BY THE KING.
A PROCLAMATION
FOR A BANK HOLIDAY.

GEORGE R.I.

WE, considering that it is desirable that Saturday, the Nineteenth day of April instant, should be kept as a close holiday in all Banks throughout the United Kingdom, do hereby, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, and in pursuance of Section four of the Bank Holidays Act, 1871, appoint the said Saturday, the Nineteenth day of April instant, to be observed as a Bank Holiday throughout the United Kingdom, for the purposes of the said Act, and We do, by this Our Royal Proclamation, command the said day to be so observed, and all Our loving subjects to order themselves accordingly:

And whereas it is customary for the usual Bank Holidays to be kept as holidays by Our loving subjects generally, and not only for the purposes of the said Act, but it is not Our intention that the said Nineteenth day of April should be kept as a general holiday in the United Kingdom:

Now, therefore, We do hereby enjoin that the

said Nineteenth day of April shall not be kept as or deemed by virtue of this Our Royal Proclamation to be a holiday in the United Kingdom for any purposes whatsoever other than the purposes of the said Act.

Given at Our Court at *Buckingham Palace*, this Fifteenth day of *April*, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and nineteen, and in the Ninth year of Our Reign.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 28th day of March, 1919, in the words following, viz.:—

“Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and

Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being, or having been, an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas by Order in Council of the 7th day of March, 1887, as amended by Order in Council of the 27th day of November, 1896, it is provided that the Chaplain of the Fleet shall receive, on retirement, Retired Pay on the scale laid down for Chaplains, R.N., with an increase at the rate of £10 a year (in addition to any increase he would have obtained as Chaplain) for each year's service in his office, provided that the total amount of Retired Pay shall not exceed £500 a year:

"And whereas we consider that, in view of the important position held by this officer in the Naval Service, he should receive a higher rate of retired pay than that authorized by the Orders in Council before quoted:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to approve of the Chaplain of the Fleet being granted on retirement a minimum pension of £400 per annum, with an increase of £50 for each year's service as Chaplain of the Fleet, up to a maximum of £600 per annum.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council dated the 10th January, 1910, and known generally as the Civil Service (Consolidating) Order in Council, 1910, as amended by two Orders in Council dated the 22nd March, 1918, and 18th December, 1918, provision has been made for testing according to fixed rules the qualifications of persons who may seek or be proposed for appointment, either permanently or temporarily, to situations or employment in any of His Majesty's Civil Establishments, and for regulating the conduct of His Majesty's said Civil Establishments and the conditions of service therein:

And whereas it is expedient that the promotion of suitable officers should be facilitated:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

(1) In Clause 36 of the Consolidating Order

the words "exceptionally, after not less than eight years' service" shall be deleted and the Clause shall run:—

36. A Clerk shall not be promoted from the Second Division to any post carrying a maximum salary exceeding £500 a year, or leading in the ordinary course of promotion to posts of which the maximum salary exceeds £500 a year, without a special certificate from the Commissioners, to be granted upon a special recommendation from the Head of the Department, and with the approval of the Treasury; and every such promotion shall be published in the *London Gazette*, with a note of such recommendation, certificate, and approval, and shall have effect from the date of such publication.

(2) In Clause 45 of the Consolidating Order the words, "exceptionally, after not less than six years' established service (towards which not less than one year's and not more than two years' approved service as Registered Boy Clerk may be allowed to reckon)" and the words, "not being higher than that which he was receiving at the date of his said appointment" shall be deleted and the Clause shall run:—

45. An established Civil Servant of a rank below the Second Division may be appointed to that Division on the ground of special merit with a certificate from the Commissioners under Clause 7 of this Order.

But such certificate shall only be granted upon a recommendation from the Head of the Department and with the approval of the Treasury. Whenever such an appointment is made, the Treasury may allow the person appointed to enter the scale of the Division at such salary as they shall think fit, and he shall be entitled to the same amount of annual holiday as if his previous established service had been in the Second Division.

And whereas it is desirable to extend the said Regulations contained in the Order in Council of the 12th day of March, 1919, to the Isle of Man:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Regulations amending the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, issued by Order of His Majesty in Council, dated the 12th March, 1919, shall extend to the Isle of Man.

