The following Addresses were presented to His Majesty at Buckingham Palace on Friday, the 7th instant:—

### CONVOCAATION OF CANTERBURY.

To The King's Most Excellent Majesty.

We, your Majesty's loyal and faithful subjects, the Archbishop, Bishops and Clergy of the Province of Canterbury in Convocation assembled, approach your Majesty with the dutiful assurance of our devotion to your Throne and Person.

Eight years, years among the most anxious and critical in our national history, have passed since we last had the privilege of presenting an Address to your Majesty, at the opening of a new Convocation. Political and industrial problems of the gravest kind confronted your Majesty and the British Parliament at that time. It is not possible to say in what way these problems would have been solved or in what shape new problems would have appeared. For they disappeared or altogether changed their form in face of a peril which threatened the freedom and happiness, not only of these islands and your Majesty's Dominions beyond the seas, but of the whole civilised world.

It is perhaps not out of place to recall the words of our Address to His Majesty King

Edward VII. when we were allowed audience in 1910, on an occasion similar to the present. We then said:—

“ As ministers of the Prince of Peace we watch with thankful admiration the care with which your Majesty labours to promote alike the accord of all parts of your dominion and the peace of the world; and we rejoice to think that far and wide your Majesty is acknowledged as foremost in the great work of averting the wasteful misery of war.”

These efforts, however, and the not less earnest and persistent efforts of your Majesty proved vain, and for four years we with our Allies have been engaged in the most terrible war that has ever been known to mankind.

As we look back upon these tragic years, we desire to assure your Majesty of the admiration with which we have watched your Majesty bear the heavy burden of care and responsibility which has inevitably fallen upon your shoulders. We share the pride which our fellow-citizens feel at the lead which your Majesty and Her Majesty the Queen have given to the patriotism of the whole people. We thank God for what you have done—and we thank Him also for giving you health to do it.

Now that, by the blessing of God, Peace is within sight, our hearts are turned to the great

Conference in Paris engaged upon the high and tremendous task of settling the peace terms. We pray God, through Jesus Christ the Prince of Peace, that by the establishment of a League of Nations, and by other means, such a settlement may be reached as to make impossible the recurrence of a war so terrible, and to ensure, under the same Divine blessing, that the reign of righteousness and peace may be established, and that the nations may dwell together as one family upon the face of all the earth.

With the coming of peace we recognise the emergence or recurrence of problems and difficulties of another kind. In many ways and in different fashions the desire for a new and better England after the war will find expression. The housing question, the industrial conditions of daily work, the due provision for leisure and its wholesome use, and perhaps above all, the education of the young, are matters calling for the urgent attention of Parliament and local authorities in the near future. And we know from the evidence which your Majesty has repeatedly given by word and action, that the truest interests of the people in these respects will be of vital concern to your Majesty.

We desire to assure your Majesty that, for our part as representatives of the National Church, we are eager to give all the help we can to the furthering of those ends. It is in the spirit of Him who for our sakes became poor and came not to be ministered unto but to minister, that we wish to offer our service to our fellow citizens. May God help us in all such service to follow the example of our Master, and to carry Christian principles into every department of our national life.

With regard to one problem affecting the constitution of the Convocation of this Province, and the well-being of the Church in Wales, we recognise the value of the assurance which has already been formally given that care will be taken to obviate the peril that the return of Peace might be marked by financial disaster to the most venerable and not the least distinguished portion of the Church of the Province in whose name we address your Majesty to-day.

In response to your Majesty's Letters of Business, we have for a long time past been engaged in careful consideration of the Rubrics of the Book of Common Prayer, with a view to making recommendations as to modifications of the existing law relating to the conduct of Divine Service. The interruption caused by the war has of necessity postponed our completion and presentation of these recommendations. But we hope that our labours, which have extended over a wide field, are now approaching their conclusion, and that we shall be able ere long to lay the Reply before your Majesty.

Nor are our plans for reform confined to the Prayer Book. For we think it right to add that there is at present under consideration, in our councils, an important scheme, by which, in the opinion of many, the Church would attain a larger liberty of action and a greater capacity for adjusting its organisation to the opportunities of the new age which is opening before us.

We would conclude, as always, with the humble prayer that the blessing of Almighty God our Heavenly Father, through our Lord

Jesus Christ, may rest upon your Majesty and upon every member of the Royal House.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following gracious answer:—

It gives me sincere pleasure to receive this loyal and dutiful Address from your Grace, and the Bishops and Clergy of the Province of Canterbury in Convocation assembled.

I cannot look back upon the years which have passed since the last occasion on which I received such an Address without recognizing the heavy burden of private sorrow and national trouble laid upon this country as the result of the Great War.

I appreciate your reference to the long-continued labours of my beloved Father to preserve peace among the nations. Those efforts have seemed for the moment to be in vain, being swallowed up in the most tragic and devastating conflict that the world has ever seen; but I hope and trust that, under the Providence of God, the deliberations of the Peace Congress may result in such an agreement as shall make it far more difficult in future for any nation to plunge the world into the horrors of War.

I share with you the hope that the signing of Peace will be the prelude to a new era in the social life of this Country. While we can now look back upon a succession of reforms and improvements extending over many years, there is still much to do to bring the conditions in which the majority of the people of these islands work and live into harmony with their own desires and with genuinely improved standards of health, education, and comfort, and the necessary opportunities for wholesome recreation.

I am sure that the vivified public spirit which follows the War—a War which both in the battlefield and at home has drawn all classes into one—will be reflected in the activities of Parliament, of the Government Departments and of the local authorities; and I am equally confident that the Ministry of the Church will always be directed towards a high conception and a faithful fulfilment of public duty.

