By the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.—No. 65.

WHEREAS His Majesty has been pleased, in exercise of the power in that behalf conferred on Him by Section one, sub-section one, of the Trading with the Enemy (Extension of Powers) Act, 1915, by divers Proclamations, and in particular by a Proclamation dated the 23rd day of May, 1916, and amended on the 16th day of January, 1918, entitled "The Trading with the Enemy (Statutory List) Proclamation," to prohibit all persons or bodies of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, resident, carrying on business, or being in the United Kingdom from trading with any of the persons or bodies of persons mentioned in the List contained in the last-mentioned Proclamation, such List being therein referred to as the Statutory List:

And whereas by Section one, sub-section two, of the said Act, it is provided that any List of persons and bodies of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, with whom such trading is prohibited by a Proclamation under the said Act may be varied or added to by an Order made

by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of a Secretary of State:

And whereas the Statutory List contained in the last-mentioned Proclamation has been varied and added to by subsequent Orders of Council:

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs to the effect that the Statutory List should be further varied and added to as set forth in the Schedule hereto.

Now, therefore, Their Lordships, having taken the said recommendation into consideration, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered,

That the Statutory List be varied and added to as set forth in the Schedule hereto.

Whereof the Right Honourable Arthur James Balfour, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Controller of the Foreign Trade Department, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

NOTE (1).—All persons or firms resident, carrying on business or being in the United Kingdom are prohibited from having, with any

person or firm mentioned in this List, or in any List issued under the Trading with the Enemy (Statutory List) Proclamation, any dealings other than such as are expressly authorised by paragraph 5 of the Proclamation. A List (The Consolidated List, No. 61A) consolidating all previous Lists, up to and including that of the 9th August, 1918, together with List No. 62 of 23rd August, List No. 63 of 6th September, List No. 64 of 20th September, and the List herewith annexed, contain all the names which up to this date are included in the Statutory List.

Additions to and variations in these Lists will be published at intervals approximately of two weeks.

The Lists are published in the London Gazette and reproduced in the Board of Trade Journal, and separate copies of all Lists may be obtained at a small cost from the Superintendent of Publications, His Majesty's Stationery Office, Imperial House, Kingsway, W.C.

NOTE (2).—Where a firm is mentioned in the List, every partner in the firm is also included in the list; and all dealings with any partner in the firm, as well as all dealings with the firm, are prohibited: and conversely, all dealings with a firm, any partner in which is mentioned in the list, are also prohibited.

NOTE (3).—Where a person or firm mentioned in the List has more than one address in the country or group of countries under which the name of the person or firm appears, all dealings in that country, or in any country in the group, with such person or firm are prohibited, even in cases where one only of the addresses or one only of the countries is specially mentioned.

NOTE (4).—Trading is prohibited under the Trading with the Enemy Proclamations of 25th June and 10th November, 1915, with any person or firm of enemy nationality resident or carrying on business in China, Siam, Persia, Morocco, Liberia or Portuguese East Africa. Persons or firms in the United Kingdom are therefore prohibited from trading with any person or firm of enemy nationality in any of those countries, even though such person or firm is not mentioned by name in the Statutory List.

NOTE (5).—In order to minimise as far as possible any inconvenience which may be caused to the British traders by the dislocation of export trade owing to the inclusion in the Statutory List of a former connection, the Foreign Trade Department is collecting and classifying the names of non-enemy firms who may be able to act as substitutes for firms mentioned in the Statutory List. A considerable amount of information is already available at the Foreign Trade Department, and it is in many cases possible to suggest the names of satisfactory substitutes for individual firms on the Lists, without the necessity of referring the matter abroad. The Department is, however, prepared on application to inquire of His Majesty's Representatives abroad for the names of suitable substitutes. When the applicant wishes this done by telegraph he is required to undertake to pay the cost of telegraphic correspondence. It would greatly facilitate the work of the Foreign Trade Department if applicants in making inquiries would specify the particular trade or trades for which substitutes are

required. *General inquiries for new connections abroad should be addressed to The Comptroller-General, Department of Overseas Trade (Development and Intelligence), 73, Basinghall Street, London, E.C. 2.*

NOTE (6).—The Statutory List for each country is telegraphed, on the day of issue, to His Majesty's representative in that country, who is instructed to notify accordingly British Consular Officers, to whom persons abroad should apply for information as to names on the List. Persons and firms in the United Kingdom with agencies or branches abroad would, however, be well advised to furnish such agencies or branches with issues of the List as they appear. The names on the Lists for all countries in Central or South America are also notified to His Majesty's Ambassador at Washington, who transmits them to H.M. Consul-General at New York and to other centres in the United States likely to be interested.

NOTE (7).—It is not unusual for firms in Holland and the Netherland East Indies to be registered under names commencing with descriptive terms such as "Handel Maatschappij" (Trading Company) or "Naamlooze Venootschap" (Limited Liability Company). In such cases it has been found more convenient to publish the firm under its proper name, followed by the general descriptive term "Handel Maatschappij" or "Naamlooze Venootschap" (N.V.) as in the case of an English company. For instance, Handel Maatschappij van den Berg & Company and Naamlooze Venootschap de Komeet v/h Dumonceau Frères will be found under "Berg" and "Komeet" respectively, and not under "Handel" or "Naamlooze."

By virtue of an Act passed in the 24th year of the Reign of His Majesty King George III, intituled "An Act to repeal so much of two Acts made in the 10th and 15th years of the Reign of His present Majesty, as authorizes The Speaker of the House of Commons to issue his Warrant to the Clerk of the Crown for making out Writs for the Election of Members to serve in Parliament in the manner therein mentioned, and for substituting other provisions for the like purposes"; And of an Act passed in the 26th year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to further limit and define the time for proceeding to Election during the Recess."

His Majesty's Minister at The Hague has received from the Netherlands Minister (British Section) at Constantinople the following communication, dated August 17th, 1918, notifying the decision of the Ottoman Council of Ministers published on the 8th ultimo, respecting the treatment of enemy property in Turkey:—

“ La Légation Royale des Pays-Bas à Constantinople présente ses compliments à la Légation de S.M. Britannique à La Haye et a l'honneur de lui faire la communication suivante: Une récente décision du Conseil des Ministres ottoman, rendue publique le 9 Août courant porte que, le Ministère des Finances doit assurer à l'avenir la gestion des biens immeubles appartenant à des belligérants absents et actuellement gérés par des tiers. Un délai de 10 jours est accordé à tous ceux qui gèrent, d'une manière officielle ou non, les dits immeubles pour se présenter à la Direction des Domaines aux fins d'y faire connaître la date à laquelle leur gestion a commencé et les conditions dans lesquelles elle s'est effectuée. Passé ce délai, l'Administration du Fisco prendra en mains la gestion des biens susmentionnés.

