SILVER BUILION (MAXIMUM PRICE).
ORDER OF THE TREASURY FIXING A MAXIMUM PRICE FOR SILVER BULLION SOLD IN THE UNITED KINGDOM.

The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by Regulation 30EEE of the Defence of the Realm Regulations, hereby make the following Order:—

As from the date of this Order the maximum price for silver bullion in the United Kingdom shall be such price as is equivalent at the current rate of exchange to 95 cents per standard ounce (925 fine).

The Order of the 20th February, 1919, fixing a maximum price of  $47\frac{3}{4}$ d. per standard ounce is hereby revoked.

BRITISH NATIONALITY AND STATUS OF ALIENS ACTS, 1914 and 1918.

In the Matter of Caroline Octavie Louise Henriette Hanemann.

Revocation of Certificate of Naturalization.

Whereas a Certificate of Naturalization was granted in the United Kingdom during the present War to Caroline Octavie Louise Henriette Hanemann, who at the date of the grant of the Certificate was the subject of a country which was then at war with His Majesty:

And whereas the question whether it is desirable that the Certificate should be revoked has been referred to the Certificates of Naturalization (Revocation) Committee constituted under Section 7 of the British Nationality and Status of Aliens Act, 1914, and whereas such question has been answered by the Committee in the affirmative:

Now, therefore, by this Order made in pursuance of sub-section (1) of Section 3 of the British Nationality and Status of Aliens Act, 1918, I revoke the said Certificate, and I direct such revocation to have effect from the date
