Genoua, Decemb. 24. N. S..

French ate fitting out their Ships at Theulon, that most of them are careen'd, and that Sca-men are coming thither from their Ports on the Ocean. The four French Men of War that were lately at Tunn are returned to Thoulon. On the 22th came into our Road a French Man of War of 40 Guns from Legisorne, who sailed the same Evening to the Westward.

Milan, Decemb. 28. Our Governor the Marquis de Leganez intends thortly to take a Review of the Forces of this State at the places where they are quartered. The Officers are called upon to haften their Recruits; and Orders are given to prepare the Train of Artillery for the Service of the next Campaign. The Fortifications of Cazal, as well those of the Cittadel, as the Town and Castle are quite demolished.

Venice, Decer 130. The Captain-General has fent the Senate an Account of the State of the Fleet and Army, and presses them to dispatch the Supplie of Ships, Men and Provisions designed for the next Years Service, that he may be in a Condition to make some Attempt upon the Energy early in the Year: And upon this Representation it has been resolved to use all possible diligence, as well to compleat the Levies, as to fit out the new Men of War and Galleys; and they are likewise preparing a great Convoy, which may be ready to fail the next Month, with Provisions and Stores, and such new-raised Men as shall come hither by that time. The Iast Letters from Dalmacia lay, all is quiet on that fide, the Enemy's Garifons being fo drained by the Detachments fent from thence to Hungary, that they are not in a Condition to draw out any Troops into the Field; which is the reason they have at present wholly laid aside the Thoughts of attacking Titul, though it be a place they very much defire to re-gain, because, being in the hands of the Imperialits, it does greatly annoy them. We are told from Turkey, by the way of Ragusa, that though the Sultan. was returned to Conference, the Grand Vifier remained on the Front ers towards Hunga-2v, to give Orders about difpoling the Troops the Enemy. 10 10

in their Winter Quarters, and to hasten the Preparations for the next Summer; and that he had dispatched Chiautes to all the Provinces of the Ottoman Empire to raise Men. The Ambailadors of this State to the King of England will certainly set out before the end of the next Month, with a great and noble Attendance.

Vienna, Decemb. 31. The States of the Lower Austria are to meet here the 9th of this Month, to give the Emperor a Supply for the War, and to raise Recruits for his Forces in Hungary. The Count de Harrach is gone with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from this Court to the Elector of Saxory, to finish the Treaty about the Forces His Electoral Highnels is willing to fend, to re-inforce those he has already in the Emperor's Service: And tis faid he is likewise to make Proposals to His Electoral Highness about the Command of the Imperial Army in Hungary next Campaign. Prince Lewis of Baden is expected here the next Week; and several General Officers are sent for, to affilt as the Council of War that will be held here after his Arrival. The Place of Vice-Chancellor of the Empire, vacant by the Death of the Count de Winditzgrats, is not yet disposed of; it belonging to the Elector of Ment, as Chancellor of the Empire, to nominate the Person to succeed therein. The Letters from Peter-Waradin and other Places on that fide tell us, though the Turks have very strong Garisons at Belgrade and Temeswaer, none of their Parties have of late appeared, to give our Troops any Disturbance, their chief Care feeming to be to fecure their own Frontier-places.

Francfort, Jan. 8. The French having posted a considerable number of their Troops near the Rhine, the Country-people apprehended they would with the sirst great Frost have passed that River, and made an Incursion on this side; but the Thaw we have had for teveral days has put an end to those Fears; though without it, sufficient Care was taken by the Allies to secure the Country, by quartering their Forces in such places as were most proper for that purpose; and had the Frost continued, the Imperial Hussars were ready to have made the French the sirst Visit. In the mean time, the Germans have re-inforced the Garisons of Snizzbeim and Epsingen, which lye most exposed to