“ La Légation Royale des Pays-Bas n'a pas manqué d'établir, par des preuves juridiques, dans un memorandum laissé au Ministre Impérial des Affaires Etrangères qu'une simple décision ministérielle, qui touche à des droits privés, n'a pas force de loi et n'est pas exécutoire. THE GAS COKE PRICES ORDER, 1918, DATED
THE 1ST DAY OF OCTOBER, 1918, MADE BY
THE BOARD OF TRADE UNDER REGULATIONS
2F TO 2JJ OF THE DEFENCE OF THE REALM
REGULATIONS.

The Board of Trade, in exercise of their powers under Regulations 2F to 2JJ of the Defence of the Realm Regulations and of all other powers enabling them thereto, hereby order as follows:—

1. This Order applies to all sales of gas, coke or breeze in the United Kingdom for such industrial and other purposes as the Household Coal Distribution Order, 1917, or the Household Fuel and Lighting Order, 1918, do not apply to.

2. (a) The maximum price of ordinary large gas coke delivered to a consumer by road vehicle shall in any district be the second highest price fixed under the Household Fuel and Lighting Order, 1918, for sales of coal in such district.

(b) The maximum price of unscreened breeze delivered to a consumer by road vehicle shall be 40 per cent. of the corresponding price of ordinary large gas coke.

3. (a) The maximum price of ordinary large gas coke or unscreened breeze delivered in railway wagon or barge load or cargo to a consumer, or to a retail merchant for delivery by road vehicle to consumers, shall be less than the price prescribed under Article 2 of this Order by 12s. per ton in the case of deliveries within the Metropolitan Fuel Area as defined in Section 124 of the Household Fuel and Lighting Order, 1918, and in the case of deliveries in the rest of Great Britain by such amount as has been fixed by the Local Fuel and Lighting Committee for the district in respect of loading, cartage, and delivery of coke, or, where no amount has been so fixed, by 10s. per ton.

(b) Where the transport charges by rail, barge or ship as the case may be are not paid either in whole or in part by the gas undertaking from whose works the coke or breeze is supplied, the maximum price shall be reduced by the amount by which such charges to the destination are not borne by the gas undertaking; provided that in the case of coke or breeze delivered into barge at gas works within the Metropolitan Area the amount by which the maximum price for coke or breeze delivered at destination shall be reduced shall be 2s. 6d. per ton in respect of the service of lighterage plus any additional cost of transport by rail.

4. (a) Additional charges may be made for the services of breaking, screening or washing coke or breeze provided that any dispute as to the cost of such services shall be submitted to the Controller of Coal Mines, whose decision shall be final and conclusive for all purposes. Any such charge shall be shown separately on the invoice.

5. The price of gas coke or breeze sold by a gas undertaking to a factor or wholesale merchant shall be 1s. 3d. per ton less than the price chargeable to a consumer under the provisions of this Order.

Provided that—

(i) Where coke or breeze is dealt with by more than one factor or wholesale merchant before reaching the consumer or retail merchant the above amount of 1s. 3d. per ton shall be divisible between the different factors and wholesale merchants, and each seller, except in the case of the final sale to the consumer or retail merchant, shall at the time of the sale inform the purchaser how much of the above amount is included in the price, and shall show such amount on every quotation, sale note, document or memorandum relating to the sale and on the invoice in order that the maximum price may not be exceeded.

(ii) Where payment is not made by the consumer or retail merchant before the date on which payment is due to the original owner of the coke or breeze or within thirty days of delivery of the same, whichever is the later, the factor or wholesale merchant may make a charge not exceeding 2½ per cent. in respect of credit to the consumer or retail merchant.

6. Where a consumer purchases gas coke or unscreened breeze under a contract for not less than 50 tons of gas coke or unscreened breeze per month over a period of not less than 12 months, the maximum price chargeable by the gas undertaking at the gas works, that is the price prescribed by Articles 2, 3 and 5 of this Order reduced by the costs of transport and handling, shall be reduced by 10 per cent. and the price chargeable by a factor or merchant in respect of coke supplied to a consumer under such a contract shall be correspondingly reduced.

7. The Board of Trade may by notice under the hand of the Controller of Coal Mines suspend the operation of this Order or any provision of this Order within the district of any local authority or larger area for such times and subject to such conditions as may be prescribed in the notice and may in like manner restore such operation.

8. The maximum prices and charges provided under this Order may be increased or reduced by the Controller of Coal Mines either

generally or as regards any particular class or case.

9. All contracts for the purchase and sale of coke and breeze existing at the date when this Order comes into operation shall remain in force notwithstanding anything contained herein, but the prices payable under such contracts shall be modified so that it shall be a price not less than, and not exceeding, the price prescribed by this Order.

Any party to such contract may apply to the Controller for the variation of or relief against any term or condition of such contract.

10. Infringements of this Order are summary offences against the Defence of the Realm Regulations.

11. This Order comes into force on the 7th day of October, 1918.

12. In the application of this Order to Scotland the Household Fuel and Lighting (Scotland) Order, 1918, shall be substituted for the Household Fuel and Lighting Order, 1918, wherever reference to the latter Order is made.

13. This Order may be cited as the Gas Coke Prices Order, 1918.

DEFENCE OF THE REALM

REGULATIONS.

PORT OF LIVERPOOL.

Rules in the Interests of Public Safety at the Port of Liverpool, made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty and the Army Council after consultation with a Secretary of State, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by Regulation 35A of the Defence of the Realm Regulations.

1. Application.

These Rules shall apply to the Docks and the Estate of the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board, to the Docks and Quays of the London and North-Western Railway Company at Gar-

ston (all of which are hereinafter called "the premises"), and to vessels (other than His Majesty's ships in commission flying the White Ensign) within the premises or within that part of the River Mersey (hereinafter called "the defined area") which lies between two imaginary lines, the northern of such lines being drawn from the Rock Lighthouse to the outer end of the Jetty on the Northern side of the Entrance to the Gladstone Docks, and the Southern of such lines being drawn from Eastham Ferry Pier to the South boundary of the Garston Docks.

The posting of these Rules conspicuously in and about the premises, and the publication of a Notice to Mariners, shall be deemed to be notice of their contents to all persons concerned.

