Messina, August 22.

THE Essex Captain Wright Commander, the Consent Caprain Grantham, and the Trident Captain Griffin, with the Muscovia Merchant, Storeship, failed hence this morning to joyn the Fleet Commanded by Admiral Russell.

Leghorne, Sept. 12. The 9th instant departed hence one of the Great Dukes Gallies, having on Board an Envoy to the Court of Spain, who designed to Land either at Barcelona or Alicant. Yesterday arrived here a Dutch Ship in 6 days from Barcelona, the Commander whereof says, That Admiral Russel, after having Bombarded Palannos, was sailed with the whole Fleet towards the Coast of Provence.

From the Camp at la Marguerite, September 14. Though the Fortifications of Casal are quite demolished, the last Bastion being blown up some days ago, yet the French continue still here, on pretence the Earth is not sufficiently levelled; which has occasioned my Lord Galloway's return to Turin, in order to fix with the Duke of Savoy a day for their departure; and we hear it is to be next Monday without farther delay; but they may leave a Commissary with Money to pay the Country People, which his Royal Highness will cause to be furnished, to finish the work to their Satisfaction. So soon as the French have quitted the place, the Forces encamped here will march to joyn those of the Allies now in Piedmont. A whole Regiment of the Montferrins that was in this Garrison is entred into the Service of the Duke of Savoy.

Turin, Sept. 17. My Lord Galway came hither the 10th instant from Casal; which place the French are to quit the 19th instant. The Forces of the Allies continue encamped at Rivalta and la Villane, but the Season being so far advanced, 'tis believed they will hardly engage in any new Enterprise this Campaign. The French are still in their Camp at Diblon; Many Deserters come over to us; and 200 Suissars are arrived at Onegha from Catalonia, where they Deserted the French, and intend to enter into the Regiments of that Nation in the Service of his Royal Highness.

Venice, Sept. 17. Yesterday a Review was taken of 1000 new raised Soldiers at the Lido, who are to Embark in few days on the Convoy designed for the Levant. Two new Men of War of seventy Guns each, are fitted, and will be ready to Sail at the same time. Several German and Italian Officers are come hither, and offer to make new Levies for the Service of the Republick, with whom the Senate is treating for that purpose. There is yet no Confirmation come of what was reported the last week of a Sea Engagement between the Venetian and Turkish Fleets, to the great advantage of the former, which makes us very much doubt the truth of it.

From the Imperial Camp at Aranka in Hungary, Sept. 7. We decamped the 3d instant from Betsch, and the Elector of Saxony arrived the same day with the Cavalry at Zenta, but General Caprara with the Foot and Artillery could not reach that place, by reason of the difficulties of the way still the next day: The Elector advanced with the Horse to Little Camisa; where he passed the Theysse, and

went with some of the General Officers, and a good Convoy, to view the Country on the other side the River, and afterwards returned to his Camp near Camisa; General Caprara came thither to Confer with his Electoral Highness; and they resolved to pass the River with the whole Army, and to march towards the Maros, to oppose the design of the Enemy, whether it were to attack Lippa, or to make an Invasion into Upper Hungary or Transylvania. The 5th a Camp was marked out accordingly; A Party of 80 Hussars, Commanded by Colonel Diack, who had been almost as far as Temeswaer, to get Intelligence of the Enemies Motions, came back, and gave an account, That he met a Party of hundred Turks, sent out to observe our march, and having engaged them, killed 30 upon the place, and took 23 Prisoners, with their Standard, Cazana Mustafa, who Commanded them, escaping very narrowly; The Prisoners reported, That the Ottoman Army was encamped near Temeswaer, and that 9000 Arnautes, under the Command of a Bassa, had been detached with several pieces of Cannon towards Lugos, but knew not upon what design. The 6th the Cavalry passed the Theysse, and the Infantry came into the Camp they quitted; Major General Bassompierre was detached with 1000 German Horse, and all the Hussars, towards Aranka to cover the Workmen, who were appointed to lay a Bridge over a Moras we were to pass in our march thither; and in the evening we received Advice; That the Turkish Army was marched from Temeswaer towards Lippa. This day the Imperial Cavalry advanced to Aranka, and the Foot having passed the Theysse at Little Camisa, encamped between these two places; One of our Parties brought in a Prisoner this Evening, who declares; That the Turkish Army not being able to take their march directly towards Lippa, because of the great Morasses in their way, were obliged to go about by Arat. To morrow we shall continue our march towards the River Maros, and hasten it all we can, having ordered our heavy Baggage to march on the other side of the Theysse towards Segedin.

Vienna, Sept. 17. By an Express from the Imperial Army in Hungary, who came thence the 7th of this month, we have an account, That upon Advice of the Enemies moving towards Lippa, where they proposed to be on the 9th or 10th of this month, having lost two days by their being obliged to march about by Arat; The Elector of Saxony, and the Imperial Generals, had resolved to march thither with all the diligence possible, and to fight the Enemy in case they were fer down before Lippa, as their design seem'd to be; so that we are in great expectation of a Battle. Our Army would be near Lippa on the 14th or 15th of this month; And General Veterani was on his march with 12000 men, most Horse, from Transylvania to joyn them. The Imperial Court is now at Ebersdorff.

Frankfort, Sept. 25. Prince Lewis of Baden is still at the Bath at Wiltsbad; from whence he will return in few days to the Confederate Army, which continues in the mean time encamped near Durlach; but it's believed the Forces will then separate and go into their Winter Quarters. The French, who lie at Guntersblun on the other side

the Rhine, are preparing to do the like. This day was observed here a Thanksgiving and publick Rejoycing for the taking of Namur. And the same has been done in all other places hereabouts.

