forces, borne on Ships' Books, 1s. a week."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the

advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 11th day of September, 1918, in the words following, viz.:—

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being, or having been, an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are, from time to time, directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas by Your Majesty's Order in Council bearing date the 8th day of August, 1917, certain rates of Family Allowance are prescribed for the benefit of Chief Officers of Your Majesty's Coast Guard who rank with Warrant Officer, R.N., and of Ratings of Your Majesty's Coast Guard below the rank of Chief Officer, in respect of their children under the age of 14, or, in the event of such Officers or Ratings being detached from their proper Stations for duty elsewhere, for the benefit of their families:

"And whereas we are of opinion that the said rates of Family Allowance should in all cases be increased by the sum of 3s. 6d. a week:

"And whereas we are further of opinion that Divisional Chief Officers and Chief Officers of Your Majesty's Coast Guard, who rank with Commissioned Warrant Officer, R.N., or the families of such Officers, should receive Family Allowance at the same rates, and subject to the same conditions, as Chief Officers ranking with Warrant Officer, R.N., and the families of such Officers:

"And whereas we are further of opinion that Divisional Chief Officers, Chief Officers, and Ratings of Your Majesty's Coast Guard who have a wife, a dependant or dependants resident with them at their proper Stations, but have no child or children under the age of 14 years, should receive a Family Allowance of 3s. 6d. a week:

"And whereas we consider that the grant of the Allowances sanctioned under Your Majesty's Order in Council of the 8th day of August, 1917, should no longer be contingent upon the declaration of an allotment of not less than 20s. a week in the case of an Officer, and 5s. a week in the case of a Rating, as prescribed in Paragraph 2 of the Schedule to the said Order:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by

Your Order in Council, to rescind so much of Paragraph 2 of the Schedule to Your Order in Council bearing date the 8th day of August, 1917, as relates to the declaration of allotments by Chief Officers and Men in Your Majesty's Coast Guard, and to sanction the payment from public funds of Allowances at rates not exceeding those set forth in the Schedule hereto; provided, however, that no Allowance therein prescribed shall be paid (a) with effect from a date earlier than the 4th day of October, 1917, or (b) concurrently with Family Allowance under Your Order in Council of the 8th August, 1917, or Separation Allowance under Your Orders in Council of the 10th January, 1917, and 13th March, 1917, or any other Order.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals.

#### " SCHEDULE.

"(1) Family Allowance may be paid to Divisional Chief Officers, Chief Officers, and Ratings of the Coast Guard during residence at their proper Stations at the following rates:—

If there be one child under 14 years of age, 7s. a week;

If there be 2 children under 14 years of age, 10s. 6d. a week;

And for each additional child under 14 years of age an additional 2s. per week.

"(2) This Allowance may be increased by 3s. a week and paid to some member of the household for each complete period of 7 days or more during which the Officer or Man is detached on duty from his proper Station provided that he be not in receipt of Subsistence Allowance.

"(3) A Family Allowance may be paid to all Divisional Chief Officers, Chief Officers, and Ratings of the Coast Guard who have no children under 14 years of age, but have a wife, a dependant or dependants resident with them at their proper Stations, at the rate of 3s. 6d. a week.

"(4) In the event of the death of any such Officer or Man, Family Allowance will cease to be payable as from the Thursday following the date of death, and there may be granted to the widow or other dependant who was resident with the Officer or Man at his proper Station, if more beneficial to them than the pension for which they would otherwise be eligible under the Regulations issued by the Minister of Pensions, Separation Allowances at the rates provided in Orders in Council dated the 10th January, 1917, and 13th March, 1917. Such Separation Allowance will be paid concurrently with the allotment, if any, in force at the date of death of the Officer or Man concerned, or, if there be no allotment in force at the date of death, concurrently with such assumed allotment as may, having regard to the circumstances of the case, appear to the Admiralty to be reasonable."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by Section 1 of the Marriage of British Subjects (Facilities) Act, 1915, it is (amongst other things) enacted as follows:—

"Where His Majesty is satisfied that the law in force in any part of His Majesty's Dominions outside the United Kingdom makes due provision for the publication of banns, or for the giving of notice in respect of marriages, between British Subjects intended to be solemnized or contracted in the United Kingdom, and for the recognition of certificates for marriage issued by Superintendent Registrars in England, and of certificates for marriage issued by Registrars, and certificates of proclamation of banns, in Scotland, and of certificates for marriage issued by Registrars in Ireland, as sufficient notice in respect of marriages between British Subjects intended to be solemnized or contracted in that part of His Majesty's Dominions, His Majesty may, by Order in Council, declare that this Section shall apply to that part of His Dominions, and in such case:—

"(a) Where a marriage is intended to be solemnized or contracted in the United Kingdom between a British Subject resident in England, Scotland, or Ireland, and a British Subject resident in that part of His Majesty's Dominions, a certificate of notice of marriage issued in accordance with such law shall in England have the same effect as a certificate for marriage issued by a Superintendent Registrar, and in Scotland and Ireland have the same effect as a certificate for marriage issued by a Registrar in Scotland and Ireland respectively; and

"(b) Where a marriage is intended to be solemnized or contracted in that part of His Majesty's Dominions between a British Subject resident in that part and a British Subject resident in England, Scotland, or Ireland, a certificate for marriage may be issued in England by a Superintendent Registrar, or in Scotland or Ireland by a Registrar, in the like manner as if the marriage was to be solemnized or contracted under circumstances requiring the issue of such a certificate, and as if both such British Subjects were resident in England, Scotland, or Ireland, as the case may be."

And whereas His Majesty is satisfied that due provision is made in respect of all the matters referred to in the hereinbefore-recited Section of the said Act by the law in force in the part of His Majesty's Dominions outside the United Kingdom hereinafter mentioned.

**DEFENCE OF THE REALM.**

THE HAY AND STRAW ORDER, No. 3, 1918, DATED  
SEPTEMBER 25TH, 1918, MADE BY THE BOARD  
OF TRADE UNDER REGULATIONS 2F AND 2JJ OF  
THE DEFENCE OF THE REALM REGULATIONS.

The Board of Trade deeming it expedient to  
make further exercise of the powers conferred  
upon them by Regulations 2F and 2JJ of the  
Defence of the Realm Regulations for the pur-  
pose of regulating and maintaining the supply  
of hay and straw hereby order as follows:—

1. This Order applies to all horses in Great  
Britain except those mentioned in the first  
Schedule.

2. No person without the consent in writing  
of the Controller of Horse Transport shall feed  
or cause or permit to be fed any long hay to  
any horse to which this Order applies.

3. No person without such consent as afore-  
said shall feed or cause or permit to be fed to  
any such horses any hay except in accordance  
with the scale set out in the Second Schedule.

4. No person shall manufacture for sale or  
sell any mixed chaff containing less than two-  
thirds of hay, and if required by the purchaser  
shall give him at the time of sale a written  
certificate to that effect.

5. No oat-straw or hay shall be used for the  
purpose of bedding horses or for the purpose  
of packing.

6. Any person or persons in possession of a  
horse or horses to which this Order applies  
shall keep a record in writing in sufficient  
detail to show (1) the number of horses kept  
by him in each class referred to in Schedule  
II.; (2) the total maximum daily ration of hay  
authorised by this Order for such horse or  
horses; (3) the quantity of hay fed to such  
horse or horses each week; (4) the quantity of  
all hay and chaff purchased and the date of  
such purchase. Such records shall at all rea-  
sonable times be open to the inspection of an  
officer of police or any person authorised by the  
Controller of Horse Transport.

7. In this Order "Horse" includes a mare,  
gelding, colt, filly, pony, mule and ass. "Hay"  
includes clover. "Chaff" means any chopped  
hay or straw.

8. If any person owning a horse or horses,  
or having control or management of a horse or  
horses, for the time being, acts in contravention  
of this Order or aids or abets any other person  
in doing anything in contravention of this  
Order, that person is guilty of a summary  
offence against the Defence of the Realm Regu-  
lations.

9. (a) This Order may be cited as the Hay  
and Straw Order No. 3, 1918.

(b) This Order shall come into force on the  
first day of October, 1918, and the Hay and  
Straw Order No. 2, 1918, is hereby revoked  
as from that day, without prejudice to any  
proceedings in respect of any previous in-  
fringement thereof, and without prejudice to  
any exemptions granted thereunder.