2. Smoking, Matches, Lights, etc.

(a) No person shall smoke, or use any match or other contrivance or apparatus of any kind for producing a light for smoking on any part of the premises or on board a vessel, except in places approved by the Head Constable of Liverpool or the Chief Constable of Birkenhead, as the case may be, which approval may be withdrawn at any time. Provided that this part of the Rule shall not apply to a vessel within the defined area unless such vessel shall have on board any explosive or highly inflammable substance, or any ammunition (other than ships' ammunition when stored as hereinafter defined).

(b) No person shall bring or have in his possession within or in the immediate vicinity of any part of the premises, or on board a vessel where any explosive or highly inflammable substance or ammunition (other than ships' ammunition when stored as hereinafter defined) is stored or deposited, or is being handled or carried, any match or apparatus for producing a light, or use any lamp, light or fire of any description except such as may be used as provided by Bye-laws Nos. 40, 41, and 43 of the Bye-laws for regulating the conveyance, loading or unloading of explosive substances within the port of Liverpool which are as follows:—

40. The hatches of any ship or boat having any Explosive on board, other than ships' ammunition, are to be kept closed, except when the operation of loading or discharging explosive is being actually performed, and, when closed, are to be covered with tarpaulins securely battened.

41. There shall be no lights or fires of any kind on board any ship or boat having Explosives on board, whilst the hatches are open or are not secured in the manner prescribed by the last Bye-Law or whilst loading or unloading any Explosive, except such safety lanterns as may, from time to time, be approved by the Board for use in the holds of vessels during the loading or unloading of Explosive, and except as regards Steamers' furnace fires properly banked up, and a light contained in a locked lantern to be used in the Engine Room for the inspection of the Steam Gauge.

43. In any ship, boat, or vehicle containing Explosive, no matches other than safety matches shall be kept for use, and such safety matches shall be kept in a safe place apart from the Explosive.

3. Searching.

An authorised Officer or a Police Constable (if in plain clothes, on production of his

authority) may search at any time (a) any part of the premises or any vehicle or anything therein, or (b) any person entering or being within or in the immediate vicinity of any part of the premises, or on a vessel where any explosive or highly inflammable substance or ammunition (other than ships' ammunition when stored as hereinafter defined) is stored or deposited, or is being handled or carried, and may examine a person's clothing and any bag, basket, parcel, or other article he may be carrying; and every person entering or being within any such part of the premises or on board a vessel shall, if so required by any such Officer or Constable, submit to such search and comply with any reasonable direction or regulation given or made with the object of enabling the same to be carried out. Provided that in no case shall a woman be searched by or in the presence of anyone but a woman.

4. *Entering Premises—Orders by Authorised Officers.*

(a) All persons shall obey any lawful order given by an authorised officer in the interests of public safety.

(b) No person shall, except on lawful business, enter any part of the premises or board a vessel where any explosive or highly inflammable substance or ammunition (other than ships' ammunition when stored as hereinafter defined) is stored or deposited, or is being handled or carried.

(c) No person shall enter or remain in any such part of the premises or any such vessel, or in the immediate vicinity thereof, or allow any article taken there by him to remain, after he has been ordered away therefrom or ordered to remove such article by an authorised Officer, or by a Police Constable, or by a Naval or Military sentry.

5. *Authorised Officers.*

The following shall be authorised officers:—

The competent Naval Authority.
The competent Military Authority.
The Principal Naval Transport Officer.
The Embarkation Commandant.

The Danger Building Officer for the Port of Liverpool and any person authorised in writing by him.

The Inspectors of Explosives for the Dock Estates on the Lancashire and Cheshire sides of the River Mersey and any other Police Officer of not less rank than a Serjeant appointed in writing by the Head Constable of Liverpool or the Chief Constable of Birkenhead.

6. *Intoxication.*

No person in a state of intoxication shall enter or remain or be in any part of the premises or on board any vessel to which Rule 2 (b) for the time being is applicable.

7. *Saving of Other Rules.*

These rules are in addition to and not in substitution for any other Rules or Regulations, whether Statutory or otherwise, in force within the premises or the defined area.

8. *Ships' Ammunition.*

These Rules shall apply in their entirety to ships' ammunition when such ammunition is being embarked or disembarked or handled on board the vessel or in the premises, but shall not apply when such ammunition is stored in

the ship's magazine or other authorised compartment on board.

9. *Commencement of Rules.*

These Rules shall come into force as from the date hereof.

10. *Penalties.*

Any person failing to comply with the above Rules will be guilty of a summary offence against the Defence of the Realm Regulations and liable on conviction to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a period not exceeding six months, or to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds (£100) or both.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 1ST OCTOBER 1918.)

EAST SUSSEX AND KENT (FOOT-AND- MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1918 (No. 2).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by
virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in
them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894
to 1914, and of every other power enabling
them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby
ordered, as follows:—

Movement of Animals into certain Boroughs for Immediate Slaughter.

1. Notwithstanding anything in the East
Sussex and Kent (Foot-and-Mouth Disease)
Order of 1918, an animal may, subject as here-
inafter provided, be moved without a licence
by railway or by vessel from outside the
Scheduled District described in the Schedule
to that Order to a railway station or landing
place situate within any borough mentioned
in the First Schedule to this Order; and an
animal so moved may be moved from the rail-
way station or landing place to any slaughter-
house or bacon factory situate within the same
borough if accompanied by a Movement
Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local
Authority of the borough.

Provisions as to Movement Licences.

2.—(1) The movement of an animal with a
Movement Licence under this Order shall be
subject to the following conditions:—

(i.) The animal shall be moved to the
slaughterhouse or bacon factory specified in
the Licence, and not elsewhere, and shall be
there detained, and shall be slaughtered
within four days of its arrival thereat.

(ii.) The animal during the movement to
the slaughterhouse or bacon factory shall,
so far as is practicable, be kept separate
from all animals not being moved with a
Licence under this Order.

(iii.) After completion of the movement
the Licence shall forthwith be delivered up

at, or sent by post to, the nearest police
station in the same district by the person
in charge of the animal at the time of com-
pleting such movement.

(2) A Movement Licence granted under this
Order shall be in force for not more than four
days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall
be in the form set forth in the Second Schedule
hereto, or to the like effect.

Exception of Certain Animals from Provisions as to Movement.

3. Nothing in this Order shall be construed
as authorising movement of an animal the
movement of which is prohibited by Regula-
tion of a Local Authority or by notice of an
Inspector of the Local Authority or of the
Board given under any Order of the Board.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

4.—(1.) Any person in charge of an animal
being moved, where under this Order a Move-
ment Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of
a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector
or other officer of the Board or of a Local
Authority, produce and show to him the
Licence, if any, necessary for the movement,
and shall allow it to be read, and a copy of or
extract from it to be taken by the person to
whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on
demand as aforesaid, give his name and address
to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or
other officer.

