A PROCLAMATION

REVOKING SECTION 4 OF THE CURRENCY AND BANK NOTES ACT, 1914, WHEREBY BANK NOTES ISSUED BY A BANK OF ISSUE IN SCOTLAND OR IRELAND WERE MADE LEGAL TENDER.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS by Section 4 of the Currency and Bank Notes Act, 1914, it was provided as follows:—

“ Any bank notes issued by a bank of issue in Scotland or Ireland shall be legal tender for a payment of any amount in Scotland or Ireland respectively, and any such bank of issue shall not be under any obligation to pay its notes on demand except at the head office of the bank, and may pay its notes, if thought fit, in currency notes issued under this Act:

“ Provided that notes which are legal tender under this section shall not be legal tender for any payment by the head office of the bank by whom they are issued for the purpose of the payment of notes issued by that bank.

“ This section shall have effect only until His Majesty by proclamation revokes the same, and any proclamation revoking this section may provide for the calling in or exchange of notes affected thereby; ”

And whereas it is desirable that in accordance with the powers thereby conferred the said section should be revoked as from the date hereinafter specified in that behalf:

Now, therefore, We have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, and We do hereby proclaim, direct and ordain as follows:—

Section 4 of the Currency and Bank Notes Act, 1914, is hereby revoked as from the first day of January, nineteen hundred and twenty, and accordingly as from that date any bank notes issued by a bank of issue in Scotland or Ireland shall cease to be legal tender, and any such bank shall be under the same obligations with respect to the payment of its notes as it was before the said section came into operation.

Provided and it is hereby declared that nothing in this Proclamation operates so as to prevent any such bank as aforesaid from

paying its notes in currency notes issued under the said Act.

Given at Our Court at *Buckingham Palace*, this Twentieth day of *December*, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and nineteen, and in the Tenth year of Our Reign.

And whereas it is expedient further to amend the said regulations in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following amendment be made in the said regulations:—

Regulation 8AA shall be revoked.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 13th day of December, 1919, in the words following, viz.:—

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a Person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine thereon, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas we consider that a rank should be established in the Accountant Branch of Your Majesty's Navy higher than that of Paymaster Captain, and that the title of such rank should be Paymaster Rear-Admiral:

"And whereas with the concurrence of the Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treas-

ury we appointed a Paymaster Director-General as from the 6th March, 1918, under the conditions set forth in the Schedule annexed hereto:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the establishment of the post of Paymaster Director-General, with the rank of Paymaster Rear-Admiral, with effect from 6th March, 1918.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals.

"SCHEDULE.

"Pay.

"To be at a consolidated rate of £1,200 a year.

"Retirement.

"To be compulsory after five years' service in the rank of Paymaster Director-General, or at the age of 60.

"Widow's Pension, etc.

"Widow's Pension and Compassionate Allowances for children to be on the scale applicable to Rear-Admirals."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by Section 80 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1906, power is given to His Majesty, by Order in Council, to make Regulations as to the manner in which Government Ships may be registered as British Ships under the Merchant Shipping Acts:

And whereas by the said Section it is provided that those Acts shall, subject to any exceptions or modifications which may be made by Order in Council, either generally or as respects any special class of such Ships, apply to such Ships when registered in accordance with such Regulations:

And whereas on account of urgency it is expedient that this Order should come into immediate operation.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act, or otherwise, in Him vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered:—

I. That the following Regulations shall have effect as regards any Government Ships in the service of the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, hereinafter sometimes referred to as the Board:—

1. An application for registry of a Government Ship in the service of the Board shall be made in writing under the hand of the Fisheries Secretary to the Board. Such application shall contain the following particulars:—

(1) A statement of the name and description of the Ship.

(2) A statement of the time when, and place where, the Ship was built; or, if the Ship was foreign built and the time and place of building are unknown, a statement to that effect, and of her foreign name.

(3) A statement of the nature of the title to the said Ship, whether by original construction by or for the Board, or by purchase, capture, condemnation, or otherwise, and a list of the documents of title, if any, in case she was not originally constructed by or for the Board.

(4) A statement of the name of the Master.

2. The Registrar, on receiving such application in respect of a Government Ship in the service of the Board shall:—

(1) enter the Ship in the Register Book as belonging to His Majesty, represented by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, and shall also enter therein:—

(2) the name of the port to which she belongs:

(3) the particulars stated in the application for registration:

(4) the details comprised in the Surveyor's Certificate.