I look forward with interest to the result of your labours in respect of the proposed modifications of the law relating to the conduct of Divine Service. In this and in kindred efforts I am sure your object will always be to adapt the ministrations of the Church to the needs and opportunities of the time, and to recognize its living responsibility as the Church of the people.

I believe that, as the era now opening seems to present problems, alike in religion and in social life, of wide range and great perplexity your efforts, as those of all right-thinking men, will be towards such settlement as will, by the blessing of God, increase the spirit of goodwill among men, without which no problem can be solved, while with it no difficulty is insuperable.

#### CONVOCAION OF YORK.

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty

May it please your Majesty.

We, your Majesty's loyal and faithful subjects the Archbishop, Bishops and Clergy of the Province of York in Convocation assem-

bled, desire to approach your Majesty with a humble and dutiful assurance of our devotion to your Majesty's Throne and Person.

Following a long and cherished tradition, we hasten among our earliest acts to offer to our Sovereign this assurance of ardent loyalty, and to avow to him our purpose deep and strong always to labour for the full and yet fuller efficiency of the National Church in its providential commission to serve the general good, above all in those things of the spirit which are vital to the health of the whole national life.

With your Majesty's Kingdom and Empire at large we congratulate your Majesty with a reverent joy upon the victory which, under the favour of God, has crowned the valour and endurance of your Majesty's forces and of the forces of the Allies and Associates of this Realm in the greatest and most formidable of the wars of history. We do not dwell upon the supreme rightfulness of the struggle against a vast and calculated wrong; nor upon the glorious temper of the Allied hosts alike in good and in evil days; nor upon the willing submission to novel restraints in daily life shown by a people jealous above all others of liberty; nor upon the sorrows and sacrifices of innumerable homes nobly borne for a most dear Country and a transcendent Cause.

In this humble Address and only for a few moments even here we would speak more particularly of the noble service to that Cause rendered by your Majesty and by your Majesty's Royal Consort. In the long records of the Crown never surely do we find that Crown more nobly dignified by its wearers than in our own time, when for four long and fateful years the Nation has watched a King and Queen living without one intermitted day a life of unreserved and exacting service rich in the power of a self-forgetful sympathy, of a simplicity of spirit, and of a godly fear whose example has been a strength and an encouragement to us all.

To the God of our fathers whose holy Name your Majesty has ever invoked before us we now look humbly up with prayer and with thanksgiving. We thank Him for innumerable mercies of patience and of grace granted to us in our hour of need. We pray Him at this time of armistice in the field and of conference of the victorious nations for the peace and welfare of the world and also of grave anxieties and perils in the social life of your Majesty's own people that He will yet deal in patience and grace with England, with Europe and with the world.

And upon the person and Throne of your Majesty and upon your Royal House dear to this Nation alike in its joys and in the tender sacredness of its sorrows we call down with reverent affection the abiding benediction of our Lord and God.

I am grateful for this loyal and dutiful Address from your Grace, and the Bishops and Clergy of the Province of York in Convocation assembled. I thank you for your expression of loyalty and devotion to the Throne and for the

blessings which you call down on the labours incidental to it.

Your congratulations on the victory which has crowned the efforts of My Army and those of Our steadfast Allies are the expression of a feeling in which the whole nation can share.

With true humility and with thanks to Almighty God for the victory, we may yet feel the thrill of a justifiable pride. The nation has been true to its past, as full of a spirit of invincible valour as ever, as firm and enduring as ever in its refusal to see in any temporary eclipse the complete overshadowing of the powers of right. The tragedy of innumerable homes broken, of innumerable families bereaved, testifies to the strength and endurance of our consciousness of right in the struggle.

That the Queen and I have been permitted to take a part in the labours incident to this struggle has been to Us a solemn joy. If what We have been able to do has been, as I hope it has, a source of help to those engaged in fighting or working, or of consolation to those bereaved, We have been richly rewarded. I am grateful that through this trying period We have been granted the strength to labour, and the sympathy that lightens labour.

I join with you in thanks to God for the many mercies vouchsafed to this country and in your prayers and aspirations for the future. I pray that all threatening perils may pass, and that the issue of the War may be, for the British Empire, a people strong, patient, at peace with itself and with all men; and for the World, the removal for long, if not for ever, of the impending fear of Warfare and of all concerted violence.

Whereas by an Act passed in a Session of Parliament holden in the third year of the reign of His late Majesty King Edward the Seventh, intituled "An Act to reorganise the Administration of the Patriotic Fund," the Patriotic Fund Commission constituted by Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, by Warrant under the Royal Sign Manual, dated the seventh day of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, was dissolved, and the property, rights, duties and liabilities thereof, and all property held in trust therefor, were transferred to and vested in the Royal Patriotic Fund Corporation established in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act:

And whereas by the said recited Act which came into operation on the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and four, it is enacted that after the expiration of three years immediately succeeding the commencement of the Act, the members of the said Corporation to be appointed by Warrant under the Royal Sign Manual shall be six in number (now increased to eight, as hereinafter appears), and shall hold office for a term of three years:

And whereas, in pursuance of the powers vested in Us by the said Act, We did, by Warrant under Our Royal Sign Manual bearing date the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and fifteen, appoint you Our said Most Dear Uncle and Counsellor Arthur William Patrick Albert, Duke of Connaught and Strathearn, together with the gentlemen therein named to be members of the Royal Patriotic Fund Corporation for the term of three years from the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and sixteen:

And whereas by section 7 of the War Pensions (Administrative Provisions) Act, 1918, provision is made for the representation of the Ministry of Pensions on the Royal Patriotic Fund Corporation, it being thereby enacted that two members of the said Corporation shall be appointed by Warrant under the Royal Sign Manual on the recommendation of the Minister of Pensions:

Now know ye that We do by these Presents under Our Royal Sign Manual, ordain and

declare that you Our said Most Dear Uncle and Counsellor Arthur William Patrick Albert, Duke of Connaught and Strathearn, together with you the said Sir Frederick William Stopford, Sir Frederic Edward Errington Brock, Sir Harry Edwin Haward, Bertram Blakiston Cubitt, Charles Henry Renn Stansfield, Edward Thompson Dickson and Charles James Mathew, shall be Members of the Royal Patriotic Fund Corporation, to exercise for the term of three years from the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, in conjunction with the six members co-opted by the General Council, and the ex-officio members specified in the First Schedule to the Act first above recited, the powers and duties transferred to that body as aforesaid, and generally to carry into effect the provisions of the said Act.

