The following Statute made by the Governing Body of New College, Oxford, on the 8th day of October, 1919, and sealed on the 11th day of November, 1919, has been submitted for the approval of His Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions of "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877."

STATUTE to alter and amend the Statutes framed by the Commissioners appointed under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, 40 and 41 Vict., cap. 48, and approved by the Queen in Council on the 3rd day of May, 1882, in relation to New College, in the University of Oxford, in the matter of "The Choir," such amending Statute being duly made at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College specially summoned for this purpose, held on the 8th day of October, 1919, and passed by the unanimous votes of those present and voting.

For Statute VII., "The Choir," substitute the following:—

"For the celebration of Divine Service in

the College as heretofore there shall be maintained by the College an Organist, and such a number of Chaplains in Holy Orders, Academical and Lay Clerks, and Choristers as shall from time to time be determined by the Warden and Fellows at any stated General Meeting. To provide for the stipends of the Organist, Chaplains, and Academical and Lay Clerks, for the education and maintenance of the Choristers, and for the other expenses of the Choir and Chapel services, there shall be set apart out of the general revenues of the College such a yearly sum of money as, with the benefactions of Dr. Woodward, Mr. Preston, and Dr. Bridle, which are applicable to the stipends of Chaplains and Lay Clerks, will make up a yearly sum of £1,250, and such a further yearly sum out of the general revenues of the College as may be necessary for these purposes, which shall not in any one year exceed £1,000 unless it shall be resolved by a Stated General Meeting, with the consent of the Visitor, that a greater sum is necessary.

"Any surplus of the said yearly sum which may from time to time remain unapplied after payment of the necessary expenses above mentioned shall form a fund for providing pensions

or gratuities on retirement for Chaplains and Lay Clerks, and for contributing to pensions for the Organist or the Schoolmaster.

"The Warden and Fellows may at any time, and from time to time, at any Stated General Meeting, appoint a Precentor for such period as they shall think fit.

"The appointment, removal, remuneration, and duties of the Chaplains, Academical and Lay Clerks, and Choristers, and of the Precentor, if any, shall be regulated by By-laws to be made by the Warden and Fellows at any Stated General Meeting, which By-laws may be repealed and altered from time to time in the same manner as other By-laws of the College. Until such By-laws shall have been made, the existing Statutes and Regulations relating to the appointment, removal, remuneration, and duties of the Chaplains, Lay Clerks, Choristers, and Precentor shall have the force of By-laws made under this clause."

Whereas We have deemed it expedient that a Commission should forthwith issue to consider the applications which have been made by the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge for financial assistance from the State and for this purpose to inquire into the financial resources of the Universities and of the Colleges and Halls therein, into the administration and application of those resources, into the government of the Universities, and into the relations of the Colleges and Halls to the Universities and to each other, and to make recommendations:

And for the better effecting the purposes of this Our Commission, We do by these Presents authorize you to sit in three Divisions or Committees to be styled respectively the Oxford Committee, the Cambridge Committee and the Committee on Estates Management; and consisting as to the Oxford Committee of you the said Herbert Henry Asquith (Chairman); Robert, Baron Chalmers; Sir John Allsebrook Simon; Thomas Banks Strong; Sir Henry Alexander Miers; William Henry Bragg; William George Stewart Adams; Emily Penrose and Albert Mansbridge; as to the Cambridge Committee of you the said Gerald William Balfour (Chairman); Arthur Henderson; Sir Walter Morley Fletcher; Sir Horace Darwin; George Macaulay Trevelyan; Hugh Kerr Anderson; Blanche Athena Clough; Montague Rhodes James and Arthur Schuster; and as to the Committee on Estates Management of you the said Rowland Edmund, Baron Ernle (Chairman); Edward Gerald Strutt; Sir Howard Frank; Sir John Hubert Oakley and Herbert Mansfield Cobb; and to allocate to the three said Divisions or Committees the duty of enquiring into such of the matters submitted for your consideration as you may deem expedient.

And We do by these Presents give and grant unto you full power to call before you or before any of the three Divisions or Committees such persons as you shall judge likely to afford you any information upon the subject of this Our Commission; and also to call for, have access to and examine all such books, documents, registers and records as may afford you the fullest information on the subject, and to inquire of and concerning the premises by all other lawful ways and means whatsoever.

And We do by these Presents authorize and empower you or any of you to visit and personally inspect such places as you may deem it expedient so to inspect for the more effectual carrying out of the purposes aforesaid.

And We do by these Presents will and ordain that this Our Commission shall continue in full force and virtue and that you, Our said Commissioners, may from time to time proceed in the execution thereof, and of every matter and thing therein contained, although the same be not continued from time to time by adjournment.

Provided that the powers and privileges hereinbefore conferred on you shall belong to, and may be exercised by, any three or more of you in Committee or by any seven or more of you if acting jointly.

And We do further ordain that you, or any seven or more of you, have liberty to report your proceedings under this Our Commission from time to time if you shall judge it expedient so to do.

And Our further will and pleasure is that you do, with as little delay as possible, report to Us under your hands and seals, or under the hands and seals of any seven or more of you, your opinion upon the matters herein submitted for your consideration.

MATRIMONIAL CAUSES (DOMINIONS
TROOPS) ACT, 1919.

(9 & 10 Geo. V., Chapter 28.)

The Matrimonial Causes (Dominions Troops) Act, 1919, which received His Majesty's assent on 22nd July, provided that, where a marriage had been contracted in the United Kingdom during the war by a member of His Majesty's Forces domiciled in any of the Oversea Dominions to which the Act applied, the competent Court in that part of the United Kingdom where the marriage took place should, any question of domicile or residence notwithstanding, have full jurisdiction and power to deal with certain classes of matrimonial proceedings, including divorce, which were specified in detail in the schedule to the Act.

It was further provided that the Act should apply to any of the self-governing Dominions (i.e., the Dominion of Canada, the Commonwealth of Australia, the Dominion of New Zealand, the Union of South Africa and Newfoundland) as from such date as might be prescribed by the Legislature of that Dominion in any declaration or enactment which might be passed applying the Act to such Dominion.

A telegram has now been received by the Secretary of State for the Colonies from the Governor-General of New Zealand in the following terms:—

“Matrimonial Causes Dominion Troops Bill has been passed in the New Zealand Legislature and received my assent on 5th November, 1919.

LIVERPOOL.”

It is understood from this telegram that the necessary action has been taken in New Zealand to apply the Matrimonial Causes (Dominions Troops) Act, 1919, to New Zealand as from November 5th, 1919.

The Secretary of State for the Colonies has been informed by the Governor-General of

the Union of South Africa that the Union Government do not consider it necessary to introduce legislation applying the Act to the Union of South Africa. No intimation has yet been received of the decision of the Governments of the Dominion of Canada, the Commonwealth of Australia and Newfoundland.

TRADE BOARDS ACTS, 1909 AND 1918. LAUNDRY TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established in Great Britain under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Laundry Trade as specified in the Trade Boards (Laundry) Order, 1919, having given due notice, on the 16th July, 1919, of proposal to fix General Minimum Time Rates, Overtime Rates, Guaranteed Time Rates and Piece Work Basis Time Rates for Female Workers, have given notice that they have fixed General Minimum Time Rates, Overtime Rates, Guaranteed Time Rates and Piece Work Basis Time Rates for Female Workers, the Minimum

Rates as fixed being as shown in the Schedule set out below:—

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

Minimum Rates of Wages for Female Workers other than those Specified in Part II. of this Schedule.