3. On the registry of a Government Ship in the service of the Board the Registrar shall retain in his possession the Surveyor's Certificate and the application for registry, and any documents of title mentioned in such application.

4. Upon the transfer of a registered Government Ship in the service of the Board by Bill of Sale the Board shall be the transferors, and the Bill of Sale shall be in Form A. in the proper form prescribed under the Principal Act, omitting the covenant therein contained. Any such Bill of Sale shall be signed by the Fisheries Secretary to the Board on behalf of the Board.

5. The application for a Certificate of Sale referred to in Sections 39 to 42 and Sections 44 to 46 of the Principal Act, may be made in respect of a Government Ship in the service of the Board by the Fisheries Secretary to the Board on their behalf.

6. The person to whom the management of any Government Ship in the service of the Board is entrusted by the Board shall be registered as provided by Section 59 (2) of the Principal Act.

7. Government Ships in the service of the Board registered in pursuance of the provisions of this Order in Council are hereby excluded from the category of ships belonging to His Majesty within the meaning of Sections 557 to 564 of the Principal Act.

8. Where any Section of the Merchant Shipping Acts which, by virtue of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1906, and this Order in Council, is applicable to Government Ships in the service of the Board imposes any duty or liability or confers any right or power upon or contemplates any act being performed by the owner of a Ship such duty, liability, right or power shall, subject always to the other provisions of this Order in Council, be carried out, borne, or exercised by the Board on behalf of His Majesty.

9. In this Order in Council the term Merchant Shipping Acts shall mean and include any of the Merchant Shipping Acts any provision of which is by virtue of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1906, and this Order, applicable to Government Ships.

10. Section 1 and Sections 8 to 12 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, shall not apply to Government Ships in the service of the Board registered in pursuance of the provisions of this Order in Council. Provided always that no provision of the Merchant Shipping Acts which, according to a reasonable construction, would not apply in the case of Government Ships in the service of the Board shall be deemed to apply to such Ships by reason only that its application is not hereby expressly excluded.

II. That this Order shall come into immediate operation provisionally in accordance with the provisions of Section 2 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893.

And whereas it is further provided by the said Act that for the purposes thereof "Government Department" includes (amongst others) the Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland:

And whereas it is further provided by the said Act that His Majesty may by Order make such incidental, consequential, and supplemental provisions as may be necessary or expedient for the purpose of giving full effect to any transfer of powers or duties as aforesaid:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as "The Ministry of Transport (Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland Transfer and Exception of Powers) Order, 1919."

2. The date as from which the powers and duties in relation to the matters aforesaid of the Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland (in this Order referred to as "the Commissioners") are transferred to the Minister of Transport shall be the first day of January, 1920.

3. There shall be excepted from such transfer—

(i) The powers and duties of the Commissioners under Section 28 of the Railways Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845, with respect to the formation of any cut, river or watercourse across a railway.

(ii) The powers and duties of the Commissioners under the Railways Act (Ireland), 1851, as amended by subsequent Acts with respect to the compulsory acquisition of lands.

(iii) The powers and duties of the Commissioners under the Marine Works (Ireland) Act, 1902, with respect to any Marine Work as defined in that Act.

(iv) The powers and duties vested in the Commissioners with respect to the maintenance of any undertaking or work which at the aforesaid date of transfer they are maintaining, and the powers and duties of the Commissioners with respect to Baronial Guarantees under the Tramways and Public Companies (Ireland) Act, 1883, and with respect to the repayment and recovery of any moneys which at the aforesaid date of transfer they may have advanced upon the security of any works or undertaking.

Provided that such powers and duties shall be exercised in consultation with the Minister of Transport.

4. For the purpose of giving full effect to the transfer of powers from the Commissioners to the Minister of Transport the Commissioners shall, in any case or cases in which the Minister of Transport may notify the Commissioners that he deems it expedient, continue to exercise any of the powers of the Commissioners so transferred, and the acts of the Commissioners in the exercise of such powers shall be deemed to be the acts of the Minister of Transport.

2. The date as from which the powers and duties in relation to the matters aforesaid of the Congested Districts Board for Ireland (hereinafter referred to as "the Board") are transferred to the Minister of Transport shall be the first day of January, 1920.

3. There shall be excepted from such transfer—

(i) All powers to make Estate-roads which the Board as Owners of land can exercise under any Statute or at Common Law, including the powers under Section 5 of the Land Law (Ireland) Act, 1881, as extended by Section 2 of the Congested Districts Board (Ireland) Act, 1901.