Commencement.

5. This Order shall come into operation on
the fourth day of October, nineteen hundred
and eighteen.

6. This Order may be cited as the EAST
SUSSEX AND KENT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE)
ORDER OF 1918 (No. 2).

1. Two light-buoys have been established to mark a ship-passage through the North Shear in the approach to Rosslare as follows:—

(a) Eastern light-buoy:

Position.—At a distance of 3 miles and $1\frac{1}{2}$ cables, 77° (*S. 85° E. Mag.*), from Rosslare point Pilot Signal staff.

Lat. $52^{\circ} 20\frac{1}{4}'$ N., long. $6^{\circ} 17\frac{1}{4}'$ W.

Description.—A black pillar-shaped light-buoy exhibiting a *flashing red* light every three seconds.

(b) Western light-buoy:

Position.—At a distance of approximately 600 feet, 278° (*N. 64° W. Mag.*), from the eastern light-buoy (a).

Remarks.—This light-buoy has been temporarily replaced by a red conical unlighted buoy.

2. Approach to Rosslare from the northward:

All vessels approaching or leaving Rosslare by the North Shear must pass between the buoys described above.

All other passage between Raven spit and Long bank is prohibited.

3. Whistle-buoy withdrawn:

All vessels bound to or from Falmouth Harbour must pass between the two light-buoys situated at a distance of about 3 miles south-westward from St. Anthony point lighthouse as

shown on charts, and maintain a course 0° (*N. 17° E. Mag.*) and 180° (*S. 17° W. Mag.*), respectively, for a distance of a quarter of a mile from the light-buoys.

Any instructions given by the patrol vessels should be strictly observed. Vessels proceeding eastward must obtain instructions as to the route to be followed before attempting to leave the anchorage.

Vessels entering Falmouth harbour must close the Drifter, stationed about half a mile to the southward of the two light-buoys defining the ship-passage.

This Drifter regulates inward-bound and outward-bound traffic.

Inward-bound vessels will be given priority over outward-bound vessels in respect of passage through the ship-passage.

Signals:

To indicate that the ship-passage is clear for inward-bound vessels, the Drifter will display:—

(a) By Day.—No signal.

(b) By Night.—Two horizontal red lights.

To indicate that the ship-passage is clear for outward-bound vessels, the Drifter will display:—

(a) By Day.—A black shape.

(b) By Night.—Two horizontal white lights.

During fog the Drifter will remain close to the ship-passage, and will sound the following signals:—

(a) Under normal conditions when no vessel is passing either way, the Drifter will sound "K" (— — — —) on her whistle every two minutes. This signal is intended to indicate the position of the Drifter and of the ship-passage.

(b) When an inward-bound vessel is heard approaching, the Drifter will sound letter "V" (— — — —) on her whistle to indicate that the ship-passage is clear for inward-bound vessels.

(c) When an outward-bound vessel is heard approaching, the Drifter will sound letter "O" (— — — —) on her whistle to indicate that the ship-passage is clear for outward-bound vessels.

Vessels approaching Falmouth in foggy weather should be careful to sound the regulation fog-signal and to proceed with great caution when within a depth of 30 fathoms at all states of the tide.

When the ship-passage is clear for inward-bound traffic, no outward-bound vessel may approach within half a mile of the ship-passage; and when the signals indicate that outward-bound traffic may pass through the ship-passage, no inward-bound vessels may approach within half a mile of the ship-passage.

During the hours of darkness all vessels entering or leaving Falmouth harbour must exhibit their side-lights.

(2) Penzance Bay—Traffic Regulations.

All vessels bound to or from Penzance bay must pass between the two light-buoys situated at a distance of about $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles south-eastward from St. Paul church, north-westward of Mousehole, as shown on charts, and maintain a course 0° (*N. 17° E. Mag.*) and 180° (*S. 17° W. Mag.*), respectively, for a distance of a quarter of a mile from the light-buoys.

Vessels approaching from the eastward must keep to the southward of the parallel of lat. $50^{\circ} 02' N.$, until reaching a position about 3

miles southward of the ship-passage, which should then be steered for.

Any instructions given by the patrol vessels should be strictly observed.

Inward-bound vessels will have priority over outward-bound vessels in respect of passage through the ship-passage.

Vessels entering Penzance bay must close the Drifter, stationed about half a mile to the southward of the two light-buoys defining the ship-passage.

This Drifter regulates inward-bound and outward-bound traffic.

The signals exhibited by this Drifter are as prescribed for Falmouth in Part (1) of this Notice.

Vessels making Mounts bay in foggy weather should be careful to sound the regulation fog-signal and to proceed with great caution when within a depth of 25 fathoms at all states of the tide.

When the ship-passage is clear for inward-bound traffic, no outward-bound vessel may approach within half a mile of the ship-passage; and when the signals indicate that outward-bound traffic may pass through the ship-passage, no inward-bound vessel may approach within half a mile of the ship-passage.

During the hours of darkness, all vessels entering or leaving Penzance bay must exhibit their side-lights.

Before attempting to leave Penzance bay, outward-bound vessels must obtain instructions as to the route to be followed.

Tor Bay Approaches—Traffic Regulations.

Former Notice.—No. 1088 of 1918.

Two ship-passages have been established as follows:—

Northern ship-passage, 600 feet wide, marked by light-buoys on either side, situated $5\frac{1}{2}$ cables, 142° (*S. 22° E. Mag.*), from the Ore Stone Δ . This ship-passage is to be used by:—

(1) All vessels approaching Tor Bay from the eastward.

Such vessels should make a position one mile, 44° (*N. 60° E. Mag.*), from the ship-passage and enter on a course 224° (*S. 60° W. Mag.*) till half a mile beyond the ship-passage.

(2) All east-bound vessels leaving Tor Bay.

Such vessels should steer so as to pass through the ship-passage on a course 44° (*N. 60° E. Mag.*) and should continue on this course for one mile, when course is to be altered to join the route in force.

Southern ship-passage, 600 feet wide, marked by light-buoys on either side, situated 7 cables, 84° (*S. 80° E. Mag.*), from Berry

Head lighthouse. This ship-passage is to be used by:—

(1) All vessels approaching Tor Bay from the southward and westward.

Such vessels should make a position one mile, 144° (*S. 20° E. Mag.*), from the ship-passage, and enter on a course, 324° (*N. 20° W. Mag.*) till half a mile beyond the ship-passage.