Section I.

General Minimum Time Rates.

(a) Workers under 15 years of age, 12s. per week.

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 15s. per week.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 19s. per week.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 23s. per week.

Workers of 18 years of age and over, 28s. per week.

(b) The minimum rates applicable in the case of workers of 16 and under 18 years of age entering the Laundry trade for the first time shall be, for the first six months of employment, 3s. per week less than the minimum rates applicable under the above scale.

(c) The minimum rates applicable in the case of workers of 18 years of age and over entering the Laundry trade for the first time shall be, for the first six months of their employment, 4s. per week less than the minimum rate applicable under the above scale.

Section II.

Piece Work Basis Time Rate.

The Piece Work Basis Time Rate shall be 8½d. per hour, that is to say, in cases where a worker is employed on piece work, each piece rate paid shall be sufficient to yield in the circumstances of the case not less than 8½d. an hour to an ordinary worker.

Section III.

Guaranteed Time Rates for Piece Workers.

The guaranteed time rates for piece workers to apply in the case of workers employed on piece work for the purpose of securing to such workers a minimum rate of remuneration on a time work basis shall be as follows, that is to say:—

Guaranteed Time Rate.

Workers under 15 years of age, 12s. per week.

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 15s. per week.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 17s. per week.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 21s. per week.

Workers of 18 years of age and over, 24s. per week.

A piece worker shall be entitled to be paid not less than the minimum rate applicable to a worker of her age as set out above in any case where her earnings on piece work are less than such sum, subject to the deductions allowed under the provisions of Section IV. of Part I. of this Schedule.

Section IV.

The above General Minimum Time Rates and Guaranteed Time Rates for Piece Workers are for a week not exceeding 48 hours, and save as provided in Part III. hereof, no deductions shall be made from such rates where the number

of hours worked in any week is less than 48, except:—

(a) Where the worker is absent without the permission of the employer, or at her own request, or in order to comply with an obligation imposed by law, or through being incapacitated from work by illness or other cause, or during any customary local holidays.

(b) Where, at her own desire, it is agreed that any worker shall be regularly employed for a less period than the full working week of the Laundry.

(c) Where, in pursuance of an agreement made in writing between an employer and the workers affected (and registered with the Trade Board), it is provided that by reason of seasonal trade, or for any cause not within the control of the employer, short time is regularly to be worked for any period commencing not less than seven days after the date of such agreement.

(d) Where in any week a worker is required to stand off for not less than a quarter of the normal working week of the Laundry by reason of a stoppage of work caused by a breakdown in machinery, a stoppage in supplies of water, gas, electric current or fuel, a general breakdown in transport services or other similar emergency over which the employer has no control. Provided that this clause shall not operate until the expiration of at least seven days from the date on which notice so to stand off is given to the worker by the employer.

In such cases a proportionate deduction may be made according as the number of hours worked is less than the full working week of the Laundry when not on short time.

Provided that for the purpose of calculating the proportionate deduction under the provisions of the foregoing clause, no deduction shall be made in respect of absence from work on any day allowed as a holiday under the provisions of Section 35 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, except where in any week in which such holiday occurs the worker, without reasonable and sufficient cause, absents herself for more than two hours during the period in which she had the opportunity of working.

Section V.

Overtime Rates for Time-Workers.

The overtime rates for time-workers shall be as follows:—

Overtime Rate.

(a) Workers under 15 years of age, 3½d. per hour.

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 4½d. per hour.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 6d. per hour.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 7½d. per hour.

Workers of 18 years of age and over, 8½d. per hour.

(b) The normal number of hours of work per week is hereby declared to be 48, and the above overtime rates shall be payable in respect of all time worked in any week in excess of 48.

(c) The normal number of hours of work on Saturday (or the weekly short day substituted therefor under Section 43 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901) is hereby declared to be five, and the above overtime

rates shall be payable in respect of time worked on such day in excess of five hours (so far as is allowed under the Factory and Workshop Acts) notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

(d) The overtime rates shall not apply to pieceworkers.

PART II.

General Minimum Rates of Wages for Female Workers specially Employed for Emergency Work or Whose Employment is of a Casual Nature.

Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained, the following shall be the time-rates for workers who are specially employed for emergency work or whose employment is of a casual nature.

Section I.

General Minimum Time-Rates.

For female workers under 18 years, 7d. per hour.

For female workers of 18 years of age and over, 7½d. per hour.

Section II.

Piecework Basis Time-Rate.

The piecework basis time-rate shall be 9d. per hour, that is to say, in cases where a worker is employed on piecework each piece-rate paid shall be sufficient to yield in the circumstances of the case not less than 9d. an hour to an ordinary worker.

Section III.

Overtime Rates.

(a) Subject to the provisions of Sub-section (c) of this Section, the overtime rates for time-workers comprised within Part II. of this Schedule shall be as follows:—

Workers under 18 years of age, 8½d. per hour.

Workers of 18 years of age and over, 9½d. per hour.

(b) Subject to the provisions of Sub-section (c) of this Section, the normal number of hours of work in the trade shall be the same as for workers comprised within Part I. of this Schedule, and the overtime rates set out in Sub-section (a) of this Section shall be payable in respect of time worked in excess of such normal number of hours.

(c) Where an Exemption Order under Section 150 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, is in operation providing for the working of longer hours than those otherwise allowed, the normal number of hours of work on Saturday and on Sunday shall be deemed to be nine, and all time worked in excess of such normal number of hours shall be paid for at the rate of time-and-a-half. Provided that in cases where a worker has worked 48 hours in the week prior to mid-day on Saturday, all time worked after mid-day on Saturday shall be paid for at the rate of time-and-a-half, and all time worked on Sunday shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

(d) The overtime rates shall not apply to pieceworkers.

The Trade Board have further given notice that they have received notification from the Minister of Labour that he has made an Order dated 12th November, 1919, under Section 4 (2) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, confirming the above minimum rates of wages as fixed by the Trade Board and specifying 24th Novem-

ber, 1919, as the date from which such minimum rates of wages shall become effective.

In accordance with the Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established under that Act for that branch of the Paper Box Trade in Great Britain which is engaged in the making of boxes or parts thereof made wholly or partially of paper, cardboard, chip or similar material, having given due notice on 7th August, 1919, of Proposal to Vary, as therein shown, the rates as set out in the Notice varying minimum rates dated 16th December, 1918, have given Notice that they have Varied the General Minimum Time Rates so previously Varied by them on 16th December, 1918, for Female Workers from 5½d. to 8d. per hour, and for Male Workers from 9d. to 1s. 1½d. per hour, with corresponding Variations in the General Minimum Time Rates fixed for younger Female and Male Workers.

The Trade Board have given similar Notice that they have fixed piece work basis time rates for Female Workers of 8½d. per hour and for Male Workers of 1s. 3½d. per hour.

The Trade Board have further given Notice that they have received notification from the Minister of Labour that he has made an Order dated 12th November, 1919, under Section 4 (2) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, confirming the above minimum rates of wages as varied and fixed by the Trade Board and specifying 17th November, 1919, as the date from which such minimum rates of wages shall become effective.

