"Defence of the Realm Regulations") under the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914, for securing the public safety and the defence of the realm:

And whereas the said Act has been amended by the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) Act, 1915, the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) (No. 2) Act, 1915, and the Munitions of War Act, 1915, and other enactments:

And whereas the said regulations have been amended by various subsequent Orders in Council:

And whereas it is expedient further to amend the said regulations in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered that the following amendments be made in the said regulations:—

1. In Regulation 9AA after the words "motor cycle," in both places where those words occur, there shall be inserted the words "or motor car"; after the words "motor cycles," in both places where those words occur, there shall be inserted the words "or motor cars," and after the words "explosive substances," where those words lastly occur, there

shall be inserted the words "motor cycles, motor cars."

2. After Regulation 12D the following regulation shall be inserted:—

"13. In any area in respect of which the operation of section one of the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) Act, 1915, is for the time being suspended, the competent naval or military authority may by order require every person within any area specified in the order to remain within doors between such hours as may be specified in the order, and in such case, if any person within that area is or remains out between such hours without a permit in writing from the competent naval or military authority or some person duly authorised by him, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations."

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas we consider it desirable to grant an allowance to certain daymen employed in connection with the Fire Control System in Your Majesty's Ships:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the grant, under the conditions set forth below, of a proficiency allowance of 3d. a day to Bandmasters and Band Corporals and to Regulating Branch (late Ship's Police), Schoolmaster, Writer and Victualling Ratings whilst employed on the more important duties in the fire control

system, which call for special knowledge and ability, *e.g.*, Plotters, Range Corrector, Dumaresq Worker, Clock Operator, Deflection Keeper, etc.:

"1. No rating to receive the allowance until he has satisfactorily performed the duty in the ship in which he is serving for three months:

"2. The allowance not to be paid in respect of duties the performance of which is provided for by the inclusion of a Seaman Gunner or higher rating in the Quarter Bill:

"3. The allowance to be paid only to men actually engaged on duties of the nature specified and not to exceed the following maximum numbers in each ship:—

Light Cruisers	-	-	-	2
Large Monitors	-	-	-	-

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being, or having been, an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas under Section 2, sub-section (1) of the Ministry of Pensions Act, 1916, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that there shall be transferred to the Ministry of Pensions the powers and duties of the Admiralty with respect to pensions and grants to persons who have served as Officers or men, and to their widows, children, and other dependants, other than service pensions, as far as such pensions and grants are payable out of moneys provided by Parliament and not provided exclusively for the purpose of Greenwich Hospital:

"And whereas we are of opinion that it is desirable to make provision for Seamen and Marines (including Reservists) discharged as medically unfit for further service pending consideration by the Ministry of Pensions of their claim to pension or gratuity, we beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Coun-

cil, to sanction the following proposals being carried into effect:—

“1. With effect from 19th October, 1917, the pay and allowances of all men discharged as medically unfit for further service, to be extended for a period of 21 days from the date of medical survey, and payment of separation allowance to be continued for two further weeks, making five weeks in all from the date of the medical survey;

“2. With effect from 15th September, 1918, the pay and allowances (including Separation Allowance where applicable) to be extended for a period of 28 days from the date of medical survey.

“The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals.”

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

“And whereas we have had under consideration the position and prospects of Mechanicians in Your Majesty's Fleet:

“And whereas we consider it desirable to establish the rating of Chief Mechanician to provide a link between the existing rating of Mechanician and the existing rank of Warrant Mechanician, and also to provide a means of advancement and reward to such Senior Mechanicians as may not be selected for Warrant rank:

“And whereas we consider it desirable that the rates of pay of Warrant Mechanicians should be assimilated to those of Artificer Engineers:

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the establishment as from the 13th June, 1918, of the ratings of Chief Mechanician 1st Class and Chief Mechanician 2nd Class with pay at the rates of 7s. 11d. and 7s. 5d. per diem, respectively, the number of Chief Mechanicians, 1st and 2nd Class, being limited to 100; and further to approve of the scale of pay for Warrant

Mechanicians being assimilated to that prescribed for Artificer Engineers, with effect from the same date.

“The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals.”

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

WHEREAS by treaty, grant, usage, sufferance, and other lawful means, His Majesty the King has jurisdiction in China.

And whereas it is desirable to make further provision with reference to the exercise of jurisdiction over British companies carrying on business within the limits of this Order.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by “The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890,” or otherwise, in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as “The China (Companies) Amendment Order in Council, 1919,” and shall be read as one with “The China (Companies) Order in Council, 1915.”

2. In this Order:—

“The Fire and Marine Insurance Companies Ordinance” means “The Fire and Marine Insurance Companies Ordinance, 1917, of the Colony of Hong Kong,” and includes any Ordinance amending or substituted for the same.

“The Ordinance” means “The Companies Ordinance, 1911, of the Colony of Hong Kong,” and includes any Ordinance amending or substituted for the same.