WHEREAS by section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that "whereas in some instances Tithings, Hamlets, Chapelries, and other Places or Dis-

tricts may be separated from the Parishes or Mother Churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and Places altogether extra-parochial may, in some instances, with advantage be annexed to Parishes or Districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted Separate Parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own Diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any Diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop, that any such Tithing, Hamlet, Chapelry, Place or District within the Diocese of such Archbishop, or the Diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any Parish or Mother Church, and either be constituted a Separate Benefice by itself or be united to any other Parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining Tithing, Hamlet, Chapelry, Place, or District, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a Separate Parish or Benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any Parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a Separate Parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop, or Bishop, shall draw up a Scheme in writing (the Scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Glebe Lands, Tithes, Rent Charges, and other Ecclesiastical Dues, Rates and Payments, and in respect to Patronage and Rights to Pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the Patron or Patrons of the Benefice or Benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such Scheme, or to such modification thereof, as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such Scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such Consent as aforesaid, by his Report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such Scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend Herbert, Lord Bishop of Hereford, hath made a Representation in writing, dated the 4th day of October, 1918, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"I, the Right Reverend Herbert, Lord Bishop of Hereford, do hereby represent to your Grace that there is in the City of Hereford, in my Diocese, the Parish of St. John Baptist, which is widely scattered:

"The Dean and Chapter of Hereford are the Patrons of the Living, and the Dean of Hereford is the present Incumbent. There is no Parsonage House, and no separate Parish Church, but there is a prescriptive right to hold services in some part of the Cathedral of Hereford, and for many years such services have been held in the Lady Chapel in the said Cathedral:

"It appears to me that, with advantage to the interests of religion, the larger portion of the said Parish and part of the parochial endowments should be divided between the adjoining Parishes as is more particularly de-

scribed in the Scheme annexed to this Representation:

"I, therefore, in pursuance of the provisions of the Act of Parliament 1 and 2 Victoria, Chapter 106, and of all other powers, have prepared a Scheme in writing, annexed to this Representation, describing the mode in which the necessary alterations authorized by the Act may best be effected, and I submit the same to your Grace, together with the Consents in writing of the Patrons and Incumbents of the several Benefices concerned, to the intent that Your Grace may, if on full consideration and enquiry you shall be satisfied with the said Scheme, certify the same and such consents aforesaid to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the Consents referred to in the said Representation are as follows:—

"SCHEME:

"1. It is proposed that of the part numbered 1 of the Parish of St. John Baptist, shown on the *Plan A* hereto annexed, and which is bounded by the Parishes of All Saints, Holmer, and St. Peter, there shall be transferred to the Parish of All Saints so much as lies South of College Road and to the Parish of Holmer so much as lies North of the same road:

"2. That the part numbered 2 on the said *Plan* and which is bounded by the Parishes of All Saints, Tupsley, and St. Peter, shall be transferred to the Parish of Tupsley;

That the parts numbered 4, 5, and 6 on the said *Plan*, and which are wholly within the Parish of St. Martin, shall be transferred to that Parish:

"3. That of the part numbered 7 on the said *Plan*, and which is bounded by the Parishes of St. Martin and Clehonger, there shall be transferred to the Parish of St. Martin so much as lies South of Newton Brook (which is the City Boundary) and to the Parish of Clehonger so much as lies North of the same Brook:

"4. That of the centre part of the said Parish of St. John Baptist, numbered 3 on the said *Plan*, of which a coloured *Plan* on the Ordnance Survey Map (Scale 25 inch) is also annexed hereto and marked B, that part coloured pink on the said *Plan B* shall be retained as the Parish of St. John Baptist, the boundaries whereof may be described as follows, namely:—

From a point on the River Wye at the South-West corner of the Palace Grounds, along the boundary of the Palace Grounds to Gwynne Street, thence along Gwynne Street, Palace Yard, Broad Street to the South-Western corner of the Mitre Hotel, thence along the Southern border of the Mitre Hotel and the Northern border of St. John's Schools to Church Street, thence at the back of the Cathedral Organist's house and the Canons' residences to St. John Street, thence along the middle of St. John Street to the corner of the Cathedral Close, thence along Harley Court, East Street, Ferrer Street, Castle Street, and to the end of Quay Street, thence along the boundary of the land belonging to the Custos and Vicars to the River Wye:

"5. That the remaining portions of the

said central part shown on the said *Plan B* shall be transferred as follows:—

(a) To *All Saints* so much as lies between Church Street and Broad Street, and as lies West of Broad Street and North of a line running westward from the South-East corner of the Green Dragon Hotel, and which portion is coloured Yellow on the said *Plan B*;

(b) To *St. Nicholas* so much as lies West and South of the retained part and of the part to be transferred to All Saints, and which portions are coloured Blue on the said *Plan B*;

(c) To *St. Peter's* the remaining part of the said central portion, and which is coloured Green on the said *Plan B*:

"6. That a part of the annual income of the said Parish of St. John Baptist and which part now consists of:—