And We do further ordain that you Our said Most Dear Uncle and Counsellor Arthur William Patrick Albert, Duke of Connaught and Strathearn, shall be President of the General Council of the said Corporation.

#### APPENDIX.

##### TRADE.

The Paper Bag Trade, that is to say—

The manufacture from paper (including gauzelined or clothlined paper) of any bag or container without a gummed flap, *including* the operations of packing, parcelling, warehousing, receiving, storekeeping; despatching, timekeeping, lift-operating, and cleaning, when these operations are carried on in connection with paper bag manufacture, and *including* the printing of paper bags when the printing apparatus is attached to the making apparatus; but *excluding* the manufacture of bags or containers with ungummed flaps (for use in the transmission of printed matter or samples) when made by the same processes as gummed envelopes, and excluding the manufacture of receptacles from cardboard, such as boxes, cartons or skillets.

Whereas the Trade Boards Acts, 1909 and 1918, apply to the trades specified in the schedule to the Trade Boards Act, 1909, and to the trades specified in the schedule to the Trade Boards Provisional Orders Confirmation Act, 1913, and the Minister of Labour is empowered, under and by virtue of Section One of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, to make a Special Order applying the Trade Boards Acts, 1909 and 1918, to any specified trade to which they do not at the time apply, if he is of opinion that no adequate machinery exists for the effective regulation of wages throughout the trade, and that accordingly, having regard to the rates of wages prevailing in the trade, or any part of the trade, it is expedient that the Trade Boards Acts, 1909 and 1918, should apply to that trade.

And whereas the Trade Boards Acts, 1909 and 1918, do not apply to the trade specified in the Appendix to this Order, and the Minister of Labour as respects that trade is of the aforesaid opinion.

Now, therefore, I, the Minister of Labour, in pursuance of the powers given to me by Section One of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, and by any other statute in that behalf, do hereby make a Special Order that from and after the date hereof the following provision shall have effect (that is to say):

Article 1.—The Trade Boards Acts, 1909 and 1918, shall apply to the trade specified in the Appendix to this Order.

Article 2.—This Order may be cited as the Trade Boards (Aerated Waters) Order, 1919.

## APPENDIX.

## TRADE.

The Aerated Waters trade, that is to say, the manufacture wherever carried on, of mineral or aerated waters, non-alcoholic cordials, flavoured syrups, unfermented sweet drinks, and other similar beverages, and the manufacture in unlicensed premises of brewed liquors, including (a) the operations of bottle washing, bottling and filling, and all other operations preparatory to the sale of any of the aforesaid liquors in bottles, jars, syphons, casks or other similar receptacles; and including also (b) the operations of bottle washing, bottling and filling, and all subsidiary operations preparatory to the sale in bottles, jars or other similar receptacles of cider, ale, stout, porter and other alcoholic beers, where all or any of such last mentioned operations are or is conducted or carried on in association with or in conjunction with all or any of the operations specified under (a) above so as to form a common or interchangeable form of employment for workers, and whether the two sets of operations or any of them are or is carried on simultaneously or not.

## AMMONIA AND AMMONIACAL PRODUCTS.

With reference to the following Order made by the Minister of Munitions, namely:—

The Ammonia Control Order, 1918, dated the 17th May, 1918,  
the Minister of Munitions hereby orders as follows:—

1. The operation of the said Order is hereby suspended on and after the 14th day of March, 1919, until further notice.

2. Such suspension shall not affect the previous operation of the said Order or the validity of any action taken thereunder, or the liability to any penalty or punishment in respect of any contravention or failure to comply with the said Order prior to such suspension or any proceeding or remedy in respect of such penalty or punishment.

3. This Order may be cited as the Ammonia and Ammoniacal Products (Suspension) Order, 1919.

## DEFENCE OF THE REALM (LIQUOR CONTROL).

## GENERAL ORDER (AMENDMENT) OF THE CENTRAL CONTROL BOARD (LIQUOR TRAFFIC) FOR ALL AREAS IN ENGLAND AND WALES.

We, the Central Control Board (Liquor Traffic), in pursuance of the powers conferred upon us by the Acts and Regulations relating to the Defence of the Realm hereby make the following Order:—

*Areas to which the Order applies.*

1. This Order shall apply to all areas, or parts of areas, situate in England and Wales

to which the Defence of the Realm (Liquor Control) Regulations, 1915, have been applied.

*Modification of Hours during which Intoxicating Liquor may be sold.*

2. The hours between 6 p.m. and 9.30 p.m. shall be substituted for the week-day evening hours prescribed by Article 2 of each of the Orders of the Board for the said areas and be the hours during which intoxicating liquor may be sold or supplied for consumption on the premises and be consumed on the premises in licensed premises and clubs in the evening on week-days; and the hours between 6 p.m. and 8.30 p.m. shall be substituted for the week-day evening hours prescribed by the said Article in the said Orders and be the hours during which intoxicating liquor may be sold or supplied for consumption off the premises in licensed premises and clubs and taken or dispatched therefrom in the evening on week-days.

And the said Article in each of the said Orders shall be read and have effect as if amended accordingly.