3. Where the general or substantial control of the business of a Company incorporated under the Ordinance is exercised by a person or persons ordinarily resident within the limits of this Order, such Company shall, irrespective of the place at which the Board of Directors may meet, or of any other circumstances, be deemed to be a Company of which the operations are directed and controlled from a place within the limits of this Order and shall be a China Company within the meaning of “The China (Companies) Order in Council, 1915.”

4.—(1.) No person, other than a British subject resident within the limits of this Order, shall act as managing director or in any position similar to that of managing director; or

shall otherwise exercise general or substantial control of the business of a China Company.

(2.) If default is made in compliance with this article the Company shall be liable to a fine not exceeding 50 dollars for every day during which the default continues, and every director and every manager of the Company who knowingly authorizes or permits the default shall be liable to the like penalty.

(3.) Failure to comply with the provisions of this article shall be a ground upon which an order for winding up the Company may be made by the Court.

(4.) This article shall come into force 60 days after the publication of this Order.

5. All documents and other written information which a company is required by the Ordinance to file with the Registrar of Companies shall, in the case of a China Company, be filed with the Registrar of Companies at Shanghai, and a copy of all such documents and other written information shall, in the case of a Hong Kong China Company, be filed with the Registrar of Companies at Shanghai.

6.—(1.) The provisions of the Fire and Marine Insurance Companies Ordinance shall be applied to China Companies and Hong Kong China Companies.

(2.) All acts done within the limits of this Order in pursuance of the Fire and Marine Insurance Companies Ordinance by, to, with, or before the Registrar of Companies at Shanghai shall, subject to the provisions of this Order, be of the same force and validity as if they had been done by, to, with, or before the Registrar of Companies in Hong Kong.

(3.) The Registrar of Companies at Shanghai shall be entitled to initiate such proceedings as he may think necessary to enforce compliance with the provisions of this Order.

7.—(1.) Subject to the provisions of this Order the jurisdiction of the Court in respect of China Companies and Hong Kong China Companies shall be exercised, so far as circumstances admit, in conformity with the provisions of the Fire and Marine Insurance Companies Ordinance.

(2.) The duties of the Governor or of the Governor in Council under Sections 5 (2), 5 (5), 6 (2), and 7 (1), and of paragraphs 2, 3, and 7 of the First Schedule of the Fire and Marine Insurance Companies Ordinance shall, within the limits of this Order, be exercised by the Minister.

(3.) All offences under the Fire and Marine Insurance Companies Ordinance made punishable by fine may, if committed within the limits of this Order, be prosecuted summarily under Article 48 of "The China Order in Council, 1904," provided that the maximum fine which can be imposed in the case of offences tried summarily shall be £200 instead of £20.

8. All fees prescribed by or under the Fire and Marine Insurance Companies Ordinance which are paid to the Registrar of Companies at Shanghai shall be paid by him to the Colonial Treasurer at Hong Kong.

9. This Order shall come into effect on the first day of January, 1920.

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order and declare, and be it ordered and declared, as follows:—

In respect of every importation licence granted by the Secretary of State in pursuance of the provisions of Section 40, subsection (9), of the Explosives Act, 1875, there shall be paid a fee of Twelve Shillings (12s.) for each Two Thousand Pounds or part of Two Thousand Pounds allowed to be imported under the said licence.

Provided that the minimum fee payable in respect of any such licence shall be One Pound and Four Shillings (£1. 4s.).

The Order in Council of the 10th day of January, 1910, is hereby revoked.

WHEREAS by Section 659 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894 (which is a Section in Part XI. of that Act and which re-enacts similar provisions by the said Act repealed of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1854), it is (among other things) enacted that His Majesty may by Order in Council fix the establishments to be maintained by each of the General Lighthouse Authorities on account of the services of lighthouses, buoys, and beacons, or the annual or other sums to be paid out of the Mercantile Marine Fund in respect of those establishments, and that an increase of any establishment or part of an establishment so fixed shall not be made without the consent of the Board of Trade:

And whereas by Section 1 of the Merchant Shipping (Mercantile Marine Fund) Act, 1898, it is (among other things) provided that references in Part XI. of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, to the Mercantile Marine Fund shall be construed as references to the General Lighthouse Fund by the now reciting Act constituted:

And whereas Her late Majesty by Order in Council dated the 28th day of June, 1892, made under the Merchant Shipping Act, 1854, was pleased to fix (*inter alia*) the conditions under which appointments to Clerkships and Lower Grade Clerkships on the establishment of the Commissioners of Irish Lights were to be made:

And whereas His Majesty (then His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales) acting under the authority of a Commission of His late

Majesty dated the 5th day of March, 1910, by Order in Council dated the 22nd day of April, 1910, was pleased to fix the establishment which might be maintained by the Commissioners of Irish Lights and the amount of the salaries to be paid to the officers of the said establishment:

