TRADE BOARDS ACT, 1909.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the above Act by the Board of Trade dated 27th April, 1910, the Trade Board

established in Great Britain under the above Act and the Trade Boards Provisional Orders Confirmation Act, 1913, for the Sugar Confectionery and Food Preserving Trade as defined in the Regulations made by the Board of Trade and dated 23rd December, 1913, have given notice that they have varied certain minimum rates of wages for female workers, the minimum rates as varied being as follows:—

1. For female workers under 15 years of age, 7s. 6d. per week.
2. For female workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 11s. per week.
3. For female workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 14s. 6d. per week.
4. For female workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 18s. per week.
5. For female workers of 18 years of age and upwards who have been employed in the trade for an aggregate period of less than 12 months and cannot suitably be engaged on piece work and to whom the Trade Board shall have issued a certificate on the ground that the employment is not merely temporary or seasonal, 19s. 6d. per week.
6. For female workers of 18 years of age and upwards (and others to whose employment the minimum rate of 21s. 8d. per week is applicable under the terms of Section 1 (a) of the Notice issued by the Trade Board dated 30th September, 1918), 21s. 8d. per week.

The above minimum rates are weekly rates based on a week of 52 hours.

The Notice setting out the variations which have been made is dated 30th September, 1918, from which date such variations take effect as provided by the Trade Boards Act.

ARMY COUNCIL ORDER.

DEFENCE OF THE REALM
 REGULATIONS.

REGULATION OF THE SALE OF HAY AND STRAW AND OF CHOPPED HAY AND STRAW IN GREAT BRITAIN.

Whereas by Order of the 20th August, 1918, the Army Council, in pursuance of the powers conferred on them by the Defence of the Realm

Regulations, did regulate the price of hay and straw and of chopped hay and straw in England and Wales.

And whereas by Order of the 27th August, 1918, the said Order was amended.

And whereas it is desired to further amend the said Order. Now, therefore, in pursuance of the powers conferred on them by the Defence of the Realm Regulations, and all other powers thereunto enabling them, the Army Council do hereby cancel paragraph 5 of the said Order of the 20th August, 1918, and substitute the following paragraph in lieu thereof:—

5. Distributors may charge for quantities not exceeding 10 cwt. an additional sum of £1 6s. 8d. per ton, provided that where a would-be purchaser gives an order for a quantity exceeding 10 cwt. (such quantity being reasonable according to his normal requirements), and owing to a shortage of supplies, or other reason, the seller does not fulfil such order in one delivery, then the price shall not exceed that laid down in Schedule 3 hereof, excepting that the seller may charge, in addition to the price laid down in Schedule 3 aforesaid, the actual cost of delivery for each delivery after the first until the full amount of the purchaser's order has been fulfilled: in all such cases an invoice or bill in respect thereof must be delivered to the purchaser indicating the charges made for delivery as separate items from the price of the goods delivered.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 4TH OCTOBER 1918.)

EAST SUSSEX AND KENT (FOOT-AND- MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1918 (No. 3).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Modification of Order.

1. The East Sussex and Kent (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1918 is modified in manner hereinafter appearing.

Movement into the Zone for Immediate Slaughter.

2.—(1.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved by railway or by vessel without a licence from premises, not situate within any District which is for the time being a Scheduled District for the purposes of an Order of the Board relating to Foot-and-Mouth Disease, to a railway station or landing-place situate within the Zone described in the First Schedule hereto (hereinafter referred to as "the Zone"); and an animal so moved may be moved from the railway station or landing-place to any slaughterhouse situate within the Zone if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the railway station or landing-place is situate.

(2.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved by road from any premises, not situate within any District which is for the time being a Scheduled District for the purposes of an Order of the Board relating to Foot-and-Mouth Disease, to any slaughterhouse in the Zone if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the slaughterhouse is situate.

Movement within the Zone.

3. Where an Inspector of the Local Authority considers it necessary or expedient that an animal in his district should be permitted to be moved from premises in the Zone to any other premises in the Zone, he may authorise such movement by a Movement Licence.

Prohibition of Markets, &c., of Animals.

4. No market, fair, sale, or exhibition of animals shall be held in the Zone, or in any other part of the Scheduled District.