(ii) The powers of the Board to contribute to works to be carried out under the Marine Works (Ireland) Act, 1902; and

(iii) The powers of the Board to construct, improve, or maintain Fishery Piers, Boat Slips and Harbours, or to contribute to the cost of the construction of such works.

Provided that in the exercise of such powers the Board shall act in consultation with the Minister of Transport.

(ii) The powers and duties of the said Department under Sections 22 and 23 of the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894, and Section 1 of the Poultry Act, 1911, and those in regard to Agriculture and other rural industries and Sea Fisheries under the Agriculture and Technical Instruction (Ireland) Act, 1899.

Provided that in the exercise of such powers, so far as they relate to the transit of animals and produce, the said Department shall act in consultation with the Minister of Transport.

Provided that in the exercise of the powers and duties so excepted the said Board shall act in consultation with the Minister of Transport.

4. There shall also be excepted from such transfer the powers and duties of the said Board under the Housing of the Working Classes (Ireland) Acts, 1890 to 1919. Provided that in the exercise of the powers so excepted so far as they relate to roads, bridges, vehicles and traffic thereon the said Board shall act in consultation with the Minister of Transport.

3. Any power so transferred which could have been exercised by the Lord Lieutenant and Privy Council of Ireland by Order in Council shall be exercisable by Order of the Minister of Transport, and in cases where such Order in Council would have required confirmation by Parliament the Order of the Minister shall not become operative unless or until it has been approved by a resolution passed by both Houses of Parliament.

And whereas by Section 1 of the Welsh Church (Temporalities) Act, 1919, it is provided that His Majesty in Council may on the application of the said Commissioners suspend the dissolution of the said Commissioners, and, subject to revision by the Treasury of the salaries of the said Commissioners, and the remuneration and number of their officers, continue their powers for such time as His Majesty thinks fit:

And whereas the said Commissioners have made an application that their dissolution may be suspended and their powers continued for four years:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the dissolution of the said Commissioners shall be suspended, and their powers shall (subject as aforesaid) be continued for a period of four years from the end of the present year, and at the expiration of the said period the Commissioners shall be dissolved unless His Majesty in Council is pleased further to suspend their dissolution and continue their powers.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, Chapter 77, of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, and of the Act of the 37th and 38th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 63, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 27th day of November, 1919, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, Chapter 77, of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, and of the Act of the 37th and 38th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 63, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme with respect to some of the Rural Deaneries within the three Arch-deaconries of York or the West Riding, the East Riding, and Cleveland, in the Diocese of York:

"Whereas it has been represented to us by the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of York, that the arrangements which are hereinafter recommended and proposed with respect to some of the Rural Deaneries within the said Arch-deaconries of York or the West Riding, the East Riding, and Cleveland are desirable and should be carried into effect, and we are of opinion that the same may be properly carried into effect:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of York, (in testimony whereof he has set his hand and Archiepiscopal Seal to this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that as from the day

on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, first, within the said Archdeaconry of York or the West Riding, the Parish of Acomb shall be transferred from the Rural Deanery of Ainsty to the Rural Deanery of York; secondly, within the said Archdeaconry of the East Riding, the Parishes of Wharram le Street and Wharram Percy shall be transferred from the Rural Deanery of Buckrose to the Rural Deanery of Settrington; thirdly, within the said Archdeaconry of Cleveland, the Parishes of Danby and Westerdale shall be transferred from the Rural Deanery of Stokesley to the Rural Deanery of Whitby; and that each of the Parishes hereinbefore referred to shall be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of the Rural Dean of the Rural Deanery to which it is hereby transferred, and shall not belong to or be a part of any other Rural Deanery, nor be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of any other Rural Dean:

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other matter or thing with respect to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, by virtue of the said Acts or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of York.

