In the Matter of Ludwig Heinrich Roll.

Revocation of Certificate of Naturalization.

Whereas I am satisfied, as the result of an enquiry conducted by the Certificates of Naturalization (Revocation) Committee, that Ludwig Heinrich Roll, to whom a certificate of naturalization, numbered 4645, was granted on the 6th July, 1886, has shown himself to be disaffected and disloyal to His Majesty.

Now, therefore, by this Order, made in pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by section 7 of the British Nationality and Status of Aliens Act, 1914, I revoke the said certificate and I direct such revocation to have effect from the date hereof, and I further order the said certificate to be given up and to be cancelled.

BRITISH NATIONALITY AND STATUS OF ALIENS ACTS, 1914 AND 1918.

In the Matter of David Bock.

Revocation of Certificate of Naturalization.

Whereas I am satisfied, as the result of an enquiry conducted by the Certificates of Naturalization (Revocation) Committee, that David Bock, to whom a certificate of naturalization, numbered 12739, was granted on the 15th August, 1902, has shown himself by act and speech to be disaffected and disloyal to His Majesty, and during the recent war unlawfully

traded with subjects of an enemy state, and was engaged in a business which was to his knowledge carried on in such manner as to assist an enemy in the war, and further that the continuance of the certificate is not conducive to the public good.

Now, therefore, by this Order, made in pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by section 7 of the British Nationality and Status of Aliens Act, 1914, I revoke the said certificate, and I direct such revocation to have effect from the date hereof, and I further order the said certificate to be given up and to be cancelled.

In the Matter of Julius Kottgen.

Revocation of Certificate of Naturalization.

Whereas a certificate of naturalization was granted in the United Kingdom during the present war to Julius Kottgen, who at the date of the grant of the certificate was the subject of a country which was then at war with His Majesty.

And whereas the question whether it is desirable that the certificate should be revoked has been referred to the Certificates of Naturalization (Revocation) Committee, constituted under section 7 of the British Nationality and Status of Aliens Act, 1914, and whereas that question has been answered by the Committee in the affirmative,

Now, therefore, by this Order, made in pursuance of sub-section (1) of section 3 of the British Nationality and Status of Aliens Act, 1918, I revoke the said certificate, and I direct such revocation to have effect from the date hereof, and I further order the said certificate to be given up and cancelled.
