His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the following immediate awards for conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in North Russia, conferred by Maj.-Gen C. C. M. Maynard, C.B., C.M.G., D.S.O., in pursuance of the powers vested in him by His Majesty:—

**AWARDED THE DISTINGUISHED  
SERVICE ORDER.**

**CANADIAN FORCE.**

Maj. Peter Anderson, Alberta R., attd. Malamute Coy.

Knowing that the enemy were preparing another attack from Ouroszero, he rapidly replaced a bridge without their knowledge, and attacked them early on 11th April, 1919, with an armoured train, killing and capturing a number, together with two field guns and one machine gun. He showed marked gallantry and initiative throughout.

**AWARDED A BAR TO THE MILITARY  
CROSS.**

Capt. Frederick George Flood, M.C., M.B., R.A.M.C., Spec. Res.

During operations at Vigozero and Petrovski Yam on 18th March, 1919, he dressed wounded under heavy machine gun and rifle fire, and under most trying conditions saved many lives. After the action he successfully evacuated all the wounded over 60 versts of most difficult country without losing a case. He showed great gallantry and marked ability and devotion to duty.

**AWARDED THE MILITARY CROSS.**

**CANADIAN FORCE.**

Lt. (A./Capt.) Robert Melrose Hood, 1st Cent. Ont. R., attd. Malamute Coy.

He was in charge of the armoured train in the taking of Ouroszero, 11th April, 1919. When the train neared the station he ran ahead and shot three enemy with his revolver, one of whom was putting a shell in

a field gun to fire at the train. His great gallantry and promptitude prevented this field gun damaging the train.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the following immediate awards for conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in North Russia, conferred by Maj.-Gen. W. E. Ironside, C.M.G., D.S.O., in pursuance of the powers vested in him by His Majesty:—

**AWARDED THE DISTINGUISHED SERVICE ORDER.**

Capt. (A./Maj.) Oliver Guy Body, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and ability in action. During the operations near Kodish, on 7th February, 1919, he displayed great coolness and courage. The situation having demanded that his guns should be advanced, he personally went forward under heavy machine-gun and rifle fire to reconnoitre, after which he enabled the infantry to withdraw under cover of barrage fire. His work with this force has at all times been excellent

Lt.-Col. John William Vincent Carroll, C.M.G., Norf. R.

He commanded the Russian forces at Morjegerskaia during the heavy enemy attacks on 14th and 17th March, 1919. It was due to his fine leadership and personal gallantry that the young Russian troops stood firm and turned a critical situation into a decisive success. His energy and coolness were beyond praise.

T./Capt. (T./Maj.) Archie Douglas Henderson, Norf. R.

He commanded at Vistafka during enemy attacks, 28th February to 4th March, 1919. Regardless of personal danger, he was the chief source of strength to the garrison, and by his untiring work and devotion to duty held Vistafka for the column, and thus saved the column from a forced withdrawal.

Lt. (T./Capt.) Algey Palmer, 6th Bn., North'd Fus., T.F.

He showed great courage and ability during the attacks on Vistafka, 28th February-4th March, 1919. During very heavy shelling and machine-gun fire he stood on the roof of a house observing our artillery fire, and by his accurate and prompt reports rendered invaluable services. His whole work during a month's unrelieved service in the front line has been very fine.

Capt. (T./Maj.) Henry Neville Grylls Watson, R.A.S.C.

For conspicuous ability and coolness during the operations against Zemstova, 24th-29th March, 1919. He was responsible for the organization of all transport operating over a very large area during the operations 20th February to 4th April, Pinega Area. He personally took charge of the transport column in the most forward area, and it was owing to him that its withdrawal under fire was uniformly successful.

**AWARDED A BAR TO THE MILITARY CROSS.**

T./Lt. Edward Charles Bradfield, M.C., 280th Coy., M.G. Corps.

On 5th May, 1919, the enemy bombarded Mala-Beresnik for fifteen hours. During that time he personally repaired his guns under fire, and through his cool example and total disregard for personal danger was able to bring heavy machine-gun fire to bear on the enemy when the barrage lifted, preventing them from advancing from the edge of the wood. He has previously done good work.