**NOTE:**

- (1) Pit horses and ponies working in the pits  
or at the pit mouth may be given 2 lbs.  
of hay extra per day.
- (2) Unbroken horses at grass or turned out  
may be fed on 5 lbs. of long hay per day.

- (3) Straw is not rationed, and any addition to the above rations must be in the form of straw.

#### ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 26TH SEPTEMBER 1918.)

#### EAST SUSSEX AND KENT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1918.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

##### *Movement into, out of, or within Scheduled District.*

1.—(1.) No cattle, sheep, goats or swine shall be landed in or moved into or out of the District described in the Schedule to this Order, hereinafter referred to as the Scheduled District, or be moved along, over, or across, or be allowed by the owner or person in charge thereof to stray upon a highway or thoroughfare within the Scheduled District; provided that nothing in this Order shall be deemed to apply to the movement of animals into or out of the Scheduled District where they are moved through such District by railway from a place outside such District to another place outside such District, without unnecessary delay, and without the animals being untrucked within such District except for the purposes of feeding or watering the animals within the railway station premises where such untrucking takes place.

(2.) If any farm (except any detached part) is partly within and partly without the Scheduled District, the whole shall be deemed to be within the Scheduled District.

##### *Power to Restrict Movement of Persons in Certain Cases.*

2.—(1.) An Inspector of the Local Authority acting under their direction may serve a Notice on the occupier of any field, shed, or other place in the Scheduled District, prohibiting the entry of any person into any such field, shed, or other place, and thereupon, notwithstanding the existence of any footpath or right-of-way, no person shall enter the field, shed, or other place to which the Notice relates while any cattle, sheep, goats or swine are therein, otherwise than in accordance with the following regulations, that is to say;

(i) The owner of the field, shed, or other place, or of the animals therein, or the agent or servants of such owner, may enter such field, shed, or other place so far as may be necessary for the feeding or tending of the animals.

(ii) Any other person may enter such field, shed, or other place with a licence of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries.

(2.) Copies of such Notice shall be affixed or exhibited by the Inspector in such manner as he shall think desirable for ensuring notification of the restrictions thereby imposed.

(3.) A copy of every such Notice shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, Whitehall Place, London, S.W.

*Power to restrict Movement of Dogs and Poultry in Certain Cases.*

3.—(1.) An Inspector of the Board, or of the Local Authority acting under their direction, may, for the purpose of preventing the spread of Foot-and-Mouth Disease, by a Notice served on the occupier of any premises in the Scheduled District, require him:—

(a) to keep in confinement, or under control, as may be prescribed by the Notice, dogs on such premises;

or (b) to confine live poultry on such premises in a pen or other like enclosure;

or (c) to prevent the access of live poultry to any specific part of the premises to which cattle, sheep, goats, or swine have, or recently have had, access;

and if any occupier after service of any such Notice shall fail to comply with the requirements thereof, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(2.) An Inspector of the Board, or of the Local Authority acting under their direction, may, for the purpose of preventing the spread of Foot-and-Mouth Disease, by Notice affixed or exhibited by the Inspector in such manner as he shall think desirable for ensuring notification of the restrictions thereby imposed, require dogs to be kept by the person in charge thereof under control while passing along any road or footpath specified in such Notice, and if any person in charge of a dog while passing along any road or footpath to which any such Notice relates fails to keep the dog under control, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(3.) Every Notice served on an occupier of premises shall remain in operation until it is withdrawn by a further Notice served by an Inspector of the Board or of the Local Authority.

(4.) A copy of every Notice served by an Inspector of the Local Authority under this Article shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Secretary, Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, Whitehall Place, London, S.W.

*Local Authority to Enforce Order.*

4. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

*Offences.*

5.—(1.) If an animal is landed in contravention of this Order, the owner, and the charterer and the master of the vessel from which it is landed, and the owner of the animal and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the landing, and the person landing the same, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been landed in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(2.) If an animal is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the animal and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing or permitting

the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the animal is moved shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(3.) If any person enters any field, shed, or other place in contravention of this Order, or of a Notice served thereunder, such person shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

*Short Title.*

6. This Order may be cited as the EAST SUSSEX AND KENT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1918.

IN ENGLAND.

Whereas by the 21st Section of the Births and Deaths Registration Act, 1874, it is enacted that the Registrar-General, with the sanction of the Local Government Board, may from time to time alter Registration Sub-districts:—

1. And whereas it is expedient

## ENGLAND, SOUTH COAST.

(1) *Falmouth Harbour Approach—Traffic Regulations.*

*Former Notices.*—Nos. 88, 151, 317, 452, 551, 673, 794, 922 and 1034 of 1918; hereby cancelled.

All vessels bound to or from Falmouth Harbour must pass between the two light-buoys situated at a distance of about 3 miles south-westward from St. Anthony point lighthouse as shown on charts, and maintain a course  $0^{\circ}$  (*N.  $17^{\circ}$  E. Mag.*) and  $180^{\circ}$  (*S.  $17^{\circ}$  W. Mag.*), respectively, for a distance of a quarter of a mile from the light-buoys.

Any instructions given by the patrol vessels should be strictly observed. Vessels proceeding eastward must obtain instructions as to the route to be followed before attempting to leave the anchorage.

Vessels entering Falmouth harbour must close the Drifter, stationed about half a mile to the southward of the two light-buoys defining the ship-passage.

This Drifter regulates inward-bound and outward-bound traffic.

Inward-bound vessels will be given priority over outward-bound vessels in respect of passage through the ship-passage.

*Signals:*

To indicate that the ship-passage is clear for inward-bound vessels, the Drifter will display:—

(a) By Day.—No signal.

(b) By Night.—Two horizontal red lights.

To indicate that the ship-passage is clear for outward-bound vessels, the Drifter will display:—

(a) By Day.—A black shape.

(b) By Night.—Two horizontal white lights.

During fog the Drifter will remain close to the ship-passage, and will sound the following signals:—

(a) Under normal conditions when no vessel is passing either way, the Drifter will sound "K" (— — —) on her whistle every two minutes. This signal is intended to indicate the position of the Drifter and of the ship-passage.

(b) When an inward-bound vessel is heard

approaching, the Drifter will sound letter "V" (— — —) on her whistle to indicate that the ship-passage is clear for inward-bound vessels.

(c) When an outward-bound vessel is heard approaching, the Drifter will sound letter "O" (— — —) on her whistle to indicate that the ship-passage is clear for outward-bound vessels.

Vessels approaching Falmouth in foggy weather should be careful to sound the regulation fog-signal and to proceed with great caution when within a depth of 30 fathoms at all states of the tide.

When the ship-passage is clear for inward-bound traffic, no outward-bound vessel may approach within half a mile of the ship-passage; and when the signals indicate that outward-bound traffic may pass through the ship-passage, no inward-bound vessels may approach within half a mile of the ship-passage.

(2) *Penzance Bay—Traffic Regulations.*

All vessels bound to or from Penzance bay must pass between the two light-buoys situated at a distance of about  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles south-eastward from St. Paul church, north-westward of Mousehole, as shown on charts, and maintain a course  $0^{\circ}$  (*N.  $17^{\circ}$  E. Mag.*) and  $180^{\circ}$  (*S.  $17^{\circ}$  W. Mag.*), respectively, for a distance of a quarter of a mile from the light-buoys.

Vessels approaching from the eastward must keep to the southward of the parallel of lat.  $50^{\circ} 02' N.$ , until reaching a position about 3 miles southward of the ship-passage, which should then be steered for.

Any instructions given by the patrol vessels should be strictly observed.

Inward-bound vessels will have priority over outward-bound vessels in respect of passage through the ship-passage.

Vessels entering Penzance bay must close the Drifter, stationed about half a mile to the southward of the two light-buoys defining the ship-passage.

This Drifter regulates inward-bound and outward-bound traffic.

The signals exhibited by this Drifter are as prescribed for Falmouth in Part (1) of this Notice.

Vessels making Mounts bay in foggy weather should be careful to sound the regulation fog-signal and to proceed with great caution when within a depth of 25 fathoms at all states of the tide.

When the ship-passage is clear for inward-bound traffic, no outward-bound vessel may approach within half a mile of the ship-passage; and when the signals indicate that outward-bound traffic may pass through the ship-passage, no inward-bound vessel may approach within half a mile of the ship-passage.

During the hours of darkness, all vessels entering or leaving Penzance bay must exhibit their side-lights.

Before attempting to leave Penzance bay, outward-bound vessels must obtain instructions as to the route to be followed.