Benefice by itself or be united to any other Parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining Tithing, Hamlet, Chapelry, Place, or District, Parochial or Extra-Parochial, so as to form a Separate Parish or Benefice, or that any Extra-Parochial Place may with advantage be annexed to any Parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a Separate Parish for ecclesiastical purposes, and the said Archbishop, or Bishop, shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Glebe Lands, Tithes, Rent Charges, and other Ecclesiastical Dues, Rates and Payments, and in respect to Patronage and Rights to Pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the Patron or Patrons of the Benefice or Benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof, as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

"That according to the last census the population of the said Parish of Bridlington inclusive of the said Township of Buckton was 5,422 persons, that of the said Parish of Bempton was 296 persons, and that of that part of the said Township of Buckton which is hereinafter referred to was 165 persons:

"That the net annual value of the said Rectory of Bridlington is £350 or thereabouts and that of the said new Vicarage of Bempton is £84 or thereabouts:

"That the Patronage of the said Rectory of Bridlington is vested in the Simeon Trustees, namely the Reverend Prebendary Ernest Augustus Eardley-Wilmot, M.A., the Reverend Canon Arthur Evelyn Barnes-Law-

rence, M.A., the Right Reverend James Denton, Lord Bishop of Sodor and Man, the Reverend George Backhouse Durrant, Clerk, M.A., and the Reverend Francis Edward Murphy, Clerk, M.A., and the Patronage of the said new Vicarage of Bempton is vested in John Broadley Harrison-Broadley, Esquire:

"That the said Patrons and Incumbents of the said Benefices of Bridlington and Bempton are consenting parties to the separation and annexation hereinafter proposed:

"That the part hereinafter referred to of the said Township of Buckton is distant upwards of three miles by the nearest road from the Parish Church of Bridlington and is only distant from the said Parish Church of Bempton half a mile or thereabouts by a straight and accessible road:

"That it appears to the said Archbishop that under the provisions of the said Act of Parliament the part of the said Township of Buckton which is edged round with red on the map hereto annexed may be advantageously separated from the said Parish of Bridlington to which it at present belongs and be united for ecclesiastical purposes to the Parish of Bempton aforesaid:

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the before mentioned Act the Archbishop has prepared a Scheme in writing, appended to this Report, describing the mode in which it appears to him the alterations above referred to may be best effected and how the changes consequent thereupon in respect of Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Glebe Lands, Tithes, Rent Charges, and other Ecclesiastical Dues, Rates and Payments, and in respect of Patronage and Rights to Pews may be made with justice to all parties interested, and the said Archbishop being on full consideration and inquiry satisfied with such Scheme he doth by this Report to Your Majesty in Council certify the same to Your Majesty in Council, with the Consents in writing of the respective Patrons and Incumbents of the said Parishes of Bridlington and Bempton, to the intent that Your Majesty in Council in case it shall be thought expedient and proper so to do, make an Order for carrying such Scheme into effect."

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Archbishop and the Consents of the Patrons and Incumbents of the said Benefices respectively are in the words and figures following:—

"SCHEME.

"That that part of the Township of Buckton in the Parish of Bridlington in the County and Diocese of York which is edged round with red on the Map hereunto annexed shall be separated from that Parish to which it at present belongs and be united to and form part of the Parish of Bempton for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That the Incumbent of the Parish of Bridlington shall cease to have Cure of Souls within the said part of the Township of Buckton proposed to be transferred as aforesaid and the Incumbent of the Parish of Bempton shall have exclusive charge and Cure of Souls within the limits of such Township.

"That the Inhabitants of that part of the said Township of Buckton proposed to be

transferred as aforesaid shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the Parish Church of Bridlington or any other Church or Chapel now or hereafter to be erected within that Parish, but shall be liable with the other Inhabitants of the Parish of Bempton subject to the provisions of 'The Compulsory Church Rate Abolition Act, 1868,' for the repair of the Parish Church of Bempton aforesaid.

"That the Inhabitants of that part of the said Township of Buckton proposed to be transferred as aforesaid shall have the same rights as to pews and the performance of all Offices and Services of the Church at the said Parish Church of Bempton and otherwise in relation to the said Church as the other Inhabitants of Bridlington and Bempton.

"That the fees for all such Offices and Services performed for the Inhabitants of that part of the said Township of Buckton proposed to be transferred as aforesaid or arising within the limits of the same and usually payable to the Incumbent of a Benefice shall belong to and be received by the Incumbent of the Benefice of Bempton aforesaid.

"That no alteration shall be made as to the Patronage or Endowment of the said two Benefices of Bridlington and Bempton."

"We, the Simeon Trustees, namely:—the Reverend Prebendary Ernest Augustus Eardley-Wilmot, M.A., the Reverend Canon Arthur Evelyn Barnes-Lawrence, M.A., the Right Reverend James Denton, Lord Bishop of Sodor and Man, the Reverend George Backhouse Durrant, Clerk, M.A., and the Reverend Francis Edward Murphy, Clerk, M.A., the Patrons or persons entitled to present to the Rectory and Parish Church of Bridlington and John Broadley Harrison-Broadley, Esquire, the Patron or person entitled to present to the Vicarage and Parish Church of Bempton both in the County and Diocese of York, and the Reverend Canon John Topham, Clerk, and the Reverend Joseph Mawson, Clerk, M.A., the present respective Incumbents of the said Rectory and Parish Church of Bridlington and the said Vicarage and Parish Church of Bempton do hereby respectively signify our assent to the foregoing Report and Scheme and to the several matters and things therein stated and proposed.

