A PROCLAMATION

For Apprehending and Securing the Person of
Roderick Mackenzie.

WILLIAM R.

W Hereas We have been Informed, That Roderick Mackenzie hath been Examined, and given Evidence before a Committee of the Commons in Parliament Assembled, in Relation to several Persons, who under Colour of an Act of Parliament passed in Scotland, for Settling a Trade to the East-Indies, had in this Kingdom Administred, and Taken an Oath De Fideli, and had also, under Colour of the said Act, Stiled themselves a Company, and Acted as such, and Raised Money in this Kingdom for Carrying on the said Company; And that since his said Examination, the said Roderick Mackenzie having been Summoned, and appearing before the said Committee, had endeavoured to suppress the Evidence he had before given against such Persons; And that to Avoid the Manifestation of the Truth, and (as much as in him lies) to Render all just and proper Methods of Prosecution in the Premises ineffectual, he the said Roderick Mackenzie hath withdrawn himself from his usual Place of Abode, and Absconded, intending, as may reasonably be supposed, to make his Escape out of this Kingdom. And whereas the Commons in Parliament Assembled, have, by their humble Address, besought Us to Issue Our Royal Proclamation, for Securing the Person of the said Roderick Mackenzie, We have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to Issue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby Requiring and Commanding all our Loving Subjects whatsoever, to Discover and Apprehend, and cause the said Roderick Mackenzie to be Discovered and Apprehended, and to carry him before some of Our Justices of the Peace, or Chief Magistrates of the County, Town, or Place where he shall be Apprehended, who are respectively Required to Secure him, and thereof to give speedy Notice unto Our Privy Council, or One of Our Principal Secretaries of State, to the end he may be forth-coming, to be Dealt withall, and Proceeded against according to Law. And We do hereby strictly Charge and Command all Our Loving Subjects (as they will Answer the contrary at their Perils) that they do not any ways Conceal, but do Discover the said Roderick Mackenzie, to the end he may be Secured and Proceeded against according to Law.

Given at Our Court at Kensington the Thirteenth Day of February, 1695. In the Eighth Year of Our Reign.

Naples, Jan. 24. The Count de Sant Isevan, who has been our Viceroy 8 years, is now preparing to leave

this Government; His Successor the Duke of Medina Celi being shortly expected from Rome, where he has resided as Ambassador from the King of Spain. They raise Men in this Kingdom to reinforce the Neapolitan Regiments in the Service of the State of Milan and in Catalonia. Four Gallies will depart hence in few days, to carry a Supply of Provisions and Ammunition to the Spanish Garisons on the Coast of Tuscany. We have an account from Malta, that the Gallies of that Order are commanded to be in a readiness to return to the Levant in the beginning of April, and that they are to take with them 1000 Land Soldiers, for the assistance of the Venetians.

Genova, Jan. 29. The French go on with their Preparations at Toulon, and the last Advices from thence say, most of the Ships had got their Guns on Board; That several thousand Seamen were come thither from their Ports in the Ocean; That the Fleet would be ready in the beginning of March, and that Monsieur de Chateau-Renaud is to Command it. We have an account, that the Governor of Milan has ordered the Troops in the Service of that Duchy, to be ready to take the Field by the end of March.

Turin, Febr. 3. They are preparing a great Train of Artillery in the Arsenal of this City; and Magazines are made in several places for the use of our Forces, which 'tis intended shall go thence into the Field this year. The French seem apprehensive of what may be attempted against them, and are therefore putting themselves into a posture to oppose us; and the Marschal de Catinat is coming back from the French Court to Command their Army on this side.

Vienna, Febr. 4. Prince Lewis of Baden, and Prince Eugene of Savoy, continue at this Court. The Emperor has not yet declared who shall command his Army in Hungary the next Summer: And the Circles of Suabia and Franconia do in the mean time press with much earnestness, that Prince Lewis may Command again on the Rhine. A great many Recruits have been already sent to Hungary, and the rest will follow in a short time. The Ambassador of Portugal will make his publick Entry the next week. The Troops of Croatia have lately had two Rencontres with the Turks, and had the better of them in both, having killed and taken about 150 of the Enemy.