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FIXED FOR MALE
WORKERS EFFECTIVE AS FROM 17TH
NOVEMBER, 1919.*

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by

the Minister of Labour and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, in Great Britain, for the Branches of the Trade specified in the Trade Boards (Boot and Shoe Repairing) Order, 1919, having given due notice on 11th August, 1919, of Proposal to fix General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for Male Workers, hereby give notice, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they have fixed General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for Male Workers, and have declared the normal number of hours of work in the trade for the purpose of the application of the Overtime Rates, and that the Minimum Rates as fixed are shown in the Schedule set out below, which is incorporated herewith.

And the Trade Board further give notice that they have received notification from the Minister of Labour that he has made an Order, dated 12th November, 1919, under Section 4 (2) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, confirming the rates as fixed by the Trade Board and specifying 17th November, 1919,* as the date from which such Minimum Rates shall become effective.

*NOTE.—Should this date, however, not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer at intervals not exceeding Seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in no case later than 23rd November, 1919.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.—GENERAL MINIMUM TIME RATES.

1. For workers of 21 years of age and upwards, 6s. per week of 48 hours.
2. For workers of 20 years and under 21 years of age, 4s. per week of 48 hours.
3. For workers of 19 years and under 20 years of age, 3s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.
4. For workers of 18 years and under 19 years of age 3s. per week of 48 hours.
5. For workers of 17 years and under 18 years of age, 2s. per week of 48 hours.
6. For workers of 16 years and under 17 years of age, 2s. per week of 48 hours.

The above rates are weekly rates based on a week of 48 hours, but they shall be subject to a proportionate deduction according as the number of hours actually spent in the factory or workshop in any week is less than 48.

PART II.—OVERTIME RATES (ALL AGES).

The minimum Rates for Overtime to apply in respect of hours worked by a worker whether engaged on Time-work or on Piece-work in excess of the declared normal number of hours (set out below) shall be as follows, that is to say:—

(1) For the first two hours Overtime on any day, except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to *time and a quarter*, that is to say, one and a quarter times the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

(2) For Overtime after the first two hours of Overtime on any day, except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to *time and a half*, that is to say, one and a half times the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

(3) For all time worked on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the

Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to *double time*, that is to say, twice the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

In accordance with Section 3 (i) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board declare the normal number of hours of work to be as follows:—

In any week	48
On Saturday	4
On Monday	8
On any other Week-day	9

Provided that any other day not being Sunday, may be by agreement in writing between an employer and a worker substituted in place of Saturday as the weekly short day, and in such case the normal number of hours on such substituted day shall be 4, and the normal number of hours on Saturday shall be 9.

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

The above-mentioned provisions shall not prejudice a worker's claim to a Saturday half-holiday where it is now given.

Provided that where it is or may become the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on five days a week, the Overtime Rates set out in sub-paragraphs (1) and (2) above shall be payable in respect of

- (a) all employment on a Saturday;
- (b) all employment in excess of 10 hours on a Friday or on one other day in each week (not being Saturday) as may be agreed between the employer and the worker;
- (c) all employment on any other week-day in excess of 9½ hours.

But in the application of this Proviso, where the employer requires attendance on any day on which it is not the established practice of the employer to require attendance all time worked on such day shall be paid for at time and a quarter for the first two hours and time and a half thereafter.

PART III.

The above minimum rates of wages shall apply subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts to all Workers in Great Britain who are employed during the whole or any part of their time in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Boot and Shoe Repairing) Order, 1919, that is to say, the repairing wherever carried on, of boots, shoes, slippers, and all kinds of leather footwear, *including* the making of bespoke handsewn, riveted or pegged leather footwear, but *excluding* the manufacture of leather footwear on a large scale, the repairing of saddlery and leather goods other than leather footwear and the retailing of leather footwear.

Provided that the above minimum rates shall not apply to Indentured Apprentices who were indentured prior to the 21st October, 1919.

PART IV.

Section I.

The above minimum rates of wages shall be paid, clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

Section II.

The above minimum rates of wages are with out prejudice to workers earning higher rates of wages.

ORDER OF THE SECRETARY OF STATE UNDER THE AIR NAVIGATION ACTS, 1911 to 1919.

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the Air Navigation Acts, 1911 to 1919, and all other powers enabling me in that behalf, I, The Right Honourable Winston Spencer Churchill, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by Order, make the following regulations amending the Air Navigation Regulations, 1919.

1. Regulation 1 of the Air Navigation Regulations, 1919, shall have effect as though the following provisions were substituted for subsection (7) thereof:—

(7) The aircraft shall not land in any prohibited area as defined by this Regulation, and shall not fly over such area at a lower altitude than six thousand feet.

Osea Island.—Three statute miles in all directions from the centre of Osea Island.

Sheerness.—Three statute miles in all directions from Garrison Point excluding Grain aerodrome and all land belonging thereto.

Chatham.—Three statute miles in all directions from Hoo Church.

Dover.—Three statute miles in all directions from Dover Castle.

Portsmouth.—Two and a half statute miles in all directions from Dockyard Clock Tower.

Poole Harbour.—Three statute miles in all directions from Lychett Minster Church.

Remuneration of Public Vaccinators.

THE VACCINATION ORDER, 1919.

To the Board of Guardians of every Poor Law Union in England and Wales;—

To the Public Vaccinators of the several Vaccination Districts in England and Wales;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

Whereas by Section 6 of the Vaccination Act, 1898, the Minister of Health, as successor to the Local Government Board, is empowered to make rules and regulations with respect to the remuneration of public vaccinators:

Now, therefore, the Minister of Health, in pursuance of the power conferred upon him by that Act, and of all other powers enabling him in that behalf, by this Order makes the following Regulations:—

ARTICLE I.—This Order may be cited as "The Vaccination Order, 1919," and shall come into force on the First day of December, 1919.

ARTICLE II.—Notwithstanding anything in the Vaccination Order, 1898, as amended by any subsequent Order, the payment to be made to a Public Vaccinator in pursuance of a contract for public vaccination (other than a contract with a Medical Officer of a Workhouse for the vaccination of the persons resident therein), in respect of each case of successful vaccination performed by him at the home of the person vaccinated, shall be a sum of not less than five shillings, and the said Order shall be read and construed accordingly.

ARTICLE III.—Any Contract made with a Public Vaccinator for public vaccination (other than a contract with the Medical Officer of a Workhouse for the vaccination of the persons resident therein) which is in force at the commencement of this Order, and which provides for payment in respect of each case of successful vaccination as aforesaid of a sum of less than five shillings, shall be varied by the substitution of five shillings for such lesser sum.

Public Health (Regulations as to Food) Act, 1907: Regulations as to Shell-fish.

PORT OF EXETER.

To the Exeter Port Sanitary Authority;

And to all others whom it may concern.

Whereas by an Order of the Local Government Board, dated the 9th day of June, 1888, a Joint Board, termed the Exeter Port Sanitary Authority, was permanently constituted the Port Sanitary Authority for the part of the Port of Exeter therein described;

And whereas it appears to the Minister of Health that danger arises to public health from the consumption of shell-fish derived from within the District of the said Port Sanitary Authority, and for the prevention of danger arising to public health it is expedient that the Regulations hereinafter set forth be made in relation to shell-fish:

Now, therefore, the Minister of Health, in the exercise of the powers conferred upon him by the Public Health Act, 1875, the Public Health Act, 1896, and the Public Health (Regulations as to Food) Act, 1907, and of every other power enabling him in that behalf, hereby makes the following Regulations, that is to say:—

ARTICLE I.—In these Regulations, unless the contrary intention appears,—

(1) The expression "the Minister" means the Minister of Health;

(2) The expression "Port Sanitary Authority" means the Exeter Port Sanitary Authority;

(3) The expression "District" means the District for which the Exeter Port Sanitary Authority was constituted;

(4) The expression "Port Medical Officer" includes the Medical Officer of Health for the District, and any legally qualified medical practitioner appointed or employed by the Port Sanitary Authority to act in the execution of these Regulations:

ARTICLE II.—These Regulations shall be executed and enforced by the Port Sanitary Authority, and the Port Medical Officer shall make all such inquiries and inspections, whether within or without the limits of jurisdiction of the Port Sanitary Authority, as may be necessary to secure that all the provisions of these Regulations are strictly complied with.

