Barcelona, July 31: N. S.

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N the 29th Instant Admiral Russell arrived before this place with the Fleet under his Command, as also the homeward bound Turkey-ships, which joyned them at Cagliari in Surlinia They have had very blowing Weather, but the Fleet has received no damage, and both Sea-men and Soldiers are in very good health. Brigadier Steward has been with the Marquis de Gastanaga (who is encamped feren or eight Leagues from hence with 14 or fiven or eight Leagues from hence with 14 or 15000 men) from the Admiral, to acquaint him with his Arrival, and to know if he can in any thing be ferviceable to him. The French, who were encamped near Oftalriche, (having demolished that place as well as Castel-Follit) are, upon the Fleet's appearing on this Coast, retired towards Palames; and 'tis faid the Spaniards intend to follow them, and either oblige them to a Battel, or, if they continue their Retreat, to beliege that

place or Roses. We are told the Admiral will sail to morrow towards the Coast of Provence.

Cadiz, July 31. N. S. The 26th, sailed from hence five Dutch Men of War, with several Provision-ships, to joyn the Fleet in the Mediterration; and the Convoy with the Forces from Fleder lie power with their Top sails loose and Handers lie now with their Top-sails loose, and will fail this Evening, or to morrow for Barcelona. The Galeons will fail in a month or fix weeks.

Alicant. Aug. 1. There are now off this Port 5 Dutch Men of War and a Fire-ship, with several Victuailers, who came from Cadiz, and are bound up the Streights.

Gibraltar, Aug. 1. Yesterday arrived here an Express from Centa, and brought an Account of a very warm Action that happen'd there the day before: The Moores thinking to surprize the Spaniards, advanced about Noon to the Forts of St. Petr and St. Paul, and with the help of Scaling-Laddets got into some of the Out-works, and posselled themselves of the place of Arms, before our Men could put themselves into a posture to oppose them; but the Alarm being given, and Succours fent from the Town, the Spaniards recovered the same, and beat off the Enemy after a Dispute of hours, in which 2000 of the Moors were killed, and 200 of the Garrison, with several Officers, among whom was the Serjeant-General Don Geronimo Maria. Five Companies of Foot are going from hence, to re-inforce the Garifon of Centa.

Madrid, Aug. 10. The first Instant To Deum was fung in the King's Chapel for the Surrender of Ca-zal, and there were Illuminations all over the Town, which were repeated the three succeeding Nights. This Court has received Advice by an Express from the Viceroy of Caralmia, of the Fleet's Arrival rhe 29th past at Barcelma; and that Admiral Russell was going to fail again towards Provence: We are very tensible here, that the Diversion he has given the Enemy, by obliging them to keep so great a part of their Forces for the Defence of their Coast, which otherwise might have been employed against us, or the Allies in Piedmont, has been of great advantage to our Affairs in Catalonia, (where the French have been forced to abandon feveral places, and to retire towards their own Frontiers;) and a Means of taking Cazal; and in all probability, will give Opportunities to both, of making further Progreffes against the Enemy; and 'tis generally difcoursed, that the Marquis ae Gastonaga has resolved to beliege Palamos.

Guernsey, Aug. 15. Capt. Slowly, Commander of the Deceiver Privateer of this Island, has lately taken three French Prizes, one of about 60 Tuns and 3 Guns, and the other two of about 40 Tuns

each, and has brought them in here.

Whereup in His Majeffy caused our Army to be drawn out likewise; in which Posture we remained the whole Day, his M.j str. continuing in the Field, from 4 in the Morning, till 8 in the Evening; and having ordered the Troops to lie under their Arms all Night; so that we are in a readiness to receive the Enemy, whenever they think sit to begin. In the mean time our Works, at the Siege go on very well; our Cannon have made large Breaches in the Castle and Cohorne Fort; and there is a discourse that a general Assault will be made to Morrow.