Thereafter the first three turns of every successive four turns of presentation shall belong to and be exercised by the said Margaret Elizabeth Strickland Constable, her heirs and assigns, and the fourth of every such four turns shall belong to and be exercised by the said Earl of Londesborough, his heirs and assigns.

CENSUS OF PRODUCTION ACT, 1917.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF TRADE, DATED 22ND DECEMBER, 1919, DETERMINING THAT A CENSUS OF PRODUCTION SHALL BE TAKEN IN THE YEAR 1921.

Whereas by Section 1 (2) of the Census of Production Act, 1917, it is provided that a census shall be taken in any year which is fixed for the purpose by an Order made by the Board of Trade and laid before Parliament; and, if the Order so directs, may be limited to any trades or businesses mentioned in the Order; provided that there is at least a year's interval between the date on which the Order is made by the Board of Trade and the commencement of the year in which the census is to be taken.

Now, therefore, the Board of Trade do by this Order determine that a Census of Production shall be taken in the year 1921 and that the said Census shall be limited to the trades or businesses included in the Schedule annexed hereto.

The Board of Trade further determine that returns for the said Census shall not be required from persons, companies or firms who did not employ on the average more than five persons, exclusive of officers of the company or members of the firm, during the calendar year 1920, provided that each such person or an officer of such company or a member of such firm, as the case may be, makes a signed declaration, on the Schedule appropriate to their trade or business, of the average number of persons employed by them (exclusive as aforesaid) inside or outside the establishment during such year.

TRADE.

The Toy Trade, that is to say, the manufacture of articles intended for the amusement of children, including dolls, metal, wooden or other hard toys, soft toys, books made from textile materials, requisites for table games, bricks, blocks, puzzles, balls, Christmas crackers, Easter eggs, masks or drums,

including also,

(a) The assembling of parts of any of the above-mentioned articles.

(b) The operations of storing, boxing, packeting, labelling or despatching, and all other warehousing or packing operations incidental to the manufacture of any of the above-mentioned articles,

but excluding,

(a) The manufacture of toys when carried on as a subsidiary branch of work in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of other articles, so as to form a common or interchangeable form of employment for the workers.

(b) The manufacture of sports requisites.

(c) The manufacture of toy perambulators, toy wheel-barrow, toy scooters, nursery yachts, toy cycles, toy cars, toy horses, dolls' houses or other similar toys when carried on as a subsidiary branch of work in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of perambulators, invalid carriages or folding push cars, so as to form a common or interchangeable form of employment for the workers.

(d) The manufacture from ceramic materials of dolls or dolls' parts, dolls' china, marbles or similar articles when carried on in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of other pottery.

(e) The making of articles from sugar confectionery.

(f) The making of hollow-ware, including boxes and canisters from sheet iron, sheet steel or tinplate, or any operations incidental thereto.

TRADE BOARDS ACTS, 1909 AND 1918.

ROPE, TWINE AND NET TRADE BOARD.

(GREAT BRITAIN.)

PROPOSAL TO FIX MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR FEMALE AND MALE WORKERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1919, the Trade Board established in Great Britain under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for those branches of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Rope, Twine and Net) Order, 1919, hereby give notice, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they propose to fix General Minimum Time-rates, Piece-work Basis Time-rates and Overtime Rates for female and male workers, and to declare the Normal Number of Hours of work in the trade for the purpose of the application of the Overtime Rates, as set out in the Schedule below.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

Proposed General Minimum Time-rates.

Section I.—Female Workers.

(a) For Workers other than Home-workers:—

Workers of 18 years of age and upwards, 8½d. per hour.

Workers of 17½ years of age and under 18, 7½d. per hour.

Workers of 17 years of age and under 17½, 6½d. per hour.

Workers of 16½ years of age and under 17, 5½d. per hour.

Workers of 16 years of age and under 16½, 5d. per hour.

Workers of 15 years of age and under 16, 4½d. per hour.

Workers under 15 years of age, 4d. per hour.

