WHEREAS at Versailles, on the 28th day of June, 1919, a Treaty of Peace with Germany (hereinafter referred to as "the Treaty") was signed on behalf of His Majesty:

And whereas it was provided in the Treaty that the property of German nationals within the territory or under the control of an Allied or Associated State might be constituted a pledge for enemy liabilities upon the conditions laid down in the Treaty:

And whereas by the Treaty of Peace Act, 1919, it was provided that His Majesty might make such appointments, establish such offices, make such Orders in Council, and do such things as appeared to Him to be necessary for carrying out the Treaty, and for giving effect to any of the provisions thereof:

And whereas by Treaty, grant, usage, sufferance, or other lawful means and by Decree of His Highness the Sultan of Egypt, His Majesty has power and jurisdiction in Egypt:

And whereas there is now in Egypt certain property of German nationals under the control of His Majesty, and it is expedient to make provision for charging such property with

the payment of the liabilities for which it may be constituted a pledge by the Treaty in the manner hereinafter provided:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, or otherwise in Him vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. All property, rights and interests in Egypt belonging to German nationals at the date when the Treaty comes into force (not being property, rights or interests acquired under any general licence issued by or on behalf of His Majesty) and the net proceeds of their sale, liquidation, or other dealings therewith, so far as such property, rights and interests or such net proceeds are vested in or otherwise under the control of the Custodian of enemy property or other British authority under the Trading with the Enemy Acts or the Trading with the Enemy Proclamations issued from time to time by the General Officer Commanding-in-Chief the British Forces in Egypt, are hereby charged:—

(a) First, with payment of the amounts due in respect of claims by British nationals with regard to their property, rights and interests, including companies and associations in which they are interested in German territory, or debts owing to them by German nationals, and with payment of any compensation awarded by the Mixed Arbitral Tribunal or by an arbitrator appointed by that Tribunal in pursuance of paragraph (e) of Article 297 of the Treaty, and with payment of claims growing out of acts committed by the German Government or by German

authorities since the 31st July, 1914, and before the 4th August, 1914.

(b) Secondly, with payment of the amounts due in respect of claims by British nationals with regard to their property, rights and interests in the territories of Austria-Hungary, Bulgaria, and Turkey in so far as those claims are not otherwise satisfied.

Provided that any particular property, rights or interests so charged may at any time, if the High Commissioner thinks fit, be released from the charge so created.

2. In the application and enforcement of the charge created by this Order the claims of or debts owing to British nationals resident or carrying on business in Egypt shall enjoy priority over the claims of or debts owing to other British nationals.

3. All decisions of the Mixed Arbitral Tribunal constituted under Section VI of Part X of the Treaty, if within the jurisdiction of that Tribunal, shall be final and conclusive, and binding on all courts.

4. For the purpose of enforcing the attendance of witnesses before the Mixed Arbitral Tribunal, whether sitting in Egypt or not, and compelling the production before the Tribunal of documents, the High Commissioner shall have power to issue orders which shall have the like effect as if the proceedings before the Tribunal were an action in the Supreme Court, and the order were a formal process issued by that court in the due exercise of its jurisdiction, and shall be enforceable by that court accordingly, and disobedience to any such order shall be punishable as contempt of court.

5. Sections IV, V, and VI of Part X of the Treaty relating to property, rights and interests, to contracts, prescriptions and judgments, and to the Mixed Arbitral Tribunal, and all provisions of the said Treaty affecting or relating to the charge created by this Order shall have full force and effect as law.

6. The time at which the periods of prescription or limitation of right of action referred to in Article 300 of the Treaty shall begin again

to run shall be at the expiration of six months after the coming into force of the Treaty, and the period to be allowed within which presentation of negotiable instruments for acceptance or payment, and notice of non-acceptance or non-payment or protest may be made under Article 301, shall be six months from the coming into force of the Treaty.

7. Rules made during the war by any recognised Exchange or Commercial Association providing for the closure of contracts entered into before the war by an enemy, and any action taken thereunder are hereby confirmed, subject to the provisos contained in paragraph 4 (a) of the Annex to Section V of Part X of the Treaty.