Paris, Sept. 26. The Duke of Bourbon, the Prince of Conti, the Duke de Maine, and the Count de Thoulouse, returned hither some days ago from the Army in Flanders, which it's believed will now quickly separate and go into Quarters. The Marechal de Bufflers arrived at Versailles the 21th, and was Complemented by the whole Court. We are told that an Edict will be shortly published for Alienating the Revenue arising by the Posts in this Kingdom; as also several others for raising Money against the next year. The Marq. de Cascais is arrived here with the Character of Ambassador Extraordinary from the King of Portugal, and 'tis said he comes to offer his Mediation for a General Peace. Orders were sent to Thoulon to fit out 42 Men of War, but they write from thence, that they cannot get Men for more than 30, and 6 Frigats; and 'tis believed these Ships are to return into the Ocean. The Letters from Marseilles of the 15th say, they had received no fresh Advice concerning the Fleet Commanded by Admiral Ruffel; and believed they were returned towards the Coast of Spain. They talk here of making a new Levy of Men this Winter. We are told from Catalonia, That the French Army was come back to Vsoal; and the Spaniards were encamped near Blanes.

Liege, Sept. 27. The Forces of Hesse and Lunenburg have passed the Meuse at Viset, and march to their Winter Quarters; The Brandenburgers will likewise pass this River in a day or two. We shall have 20 Battalions in Garrison here this Winter.

Brussels, Sept. 28. The Campagne in these parts draws towards an end; The Elector of Bavaria with the Confederate Army has since Thursday last been encamped at Lemick-St. Quintin; And the Marechal de Villeroi is marched from Cambrai to Leuze; from whence he has sent 6 Regiments of Dragoons to joyn the Marquis de Harcourt, who lies still near Philipville; Monsieur de Precontal continues with 8 or 9000 Men at Bislogne, to cover the Country of Luxemburg. The Forces of Brandenburg, Hesse, and Lunenburg, have passed the Meuse in order to go into their Winter Quarters. Count Oxenstiern's Regiment of Foot, which was at the Siege of Namur, came hither yesterday, and several other Regiments are daily expected, being to Winter in this place. The Parties sent out from Aeth have within these 8 days taken above 700 Horses from the French, and many Prisoners.

Loos, Sept. 29. Here is a great Court of Foreign Ministers and other Persons of Quality who are come to wait on His Majesty. The Prince of Nassau, Governor of Brisland, came hither last Tuesday; The Prince of Anhalt Dessau the next day, and the Prince de Vaudemont this Evening. The Elector of Brandenburg was to set out from Berlin yesterday in his way hither. His Majesty intends to go to the Hague about the middle of the next week.

Hague, Sept. 30. N.S. The Thanksgiving appointed by this State for the taking of Namur was observed on Wednesday last: On which occasion very fine Fireworks were prepared here on the Water called the Viver, and divers pieces of Cannon were placed on the Viverberg and several times discharged, accompanied with Illuminations, and other suitable Demonstrations of Joy; Great Entertainments were made for the States General, the States of Holland, the Council of State, and the other Colledges of the Government; And my Lord Villers His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary, Entertained very splendidly all the Foreign Ministers, and caused Wine to run through Artificial Conduits among the People. There were like Rejoycings in all the other Towns of this Province. The Garrisons of Drenaud and Doyse are daily expected. The Burgers of this Place have desired leave to appear in their Arms upon His Majesty's arrival here.

Dublin, Sept. 19. The Two Houses of Parliament have since my last dispatched several publick Bills. The Commons have been twice in a Committee of the whole House to consider of Ways and Means for raising the Supply Granted to His Majesty, and are to proceed on the same on Friday next. A Petition has been presented to the House of Commons of divers Merchants of the City of Dublin, in behalf of themselves and others, making Proposals for a

publick Bank or Fund of Credit here, for the Encouragement of Trade, and to supply the present want of Money, which is referred to the Committee of Trade. Yesterday the Commons were in a Committee of the whole House to consider of the State of the Nation, and resolved that the great Interest and Countenance the Irish had in the Court of England during the two last Reigns, have been the Chief Cause of all the Miseries and Calamities that have since befallen this Kingdom. My Lord Clifford arrived here the 11th from England, and the 13th was Sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council. On Monday last arrived here about 50 Sail of Ships from Chester, Liverpool, Milford and Whitehaven, with their Convoy. The Portsmouth Prize who was forced ashore by bad weather on the Ile of Man, got off again, and is come into this Harbour. They write from Kinsale of the 15th, That 16 Sail of Bristol Ships were failed thence to the several Ports to which they were bound, under Convoy of 2 Men of War; The Shoram Frigate was come in there from Milport.

Newcastle, Sept. 20. Yesterday came to our Bar a Fleet of 200 Sail of light Colliers, under Convoy of the Sweepstakes, and two other Men of War.

Hull, Sept. 21. Yesterday arrived here 18 Sail belonging to this place from Rotterdam, who came thence under Convoy of 2 Dutch Men of War, with about 20 Sail more, who are passed to the Northward.

Plimouth, Sept. 22. Yesterday arrived here a Vessel of this place from Cadiz, whence she came in Company of the Turkey Fleet, under Convoy of 17 Men of War and 2 Fireships, which passed by this Port on the 20th instant to the Eastward.

Cowes, Sept. 21. Captain Bowles Commander of His Majesty's Ship the Lime, has sent in a small Flushing Caper, which he retook from the French last Tuesday near Cape de Hague; Rear Admiral Hopson was then on that Coast with the Squadron under on his Command standing to the Westward.

Portsmouth, Sept. 24. We have Advice by a Sloop that is come in, that our homeward bound Turkey Fleet and other Merchant Ships, consisting of about 75 Sail, whereof 15 Men of War, were this morning in sight of the Ile of VVight, making the best of their way for the Downes.
