## VVhitehall, August 29. 1695.

This Morning arrived here an Express from His Majesties Camp with the good News of the Surrender of the Castle of Namur; and brought the Accounts which follow.

From before the Caftle of Namur, Sept. 1. N. S. 1695.

N Tuesday the 30th of August N. S. we made a general Affault, the disposition being as follows: The Lord Cutts attacks: the CounterCorp and Breach of the Terra Nova with a Detachemon of Greatdiers from the Army, and 4 Regiments of Foot. Count Rivers Major-General in the Spanish Service attacks the Cohorn on the side next the Terra Nova with 3000 Spaniards and Bavarians. Major-General la Cave the Terra Nova with 3000 Spaniards and Bavarians. Major-General la Cave sucht the Cohorn on the right of the Spaniards with 2000 Brandenburger. Major-General Swerin attackt the Cafotte with 2000 Dutch, and the lower Town was attackt by a Colonel with near 2000 men. The English advanced with great order and refolution, and had gained the top of the Bratch (through a great deal of Fire on all fider) but found the Enemy for advance only pofted and entreacht behind the Breach, with the ground on their fide fovery bad, that they could not advance in any Front, and were freed to retire. Count Rivera was foon killed upon approaching the Countries but the Bavarians tooks or fit thom a Saliant Angle of the Coentries. trifup, but the Bavarians took post upon a Saliant Angle of the Coc-hon, and maintained a hot fire with the Enemy, who disputed hard to dis-ledge them, and when most of the Officers of the Bavarian Guards were tiled and wounded, and that the other Regiments had fuffered very much, kiled and wounded, and that the other Regiments had suffered very much, the Enemy continuing their fire with a great deal of obstinacy, the English that had left the Terra Nova, not being able to do any thing on that side, shained the Spaniards and Bavarians under the Cemmand of my Lord Cutts, who at the same time ordered a Lieutenant of Colonel Mackay's Regiment with thirty men to pass the Palisadoes, and attack a Battery of the Enemies, which he executed with a great deal of Resolution, turning 7 of their own Cannon against them, securing at the same time some of their Mines, and the English and Bavarians planting their Colours upon the Palisadoes; and that the Bavarians made a good Lodgment. From the Camp at Offin, Sept. 1. The Enemy appear every day in the front of our Line, on Tuesday they came with about 70 Squadrons to Both, where they have taken post, extending their Line from that place to

the Right near to Perwys; whereupon his Majesty caused the Army like-wise to move, and extended our Right to Longchamp, our less being near St. Denis, and a Brigade of Foot is less at Masy to secure that Pod. Yelter-St. Denis, and a Brigade of Foot is left at Mary to recove that For. Yetter-day they appeared with about 11 Squadrons near our grand Guard, but were foon repulfed. His Majesty having dined very early, was this afternoon upon his way to the Camp before Namer, in order to give Directions concerning a further Attack of the Castle, and met an Adju ant fent by the Elector of Bavaria to give his Majesty an account that the Mareschal de Boufflers and Monsieur de Guiseard had desired to Capitulate, offering as first to do it for the Cohorn alone: but that upon the Elector's refusal, they Boifflers and Monsieur de Guiserd had desired to Capitulate, offering at first to do it for the Cohorn alone: but that upon the Elector's resulal, they had agreed for the whole; Upon his Majesties arrival there, Hostzges we've exchanged, and Propositions brought from the Castle to the Salsine; the chief of which is, That they may have ten days to expect Succours, which is absolutely denied them, and only two proposed to be allowed. The other Propositions are of no great configuence, being such as are usual, and are most of them agreed to by the Elector with his Majesties Consent, but no answer being come from the Castle before his Majesties return hither. no answer being come from the Cattle before his Majesties Conient; but no answer being come from the Cattle before his Majesties return hither, there can be no further account given till to morrow morning; but in the general it appears that the Enemy suffered so very much at the last Assaul; and are otherwise so much dispirited, that there is little doubt of their submitting to what is granted.