## ENGLAND, SOUTH COAST.

*Tor Bay Approaches—Traffic Regulations.**Former Notices.*—Nos. 795, 923 and 1036 of 1918; hereby cancelled.

Two ship-passages have been established as follows:—

*Northern ship-passage*, 600 feet wide, marked by light-buoys on either side, situated  $5\frac{1}{2}$  cables,  $142^{\circ}$  (*S.  $22^{\circ}$  E. Mag.*), from the Ore Stone  $\Delta$ . This ship-passage is to be used by:—

(1) All vessels approaching Tor Bay from the eastward.

Such vessels should make a position one mile,  $44^{\circ}$  (*N.  $60^{\circ}$  E. Mag.*), from the ship-passage and enter on a course  $224^{\circ}$  (*S.  $60^{\circ}$  W. Mag.*) till half a mile beyond the ship-passage.

(2) All east-bound vessels leaving Tor Bay. Such vessels should steer so as to pass through the ship-passage on a course  $44^{\circ}$  (*N.  $60^{\circ}$  E. Mag.*) and should continue on this course for one mile, when course is to be altered to join the route in force.

*Southern ship-passage*, 600 feet wide, marked by light-buoys on either side, situated 7 cables,  $84^{\circ}$  (*S.  $80^{\circ}$  E. Mag.*), from Berry Head lighthouse. This ship-passage is to be used by:—

(1) All vessels approaching Tor Bay from the southward and westward.

Such vessels should make a position one mile,  $144^{\circ}$  (*S.  $20^{\circ}$  E. Mag.*), from the ship-passage, and enter on a course,  $324^{\circ}$  (*N.  $36^{\circ}$  W. Mag.*) till half a mile beyond the ship-passage.

(2) All south and west-bound vessels.

Such vessels should steer so as to pass through the ship-passage on a course  $144^{\circ}$  (*S.  $20^{\circ}$  E. Mag.*) and should continue on this course for a mile beyond the ship-passage, when course is to be altered to join the route in force.

Caution is necessary when entering southern ship-passage as the stream sets obliquely across the entrance. A Drifter regulates the inward and outward-bound traffic through each ship-passage.

Inward-bound vessels will be given priority over outward-bound vessels in respect of passage through the ship-passages.

*Signals:*

To indicate that the ship-passage is clear for *inward-bound* vessels, the Drifter will display:—

(a) By Day: No signal.

(b) By Night: Two horizontal red lights.

To indicate that the ship-passage is clear for *outward-bound* vessels the Drifter will display:—

(a) By Day: A black shape.

(b) By Night: Two horizontal white lights.

During fog the Drifter will remain close to the ship-passages, and will sound the following signals:—

(a) Under normal conditions when no vessel is passing either way, the Drifter will sound "K" (— — —) on her whistle every two minutes. This signal is intended to indicate the position of the Drifter and of the ship-passage.

(b) When an inward-bound vessel is

heard approaching, the Drifter will sound letter "V" (— — —) on her whistle to indicate that the ship-passage is clear for inward-bound vessels.

(c) When an outward-bound vessel is heard approaching, the Drifter will sound letter "O" (— — —) on her whistle to indicate that the ship-passage is clear for outward-bound vessels.

No outgoing vessel is to approach within half a mile of the ship-passages unless this signal is displayed and permission has been given to proceed.

Incoming vessels are not to approach within half a mile of the ship-passages while they are open to outgoing vessels. All vessels entering or leaving Tor Bay during darkness must exhibit their side lights.

Vessels approaching Tor Bay in foggy weather should sound the regulation fog-signal and proceed with great caution.

## ANCHORAGE REGULATIONS.

All orders given by the patrols are to be strictly carried out.

Vessels entering Tor Bay anchorage in order to bunker at Brixham, and westbound vessels in ballast which are weather-bound and unable to round Start Point are to anchor as directed in Brixham roads to the westward of a line drawn in a  $0^{\circ}$  (*N.  $16^{\circ}$  E. Mag.*) direction from Brixham breakwater light, and to the southward of a line drawn in a  $90^{\circ}$  (*S.  $7\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$  E. Mag.*) from Goodrington.

Sailing vessels are to anchor as directed on the inshore side of a line drawn in a  $219^{\circ}$  (*N.  $46^{\circ}$  W. Mag.*) direction through Brixham breakwater light clear of the fairway into Brixham harbour.

All other vessels are to anchor as directed on entering.

## REGULATIONS FOR BRIXHAM FISHING VESSELS.

No fishing vessel is on any account to attempt to pass through the ship-passages during the hours of darkness.

Fishing vessels are not to leave Brixham harbour until permission has been obtained from the Port Fishery Officer. The three organised fleets working from Brixham are to follow the motions of the Admiral of their fleet in respect to leaving harbour.

The conduct of these fleets is dealt with by local orders.

In addition to the restrictions to fishing laid down in Admiralty Notices to Mariners:—

Trawling or drifting is prohibited within two miles of the obstruction in any direction.

The laying of nets, crab or any other pots, or anchoring for the purpose of fishing with hand lines is entirely prohibited within half a mile of the obstruction in any direction.

## REGULATIONS RESPECTING SMALL CRAFT AND PLEASURE BOATS.

The following regulations are to apply to all small craft and pleasure boats (exclusive of *bonâ fide* commercial fishing craft sailing under fishing permits) using the harbours of Brixham, Paignton and Torquay.

No small craft or pleasure boat will be permitted to go outside the ship-passages.

Small craft with amateur fishing permits can obtain special permission to pass through the ship-passages between the hours of sunrise and sunset provided they keep within the three-

mile limit from their port. Such permission must be obtained from the Senior Naval Officer, Torquay, through the Station Officer of the Coastguard Station.

Small craft must not go alongside, or hold communication with any vessel in the anchorage unless special permission from the Senior Naval Officer has been obtained to do so.

*Variation.*—16° W.

#### ENGLAND AND WALES, SOUTH AND WEST COASTS.

*Portland Bill to Bardsey Island—Traffic Regulations.*

*Former Notice.*—No. 992 of 1918; hereby cancelled.

Notice is hereby given that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty and are now in force:—

#### I.—REGULATIONS RESPECTING SMALL CRAFT AND AMATEUR FISHING.

The following regulations are to apply to all small craft (exclusive of bona-fide commercial fishing boats, sailing under fishing permits) from Portland Bill on the east to Bardsey Island on the west.

2. Discretionary power is granted to Divisional Coast Watching Officers to grant exemptions in cases where it can be shown that exceptional hardship to individuals, or interference with recognised means of communication across estuaries, &c., would be caused by a strict interpretation of the regulations.

3. The following regulations with regard to pleasure permits are now in force:—

(i) No fisherman, boatman or waterman under 60 years of age may be granted a permit. Fishermen, boatmen or watermen over 60 years of age may receive a permit for one pleasure or waterman's boat (which may be let out on hire), provided that the boat has not been granted a fishing or amateur permit.

(ii) Persons, other than fishermen, boatmen or watermen, who own boats may receive permits on the strict understanding that no professional fisherman, boatman or waterman under the age of 60 is employed either on shore or at sea in connection with such craft. Any infringement of this rule will lead to the immediate withdrawal of the permit.

Boats thus licensed are to comply strictly with the following navigational directions:—

(a) They are not to be under way at night, i.e., between half an hour after

sunset and half an hour before sunrise, or during fog, but are to remain at their moorings. If caught out by fog they are to return to the shore at once.

(b) Subject to any special exceptions that have been or may hereafter be made, they are not to proceed to a distance of more than three miles in any direction from the port, creek or river to which they belong.

Applications for permits should be made to the Divisional Coast Watching Officer through the Station Officer of the nearest Coast Guard station. No boat or vessel may be used without a permit. Permits must always be carried while under way, and may be withdrawn at any time at the discretion of the Officer by whom they were issued.

4. Through the above-mentioned channel, and with the concurrence of the Fishery Authorities, British born amateurs desirous of fishing for food may obtain amateur permits, subject to the following provisions:—

(a) The crew of the boat—and if desired an alternative crew for each—shall be named on the permit, which shall be signed by each of those persons, and no person other than those named may be at sea in the boat. The permit must always be carried in the boat while under way.

(b) Boats sailing under amateur permits shall not carry as members of their crew bona-fide fishermen holding, or qualified to hold, fishing permits.