ARTICLE III.—A person shall not, on and after the 1st day of December, 1919, sell, distribute, or offer for sale for human consumption any mussels or other shell-fish taken from within the District—

(a) (i) Unless such shell-fish have been taken from places in the District which the Minister may from time to time specify; and

(ii) Until such shell-fish have been subjected to a process of cleansing which the Minister, after consultation with the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, has approved; or

(b) Unless and until such shell-fish have been subjected to a process of sterilization by steaming under pressure in a suitable apparatus for at least six minutes. The sterilization shall be carried out in a manner and at a place in the District approved by the Port Medical Officer, subject to the concurrence of the Minister or of his representative.

ARTICLE IV.—(1) The Port Sanitary Authority may with the consent of the Minister appoint and pay a legally qualified medical practitioner to act in the execution of these Regulations.

(2) The Port Sanitary Authority may also, with the consent of the Minister, appoint or employ and pay a person to act, under the direction of the Port Medical Officer, in the execution of any such powers or in the discharge of any such duties of the Port Medical Officer under these Regulations as the Port Sanitary Authority assign to the person so appointed.

ARTICLE V.—Within the period of fourteen days after the date of these Regulations or within such further period as the Minister may allow, the Port Sanitary Authority shall cause these Regulations to be published in one or more local newspapers circulating in the District, and shall take such other steps as they may think necessary to bring them to the notice of persons interested.

ARTICLE VI.—These Regulations may be cited as "The Exeter (Shell-fish) Regulations, 1919."

The Minister of Health further certifies, in pursuance of Section 2 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, that on account of urgency the foregoing Regulations shall come into immediate operation, and accordingly Orders that these Regulations shall come into force forthwith as Provisional Regulations.

NOTICE.—The Public Health Act, 1896, provides by Sub-section 3 of Section 1 that if any person wilfully neglects or refuses to obey or carry out, or obstructs the execution of any regulation made under any of the enactments mentioned in that Act he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds, and, in the case of a continuing offence, to a further penalty not exceeding fifty pounds for every day during which the offence continues.

The power of making regulations under the Public Health Act, 1896, and the enactments mentioned in that Act is enlarged by the Public Health (Regulations as to Food) Act, 1907.

Notice is hereby given, pursuant to Section 8 (2) of the Ministry of Health Act, 1919, that it is proposed, at the expiration of thirty days on which each House of Parliament has sat, and subject to the approval of Parliament, to submit to His Majesty in Council an Order under sub-sections (2) (b) and (4) of Section 3 of the Act providing for the transfer to the Minister of Health of certain powers and duties of the Secretary of State under the enactments relating to lunacy and mental deficiency.

Modification of Orders.

1. The Warwickshire and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1919 (No. 9, and the Warwickshire and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1919 (No. 12), are modified in manner hereinafter appearing.

Movement out of the Scheduled District (except the Prohibited Area) for immediate slaughter only.

2. From and after the commencement of this Order cattle may be moved from any premises in the Scheduled District which are not in the Prohibited Area to any slaughterhouse in Great Britain, which is not in a Scheduled District for the purpose of any Order of the Board relating to Foot-and-Mouth Disease, subject to and in accordance with the following conditions:—

(i) The cattle shall be accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the premises from which the cattle are to be moved are situate.

(ii) The cattle shall be consigned by rail from a railway station in the Scheduled District which is not in the Prohibited Area, and shall be moved by rail as far as is practicable direct to the slaughterhouse specified in the Licence, where they shall be slaughtered within forty-eight hours after arrival thereat.

(iii) The cattle shall, before the movement is commenced, be marked by or at the expense of the owner, by the stamping of a cross, six inches in extent, on both sides of each of the cattle, with the following composition:—Rosin, five parts; oil of turpentine, two parts; and red ochre, one part; melted and used warm; or with some other adhesive composition of a red colour.

Provision as to Movement Licences.

3. (1) A Movement Licence under this Order shall not be granted by an Inspector of a Local Authority unless he is satisfied that the proposed movement will not involve movement on a road which is in the Prohibited Area.

(2) The Licence shall forthwith, after completion of the movement, be delivered up to an officer of the Local Authority or be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District by the person in charge of the animals at the time of completing the movement.

(3) A Movement Licence granted under this Order, except where it is otherwise expressly authorized by this Order, shall be in force for four days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall be in the form set forth in the Second Schedule to the Warwickshire and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1919 (No. 10), or to the like effect.

(4.) A copy of a Licence which authorises movement to premises in a District other than the District for which the person granting the Licence acts as Inspector shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Local Authority of the District in which the place of destination is situate.

Saving for Orders and Regulations.

4. Movement of animals under this Order is subject to any Regulation made by a Local Authority under any Order of the Board for prohibiting or regulating the movement of animals.

Production of Licences, Names and Addresses.

5. (1) Any person in charge of an animal being moved under this Order shall, on demand

of a Justice or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Licence necessary for the movement, and shall allow it to be read, and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Offences.

6. (1) If a person in charge of an animal being moved with a Licence under this Order on demand made under this Order fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2) If any person with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order by washing, or in any other manner takes out, effaces or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface or obliterate, any mark painted on any cattle as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the cattle, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts

and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Commencement.



ORDER OF 1919.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

PART I.

Prohibition of Movement of Dogs out of certain District.

1.—(1.) No dog shall be moved out of the District described in the Schedule hereto, hereinafter referred to as "the Scheduled District," unless it is accompanied by a licence of the Board authorising such movement signed by an Officer of the Board, and any such licence may be subject to such conditions as to the detention and isolation of the dog or otherwise as the Board may think necessary or desirable and shall be specified in the licence: Provided that this Article shall not apply to—

(a) the movement of a dog under a licence granted by the Board under the Importation of Dogs Order of 1914 and the Importation of Dogs (Amendment) Order of 1918 (No. 2) to a port in Great Britain for shipment, or to a place of detention for the purpose of detention and isolation; or

(b) the movement of a dog through the Scheduled District by railway from a place outside the District to another place outside the District without unnecessary delay and without being re-booked within the District.

(2.) If any farm (except any detached part) is partly within and partly without the Scheduled District, the whole shall be deemed to be within the Scheduled District.

Seizure of Dogs in case of Default.

2.—(1.) If a dog has been moved in contravention of this Order or having been moved with a licence under this Order is not detained and isolated or otherwise dealt with as required by the conditions of the licence an Inspector of the Board may seize the dog, and thereupon the Board shall detain and isolate it at the place of detention specified in the licence (if any) or any other place of detention selected by them for such time as the Board think necessary or expedient.

