THE King Embarked latt Wednesday morning on the *William and Mary* Yacht in the *Masse*; and on Thursday about 10 in the morning His Majesty landed at *Margate*, being attended in His Passage by a Squadron of English and Dutch Men of War, under the Command of Sir *Cloudeley Shovell*: His Majesty lay that night at *Canterbury*, and came yesterday in the evening to *Kensington*: In *London* and *Westminster* there were every where Illuminations, Bonfires, and Ringing of Bells; The People expressing with great Zeal and Affection, their Joy for His Majesty's safe Return.

His Majesty having called a Council the same Evening, was there Pleas'd to Order a Proclamation to be Issued for Dissolving this present Parliament, and declaring the speedy Calling another, which was accordingly Published this day, as follows.

WILLIAM R.

Whereas We have thought fit, for divers Important and Weighty Considerations; by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to Dissolve Our present Parliament, which now stands Prorogued to the One and thirtieth day of this Instant October; We do for that end Publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby Dissolve the said present Parliament accordingly. And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses of the said Parliament are discharged from their Meeting upon the said One and thirtieth day of October. And to the intent Our good Subjects may perceive the Confidence We have in their Affections, and how desirous We are to Meet Our People, and have their Advice in Parliament, We do hereby make Known to Our said Subjects, that We have given Directions to Our Lord Keeper of Our Great Seal, for the Issuing out of Writs in due Form of Law for the Calling of a New Parliament, which shall begin and be holden at Westminster on Friday the Twenty second Day of November next.

Given at Our Court at *Kensington*, the Eleventh Day of October, 1695: In the Seventh Year of Our Reign.

Whereas We have given Directions for the Issuing out of Writs for the Calling of a new Parliament, and are desirous that the Elections may be carried on without the least Complaint or pretence of Disorder from the Quartering of Our Troops within any Place where such Elections are to be made, We do hereby signify Our Will and Pleasure to all Colonels and Commanders of any of our Regiments, Troops or Companies, that they do not fail, with the Regiments, Troops or Companies under their Command, to march out of such Place of Election the day before the same shall be made, to the next adjacent Place or Places, and that they do not return to their former Quarters until the day after such Election, Our Garrisons only excepted, where it is necessary that Our Forces do remain for the security thereof. And the Officers are to take care that the Soldiers behave themselves civilly, and duly pay their Landlords. And all Magistrates, Justices of the Peace, Constables and other Our Officers whom it may concern, are to be assist-

ing to them in providing Quarters, Impressing Carriages, and otherwise as there shall be occasion.

Given at Our Court at *Kensington* this 13th day of October 1695. In the Seventh Year of Our Reign.

Madrid, Sept. 29. The Letters from *Alicant* of the 19th Instant inform us, that Admiral *Russell* passed by that place the day before with the Fleet under his command, towards *Cadix*. They write from *Malaga*, That the *Essex* Man of War, Captain *Wright* Commander, with the two French Prizes the *Convent* and *Trident*, and *Muscovia-Merchant* Storeship, arrived there the 15th from *Messina*; and there were likewise come into that Road 3 English Ships, viz. the *Orange-Tree* and two others, whose Names the Letters do not mention. On the 25th *Te Deum* was Sung in the King of Spain's Chapel for the taking of *Namur*, and here were great Rejoycings the 3 succeeding nights. The last Advices from *Catalonia* say, the Marquis de *Gastanaga* had given Orders to raise some new Fortifications at *Ostalricke*. The Spanish Army was encamped between *Blanes* and *Barcelona*; and the French near *Palamos*.

Turin, Oct. 5. The Hostages that were given for the due performance of the Capitulation of *Cazal* are discharged on both sides, and ours are come back to this place: The Marquis de *Leganex* arrived here yesterday, and intends to return in few days with the Spanish Troops to *Milan*; and the rest of the Confederate Forces will at the same time be going to their Winter Quarters. The French Troops continue at *Diblon*; and they fortifie the Pass of *Fenestrelle*.

From the Imperial Camp near *Genz*, Septemb. 26. By Letters from *Monkous* of the 18th Instant we gave an account of our Proceedings till then; and of the Resolution that was taken, that the Imperial Horse should march on towards *Transilvania*, and the Foot return to the *Danube*; accordingly Provisions having been given out to the Troops for several days, General *Sparemberg* marched away the 20th with all the Infantry, and the Saxon and *Brandenburg* Cavalry to *Segedin*; and the Elector of *Saxony* and General *Caprara* continued their march with 16 Regiments of Horse and Dragoons, and several Field Pieces towards *Lippa*; The 21th his Electoral Highness encamped at *Nadbach*; the 22th at *Semblach*; the 23d near *Arad*, and the 24th within a League of *Lippa*; During our first days march, an Officer came from General *Veterani*, and informed us of the posture he was in, and that he did not doubt to maintain his Post, if he had not too great a number of the Enemy to deal with; The days following we understood by Deserters and others, that the Sultan was marched with his Army from *Temeswaer* towards *Caransebes*, having sent back the heavy Baggage to *Belgrade*; and we heard afterwards, that the Turks had attackt General *Veterani*, and that there had been a Bloody Action between them; whereupon a Council of War was held, and it was resolv'd to continue our march towards *Almach* and *Deua*, in order to secure *Transilvania*; The 25th we advanced within two Leagues of *Genz*, and this day we came hither, where the Generals received an Express from General *Truchses*, to acquaint them with the Misfortune befallen General *Veterani*, who having with him about 6500 Men, was on the 21th attackt in his Camp near *Lugos* by 40000 Turkes, Foot and Horse; That

