

Prisoners, who reported, That the Turks had very strong Garrisons at *Belgrade* and *Temeswar*, and continued to work on the Fortifications of both these Places. Count *Guido* of *Staremberg* will shortly begin his Journey to *Transilvania*, to Command the Emperors Forces on that tide in the place of the late General *Veterani*. The Imperial Commissaries have Orders to provide Magazines as well in several Places on the River *Theysse* as on the *Danube*; The former for the Service of the Forces on the Frontiers of *Transilvania*, and the latter for the Emperor's Main Army. The Count *de Harrach*, the Emperor's Envoy to the Elector of *Saxony*, is now on his Journey to *Dresden*; 'Tis generally thought his Electoral Highness will have the Command of the Imperial Army again the next Summer, which is designed to be much stronger than it was the last year.

*Fraucfort, Jan. 15.* Some Persons who are come hither within these few days from *Alsace*, give an account that the Country is full of Complaints of the Violences committed by the French Officers in making their new Levies and Recruits, which by these Means they have almost finished, but the Men as they are raised by Force, to make use of every opportunity to Desert. The French provide Magazines at *Landaw*, and other Places. They do not yet know who is to Command their Army on the *Rhine* this next Campaign, in the room of the *Marschal de Lorge*, who by reason of the ill State of his Health, will be excused from going any more with the Forces into the Field.

*Hamburg, Jan. 17.* The last Letters from *Warsaw* tell us, The King of *Poland* had resolved to hold a Diet this Winter, but that the Circular Letters for that purpose were not yet dispatched.

*Brussels, Jan. 18. N S.* The late motion of the Enemies Troops between the *Sambre* and the *Meuse*, was only to conduct their Convoys, for filling the Magazines they are making at *Givet*, *Charlemont*, *Avesnes*, and *Philipville*. The Earl of *Athlone* arrived the 16th at *Antwerp* from *Holland*, and is expected here to morrow, to Review the Dutch Horde quartered in this and the Neighbouring Places. The Burghers of this City are now assembled to Consult about raising the new Subsidy the Elector of *Bavaria* has demanded of them.

*Plymouth, Jan. 14.* Yesterday came into this Port the *St. Jacob* of *Copenhagen*, bound home from *Bourdeaux*.

*Cowes, Jan. 15.* Yesterday came into this Road two Dutch Privateers from Cruising.

*Yarmouth, January 15.* The Wind being at South, keeps the *Samuel* and *Henry*, the *Roebuck* and *Milford*, with the Merchant Ships bound to *London*, still in this Road.

*Yarmouth, Jan. 17.* This day the *Samuel* and *Henry* failed out of this Road with some laden Ships for the River, and the *Milford* with those under her Convoy for the River. The *Roebuck* went out at the same time.

*Deal, Jan. 18.* Yesterday came into the Downs from the North, His Majesty's Ships, *Victory*, *Devonshire*, and *Minister*.

His Majesty has been pleased to appoint *John Lynn Esq;* to be High-Sheriff for the County of *Northampton*, and *Edward Sumner Esq;* for the County of *Wilt.*

The Mail from *Holland* of *Tuesday* last is not yet come in.