Hamburg, Febr. 14. The last Letters from Stockholm give an account, that the Duke of Holstein-Gottorp had sent an Envoy to the King of Sweden, to acquaint him with what hath passed between the King of Denmark and the said Duke, in relation to their present Difference, and that he was come away with a very satisfactory Answer, the King of Sweden declaring, that he will assist the Duke of Holstein in case the Danes commit any Acts of Hostility against him, and having sent Orders to the Governors of the Duchies of Pomerania and Bremen to have their Forces in a readiness to march for this purpose. In the mean time the Ministers of several Princes are met here, to endeavour an amicable Compromise of this Affair.

Kinsale, Febr. 7. His Majesty's Ship the Foresight, Capt. Walker Commander, arrived here the 3d Instant from Ventry Bay, where she took in the Goods saved out of the East-India Ship that was lost upon that Coast the last Summer; and this afternoon she sailed hence for England, having under her Convoy the James and George, (which arrived here some days ago from Barbadoes, but left from Toughall) and several small Vessels bound to Ostend. The French Privateers who my last told

told you was forced by bad Weather into Kilmare River, is got out again, and gone off to Sea.

Dublin, Febr. 10. On Wednesday night last was cast away between this place and Wicklow two Vessels laden with Coals from *Moffen*, whereof *Hughes* and *Jones* were Masters, and all the Men and Passengers, being about 16 in number, were lost, except four: At the same time several other Ships from *Chester* and *Liverpoole* were put by this Port to the Southward, which we hope are got into *Waterford*. His Majesty's Ship the *Speedwell* is now in this Bay, and will sail with the first opportunity of Wind and Weather to the River of *Waterford*, and thence to *Kinsale*, having Stores on Board for *Duncannon* and *Charles Forts*.

Falmouth, Febr. 10. On the 8th put into this Port the *Betty* Transport Ship bound to *Kinsale* to carry off the French Prisoners that are there; and yesterday came in the *William* of *London* from *Dublin*.

Lime, Febr. 12. The roth arrived here the *Loyal-Merchant* of *Topsham*, in a Month from *Cadiz*; she came out in Company of about 30 Sail most Dutch, under Convoy of 3 *Ostend* Men of War; The English Men of War commanded by *Sir George Rooke* were Careening in that Port when these Ships came away.

Hull, Febr. 12. The Ships bound to *London*, being about 40 Sail, with their Convoys the *Garland* and *Winchelsea* Frigats, are still detained here by the Stormy Weather and Southerly Winds.

Yarmouth, Febr. 12. A Vessel called the *Fellowship*, *Robert Webster* Master, is come in here from *Holland*; she sailed out of the *Maese* on Saturday last; and towards evening saw two Dutch Men of War who came from *Goree*, and stood to the Northward. About 9 a Clock the next morning appeared to Windward 5 French Men of War, carrying from 50 to 40 Guns, and 3 or 4 Tenders, being the Squadron commanded by *Du Barr*, come newly from *Dunkirke*, who bore down upon the Dutch Frigats and engaged them, and after an hours Dispute took the biggest of about 40 Guns; The other bore away, and was pursued by the Enemy. A Sloop at the same time gave Chase to *Webster's* Vessel, and fired several Guns, which our Men returned; and by one of the Enemy's Shot, or some Accident, the English Vessel took Fire, and blew up some Powder, which wounded two or three Men; but the Fire was soon put out, and *Webster* made the best of his way into this Road, where he arrived on Monday morning. Yesterday was seen off *Laystoff* a Fleet of about 30 Sail of Danes, Swedes, and Hamburgers standing to the Westward.

Perrsmouth, Febr. 13. The outward bound Ships continue at *Spithead* and in *Stokes Bay*.

Deale, Febr. 13. Yesterday came into the Downs 4 Ships from *Malaga* and *Cadiz*, from which last place they came under the *Ostend* Convoy; and are sailed for the River.

London, Febr. 15. The Transport Ships with the Princess of *Denmark's* Regiment of Foot commanded by Colonel *Webb*, and a great many Soldiers for Recruits, and Horses, who Embark'd last Wednesday, are sailed out of the River for *Flanders*, under Convoy of His Majesty's Ship the *Captain*, and several other Men of War.

Westminster, Febr. 13. The King came this day to the House of Peers, attended with the usual Solemnity; and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne, and the

Commons being sent for up, His Majesty gave the Royal Assent to