8. The power under the Egypt Order in Council, 1915, to make King's Regulations, shall extend to the issue of regulations for the purpose of enforcing the charge created by this Order, and for making such arrangements as may be required for establishing and assessing the claims and debts for the payment of which the property charged is rendered liable, and for the payment, in whole or in part, of the sums due.

9. In this Order the term "British nationals resident or carrying on business in Egypt" means persons who are subject to the Egypt Order in Council, 1915, and who are so resident or carrying on business.

10. The Treaty of Peace Order, 1919, shall not apply to Egypt except so far as may be consistent with the provisions of this Order or of any Proclamation issued by the General Officer Commanding-in-Chief the British Forces in Egypt, or with any rules or directions given thereunder.

11. This Order may be cited as the Egypt (Treaty of Peace) Order in Council, 1920, and shall be read as one with the Egypt Order in Council, 1915.

12. This Order shall be deemed to have had effect as from the date when the Treaty of Peace came into force.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 17th day of January, 1920, in the words following, viz.:—

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, and other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas by Section 2 of the Officers of the Royal Naval Reserve Act, 1863, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that the Admiralty may enrol Officers of the Reserve to the Royal Navy under, and subject to, such Rules, Orders and Regulations as the Admiralty may, with the consent of Your Majesty in Council, from time to time establish:

"And whereas by the Naval Forces Act,

1903, it is enacted that the Admiralty shall have power to raise and maintain a Force to be called the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve, and that any volunteer enrolled under this Act, when serving for training afloat, or called out for actual service, shall be deemed to be serving in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force within the meaning of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865:

"And whereas during the war certain changes in the rules governing promotion and the rates of full pay and retiring allowances of Officers of various ranks of Your Majesty's Naval, Marine and Reserve Forces have from time to time been deemed desirable and have, with the concurrence of the Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury, been introduced:

"And whereas, with the consent of the Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury, pending a general revision of the pay of Officers, temporary bonuses were granted with effect from the 1st February, 1919, to all Officers of Your Majesty's Naval, Marine and Reserve Forces:

"And whereas we are of opinion that the Regulations governing service, promotion and retirement in certain ranks require further revision so as to place Officers of various Branches of the Royal Navy, Royal Naval

Reserve and Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve on an equality as regards the age at which the several ranks may be attained, so far as possible, with due regard to the responsibilities and to the technical and professional knowledge required for the performance of the duties of the several ranks:

"And whereas we are of opinion that Officers of the Royal Marines should be treated, in regard to their emoluments during active service and on retirement, similarly to Naval Officers, and further that there should be one scale of pay applicable to all such Officers whether belonging to the Royal Marine Artillery or to the Royal Marine Light Infantry and whether serving at sea or ashore:

"And whereas we are of opinion that the

scales of pay, half-pay and retired pay of Officers of Your Majesty's Naval and Marine Forces should be substantially increased in the higher ranks in view of the altered economic conditions arising from the war and for other reasons, and further that rates of unemployed pay should be introduced for certain ranks during periods of unemployment not exceeding a year:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the proposals contained in the Schedules annexed hereto.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals.

"COMMISSIONED WARRANT AND WARRANT OFFICERS AND OFFICERS PROMOTED FROM THOSE RANKS.

"The following improvements to be made with regard to the promotion and the conditions of service of Commissioned Warrant Officers and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy, with effect from the 1st October, 1918.

"Promotion.

"(1) The number of Officers to be promoted to commissioned rank to be increased to 8 per cent. of the total pre-war numbers of Commissioned Officers, Commissioned Warrant Officers and Warrant Officers in each branch.

"(2) The rank of Commander to be opened to such branches as we may consider to require Officers of that rank; the number allowed to be 1 per cent. of the total number of Commissioned Officers, Commissioned Warrant Officers and Warrant Officers of the branches allowed the rank. This rank to be allowed in the following branches:—

Gunners and Gunners (T).
Boatswains.
Signal Boatswains.
Engineers.
Shipwright Branch.

"(3) Warrant Officers of all branches to receive promotion to Commissioned Warrant rank after ten years' seniority as Warrant Officer, provided they are recommended by their Commanding Officers, have good records, and have served for five years at sea as Warrant Officers.