Provided that workers entering the Trade for the first time at or over the age of 16 years may be employed for a period not exceeding six months at a minimum rate which is less by ½d. per hour than the minimum rate applicable under the above scale.

(b) For Home-workers:—

(i) General Minimum Time-rate to operate during the first period of six months from the date on which the minimum rates set out in this Notice take effect, 7½d. per hour.

(ii) General Minimum Time-rate to operate during the second period of six months from the date on which the minimum rates set out in this Notice take effect, 8d. per hour.

(iii) General Minimum Time-rate to operate as from the expiration of twelve months from the date on which the minimum rates set out in this Notice take effect, 8½d. per hour.

Section II.—Male Workers.

	(i) General Minimum Time-rate to operate during the first period of six months from the date on which the minimum rates set out in this Notice take effect.	(ii) General Minimum Time-rate to operate during the second period of six months from the date on which the minimum rates set out in this Notice take effect.	(iii) General Minimum Time-rate to operate as from the expiration of twelve months from the date on which the minimum rates set out in this Notice take effect.

Provided that workers entering the trade for the first time at or over the age of 18 years may be employed for a period not exceeding six months at a minimum rate which is less by 1d. per hour than the minimum rate applicable under the above scale.

PART II.

Proposed Piece-work Basis Time-rates.

Section I.—For all Female Workers other than Home-workers, 9d. per hour.

(a) In the case of Female Home-workers employed on Piece-work, each Piece-rate paid shall be such as would yield in the circumstances of the case to an Ordinary worker not less than the General Minimum Time-rate for Home-workers applicable as set out in Section I (b) of Part I above.

(b) In the case of all Female Workers, other than Home-workers, employed on Piece-work, each Piece-rate paid shall be such as would yield in the circumstances of the case not less than 9d. an hour to an Ordinary worker. Provided that in determining as to whether any Piece-rate satisfies the foregoing condition, regard shall be had only to the earnings of workers of 18 years of age and over who have

had not less than six months' experience in the trade.

Section II.—For all Male Workers.

(i) Piece-work Basis Time-rate to operate during the first period of six months from the date on which the minimum rates set out in this Notice take effect, 1s. 2½d. per hour.

(ii) Piece-work Basis Time-rate to operate during the second period of six months from the date on which the minimum rates set out in this Notice take effect, 1s. 3d. per hour.

(iii) Piece-work Basis Time-rate to operate as from the expiration of twelve months from the date on which the minimum rates set out in this Notice take effect, 1s. 4d. per hour.

In the case of all Male Workers employed on Piece-work, each Piece-rate paid shall be such as would yield in the circumstances of the case to an Ordinary worker not less than the Piece-work basis Time-rate set out above and applic-

able. Provided that in determining as to whether any Piece-rate satisfies the foregoing condition regard shall be had only to the earnings of workers of 21 years of age and over who have had not less than six months' experience in the trade.

PART III.

Proposed Overtime Rates for Female Workers (other than Home-workers) and for Male Workers (all ages).

Section I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board propose to declare the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—

In any week, 48.

On any day (other than Saturday), 9.

On Saturday, 5.

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

Section II.—The Trade Board propose to fix Overtime Rates in respect of male and female workers (other than female home-workers) to apply in respect of hours worked by a worker, whether engaged on Time-work or on Piece-work in excess of the declared normal number of hours, as follows, that is to say:—

(a) For the first two hours' overtime on any day, except Saturdays, Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to Time-and-a-quarter, that is to say, one-and-a-quarter times the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

(b) For overtime after the first two hours of overtime on any day except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, and for all overtime on Saturdays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to Time-and-a-Half, that is to say, one-and-a-half times the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

(c) For all time worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to Double Time, that is to say, twice the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

(d) All hours worked in any week in excess of 48 shall be paid for as Overtime irrespective of the number of hours worked on any particular day, and the Overtime Rate shall also be payable where on any day (not being a Sunday or Customary Public or Statutory Holiday), the number of hours worked exceeds nine, or in the case of Saturday exceeds five, notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48. The Overtime Rate payable for hours worked in excess of 48 in any week shall be:—(a) As respects any day except Saturdays, Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, time-and-a-quarter for the first two hours, and time-and-a-half thereafter; (b) as respects Saturdays, time-and-a-half; (c) as respects Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, double time.

Section III.—Notwithstanding anything contained in Sections I. and II. of this part of this Notice:

(a) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer only to require

attendance on five days a week, the Overtime Rate shall only be payable where on any day the number of hours worked exceeds 9½.