**AWARDED THE MILITARY CROSS.**

T./2nd Lt. Walter George Butteriss, Leic. R., attd. 13th Bn., Yorks. R.

On 23rd March, 1919, he led his platoon as advanced guard commander with energy and decision. When less experienced troops were temporarily thrown into confusion under heavy fire he continued to advance his platoon and forced the enemy to quit their position. He then by his example and leadership gave the greatest help in restoring the situation until it was possible to continue the advance. He showed great gallantry and devotion to duty.

T./Lt. (T./Capt.) William James George Child, 1st Bn., N. Staffs. R.

At Rialka, on 15th March, 1919, he, with a small party of Cossack Platoon, attacked and captured two Bolshevik machine-guns, killing and driving off the teams, which were just coming into action against the party under Capt. Deighton, who were recapturing the village of Lytchino. His fine action, skill and courage greatly assisted the attack, and set a high example to the Russian troops.

2nd Lt. (T./Capt.) George Frederick Harold Deighton, 3rd Bn., York and Lanc. R.

At Rialka, on 15th March, 1919, the Bolsheviks attacked and held the village of Lytchino. He collected a small party of about twenty men, attacked and retook Lytchino, with five prisoners and two machine guns. His coolness, courage and prompt action were of great assistance in repulsing the attack, and in setting a high example to the Russian troops.

T./2nd Lt. Robert Norman Dodds, D.C.M., M.M., R.E.

During the attacks on Bolshee-Ozerki on 23rd March and 2nd April, 1919, he worked unceasingly under heavy fire from the enemy, and, after having established signal communication, continued, at great personal risk, to keep in touch with the different attacking parties. It was his disregard for danger and splendid spirit that inspired his men to keep up communication at all risks when exposed to great danger.

T./2nd Lt. Samuel George Dudley, 17th Bn., L'pool R.

When the enemy attacked Mala-Beresnik on 1st May, 1919, he was sent out to take charge of an advanced post of considerable importance. He handled the garrison of this post, consisting of one N.C.O. and eight

men, with great skill, and set a fine example of cool courage. He took his detachment out of the post and engaged the enemy from his right rear, thus holding up the main enemy attack.

Lt. John Dudley Stanhope Holroyd-Sergeant, Yorks. R., attd. 13th Bn.

On the early morning of the 3rd April, 1919, he took up reinforcements to help the party in the blockhouse at the 4½ verst on Alexandrovo Road. Whilst his men were still in the sledges, he met the party from the blockhouse retiring on Sred Mekrenga. At the same moment he was fired on from both flanks. Owing to his great coolness and fine example set by him, the whole party was extricated with only the loss of one sledge. Later, when in charge of a blockhouse, he was strongly attacked by the enemy, but repulsed them with heavy casualties, leaving over 100 prisoners in our hands, with four machine guns.

T./2nd Lt. Charles Frederick Jameson, 13th Bn., Yorks. R.

During the enemy's attempted attack on Sred Mekrenga on 17th March, 1919, he showed a splendid example to the men. When the cavalry patrol fell back too rapidly, he rallied the British infantry patrol and set them the necessary example with great coolness under heavy rifle fire.

2nd Lt. Charles Norman Marshall, 6th Bn., Yorks. R.

He showed great gallantry and disregard of danger in the action on 2nd April, 1919, west of Bolshee-Ozerki. When all his company Lewis guns were out of action he went back 300 yards under heavy machine-gun fire and brought up two more guns.

Lt. Bernhard William John Hankins Martin, D.S.O., R.F.A., Spec. Res.

At Vistafka, during the enemy attacks 28th February to 4th March, 1919, he handled his gun with the greatest coolness and efficiency, relaxing no effort. His fine spirit communicated itself to those under his command.

T./Capt. Maurice George Trant McCall, 13th Bn., Yorks. R.

During the attack by the enemy on Sred Mekrenga on 17th March, 1919, he was commanding the party covering our front line. Although both his flanks were turned by the enemy, he continued to put up such a stubborn defence that the enemy withdrew. He did fine work.