"That the Right Reverend Herbert, Lord Bishop of Hereford, has represented unto Us (amongst other things)—

"That there is in the City of Hereford and his Diocese of Hereford the Parish of St. John Baptist, which is widely scattered:

"That there are also in his said Diocese several other Parishes, viz.:—the Parishes of St. Peter, All Saints, St. Nicholas, St. Martin, Tupsley, Holmer, and Clehonger, all of which adjoin the said Parish of St. John Baptist:

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that under the provisions of the Pluralities Act, 1838, the larger portion of the said Parish of St. John Baptist may be separated therefrom (together with part of the parochial endowments) and parts thereof annexed to the said several Parishes of All Saints, Holmer, Tupsley, St. Martin, Clehonger, St. Nicholas

and St. Peter's in the manner more particularly described in the Scheme hereinafter mentioned.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the said Act of Parliament the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a Scheme in writing, annexed to his Representation, describing the several parts of the said Parish of St. John Baptist so as aforesaid proposed to be separated therefrom and annexed respectively to the several contiguous Parishes hereinbefore named and the mode in which it appears to him that the proposed alterations may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alterations in respect to Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Glebe Lands, Tithe Rent Charges, and other Ecclesiastical Dues, Rates, and Payments, and in respect to Patronage and Rights to Pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested, which Scheme, together with the Consents thereto in writing of the respective Patrons and Incumbents of all the said several Benefices or Parishes affected, has been transmitted to Us by the said Lord Bishop for our consideration:

"The said several portions of St. John Baptist, Hereford, so as aforesaid proposed to be separated therefrom and annexed respectively to the several contiguous Parishes hereinbefore named are separately and fully described with the several boundaries thereof in the said Scheme of the said Lord Bishop, and are dis-

tinguished by reference to numbers and colours in the said Scheme and also by similar letters and colours in the two *Maps* or *Plans* marked A and B, annexed to the said Scheme of the said Lord Bishop:

"The Representation and Scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the Consents above referred to are hereunto annexed:

"And we, the said Archbishop, being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said Scheme, do hereby, pursuant to the said Pluralities Act, 1838, certify the same, and such Consents as aforesaid, to Your Majesty in Council, to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may, in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do, make and issue an Order for carrying the said Scheme into effect.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 33rd and 34th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 39, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 113, the Act of the 4th and 5th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 39, and the Act of the 31st and 32nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 114, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 6th day of March, 1919, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 33rd and 34th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 39, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 113, the Act of the 4th and 5th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 39, and the Act of the 31st and 32nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 114, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the Church and Cure (hereinafter called 'the said Benefice') of Howell, in the County of Lincoln and in the Diocese of Lincoln:

"Whereas the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Howell is vested for an estate in fee simple in possession free from incumbrances in Arthur Vessey Machin, of Number 49, Esplanade Road, Scarborough, Esquire, Delia Vessey Machin, of Number 37, Avenue Victoria, Scarborough, Spinster, George Vessey Machin, of The Haven, Worksop, Esquire, and Edward Vessey Machin, a Captain in Your Majesty's Army, as tenants in common:

"And whereas the said Arthur Vessey Machin, Delia Vessey Machin, George Vessey

Machin, and Edward Vessey Machin are desirous that the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Howell, now vested in them as aforesaid, should be transferred to and be vested in the Right Reverend Edward Lee, now Bishop of Lincoln, and his Successors in the same Bishopric:

"And whereas the said Edward Lee, Bishop of Lincoln, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness, and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the Diocese, which, by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited, or by some or one of them, is made necessary, he, the said Edward Lee, Bishop of Lincoln, has executed this Scheme as hereinafter mentioned:

"And whereas the transfer of the Patronage of the said Benefice of Howell, which is hereinbefore mentioned, and hereinafter recommended and proposed, will, in our opinion, tend to make better provision for the Cure of Souls in the Parish or District in or in respect of which the right of Patronage or Advowson, so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid, arises or exists, that is to say, in the Parish of Howell:

DEFENCE OF THE REALM.

THE PITWOOD ORDER, 1919, DATED 10TH APRIL, 1919, MADE BY THE BOARD OF TRADE UNDER REGULATIONS 2F AND 2JJ OF THE DEFENCE OF THE REALM REGULATIONS.

The Board of Trade, deeming it expedient to make further exercise of the powers conferred upon them by Regulations 2F and 2JJ of the Defence of the Realm Regulations, hereby order as follows:—

1. For the purposes of this Order Great Britain shall be divided into areas called Pitwood areas of supply as defined in the first Schedule hereto.

The expression "Pitwood" means pit props, sawn props and timber in the round which is intended for use in mines.