(2) All south and west-bound vessels.

Such vessels should steer so as to pass through the ship-passage on a course 144° (*S. 20° E. Mag.*) and should continue on this course for a mile beyond the ship-passage, when course is to be altered to join the route in force.

Caution is necessary when entering southern ship-passage as the stream sets obliquely across the entrance. A Drifter regulates the inward and outward-bound traffic through each ship-passage.

Inward-bound vessels will be given priority over outward-bound vessels in respect of passage through the ship-passages.

Signals:

To indicate that the ship-passage is clear for *inward-bound* vessels, the Drifter will display:—

(a) By Day: No signal.

(b) By Night: Two horizontal red lights.

To indicate that the ship-passage is clear for *outward-bound* vessels the Drifter will display:—

(a) By Day: A black shape.

(b) By Night: Two horizontal white lights.

During fog the Drifter will remain close to the ship-passages, and will sound the following signals:—

(a) Under normal conditions when no vessel is passing either way, the Drifter will sound "K" (— — — —) on her whistle every two minutes. This signal is intended to indicate the position of the Drifter and of the ship-passage.

(b) When an inward-bound vessel is heard approaching, the Drifter will sound letter "V" (— — — —) on her whistle to indicate that the ship-passage is clear for inward-bound vessels.

(c) When an outward-bound vessel is heard approaching, the Drifter will sound letter "O" (— — — —) on her whistle to indicate that the ship-passage is clear for outward-bound vessels.

No outgoing vessel is to approach within half a mile of the ship-passages unless this signal is displayed and permission has been given to proceed.

Incoming vessels are not to approach within half a mile of the ship-passages while they are open to outgoing vessels. All vessels entering or leaving Tor Bay during darkness must exhibit their side-lights.

Vessels approaching Tor Bay in foggy weather should sound the regulation fog-signal and proceed with great caution.

ANCHORAGE REGULATIONS.

All orders given by the patrols are to be strictly carried out.

Vessels entering Tor Bay anchorage in order to bunker at Brixham, and westbound vessels in ballast which are weather-bound and unable to round Start Point are to anchor as directed

in Brixham roads to the westward of a line drawn in a 0° (*N. 16° E. Mag.*) direction from Brixham breakwater light, and to the southward of a line drawn in a 90° (*S. $7\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ E. Mag.*) from Goodrington.

Sailing vessels are to anchor as directed on the inshore side of a line drawn in a 219° (*N. 45° W. Mag.*) direction through Brixham breakwater light clear of the fairway into Brixham harbour.

All other vessels are to anchor as directed on entering.

REGULATIONS FOR BRIXHAM FISHING VESSELS.

No fishing vessel is on any account to attempt to pass through the ship-passages during the hours of darkness.

Fishing vessels are not to leave Brixham harbour until permission has been obtained from the Port Fishery Officer. The three organised fleets working from Brixham are to follow the motions of the Admiral of their fleet in respect of leaving harbour.

The conduct of these fleets is dealt with by local orders.

In addition to the restrictions to fishing laid down in Admiralty Notices to Mariners:—

Trawling or drifting is prohibited within two miles of the obstruction in any direction.

The laying of nets, crab or any other pots, or anchoring for the purpose of fishing with hand lines is entirely prohibited within half a mile of the obstruction in any direction.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING SMALL CRAFT AND PLEASURE BOATS.

The following regulations are to apply to all small craft and pleasure boats (exclusive of *bond fide* commercial fishing craft sailing under fishing permits) using the harbours of Brixham, Paignton and Torquay.

No small craft or pleasure boat will be permitted to go outside the ship-passages.

Small craft with amateur fishing permits can obtain special permission to pass through the ship-passages between the hours of sunrise and sunset provided they keep within the three-mile limit from their port. Such permission must be obtained from the Senior Naval Officer, Torquay, through the Station Officer of the Coastguard Station.

Small craft must not go alongside, or hold communication with any vessel in the anchorage unless special permission from the Senior Naval Officer has been obtained to do so.

Variation.— 16° W.

Dover Channel—Traffic Regulations.

Former Notice.—No. 1037 of 1918.

1. Two light-vessels and four light-buoys have been established to mark a gateway in the

Dover channel off Folkestone, as shown on the charts.

2. Shipping is hereby warned that the *only* passage for traffic proceeding between the Downs and Dungeness is between the North-East and South-East gate light-buoys and then between North and South Folkestone gate light-vessels shown on the chart, and between North-West and South-West gate light-buoys and *vice versa*, and that Article 25 of the Collision Regulations must be complied with, that is to say, East-bound traffic must keep to the Southern side of the passage and West-bound traffic must keep to the Northern side. Ships disregarding this warning will do so at their own peril.

3. *Caution.*—Mariners are warned to exercise great caution when approaching the ships' passage between the Folkestone gate light-vessels, as the tidal streams may at times set obliquely across the passage. Both light-vessels should be given as wide a berth as the width of the passage and compliance with Article 25 of the Collision Regulations permit.

4. The latest route information and route instructions are to be obtained from the examination vessels off Calais and Boulogne, or in the Downs or from Patrol vessels westward of Folkestone gate or in the vicinity of Cape Gris Nez. Any deviation from these instructions may entail the destruction of the vessel. No vessels are to pass through the area given in paragraph 5 of this Notice except by the authorised routes.

5. No vessel is to anchor or to fish in the following area:—

The area is bounded by lines joining the following points:—

- (a) Admiralty pier lighthouse, Dover.
- (b) Les Quenocs buoy No. 4.
- (c) Cape Gris Nez lighthouse.
- (d) The light-buoy at the north-east end of the Bassure de Baas in lat. $50^{\circ} 48\frac{1}{2}'$ N., long. $1^{\circ} 33'$ E.
- (e) The light-buoy at the south-west end of Le Colbart in lat. $50^{\circ} 49\frac{1}{4}'$ N., long. $1^{\circ} 15\frac{1}{2}'$ E.
- (f) Sandgate castle.

6. No merchant vessel is to pass to the north-eastward of an imaginary line drawn in a direction 292° (*N. 55° W. Mag.*) from the outer end of Gravelines pier as far as the South Sand Head of the Goodwin Sands, unless in receipt of special authority to do so from the Vice-Admiral, Dover, or the Examination or Patrol vessels mentioned in paragraph 4.

7. British Merchant vessels approaching the Straits of Dover are to hoist their number in the International Code.

8. *Caution.*—Mariners are warned that light-buoys which are not shown on the chart may be met with between the parallels of lat. $51^{\circ} 04'$ N. and $51^{\circ} 20'$ N.