(c) Amateurs and visitors who propose to hire boats for periods of not less than one week, and whose credentials are satisfactory, may obtain amateur permits in the same manner as amateur boat-owners. The period of such permits, together with the holder's home address, shall be stated on it, and it shall be given up to the Station Officer at the end of that period.

(d) Subject to local modifications, boats sailing under amateur permits may proceed to a distance of not more than 3 nautical miles in any direction from their port or estuary, and may be under way from one hour before dawn till two hours after sunset. They are not to put to sea during fog, and if caught out by fog, are to return to port. In no case may the holders of amateur permits fish or be at sea in contravention of fishing regulations or orders. Special local regulations are in force for defended areas and ports, comprising Portland, Plymouth, Falmouth, Milford Haven, Cardiff and Barry, and Swansea.

(e) Amateurs returning to port later than half an hour after sunset are to report forthwith at the Coast Guard station, or otherwise, as directed.

(f) A return of fish caught is to be made after each trip, to the Station Officer or other designated person, on forms provided by, and in the manner laid down by, the Fishery Authorities.

(g) With the sanction of the Naval and Military Authorities, amateurs may form an approved local Food Fishing Association, the Secretary of which may then perform the duties of a Station Officer under these regulations in respect of recommending members for permits, checking boats ashore, and taking returns of fish landed.

(h) The right is reserved by the Fishery Authorities to direct the manner in which fish-

caught under amateur permits shall be disposed of.

5. Amateur permits may be endorsed, suspended or withdrawn by the Naval or Fishery Authorities, by whom, acting in conjunction, the provisions as to fishing may be modified locally.

6. Questions relative to permits should be referred to the Divisional Coast Watching Officer through the Station Officer; questions in regard to fishing or to the formation of Local Food Fishing Associations, to the Inspector of Fisheries for the area. The conditions under which amateurs may ship as working hands in bona-fide fishing boats can also be obtained from the Inspector of Fisheries.

7. Excursion traffic, defined as advertised trips wholly or chiefly for the pleasure of the passengers, is allowed only within ports, creeks or rivers, and by written permission of the Commander-in-Chief, Plymouth. Such permission may be obtained through the Divisional Coast Watching Officer, and will only be given provided that—

- (a) The entire trip is within the harbour.
- (b) The boat or vessel is not under weigh at night, i.e., between half an hour after sunset and half an hour before sunrise, or during fog.
- (c) One person is responsible for the party, and
- (d) The permission is applicable only to the trip specified.

8. Regular ferry boats may obtain special permission from the Divisional Coast Watching Officer, to run to a specified hour according to circumstances.

9. Oil, motor spirit, petrol, or other goods may not be shipped on board craft of any description, whether coasting or foreign, either as stores for the equipment or navigation of the vessel, or as merchandise, except at places which are under the supervision of a Customs Officer. Such goods must be properly pre-entered before shipment, and a clearance must be obtained from the Customs Officials in accordance with the Customs War Powers Act, 1915. Sailing vessels may not have on board a quantity of petrol, motor spirit, benzine, paraffin, petroleum, or other similar substances, exceeding 4 gallons.

## II.—REGULATIONS WITH REGARD TO COMMERCIAL FISHERMEN.

The following Regulations are to be complied with by all fishing vessels and boats on the coast of England and Wales from Portland Bill westwards to Bardsey island (hereinafter referred to as the South-Western Area).

2. Fishing vessels authorised by fishing permits signed by the local Fishery Officer, are allowed to be at sea day and night, except as stated below in paragraphs 3, 4 and 5.

3. (i.) By day and night, the laying of nets, or of crab or any other pots, trawling, long-lining, drifting, or anchoring is prohibited within the area bounded:

*On the North:* By a line joining the following places and points, viz.:—The Longships—the Runnelstone—a point 4 miles 164° (*South Mag.*) from St. Michael's Mount tower—a point one mile 164° (*South Mag.*) from Lizard head—a point half a mile 164° (*South Mag.*) from Black head—a point 2

miles 164° (*South Mag.*) from Dodman point—Rame head—Mewstone buoy—a point one mile 164° (*South Mag.*) from Bolt head—a point one mile 164° (*South Mag.*) from Prawle point—a point one mile 119° (*S. 45° E. Mag.*) from Start point—Skerries bell-buoy—and Berry head—and the parallel of lat. 50° 30' N.

*On the South:* By a line from Wolf rock to a position in lat. 49° 46' N., long. 5° 12' W.—thence to a position in lat. 50° 06' N., long. 4° 16' W.—thence to a position in lat. 50° 05' N., long. 3° 22' W.

*On the East:* By the meridian of long. 3° 22' W.

*On the West:* By a line joining the Longships and Wolf rock.

(ii.) The above prohibition does not apply to vessels sailing across the prohibited area, or whiffing with handlines without anchoring.

(iii.) Anchoring for the purpose of hand-lining, and fishing with longlines, is permitted within 2½ miles of the Eddystone.

4. By day and night, between the meridians of Portland Bill and Start Point, fishing is prohibited at a distance of more than 5 miles from shore, unless fishing vessels are sailing under Port Fishery Orders.

5. Local regulations are in force as follows:

(i.) Defended Ports and Areas. By night, no vessel is allowed to fish or to be within 10 miles of the entrance to any defended port, except as may be provided for in the special local regulations of that port. The defended ports comprise Portland, Plymouth, Falmouth, Cardiff and Barry, Swansea, and Milford Haven. Special local regulations are also in force in Tor Bay and Mount's Bay, and at St. Ives.

(ii.) Port Fishery Orders are in force at Brixham, Plymouth, Newlyn and Mousehole, St. Ives, Padstow, Swansea, and Milford Haven. Vessels fishing out of those ports, and out of such other ports as may be placed under Port Fishery Orders, are to fish in organised fleets under the orders of the Port Fishery Officer.

(iii.) Fishing in Prohibited Areas.

(a) Special permission has been, and may from time to time be, granted by Port Fishery Order for vessels fishing out of certain ports to engage in specified forms of fishing within specified portions of the prohibited areas defined in paragraphs 3 and 4 above. This permission can be obtained only from the Inspector of Fisheries for the S.W. Area, through the Port Fishery Officer of the port concerned, to whom application should be made in the first place.

(b) Orders permitting fishing within the prohibited areas are to be strictly complied with in every respect. One boat with each fleet is to act as picket or Commodore boat, and is to carry a copy of the order under which the fleet is fishing; this copy to be produced for inspection whenever required by any of H.M. ships or patrol vessels.

(iv.) Whitsand Bay. Night fishing is permitted in Whitsand Bay inshore of the northern line of the prohibited area, as defined in paragraph 3 (i.) above, provided that:

(a) During the hours of "official

night" no vessel, approaching Plymouth, may cross to the eastward of a line drawn 231° (S. 67° W. Mag.), from Rame Head; and

(b) Except on Sundays, no boat may approach within three miles of the coast between Tregantle and Portwrinkle up to the hour of 12.0 midnight, or such later hour as may be ordered.

6. A new issue of fishing permits was recently made throughout the S.W. Area, fishing skippers being required to exchange their old permits for blue permits of the new issue by the 31st August, 1918.

7. The fishing permit, made out to the skipper actually in charge and for the boat in question, must at all times be carried by a fishing vessel at sea, and it must be produced on demand to any Naval or Fishery Officer, or other authorised person. Failure to comply with this regulation will render the offender liable to prosecution.

In the case of a new skipper taking charge of a boat, or of a skipper taking charge of a boat not specified on his permit, a new permit must be obtained. No alterations on permits will be recognised, whether made by the Permit Issuer or not.

8. The shipment of oil, motor spirit, petrol, and other goods in fishing vessels is subject to the Customs Regulations for the time being.

9. Admiralty Orders for British fishing vessels are in all cases to be obeyed: See the current Notices to Fishermen (the "Green Book") issued free to fishermen at Mercantile Marine and Customs Offices.

#### Notes.

1. Fishing vessels are only to include bona-fide commercial fishing craft, manned by bona-fide professional fishermen.

2. Amateur fishermen and pleasure craft out fishing are not to be regarded as coming under this section of the Notice, except that areas prohibited to fishing vessels are also prohibited to amateur fishing boats and pleasure craft. These latter must comply with the current regulations as to amateur fishing boats and pleasure craft, and must obtain their amateur fishing permits, or pleasure permits, as the case may be, through the nearest Coastguard Station Officer.

