Genova, January 15. N. S.

THE Advices from *Provence* continue to speak of the French Preparations at *Toulon*. On the 8th Instant arrived here the *Canterbury* Frigate, Capt. *Lake* Commander, with a considerable Sum of Money from *Cadiz*, having made his Voyage from thence in 15 days; and yesterday he sailed again towards the *Streights* Mouth.

Legborne, Jan. 16. Several Ships are come in here this week, among which are 6 Dutch and two English Ships from *Holland* and *England*; One of the Dutch Ships came from *Cadiz* about 14 days ago in Company of the Ships bound up the *Mediterranean*, and to *Turkey*, and parted with them the 9th Instant off *Minorca*, being 8 Men of War, and about 20 Merchant Ships, who took their Course towards *Sardinia*. We hear from *Toulon*, that the French have only some few Cruisers abroad, that about 50 Men of War were caulked in that Port, and might soon be ready to sail. The *Mary* arrived here this day from *London*.

Turin, Jan. 17. The Officers in the Duke of *Savoy's* Service have almost compleated their Recruits; and the Preparations for the Campaign are carried on with great application.

Venice, January 19. The Ambassadors of this State, Signior *Lazarro* and Signior *Venier*, intend to set out the next Week for *England*, with a numerous and splendid Attendance. The Princess of *Hanover*, lately Married to the Duke of *Modena*, is expected here in few days, in her Journey to *Modena*. We have no fresh Advices from the *Levant*.

Vienna, July 21. The States of the Lower *Austria* met here the 16th Instant in the Great Hall of the Palace, in the Presence of the Emperor, who was seated on his Throne. The Count de *Bucellini*, Chancellor of the Court made a Speech to them, and gave them an Account of what had passed in *Hungary* the last Summer, and of the happy Success of the Arms of the Allies in the taking of *Namur*, and *Casal*; and concluded with a Demand of Subsidies for carrying on the War; To which the Count de *Traun*, Marschal or Speaker of the Assembly, answered with many Expressions of Zeal and Duty towards the Emperor, and assurances of the States to give him their utmost Assistance. The Officers that are making their Recruits in the Parts hereabouts for the Service of the Imperial Troops in *Hungary*, are to have them Compleat by the beginning of March. The Emperor has not yet declared the General Officers that are to command his Armies against the *Turks* the next Summer.

Frankfort, Jan. 29. We hear, that the French send several Detachements of their Troops in *Germany* towards *Flanders*.

Hamburgh, January 31. We have an Account this Day, that 6 English Merchant Men, are arrival in this River, under Convoy

of two Men of War. There are now in this City, Ministers from the King of *Sueden*, Elector of *Brandenburgh*, and the House of *Lunenburgh*, to endeavour to compose the present Difference between the King of *Denmark* and the Duke of *Holstein Gottorp*.

Paris, January 30. The Marschal de *Catinat* parted from hence on Friday last for *Piedmont*, the French being alarmed by the Preparations the Allies make on that side. 'Tis believed the French King will in few days, declare the General Officers to command his Armies the next Summer in *Flanders*, *Germany*, & *Catalonia*; 'Tis now discoursed, that the Duke de *Vondosme* will be Employed on the *Rhine*; and the Duke de *Maine* have the command in *Catalonia*. The Chevalier de *Bart* is returned to *Dunkirk*, in order to go to Sea with several Ships, which its said are to Cruise to the Northward. The Squadrons, that are fitting out under the Command of the Marquis de *Nesmond* and the Sieur *Renaud*, are, its said, to consist, the first of 8 Men of War, and the other of six Frigats; 'Tis not yet declared whither they are designed. We are told, that the Fleet at *Toulon* cannot be ready to Sail till the beginning of March.

Brussels, Febr. 1. The Earl of *Ashlone* went hence yesterday to take a Review of the Dutch Cavalry quartered in *Brabant* and the Countsy of *Liege*. The Marschal de *Boufflers* having visited the French Garisons between the *Sambre* and the *Meuse*, is gone to do the like in *Flanders*. They write from *Namur*, that 16 *Wessels* were arrived with Ammunition and Provisions from *Maestricht*, to be laid up in the Magazines there.

Hague, Febr. 3. N. S. The States of *Holland* are separated, and will not meet again till the 14th of this month. On the 31th past there happened a great Tumult at *Amsterdam* occasioned by the Rabble, who would oppose an Order that had been published by the Magistrates about Burials, and plundered several Houses, but the Burghers being, by Command of the Magistrates, got together in Arms, they dispersed them; several of the Mutineers were killed, and many taken, 5 whereof have been already Hanged, and the rest will be proceeded against according to their demerit: The last Letters from thence say, all was quiet again, and the 4 new Burgermasters of that City were chosen yesterday, who Thanked the Burghers for the great Zeal they had shewed on this Occasion.
