General Order.

THE PUBLIC HEALTH (CEREBRO-SPINAL FEVER) REGULATIONS, 1919.

To the Council of every County and of every County Borough in England and Wales;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

Whereas by virtue of the provisions of Section 130 of the Public Health Act, 1875, of Section 2 of the Public Health (Prevention and Treatment of Disease) Act, 1913, and of other enactments in that behalf, We, the Local Government Board, are empowered to make Regulations with a view to the treatment of persons suffering from the infectious disease known as cerebro-spinal fever, and for preventing the spread of the disease, and to declare the authorities by whom the Regulations shall be executed and enforced;

And whereas by the Public Health (Cerebro-Spinal Fever) Regulations, 1918, We made certain provisions with respect to the treatment of cases or suspected cases of cerebro-spinal fever, and for the examination of persons suspected to be suffering from the disease;

Now, therefore, in the exercise of the powers conferred on Us by the Public Health Act, 1875, the Public Health (London) Act, 1891, the Public Health Act, 1896, and the Public Health (Prevention and Treatment of Disease) Act, 1913, and of every other power enabling Us in that behalf, We hereby rescind the Public Health (Cerebro-Spinal Fever) Regulations, 1918, and do make the following Regulations, and also Declare and Direct as follows:—

ARTICLE I.—The Council of any Administrative County and of any County Borough may provide or arrange—

(1) for the examination and treatment of any person who for the time being is in the County or Borough as the case may be and is either suspected to be suffering from cerebro-spinal fever, or has been in contact with a person suffering or suspected to be suffering from the disease; and

(2) for the provision of serum and vaccine for the treatment of cases or suspected cases of the disease, together with the necessary apparatus for the use of the serum or vaccine.

ARTICLE II.—The expenses incurred under these Regulations, and any expenses incurred before the date hereof under the Regulations hereby rescinded, shall in the case of a County Council be defrayed as expenses for general county purposes, and in the case of a County Borough Council as part of the expenses incurred by the Council in the execution of the Public Health Acts.

ARTICLE III.—These Regulations shall come into operation on the date of this Order, and shall then and thereafter apply and have effect throughout England and Wales.

ARTICLE IV.—These Regulations may be cited as "The Public Health (Cerebro-Spinal Fever) Regulations, 1919."

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 17TH JUNE 1919.)

CORNWALL AND DEVON (CONTROL OF DOGS) ORDER OF 1919 (No. 4).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Prohibition of Movement of Dogs out of certain Area.

I. No dog shall be moved out of the Area described in the Schedule hereto unless it is accompanied by a licence of the Board authorising such movement, signed by an Officer of the Board, and any such licence may be subject to such conditions as to the detention and isolation of the dog or otherwise as the Board may think necessary or desirable, and shall be specified in the licence; Provided that this Article shall not apply to (a) the movement of a dog under a licence granted by the Board under the Importation of Dogs Order of 1914, or any Order amending it, to a port in Great Britain for shipment, or to a place of detention for the purpose of detention and isolation; or (b) the movement of a dog through such area by railway from a place outside the area to another place outside the area without unnecessary delay and without being rebooked within the area.

Control of Dogs in certain Area.

2. (1) A dog in the Area described in the Schedule hereto shall at all times—

(a) whilst in or on any public place be efficiently muzzled with an effective wire cage muzzle;

(b) whilst in or on any other place, be kept under control by being—

(i) confined in a kennel or other enclosure from which the dog cannot escape; or

(ii) secured to some premises by a collar and chain; or
