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Constantinople, October 26.

THE Grand Signior has ended the Campaign in Hungary much sooner than was expected, and is now on his way higher from Adrianople, where he arrived the 17th of this Month: He intends to make a Publick Entry into this City, by way of Triumph for his late Victory over General Veterani, in Hungary: But they who are truly informed of that Action think there is but little Occasion for it; for they say the Turks, though their whole Army had only a Body of 7 or 8000 Men to deal with, were several times repulsed, and suffered so great a Loss of Men, that they did not think fit to pursue their March towards Transilvania, as was resolv'd on, but returned in haste towards the Danube, to avoid a new Engagement with the German Forces under the Command of the Elector of Saxony. They talk here of making great Preparations for the next Campaign; and to that end, strict Orders have been sent to the Bassa's of the several Provinces to raise all the Men they can during the Winter, and to send them to the Army in the Spring. At the same time they are building several Ships to re-inforce their Fleet, which is returned hither from the Archipelago. Count Tockley and his Wife are come to this place: He has an Allowance from the Turks for his Subsistence, though he seems to be in no great Esteem with them. The French Ambassador is returned from Adrianople, and still feeds the Turks with Promises of giving the Emperor's Forces a great Diversion in Germany; But he has made the like so often, and we have seen so little Effect of them, that they are the less regarded now. 'Tis said here that the Moscovites have had several great Repulses in the Siege of Asif, in which they have been engaged ever since the beginning of the last Summer.

Rome, Novemb. 27. On Saturday last arrived hither the Count de Martinitz, Ambassador from the Emperor; and the next day he went to Prescati, where he will stay, till things are put in order for his Publick Entry. The Design of making Civita Vecchia a free Port is continued; and Cardinal Negroni, who does very zealously employ himself for that purpose, has lent 15000 Crowns to carry on the New Buildings; and others are called upon to do the like. The Pope has declared he will hold but one Confistory more before Christmas, when every body

expects a Promotion of Cardinals, there being at present 14 Vacancies.

Milan, Novemb. 26. Our Governor the Marquis de Leganes has, since his Return from Piedmont, given out Orders for recruiting the Spanish Forces, and making the other necessary Preparations for the next Campaign; and has sent an Express to the Viceroy of Naples, to hasten the new Levies he is to make for the Service of this Dutchy. The City of Geneva has been alarm'd of late by the Proceedings of the French Minister there, which looked as if he was seeking an Occasion of a Breach with them: But whatever Design the Court of France may have of this kind, they have their hands too full at present, to put it in Execution.

Genova, Novemb. 27. The Squadron of Spanish Galleys commanded by the Duke of Turiss, is now in this Port, and will probably continue here some time. By a Vessel arrived from the Levant we have an Account, that several French Merchant-ships had lain at Smirna above six Months, for want of Convoy, being bound to Marseilles; but we hear that at last 4 French Men of War are sailed from Thoulon, to fetch them home. There are several French Privateers in these Seas.

Vienna, Decemb. 3. Several Officers are come hither from Hungary, having left their Regiments in their Winter-Quarters: They come to raise Recruits, which they are to have compleat by the Beginning of March. The Imperialists go on with the Re-fortifying of Titul; the Turks, who have failed in one or two Attempts they made to hinder the same, seeming to have no Intention of giving them any farther Disturbance therein: However, Lieutenant-General Count de Staremberg continues on those Frontiers, to watch the Enemy's Motions, who have numerous Garrisons at Belgrade, Temeswaer, and other Places on the Danube and the Sate. The last Letters from Transilvania say, all things are quiet on that side; and the Apprehensions some had, that the Tartars, in their Return home from the Ottoman Army, would make an Inroad into that Country, are now over. The Elector of Saxony intends to return the next week to Dresden, and to be here again soon after Christmas. The Portugall Ambassador will have his Publick Audience in few days. The last Letters from Warsaw tell us, that the King of Poland had appointed a Meeting of the Senators and other Great Men of that Kingdom, to consult with them about calling another Dyet, and what is fit to be done