*Modification of Restrictions as to Spirits.*

3. Paragraphs (a) and (b) of Article 3 of each of the said Orders are hereby revoked, and the following paragraph shall be substituted therefor:—

“(a) Spirits to be consumed off the premises shall not be sold or supplied in or taken or (save as hereinafter expressly provided) dispatched from any licensed premises or club except on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, and during the mid-day hours prescribed by Article 2 of this Order.”

And the said Article in each of the said Orders shall be read and have effect as if amended accordingly.

*Modification of Saving Provisions.*

4. (1) The following words shall be added at the end of paragraph (a) of Article 6 of each of the said Orders:—

“or the sale or supply of intoxicating liquor for consumption at a meal supplied at the same time to any such person between the hours of 9.30 p.m. and 11 p.m. on week-days, and 9 p.m. and 11 p.m. on Sundays.”

(2) The following paragraph shall be substituted for the paragraph in the said Article relating to the dispatch of intoxicating liquor from licensed premises:—

“(d) The dispatch from licensed premises of any spirits or other intoxicating liquor in any horse-drawn or motor van, lorry, or similar vehicle, at any time of the day up to 8.30 p.m. on any week-day on which the sale of the same for consumption off the premises is permitted by Article 2 and Article 3 of this Order, as the case may be.”

(3) The following paragraph shall be added to the said Article:—

“(e) The sale or supply of intoxicating liquor for consumption on the premises and the consumption of intoxicating liquor on the premises between the hours of 9.30 p.m. and 11 p.m. on week-days under an order or licence granted in pursuance of section 57



or section 64 of the Licensing (Consolidation) Act, 1910."

(4) The following paragraph shall be added after paragraph (a) of the said article in the Orders of the Board now in force in the Welsh and West Gloucestershire areas:—

"(a2) The sale or supply of intoxicating liquor for consumption at a meal supplied at the same time and the consumption of intoxicating liquor at such meal to and by any person in any licensed premises or club between the hours of 12.30 p.m. and 2.30 p.m. and between the hours of 6.30 p.m. and 9 p.m. on Sundays."

And the said Article in each of the said Orders shall be read and have effect as if amended accordingly.

#### *Exhibition of Order.*

5. The secretary of every club to which this Order applies and every holder of a licence for the sale of intoxicating liquor shall keep permanently affixed in some conspicuous place in the club or in the licensed premises a copy of this Order.

#### *Commencement of Order.*

6. This Order shall come into force on the seventeenth day of March, 1919.

# ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 4TH MARCH 1919.)

## YORKSHIRE (WEST RIDING) (LEEDS DISTRICT) (FOOT - AND - MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1919 (No. 3).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

### *Modification of Orders.*

1. The Yorkshire (West Riding) (Leeds District) (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1919, hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order," and the Yorkshire (West Riding) (Leeds District) (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1919 (No. 2), hereinafter referred to as Order (No. 2), are modified in manner hereinafter appearing.

### *Movement into the Zone for Immediate Slaughter.*

2.—(1.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved by railway without a licence from premises not situate within the Scheduled District to a railway station situate within the Zone described in the First Schedule hereto (hereinafter referred to as "the Zone"); and an animal so moved may be moved from the railway station to any slaughterhouse situate within the Zone if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the railway station is situate.

(2.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved by road from any premises not situate within the Scheduled District to any slaughterhouse in the Zone if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the slaughterhouse is situate.

### *Movement within the Zone.*

3. Where an Inspector of the Local Authority considers it necessary or expedient that an animal in his district should be permitted to be moved from premises in the Zone to any other premises in the Zone, he may authorise such movement by a Movement Licence.

### *Provisions as to Movement Licences.*

4.—(1.) Where the movement authorised by a Movement Licence granted under this Order is movement to a slaughterhouse from premises other than a railway station an animal shall not be moved with the Licence unless before the movement is commenced it is marked by and at the expense of the owner in manner following:—

*Cattle.*—By the clipping of a broad arrow ↑ about six inches long on the left hind-quarter of each of the cattle and by the clipping of the hair off the end of the tail.

*Sheep.*—By the clipping of a broad arrow ↑ on the forehead of each of the sheep; and also by the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the sheep with the following composition, namely: Rosin, five parts; oil of turpentine, two parts; and blue or red ochre, one part; melted and used warm; or with some other adhesive composition of a blue or red colour.

*Swine.*—By the painting or stamping of

the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the swine with the composition above mentioned.

(2.) A Movement Licence under this Order shall not be granted by an Inspector of a Local Authority unless he is satisfied that the proposed movement will not involve movement on a road in the Scheduled District which is not in the Zone.

(3.) Where the movement authorised by a Movement Licence is movement as often as occasion may require, either between different parts of the same farm or between different farms, the Licence shall be marked with the words "Occupation Licence," and shall be in force until it is revoked by an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board by a Notice served on the occupier of the farm on which the animals then are.

(4.) Every Licence shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted, the number and description of the animals authorised to be moved, and the name or description of the several premises to and from which the animals are authorised to be moved.

(5.) Where animals are moved with a Licence under this Order, unless the Licence is an Occupation Licence, the Licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up to an officer of the Local Authority or be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District by the person in charge of the animals at the time of completing the movement.

(6.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order, except where it is otherwise expressly authorised by this Order, shall be in force for four days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall be in the form set forth in the Second Schedule to this Order or to the like effect.

(7.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order shall not be available if granted by the owner of the animal to be moved, or by his agent, or by the consignee of the animal, or by the occupier of the farm or premises or slaughterhouse from or to which the animal is to be moved, or by any individual member of an Executive Committee or Sub-Committee of a Local Authority.

(8.) A copy of a Licence which authorises movement to premises in a District other than the District for which the person granting the Licence acts as Inspector shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Local Authority of the District in which the place of destination is situate.