(2.) If the owner of the dog does not, within ten days after the expiration of the period of detention specified in the licence (if any) or such other period as the Board may think necessary or expedient and notify to the owner, claim the dog from the Board and pay to them their expenses of detaining and isolating the dog, the Board may destroy or otherwise disposed of the dog as they think expedient.

Notice of Detention in case of Illegal Movement.

3.—(1.) Where an Inspector or other Officer of the Board, or of a Local Authority, has reason to believe that a dog has been moved in contravention of this Order he may give notice to the owner or person in charge of the dog requiring that the dog shall be detained and isolated in accordance with the provisions of such notice, and that within a time specified in such notice, the dog shall be moved to a place of detention for the purpose of such detention and isolation.

(2.) Such provisions may be inserted in the notice as the Board may think necessary or desirable for any of the following purposes, namely:—

(i) For prescribing and regulating the detention and isolation of the dog.

(ii) For prescribing the person by whom and the premises on which the dog shall be detained and isolated.

(iii) For regulating the movement of the dog to the place of detention.

(iv) For prescribing the confinement of the dog in a suitable hamper, crate, box, or other receptacle, or the muzzling of the dog, during its movement by railway, or along a highway or thoroughfare.

(v) For prescribing the mode of isolation of the dog.

(vi) For prescribing the notice to be given of the death or loss of the dog, or of any matter arising in connection with the movement, detention, or isolation of the dog, and the persons by whom and to whom the notice is to be given; and

(vii) For prescribing the production of the notice for inspection by an officer of the Board, or police constable, or officer of the Local Authority.

(3.) The operation of a notice under this Article may be terminated by notice to that effect given by an Inspector or other Officer of the Board or of the Local Authority to the owner or person in charge of the dog, on proof to the satisfaction of the Inspector or Officer that the dog was not moved in contravention of the said Order.

(4.) If the owner or person in charge of the dog, after receipt of such notice, fails to move the dog as required by the notice, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(5.) If the provisions inserted in any notice under this Article are not complied with, the owner of the dog and the person in charge of the dog and any person who being required to comply with any such provision fails to do so, shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

PART II.

Control of Dogs in Scheduled District.

4.—(1.) A dog in the Scheduled District shall at all times:—

(a) whilst in or on any public place be efficiently muzzled with an effective wire cage muzzle;

(b) whilst in or on any other place, be kept under control by being—

(i) confined in a kennel or other enclosure from which the dog cannot escape; or

(ii) secured to some premises by a collar and chain; or

(iii) efficiently muzzled with an effective wire cage muzzle; or

(iv) accompanied by the owner or some person deputed by him and under effectual control.

(2.) The provisions of this Article shall not apply to—

(a) any pack of hounds while being exercised under the supervision of two or more competent attendants; or

(b) any dog in charge of a competent person while being used for sporting purposes, or for the capture or destruction of vermin, or for the driving or tending of cattle or sheep; or

(c) any dog confined in a suitable hamper, crate, box, or other receptacle, so constructed as to render it impossible for such dog while so confined to bite any person or animal.

Seizure, Detention, and Disposal of Uncontrolled Dogs.

5.—(1.) Any dog in the Scheduled District which is not muzzled, or kept under control, as prescribed by this Order, may be seized by the Local Authority or by the police, and any dog so seized shall be dealt with by the Local Authority as follows:—

(i) If the dog is diseased or suspected, or has been bitten by a diseased or suspected dog, it shall be forthwith slaughtered.

(ii) If the dog has been exposed to the infection of rabies it shall be detained, slaughtered, or otherwise dealt with as the Local Authority think expedient, but so that the dog shall not, while detained by the Local Authority, be allowed to come in contact with any other animal.

(iii) In any other case the dog shall be treated as a stray dog seized under the powers conferred by section three of the Dogs Act, 1906.

(2.) No dog so seized shall be given or sold for the purposes of vivisection.

(3.) Every dog shall, for the purposes of this Article, be deemed to have been exposed to the infection of rabies which has been in the same shed, stable, building, kennel, field, or other place, or otherwise in contact with any diseased or suspected dog, or which has in any other way been exposed to the infection of rabies.

Prohibitions of Holding of Exhibitions or Shows of Dogs in Scheduled District.

6.—No exhibition or show of dogs whether for sale or otherwise shall be held in the Scheduled District except with a licence of the Board, and any such licence shall be subject to such conditions as the Board may think necessary or desirable, and shall specify in the licence.

PART III.

GENERAL.

Offences.

7.—(1.) If a dog is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the dog, and the

person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the dog, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the dog is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If any dog in the Scheduled District is not muzzled, or kept under control, as prescribed by this Order, the owner of the dog, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(3.) If a dog which is being moved or has been moved with a licence under this Order is not muzzled or confined or is not detained and isolated or otherwise dealt with as required by the conditions of the licence, the owner of the dog, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(4.) If any person holds or causes or permits to be held, any exhibition or show in contravention of this Order, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(5.) If a person with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order or of the conditions of a licence under this Order, allows a dog to stray, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(6.) If the owner or person in charge of a dog fails to give, produce, or do any notice, licence, or thing which by this Order, or by the conditions of a licence thereunder, he is required to give, produce, or do, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

8.—In this Order—

“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act 1894.

“Disease” means rabies, “diseased” means affected with rabies, and “suspected” means suspected of rabies.

“Public place” includes any street, highway, thoroughfare, public bridge, royal park, public park, garden or pleasure ground, common, unenclosed land, or other place to which the public have for the time being access.

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Rabies Order of 1919.

Local Authority to Enforce Order.

9.—The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Commencement.

10. This Order shall come into operation on the seventeenth day of November, nineteen hundred and nineteen: Provided that until the nineteenth day of that month a dog in or on any public place in the Scheduled District need not be muzzled if it is led by a person with a collar and chain or other attachment.

11. This Order may be cited as the Bucking-





Extending Time for operation of Section 124
of the Wimbledon Corporation Act, 1914.

EASTERN VALLEYS (MONMOUTHSHIRE) JOINT SEWERAGE DISTRICT.

To the Eastern Valleys (Monmouthshire) Joint Sewerage Board;—
And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by virtue of Article XV of the Eastern Valleys (Monmouthshire) Joint Sewerage Order, 1912 (hereinafter referred to as "the Order of 1912"), which was duly confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Order Confirmation (No. 13) Act, 1912, of Section 3 of the Eastern Valleys (Monmouthshire) Joint Sewerage Board Act, 1915, and of Orders dated the 25th day of March, 1918, and the 28th day of February, 1919, issued by the Local Government Board, under Section 1 of the Special Acts (Extension of Time) Act, 1915, the period within which the Eastern Valleys (Monmouthshire) Joint Sewerage Board (hereinafter referred to as "the Joint Sewerage Board") are empowered and required to apply to Parliament for the powers mentioned in the said Article will expire at the end of two years from the conclusion of the Session of 1918:

1. To authorize the Corporation to make, maintain, alter, enlarge, extend, deepen, repair, reconstruct and use or discontinue the works in this paragraph described, or some or one of them or some part or parts thereof respectively (which works are hereinafter referred to as "the new works"), that is to say:—
In the county of Brecknock—

Work No. 1.—An impounding reservoir (to be called "the Caerfanell Reservoir") in the parishes of Llanfigan and Llanddettty, in the rural district of Brecknock, to be formed by means of a dam across the stream known as Caerfanell, above the bridge known as Pont Rhyd-y-bine, which dam will commence in the property numbered on the Ordnance Map (Scale $\frac{1}{2500}$ 2nd edition) (hereinafter referred to as "the Map"), 1425, in the said parish of Llanfigan, at or near a point 73 yards north-westwards from the north-western corner of the building known as Ffynodau, and will terminate in the property numbered on the Map 804, in the said parish of Llanddettty, at or near a point 73 yards south-eastwards from the north-western corner of that property, such reservoir extending from the aforesaid dam in a southerly direction up the Glyn Collwr to a point in the Caerfanell stream 767 yards or thereabouts north-eastwards from the

easternmost corner of the building known as Capel Glyn-collwn.

