The KING has been pleased to issue a Warrant under His Majesty's Royal Sign Manual to the following effect:—

GEORGE R.I.

GEORGE THE FIFTH, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India, to all to whom these Presents shall come, Greeting!

WHEREAS We have taken into Our Royal consideration the faithful and devoted service rendered by members of the Special Constabulary during the War:

And whereas we are desirous of distinguishing such service by some mark of Our Royal Favour and also of providing a means of recognising continued and efficient service which may be rendered in the future by members of any Special Constabulary Reserve hereafter constituted:

We do by these Presents for Us, Our Heirs and Successors, institute and create a new Medal to be awarded for such service as aforesaid.

I. It is ordained that the Medal shall be designated and styled "The Special Constabulary Medal."

II. It is ordained that the Special Constabulary Medal shall consist of a circular Medal of Silver with Our Effigy on the obverse and on the reverse an appropriate design or inscription, and shall bear on the rim the name of the person to whom the Medal is awarded.

III. It is ordained that the Medal shall only be awarded to those of Our faithful subjects who being or having been members of the Special Constabulary during the War or of any Special Constabulary Reserve shall satisfy the following conditions, namely:—

(1) Shall have served as a Special Constable without pay during the War for not less than three years, and shall during that period have performed not less than 150 police duties; or

(2) Shall have served in a Special Constabulary Reserve for not less than nine years, and shall have (a) taken an approved course of training in Police duty, (b) voluntarily performed such actual police duty as may be required by the Chief Officer of Police in accordance with any general regulations made by Our Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, (c) been annually certified as efficient by the Chief Officer of Police.

Provided that in the case of a man who has served both in the Special Constabulary during the War and in a Special Constabulary Reserve, one year of service during the War (with not less than 50 police duties in such year) shall be reckoned as equivalent to three years' efficient service in the Reserve, and less periods in the same proportion.

IV. It is ordained that the Medal shall be awarded only on a recommendation to Us by Our Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, and that the names of the persons to be so recommended to Us shall be submitted to Our said Secretary of State by the Chief Officer of Police under whom such persons have served.

V. It is ordained that the Medal shall be worn on the left breast suspended from a

ribband of an inch and three-eighths in width, of which the central part (one-third of the whole) shall be red, while the remaining parts shall each have three longitudinal stripes of equal width, the central stripe being black and the other two white; and further that in the case of those to whom the Medal is awarded for service during the War a bar or clasp shall be attached to the ribband; bearing the words "The Great War, 1914-1918."

VI. It is ordained that if any person to whom this Medal is awarded shall be guilty of any crime or disgraceful conduct which in Our judgment disqualifies him for the same, his Medal shall, by an Order of Our Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, be forfeited and the name of such person shall be erased from the record of those to whom the Medal shall have been awarded. It is hereby further declared that We, Our Heirs and Successors, shall be the sole judges of the circumstances demanding such forfeiture, and that every person whose Medal shall be so forfeited shall on being required so to do by Our said Secretary of State deliver up his Medal to such person as Our said Secretary of State may direct.

VII. Our Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department is hereby authorized to make such regulations as may be necessary for the better carrying out of this Our Warrant.

Given at Our Court at *Balmoral*, this *Thirtieth* day of *August*, One thousand nine hundred and nineteen, in the Tenth year of Our Reign.

BRITISH NATIONALITY AND STATUS OF ALIENS ACTS, 1914 AND 1918.

In the Matter of *Lionel Max Ettlinger.*

Revocation of Certificate of Naturalization.

Whereas I am satisfied as the result of an enquiry conducted by the Certificates of Naturalization (Revocation) Committee that *Lionel Max Ettlinger*, to whom a certificate of naturalization, numbered 16,385, was granted on the 18th October, 1906, has shown himself by act or speech to be disaffected and disloyal to His Majesty.

Now, therefore, by this Order made in pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by Section 7 of the British Nationality and Status of Aliens Act, 1914, I revoke the said certifi-