3. Passengers. Fishing vessels having a fishing permit, and desiring to carry passengers—i.e., persons other than their bona-fide crew—must obtain separate pleasure permits, and when such passengers are aboard they will be strictly subject to the pleasure craft regulations for the time being. In the event of non-compliance, both the boats' permits may be withdrawn by the Naval or Fishery Authorities. The conditions under which fishing skippers may ship non-fishermen hands to make up their crew, or may take out wounded soldiers and sailors in uniform, or may give passages to members of their own families, can be obtained on inquiry of the Permit Issuer.

4. Fishery Officer means an officer of the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, a Port Fishery Officer, or other person duly appointed to issue fishing permits.

5. Permits may be withdrawn, suspended, or endorsed at the discretion of the Naval Authorities or of a Fishery Officer.

6. Availability of Permits. A S.W. Area fishing permit is available over the whole area, when and where fishing is permitted by these

regulations, but boats moving from port to port within the area must notify their arrival and departure to the local Fishery Officers of those ports.

7. Visiting boats from ports outside the S.W. Area must, before fishing in this area, obtain from the local Permit Issuer a S.W. Area fishing permit, either—

(a) In exchange for their former permit (re-exchanging on departure), or,

(b) By previous application through the local Fishery Officer of their home port;

otherwise they will be detained in port while their credentials are being verified. In all cases, visiting boats must give up their S.W. Area fishing permits on leaving the S.W. Area, and must notify the local Fishery Officers when they move from port to port within the area.

8. Charts of prohibited areas and of areas affected by Port Fishery Orders can be seen by fishermen on application to Port Fishery Officers.

9. Complaints on the part of the fishing community, and questions of doubt, should be referred in the first instance to the local Fishery Officer, or direct to the Inspector of Fisheries attached to the area.

### III.—PLYMOUTH.

No vessels other than those of British Nationality or those of the Allied Nations are permitted to enter the Port of Plymouth until further notice.

#### PART I.—ENTRANCE TO THE PORT.

##### Notification of Time of Arrival.

1. Shipowners and shipping agents will facilitate the entry of their vessels by giving previous notice of the probable time of arrival to the King's Harbour Master for Plymouth, Longroom, Stonehouse (Telegraphic address: Tidal, Plymouth), with particulars of appearance, &c., so that they may be readily identified.

##### Instructions for Ships Approaching the Port.

2. All ships may be brought in at night as well as by day. This does not apply to fishing vessels and small craft, as they cannot be allowed to enter at night.

Endeavour will be made to bring vessels in from sea during a fog even though movements inside the port are prohibited (see paragraph 11). If, however, the fog is so dense as to make this dangerous, the vessel must wait in the outer examination anchorage (Cawsand bay) or at sea until it lifts sufficiently.

When once ships are anchored they are not to move under any circumstances without previously obtaining permission from the King's Harbour Master for Plymouth.

Vessels of every description, including fishing vessels and small craft, are forbidden to enter or leave the port by the eastern entrance. They may only do so by the western entrance.

The Devil's Bridge is entirely closed.

All orders and instructions given by the Examining Officers are to be implicitly obeyed, otherwise ships will be liable to be fired upon.

##### Distinguishing Signals of Examination Steamers.

3. The Examining Steamer will be found in the neighbourhood of Penlee point, and will *by day* be distinguished by the Examination Flag (white and red horizontal sur-

rounded by blue border), and will fly the Blue Ensign.

*By night* the Examination Steamer will be distinguished by those white lights.

#### Signals Indicating Port Closed.

4. The following signals will be employed to indicate that the Port is closed:—

*By Day*.—Three red balls hoisted vertically by the Examination Steamer and at the flagstaff on Breakwater fort.

*By Night*.—Three red lights, six feet apart, hoisted vertically by the Examination Steamer, and at the flagstaff on Breakwater fort.

In this case the Examination Vessel will not lead ships in further than Cawsand bay, where they must anchor or remain at sea.

Vessels must on no account proceed further in than Cawsand bay unless met by the Examination Steamer and led in or given the special signal to proceed into the sound.

#### Ships Anchored in Cawsand Bay.

5. Vessels are not to attempt to leave the anchorage under any circumstances, or to communicate with other vessels, or with the shore, without previously obtaining permission from the Chief Examining Officer.

#### Fishing Vessels and Small Craft.

6. Fishing vessels, barges, boats, yachts, and small private vessels of any kind are only to enter the port by day and should approach the western entrance only, where the patrol boats will give them instructions as to proceeding into harbour.

If obliged to shelter at night from stress of weather or other cause, Shipowners, Masters, and Local Agents are advised to direct their vessels to proceed to a sheltered anchorage in the vicinity, such as Salcombe, The Yealm, Looe or Fowey, until daylight.

#### Lights of Ships.

7. The normal condition in regard to lights of ships at anchor in the sound, Cawsand bay, Cattewater, or Hamoaze at night is that no lights whatever are to show from the outside. When, however, during dark hours, a vessel is under way, anchor lights are to be exposed until the vessel is anchored; or, in the case of ships leaving, until they are clear of the breakwater, when lights are again to be obscured. It is expected that masters of vessels and others concerned will see that this order, which is given for their own protection, is carried out; any infringement of it will entail more stringent measures being taken.

Anchor lights, bow and masthead steaming lights, and other lights, are to be as prescribed in Part 5 of Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 872 of 1918.

#### Pilotage.

8. Pilotage is compulsory for all vessels in the whole of the waters comprising Plymouth Sound, Hamoaze, Cattewater and Sutton pool, inside a line joining Penlee point on the west through the Shagstone to the coast on the East, as far as Laira bridge to the eastward and Saltash bridge to the westward, with the following exceptions:—

(a) Ships belonging to His Majesty and Allied Men-of-War;

(b) Pleasure yachts and sailing boats

under 30 feet in length on the water line and under 10 feet draught;

(c) Fishing vessels;

(d) Sailing vessels trading coastwise of less than 75 tons net register;

(e) Ships of less than 50 tons gross tonnage not carrying passengers;

(f) Motor barges and boats habitually used exclusively within the limits of the Port of Plymouth;

(g) Steam tug boats registered at the Port of Plymouth.

NOTE.—This order does not apply to ships changing moorings unless the shift entails going through or into the channel.

If necessary, the Examining Officer will place a licensed local Pilot on board all incoming merchant vessels, or they will be led in by one of the Examination Vessels which have licensed Pilots on board.

All vessels proceeding from the Cattewater or Sutton pool to Plymouth sound and *vice versa* are to pass between the Mallard shoal and Mount Batten breakwater.

#### PART II.—MOVEMENTS WITHIN THE PORT.

9. The movements of all merchant ships, fishing vessels, or boats of any kind, are subject to the direction of the King's Harbour Master, Plymouth, for the Sound, and the King's Harbour Master, Devonport, for the Hamoaze, whose orders are to be immediately obeyed.

Disobedience of such orders will render vessels liable to be fired upon.

#### Pilotage.

10. Pilotage is compulsory under the same conditions as stated in paragraph 8 above.

#### Night and During Fog.

11. During the hours of official night, or during fog, no merchant vessels (including fishing craft, barges, boats, yachts, or private vessels of any kind) will be allowed to be under way in the sound and adjacent waters, except with special permission, which should be obtained from the King's Harbour Master for Plymouth, at Longroom, Stonehouse.

During the hours of official night no vessel, barge, or boat of any kind, will be allowed to be under way in the Hamoaze or creeks and coves adjoining, including the Lynher river and the Tamar river above Saltash as far as a line joining Skinham and Warren points, except with special permission, which should be obtained from the King's Harbour Master, for Devonport, at His Majesty's Dockyard, Devonport.

All traffic within the port is absolutely prohibited during a state of fog.

#### Approach to Government Vessels and Establishments.

12. No merchant vessels (including fishing craft, barges, boats, yachts, or private vessels of any kind) will be allowed to approach any Government ship, vessel, lighter, or other Government craft, or any Government Dockyard or Establishment, without special permission.

Subject to the above, merchant shipping may move as usual within the Ports of Plymouth and Devonport, taking care to keep clear of any of His Majesty's ships which are being navigated in the Ports. (See paragraph 22, Part IV., of this Section.)

### Patrol of Internal Waterways and Approaches of the Port.

13. The internal waterways of the port, as well as the approaches thereto, will be patrolled by Naval patrol boats, or other Government vessels. Captains and Masters of merchant ships, and persons in charge of fishing vessels or boats of any kind, are hereby warned to observe any orders which may be given by the Naval patrols. Merchant ships, fishing vessels, and boats will be subject to inspection and search, and will be liable to be fired upon in the event of disobedience to the orders given them by the patrols.