Provisions as to Movement Licences.

5.—(1.) Where the movement authorised by a Movement Licence granted under this Order is movement by road into the Zone or is movement to a slaughterhouse in the Zone from premises in the Zone other than a railway station or landing-place, an animal shall not be moved with the Licence unless before the movement is commenced it is marked by and at the expense of the owner in manner following:—

Cattle.—By the clipping of a broad arrow ↑ about six inches long on the left hind-quarter of each of the cattle and by the clipping of the hair off the end of the tail.

Sheep.—By the clipping of a broad arrow ↑ on the forehead of each of the sheep; and also by the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the sheep with the following composition, namely: Rosin, five parts; oil of turpentine, two parts; and blue or red ochre, one part; melted and used warm; or with some other adhesive composition of a blue or red colour.

Swine.—By the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the swine with the composition above mentioned.

(2.) A Movement Licence under this Order shall not be granted by an Inspector of a Local Authority unless he is satisfied that the proposed movement will not involve movement on a road in the Scheduled District which is not in the Zone.

(3.) Where the movement authorised by a Movement Licence is movement as often as occasion may require, either between different parts of the same farm or between different farms, the Licence shall be marked with the words "Occupation Licence," and shall be in force until it is revoked by an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board by a Notice served on the occupier of the farm on which the animals then are.

(4.) Every Licence shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted, the number and description of the animals authorised to be moved, and the name or description of the several premises to and from which the animals are authorised to be moved.

(5.) Where animals are moved with a Licence under this Order, unless the Licence is an Occupation Licence, the Licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up to an officer of the Local Authority or be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District by the person in charge of the animals at the time of completing the movement.

(6.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order, except where it is otherwise expressly authorised by this Order, shall be in force for four days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall be in the form set forth in the Second Schedule to this Order or to the like effect.

(7.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order shall not be available if granted by the owner of the animal to be moved, or by his agent, or by the consignee of the animal, or by the occupier of the farm or premises or slaughterhouse from or to which the animal is to be moved or by any individual member of an Executive Committee or Sub-Committee of a Local Authority.

(8.) A copy of a Licence which authorises movement to premises in a District other than the District for which the person granting the Licence acts as Inspector shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Local Authority of the District in which the place of destination is situate.

General Provisions as to Movement.

6. Animals while being moved under this Order shall, so far as is practicable, be kept separate from all animals which are not being so moved, and shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay to the place of destination specified in the Licence, and where the place of destination is a slaughterhouse they shall be there detained until they are slaughtered.

Exception of certain Animals from Provisions as to Movement.

7. Nothing in this Order shall be construed as authorising—

(i.) movement of an animal which is affected with foot-and-mouth disease, or which has during the preceding twenty-eight days been in any way exposed to the infection of such disease; or

(ii.) movement into or out of a foot-and-mouth disease infected place; or

(iii.) movement of an animal the movement of which is prohibited by notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board.

Saving for Orders and Regulations.

8. Movement of animals under this Order is subject to any other Order of the Board, and also subject to any Regulation made by a Local Authority under any Order of the Board for prohibiting or regulating the movement of animals.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

9.—(1.) Any person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Licence, if any, necessary for the movement, and shall allow it to be read, and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address

to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Offences.

10.—(1.) If a person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If any person, with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark painted on any animal as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

11. In this Order—

“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

“The Board” means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries.

“Animals” means cattle, sheep, goats and swine.

“Slaughterhouse” means any premises where animals are habitually slaughtered, and includes a bacon factory.

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894

Revocation.

12. The East Sussex and Kent (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1918 (No. 2) is hereby revoked.

Commencement

13. This Order shall come into operation on the seventh day of October, nineteen hundred and eighteen.

Short Title, &c.

14. This Order may be cited as the EAST SUSSEX AND KENT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1918 (No. 3), and shall be read with the Order referred to in Article 1.

This Licence does not authorise movement of an animal which is affected with Foot-and-Mouth disease or which has during the preceding twenty-eight days been in any way exposed to the infection of such disease or movement into or out of a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place, or movement of an animal the movement of which is prohibited by a notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries given under any Order of the Board.