### *General Provisions as to Movement.*

5. Animals while being moved under this Order shall, so far as is practicable, be kept separate from all animals which are not being so moved, and shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay to the place of destination specified in the Licence, and where the place of destination is a slaughterhouse they shall be there detained until they are slaughtered.

### *Exception of certain Animals from Provisions as to Movement.*

6. Nothing in this Order shall be construed as authorising—

(i) movement of an animal which is affected with foot-and-mouth disease, or which has during the preceding twenty-eight days been in any way exposed to the infection of such disease; or

(ii) movement into or out of a foot-and-mouth disease infected place; or

(iii) movement of an animal the movement of which is prohibited by notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board.

*Saving for Orders and Regulations.*

7. Movement of animals under this Order is subject to any other Order of the Board, and also subject to any Regulation made by a Local Authority under any Order of the Board for prohibiting or regulating the movement of animals.

*Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.*

8.—(1.) Any person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Licence, if any, necessary for the movement, and shall allow it to be read, and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

*Prohibition of Movement out of the Zone except in certain cases.*

9. No animal shall be moved out of the Zone except for the purpose of movement for slaughter into any of the boroughs described in the Schedule to Order (No. 2), under and in accordance with the provisions of that Order, and for the purposes of such movement the Zone shall be treated as if it were not in the Scheduled District.

*Holding of Markets and Sales in the Zone.*

10.—(1.) A market or sale of animals may be held on any premises in the Zone if the Local Authority are satisfied that the market or sale will be restricted to animals intended for immediate slaughter and the market or sale is authorised by the Local Authority under this Article.

(2.) The Local Authority shall cause a Veterinary Inspector to attend at every market or sale authorised under this Article and examine the animals exposed thereat.

(3.) An animal exposed at a market or sale authorised under this Article shall not be moved therefrom unless before such movement it is marked, by and at the expense of the owner, in the manner described in Article 4 of this Order.

*Offences.*

11.—(1.) If a person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If any person, with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark painted on any animal as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each

according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

*Interpretation.*

12.—In this Order—

“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

“The Board” means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries.

“Animals” means cattle, sheep, goats and swine.

“Slaughterhouse” means any premises where animals are habitually slaughtered, and includes a bacon factory.

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

*Short Title, &c.*

13.—This Order may be cited as the YORKSHIRE (WEST RIDING) (LEEDS DISTRICT) (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1919 (No. 3), and shall be read with the Orders referred to in Article 1.

#### THE WART DISEASE OF POTATOES (SCOTTISH SEED POTATOES) ORDER OF 1919.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Destructive Insects and Pests Acts, 1877 and 1907, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

##### *Commencement.*

1. This Order shall come into operation on the tenth day of March, nineteen hundred and nineteen.

##### *Restrictions on dealings in Scottish Seed Potatoes.*

2.—(1) Any person who shall bring or cause to be brought into England or Wales, any seed potatoes grown in Scotland and purchased by him shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds (a) unless the potatoes are sold to him as potatoes of an approved immune variety; or (b) unless he has previously obtained a declaration, signed by the grower or purporting to be so signed, that to the best of his knowledge, information, and belief the potatoes are not affected with Wart Disease, and that Wart Disease has not occurred on the farm where the potatoes were grown and also obtained a certificate issued by the Board of Agriculture for Scotland not more than seven days before the potatoes are consigned to England or Wales that, so far as the Board of Agriculture for Scotland are aware, Wart Disease has not existed on the farm on which the potatoes were grown or within one mile of such farm.

(2) Any person in England or Wales to whom seed potatoes grown in Scotland have been consigned for sale on behalf of the consignor or other person, whether before or after the commencement of this Order, shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds if, after the commencement of this Order, he sells the potatoes or any of them (not being potatoes of an approved immune variety) before he has obtained a declaration and cer-

tificate as prescribed by the preceding subsection.

(3) An approved immune variety is a variety approved for the time being by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries as being immune from Wart Disease.

*Production of Declarations and Certificates.*

3. Any person or agent for sale by this Order required to obtain a declaration and certificate shall, if so required by an officer of the Board, produce the same for his inspection, and if he fail to do so without reasonable cause shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

*Offences.*

4. Any person who shall make a false declaration for the purposes of this Order shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

*Definition.*

5. In this Order the expression "Wart Disease" means the disease affecting potatoes which is known as Synchytrium endobioticum, or Wart Disease of Potatoes, or Black Scab or Cauliflower disease, and the expression "person" includes a corporation.

*Short Title.*

6. This Order may be cited as the Wart Disease of Potatoes (Scottish Seed Potatoes) Order of 1919.

To make all necessary provision consequential or otherwise to enable the purchase by the Council of such waterworks and plant as aforesaid to be carried into effect, and for that purpose to vary or amend all or any of the provisions of the Llanelly Waterworks Acts, 1865 to 1909, and in particular but not exclusively Section 4 of the Llanelly Waterworks Act, 1909, and Section 29 of that Act as amended or extended by three Orders made by the Local Government Board in pursuance of the Special Acts (Extension of Time) Act, 1915, dated respectively 27th January, 1916, 25th July, 1917, and 14th August, 1918.

