## Whitehall, July 29. 1695. This Day came in the Dutch Mails of Tuesday and Friday last, and brought the following Advices.

From His Majesty's Camp before Namur, August; 4. N. S.

N Express was dispatched some hours ago with the News of the Surrender of the Town of Namer; the chief Points of the Capitulation are, That the Inhabitants shall be preserved in the Enjoyment of their Antient Priviledges. That the Garifon shall be allowed two Days, reckoning from this Day at Noon, (they demanded Six) to retire into the Callle, with their Families and Effects, during which time their thall be a Cellation of Hostilities: That the Sick and Wounded Men may be Transported to Dinant; and those that are not in a condition to remove, may stay in the Town of Namur. That the Prisoners taken during the Siege be Exchanged on both sides. And that Hostiges be given for the punctual performance of these Articles. The French demanded that the Horsesand Equipages belonging to the Officers of the Garison, should be sent with a Convoy to Dinane; and that the Deserters should be Pardoned; but both these Articles were rejected. And in Pursuance of this Capitulation, we have taken Possession of the Gates of the Town. Tisbelieved that a strong Detachment will be sent the beginning of the next Week, to reinforce the Prince de Vaudemont

Hague, August 7. They write from Flanders, that Dixmuyde was Invested the 25th pust by the Count de Montal, and Surrendered the 27th not without great suspition of Treachery; The Garison are made prisoners of War; and Major General Ellenberg who Commanded them is gone to Paris; but some of the Officers, with a confiderable number of private Soldiers, are come to Ghent, having made their escape from the French. Deynse is given up upon no better Terms by the Officer who commanded there. The Prince de Vaudemont continues encamped near Ghent; and the Mareshal de Villeroy at Wacken on the River Lys. The French are sending a Detachment of 10000 men from the Rhine to their Army in Flanders; and the Landtgrave of Hesse with all his Forces, and the Lunenburgers, are coming down to joyn His Majesty's Army.

Paris, August 1. We have an account from Namur, that the Besiegers carry on their Attacks with great Vigor, and that the Garrison have lost a great many men. The Count de Vieuxbourg, Count Albert, and Count Morstein, are killed, with several other Officers of note. The Musketeers have Orders to prepare for a march; and there is a talk that the Dauphia is to go to the Army to endeavour the relief of Namur; And that the French King will go as far as the Frontiers. They write from Toulon, that orders were come thither to fit out feveral men of War. And that Admiral Russell was by their last Advice on the Coast of Sardinia. The letters from

Perpignan tell us that the Duke of Vendofme has demolished likewise Oftalrick.

Finefort, July 31. The French, fince they repailed the Rhine, have been Encamped near a place called the Rechatton, and have posted their Horse along that River, to hinder the Germans from passing it. Prince Lewis marched the 23d with the Confederate Army from Waltors, and Encamped near Epidling, and has caused boats too be provided for making Bridges over the Rhine, in order to his sassing it; and in the mean time has sent Count Pals with a body of Horse to observe the Enemy. The Marchal de Joyense has sent a Detachment of Horse and Foot towards Flanders; and Prince Lewis does the like from the Confederate Army.

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Vienna, July 23. The Saxon Infantry confiffing in 6000 men arrived here yetterday by water from Lintz; The Emperor, the King of the Romans, and the Elector of Saxony, took this day a review of them, and after they have refresh'd themselves a day or two, they will proceed down the Danibe for Hangary; the Saxon Cavalry is passed by Presburgh, in their March to joyn the Imperial Army, which continued Encamped the 16th instant near Buckin. General Captures went hence the 21st to the Army; and the Elector of Saxony will follow in few Days. Here are reports that the Grand Signior is gone back to Advianople, but without any certainty.