### Regulation Lights to be shown at Night.

14. All vessels, barges, or boats, that have received permission to be under way, must display the regulation lights at night. (See also paragraph 7.)

### Caution as to Anchoring.

16. When anchoring, care must be taken to be well clear of the fairway.

### Prohibited Areas.

16. No vessel, boat, or craft of any kind, is at any time allowed within the following areas:

*The Eastern Channel.*—The area defined as follows:—On the north by the line of Torpedo range targets; on the west by the line joining Breakwater fort with Shagstone beacon; and on the south by a line joining Shagstone beacon with Reny rocks.

*The Bridge.*—The area defined as follows:—On the north by a line joining Raveness point to Drake's island north-west buoy; on the east by a line joining Drake's island north-west buoy to Melampus light-buoy; and on the south by a line joining Melampus light-buoy to Fort Picklecombe pier.

*Mount Batten Breakwater.*—All small craft are warned they should not approach within 200 yards of Mount Batten Breakwater, it being necessary to keep this area clear for seaplanes going out and returning.

No fishing boat or sailing vessel engaged in coast trade shall be admitted into Cawsand bay during the night, or be allowed to lie at anchor there during the night. No fishing boat or sailing vessel engaged in coast trade shall approach Cawsand bay so late in the evening as to make it impossible for them to enter the Cattewater before dark.

Fishing is now permitted by night in Whitsand bay, subject to the following regulations:

(a) No fishing at night is to take place east of a line drawn in a  $231^{\circ}$  (S.  $67^{\circ}$  W. Mag.) direction from Rame head, and no boat is to cross this line at a distance of less than ten miles from the Breakwater light during the hours of official night.

(b) Except on Sundays, no night fishing is to take place within three miles of the Coast between Tregantle and Portwrinkle up to the hour of 12 midnight, or such later hour as may be ordered.

The above regulations are to be strictly complied with and any infringement of them will entail severe penalties.

Paragraph 3 of Section II. of this Notice is modified to the extent stated above as regards the defended Port of Plymouth.

No yacht, &c., or pleasure boat may proceed to the westward of a line joining the west end of West Hoe Terrace, the Asia and Melampus

light-buoys, nor may they proceed more than two miles outside the breakwater.

With the above exceptions, yachts, &c., and pleasure boats, may cruise in the waters of the sound as laid down in the Public Traffic Regulations. All persons going afloat in charge of yachts or boats are to make themselves thoroughly acquainted with these orders, the Public Traffic Regulations, and the notices that have been published from time to time in the public press defining prohibited areas.

Special notice is drawn to the following points in the regulations:—

No yacht or boat may be under way after dark; there can, therefore, be no traffic after dark between yachts at their moorings and the shore.

Although it is only laid down that no craft may leave or enter by the East channel, no craft is to approach anywhere near the East channel buoys, as such action would be likely to draw the fire of the forts.

All Excursion Steamer Traffic is Prohibited in the Sound.

*Note.*—Yachts that are only fitting out at Plymouth, and that may wish to proceed to their Summer base harbour, must obtain permission to leave for that purpose.

A limited number of moorings for yachts may be laid in the following places and nowhere else:—

On West Hoe—on application to King's Harbour Master, Plymouth; in the Cattewater above Turnchapel—on application to the Harbour Master of Cattewater.

*Hamoaze.*—Within the limits in the Harbour of Devonport mentioned in paragraph (4) below, all small craft, motor boats, steam boats, pulling boats, punts, &c., are to be moored in one of the following areas, viz.:—Saltash, Pottery quay, North corner, Mutton cove, Cremyll hard, Torpoint, Stonehouse creek (or be hauled up and secured above high-water mark in an approved position), where they will remain under Police supervision, and only be allowed out on the production of a permit. (See paragraph (4) below.)

(2) With the exception of steam or motor ferry boats which have obtained special permits, no craft of any description is to be under way during the hours of official night. Any craft under way between these times may be fired on by the Naval patrol boats or H.M. ships in harbour without notice.

(3) During fog or thick weather, no craft of any description is to be under way, with the exception of the Chain Ferry bridges at Torpoint and Saltash.

(4) All traffic is prohibited in the waters of the Harbour of Devonport within the following limits, viz.:—Between lines joining Skinham and Warren points in the Tamar river, and the Boom at Devil's point, including the Lynher river as far as St. Germans, Millbrook lake, and all the creeks and coves adjoining, subject to the following provisions:—

*During daylight, i.e., outside the hours of official night, all craft of any description engaged by their owners in the prosecution of their business, or used by them as a means of obtaining their livelihood, may be permitted to be under way within the above limits on obtaining a permit for the purpose. These permits to be obtained for steam, motor, or other self-propelled craft from the King's Harbour Master, Devonport, and for sailing or pulling craft from the Superintendent of Dockyard Police; such permits to be produced*



when called for by the person in charge of any patrol boat, police boat, or boat of H.M. ships.

Persons owning craft of any description which they may wish to use for pleasure purposes will be allowed to remove the same to approved places outside the above limits.

#### No Permits will be Granted for Use of Pleasure Craft within the Limits Defined.

(5) With the undermentioned exception at \*\* the following areas are prohibited to all craft of every description:—

Coombe bay, Kiln bay, Wilcove lake, Thanckes lake, south of Gravesend point to Pound at Torpoint, St. John's lake, Millbrook lake (inside a line from Palmer point to Little Southdown).

\*\* With regard to Millbrook lake inside the line specified, special permits will be given to steam or motor ferry craft, for public traffic only, and for sailing and pulling craft conveying market produce or provisions and coal, at the discretion of the King's Harbour Master, Devonport.

(6) No craft of any description is to approach or is to communicate with any of H.M. establishments or ships without having permission and calling the attention of the guard before they close. Craft disobeying this order may be fired on without notice.

(7) The foregoing provisions do not apply to any of H.M. craft or boats, or to vessels in Government employ.

(8) No excursion steamers will be permitted in the Hamoaze between the boom at Devil's point and Saltash pier. Subject to special arrangements, facilities will be granted during the summer months only for excursions in the Rivers Tamar and Tavy above Saltash, permits for which must be obtained by the owners of Excursion Steamers from the King's Harbour Master, Devonport.

#### Special Warning to Boatmen and those who Hire Out Yachts or Boats.

Great care must be taken that yachts and boats are only hired out to persons who are thoroughly acquainted with these regulations, as any infringement of the orders will, amongst other things, lead to the detention of the offending yacht or boat.

#### PART III.—VESSELS LEAVING THE PORT.

##### Prohibition.

17. No fishing vessels, barges, boats, yachts, or private vessels of any kind, are permitted to leave the Dockyard Port of Plymouth during the hours of official night or during fog.

18. Merchant vessels (including those engaged in the coastal trade) must on no account leave the Dockyard ports of Devonport and Plymouth without permission.

Vessels in the Hamoaze must obtain such permission from the King's Harbour Master, Devonport, at his office in the Dockyard; those at berths in the waters of the sound, Cawsand bay, Cattewater, Sutton pool, or Millbay docks, must obtain permission from the King's Harbour Master, Plymouth, at Longroom, Stonehouse.

It is also necessary for ships to obtain permission from the Collector of Customs, at the Barbican, Plymouth.

#### Fishing Vessels and Small Craft.

19. Fishing vessels, boats, and small craft generally may leave the Port during daylight without any formalities, but such craft are liable to inspection and search by the Naval patrol boats.

##### Pilotage.

20. Pilotage is compulsory under the same conditions as stated in paragraphs 8 of Part I. above.

#### PART IV.—BOOM DEFENCE.

21. A boom defence is in position across the entrance to the Hamoaze and should be approached with caution.

The gate of the boom will always be closed during the hours of official night and during fog, and may be closed during the day.

The following signals will be displayed:—

##### By Day.

*When the Gate is open.*—On each side of the gateway on the hulk to which the end of the gate is secured, the signals displayed by wreck-marking vessels, viz.:—Two black balls vertical on one yard-arm and one black ball on the opposite yard-arm. Vessels to pass on the side showing two balls.

*When the Gate is closed.*—On each side of the gateway of the boom a blue burgee.

This signal is also shown from Mount Wise signal station; Harbour Master's flagstaff, Longroom, Stonehouse; and South dockyard flagstaff.