SCOTLAND, NORTH-EAST COAST, WITH ORKNEY AND SHETLAND ISLES.

Former Notices.—Nos. 737, 756, 796, 925 and 1035 of 1918.

Notice is hereby given that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and are now in force:—

(1) *Pentland and Moray Firths—Restrictions of Traffic; Pilotage and Traffic Regulations.*

The following regulations have been made with a view to safeguarding the interests of shipping in the Pentland and Moray firths:—

I.—RESTRICTION OF TRAFFIC.

1. No vessel, either British, Allied or Neutral, is to be in the shaded area on the accompanying portion of Admiralty Chart No. 2, from half an hour after sunset to half an hour before sunrise, unless at anchor. No vessel, however, is to anchor:—

(a) Anywhere along the coast between Tarbet ness and North Sutor, except within one mile radius of Balintore;

(b) Anywhere off the south shore of the Moray firth between the meridians of Port Gordon and Burchhead, except within three-quarters of a mile of the low-water mark;

(c) Outside a distance of one mile of the coast in any other portion of the shaded area.

Notwithstanding the above order a limited number of fishing drifters are allowed to fish at night by special permit within certain areas in the Moray firth.

2. Vessels proceeding to ports in the Moray firth should endeavour to enter the firth in time to reach their destinations not later than half an hour after sunset. Should they not reach their destinations by that time they are to anchor, weather permitting, subject to the restrictions given in clause 1.

3. Any vessel contravening the foregoing regulations will run the gravest risk of being sunk.

Caution.—Neutral or Allied vessels are particularly warned that the passage through the Pentland firth presents very grave risks to a Westbound vessel and are strongly advised not to take it.

II.—CROMARTY AND INVERNESS AND APPROACHES—PILOTAGE AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS.

Port of Cromarty and Approaches.

1. Pilotage is compulsory at the port of Cromarty for all vessels (including fishing vessels) which have a draught of over eight feet, and Fishing and other small vessels having a draught of over eight feet are to assemble at the Pilotage stations, and will be conducted into and out of the port in groups.

Vessels bound for Cromarty will be led through the defences from a position off Tarbet ness by a pilot boat. They should follow directly astern of her.

Local arrangements for leading vessels through the defences will be made for vessels leaving Cromarty.

2. It is dangerous for any vessel to be under

way to the south-westward of a line joining Tarbet Ness and Findhorn without a pilot.

3. No vessels of any description other than H.M. Ships and Auxiliaries are to be under way between sunset and sunrise in the waters contained between a line drawn from Tarbet Ness to Findhorn, and a line drawn from Fort George to Chanonry point.

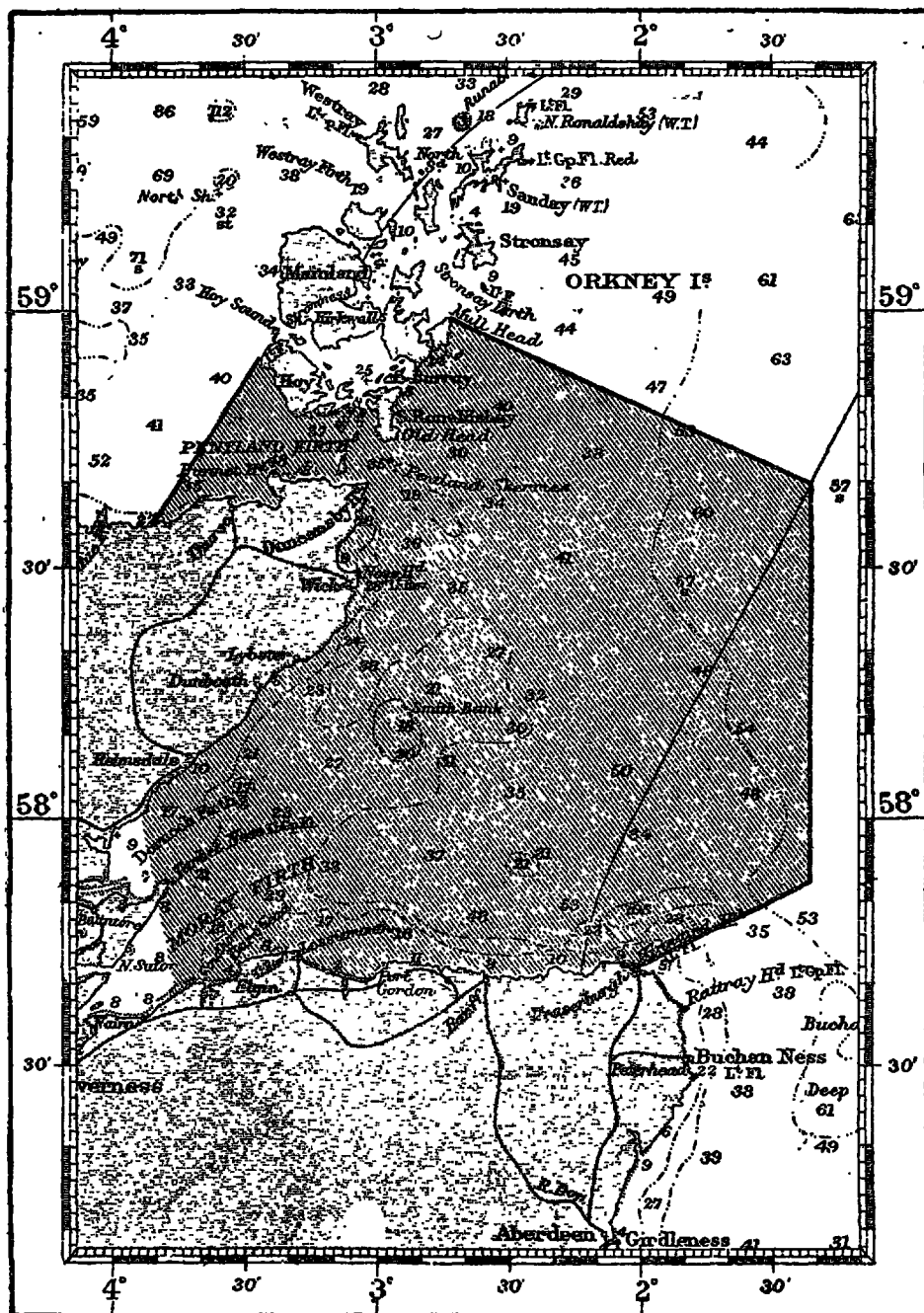
Port of Inverness and Approaches.