our Troops made a very desperate defence from morning till evening, but the enemy over-powering them, after several Repulses, broke into our Camp; However, the Foot, which consisted but of 8 or 900 Men, having made a kind of Fortification with their Baggage, maintained their Ground till most of them were cut off; and thereby gave an opportunity to the Horse to Rally, and to retire towards *Caransebes*, which they did in good Order, under the Command of General *Truchses*, who withdrew the Garison from *Caransebes*, and posted himself near the *Iron-Gate*, having with him 5000 men, to defend that Pass, which covers *Transilvania* on that side. General *Peterani* being very much wounded, was carried off in his Coach, and unfortunately taken with the Baggage. To morrow we shall continue our march, and propose to be the 28th at *Aimash*, and the 30th at *Deus*.

Vienna, Oct. 5. The last Letters from *Hungary* give an account, that the Elector of *Saxony* was on his march towards *Transilvania*, and we believe our next Advices from those parts will tell us that he is joined with General *Truchses*, who together would have a Body of above 20000 Horse and Dragoons. The Turks had attempted nothing since the Action of *Lugos*, being probably discouraged by the great and unexpected resistance they met with from so small a Body of Men, and the loss they themselves suffered, which they own themselves (as appears by some intercepted Letters) to be very great, and all the Advices from our side make to amount to above 10000 men. General *Staremberg* returned the 28th to *Peter-Waradin* with the Imperial Infantry and the *Saxon* and *Brandenburgh* Horse, and they designed some Enterprize against the Enemy on that side. General *Peterani* was still alive by these Advices, and was carried to *Ternspolzer*.

Francfort, Oct. 13. The Army of the Allies continues encamped near *Durlach*; but every thing is preparing as well there, as in the French Army, which lies at *Flonheim*, in order to put the Troops into Winter Quarters. The Marquis *d'Aranches*, Ambassador from the King of *Portugal* to the Emperor, passed through this place two days ago in his way to *Vienna*.

Cologne, Oct. 14. Four Regiments of Horse and 3 Battalions of Foot are coming from the *Maese* to take their Winter Quarters in this Diocess.

Paris, Oct. 14. 'Tis believed the new Edicts that are now talked of for raising Money, will be published in few days. The *Marschal de Villeroy* is shortly expected from *Flanders*, and the *Marschal de Lorge* from *Germany*, the Armies they command being separated, and by the 25th of this month, 'tis believed, the Troops will be all in their Winter Quarters. 'Tis still said the French are disarming their Ships at *Toulon*, of which we may expect the certainty by the next Letters. They write from *Catalonia*, that the Duke of *Vendosme* had caused *Palamos* to be demolished, and continued himself with the French Army near that place to see the Work finished; Some Regiments of Horse and Dragoons were come to *Perpignan* from *Xaintogne* and *Poitou* to join (as the Report went) the Duke of *Vendosme*. The new Archbishop of *Paris* has received his Bulls from *Rome*.

Brussels, Oct. 16. The Elector of *Bavaria* went from hence two days ago to meet the Electress in her return from *Aix la Chapelle*, and last night their Electoral Highnesses arrived here from *Lowain*. Most of our Forces are gone into their Winter Quarters, the rest are still cantoned between *Ghent*, *Bruges*, *Ossend*, and *Newport*. Greatest part of the French Army is likewise gone into Winter Quarters; The Troops of the Household that are to return to *France* are passed by *Cambray*; and the rest of their Forces lie between *Courtray* and *Harlebecke*; The *Marschal de Boufflers* is coming to command the French Troops in *Flanders*, and so soon as he arrives the *Marschal de Villeroy* will return to *Verfailles*. They write from the French Conquest, that Monsieur *de Vauban* is shortly expected there to visit all their Frontier Garisons, and to give Orders for the making of some new advanced Works about those places they think most exposed.

Hague, Oct. 18. The States of *Holland* are separated for a few days, and the several Deputies gone home to consult their Principals concerning the new Impositions that are now under consideration towards raising a Fund for the next year. The Elector of *Brandenburg* went hence this day to *Amsterdam*, where he intends to stay till towards the end of this week, and then to go to *Cleves* to hold an Assembly of the States of that Country. A Ship is arrived at *Amsterdam* from *Curassaw*, and brings Letters of the 26th of *August*, which advise, that by a Vessel newly arrived there from *St. Domingo* they had received an account, that the English and Spaniards had taken from the French *Petit-Guayes*, *Porro-Paix*, *Gnarico*, and *El Cabo*; and that Monsieur *de Caffé*, the French Governor, was retired with 1000 Men to the Mountains, where they were so beset by the English and Spanish Forces that they could not escape.

Guernsey, Oct. 4. Capt. *Vale* Commander of a *Guernsey* Privateer, cruising on the French Coast, took lately 3 Vessels near *Port Louis*, all empty, of about 30 Tuns each, and brought them in here; Some days after he went to the Road of *Croisicke*, where he forced ashore 12 small Vessels, and brought away 3 laden with Salt. About the same time Capt. *Stevens* took a French Vessel of about 20 Tun bound to *St. Malo*.

Portsmouth, Oct. 12. Sir *George Rooke* sailed yesterday from *St. Helens*, with the Men of War and Merchant Ships bound to the *Streights*.
