**THE FUEL CONSUMERS' (RETURNS) ORDER, 1918, DATED THE EIGHTEENTH OCTOBER, 1918, MADE BY THE BOARD OF TRADE UNDER REGULATIONS 2F, 2G, AND 2JJ OF THE DEFENCE OF THE REALM REGULATIONS.**

The Board of Trade, deeming it expedient to make further exercise of their powers under Regulations 2F, 2G, and 2JJ of the Defence of the Realm Regulations as respects coal and coke, hereby Order as follows:—

1. All persons who consume two tons or over of fuel in any week, or whose yearly consumption is reasonably estimated, having regard to their consumption in the past, to exceed 100 tons a year, shall, not later than Wednesday, 30th October instant, make a Return addressed to the Controller of Coal Mines, Room 412, Holborn Viaduct Hotel, London, E.C. 1, in the form contained in the Schedule hereto;

Provided that this Order shall not apply to—

(a) fuel in respect of which weekly Returns are already made to the Controller of Coal Mines;

(b) fuel supplied under the provisions of the Household Fuel and Lighting Order, 1918, and the Household Fuel and Lighting (Scotland) Order, 1918;

(c) fuel used solely for agricultural purposes;

(d) fuel used solely for steam lorries.

2. Similar Returns shall be made by all such consumers not later than each Wednesday subsequent to Wednesday, 30th October instant, and each such Return shall apply to the week ended on the Saturday immediately previous.

3. In this Order the expression "fuel" means coal, coke, slack, breeze and any solid fuel of which coal or coke is a constituent.

4. Failure to comply with the provisions of this Order is a Summary Offence against the Defence of the Realm Regulations.

5. This Order may be cited as the Fuel Consumers' (Returns) Order, 1918.

## ADMIRALTY ORDER.

## CAMERAS ON BOARD SHIP.

In exercise of the powers conferred upon them by Regulation 19 of the Defence of the Realm Regulations, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty hereby order as follows:—

1. No person shall use any camera on board any British vessel at any time or on board any foreign-owned vessel while the vessel is within the territorial waters of the United Kingdom unless expressly authorised to do so in writing for official purposes by a Competent Naval or Military Authority.

2. Any person not being a person authorised as aforesaid who takes or is in possession of a camera on board any British vessel or on board any foreign-owned vessel within the territorial waters of the United Kingdom shall forthwith deliver it into the custody of the Master of the vessel.

3. The Master shall take charge of all cameras on board his vessel as aforesaid and retain them in his custody in the case of a British vessel until the owner or person claiming possession of the camera quits the vessel, and in the case of a foreign-owned vessel so long as the vessel is within the territorial waters of the United Kingdom.

4. Cameras in the custody of the Master of a vessel may be placed under the Seal of H.M. Customs and Excise by an Officer of Customs, and such seal shall not be broken so long as the Master is required by paragraph 3 of this Order to retain them in his possession.

5. This Order shall not apply to cameras on board His Majesty's ships nor to a camera taken or sent on board any vessels as part of the cargo or in baggage which is not accessible during the voyage to the owner or person claiming possession thereof.

6. Any person acting in contravention of this Order will be liable to prosecution for an offence against the said Regulations.

#### EAST SUSSEX AND KENT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1918 (No. 5).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:



*Modification of Existing Orders.*

1. The East Sussex and Kent (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1918 and the East Sussex and Kent (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Orders of 1918 (Nos. 3 and 4), hereinafter referred to as "the existing Orders," are modified in manner hereinafter appearing.

*Alteration of Zones I, II, and III.*

2. The existing Orders shall be read and have effect as if the Zones I, II and III described in the Schedule hereto, were respectively substituted for the Zones I, II, and III to which the existing Orders refer, and the Scheduled District for the purposes of those Orders shall comprise only the Zones I, II, and III as described in the Schedule hereto.

*Commencement*

3. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-first day of October, nineteen hundred and eighteen.

*Short Title, &c.*

4. This Order may be cited as the EAST SUSSEX AND KENT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1918 (No. 5), and shall be read with the existing Orders.

*and Witherenden Bridge*) to the point of commencement.

## ZONE II.

A Zone comprising:—

*In the administrative county of East Sussex:*

The parish of Dallington; such portions of the parishes of Ticehurst, Etchingham, Burwash, and Brightling as are not comprised within Zone I;

Such portion of the parish of Wadhurst as lies to the south and south-east of the road from Lamberhurst (*via Cousleywood, Durgates, Cheeseman's, and Sand Den*) to the boundary between the parishes of Wadhurst and Rotherfield;

Such portion of the parish of Mayfield as lies to the north-east and east of the London, Brighton and South Coast Railway Line from Hailsham to Rotherfield;

Such portions of the parishes of Heathfield and Warbleton as lie to the north, north-east, and north-west of the road from Cross-in-Hand (*via Tower Street, North Down, Cade Street, Chapel Cross, Moorcocks, Rushlake Green, Stone House, and Earl's Down*) to Carrick's Hill, Dallington;

Such portion of the parish of Framfield as lies to the north-east and south-east of the road from Uckfield to The Nursery (*via Cysley's Farm, Palehouse Common, and Eason's Green*);

The parishes of Chiddingfold and Hellingly (*except such portions thereof as lie to the south and south-west of the road from Magham Down via Lower and Upper Horsebridge to East Hoathly*);

When one of His Majesty's vessels or other vessel in charge of His Majesty's Officers intends to pass between the Dockyard Port of Devonport and Plymouth Sound she shall hoist the Red Ensign over 'M' flag (International Code—Alphabetical) by day, or a red light by night at the foremast head, and all other of His Majesty's vessels present in the port shall hoist the Pilot Jack by day, or show position lights (two white lights vertical, 8 feet apart, hoisted at the peak, or, if no gaff, hoisted abreast the maintop in the middle line of the ship or on the Ensign Staff) by night, as a general warning. The Pilot Jack shall also be hoisted by day, or position lights by night, on the Flagstaff at Mount Wise for the same purpose, and all other vessels under way in the Dockyard Port of Devonport or in the narrow waters of Plymouth Sound shall keep out of the way of the said vessel flying the Red Ensign over 'M' flag, or showing a red light at the foremast head; provided always that the said vessel shall be navigated with due care and at a moderate speed."