2. From the 30th day of April, 1919, no person shall deliver, move or consign or cause or permit to be delivered, moved or consigned, pitwood from Area of Supply No. 1 described in the first Schedule hereto to any other area of supply, unless such pitwood is consigned direct to a colliery or mine.

3. From the 30th day of April, 1919, no person shall buy or sell or offer to buy or sell pitwood (whether in selected sizes or otherwise) at prices exceeding those set forth in the Second Schedule hereto, provided that the Controller of Coal Mines by notice under his hand may from time to time alter such prices and the prices as altered shall thereafter be the maximum prices at which pitwood may be bought or sold.

4. From the 30th day of April, 1919, no person shall deliver, move or consign or cause or permit to be delivered, moved or consigned pitwood from Pitwood Area of Supply No. 1 to another area except under and in accordance with the terms of a permit granted by the Controller of Coal Mines or by a person duly authorised on his behalf.

5. Home Grown Pitwood shall be sold, invoiced and consigned, separate and apart from imported pitwood.

6. Where pitwood is sold by weight in any area of supply other than No. 1 the price shall not exceed the equivalent price per 100 lineal feet based on the prices set forth in the Second Schedule hereto.

7. Infringements of this Order are summary offences against the Defence of the Realm Regulations.

8. As from the 30th day of April, 1919, the Pitwood Order, 1918, is hereby revoked without prejudice to any Act or matter done or suffered or to any proceeding or prosecution instituted thereunder.

9. This Order may be cited as the Pitwood Order, 1919.

CORN PRODUCTION ACT, 1917.

AGRICULTURAL WAGES BOARD
(ENGLAND AND WALES).FURTHER VARIATION OF THE DETERMINATION
OF THE VALUE OF A COTTAGE AS A "BENEFIT
OR ADVANTAGE" IN SOMERSET.

The determination, dated the 19th December, 1918, as amended by the variation dated the 13th March, 1919, applicable to the administrative county of Somerset and the County Borough of Bath, of the value at which the provision by an employer for a workman employed by him of a cottage may be reckoned as part payment of wages in lieu of payment in cash for the purpose of any minimum rates of wages fixed under the above Act, has been further amended as from the 10th April, 1919, so as to provide that such value shall be as follows:—

I. NEWHAVEN AND APPROACH—AREA WITHIN WHICH ANCHORING AND TRAWLING IS PROHIBITED.

All vessels are prohibited from anchoring or trawling, or any other forms of bottom fishing with nets, in an area formed by lines joining the following positions:—

(a) Birling gap.

II. SPITHEAD APPROACH—TRAFFIC REGULATIONS; AND REGULATIONS REGARDING TRADING, FISHING AND PLEASURE CRAFT.

I. TRAFFIC REGULATIONS.

1. Passage of vessels between Noman's fort and the charted position of Warner light-vessel is permitted during the hours of official daylight, but they are not to use this passage during official night or in thick weather.

2. Vessels of all descriptions are prohibited from anchoring in St. Helen's roads to the westward of a line drawn in a 162° (*S. 3° E. Mag.*) direction from Noman's fort.

3. No vessel or boat of any description is to anchor or trawl within 100 yards either side of a line drawn from southern corner of Stokes bay pier head, in a 177° (*S. 12° W. Mag.*) direction for a distance of 440 yards.

4. No vessel is to anchor or trawl within 100 yards of a line drawn from the north-eastern corner of the prohibited area off Gilkicker point, mentioned in Part (2) of Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 770 of 1919, in a 7° (*N. 22° E. Mag.*) direction to the shore.

5. No vessel or boat of any description is to anchor kedge within 100 yards either side of a line joining the two buoys situated respectively 600 yards, 259° (*N. 86° W. Mag.*), and 600 yards, 246° (*S. 81° W. Mag.*), from the centre of St. Helen's fort.

Note.—On and after 15th April, 1919, pilot cutters will be cruising both on the eastern and western stations of the Isle of Wight district, and vessels coming from the westward may now enter the Needles channel.

II. REGULATIONS REGARDING TRADING, FISHING AND PLEASURE CRAFT.

1. Fishing vessels are required to follow the Admiralty Orders for British Fishing vessels dated 7th January, 1919, and any subsequent Orders.

Mag.*), from Whitenose to the southward.

4. Fishing (including the use of trawls) may be carried out in the area enclosed by a straight line drawn from a point 5 miles, 180° (*S. 15° W. Any person aiding or abetting the commission of such an offence is himself guilty of an offence against the Regulations.

Attention is also drawn to the fact that any infringement of the directions contained in this Admiralty Notice to Mariners is liable to result in the detention of the ship or vessel.