Work No. 2.—A road, being a diversion of the public road between Talybont and Torpantau Railway Station, commencing in the said public road at or near the junction therewith of the road leading to the building known as Rhyd-y-bine, and terminating in the said public road at or near a point 415 yards south-westwards from the southernmost corner of the building known as Pwll-Ifor.

In the counties of Brecknock and Monmouth—

Work No. 5.—An aqueduct (consisting of a conduit or line or lines of pipes) commencing in the intended Caerfanell Reservoir at or near a point in the inclosure numbered on the Map 1418, in the parish of Llanfigan, 150 yards or thereabouts south-eastwards from the south-eastern corner of the said building known as Ffynodau, and terminating in the intended reservoir (Work No. 7) hereinafter described, which aqueduct will be situated in the parishes of Llanfigan and Llanddettty in the rural district of Brecknock and Llangynidr, Llangattock and Llanely in the rural district of Crickhowell, all in the county of Brecknock and in the parishes of Llanwenarth Ultra, Llanfoist, Llanelen (otherwise Llanellan), and Llanover in the rural district of Abergavenny, Goytre, Mamlhad, and Llanfrechfa Lower (otherwise Lower Llanvrechva) in the rural district of Pontypool, Llanvihangel-Pontymoill and Panteg (otherwise Pantegague) in the urban district of Panteg and Llanvihangel-Llantarnam in the urban district of Llantarnam, all in the county of Monmouth.

In the county of Monmouth—

Work No. 6.—An aqueduct (consisting of a conduit or line or lines of pipes) in the said parish of Llanvihangel-Pontymoill, commencing by a junction with the intended aqueduct (Work No. 5) in the inclosure numbered on the Map 304 in that parish, at or near a point 83 yards northwards from the southernmost corner of that inclosure, and terminating at a point in the centre of the Avon-lwyd, distant 7 yards or thereabouts south-westwards from the southernmost corner of the inclosure numbered on the Map 295, in the said parish.

Work No. 7.—A service reservoir in the inclosure numbered on the Map 1009, in the

said parish of Llanvihangel-Llantarnam in the urban district of Llantarnam.

Work No. 8.—An aqueduct (consisting of a conduit or line or lines of pipes), commencing in the said parish of Llanvihangel, Llantarnam in the urban district of Llantarnam in the intended reservoir (Work No. 7) hereinbefore described, and terminating in the parish of Malpas in the rural district of St. Mellons by a junction with the existing mains of the Corporation in the Malpas-road, at or near the boundary of the borough.

2. To empower the Corporation to make and maintain in the parishes aforesaid or any of them all such cuts, channels, catchwaters, intakes, tunnels, adits, aqueducts, conduits, culverts, pipes, shafts, drains, junctions, sluices, bye-washes, washouts, watercourses, weirs, gauges, wells, bores, reservoirs, tanks, basins, meters, filter beds, filters, water towers, overflows, embankments, banks, dams, retaining walls, bridges, piers, roads, approaches, fences, tramroads, ropeways, rails, sidings, buildings, yards, quays, platforms, telegraphic, telephonic, electric and hydro-electric apparatus, engines, pumps, machinery, appliances and conveniences as may be necessary or convenient in connection with or subsidiary to the new works or any of them, or for inspecting, maintaining, repairing, cleansing, managing, working or using the same, and for collecting, diverting, impounding, obtaining, filtering, storing, conveying and distributing water and augmenting and improving the supply thereof.

3. To empower the Corporation to deviate from the lines and levels of the new works, as shown on the plans and sections hereinafter mentioned.

4. To prescribe the gauge of the said intended railway as 4 ft. 8½ ins., or such other gauge as may be specified in the Bill or approved by the Ministry of Transport.

5. To exempt the Corporation from all obligations as to the fencing of the said intended railway from adjoining lands or the provision of accommodation works or drainage for such lands, or of signals and signalling apparatus, and to make special provision and to confer special exemptions on the Corporation with reference to the method of construction and working and the user of the railway and the materials used therefor, and to provide (if thought fit) that the railway shall not be used for the conveyance of public traffic.

6. To empower the Corporation to work and use the said intended railway, and to authorize the Corporation and the Brecon and Merthyr Tydfil Junction Railway Company and other companies, authorities and persons to enter into agreements with reference to the construction, maintenance, management, working and user of the railway and the supply and maintenance of engines, stock and plant, and to make provision as to the future discontinuance and abandonment of the railway, and the sale of any materials forming part thereof and of any lands forming the site thereof.

7. To constitute the said intended works or some of them part of the water undertaking of the Corporation for all or any purposes, and to extend and apply all or some of the enactments now in force in relation to the existing water undertaking of the Corporation, with or without modification, to the said intended works or some of them.

8. To empower the Corporation to collect, divert, impound, take, use and appropriate the waters of the said stream known as Caerfanell and its tributaries, and all or any other springs, streams and waters (whether above or underground) situate or flowing within the drainage area of the said stream, or which may be intercepted by the new works or any supplementary or ancillary works in connection therewith, all or some of which waters now flow into the River Usk, thence into the River Severn and thence into the Bristol Channel, and to make special provision as to the taking of all or any of the said streams, springs and waters prior to the completion and first filling of the intended Caerfanell reservoir.

9. To amend and extend the provisions of section 38 of the Newport Corporation Act, 1914 (hereinafter referred to as "the Act of 1914"), and to apply the same to any lands or waters which the Corporation may by the Bill be authorized to take or use.

10. To make further provision for protecting the water works, property and water supply of the Corporation, and for securing the purity and more effectual collecting and conveyance of any waters which they are or may be authorized to take, and to empower the Corporation for those purposes to prescribe the construction, maintenance and use of proper drains, sewers, watercourses and other works, to provide for the prevention of nuisances, to prohibit the washing of sheep, and to exercise all or any of such powers within the parishes aforesaid or any of them, the parish of Llanfrynach in the said rural district of Brecknock and the limits of the Corporation for the supply of water.

11. To empower the Corporation for the purposes of the new works and other purposes of the Bill to purchase or acquire, by compulsion or agreement, and to hold and use lands, waters, buildings, tenements and hereditaments in the parishes aforesaid, or any of them, or in lieu of acquiring such lands, waters, buildings, tenements and hereditaments, to acquire by compulsion or agreement easements, wayleaves or rights therein, thereover or thereunder.

12. To empower the Corporation for any purposes of or connected with their water undertaking, including the purpose of protecting, securing and preserving the purity of their waterworks and water supply, to purchase, take on lease or otherwise acquire by agreement, and hold any further lands, tenements, hereditaments and waters or easements therein, thereunder or thereover within the parishes aforesaid and elsewhere.