And whereas His Majesty by Order in Council dated the 10th day of June, 1912, was pleased to fix the maximum salary of the post at the present time held by Mr. J. B. Phelps at £370 per annum, and the increments of salary payable to the Lower Grade Clerks on the said establishment at £7 10s. per annum until the salary reaches £125 per annum, and £10 thereafter, until the maximum salary of £250 has been reached:

And whereas it is expedient that the conditions specified in the said Order in Council dated the 28th day of June, 1892, and the establishment of the said Commissioners as fixed by the said Orders in Council of the 22nd day of April, 1910, and the 10th day of June, 1912, should be varied in manner hereinafter appearing:

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the Board of Trade have consented to such variation of the establishment:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Him by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and of any other powers Him thereunto enabling, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, is pleased to fix as follows, that is to say:—

(1) The salary payable to Mr. J. B. Phelps shall from the 1st day of January, 1919, be £400 per annum.

(2) The salary of Mr. S. W. Nugent, at present Assistant Engineer on the said establishment, shall be increased from £350 per annum to £370 per annum as from the 1st January, 1919, rising thereafter to £390 as from the 1st January, 1920, and to £400 as from the 1st January, 1921.

(3) The salary of Mr. D. Rowlands, one of the Lower Grade Clerks on the said establishment, shall be increased by a special increment of £10 to £171 13s. 4d. as from the 1st day of June, 1919, rising thereafter by the annual increments fixed by the said Order in Council dated the 10th day of June, 1912.

(4) Notwithstanding anything contained in the said Order in Council dated the 28th day of June, 1892, Mr. O. Conway, at present an unestablished clerk in the service of the Commissioners of Irish Lights, shall be eligible for appointment to the Lower Grade, as from the first day of April, 1919, his salary in such Lower Grade as from the date upon which his appointment operates to commence at £132 per annum and to rise thereafter by the annual increments fixed by the said Order in Council of 10th June, 1912.

(5) Notwithstanding anything contained in the said Order in Council dated the 28th day of June, 1892, the whole or any part of the service of an unestablished clerk under whatever title he has been or may be serving who has been or may be appointed to a post on the said establishment may with the consent of the Board of Trade be counted towards his subsequent superannuation (if any) whether such appointment was made by promotion or after passing the prescribed examination, and whether he is at present

serving in the Lower Grade or in any Senior Grade or Class on the said establishment.

And His Majesty, by virtue and in further exercise of the powers so vested in Him as aforesaid, and by and with the advice aforesaid, is further pleased to fix, and doth hereby fix, that the salaries payable under the provisions of this Order shall be paid out of the General Lighthouse Fund.

WHEREAS by Section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that "Whereas in some instances Tithings, Hamlets, Chapelries, and other Places or Districts may be separated from the Parishes or Mother Churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and Places altogether extra-parochial may, in some instances, with advantage be annexed to Parishes or Districts which they are contiguous, or be constituted Separate Parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own Diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any Diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop, that any such Tithing, Hamlet, Chapelry, Place or District within the Diocese of such Archbishop, or the Diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any Parish or Mother Church, and either be constituted a Separate Benefice by itself or be united to any other Parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining Tithing, Hamlet, Chapelry, Place, or District, Parochial or Extra-Parochial, so as to form a Separate Parish or Benefice, or that any Extra-Parochial Place may with advantage be annexed to any Parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a Separate Parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop, or Bishop, shall draw up a Scheme in writing (the Scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Glebe Lands, Tithes, Rent Charges, and other Ecclesiastical Dues, Rates and Payments, and in respect to Patronage and Rights to Pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the Patron or Patrons of the Benefice or Benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such Scheme, or to such modification thereof, as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such Scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such Consent as aforesaid, by his Report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such Scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend Edwyn, Lord Bishop of Southwell, hath made a Representation in writing, dated the 7th day of January, 1919, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

“ I, Edwyn, by Divine Permission Bishop of Southwell, do hereby, pursuant to the provisions of Section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, represent to your Grace:—

“ 1. That there is in the County of Derby and in my Diocese of Southwell a Benefice (being a Vicarage) and Ecclesiastical Parish of Kirk Hallam containing an area of 744 acres and a population of 103 persons according to the last Census, and there is within the limits of the said Parish the Parish Church of All Saints, Kirk Hallam, with accommodation for 120 persons:

“ 2. That there is in the said County of Derby and my Diocese of Southwell a Benefice (being a Vicarage) and Ecclesiastical Parish of Saint Mary, Ilkeston, containing an area of 2,290 acres with a population of 11,078 persons, with a Church containing accommodation for 825 persons:

“ 3. Within the said Parish of Saint Mary, Ilkeston, and at the extremities thereof, there is a District known as Little Hallam, contiguous to the said Parish of Kirk Hallam, containing a population of 170 persons:

“ 4. The inhabitants of the said District of Little Hallam being remote from the said Parish Church of Saint Mary, Ilkeston, are accustomed to resort to the neighbouring Parish Church of All Saints, Kirk Hallam, for Divine Service on Sundays:

“ 5. That having regard to the distance separating the District of Little Hallam from the Parish Church of Saint Mary, Ilkeston, and to the consequent difficulty of making adequate provision for the Cure of Souls in such District and to the proximity of such District to the Parish Church of All Saints, Kirk Hallam, it appears to me that the said District of Little Hallam may, under the provisions of the Pluralities Act, 1838, be advantageously separated from the said Vicarage and Parish Church of Saint Mary, Ilkeston, and be annexed to the said contiguous Vicarage and Parish Church of All Saints, Kirk Hallam, for ecclesiastical purposes:

“ 6. That with a view to making better provision for the Endowment of the said Vicarage of All Saints, Kirk Hallam, William Adlington, formerly of Ockbrook, in the county of Derby, but now of Matlock, in the same County, Esquire, the Patron of the said Benefice of Kirk Hallam, lately offered to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England by way of benefaction certain Rectorial Tithes Rent Charges arising out of lands in the Parish of Kirk Hallam of the commuted value of £60 per annum, which said benefaction the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners have agreed to meet with a grant of a capital sum of £900 on condition that the said District of Little Hallam is separated from the Parish of Saint Mary, Ilkeston, and annexed to the said Parish of All Saints, Kirk Hallam:

“ 7. The Patronage of the said Vicarage of Kirk Hallam belongs to the said William Adlington, and the Reverend John Edward Dallimore, Clerk, M.A., is the present Vicar thereof:

“ 8. The Patronage of the said Vicarage of Saint Mary, Ilkeston, belongs to His Grace

the Most Noble Henry John Brinsley, Duke of Rutland, and the Reverend Archibald William Bell, Clerk, M.A., is the present Vicar thereof:

“ 9. That pursuant to the directions contained in the 26th Section of the Pluralities Act, 1838, I have drawn up a Scheme in writing, annexed to this Representation, describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alteration above proposed may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Glebe Lands, Tithes, Rent Charges and other Ecclesiastical Dues, Rates and Payments, and in respect to Patronage and Rights to Pews may be made with justice to all parties interested; and I do hereby submit the same to your Grace, together with the Consents thereto of William Adlington, the Patron of the said Benefice of Kirk Hallam, of the Reverend John Edward Dallimore, the Incumbent of such Benefice, of the said The Most Noble Henry John Brinsley, Duke of Rutland, the Patron of the said Benefice of Saint Mary, Ilkeston, and of the said Reverend Archibald William Bell, the Incumbent of such last-mentioned Benefice, to the intent that if your Grace shall on full consideration and enquiry be satisfied with such Scheme you may certify the same and such Consents as aforesaid by your Report to His Majesty in Council.”

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the Consents referred to in the said Representation are as follows:—

“ SCHEME

“ That all that part of the Parish of Saint Mary, Ilkeston, in the County of Derby, described in the Schedule hereunder written and hereinafter referred to as the District of Little Hallam, which District together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth in the *Map or Plan* hereunto annexed and thereon coloured pink, shall be separated from the said Benefice and Parish of Saint Mary, Ilkeston, and annexed to the said contiguous Benefice and Parish of All Saints, Kirk Hallam, for ecclesiastical purposes:

“ That the said District of Little Hallam shall when annexed to the said Parish of All Saints, Kirk Hallam, be subject to the same Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction as the said Parishes of Saint Mary, Ilkeston, and All Saints, Kirk Hallam, and the Incumbent of All Saints, Kirk Hallam, shall have exclusive Cure of Souls within the limits of the same:

“ That all Fees and other Ecclesiastical Dues and Payments for Marriages and Burials and other Ecclesiastical Offices solemnized and performed as shall arise in respect of the Marriages of or Burials of inhabitants of the said District of Little Hallam shall belong and be payable to the Incumbent of the said Benefice of Kirk Hallam:

“ That the parishioners and inhabitants of the said District of Little Hallam shall not be entitled to Church Accommodation or to the Solemnization of Marriages in any other Church than the Church of All Saints, Kirk Hallam, nor shall they be entitled to the right of burial in any other Churchyard than the Churchyard belonging to the Parish Church of All Saints, Kirk Hallam, except so far as any person or persons, inhabitants of the said District of Little Hallam, may possess by Faculty or otherwise the exclusive use of any Pews orittings in any other Church or he

lawfully entitled to the right of sepulture in any other Churchyard or Burial Ground.

" CONSENTS.