(b) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the normal number of hours for the week in which attendance on Saturday is required shall be deemed to be 50.

(c) In the application of clauses (a) and (b) of this Section, where the employer requires attendance on any day on which it is not the established practice of the employer to require attendance, all time worked on such day shall be paid for as overtime at the respective overtime rates set out in paragraphs (a), (b) and (c) of Section II.

Note.—The hours which female workers and young persons are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts.

PART IV.

For the purpose of this Notice the expression "Home-worker" shall be held to mean a worker who works in her own home or in any other place not under the control or management of the employer.

PART V.

The above minimum rates of wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in Great Britain who are employed during the whole or any part of their time in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Rope, Twine and Net) Order, 1919; that is to say, the making or re-making of (a) rope (including driving rope and banding, (b) cord (including blind and window cord, but excluding silk, worsted and other fancy cords), (c) cord for wire ropes, (d) lines, (e) twine (including binder and trawl twine), (f) lanyards, (g) net and similar articles; the bleaching, teasing, hackling, carding, preparing and spinning of the materials required for the making or re-making of any of the articles (a) to (g) above, when carried on in the same factory or workshop as such making or re-making; the manufacture of packings, gaskins, and spun yarns, when carried on in the same factory or workshop as the making or re-making of any of the articles (a) to (g) above; the braiding or splicing of articles made from rope, cord, twine or net; the mending of nets and the winding, twisting, doubling, laying, polishing, dressing, tarring, tanning, dyeing, balling, reeling, finishing, packing, despatching, warehousing and storing of any of the above articles, where these operations or any of them are carried on in a factory or workshop in which any of the articles (a) to (g) above are made or re-made; but excluding the making of wire rope (unless made in the same factory or workshop as hemp or similar rope or core for wire rope), and excluding the making of net in connection with the lace curtain trade and the weaving of cloth.

PART VI.

Section I.—The above General Minimum Time-rates, Piece-work Basis Time-rates and Overtime Rates shall be paid clear of all deduc-

tions, other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

Section II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above Proposals which may be lodged with them within two months from 23rd December, 1919. Such Objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary, The Rope, Twine and Net Trade Board (Great Britain), 5, Chancery Lane, London, W.C. 2.

It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

WESTHOUGHTON.

(1) To enable the Council to increase the charges prescribed by section 6 of the said Act for water supplied for domestic purposes; and

(2) To enable the Council to make by-laws for preventing the waste, undue consumption, misuse or contamination of the water supplied by the said Council; and

(3) To confer on the Council further and amended powers and privileges in relation to their water undertaking, including provisions for the following purposes:—

(a) To empower the Council to recover the rate for the supply of water from the owners of small houses in certain cases;

(b) To authorize the Council to charge an additional sum not exceeding twenty shillings per annum in respect of water supplied by hosepipe to stables, or premises where horses, carriages or motor-cars are kept;

(c) To provide that the Council shall not be bound to supply with water otherwise than by measure any building used by an occupier as a dwelling-house whereof any part is used by the same occupier for any trade or manufacturing purpose for which water is required, or to supply water otherwise than by measure for farming purposes or to supply more than one house by means of the same communication pipe;

(d) To provide that a notice to the Council from a consumer for the discontinuance of a supply of water shall be of no effect unless in writing, and that before any person disconnects a meter he shall give notice in writing to the Council of his intention to do so;

(e) To empower the Council to lay pipes in streets not dedicated to public use;

(f) To confer on the person liable under the provisions of the Waterworks Clauses Act, 1847, to maintain any pipe or apparatus the like power to open the ground as is conferred on him by sections 48 to 52 inclusive of the Waterworks Clauses Act, 1847, in relation to the laying of communication pipes;

(g) To empower the Council to repair a communication pipe in certain cases and to recover the expense incurred from the owner;

(h) To authorize the Council to affix and maintain apparatus for the purpose of preventing and detecting waste of water,

(i) To empower the Council to sell or let for hire meters and other water fittings, and in certain cases to remove water meters and other fittings belonging to them, and to provide that meters and other fittings let by them for hire shall not be subject to distress;

(k) With respect to contributions by the several owners or occupiers to the amount of any expenses incurred by the Council in the maintenance and repair of a common pipe belonging to the said several owners or occupiers;

(l) To authorize the Council temporarily to discharge water into streams for the purpose of enlarging, extending, repairing, etc., their waterworks;

(m) With respect to proceedings for the recovery of demands made under the said local Act as amended by the Provisional Order applied for; and

(4) For the several purposes of the application or for purposes connected with, incidental to, or consequent on those purposes to make any such alteration or amendment of the said Local Act, or of any other local Act or of any Act confirming a Provisional Order made in pursuance of any of the Sanitary Acts or of the Public Health Act, 1875, in force in the said district as may be necessary or desirable.