T./Lt. Ashton Christopher Mills, 6th Bn., Yorks. R.

For marked gallantry and devotion to duty. He, with his two platoons, held up the enemy east of Bailey's track, west of Bolshee-Ozerki, on 2nd April, 1919, for five hours under heavy machine gun fire, and repeated attempts of the enemy to turn his right flank. His gallant work and tenacity were the means of his company not being cut off.

Lt. (T./Capt.) Godfrey Fuller Whistler, R.F.A.

At Tulgas, on 25th April, 1919, a mutiny occurred among the Russian troops. His prompt action in shooting a mutineer saved the lives of two other officers. He subsequently took charge and carried out the retirement of the guns from Tulgas with great ability. His courage and devotion to duty had the effect of keeping the Russian artillery personnel loyal.

T./2nd Lt. Leslie Milne Worgan, 17th Bn., L'pool R.

He held, with his platoon of twenty men, a forward post during the enemy attack on Mala-Beresnik on 1st May, 1919. By the coolness and judgment with which he controlled the fire of his own unit and his fine example of courage a determined attack by some 200 Bolshevik infantry, covered by heavy machine-gun and rifle fire, was beaten off, with a loss to the enemy of forty killed and twenty-one prisoners.

T./2nd Lt. Arthur Charles Morrall, Leicester. R., attd. 13th Bn., Yorks. R.

At Sred Mekrenga, 3rd April, 1919: When in charge of an advanced position on the Alexandrovo Road, with fifteen other ranks and two Lewis guns, he held up a force of enemy, about 500, with six machine guns, for three and a half hours. Several times this small party was practically surrounded. It was only due to his personal gallantry and total disregard of danger that all his men were withdrawn safely. After evacuating the forward positions he fought a steady rearguard action for four versts back to Sred Mekrenga.

T./Lt. George Richardson, 6th Bn., Yorks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry during the attack on Zemstovo on 25th March, 1919. When the flank attack on the village had been held up by heavy machine gun fire, he led forward his platoon through deep snow and under rifle fire, and endeavoured to rush the village. When compelled to withdraw, he extricated his platoon very skilfully without further loss, and evacuated all his wounded.

2nd Lt. (T./Capt.) William Carl Trorey Roeber, 15th Bn., Lond. R.

When Adjutant of this force during the whole attack, without any rest, he was working unceasingly and untiringly, and it was through him that the close co-operation between the infantry and artillery was maintained so well.

#### CANADIAN FORCE.

Lt. Walter Selkirk Newton, Can.Fld. Arty.

During enemy attacks on Vistafka, 28th February, 1919, to 4th March, 1919, he displayed great ability and coolness. His observation work under heavy shell fire was invaluable and enabled our guns to do most effective work. He worked for nearly five days with next to no rest, and set a fine example to his men.

## AWARDED THE DISTINGUISHED CONDUCT MEDAL.

374008 B./S./M. C. F. Grayson, "C" Mtn. By., R.G.A. (Lewes).

For great gallantry in action at Tarasevo on the 29th January, 1919. When the enemy had broken through our lines, and had opened fire with rifles and machine guns from within 200 yards, he took a leading part in the withdrawal of the second gun from its exposed position. The gun horse had bolted into the enemy lines, and it was necessary to improvise harness at the last moment, and it was due to the coolness and example shown by this Warrant Officer that this was possible. Throughout the whole action he did splendid work.

201421 Sjt. E. Harrison, 6th Bn., York. R. (Thornaby-on-Tees).

For gallantry and able leadership during the attack on Zemstovo on 25th March, 1919. When the attacking platoon was held up by deep snow and heavy machine-gun fire, he led his platoon forward with great skill to support the attack. He took up a position close to the village and succeeded in covering the withdrawal of the attacking platoon and the evacuation of the wounded, and finally extricated his platoon from a difficult position without casualties. The determination and resourcefulness displayed by him were admirable.