Animals while being moved under this Licence must be accompanied by the Licence and must, so far as is practicable, be kept separate from all animals which are not being so moved. They must be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay to the place of destination specified in the Licence, and where the place of destination is a slaughter-house or bacon factory they must be there detained until they are slaughtered.

Unless the Licence is an Occupation Licence, the Licence must forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up to an officer of the Local Authority or be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District by the person in charge of the animals at the time of completing the movement.

This Licence is not available if it is granted by the owner of the animals to be moved, or by his agent, or by the consignee of the animals, or by the occupier of the farm or premises or slaughter-house from or to which the animals are to be moved, or by any individual member of an Executive Committee or Sub-Committee of a Local Authority.

CORNWALL AND DEVON (CONTROL
OF DOGS) ORDER OF 1918 (No. 5).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, the Dogs Act, 1906, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Control of Dogs in certain Areas.

1.—(1) A dog in either of the areas described in the Schedule hereto shall at all times—

(a) whilst in or on any public place be efficiently muzzled with an effective cage muzzle, made either of wire or of leather, and shall also be led by a person with a collar and chain or other attachment;

(b) whilst in or on any other place, be kept under control by being—

(i) confined in a kennel or other enclosure from which the dog cannot escape; or

(ii) secured to some premises by a collar and chain; or

(iii) efficiently muzzled with an effective cage muzzle, made either of wire or of leather; or

(iv) led by a person with a collar and chain or other attachment.

(2) The provisions of this Article shall not apply to any dog confined in a suitable hamper, crate, box, or other receptacle, so constructed as to render it impossible for such dog while so confined to bite any person or animal.

(3) Article 2 (*Control of Dogs in Scheduled District No. 1*) of the Cornwall and Devon

(Control of Dogs) Order of 1918 shall apply only to such parts of the Scheduled District No. 1 (as extended by subsequent Orders) as are not comprised in an area described in the Schedule to this Order.

Prohibition of Movement of Dogs out of certain Area.

2.—(1) No dog shall be moved out of the area (No. 1) described in the Schedule hereto unless it is accompanied by a licence of the Board authorising such movement signed by an Officer of the Board, and any such licence may be subject to such conditions as to the detention and isolation of the dog or otherwise as the Board may think necessary or desirable and shall be specified in the licence: Provided that this Article shall not apply to:—

(a) the movement of a dog under a licence granted by the Board under the Importation of Dogs Order of 1914 to a port in Great Britain for shipment, or to a place of detention for the purpose of detention and isolation; or

(b) the movement of a dog through the said area by railway from a place outside the area to another place outside the area without unnecessary delay and without being re-booked within the area.

(2) Article 2 (*Seizure of Dogs in case of Default*) and Article 3 (*Offences*) of the Cornwall and Devon (Control of Dogs) Order of 1918 (No. 3) shall apply as if this Order were the Order therein referred to.

(3) This Article shall come into operation on the eighth day of October, nineteen hundred and eighteen.

Seizure, Detention, and Disposal of Uncontrolled Dogs.

3.—(1) Any dog found in or on any public place, in either of the areas described in the

Schedule hereto, in respect of which the provisions of this Order are not being complied with, may be seized by the Local Authority or by the police, and any dog so seized shall be dealt with by the Local Authority in the manner directed by Article 4 of the Cornwall and Devon (Control of Dogs) Order of 1918 (*Seizure, Detention, and Disposal of Uncontrolled dogs*), which Article shall apply accordingly.

Offences.

4.—(1) If a dog is moved in contravention of Article 2 of this Order, the owner of the dog, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the dog, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the dog is moved shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2) If any dog is not kept under control in manner prescribed by this Order, the owner of the dog, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the act of 1894.

Interpretation.

5. In this Order—

“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

“Public place” includes any street, highway, thoroughfare, public bridge, royal park, public park garden or pleasure ground, common, uninclosed land, or other place to which the public have for the time being access:

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Rabies Order of 1897.

Local Authority to Enforce Order.

6. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Commencement.

7. This Order (except Article 2 thereof) shall come into operation on the eleventh day of October, nineteen hundred and eighteen.

Short Title.

8. This Order may be cited as the Cornwall and Devon (Control of Dogs) Order of 1918 (No. 5).