1. All Merchant Vessels, including Fishing craft, are to speak the Examination vessel off

craft, and vessels of similar size, which must carefully observe the rule of the road whilst keeping out of the way of larger vessels.

4. No vessel (other than H.M. Ships and allied Men-of-War) or boat shall without special permission move in or approach the Port during the hours of official night, and no boat (other than those belonging to H.M. Ships and allied Men-of-War) shall without special permission approach the shore or go alongside any pier or wharf in the Port of Inverness.

5. Pilotage is compulsory for all vessels of



Cromarty, and are to obtain permission from her to proceed into the Port of Inverness, the seaward entrances to which are dangerous.

2. Merchant vessels shall obey all orders given them by the Naval Port Authorities as regards anchoring or shifting berth.

3. Vessels proceeding in the same direction must not attempt to overtake and pass a vessel ahead in any of the channels in the Firth, or within the seaward entrances of the North and South channels.

This is not intended to apply to small fishing

8 feet draught and over (other than H.M. Ships and allied Men-of-War) entering or leaving the Port of Inverness, unless otherwise ordered by the Naval Authorities.

6. Vessels, when cleared, shall wait for the orders from Naval Authorities before leaving.

7. Drifters engaged on Inverness Pilotage duty will fly the pilot flag, and will be stationed at the Examination anchorage off Cromarty and all vessels arriving are to close the drifter flying this flag, after speaking the Ex-

amination vessel, and obey any orders they may receive.

8. Incoming and outgoing traffic will be regulated by signals hoisted at Fort George and on the Control vessel stationed seaward of the entrance to the port.

9. Traffic signals are to be strictly obeyed, and no vessel shall approach the entrances when the signals displayed are not in her favour, and no outgoing vessel is to approach Chanonry point within half a mile whilst the signals are against her.

10. Vessels proceeding with the tidal stream will, as a rule, be given priority over those proceeding against the tidal stream, but the signals are equally applicable to all vessels, entering or leaving the harbour, and they are only to use the channel between the light-buoys defining the ship passages.

11. Incoming and outgoing vessels shall not pass through the ship passages simultaneously. If through any misunderstanding an outgoing and an incoming ship are approaching the ship passages simultaneously, then the ship proceeding against the tidal stream shall give way and wait until the entrance is clear.

12. Vessels are to pass through the ship passages at a speed not exceeding 12 knots.

13. Inward-bound vessels, with special permission to be under way in Inverness firth and approaches during the hours of official night, when within 3 miles of the whistle-buoy off Cromarty and until they arrive at their anchorage within the Port of Inverness are to exhibit navigation lights (with the exception of a stern light, which is not to be shown), dimmed as provided for in Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 1065 of 1918, or any subsequent revision or republication thereof.

Outgoing vessels are to carry similar lights which are to be extinguished as soon as they are past Cromarty.

14. All vessels under way within the limits of the Port of Inverness are to exhibit navigation lights during the daylight hours, when owing to mist or other weather conditions the visibility is sufficiently low to render such a course desirable.

15. Vessels at anchor in the Port of Inverness and approaches are to obey all orders given them by the Naval Authorities as to the exhibition or obscuring of riding lights and darkening of ships.

(2) Orkney Isles—Traffic Regulations.

I.—SCAPA FLOW AND APPROACHES.

1. All entrances are dangerous, and entry is absolutely prohibited by any of them except as provided in succeeding paragraphs.

2. Examination services have been established in the entrance to Hoxa and Hoy sounds; vessels directed to enter must communicate with the Examination vessel and follow the instructions received from her very carefully.

3. No vessel is permitted to approach the entrance to Hoxa sound within a radius of 5 miles under any circumstances whatever, except when actually ordered to Scapa Flow.

4. The only vessels permitted to enter Hoy sound from the westward are those ordered to Stromness.

5. Vessels are not permitted to enter Hoxa or Hoy sounds by night or in thick weather.

6. Passage through Cantick sound is entirely prohibited.

II.—PORT OF KIRKWALL AND APPROACHES.

1. The port of Kirkwall shall comprise all enclosed waters of the Wide Firth and Kirkwall bay to westward of Thieves holm.

2. Merchant vessels shall obey all orders given them by the Admiralty Port Officer as regards anchoring or shifting position.

3. No vessel other than H.M. Ships shall enter or leave the Port of Kirkwall during hours of darkness, i.e., between half an hour after sunset and half an hour before sunrise, except in special circumstances with special permission from the Admiralty Port Officer.

4. During foggy and thick weather, traffic in and out of the port is stopped, and no vessel shall approach the boom from either direction.

5. No vessel other than H.M. Ships or boats shall move in the harbour during hours of darkness as aforesaid. And no boat other than those belonging to H.M. Ships shall approach the shore or go alongside any pier in the Port of Kirkwall.

6. All vessels other than H.M. Ships entering or leaving the Port of Kirkwall shall be piloted in and out by a Pilot drifter, and are prohibited from entering or leaving harbour unless so piloted, save an except only, (1) in the case of such British vessels as have a written exemption therefrom, issued by the Admiralty Port Officer, (2) when a liner is entering the harbour, the Pilot may at his discretion, when circumstances of tide and sea render it advisable, direct such liner to enter the harbour without being piloted, provided always that the gate is open for incoming traffic.

7. Vessels, when cleared, shall wait for the Pilot vessel to conduct them out of port, or proceed as directed by the Naval Authorities.

8. Drifters engaged on pilot duty will fly the pilot flag (white and red, horizontal).

9. Incoming and outgoing traffic will be regulated by signals hoisted at the yardarm of the Boom trawler and repeated at the Helliarm holm lighthouse.

10. Traffic signals are to be strictly obeyed, and no vessel shall approach the entrance against the signal.

11. The following Traffic signals will be displayed at the Boom and at Helliarm holm:—

Gate "Open for Incoming Traffic":

By day—Two balls, vertical.

By night—A red light.

Gate "Open for Outgoing Traffic":

By day—A cone, point upwards.

By night—A green light.

Gate Closed:

By day—Three balls at Helliarm holm.

By night—Three red lights at Helliarm holm.

12. Vessels entering will, as a rule, be given priority over those leaving.

13. All outgoing vessels shall pass round the Turning buoy (red and white striped, spherical) moored approximately 285° (N. 56° W. Mag.), one mile from the entrance.

14. Incoming vessels will not pass round the Turning buoy, but will shape course as requisite for the anchorage on entering.

15. No outgoing vessel shall pass the Turning buoy, unless the signal for outgoing traffic is up. If the signal is against it, such vessel shall stop and wait in the neighbourhood of the Turning buoy.