" That pursuant to the directions contained in the said Pluralities Act the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a Scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him that the proposed alterations may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alterations in respect of Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Glebe Lands, Tithe Rent Charges and other Ecclesiastical Dues, Rates and Payments and in respect to Patronage and Rights to Pews may be made with justice to all parties interested, which Scheme, together with the Consents in writing of William Adlington, the Patron entitled to present to the Benefice of Kirk Hallam, (if the same were now vacant), The Reverend John Edward Dallimore, the Incumbent of the same Benefice, The Most Noble Henry John Brinsley, Duke of Rutland, the person entitled to present to the Benefice of Saint Mary, Ilkeston, (if the same were now vacant), and The Reverend Archibald William Bell, the Incumbent of the same Benefice, has been transmitted to Us for our consideration:

"1. There is in the County of Worcester and my Diocese of Worcester, the Vicarage of Ombersley, the Parish whereof lies adjacent to the Parish of Doverdale, and contains according

to the census of 1911 a population of 1,942 and the net annual value thereof is £300:

"2. In the same County and Diocese is the Rectory of Doverdale, the Parish whereof adjoins the said Parish of Ombersley, and contains according to the census of 1911 a population of 44 and the net annual value thereof is £182:

"3. It appears to me, that a certain District of the said Ecclesiastical Parish of Ombersley, being contiguous to the Ecclesiastical Parish of Doverdale may, under the provisions of the said Act of the 1st and 2nd Victoria, Chapter 106, and of the Act of the 2nd and 3rd years of the same Reign, Chapter 49, be advantageously separated from the said Ecclesiastical Parish of Ombersley and united to the said Parish of Doverdale:

"4. The Right Honourable Michael Edwin Marcus, Baron Sandys, is the Patron of the said Benefice of Ombersley, and Jane Catherine Mottram, of Woodfield, Ombersley, in the County of Worcester, Widow, is the Patron of the said Benefice of Doverdale:

"5. The Reverend John Webster is the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Ombersley, and the Reverend John Graham Barrow is the present Incumbent of the said Benefice of Doverdale.

"6. Pursuant to the directions contained in the 26th Section of the said Act, I, the said Bishop, have drawn up a Scheme in writing, appended to this Representation, describing the area or district of the Parish of Ombersley proposed to be annexed to the said Parish of Doverdale and the mode in which it appears to me the alteration may be best effected and how the changes consequent thereon in respect to Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Glebe Lands, Tithes, Dues, Rates and Payments and in respect of Patronage and Rights to Pews may be made with justice to all parties interested, and I do hereby submit the same to your Grace, together with the Consents in writing of the said Patrons and Incumbents, and in case you shall on full consideration and inquiry be satisfied therewith, I request that your Grace will be pleased to certify the same and the Consent of the Patrons thereto to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the Consents referred to in the said Representation are as follows:—

"SCHEME

"It is proposed to separate the following District from the Parish of Ombersley, in the County and Diocese of Worcester, and unite the same for Ecclesiastical purposes to the adjoining Parish of Doverdale, in the same County and Diocese:

"Such district shall consist of that portion of the said Parish of Ombersley which lies to the north of an imaginary line starting from the point in the western boundary of the Parish of Ombersley in the centre of the River Severn, which is opposite the stream which forms the north or north-western boundary of the field No. 349 on the Ordnance Map for the said Parish of Ombersley (Second Edition, 1903), and proceeds eastward to the exit of that stream into the River Severn, thence north-eastward along the centre of the said stream to the centre of Den's Lane, thence in an easterly direction along the centre of Den's Lane and along the centre of the road leading from Den's Lane to Battington Green until it

reaches the High Road from Worcester to Kidderminster, thence northward along the centre of the said High Road until it reaches the farm road known as Sytchampton Alford Lane, thence eastward along the centre of the said lane until it reaches the northern end of the eastern boundary of the Field No. 626 on the said Ordnance Map, thence southward along the eastern boundary of that field and thence eastward along the northern boundaries of the fields or enclosures Nos. 625 and 677 and 672 until it meets the western boundary of the said Parish of Doverdale, and such District is coloured pink on the annexed *Map*. The Inhabitants of the said District shall not in future be entitled to any accommodation in the Parish Church of Ombersley (except nevertheless any person or persons possessing a legal right by faculty or otherwise to any pew or sitting within the said Church and who may not be willing to relinquish or give up the same) and shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the said Parish Church of Ombersley, but shall be entitled to accommodation in the Parish Church of Doverdale and shall be liable, subject to the provisions of the Compulsory Church Rates Abolition Act, 1868, to the repairs of the said Church. The Incumbent of the Parish of Doverdale shall have the sole and exclusive Cure of Souls within the above-mentioned District:

"No alteration shall be made in the Patronage or endowments of either of the said Benefices."

"That the whole of the Tithe Rent-Charge arising out of land proposed to be separated from Milton otherwise Milton Abbots and added to the Parish of Maristow with the Chapel of Thrushelton annexed is to remain the property of the Incumbent of Milton otherwise Milton Abbots as heretofore, but the Incumbent of Milton otherwise Milton Abbots shall pay to the Incumbent of Maristow with the Chapel of Thrushelton annexed the clear yearly sum of £60:

WHEREAS by Section 16 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, as amended by the Pluralities Act, 1850, it is, amongst other things, enacted, “That whenever it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, with respect to his own Diocese, and whenever it shall be represented to him by the Bishop of any Diocese, or by the Bishops of any two Dioceses, that two or more Benefices, or that one or more Benefice or Benefices, and one or more Spiritual Sinecure Rectory or Rectories, Vicarage or Vicarages, in his or their Diocese or Dioceses, being either in the same Parish or contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population shall not exceed 1,500 persons, may, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one Benefice, the said Archbishop of the Province shall inquire into the circumstances of the case; and if on such Inquiry it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully made, and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that the Patron or Patrons of the said Benefices, Sinecure Rectory or Rectories, Vicarage or Vicarages respectively, is or are consenting thereto; such Consent being signified in writing under the hands of such Patron or Patrons, the said Archbishop shall, six weeks before certifying such Inquiry and Consent to His Majesty as hereinafter directed, cause, with respect to his own Diocese, a statement in writing of the facts, and in other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid Representation, to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the Church, or in some public and conspicuous place in each of such Benefices, Sinecure Rectories, or Vicarages, with notice to any person or persons interested that he, she, or they may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop against such union; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the said Archbishop shall certify the Inquiry and Consent aforesaid to His Majesty in Council; and thereupon it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting such Benefices, Sinecure Rectory or Rectories, Vicarage or Vicarages, into one Benefice, with Cure of Souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only; and it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to give directions for

regulating the course and succession in which the Patrons, if there be more than one Patron, shall present or nominate to such United Benefice, from time to time, as the same shall become vacant."

And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Cosmo Gordon, Lord Archbishop of York, hath, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a Certificate in writing, bearing date the 16th day of April, 1919, in the words and figures following:—

"The undersigned, Cosmo Gordon, Lord Archbishop of York, hereby states that it having appeared to him that the Benefice (being a Vicarage) of Ruswarp and the Benefice (being a Rectory) of Sneaton, both in the County and Diocese of York, might with advantage to the interests of Religion be united into one Benefice for Ecclesiastical purposes, under the Acts of Parliament of the 1st and 2nd years of the Reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 106, and of the 13th and 14th years of the same reign, Chapter 98, he made inquiries into the circumstances of the case, and that on such Inquiry it appeared to him that the said union might be usefully made, and that the said Benefices, if united, would not be of inconvenient extent, and that he therefore caused to be published, as required by the said first mentioned Act, a Statement in writing of the facts, with notice to any person or persons interested to show cause in writing within the time prescribed by the said Act against such union and that such time has expired without any reasonable notice having been shown to him:

"Wherefore the said Archbishop doth hereby, pursuant to the said first mentioned Act, certify to Your Majesty in Council the circumstances of the case respecting the said union appeared on the before mentioned Inquiry to be as follows:—

"That the said Vicarage and Rectory and the Benefices of the same are contiguous:

"That the aggregate population of the parishes of the said two Benefices according to the latest Returns of population made under the Authority of Parliament does not exceed 782 persons. The population of Ruswarp being 571 persons and the population of Sneaton being 211 persons:

"That the net yearly value of the Benefice of Ruswarp is £285 or thereabouts, and the net yearly value of the Benefice of Sneaton is £269 or thereabouts:

"That there is a Church belonging to each of the said two Benefices of Ruswarp and Sneaton sufficient for the accommodation of the Inhabitants thereof:

"That each of the said two Benefices has a house of Residence, and in case the proposed union of such Benefices should be carried into effect it is proposed that the Vicar of the United Benefice should use the Parsonage House of the Benefice of Ruswarp as the Parsonage House of the United Benefice, and that the Parsonage House of the Benefice of Sneaton shall either be let, or sold, or assigned as a Residence House for any Assistant Curate who may be licensed to the said United Parish:

"That the Patronage of the Benefice of Ruswarp is vested in Us the Archbishop of York aforesaid and our Successors and that

of the Benefice of Sneaton is vested in the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain and that they have signified their Consents to the union hereinbefore proposed:

"That the Reverend Leonard Faulconer Bury Knight, Clerk, M.A., is the present Vicar of the said Vicarage and Benefice of Ruswarp, and the Rectory and Benefice of Sneaton is now Vacant:

"That if the proposed union is carried into effect it is proposed that the Patronage or Right of Presentation to the said United Benefice of Ruswarp and Sneaton shall be vested jointly in the said Archbishop of York and Lord High Chancellor, who shall exercise the Right of Patronage as follows:—

"On the occasion of the next vacancy which shall occur after the taking effect of this Scheme the said Archbishop and his Successors shall be entitled to exercise the right of Presentation and on the occasion of the 2nd vacancy after the taking effect of this Scheme the Right of Presentation shall be exercised by the said Lord Chancellor and thereafter the said Archbishop and his Successors and the said Lord Chancellor shall exercise the Right of Patronage alternately, the said Archbishop having the right to exercise it for two turns to one turn exercised by the said Lord Chancellor and in that order:

"That if the proposed union is carried into effect the said United Benefice shall be known by the name of the Vicarage of Ruswarp with the Rectory of Sneaton:

"The said Inquiry and Consents are thus certified by the said Archbishop, to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may, by virtue of the said Acts issue an Order, if Your Majesty in Council shall so think fit, for uniting the said Benefices of Ruswarp and Sneaton into one Benefice, with Cure of Souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only.

