

the Turks march towards *Transylvania*, which seems to be their design, the Elector of *Saxony* should advance with the Cavalry to; in General *Peterani*, while General *Capriola* returns with the Foot towards the *Danube*.

Vienna, Sept. 21. The last Letters from Hungary tell us, that the whole Ottoman Army encamped before the Palanque of *Lippa* the 7th of this month, and being a Place of little strength, they attack it without raising any Batteries or making any Approaches; The Garrison which consisted of about 1500 men made all the resistance possible for several hours, but were over powered by their numbers, and all put to the Sword except Col. *Toldo* the Commandant, and some other Officers; after which the Turks burnt the Town, and marched back towards *Temeswaer*. The Enemy have likewise taken another small Place called *Tirul* situate on the River *Theysse*. The Imperial Army made great marches, hoping to have met the Turks and obliged them to a Battle, but finding they avoided it, and the difficulty to subsist the Army in those parts not suffering them to follow the Enemy, the Imperial Infantry was coming back towards *Peter-Waradin*, while the Elector of *Saxony* marched to join our Forces on the Frontiers of *Transylvania*, or, as others say, to intercept a Detachment of the Enemies of whose march he had received advice.

Frankfort, Oct. 2. Prince *Lewis of Baden* is returned from the Bath at *Wilbad* to the Army, which continues encamped near *Durlach*; and the Deputies of the Neighbouring States are gone thither to confer with his Highness about settling the Winter Quarters. The French lie in several Bodies on the other side the *Rhine*; their chief Quarters being at *Gumersblum*. We have an account from *Menz*, that a Party of Hussars returned thither two days ago, and brought in two Wagons laden with Cloaths for two Regiments, which they took as they were going to the French, after having defeated their Convoy, and taken a Cornet and several other Prisoners.

Cologne, October 4. The *Lunenbourg* Troops passed the *Rhine* here this morning, over our flying Bridge, in their march homeward. The Forces of *Hesse* intend to pass the same River at *Bonne* this day or to morrow: Part of the *Brandenbourg* Troops are to have their Winter Quarters in this Diocesis.

Hamburg, October 4. The *Moscovites*, as the last Letters from those parts inform us, continue to make considerable Progresses against the *Tartars*, having taken from them several Castles and other Places situated on the *Nieper*. There has been great Rejoycing in all our Neighbouring Places for the taking of *Namar*.

Paris, Oct. 3. The main Business at this Court at present is to find out ways to raise Money for the next years Expences, and among others, 'tis said an Edict will be published to oblige those that have made any Purchases since the year 1640, to pay two Sols for every Livre the same cost them. The *Marschal de Boufflers* is returned to *Flanders*. The talk continues of making new Levies this Winter, and that the Governor of every Province shall be obliged to raise a certain number of men, it being hardly possible to get them otherwise. The Letters from *Toulon* tell us, that of the 42 Men of War ordered to be fitted out there, they have been able to man only 30; 'twas intended they should have sailed about the middle of the last month, but Admiral *Ruffell's* appearing lately on that Coast has given them a new Alarm, and 'tis now said, they are to continue in Port till farther Order. The Duke of *Vendosme* was still encamped the 15th past at *Vizbal* in *Catalonia*; and the Spaniards between *Blanes* and *Tordera*.

Brussels, Oct. 5. Our Army began to separate yesterday, and the Elector of *Bavaria* is expected here towards the end of this week; The Duke of *Wittemberg* is marched with most of the English Foot, and a considerable Body of Horse towards *Flanders*, in order to put them into their Winter Quarters. The *Marschal de Villeroi* has also separated his Army, and sent a Detachment of *Grenadiers* to join the *Marquis de Marcourt* who lies still between *Dinant* and *Givet* to observe the *Brandenbourg*s. Part of the *Garrisons* of *Dixmuyde* and *Deynse* are come to *Ghent*.

Hague, Oct. 8. The King came hither from *Loo* yesterday in the Evening, and was received with extraordinary Demonstrations of Joy for his safe return; The Burghers had made great preparations upon this occasion, and designed to have appeared in *Aimes*, but His Majesty thought fit to decline that Ceremony. The Elector of *Brandenburg* lay last night at *Amsford*, and is expected here this Evening; His Electoral Highness is to lodge at Prince *Maurice's* house. The Prince of *Vaudemont* is now here. Sir *Cloudesly Shovel* arrived the beginning of this week with a Squadron of English men of War in the *Goree* to attend His Majesty in his return to England. It is believed His Majesty will embark in few days. The Council of State will be ready to present to the States General on Monday or Tuesday next, the State of the War for the next year. Major General *Ellenberg* came some days ago to *Ghent*, but endeavouring afterwards to get away, was taken, and is now a Prisoner; Col. *O. Farrell* has brought back 1200 of our men; He and the other chief Officers of the *Garrisons* of *Dixmuyde* and *Deynse* are likewise under Arrest, and a Court

Martial is appointed for their Trial. A small Dutch Frigate of 24 Guns who was Convoy to some of our *Merchants*, is, as we hear, taken by the French, and carried to *Dunkirk*.

Pembrocks, Sept. 27. On the 25th Instant came into this Harbour the *Joseph* and *Jolly* Prize with about 50 Sail of Vessels under their Convoy from *Plimouth*.

Falmouth, Sept. 28. Yesterday arrived here the Spanish Expedition in 3 days from the *Groynes*.

Plimouth, Sept. 29. The 25th came to this Port the Prince *Charles* of and for *Genoa* from *Amsterdam*; The *Osman* Galley of *London* for *Zant*; and a Portuguese for *Amsterdam*.

Brissol, Sept. 28. This day arrived here the *Tyger* hired Man of War, who went out with the *Berry* another hired Man of War, as Convoy to several Merchant Ships bound from hence to the *Westward*; On the 14th Instant they met a French Ship of 48 Guns, who engaged the *Berry* carrying 34 Guns, and after a sharp Dispute took her; The *Tyger* being said to be so much to Leeward that she could not come time enough to assist her; The French Frigate afterwards bore away, and the *Tyger* with the Merchant Ships proceeded on their Voyage.

Hull, Sept. 30. Yesterday came in our *Amsterdam* Fleet under Convoy of two Dutch Men of War, who are gone on to the Northwards with the rest of the Ships.

Deal, Sept. 30. Yesterday sailed out of the Downs the Outward-bound Merchant Ships with their Convoy.

Portsmouth, Oct. 1. His Majesties Ship the *Jolly* took two days ago a small French Caper of 5 or 6 Guns.