From the Camp at Oftin, near Namur, Septemb. 2. N.S. This Morning the Capitulation for the Surrender of the Caftle of Namur was figured; and in pursuance of it, we have already taken possession of part of the Out-works, and the French are to deliver up the Castle and all the rest on Monday Morning. The Mareschal de Villeroy is retiring with the French Army towards Flerus.

Articles proposed by the Mareschal de Boufflers to His Electoral Highness the Elector of Bavaria, jointly with the Allies, for the Capitulation of the Castle of Namur.

I. That the faid Castle with the Lower Town shall be delivered up to the Troops of the Allies the 10th of this Instant September in case it be not relieved, and that during the said time there shall be committed no Act of Hostility between the Besieged and the Besiegers.

II. That on the faid 10th of September there shall be given up to the faid Troops of the Allies the first Gate of Entry into the said Castle on the side of the Country, where a Guard of the Troops of the Garison shall be likewise placed to prevent the Troops mixing together, and all disorders.

Inswer to the first and second Arcicles.

The Outward Fortifications, viz. the Fort of Cohorne, the Redoubt Casemattee, the Casette, and the Hern Work of Bule, shall be delivered up to morrow, being the 2d Instant, at 9 in the morning.

III. That the Mareschal de Boussiers, the Count de Guissard, Lieutenant General of the Kings Armies, Governor of Namur, With all the General Officers, and Field-Officers of the Place, the Officers and Guards of the said Mareschal, the Troops as well French, as Strangers, the Officers of the Artillery, and all others whatsoever that are in the Castle for the service of the most Chrlstian King, shall march out on the 12th of this month through the Breaches with their Arms, Baggage and Horses, Drums Beating, Match Lighted, and Colours Flying, wish 12 Pieces of Great Cannon and 4 Mortars, as the Belieged shall choose, with their Carriages, and Arms and Ammunition for 12 discharges for every Riece

Pi ce, in order to reprire to ogether to Givit, along the Mense by the scareff way, and in 2 or 3 days, at the choice of the Belieged, and on any pretence whatleever they shall not be obliged to go another way, and a Convo. Shall be given them by the Allies as well for the security of the Garison as their Equipages.

Answer. They shall march out the 5th of this month, at 7 in the morning, with two pieces of Cannon of 24 Pounders, two 12 Pounders, and two 6 Pounders, and two Mortars, and the rest of the Article is granted.

IV. That for Transparing the said 12 Pieces of Cannon, and Mortars, the siquippes of the Troops, and the Sick and Wounded of the said Garison, there shall be turnished by the Allies, and at their charge 100 Carriage Horses with their Harnesses, 100 Wagnes, drawn each by 4 Horses, and 50 Great Boats on the Musle, with a sufficient number of Watermen and Horses to conduct them to Groct, all which shall be provided the 10th of this month, that so they may load them time enough to depart with the Garison, and to take the same way, that they may arrive at the same time of Groct. time of Gevet.

V. That the Sick and Wounded, remaining in the Town of Namer, who are in a condition to depart with the Garison of the Gattle, may do so at the fame time, and that Boats and Watermen shall be likewise summission at the charge of the Allies to transport them to Givet.

Answer to the fourth and fifth Articles.

There shall be provided for them a sufficient number of Horses for the Cannon and Mortars, 80 Wagons, and as many Boats for the Cannon and Mortars, 80 Wagons, and as many Boats as can be found in two days before that which is fixed for the going out of the Garison, and the rest as saft as they can be got, so as that the whole shall be furnished before the 12th of this month. The Besieged may leave Officers and Commissaries to take care of the Sick and Wounded, and the Equipages who cannot depart with the Garison on the 5th for want of Boats; and Passeports shall be given them, and the rist of these Articles are granted.