To alter and extend the limits of the Council for the supply of water so as to include in addition to their existing limits as defined by the Llanelly Rural District Water Act, 1912:

(1) the before-mentioned "extended limits of supply"; and

(2) An area comprising so much of the

parish of Pontyberem constituted by the Carmarthen and Glamorgan (Pontyberem) Confirmation Order, 1919, as is not included in the existing limits of supply of the Council, which area is bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the footbridge over the River Gwendraeth-fawr, near Ynys-y-bont, and drawn thence in a north-westerly direction along the western side of the road leading to Waun-boeth farm, thence in a northerly direction along the western side of the same road to the main road from Pontyberem to Carmarthen at Bancfos-felen, crossing such main road, and thence in a north-easterly direction along the northern side of the road leading to Rhyd-olau, crossing the road leading from Laswern to Pentre-dolau, thence along the boundary fence dividing the enclosures numbered 152 and 153, thence in an easterly direction for a distance of 92 yards or thereabouts along the boundary fence dividing enclosures numbered 151 and 153, thence in an easterly direction across the enclosures numbered 153, 154 and 155 to the head of the Afon Dulais in the enclosure numbered 155, all which enclosures are shown on the 2500 Ordnance Map of the county of Carmarthen, sheet XLVII., 6 (edition of 1915), thence in a north-easterly direction along the northern side of the Afon Dulais to the ford at Pant-yr-efail, crossing the road leading from Mount Pleasant to Llwyn-yr-Eoc, thence in a southerly and south-easterly direction along the eastern side of the last mentioned road to the ford 124 yards or thereabouts north-west of Clos-isaf farmhouse, thence in an easterly direction along the northern side of the last mentioned road to the bridge over the River Gwendraeth-fawr east of Clos-isaf farm, and thence in a south-westerly direction along the boundary of the existing limits of supply of the Council until it meets the point of commencement of such imaginary line.

To confer upon the Council and enable them to exercise within the whole or any part or parts of their limits of supply as proposed to be extended either with or without variation or subject to such conditions as the Bill may define or Parliament may prescribe all or any of the powers, privileges and authorities for or in relation to the supply of water which they have or may exercise within their existing limits for the supply of water, and to provide that all the powers, rights, privileges, authorities and obligations of the Corporation for or in relation to the supply of water within such limits, or any part or parts thereof, shall cease and determine.

To empower the Council on the one hand and the Corporation on the other hand to enter into and carry into effect contracts and agreements for the supply of water in bulk for such period or periods and on such terms and conditions as may be agreed upon or as may be defined in the intended Act, and to confirm any contract or agreement which may have been or may before the passing of the intended Act be entered into with respect thereto.

To provide for the application of monies received in respect of the water undertaking of the Council and for any deficiency in the revenue of that undertaking being defrayed otherwise than in the manner directed by the Public Health Act, 1875, with respect to

special expenses incurred in the execution of that Act.

To authorize the Council for the purpose of defraying the expenses of their water undertaking (including the payment of interest on moneys already borrowed or to be borrowed in connection with that undertaking and the requisite appropriations, instalments or sinking fund payments in respect of moneys so borrowed) and of meeting any deficiency in the revenue of their water undertaking, to levy a rate throughout their limits for the supply of water, including such limits as proposed to be extended, and to raise or charge the amount of such expenses and deficiency from or upon the contributory places or parts of contributory places within such limits of supply as if the same were special expenses of the whole area comprising such contributory places and parts of contributory places.

For the foregoing purposes or any of them to amend, alter or repeal sections 45 and 58 of the Llanelly Rural District Water Act, 1912.

To enable the Council to borrow and re-borrow moneys for the purposes of the Llanelly Rural District Water Act, 1912, and of the intended Act upon the security of their water undertaking and of the revenue thereof, and upon all rates, moneys, revenue and property of the Council, including any fund or rate to be authorized by the intended Act, and to make further and better provision with regard to the borrowing and re-borrowing of money and the application of the revenue of the water undertaking and other financial matters, and to exempt the powers of borrowing money under the intended Act from the restrictions contained in Section 234 of the Public Health Act, 1875.

To sanction and confirm, so far as may be necessary, the borrowing of money already raised by the Council for the purposes of their water undertaking.

To consolidate or to provide for the consolidation of loans of the Council on water works account upon an equated period for repayment with or without an extension of any such first-mentioned period, and to confer upon the Council any necessary powers of borrowing money for giving effect thereto.

To vary or extinguish all rights, powers and privileges inconsistent with or which would or might in any way interfere with any of the objects of the intended Act, and to confer other rights, powers and privileges.

The intended Act will, so far as it may be necessary or expedient to give effect to the foregoing objects and purposes or any of them, amend, extend or repeal the provisions or some of the provisions of the Llanelly Waterworks Acts, 1865 to 1909, and any other Act or Acts relating to the water undertaking of the Corporation, the Llanelly Rural District Water Act, 1912, and any other Act or Acts relating to the water undertaking of the Council, and will or may incorporate and apply to the Council and their water undertaking, with or without modifications, all or some of the provisions of the Waterworks Clauses Acts, 1847 and 1863; the Public Health Acts, the Local Loans Act, 1875, and all other Acts amending the said Acts respectively.

Printed copies of the Bill for the intended

Act will be deposited in the Private Bill Office of the House of Commons as soon as leave shall have been given by Parliament to introduce the Bill.

#### SHOREHAM-BY-SEA URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL.

(Power to Shoreham-by-Sea Urban District Council to Construct Footbridge over the River Adur with Approaches thereto; Compulsory Purchase of Lands and Easements; Powers of Deviation; Dredging and Subsidiary Works; Establishment of Ferries; Provision of Boats; Power to levy Tolls, Rates and Duties for use of Bridge and Ferries; Appointment of Officers, &c.; By-laws; Penalties; Further Powers in regard to Streets, Buildings, Sewers, Drains, Watercourses, Infectious Diseases and Sanitary Matters; Discontinuance of Offensive Trades; Street Cries and Noisy Hawking; Common Lodging-houses; Fire Alarms; Additional Borrowing Powers; Financial Provisions; Miscellaneous and Incidental Provisions; Incorporation, Repeal and Amendment of Acts.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the present session by the Urban District Council of Shoreham-by-Sea (hereinafter called

"the Council") for an Act for all or some of the following purposes, and to confer on the Council the following, or some of the following, among other powers (that is to say):—

*Footbridge and Ferries.*

1. To authorize the Council to make and maintain a footbridge over the River Adur with all proper openings, piers, abutments, roads, approaches and other works and conveniences connected therewith, commencing at a point on the northern side of the said river, at the top of the steps leading to the foreshore 40 yards or thereabouts from the western corner of the public house at the junction of Lower-road and East-street measured in a southerly direction and terminating at a point on the roadway on the southern side of the said river 235 yards or thereabouts from the commencement of the bridge measured in a southerly direction, and 130 yards or thereabouts west of the southern approach road to the ferry between Shoreham-by-Sea and Shoreham beach; which said intended footbridge approaches and works will be situate wholly in the parish of Shoreham-by-Sea in the urban district of Shoreham-by-Sea, in the county of Sussex.

