A PROCLAMATION.

WILLIAM R.

Hereas Our Royal Proclamations, bearing
Date on the Twenty third Day of Februaty, and on the Twenty second day of this
instant March, Issued for the Apprehending several Persons therein Named, who, with divers
other Wicked and Trainsum Persons, had Entred into a
Horrid and Detestable Continuous to Allastinuate and Mar-Horrid and Detestable Conspiracy, to Assassine and Mur-der Our Royal Person; several of which Person kave been since Apprehended, and some of them have Suffered the Just Punishment of the Law for such their Horrid and Wicked Conspiracy, and others remain yet Undiscovered, Viz. Sir George Barclay, who is Lieutenant Colonel of the Viz. Sir George Barciay, who is Lieurenant Council of the late King James's Horse Guards in France, a Tall thin Man, about the dge of Sixty Years, of a Ruddy Complexion, is Lame of his Right Haud; Dinant, Major George Holunes, a Short thick Man of a fiesh Colour, aged about Forty Tears; Durant, a Walson, who is a Middle-fixed Black Man, Thin faced, he tween Thirty and Forty Years of Age, has very Black Eye-brows, Speaks Dutch and French very well, Bryerly, who is a Middle-fixed Man, of a Brown Complexion, very stender, has a short Nose, and very wide Mouth; Chambers, who is a Scotch Man, between Thirty and Forty Years Old, has a Hurt in his Hand, and a great Wound in his Breast, and was formerly talk on Board a French Provaver; Davies; Ta-ther Johnson elie: Harrison, a Priest, who is a Short Black, Full-hodied Man, his Eyes standing a little out of his Head, Aged about Forty Years, Have, who is a Black Well-fet Man, not very Tall, with a short Nose, Aged about Thirty Years; alias Rumsey; Hungate Mins Rogers, who is a Fair Fresh Coloured Man, Middle-sized, aged about Thirty Years. And whereas We have since the Issuing Our Jaid Proclamations, Received further Information of Several other Persons herein after Named, who were concerned in the Said Horrid and Detestable Conspiracy; for which Cause several Warrants of High Treason have Issued a-gainst them, but they have withdrawn themselves from their usual Places of their and and the Table their usual Places of Abode, and are fled from Justice: We therefore (with the Advice of Our Privy Council) have thought fit to Issue this Our Royal Proclamation here-by Requiring and Commanding all Our Loving Subjects to Discover, Take and Apprehend the Persons above-named, and also Meldrum, a Well-Set Man, with a Large Nose, and Large Eyes, Aged about Thirty Years;
Blackburne, a Lusty Man, with a Round
Face, Aged about Thirty Years;
Richardson, a
Well-Set Man, with a Wide Mouth, very Smooth Face, his Hair Dark Brown, Aged about Thirty Five Years; Hanford, a Tall, Black Man, with his own Hair; Long Hair ;

John Maxwell, a Little Man, with Darkift-Brown Plowden, a Middle-fixed Man, with a Long and Thin Visage, High Nose, speaks very Broad; William Berkenhead, a Middle-sized Man, with A Little Face, and Brown Complexion, about Fifty Years of Age, he has gone by the Names of Filh; East, West, South Age, he has gone by the Names of Fish; East, West, South i and Baker, and was formerly a Custom-House Officer, where ever they may be found, and to Carry them before the west Justice of Peace, or Chief Mazistrate, who is hereby Required to Commit them to the next Goal, there to Re-

And We do hereby Require the Said Justice, or other Magistrate, immediately to give Notice thereof to Us or Our Privy Council. And for Prevention of the going of the Said Persons into Ireland, or other Places beyond the Seas, We do Require and Command all Our Officers of the Customs, and other Our Officers and Subjects of and in the restricts Parts and Magistration Toward jests of, and in the respective Ports and Maritime Towns; and Places within Our Kingdom of England, Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, That they, and every of them, in their respective Stations and Places, he Careful and Diligent in the Examination of all Prices, we careful and Drugent in the Examination of an Perfons who shall Pass, or endeavour to Pass, beyond the Scar. And if they shall Discover the said Persons above named, or any of them, then to coule them to be Apprewe do hereby Publish and Declare, That who sever shall Conesal the Persons above-named, or any of them; or be Aiding and Assisting in the Concealing of them, or Fruther. ing their Escape; Shall be, for Such their Offence, Proceeded against with the utmost Severity according to Law. And for the Encouragement of all Persons to be Diligent and careful in endeavouring to Discover and Apprehend the said Persons, We do hereby further Declare, That whose ever shall Discover and Apprehend the Persons above named, who were mentioned in Our faid former Problamations, or any of them, and shall bring them before some Justice of the Peace, or Chief Magistrate, as asovelaid, shall Have and Receive, as a Reward, the Sum of One Thousand Pounds promised by Our said Proclamations; which said Sum of One rhousand Pounds, the Commissioners of Our Treasury are horsely Required and Directed to Pay accordingly. And We do wordly also surther Decline That whoseever shall District and Apprehend the Persons abovenonspecter some Deserver and Apprennia era resigne ausoca-named, who were nor remained in Our said former Pro-clamations, or any of thom, and shall bring them before some Justice of Peace or Chief Mugistrate, as aforesaid, shall Have and Receive, as a Reward, the like Sum of Shall stave and Receive, as a Reward, the like Sum of One benefind Pounds, to be pard in Juch manner, as aforefail. And if any of the Porlens above-named Shall Discover and Apprehend the faid Sir George Barclay, Johnson alies Harrison, and Major George Holmes, or either of them, so as they may be brought to Justice, We do kereby Desiure, Thus every Person making such Discovery, shall have Our Gracious Pardon for his Officee, and Shall Receive the Reward of One thousand Priords, to be Paid in such manner as aforesaid.