And whereas it is proposed that a Provisional Order should be issued in compliance with the said application;

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF
AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 22ND DECEMBER 1919.)

WEST SUSSEX AND DISTRICT (FOOT-
AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF
1919.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Movement into, out of, or within Scheduled District.

1.—(1.) No cattle, sheep, goats or swine shall be landed in or moved into or out of the District described in the Schedule to this Order, hereinafter referred to as the Scheduled District, or be moved along, over, or across, or be allowed by the owner or person in charge thereof to stray upon a highway or thoroughfare within the Scheduled District; provided that nothing in this Order shall be deemed to apply to the movement of animals into or out of the Scheduled District where they are moved through such District by railway from a place outside such District to another place outside such District, without unnecessary delay, and without the animals being untrucked within such District except for the purposes of feeding or watering the animals within the railway station premises where such untrucking takes place.

(2.) If any farm (except any detached part) is partly within and partly without the Scheduled District, the whole shall be deemed to be within the Scheduled District.

Power to Restrict Movement of Persons in Certain Cases.

2.—(1.) An Inspector of the Local Authority acting under their direction may serve a Notice on the occupier of any field, shed, or other place in the Scheduled District, prohibiting the entry of any person into any such field, shed, or other place, and thereupon, notwithstanding the existence of any footpath or right-of-way, no person shall enter the field, shed, or other place to which the Notice relates while any cattle, sheep, goats or swine are therein, otherwise than in accordance with the following regulations, that is to say;

(i) The owner of the field, shed, or other place, or of the animals therein, or the agent or servants of such owner, may enter such field, shed, or other place so far as may be necessary for the feeding or tending of the animals.

(ii) Any other person may enter such field, shed, or other place with a licence of an Inspector of the Local Authority, or of the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries.

(2.) Copies of such Notice shall be affixed or exhibited by the Inspector in such manner as he shall think desirable for ensuring notification of the restrictions thereby imposed.

(3.) A copy of every such Notice shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Board of

Agriculture and Fisheries, Whitehall Place, London, S.W.

Power to restrict Movement of Dogs and Poultry in Certain Cases.

3.—(1.) An Inspector of the Board, or of the Local Authority acting under their direction, may, for the purpose of preventing the spread of Foot-and-Mouth Disease, by a Notice served on the occupier of any premises in the Scheduled District, require him:—

(a) to keep in confinement, or under control, as may be prescribed by the Notice, dogs on such premises;

or (b) to confine live poultry on such premises in a pen or other like enclosure;

or (c) to prevent the access of live poultry to any specific part of the premises to which cattle, sheep, goats, or swine have, or recently have had, access;

and if any occupier after service of any such Notice shall fail to comply with the requirements thereof, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(2.) An Inspector of the Board, or of the Local Authority acting under their direction, may, for the purpose of preventing the spread of Foot-and-Mouth Disease, by Notice affixed or exhibited by the Inspector in such manner as he shall think desirable for ensuring notification of the restrictions thereby imposed, require dogs to be kept by the person in charge thereof under control while passing along any road or footpath specified in such Notice, and if any person in charge of a dog while passing along any road or footpath to which any such Notice relates fails to keep the dog under control, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(3.) Every Notice served on an occupier of premises shall remain in operation until it is withdrawn by a further Notice served by an Inspector of the Board or of the Local Authority.

(4.) A copy of every Notice served by an Inspector of the Local Authority under this Article shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Secretary, Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, Whitehall Place, London, S.W.

Local Authority to Enforce Order.

4. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

5.—(1.) If an animal is landed in contravention of this Order, the owner, and the charterer and the master of the vessel from which it is landed, and the owner of the animal and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing or permitting the landing, and the person landing the same, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been landed in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(2.) If an animal is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the animal and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing or permitting

the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the animal is moved shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(3.) If any person enters any field, shed, or other place in contravention of this Order, or of a Notice served thereunder, such person shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Short Title.

6. This Order may be cited as the WEST SUSSEX AND DISTRICT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1919.