16. No incoming vessel shall pass Helliard holm, unless the signal for incoming traffic is up at Helliard holm. If the signal is against it, such vessel shall wait in Shapinsay sound.

17. Incoming and outgoing vessels shall not pass through the gate simultaneously. If, through any misunderstanding, an outgoing and an incoming ship are approaching the gate simultaneously, then the outgoing ship shall give way and shall turn round, and return to the Turning buoy and there wait till such time as the entrance is clear.

18. As a rule only one ship will be conducted out at a time, but under exceptional circumstances, in the event of two ships being conducted out, then the pilot will give instructions as to which ship is to go first and the rear ship shall then keep a full half mile directly astern, and is on no account to close or overhaul or attempt to pass the ship ahead.

19. *Caution.*—Caution is necessary when approaching the boom, as the tidal stream does not set fairly through the opening and attains considerable velocity especially on the ebb or west-going stream, which sets in a north-westerly direction.

Variation.—19° W.

(3) *Shetland Isles—Traffic of Neutral Vessels Prohibited.*

No vessels other than those of British Nationality or those of the Allied Nations, except vessels calling for the purpose of Examination, shall enter any ports or harbours in, or anchor off any part of, the coasts of the Shetland Isles until further notice.

Note.—Special traffic regulations for the Port of Lerwick and approaches will be found in Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 767 of 1917.

Lamlash Harbour Entrances—Traffic Regulations.

Former Notices.—Nos. 154, 320, 455, 554, 677, 797, 926 and 1038 of 1918.

A ship-passage, 500 feet in width, has been established at the entrance to North channel. This ship-passage is marked on its northern side by a light-buoy situated about 4½ cables south-eastward from Hamilton rock as shown on chart.

A ship-passage, 500 feet in width, has also been established at the entrance to South channel. This ship-passage is marked on its western side by a light-buoy situated about 6½ cables south-eastward from Stone on Kings-cross point as shown on chart.

All vessels bound for Lamlash must approach by the Northern channel, and maintain a course 244° (*S. 82° W. Mag.*) for a distance of a quarter of a mile on either side of the light-buoy, which should be left on the starboard hand at a distance not exceeding 75 yards.

Vessels must not attempt to enter by the Southern channel unless they have been definitely ordered by their route instructions or a Clyde Patrol vessel to do so, when they must maintain a course 329° (*N. 13° W. Mag.*) for a distance of a quarter of a mile on either side of the light-buoy, which should be left on the port hand at a distance not exceeding 75 yards.

When using the Northern channel, inward-bound vessels will be given priority over those outward bound.

Vessels entering are not to approach the ship-passage at a speed exceeding 10 knots.

Vessels entering are to close the drifter, which will be lying off the ship-passage, for instructions. Any instructions which may be given by Patrol vessels in the outer reaches of the Clyde must also be strictly observed.

The drifter regulates the traffic both inward and outward bound as follows:—

To indicate that the ship-passage is clear for inward-bound traffic, she will display at both yard-arms:

By day—Two black balls hoisted vertically.

By night—One red light.

To indicate that the ship-passage is clear for outward-bound traffic, she will display at both yard-arms:

By day—One black cone, point up.

By night—One green light.

During fog or thick weather, she will sound three long blasts on her steam whistle at intervals of five minutes to indicate that the ship-passage is clear for outward-bound traffic.

There will be no sound signal for inward-bound traffic.

No vessel, either inward or outward bound, is to approach within half a mile of the ship-passage unless the drifter is displaying the traffic signal in her favour.

In foggy or thick weather, vessels approaching are to sound the regulation fog-signals, and proceed with great caution.

All vessels entering Lamlash by night are to burn side lights.

Vessels entering Lamlash by day are to anchor to the southward of a line joining the new Pier head and the north end of Holy island.

Vessels entering during the night may anchor to the northward of this line until the morning.

Before attempting to leave Lamlash, all vessels must obtain instructions as to the route to be followed.

Variation.—18° W.

Belfast Lough—Traffic Regulations.

Former Notice.—No. 1064 of 1918.

A ship-passage has been established on the northern side of the entrance to Belfast lough,

about 8 cables south-eastward from Cloghar point. The ship-passage is marked by two light-buoys as shown on the charts.

When making for this ship-passage, vessels must maintain a course of 201° (*S. 40° W. Mag.*) or 21° (*N. 40° E. Mag.*) for a distance of a quarter of a mile on either side of the ship-passage.

The Gobbins head light-and-whistle-buoy, exhibiting a *flashing red* light, situated in lat. 54° 48' 10" N., long. 5° 38' 20" W., approximately, serves as an additional aid to vessels.

Vessels approaching Belfast lough must be careful to look out for and close the Patrol vessels off Black head and strictly observe any instructions communicated to them by the Patrols.

A Drifter will be stationed at a distance of about half a mile north-eastward of the ship-passage. This Drifter regulates the inward and outward bound traffic.

Inward-bound vessels will be given priority over outward-bound vessels in respect of passage through the ship-passage.

Signals

To indicate that the ship-passage is clear for inward-bound vessels, the Drifter will display:—

(a) By Day—No signal.

(b) By Night—Two horizontal red lights.

To indicate that the ship-passage is clear for outward-bound vessels, the Drifter will display:—

(a) By Day—A black shape.

(b) By Night—Two horizontal white lights.

During fog the Drifter will remain close to the ship-passage, and will sound the following signals:—

(a) Under normal conditions when no vessel is passing either way, the Drifter will sound "K" (— — — —) on her whistle every two minutes. This signal is intended to indicate the position of the Drifter and of the ship-passage.

(b) When an inward-bound vessel is heard approaching, the Drifter will sound letter "V" (— — — —) on her whistle to indicate that the ship-passage is clear for inward-bound vessels.

(c) When an outward-bound vessel is heard approaching, the Drifter will sound letter "O" (— — — —) on her whistle to indicate that the ship-passage is clear for outward-bound vessels.

Vessels approaching Belfast lough in foggy weather should be careful to sound the regulation fog-signals, and to proceed with great caution when within a depth of 30 fathoms at all states of the tide.

During the hours of darkness, all vessels entering or leaving must exhibit their side lights.

At all times, day or night, when the signals indicate that the ship-passage is clear for inward-bound traffic, no outward-bound vessel may approach within half a mile of the ship-passage; and similarly, when the signals indicate that the ship-passage is clear for outward-bound traffic, no inward-bound vessel

may approach within half a mile of the ship-passage.