"Cosmo Ebor."

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the Vicarage of Ruswarp, situate in the County and Diocese of York, and the Rectory of Sneaton, situate in the same County and Diocese, shall be united into one Benefice, with Cure of Souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only.

And His Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of His said Council, is further pleased to direct that the course and succession in which the respective Patrons for the time being shall present or nominate to the said Benefices, after the same shall be united into one Benefice and come to be holden by the same Incumbent, from time to time as the same shall become vacant, shall be as follows, that is to say: the said Archbishop or his Successor shall present or nominate on the first vacancy, the said Lord Chancellor or his Successor shall present or nominate on the second vacancy, and thereafter the first two turns of every set of three turns of presentation or nomination shall belong to and be exercised by the said Archbishop and his Successors and the third turn of every such set of three turns shall belong to and be exercised by the said Lord Chancellor and his Successors.

WHEREAS by Section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that "Whereas in some instances Tithings, Hamlets, Chapelries, and other Places or Districts may be separated from the Parishes or Mother Churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and Places altogether extra-parochial may, in some instances, with advantage be annexed to Parishes or Districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted Separate Parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own Diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any Diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop, that any such Tithing, Hamlet, Chapelry, Place or District within the Diocese of such Archbishop, or the Diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any Parish or Mother Church, and either be constituted a Separate Benefice by itself or be united to any other Parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining Tithing, Hamlet, Chapelry, Place, or District, Parochial or Extra-Parochial, so as to form a Separate Parish or Benefice, or that any Extra-Parochial Place may with advantage be annexed to any Parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a Separate Parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop, or Bishop, shall draw up a Scheme in writing (the Scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Glebe Lands, Tithes, Rent Charges, and other Ecclesiastical Dues, Rates and Payments, and in respect to Patronage and Rights to Pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the Patron or Patrons of the Benefice or Benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such Scheme, or to such modification thereof, as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such Scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such Consent as aforesaid, by his Report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such Scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend Herbert Louis, Lord Bishop of Newcastle, hath made a Representation, in writing, dated the 10th day of December, 1918, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Cosmo Gordon, Lord Archbishop of York, as follows:—

"We, the Right Reverend Herbert Louis, by Divine Permission Lord Bishop of Newcastle, do, in pursuance of an Act of Parliament of the 1st and 2nd years of the reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 106, hereby represent to your Grace as follows:—

"1. There is in the County of Northumberland and Diocese of Newcastle the Vicarage of Haltwhistle, the Parish whereof contains according to the last Census a population of

5,209. The net annual value of the Benefice of Haltwhistle is at present £773. The Patronage of the said Vicarage is vested in Us, the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Newcastle, and the Reverend Edward Barry Hicks is the present Vicar thereof:

"2. There is in the same County and Diocese the Vicarage of Lambley, the Parish whereof contains according to the last Census a population of 700. The net annual value of the Benefice of Lambley is at present £197. The Patronage of the said Vicarage is vested in Captain Guy Hunter Allgood, and the Reverend Charles Horatio Gulliver is the present Vicar thereof:

"3. It appears to us that under the provisions or the said Act of Parliament of the 1st and 2nd years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 106, and of another Act passed in the 2nd and 3rd years of the same reign, Chapter 49, the following alterations in the contents and boundaries of the above-mentioned Parishes may advantageously be made. The separation of a portion of the Parish of Haltwhistle, more particularly described in the Scheme hereunto annexed, from that Parish and the annexation of the same to the Parish of Lambley:

"4. Such alteration as aforesaid is in our opinion desirable owing to the fact that such portion of the Parish of Haltwhistle is nearer to the Parish Church to which it is proposed to annex the same by 5 miles than to the Parish Church of the Parish to which such portion now belongs, and such alteration will be for the convenience of the inhabitants thereof:

"5. Pursuant to the directions contained in the said 26th Section of the said first-mentioned Act of Parliament, We, the said Lord Bishop, have drawn up a Scheme in writing, annexed to this Representation, describing such portion of the said Parish of Haltwhistle above referred to and the mode in which it appears to us that such alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent thereupon in respect of Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Glebe Lands, Tithes, Tithe-Rent Charges, and other Ecclesiastical Dues and Payments, and in respect of Patronage and the Right to Pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested. And we do hereby submit the same to your Grace, together with the Consents in writing of the said Patrons and Incumbents, and in case you shall on full consideration and inquiry be satisfied therewith, we request that your Grace will be pleased to certify the same and the Consents aforesaid by your Report to His Majesty in Council.