##### By Night.

The Gate is closed and no signals will be shown.

22. Vessels are warned to pay strict attention to Clause 9, Second Schedule of Order in Council, 14th October, 1915, Regulations for the Dockyard Ports of Plymouth and Devonport, and no merchant vessel, whether navigating with or against the tide, is to attempt to pass a man-of-war in the "Narrows" when she is flying the "O" Flag at the fore truck.

Vessels are required not to pass other vessels in the gateway of the boom, and a vessel navigating against the tide should ease her engines and wait until any other vessel going with the tide has passed clear.

The following signals are hoisted at Mount Wise, Longroom, and South dockyard signal station:—

##### Signal and Signification.

Ball over Red Burgee.—Large ships coming from sound to Hamoaze; all traffic outwards between Rubble bank and Melampus light-buoy is to cease while this signal is flying.

Red Burgee over Ball.—Large ships coming from Hamoaze to sound all traffic inwards between Melampus light-buoy and Rubble bank is to cease while this signal is flying.

##### Ordinary Port Regulations.

23. The ordinary Regulations of the Port, except as affected by this Notice, are to be strictly adhered to.

#### IV.—BRISTOL CHANNEL.

1. All alien vessels navigating in the waters of the Bristol channel to the northward and eastward of a line drawn from Pwll-du head to the Scarweather light-vessel and thence to Sker (Scar) point must be conducted by Pilots

licensed by either the Swansea Harbour Trustees or the Port Talbot Pilotage Board.

All alien vessels navigating in the waters of the Bristol channel to the eastward of a line drawn from Breaksea point to Watchet must be conducted by Pilots licensed by either the London Trinity House, the Barry Pilotage Board, the Cardiff Pilotage Board, the Newport Pilotage Board, the Corporation of Bristol or the Gloucester Pilotage Board.

2. The passage of vessels through the channel southward of the Breaksea light-vessel is entirely prohibited. Vessels contravening this regulation are liable to be fired upon.

3. No vessel is allowed to anchor to the westward of a line drawn from Nells point to Breaksea light-vessel, except during foggy weather when inward bound.

Only vessels waiting to enter Barry harbour are permitted to anchor in Barry roads; all other shipping should anchor to the eastward of West Cardiff light-buoy.

*Variation.*—16° W.

*Note.*—This Notice is a revision of the former Notice quoted above.

#### *Caution.*

This Admiralty Notice to Mariners is issued under the provisions of the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, and failure to comply strictly with the directions contained in it will constitute an offence against those Regulations.

Any person found guilty of such an offence is liable to severe penalties both of imprisonment and fine.

Any person aiding or abetting the commission of such an offence is himself guilty of an offence against the Regulations.

Attention is also drawn to the fact that any infringement of the directions contained in this Admiralty Notice to Mariners is liable to result in the detention of the ship or vessel.

### ADMIRALTY NOTICE TO MARINERS.

No. 1101 of the year 1918.

SCOTLAND, EAST COAST.

*Firth of Forth—Traffic Regulations.*

*Former Notice.*—No. 963 of 1918; hereby cancelled.

Mariners are hereby warned that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty and are now in force:—

No vessels other than those of British Nationality, or those of the Allied Nations may enter Granton harbour, or the Port and Harbour of Burntisland, within the statutory limits administered by the Harbour Commissioners, until further Notice.

Vessels trading with neutral ports or having aliens on board, whether as members of the

crew or as passengers, are prohibited from using the following ports in the Firth of Forth:—

Burntisland, Kirkcaldy, Dysart and West Wemyss.

#### Section I.

(1) Until further notice, the following Regulations are to be observed by all merchant vessels, except when under escort, approaching or moving in the Firth of Forth (i.e., westward of a line joining Barns Ness and North Carr Rock).

(2) All orders and instructions given by the King's Harbour Master or Chief Examination Officer, Methil, or by any Patrol vessel are to be implicitly obeyed, otherwise vessels will be liable to be fired upon.

#### Section II.

##### INSTRUCTIONS TO SHIP MASTERS, &c.

(3) Masters of ships and other persons concerned are advised that in their own interests and the interests of those whom they represent they should assist in every possible way to conform to these Regulations.

(4) Ships outward bound without escort must time their departure so as to be clear of the Firth of Forth before the commencement of Official Night.

(5) Fishing Boats' numbers to be kept distinctly painted.

(6) No unescorted merchant vessel is permitted to be under way in the Firth of Forth during the hours of Official Night, or when the Firth of Forth has been closed, except with the official permission of the Commander-in-Chief. Coast of Scotland, which can be obtained through the King's Harbour Master or Chief Examination Officer, Methil.

(7) Merchant vessels may enter or leave the docks at Leith and Granton with the permission of the Senior Naval Officer, Leith, or the Senior Naval Officer, Granton, respectively. Special arrangements, which are notified from time to time, are made for merchant vessels entering and leaving Docks at Ports East of Inchkeith.

(8) (a) During Official Night no lights are to be visible from outboard, scuttles and skylights are to be effectively screened. When under way, navigation lights should be shown. (Electric navigation lights are prohibited.)

(b) The side ladder and a boat should be kept ready for use. All boats are to be kept hoisted close up to the davits during the hours of Official Night.

(c) The Wireless Room is to be locked, and no Wireless Messages are to be taken or despatched whilst the ship is in the Firth of Forth.

(d) When at anchor riding lights are to be exhibited so long as the Examination Steamer or other Naval vessel shows the three vertical red lights which indicate "Forth closed." When the three red lights are hauled down, all vessels are to extinguish their riding lights.

(e) Merchant vessels berthed in Leith and Granton Docks and Harbours are prohibited from having any lights visible from outboard during the hours of Official Night, unless such vessel is actually engaged in working cargo. All such lights are to be screened from overhead and from seaward when possible.

(9) When inward bound, the National Colours and number (or distinguishing signal)

are to be hoisted on passing May Island, and kept flying until the vessel docks.

(10) Care is to be taken that all flags displayed are showing clearly. If the weather is calm, any flag signal which the vessel is ordered by an Examination Steamer to hoist should be shaken out so as to render it readily distinguishable.

(11) As little smoke as possible is to be allowed to escape from the funnels, and care is to be taken that neither lights nor flags are obscured by it.

### Section III.

#### DISTINGUISHING SIGNALS OF EXAMINATION STEAMERS.

(12) Armed Examination Steamers will be found at the Examining Station (*see* Section VII.) and near the green buoy (*see* Section IV., par. (16)), and will be distinguished by the following means:—

*By Day.*—At the foremast head the special pilot flag (white and red horizontal, surrounded by a blue border). When the Firth of Forth is "Closed" three Red balls vertical will be hoisted in addition.

*By Night.*—Three Red lights vertically 6 feet apart, conspicuously displayed at the end of a yard so as to show an unbroken light round the horizon.

Masters of merchant vessels must approach these vessels with care, and see that when stopped they are in a favourable position for the Boarding Officer coming alongside, and that a beat-rope and side-ladder are in position.

### Section IV.

#### NAVIGATION IN THE FIRTH OF FORTH.

(13) Unescorted merchant vessels may enter the Firth of Forth at any time, but should make every endeavour to do so during official daylight and, when possible, should have sufficient daylight to allow them to be examined before dark.

(14) Vessels desirous of entering the Forth during Official Night or in thick or foggy weather must report themselves to St. Abbs Head or Fifeness Signal Stations, whence they should proceed as directed in paragraph (16). They will be met by a Patrol Vessel and taken to an anchorage.

(15) Sailing ships and other small vessels which are forced to seek shelter owing to weather conditions, and arrive during the hours of Official Night, will be anchored in the most convenient position by orders of a Patrol Vessel until the weather moderates.

(16) Unescorted vessels must pass between Isle of May and Anstruther Wester, *thence* they must steer a course so as to pass 2 miles south of Elieness, and within half a mile to the southward of a green buoy in lat. 56° 09' N., long. 2° 51' W.

*Thence* (if not met by a Pilot Boat or Examination Steamer) steer 297° (*N. 45° W. Mag.*) for a mile and a half to pass to the southward of a second buoy; *thence* to the Examining Station.

(17) All merchant vessels entering the Firth of Forth, with or without a pilot on board, are to proceed to the Examining Station to be passed by the Examining Officer and given the "Special Signal" before proceeding to any port in the Firth of Forth.

### Section V.

#### VESSELS LEAVING THE FIRTH OF FORTH.

(18) Merchant vessels must on no account leave the Firth of Forth without first obtaining a "Port Clearance" from the Collector of Customs at the port of departure.

