MONMOUTHSHIRE AND DISTRICT (CONTROL OF DOGS) ORDER OF 1919 (No. 6).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, the Dogs Act, 1906, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Extension of Scheduled District No. 1.

1. The Monmouthshire and District (Control of Dogs) Order of 1919 (No. 5) shall be read and have effect as if the Area described in

the Schedule hereto were included in, and formed part of, the Scheduled District No. 1 described in the First Schedule to that Order.

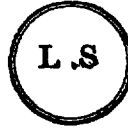
Commencement.

2. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-first day of April, nineteen hundred and nineteen: Provided that until the twenty-fourth day of that month a dog in or on any public place in the Area described in the Schedule hereto need not be muzzled if it is led by a person with a collar and chain or other attachment.

Short Title.

3. This Order may be cited as the Monmouthshire and District (Control of Dogs) Order of 1919 (No. 6), and shall be read with the Order referred to in Article 1.