2. To authorize the Council to acquire by compulsion or agreement lands and buildings in the said parish of Shoreham-by-Sea for the purposes of the intended footbridge approaches and other works and other lands and buildings, and any easements, rights or privileges in, over or affecting such lands required for the purposes of the intended Act; to extinguish all private and other rights of way over any such lands; and to enable the Council to retain, hold and use or to sell, lease, exchange or otherwise dispose of any lands or any interest therein acquired by them under the intended Act, and to sell, exchange or otherwise dispose of any rents reserved thereon.

3. To empower the Council to cross, stop up, interfere with, widen, raise, sink, alter or divert, either temporary or permanently, all roads, streets, highways, railways, footpaths, ways and rights of way, rivers, navigations, streams, gas or water mains, pipes, wires and apparatus, steps, areas, cellars, windows, spouts and pipes, sewers, drains, channels and water-courses within or adjoining the said parish which it may be necessary to cross, stop up, interfere with, alter or divert for the purposes of the intended footbridge approaches and other works or any of them or other purposes of the intended Act.

4. To authorize the Council to deviate in the construction of the intended footbridge approaches and other works from the lines and levels delineated on the plans and sections to be deposited as hereinafter mentioned to such extent as will be defined on the said plans and sections or as may be authorized by the intended Act.

5. To enable the Council to dredge, scour and deepen the River Adur, and to execute, erect, construct, maintain and repair guiding and other piling, fenders, mooring posts and mooring stages, towpaths, staging and other works on the bed, foreshore and banks of the said river, and to alter and interfere with the banks, bed soil and foreshore of that river; to close against navigation during the progress of any such works or operations such parts of the waterway of the said river as may be necessary; to erect, provide and make charges for the use of waiting rooms, shelters, toll-houses, offices

and other buildings and works for the accommodation of passenger and other traffic; to appoint, remove and remunerate officers and servants; to make, alter, rescind, amend and enforce byelaws, rules and regulations for the management, regulation and use of the intended footbridge and the ferries hereinafter mentioned and other works and conveniences; for the prevention of nuisances, for preserving the property of the Council, for controlling the conduct of all persons who shall be employed in or about the bridge or ferries and for regulating and controlling the conveyance of passengers and goods, vessels and boats and for the preservation of order; and to impose penalties for the breach of any provisions of the intended Act or of the said byelaws and regulations.

6. To authorize the Council to establish a ferry or ferries across the river Adur between Shoreham-by-Sea and Shoreham Beach at such point or points as the Council may deem expedient; to purchase, hire, provide, maintain, use and work ferry boats and to construct and maintain landing stages, piers and other works and conveniences for the purposes of such ferries; to convey passengers, animals and goods on payment of the tolls, rates or charges to be authorized by the intended Act across the said river by means of such boats and works; and to sell, transfer, and grant licences to use the said rights of ferry and any lands, buildings, plant, machinery, vessels, boats, barges, works and conveniences belonging to the Council on such terms and conditions and for such consideration as the intended Act may prescribe.

7. To empower the Council to sell, assign, lease or otherwise dispose of the whole or any part of their ferry or bridge undertaking and to reserve any rent, fine or other consideration upon any such lease, assignment, sale or other disposition.

8. To empower the Council to take, levy and recover tolls, rates, charges and duties upon or in respect of the said ferries and the said intended footbridge and works, to regulate and control the payment and collection thereof; to provide penalties for any offence in connection with the payment or collection thereof; to empower the Council to erect toll gates, toll houses and weighing machines and to weigh any goods, articles or things intended to be conveyed over such ferry or footbridge; to confer, vary or extinguish exemptions from the payment of tolls, rates, charges and duties and to enable the Council to enter into compositions with respect to the payment of the said tolls, rates, charges and duties and to lease the same.

*Streets, Buildings, Sewers and Drains.*

9. To confer further powers on the Council in regard to streets, buildings, sewers and drains generally, and in particular to deal with and provide for the following matters (that is to say)—

To enable the Council to define and prescribe the future line of frontage of streets and roads and to confer compulsory and other powers of purchase upon the Council of any land lying between the street or road and the line of frontage so defined or prescribed; to require new streets to be constructed of additional width in certain cases and the setting back of new buildings in new streets; further provisions in regard to widening of new