(19) No unescorted merchant vessels are permitted to leave the Firth of Forth—

(a) During the hours of Official Night.

(b) If sufficient daylight is not left to enable them to clear the Isle of May before dark; or

(c) When the Firth of Forth is "Closed," except with the permission of the Commander-in-Chief, Rosyth, which must be obtained through the Chief Examination Officer, Methil.

(20) When the Firth of Forth is "Open" to the traffic of merchant shipping the following signal will be displayed at the various ports east of Oxcars:—

One Red ball, indicating that merchant vessels anchored in the roads off any port are at liberty to proceed.

No merchant vessel is to proceed until one Red ball is hoisted as follows:—

Leith.—From H.M.S. "Tyne."

Granton.—From Flagstaff at Central Pier.

Inchkeith.—From the Flagstaff at the Signal Station.

Burntisland.—From the Middle Lighthouse.

Kirkcaldy.—From the Flagstaff at the Harbour Master's Office.

Methil.—From a Flagstaff at the Dock Gate.

Wemyss.—At the entrance to Wemyss Harbour.

Dysart.—From the East Pier at the entrance to Dysart Harbour.

The Licensed Trinity Pilot in charge of a merchant vessel will be held personally responsible that such vessel does not leave her anchorage until the above-mentioned signal is hoisted.

The Red ball will be hoisted at the commencement of Official Day if the Firth of Forth is not "Closed" for any reason, and will be hauled down at the commencement of Official Night.

Note.—It will be hauled down on all occasions when the Firth of Forth is "Closed" to merchant shipping traffic by order of the King's Harbour Master, Rosyth, and will be rehoisted by order of the King's Harbour Master, Rosyth, when the Firth of Forth is "Opened" again to mercantile traffic.

### Section VI.

#### SIGNALS INDICATING FIRTH OF FORTH "CLOSED."

(21) Whenever the Firth of Forth is "Closed" during the day the following signals will be displayed:—

Three Red balls vertical will be hoisted by each Examination Steamer and also at Inchkeith and at the principal ports in the Firth of Forth.

The single Red ball which is hoisted at the principal ports in the Firth of Forth east of Oxcars, to indicate that the Firth of Forth is "Open," will at the same time be hauled down.

Note.—By night the Firth of Forth is closed

to all unescorted mercantile shipping, except as provided for in paragraph (14).

#### Section VII.

##### POSITION OF THE EXAMINING STATION.

(22) The Examining Station is 240° (S 78° W. *Mag.*) 1½ miles from Ruddons point.

(23) Vessels are not under any circumstances to attempt to pass in from the Examining Station without obtaining permission from the Examination Steamer, or to leave the Examination Anchorage, or to communicate with the shore or any other vessel, without first obtaining permission from the Examination Vessel.

(See Appendix "A," "Warnings to Masters.")

(24) During stormy weather, when boarding operations cannot be safely carried on off Ruddons point, vessels will receive special instructions as to where they are to proceed to an anchorage for examination.

#### Section VIII.

##### PILOTS AND PILOTAGE.

(25) It will be compulsory for all vessels to have a licensed pilot on board when navigating the Firth of Forth, unless under escort. Vessels entering the Firth for the purposes of joining a Convoy are not exempt from compulsory pilotage.

Incoming vessels will pick up the pilot from the Pilot Vessel which will be found in the vicinity of the green buoy (see Section IV., par. (16)) during the hours of Official Day.

Outward-bound vessels from ports west of Inchkeith are to proceed to the Advanced Convoy Anchorage and discharge their pilot there, or at the Cutter if sailing without Convoy.

A uniform landing fee of eight shillings is to be paid by every pilot landed from the motor boat or other vessel which is provided by the Admiralty for the purpose of conveying pilots to and from the pilotage station. The pilot is hereby authorised to recover this fee from the master, owner, or agent of each vessel piloted.

#### Section IX.

##### CAUTION AS TO ANCHORING.

(26) No merchant vessel will be permitted to anchor within the limits of the Firth of Forth, except as hereinafter stated, unless—

- (a) To avoid, or after, an accident;
- (b) Her further progress is prevented by unforeseen circumstances;
- (c) During thick or foggy weather.

When anchoring, care must be taken to be well clear of the fairway.

(27) If a vessel has to anchor for any of the reasons shown (a, b, or c, above) she is to hoist "Not under control" signals, and keep them displayed so long as she remains at anchor.

(28) Unescorted merchant vessels, after being given "Special Signal" by an Examining Officer and with pilot on board, may proceed during the hours of Official Day to anchor off the port of destination.

The pilot in charge of the vessel is responsible

that no contravention of the Traffic Regulations of the Firth of Forth occur during this period.

If, whilst a merchant vessel is lying at anchor off any port east of Oxcars in the Firth of Forth, the weather conditions become so unfavourable as to jeopardise the safety of the vessel in the position in which she is then lying, the pilot may use his discretion and get under way to proceed under the lee of Inchkeith in the case of easterly gales, and to Kirkcaldy in the case of westerly gales.

In doing this, he is responsible that the vessel carries navigation lights, proceeds at slow speed, and keeps out of the fairway.

#### Section X.

##### PATROL OF INTERNAL WATERWAYS AND APPROACHES TO THE FIRTH OF FORTH.

(29) The Firth of Forth, as well as the approaches thereto, will be patrolled by Naval Patrol boats or other Government vessels.

Masters of merchant vessels and persons in charge of small craft are hereby warned to observe any orders which may be given by the Naval Patrols.

Merchant vessels and small craft will be subject to inspection and search, and will be liable to be fired upon in the event of disobedience to the orders given them by the patrols.

They also render themselves liable to be prosecuted under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914.

#### Section XI.

##### MERCHANT VESSELS TO FLY THEIR COLOURS, &c.

(30) All merchant vessels which are within the limits of the Firth of Forth must—

- (a) Keep their colours flying day and night.
- (b) Keep their commercial code number flying from sunrise to sunset.
- (c) Show the regulation navigation lights by night unless ordered to the contrary. (See Section II., paragraph (8)).

#### Section XII.

##### ORDINARY NAVIGATION RULES TO BE ADHERED TO.

(31) The ordinary rules for the navigation and safe conduct of ships are to be adhered to in the Firth of Forth, except as far as they are affected by these Regulations.

Nothing in these Regulations will exonerate the owner, master, or agent of any ship from any neglect of the ordinary rules for the navigation and safe conduct of ships.

#### APPENDIX A.

##### WARNINGS TO MASTERS OF VESSELS IN THE FIRTH OF FORTH.

1. You are to strictly obey all orders given you by the officer who boards you, or by the King's Harbour Master or his representative, or the Chief Examination Officer, Methil.

2. When in the Examination Anchorage, or lying off any port in the Firth of Forth below the Forth Bridge, waiting to dock, or for Official Day after undocking during the night, or when at anchor in consequence of fog, &c., you are forbidden, except in emergency which you will be called upon to prove, to lower any boats or to communicate with the shore, or to

work the cables, or to move the ship, or to allow anyone to leave the ship without permission of the Senior Naval Officer, Leith, if anchored off Leith, or the Port Authority of ports other than Leith in the Firth of Forth. You are also to keep your National Colours and the Signal Letters of your ship's name flying day and night.

3. Before leaving any port or anchorage in the Firth of Forth you must obtain permission from the proper authorities (*see* Section V., paragraph (18)).

4. The use of wireless telegraphy is prohibited. You are to forthwith lower all aerial wires, and disconnect them from their halliards and from the operating room. They are not to be rehoisted whilst your ship is in British territorial waters, except by special permission from the Admiralty as laid down in "Instructions for Masters of British Merchant Ships, &c."

5. To communicate with the Port Authorities, hoist flags J. G. C. by day, or lights Red, White, Red, vertically by night.

*Variation.*—18° W.

*Note.*

This Notice is a revision of the former Notice quoted above.

*Caution.*

This Admiralty Notice to Mariners is issued under the provisions of the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, and failure to comply strictly with the directions contained in it will constitute an offence against those Regulations.

Any person found guilty of such an offence is liable to severe penalties both of imprisonment and fine.

Any person aiding or abetting the commission of such an offence is himself guilty of an offence against the Regulations.

Attention is also drawn to the fact that any infringement of the directions contained in this Admiralty Notice to Mariners is liable to result in the detention of the ship or vessel.