"(4) Commissioned warrant rank may be granted earlier at the discretion of the Admiralty for war, or other distinguished service as at present.

"(5) Commissioned Warrant Officers to be allowed to pass an examination for Lieutenant (or equivalent rank) after promotion to Commissioned Warrant Officer, and then to be eligible for promotion by selection in conjunction with seniority up to the maximum allowed, provided they have three years' sea

service as Commissioned Warrant Officer before promotion. Lieutenants (or Officers of equivalent rank) promoted from Commissioned Warrant Officer to be promoted to Lieutenant-Commander (or equivalent rank) after eight years' seniority in the junior rank without examination provided they are recommended by their Commanding Officers, have good records, and three years' sea service as Lieutenant (or equivalent rank).

"The regulations in this paragraph not to refer to older Officers promoted for long and zealous service.

"(6) Promotion to Commanders rank to be from the rank of Lieutenant-Commander (or equivalent rank) and to be by selection in conjunction with seniority, subject to passing the examination for promotion in branches where an examination is laid down for direct entry Officers.

"Officers promoted from Commissioned Warrant or Warrant rank to the rank of Lieutenant or equivalent rank for gallantry to receive full pay on the scale for Officers of those ranks promoted to Lieutenant for long and zealous service, together with the authorized messing allowance.

"SCHEDULE III.

"SCHOOLMASTER BRANCH.

"The following new constitution to be introduced for this branch from the 29th November, 1918.

"The Schoolmaster Branch in future to be a branch by itself and not to be considered comparable with other Warrant Officer branches, except in so far as the following regulations deal with relative rank:—

"I.—*Schoolmaster Candidate.*

"1. Schoolmasters to be entered either direct from the shore or by transfer from other ratings. On entry to have the title of 'Schoolmaster Candidate' with the relative rank of Acting Warrant Officer.

"2. Candidates to be of such age and to possess such qualifications as we may from time to time prescribe.

"3. To be regarded as on probation for twelve months from date of entry or transfer and during that period to be liable to be discharged, or to revert to their original rating, at any time if found unsuitable.

"4. In the case of a man who reverts to his original rating the time served as 'Schoolmaster Candidate' or 'Probationary Schoolmaster' to count as time served in the rating held prior to appointment to the Schoolmaster Branch.

"5. Schoolmaster candidates who reach a standard of special merit in the first part of their preliminary course of instruction and are recommended as likely to prove Schoolmasters of exceptional ability to be advanced to 'Probationary Schoolmaster' from the date of the examination. The remaining candidates to complete the preliminary course and those who reach the necessary qualifying standard to be advanced to 'Probationary Schoolmaster' at the end of the course.

"II.—*Probationary Schoolmaster (Relative Rank of Acting Warrant Officer).*

"1. Probationary Schoolmasters, not recommended for confirmation on the completion of 3 months' service afloat, to be discharged to the shore or revert to their original rating, unless at the discretion of the Admiralty they may be allowed the option of a further period of probation not exceeding 6 months.

"2. Seniority as Schoolmasters, when confirmed in the rank, to be reckoned as from the date of promotion to 'Probationary Schoolmaster.'

"III.—*Schoolmaster (Relative Rank of Warrant Officer).*

"1. All Schoolmasters to be required to take a short re-qualifying course at such intervals as we may prescribe.

"2. Schoolmasters who fail to pass not to be eligible for further increments of pay or for advancement to the relative rank of Commissioned Warrant Officer.

"IV.—*Schoolmaster (Relative Rank of Commissioned Warrant Officer).*

"1. Schoolmasters to be advanced 'automatically' to the relative rank of Commissioned Warrant Officer on the completion of 20 years' service, provided that they are recommended and have obtained a pass in each of their re-qualifying courses.

"V.—*Advanced Course.*

"1. Schoolmasters who are recommended for early advancement as having shown marked ability, both as teachers and in organising the work of their ship, and who reach the necessary standard in the first re-qualifying course—or subsequently in special cases—to be eligible for selection for an Advanced Course of instruction.