13. To exempt the Corporation and any lands for the time being belonging to or held by them from the provisions of the Lands Clauses Acts with respect to the sale of superfluous lands, and to empower the Corporation to hold, use, lease, sell, exchange or dispose of any lands, tenements, hereditaments, easements or rights for the time being belonging to them, with or without reservation of the water or water rights or other easements belonging thereto, and upon such terms, pecuniary or otherwise, and conditions or restrictions as the Corporation may think fit, or as may be authorized by the intended Act.

14. To exempt the Corporation from the provisions of section 92 of the Lands Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845.

15. To make special provision with respect to the entry upon, survey and valuation of lands, buildings and property to be purchased

or used under the powers of the Bill, and as to determining claims of disputed compensation and for limiting the amount of any such compensation and claims in respect thereof.

16. To empower the Corporation to stop up and extinguish all rights of way over—

(a) The respective portions of the existing public road between Falybont and Torpantau Railway Station which respectively lie between the commencement and termination of the intended Road (Work No. 2) and the commencement and termination of the intended Road (Work No. 3) hereinbefore described.

(b) So much of the road leading from the said bridge known as Pont Rhyd-y-bine, past Ty-newydd, Pant-y-rhiw and Ffynnon-fawr Farms to Aber-Cynafon Farm, as lies between a point 155 yards or thereabouts southwards of the said bridge and a point 457 yards or thereabouts eastwards of the ford across the Caerfanell Stream, near the said Aber-Cynafon Farm; and

(c) Any roads or footpaths in the said parishes of Llanfigan and Llanddettty as may be situate upon any lands acquired by the Corporation under the powers of the Bill; and to appropriate and use for the purposes of their undertaking the site and soil of so much of any such roads and footpaths as will be stopped up, and to provide for extinguishing all rights of way thereover, and to make provision with regard to the intended Roads (Works Nos. 2 and 3) hereinbefore described, and the repair and maintenance thereof respectively when constructed by and at the expense of the Brecknock Rural District Council or such other authority or body as may be prescribed by the Bill.

17. To empower the Corporation to execute on all or any lands for the time being belonging or leased to them all or any of the works and things mentioned or referred to in section 12 of the Waterworks Clauses Act 1847, to have and exercise within and without their limits for the supply of water the like powers as a local authority may exercise within and without their district under section 54 of the Public Health Act, 1875, to construct, lay down, erect, affix and maintain within the parishes aforesaid or any of them or within the limits of the Corporation for the supply of water meters, stopcocks, covers, boxes and apparatus in, under or on any mains or pipes of themselves or their consumers, and discharge pipes, telephones and telegraph posts and other apparatus, and to discharge water from any of their existing or future works into any stream or watercourse.

18. To enable the Corporation on the one hand, and any authority, board, company or person on the other hand, to enter into and carry into effect agreements for and with respect to the supply of water in bulk or otherwise for any purpose by or to the Corporation to or by any such authority, board, company or person, and whether within or beyond the limits of the Corporation for the supply of water, and to confirm any such agreement which may have been or be entered into, and to confer all necessary powers in that behalf on any such authority, board, company or person.

19. To empower the Corporation for any purposes of or connected with the supply and distribution of water or ancillary to their undertaking and any of the objects of the Bill to open, break up, cross, divert, alter, stop up

or interfere with, whether temporarily or permanently, all such public and private roads, highways, streets, footpaths, bridges, tunnels, canals, navigations, rivers, streams, railways, tramways, sewers, drains, pipes, wires and apparatus within the parishes aforesaid or within the limits of the Corporation for the supply of water as it may be necessary or convenient to break up, cross, divert, alter, stop up, or interfere with, and to lay down, construct, place, maintain and renew on, over, under or across the same mains, pipes, works and apparatus, and to make all necessary and convenient junctions and communications with any such roads, highways, streets, footpaths, bridges and railways as aforesaid.

20. To empower the Corporation to lay down and maintain pipes and apparatus in roads and streets not dedicated to public use, to execute repairs to communication pipes whether on private premises or elsewhere and recover the cost thereof from owners and occupiers, and to confer upon persons liable to maintain pipes and apparatus the like powers of opening the ground as are conferred upon them by the Waterworks Clauses Act, 1847, with reference to the laying of communication pipes.

21. To make provision with respect to the supply of water used for farming purposes and to clubs, inns and similar premises, and to empower the Corporation to make, levy and demand special charges for water used for such purposes or for washing carriages, motor cars or horses, or in garages, stables and similar premises.

22. To make further provision with respect to the terms and conditions on which, and the pressure at which, water is to be supplied by the Corporation, the exemption from the obligation to supply in certain cases, the prevention and detection of waste, the prevention of injury to meters and fittings, the fraudulent abstraction or use of water, the connecting and disconnecting of meters and fittings, the imposing and recovery of penalties, and the notices to be given by consumers and others.

23. To authorize the Corporation to make and enforce bye-laws, rules and regulations in relation to all or any of the objects aforesaid and to impose penalties for the breach thereof or of any of the provisions of the Bill.

24. To authorize the Corporation to apply to the purposes of the Bill, or any of them, any funds, moneys, rates, rents or revenues now belonging to them, or which they now are or may hereafter be authorised to raise, and to make and levy additional and to alter existing rates and charges, and to confer exemptions from the payment of rates and charges, and for all or any of the purposes of the Bill to borrow on mortgage or bonds or to create and issue stock charged on the security of any such funds, money, rates, rents or revenues and of any undertaking or property of the Corporation.

25. To authorize the Corporation to borrow money for the payment of interest, to make further provisions as to sinking funds for any of the Corporation's loans and the calculation of the rate of accumulations thereto, and to make all other financial provisions which may be deemed necessary or expedient.

26. To make provision for the consolidation into one rate of the borough rate and the general district rate, and for the levying of the borough rate on all hereditaments within the borough, and, as to the making, assessing,

levying, collection and recovery of the rates so consolidated and the application of the proceeds thereof. To provide for the payment out of or the carrying to the credit of the borough fund and borough rate of all expenses and moneys which would otherwise be paid out of or be carried to the credit of the district fund or general district rate, and to provide for the closing of the district fund and for the transfer of any credit or debit balances thereof to the borough fund.

27. To make all necessary or incidental provision in regard to the consolidation of the said rates and funds, to require the Overseers of the parish of Newport to pay out of the poor rate leviable in that parish the contributions of that parish to the borough rate; to provide that references in any Acts or orders of or relating to the Corporation or in force within the borough or any mortgage or charge on any of the rates, funds or accounts hereinbefore mentioned shall be construed as references to the borough fund and borough rate.

28. To repeal, alter or amend the provisions of all or any general or local enactments in force within the borough relating to, and to make further provision as to the differential rating of any part or parts of the borough or of particular classes of property, or the payment by owners instead of occupiers of the whole or any part of the borough rate or rates so consolidated and the poor rate, or to any exemption (whether total or partial) from the said rates or any of them, and to confer, vary or extinguish exemptions from any such rates as aforesaid.

29. To extend the time now limited for the compulsory purchase of lands authorized to be taken by Part III. of the Act of 1914 and for the completion of the bridge and street works authorized by Part II. of that Act.

30. To incorporate with the Bill with or without modification and apply to the purposes thereof or some of them all or some of the provisions of the Lands Clauses Acts, the Waterworks Clauses Acts, 1847 and 1863, the Railways Clauses Acts, 1845 and 1863, and the Public Health Acts, and to exempt the Corporation from all or any of the provisions of those Acts.