And whereas the said Scheme, drawn up by the said Bishop, and the Consents referred to in the said Representation are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"It is proposed to separate a certain District known as the Township of Hartleyburn, in the County of Northumberland and Diocese of Newcastle, now part of the Parish of Haltwhistle, and more particularly described in the Schedule hereto, from that Parish and to annex the same for Ecclesiastical purposes to the Parish of Lambley, in the same County and Diocese:

"From and after the passing of any Order in Council carrying this Scheme into effect the Incumbent of the Parish of Lambley shall have exclusive Cure of Souls within the limits of the said District, now part of Haltwhistle, and the

fees for Marriages, Churchings and Burials, and other Ecclesiastical Dues, Offerings and Emoluments, including Tithe Rent-Charge, of which the commuted value is £25 3s. 4d., arising from the said District, shall thenceforth belong to the Incumbent of the Parish to which such District shall have been annexed:

"That no alteration shall be made as to the Patronage or (save as aforesaid) the endowments of either of the Parishes affected by this Scheme."

"SCHEDULE.

"All that portion of the Parish of Haltwhistle in the County of Northumberland and Diocese of Newcastle comprised within the whole of the Township of Hartleyburn, the boundaries of which Township are well known and defined.

"CONSENTS.

"We, Herbert Louis, by Divine Permission Lord Bishop of Newcastle, the Patron entitled to present to the Vicarage of Haltwhistle were the same now vacant, do hereby signify our Consent to the foregoing Representation and Scheme and to the several matters and things therein stated and proposed.

"In witness whereof we have hereunto set our hand this 1st day of November, 1918.

"I, Guy Hunter Allgood, the Patron entitled to present to the Vicarage of Lambley were the same now vacant, do hereby signify my Consent to the foregoing Representation and Scheme and to the several matters and things therein stated and proposed.

"I, Edward Barry Hicks, Clerk in Holy Orders, Vicar or Incumbent of the Parish and Parish Church of Haltwhistle do hereby signify my Consent to the foregoing Representation and Scheme and to the several matters and things therein stated and proposed.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 37, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property in the parish of Shipston-on-Stour in the county of Worcester now vested in us:

"Whereas under and by virtue of an Indenture bearing date the 29th day of September, 1863, and made between Richard Badger the younger of Shipston-on-Stour, in the county of Worcester, Gentleman, of the one part, and us, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the other part, certain lands tenements and hereditaments situate in the parish of Shipston-on-Stour aforesaid, shown within the green and pink verges on the Plan drawn on the said Indenture, and particularly described in the two Schedules thereto, became with their appurtenances and are now vested in us:

"And whereas the said lands tenements and hereditaments are not subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant but are now in our possession, but some portions thereof on account of their character or situation are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed:

" And whereas with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the same or of the proceeds thereof for the ultimate improvement of our common fund it is expedient that the said lands tenements and hereditaments or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit should be sold or disposed of and accordingly that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest in such lands tenements and hereditaments or in any part or parts thereof in such manner as shall appear to us advisable:

" Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell or dispose of and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands tenements and hereditaments so vested in us as aforesaid, under and by virtue of the said Indenture with their appurtenances and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein or in any part or parts thereof unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same and his or their heirs executors administrators or assigns or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable, it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time as occasion may arise in the purchase of other lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or hereditaments or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary Stock or other public securities in England.

" And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the Diocese of Worcester.

" We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, Chapter 134; of the Act of the 2nd and 3rd years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 49; and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 55, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Representation as to the assignment of a District Chapelry to the consecrated Church of Saint Mark, Talbot Village, situate in the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint Andrew, Kinson, in the County of Dorset and in the Diocese of Salisbury:

" Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a District Chapelry should be assigned to the said Church of Saint Mark, Talbot Village, situate as aforesaid:

" Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Frederic Edward, Bishop of Salisbury, (testified by his having signed and sealed this Representation), We, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said New Parish of Saint Andrew, Kinson, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the *map* or *plan* hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a District Chapelry to the said Church of Saint Mark, Talbot Village, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Mark, Talbot Village':

" And with the like consent of the said Frederic Edward, Bishop of Salisbury, (testified as aforesaid), We, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said Church of Saint Mark, Talbot Village, situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being; Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof:

" We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in your Royal Wisdom, shall seem meet:

" THE SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

" The District Chapelry of Saint Mark, Talbot Village, being:—

" All that part of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint Andrew, Kinson, in the County of Dorset and in the Diocese of Salisbury, which is bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the New Parish of Saint Clement, Branksome, in the said County and Diocese, from the said New Parish of Saint Andrew,

(b) $5\frac{1}{2}$ cables, 77° (S. 85° E. Mag.), from charted position of Riddock shoal buoy.

Two light-buoys, each exhibiting a *flashing white light every six seconds*, have been established in the following positions to mark the western side of the gateway:—

(1) 900 feet, 343° (N. 1° E. Mag.) from (a)

(2) 900 feet, 163° (S. 1° W. Mag.), from (a).

All vessels must pass to the eastward of these light-buoys.

The eastern side of the gateway is marked by a pole carrying a three-foot square shape.

Vessels without local knowledge are warned against attempting to pass through Clestron sound by night or in thick weather.