VI. That such of the Sick and Wounded that are at present in the Castle and Lower Town, and who shall not be in a condition to be transported to Givet at the same time the Garison marches out of the Castle, shall be transported to the Town of Namur by such Carriages and other Conveniencies as the Bestegers shall turnish before the Evacuation of the Castle; and that convenient Lodgings shall be provided by the Allies in the said Town for the Officers, Dragoons, and Saldiers, with Beds, Provisions and Medicaments at the charge of the Allies, until their persect Recovery, in the same manner as they are used to be treated and provided tor in the most Christian Kings Hospitals; as also Physicians, Chyturgeons, and other Persons to be employed to take care of them; and as soon as any of the Sick and Wounded shall be recovered, they shall be furnished by the Allies with Passeports, Boats and Watermen to conduct them by the Meuse in safety to Givet, together with the Physicians, Chyturgeons, and others that shall be proposed to take care of them on the way.

VII. That Monlieur de Megrigry, Mareschal de Camp of the King's Armies, the Sieur Fellet, Director of the Fortifications, the Engineers, Undertakers, and others employed on the Fortifications, shall enjoy the benefit of this Capitulation, and shall march out with the Troops, in order to repair by the same way to Giver, with their Equipages and Effects. Granted.

VIII. That the Sicur de Fumeron, employed for the Finances, the Commissaries of War, the Receivers of Contributions, and of the Fortifications, the Treasurers Extraordinary of the War, the Com-

missaries of Frevisions and Hospitals, and generally all those are ployed in the Cattle, whether named, or not named in the pice. ployed in the Cattle, whether named, or not named in the price. Capitulation, shall march out of the said Cattle, together with its Garrison, in order to go by the same way to Giver; and on a pretence whatsoever neither they nor their Equipages, Papers and Effects shall be stopped, whether they be in the Cattle, or in its Town of Namur.

IX. That likewise no Officer or other Person to whom the Br. gers of Namur have lent any Money, or furnished Goods or Mg. chandize shall be stopt.

Answer to the Eighth and Minth Articles. Granted, provided they give before occurity or Holtages to the Satisfaction of his Electoral Highness for what they may we.

X. That there shall be provided by the Allies for the Beligd 6 Covered Wagons, which shall go out of the Castle, and becauted to Giver with the Garison, and the Allies shall not take me tice of what they are loaded with, nor visit them.

XI. That the Prisoners taken during the present Siege shall ber. leafed on both fides; and that those who are in the Army of the lies, or in the Town, shall be sent back to the Castle before the Ga risen marches out; and the rest that are in places more remainful be sent back to Dinant in 15 days, to reckon from this day, win the necessary Pasports, that they may repair thither in fasting by the nearch way.

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XII. That no Satisfaction shall be pretended of the Besieged, enz-count of any Cattel taken in the County of Namus before the Siege; nor the Houses that have been demolished in the Lower Town, or eliewhere, for the Defence of the place, no more than for the less burnt or broke during the Siege.

Granted only for what concerns the Houses demolished, and the rest shall be paid.

XIII. That the Hostages which shall be given on both sides, for the due performance of this Capitulation shall be reciprocally reformed after the full Execution of the same, and the Arrival of the Garrison at Givet.

The Besieged shall be obliged faithfully to deliver up their Migzines, Ammunition, Arms, Cannon, Morrars, Carriages, and
Dependances, and all other Instruments of War, none reserved a
excepted, which shall be as well in the Castle as in the Outwork,
to morrow morning the 2d of this month, to such Commissions
shall be appointed by his Electoral Highness for that purpose.

They shall be obliged faithfully to discover their Mines and fame.

They shall likewise deliver up all the Provisions that are in the

fame.
They shall likewise deliver up all the Provisions that are intermagneting the Castle, and what shall be necessary for them in their mach to Givet, without wasting or spoiling any; Of which they shall give Inspection to morrow to the Commissaries to be appointedly his Electoral Highness for that purpose.

That all the Spaniards, Italians, and others Subjects of His Catholick Majesty which shall be sound among the Troops of the Garison of the Castle shall have liberty to return back, without any molestation or trouble to be given them on one side or other.