streets by owners of property on either side; enabling the Council to agree with the owner of any land in any street to exchange part of the street for his land; regulating the construction and laying out of new streets in continuation of existing streets; the prohibition of the erection of new buildings until the situation and line of the new street in which they are to be built is defined; to regulate the fencing of forecourts, steps, and other projections in streets; to enable the Council to lay drains in private streets; to require means of escape from buildings (including shops in or in connection with which sleeping accommodation is provided) in case of fire; amendment of section 19 of the Public Health Acts (Amendment) Act 1890 so as to apply to houses belonging to the same owner; enabling the Council to make communications between private drains and the sewers of the Council; to require soil pipes to be ventilated; to provide that water-courses choked up shall be a nuisance under the Public Health Acts; to prevent the covering in of watercourses except in accordance with approved plans; to impose penalties for throwing rubbish into streams; to enable the Council to make bye-laws in regard to the materials with which new buildings shall be constructed, the construction of ovens and furnaces, the uniting of buildings, openings in party walls, fire-resisting doors, woodwork in external walls, the testing of drains of new buildings, and staircases and other matters in connection with new buildings; to regulate and control the erection of buildings of iron, steel, or reinforced concrete, and to enable the Council to make general regulations in regard thereto; to require sanitary and other conveniences for workmen employed on buildings; imposing penalties on occupiers refusing execution of Act; to make provision in regard to the area of habitable rooms; to impose penalties on the occupation of houses not provided with a proper water supply; empowering the Council for the purpose of main drainage to require the construction of enlarged sewers in new streets; enabling the Council to reconstruct any drains or sewers made in contravention of the Public Health Acts, or not being in proper condition and repair; imposing penalties on persons repairing drains without notice, or constructing or repairing waterclosets, drains or soil pipes in such manner as to create a nuisance, or wilfully damaging drains, waterclosets, earth-closets, privies or ashpits, or reconstructing drains except in accordance with the bye-laws of the Council; enabling the Council to repair private drains in certain cases; to extend section 49 of the Public Health Acts (Amendment) Act 1907, to buildings and tenements; empowering the Council to order houses to be drained by a combined operation, and to lay drains in private streets; and to regulate the discharge and trapping of pipes from slopstones, baths and basins.

*Infectious Disease and Sanitary Provisions.*

10. To make further and better provision for the prevention of disease in the district with respect amongst others to the following matters:—Empowering the Council to pay compensation to dairymen who at the request of the Council stop their milk supply for the purpose of reducing the spread of infectious

disease and to other persons who stop their employment on the like account; penalties for exposure or allowing exposure of persons suffering from infectious disease; information to be furnished to medical officer in cases of infectious disease; regulations for premises in which food is sold, or exposed, or deposited for sale or preparation for sale; further regulations for manufacture or sale of ice-cream and similar commodities, and for the destruction thereof in case of infectious disease, and for requiring dealers to have their names and addresses painted on their carts; to provide for the cleansing of milk vessels; to define the establishment of a new offensive trade and to empower the Council to deal with and remove offensive trades and to amend the Public Health Acts accordingly; and to enable the Council to require the owners or occupiers of any dwelling-house, warehouse, or shop to provide suitable dust-bins.

*Financial.*

11. To authorize the Council to borrow money for the construction of the intended footbridge and for the purposes of the bridge and ferry undertaking of the Council, and for all or any other of the purposes of the intended Act, and for such purposes to charge the district fund and general district rate and the undertakings, estates, rates, revenues and other properties of the Council or any of such securities, and to execute and grant and issue mortgages and other securities; to authorize the Council to apply any of their funds or other moneys authorized to be raised to any of the purposes of the intended Act; and to exempt the powers of borrowing moneys under the intended Act from the restrictions contained in section 234 of the Public Health Act, 1875.

12. To empower the Council to borrow money temporarily for defraying their current expenses by temporary loan or overdraft from any bank or on temporary loan on deposit receipt or otherwise, and also under the provisions of the Local Loans Act, 1875; to enable the Council to consolidate their existing loans; to use their sinking funds instead of borrowing; to amend rates in accordance with a new valuation list; and to grant gratuities to their officers and servants.

13. To make provision for the formation and maintenance of a sinking fund for the redemption of the loans raised by the Council; to enable them to use one form of mortgage for all purposes; to make provision for the Council to re-borrow moneys; to invest their sinking funds in statutory securities; and to provide for the proceeds of the sale of surplus lands and for the application of the revenue of the bridge and ferry undertaking.

*Miscellaneous.*

14. To empower the Council to provide fire alarms in the streets, and to prohibit street eries and noisy hawking.

15. To enact all necessary provisions for giving effect to the purposes of the intended Act or of the general or local Acts in force in the district, including power for the Council to enter premises and penalties for obstructing such entry or the execution of the provisions of the Bill; the imposition of penalties for breach of the provisions of the intended Act or any

bye-laws thereunder, or for failure to comply with the terms or conditions of any consent given by the Council under any Act or otherwise; consent of Council to be in writing; confirmation of bye-laws; evidence of appointments and resolutions, and authentication and service of notices, orders and other documents; exemption of Council from liability for negligence when executing works for owners of property and others, and imposition of such liability upon such owners and others; the recovery, apportionment and application of penalties and expenses; the declaration of expenses incurred by the Council to be private improvement expenses; the recovery of demands in the county court; the laying of informations, and the payment of penalties recovered on the prosecution of the Council or other officer on their behalf to the treasurer of the Council.

16. To alter, amend, extend, enlarge or repeal or re-enact with or without amendment all or some of the provisions of the Act. 56 Geo. III. ch. lxxxi., the New Shoreham Harbour Acts, 1873, 1876 and 1887, and any other Acts and Orders relating to or affecting the Shoreham Harbour Trustees, the Ferries and the Council, and any other Act relating to the Harbour of New Shoreham or the district of the Council.

17. To vary or extinguish all existing rights or privileges inconsistent with or which will or may in any manner impede or interfere with the objects or purposes of the intended Act, and to confer, vary or extinguish other rights and privileges.

18. To apply and incorporate with the intended Act with or without amendment all or

some of the provisions of the Lands Clauses Acts, the Railways Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845, the Arbitration Act, 1889, and any Acts amending or affecting the same or any of them.

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A Notice of Dissolution of Partnership not signed by all the Partners, or their legal representatives, must be accompanied by a Statutory Declaration made by a Solicitor of the Supreme Court to the effect that such notice is given in pursuance of the terms of the partnership to which it relates.

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