31. To vary or extinguish all or any public or private rights of way or water or other rights, easements or privileges in any manner connected with any lands, streams, springs, waters, buildings, tenements and hereditaments to be acquired, taken, used or appropriated by the Corporation and any other rights and privileges which are inconsistent with, or which would interfere with any of the objects of the Bill, and to confer other rights and privileges.

32. To alter, amend, extend, enlarge or repeal so far as may be necessary or expedient for the purposes of the Bill all or some of the provisions of the following local and personal Acts of Parliament and Orders following (that is to say):—

The Acts 17 and 18 Vict. c. 191, 50 and 51 Vict. c. 134, and any other Act or Order relating to the former Newport Waterworks Company. the Acts 51 and 52 Vict., c. 82, 52 and 53 Vict., c. 152, 55 and 56 Vict., c. 123, 60 and 61 Vict., c. 168, 63 and 64 Vict., c. 42, 2 Edw. 7, c. 167, 6 Edw. 7, c. 97. the Act of 1914, and any other Act or Order relating to or affecting the

Corporation or the borough or their water undertaking, the Act of 22 and 23 Vict., c. 68, and any other Act or Acts relating to the Brecon and Merthyr Tydfil Junction Railway Company.

(Increased Tolls on Passenger Vessels; Tolls on Pleasure Boats and Houseboats; Commissioners to have powers of a Local Authority with regard to Licensing of Pleasure Boats and Vessels and making Bye-laws with regard thereto—and the Proprietors and Boatmen and other Persons in charge thereof; License of Local Authority not required for Vessels and Persons Licensed by Commissioners; Licensing of Persons employed on Passenger Vessels; Bye-laws relating to Ferryboats and the Embarking and Disembarking of Passengers

and Goods; Closing of Locks on River at Night; Application of Funds; Amendment of Acts; and other purposes.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the ensuing Session by the Severn Commissioners (hereinafter called "the Commissioners") for leave to bring in a Bill (hereinafter called "the Bill") for all or some of the following among other purposes, that is to say:—

NOTE.—In this notice the expression "the River" means unless otherwise stated the River Severn within the jurisdiction of the Commissioners, that is to say, from the Lower Parting at Portham Mead by way of the eastern channel of the River there, and from the entrance lock of the former Herefordshire and Gloucestershire Canal, by way of the western channel of the River there respectively, in the County of Gloucester to Gladder or Whitehouse Brook in the County of Worcester.

1. To repeal or amend Section 186 of the Severn Navigation Act, 1842, as amended by Section 62 of the Severn Navigation Act, 1869, and to authorize the Commissioners to levy and recover new and increased tolls, rates and dues on vessels navigating the River, and constructed or used for carrying passengers for pay or hire and propelled by mechanical means, including vessels constructed or used for carrying passengers for pay or hire and hauled by another vessel. The vessels hereinbefore described are hereinafter referred to as "passenger vessels."

2. To authorize the Commissioners to levy and recover tolls, rates or dues in respect of pleasure boats and vessels including launches and houseboats and every other description of pleasure boat or vessel navigating or using the River, however propelled or navigated, not being a passenger vessel as defined above.

3. To enable the Commissioners to exercise in relation to pleasure boats and vessels to be let for hire or to be used for carrying passengers for hire on the River or on such part or parts of the River as may be prescribed in the Bill, and in relation to the proprietors of and to the boatmen or persons assisting in the charge or navigation of such boats and vessels: all or some of the powers vested in or conferred on a local authority in relation to pleasure boats and vessels and the proprietors thereof and the boatmen or persons in charge thereof by Section 172 (Urban Authority may make bye-laws for licensing horses, boats, &c., for hire) of the Public Health Act, 1875, and Section 94 (Power to license pleasure boats) of the Public Health Acts Amendment Act, 1907, and to provide that all or some of the provisions of those sections shall apply in relation to the exercise by the Commissioners of those powers and to the vessels, boats and persons affected thereby.

4. To provide for the payment of a fee for the granting of any such license, and to prohibit the use on the River of pleasure boats and vessels not licensed by the Commissioners or any Local Authority.

5. To provide that the sections of the Public Health Acts hereinbefore referred to shall not apply to any boat, vessel or person licensed or required to be licensed by the Commissioners under the powers or provisions of the Bill.

6. To provide or to enable the Commissioners to make bye-laws to provide that no person shall be employed in the navigation or working of a passenger vessel on the River unless such person is licensed by the Commissioners as a fit and competent person to be so employed; for the issue by the Commissioners of licenses of fitness and competency for such employment and for the examination of the fitness and competency of persons applying for such licences; for the duration of such licences and for the revocation or suspension thereof on cause shown; for the payment of fees for the issue of such licences and for the amount thereof; and for the imposition of penalties for the employment of a person not licensed by the Commissioners, and for the breach of such provisions or bye-laws as the case may be.

7. To enlarge the power to make bye-laws conferred on the Commissioners by Section 210 of the Severn Navigation Act, 1842, as amended by Section 43 of the Severn Navigation Act, 1890, and Section 16 of the Severn Navigation Act, 1914, and to enable the Commissioners to make, alter and rescind bye-laws for the following among other purposes; for prohibiting the use on the River as ferry boats of boats not licensed by the Commissioners for use as such; for determining the nature, size and carrying capacity of boats to be used as ferry boats on the River, and the number of persons to be carried therein; for requiring the periodical inspection of boats licensed to be used as ferry boats; for prescribing the terms and conditions on which licenses will be issued for the use of boats as ferry boats, and for fixing the fees payable for such licenses; for prescribing the places at which passengers and goods may be embarked or disembarked, loaded or unloaded on to or from vessels plying on the river, and for prohibiting the embarking or disembarking, loading or unloading of passengers or goods at any wharf, quay, pier, jetty, landing place, raft or place not so prescribed, and for the removal of any vessel, raft, sunken craft or other obstruction to the use of any wharf, quay, pier, jetty, landing place, raft or place, the use of which for the foregoing purposes is authorized by the Commissioners; and for imposing penalties for the breach of any such bye-laws.

8. To enable the Commissioners to close the locks or any of the locks on the River and prohibit the passage of traffic through the same between the hours of six in the evening and six in the morning, or during such part of that period as the Commissioners may think fit or as the Bill may prescribe.

9. To empower the Commissioners to apply any funds belonging to them or under their control for the purposes of the Bill.

10. To levy tolls, rates and dues; to alter existing tolls, rates and dues; to make provisions for the compounding of tolls, rates and dues; to enable the Commissioners to reduce, remit or grant rebates in respect of any tolls, rates or dues; and to confer, vary or extinguish exemptions from payment of tolls, rates and dues.

11. To vary or extinguish all rights and privileges inconsistent with or which would or might in any way interfere with the objects of the Bill, and to confer other rights and privileges.

12. To alter, amend or repeal as far as may be necessary or expedient for giving effect to the objects and purposes of the Bill the pro-

visions or some of the provisions of the several Acts hereinbefore referred to, and of the following among other Acts, viz.:—The Severn Navigation Act, 1844; the Severn Navigation Act, 1846; the Severn Navigation Act, 1853; the Severn Navigation Act, 1856; the Severn Navigation Act, 1869; the Severn Navigation Act, 1881; and the Canal Tolls and Charges No 6 (River Lea, &c.) Order Confirmation Act, 1894, and any Acts recited or referred to in any of the foregoing Acts.