"2. Those who complete the course and examination satisfactorily to have their names distinguished by a † in the list of Schoolmasters, and to be eligible for appointments on the 'Special List' (see Section VI.).

"VI.—*'Special List' of Higher Appointments.*

"1. A list to be established consisting of those appointments which carry special responsibilities or call for technical knowledge of an advanced character. This list to be known as the 'Special List.'

"2. Schoolmasters who have passed the Advanced Course and are appointed to positions on this 'Special List,' or are appointed acting temporarily to such a post by the Senior Officer, to receive additional remuneration of 1s. a day (see Section VII.). This allowance to be payable under the same conditions as specialist allowances (*vide* Article 1407, King's Regulations).

"VII.—*Staff for Organisation and Supervision.*

"1. Two higher grades to be instituted to be termed 'Headmaster' and 'Senior Master.' These grades to be confined to a limited number of Officers who have been selected by a gradual process of elimination as specially fitted for responsible positions.

"Officers of these grades to hold the relative ranks of Lieutenant and Commissioned Warrant Officer respectively.

"Senior Master.

"2. The number of Senior Masters not to exceed, in the normal course, 25 per cent. of the total number of active service Officers of the Schoolmaster Branch. Subject to this limit the establishment to be determined by the number of appointments in which the services of a Senior Master are required.

"3. In the Schoolmaster Branch, Senior Masters to rank above all 'Schoolmasters.'

"4. Appointments as Senior Masters to be made only into vacancies, and to be by selection from among those Schoolmasters who have passed the Advanced Course, have completed one year's satisfactory employment in a 'Special List' appointment, and are recommended as possessing the special qualities requisite for a supervising appointment.

"5. Senior Masters to be considered as 'Acting' for the first 12 months of their service in that grade.

"VIII.—*Headmaster (Active List).*

"1. Senior Masters with not less than three years' service as such to be eligible for promotion to Headmaster on the Active List.

"2. The number of Headmasters on the Active List not to exceed, in the normal course, 8 per cent. of the total number of active service Officers of the Schoolmaster Branch. Subject to this limit, the actual number at any time to be determined by the number of appointments in which the services of a Headmaster are required.

"3. Promotions to be made by selection as vacancies occur.

"VIII.A.—*Headmaster (Retired List).*

"1. Senior Masters who retire after not less than 10 years' service in that rank to be eligible for promotion to the rank of Headmaster on the Retired List.

"2. Similar promotion, as a reward for long and zealous service, to be allowed in the case of specially recommended Schoolmasters who retire after not less than 23 years' service.

"X.—*Retirement.*

"1. Schoolmasters who are not promoted to the relative rank of Commissioned Warrant Officer to be retired at the discretion of the Admiralty on reaching the age of 45 years.

"2. Officers of the Schoolmaster Branch of or above the relative rank of Commissioned Warrant Officer to be retired on reaching the age of 55 years, with the exception that Headmasters and Senior Masters may be retained on the Active List up to 60 years of age when this is considered advisable in the interests of the Service.

"XI.—*Retirement with Gratuity.*

"(a) The existing provision under which Schoolmasters of Warrant Rank may be allowed to retire at any age, at the discretion of the Admiralty, to be retained. Such retirements in future to be allowed with a gratuity or retired pay, according to Scale A in the following table, in the case of all officers of the Schoolmaster Branch. (This provision not, however, to prejudice or affect the powers of the Admiralty under Order in Council of 13th May, 1901, or any subsequent Order in Council amending that Order.)

"(b) Officers of the Schoolmaster Branch who are found to be inefficient or unworthy of further employment to be retired at any age, at the discretion of the Admiralty, with a gratuity or retired pay according to Scale B in the following table:—

"XII.—*Widows' Pensions, Wound Gratuities, &c.*

"Widows' pensions, wound gratuities, compassionate allowance, &c., to be according to the scales for Warrant Officer, Commissioned Warrant Officer, Lieutenant and Lieutenant-Commander respectively.

"XIII.—*Special Arrangements for those now Serving.*

"1. All Schoolmasters entered for Continuous Service prior to August, 1914, to have the option of accepting the new terms.

