*Pembroke, Jan. 17.*

**T**HE Weather has been of late very Tempestuous. The 14th instant was driven ashore upon this Coast; a Portuguese Vessel of about 70 Tuns, laden with Wine and Oranges from *Port O Port*, bound to *London*; The Vessel is Staved in pieces; but the Men all saved, and about 30 Pipes of Wine. The same day came into our Harbour a Ship of *Dantzick*, laden with Salt from *St. Ubes*; As likewise a Ship from *New England*, laden with Sugar, Molasses, and Rum, bound to *London*. The *Joseph*, laden with Masts and Stores from *New England*, continues still in *Caldy Road*.

*Falmouth, January 18.* It continues to blow very fresh at S. W. which detains both the *Greyne Packet Boats* in this Harbour.

*Weymouth, Jan. 18.* The *Arundel*, *Greyhound*, and *Quaker Ketch*, with several Ships under their Convoy, sailed yesterday from *Studland Bay* near *Poole*; but they were soon after separated by bad Weather; and the two latter are come into this Harbour, with the *Anne* of *Portsmouth* from *Rotterdam*, and the *Lopaty* of this place from *London*. The *Arundel*, with the rest, are, it is believed, proceeded to the Westward.

*Plymouth, Jan. 19.* The 16th came in to this Port the *Sarah* of *Flushing*, laden with Sugar from *Suranam*; The *White*

*Lamb* of *Bergen* in *Norway*, in Ballast for *Bordeaux*; and a Portuguese from *Oporto*. His Majesty's Ships, the *Lenox*, *Africa*, and *Ruby Prize*, intend to sail to-morrow to the Eastward, together with the *Hope* and *Fir-Tree* Mast Ships, and several other homeward bound Merchantmen.

*Newcastle, January 18.* The *Sweepstakes* and *Winchelsea* are still in our Harbour; but will sail with the laden Fleet of Colliers with the first opportunity of Wind and Weather. It has been very blowing Weather all this Week; Several light Ships are come in from the Southward.

*Hull, January 20.* The *Garland* continues still here by reason of the bad Weather, with the Ships under her Convoy. The *Assistance* is put into *Humber*, having Sprung her Main-Mast.

*Chester, January 18.* On the 15th instant the *Dover Prize* came into *Higb-lake* with several Passengers from *Ireland*. The *Queensborough* is now in *Higb-lake*.

*Yarmouth, January 20.* On Friday the Wind coming to the South, forced back into this Road the *Milford*, with the Ships bound to *Holland*; As also the *Samuel* and *Henry*, with the laden Ships for the River. On Saturday came in the *Rupert Prize*: and this day the *Milford*, and the *Samuel* and *Henry*, sailed again with the Merchant Ships under their respective Convoys.

*Cowes, January 20.* The 18th came in here the *St. Augustine* of *Port O Port*, bound to *Rotterdam*; As also a Dutch Privateer

Privateer from Cruising. The Cole Galley came into this Road yesterday; and at the same time an Ostend Privateer, who had been several days in this Road, went out to Cruise.

Portsmouth, Jan. 21. On Sunday last came to Spithead, His Majesty's Ship the Dolphin from the Coast of Ireland. And yesterday sailed a Dutch Man of War for the Downes.

Deal, Jan. 21. This day arrived in the Downes the Crescent Fireship, with about twenty Sail of Merchant Ships from the Straights and Portugal, having left His Majesty's Ship Carlisle, who came the Voyage with them, last night off Dungeness. They parted from Cadiz the first of this month, stopp'd some days in the River of Lisbon, and sailed from thence the 8th. The Carlisle is now coming in.

London, Jan. 22. There was lately Launched at Bristol, a new Sixth Rate Ship of 24 Guns, named the Seaford, built by Mr. Herring.
