CROWN OFFICE ACT, 1877.

Notice is hereby given, in accordance with the provisions of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, that, after the expiration of 40 days from the date hereof, the Committee of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, constituted under Sections 4 and 5 of the Crown Office Act, 1877, propose, in exercise of thepowers in that behalf conferred upon them by the said Sections of the said Act, to make an Order adding to the Schedule to the Order of Council of the 30th day of August, 1916, (which relates to the preparation and authentication of certain documents issued from the Office of the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery), and, further, that copies of the Draft Order can be obtained by any Public Body within 40 days from the date of this Notice, at the Privy Council Office, Whitehall.

The KING has been pleased to grant unrestricted permission to Miss Francesca Wilson, Miss Margaret MacFie, Miss Dorothy Brown, and Miss Ellen Hill to wear the Insignia of the Fifth Class of the Order of St. Sava conferred upon them by His Majesty the King of the Serbs, the Croats and the Slovenes, in recognition of their services under the auspices of the Serbian Relief Fund.

The KING has been graciously pleased, by Warrant under His Royal Sign Manual, to ordain and declare that Gertrude Mary O'Bryen, widow of Ernest Adolphus O'Bryen, Esquire, late Mayor of the Metropolitan Borough of Hampstead, upon whom it was His Majesty's intention to have conferred the title and dignity of a Knight Bachelor, but who died before the Royal intention could be fully carried into effect, shall have, hold and enjoy the same style, title, place and precedence to which she would have been entitled had her said husband survived and received, either personally or by Letters Patent under the Great Seal, the degree, style and title of a Knight Bachelor;

And to command that the said Royal Warrant be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.