63953 Pte. P. Hughes, 13th Bn., York. 3. (Egremont).

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty on two occasions. On the night of the 31st March-1st April, 1919, he engaged the enemy with his Lewis gun. The enemy was attacking with two machine guns. By his action the patrol was enabled to withdraw safely to the blockhouse. On the 3rd April, when sent forward with a patrol to ascertain the whereabouts of the enemy, he got his Lewis gun into action and saved the party from being cut off. He also showed great gallantry while covering the subsequent withdrawal to the blockhouse.

65761 Sjt. E. McLaughlin, 13th Bn., York. R. (Callaby).

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. At Sred Mekrenga on the 17th March, 1919, he set a fine example to his men. When the situation was obscure, he carried out a reconnaissance of the enemy's dispositions under heavy rifle and machine-gun fire, and obtained very valuable information. He was always the first man into action, and the last man out.

66005 Sjt. A. O. L. Parsons, 2/10th Bn., R. Scots, attd. R.E. Signals (Harrow).

He showed conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during the enemy attack on Mala-Beresnik on 1st May, 1919. He repeatedly repaired wires under heavy fire, working for twenty-three hours without rest of any kind. On 5th May, under intense bombardment, he on three occasions went out into the open to repair the line to the forward outpost position, thus enabling the artillery to get observation. He behaved splendidly.

13021 C./S./M. W. Rutter, 6th Bn., York. R. (South Hetton).

During the attack on Zemstovo on 25th March, 1919, and the subsequent operations, he displayed marked gallantry and determination. When the flank on the village was held up by machine-gun fire, he forced his way through deep snow and heavy rifle-fire to the outskirts of the village, acting as guide to one platoon of his company, which endeavoured to carry the village by a frontal attack. When this platoon was held up by very heavy machine-gun fire and deep snow, and ordered to withdraw, he supervised the evacuation of all the wounded. He set a fine example to all.

66242 Pte. A. Turton, M.M., 2/10th Bn., R. Scots (Sutton Bridge).

On 20th September, 1918, when the column commander wanted to regain touch with headquarters, and called for volunteers to row a boat some five miles through the shelled area and minefields, Lance-Corporal Turton immediately volunteered, and was given the despatch, and was also told to note the positions of the mines. In spite of shelling from river craft he steered his boat cleverly through the mines and delivered the despatch and a report on the position of the mines. His cool courage and ability were of very great service.

83709 C./S./M. A. G. S. Vincent, 252nd Coy., M.G. Corps (Colchester).

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He volunteered and went on some exceedingly dangerous patrols, bringing back valuable information. All through the attack he set an excellent example to the men.

## CANADIAN FORCE.

85697 Bdr. C. H. Colwell, Can. Fd. Arty.

For conspicuous gallantry and determination. He, with three other men at Kur-gomen on 27th October, 1918, volunteered to go out with the infantry in the attack on Topsis; and in case of success to man any guns. His party, with four marine artillerymen, when the infantry attack failed and some disorder ensued, refused to retire until ordered, although practically surrounded, and eventually fought his way out, bringing his party back complete.

41013 B./S./M. T. Tomkinson, Can. Fd. Arty.

At Kodema, on 15th December, 1918, all the serjeants of the battery being in charge of other guns on other fronts, he acted as No. 1 of the gun employed in this operation with great success and marked courage at a range of 800 yards under heavy rifle and machine-gun fire.

43800 Sjt. C. D. Winegard, Can. Fd. Arty.

For conspicuous gallantry and good work. On 1st March, 1919, at Vistafka, heavy enemy shell fire caused an outbreak of fire in the billets, stables and ammunition dump. He mustered the drivers and spare gunners and saved all the horses and a considerable quantity of ammunition. On 3rd March, at Vistafka, when the enemy had surrounded the

position, he with two others formed a patrol, and, crawling to within fifty yards of the enemy outpost, with machine-gun fire forced them to withdraw. This achievement was the result of securing very valuable information.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the award of the Military Medal to the undermentioned lady for distinguished services in the field:—

Miss S. A. Valentine, V.A.D.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty on the 10th and 14th October, 1918, tending wounded under heavy fire on ship and shore while attached to the hospital river steamer "Vologjanin." On several occasions her conduct under fire had a marked effect on the morale of jaded troops.