"2. Any Head Schoolmaster (old scheme) who does not accept the new conditions, to be eligible for promotion to Commissioned Warrant Rank (Chief Schoolmaster, old scheme) after 15 years' service as Warrant Officer.

"3. Any Naval Schoolmaster (C.P.O. (O.S.) rating) or Acting Warrant Schoolmaster (Continuous Service) who declines to accept the new conditions, to be promoted, if recommended, to Warrant Rank (Head Schoolmaster, old scheme) after 10 years' service from date of entry.

"4. In the case of those who accept the new conditions, the provisions of the scheme to apply except where other special arrangements are made.

(a) A Continuous Service Schoolmaster who accepts the new conditions to enter the scale of pay as if he had been appointed Probationary Schoolmaster on a date subsequent by 6 months to that of his continuous service engagement, but to be allowed to remain on his previous scale so long as that is to his advantage.

(b) Schoolmaster Lieutenants and Chief Schoolmasters (Acting or otherwise) who hold that rank at the time of acceptance to become Headmasters and Senior Masters respectively, with their original seniorities as Schoolmaster Lieutenant or Chief Schoolmaster (Acting or otherwise).

(c) Head Schoolmasters and Acting Head Schoolmasters, described in Navy List as 'Temporary' to become 'Schoolmasters,' but to be eligible for selection for Senior Master. All time served as Head Schoolmaster, including 'acting' time, to count as double time as regards seniority as 'Schoolmaster,' and towards the completion of the 20 years' service required in the grade before advancement to the relative rank of 'Commissioned Warrant Officer, but not for any other purpose, such as increase of pay or pension.

(d) Schoolmasters entered as Naval Schoolmasters for continuous service prior to the outbreak of the late war to reckon their seniority in relative rank as from the date of their Acting Warrant, but to reckon their qualifying service for advancement, pension, &c., from a date subsequent by six months to that of their Continuous Service Engagement.

(e) Schoolmasters entered for temporary service since the outbreak of the war who elect to join for continuous service, and are accepted, to reckon their seniority in relative rank as from the date of their Acting Warrant. Those who do not join for continuous service to be eligible for full pay of 7s. a day as from the date of their Acting Warrant or 29th November, 1918, whichever is the later date and for the normal increments of pay as from the date of their Acting Warrant while they continue to serve.

(f) *Retirement.*—The conditions (Section X.), under which Schoolmasters who are not promoted to relative Commissioned Warrant Rank are to be placed on the Retired List on reaching 45 years of age, not to apply in the case of those Schoolmasters who have served for more than 18 years on the 29th November, 1918.

"1. The following alterations to be made in the rules regarding promotion:—

(i) Accountant Officers.

(a) Paymaster Midshipmen to be eligible for promotion after 3 years' service from date of entry, instead of after $3\frac{1}{2}$ as at present.

(b) Paymaster Sub-Lieutenants to be promoted to Paymaster Lieutenant on attaining 2 years' seniority, instead of 4 if their service has been satisfactory, the promotion of those now on the list being antedated as necessary.

(c) Paymaster Lieutenants, whose service has been satisfactory, to be automatically promoted to Paymaster Lieutenant-Commander on attaining 8 years' seniority, subject to passing the necessary examination where required to do so under the regulations.

(d) The seniority of Paymaster Lieutenants, Paymaster Lieutenant-Commanders and Paymaster Commanders on the list on 1st July, 1919, who served a minimum of 4 years as Paymaster Sub-Lieutenant to be antedated 2 years, and the necessary promotions to the ranks of Paymaster Lieutenant and Paymaster Lieutenant-Commander and Paymaster Commander to be made.

(ii) Medical Officers.

(a) Surgeon Lieutenants to be eligible for promotion after 6 years instead of 8 as at present, the promotion of those on the list on 1st July, 1919, being antedated as necessary.

(b) Surgeon Lieutenant-Commanders to be eligible for promotion to Surgeon Commander after 6 years instead of 8 as at present, those on the list on 1st July, 1919, being given 2 years' seniority.

(c) Surgeon Commanders on the list on the 1st July, 1919, to be given 2 years' seniority.

(d) The necessary promotions to the ranks of Surgeon Lieutenant-Commander and Surgeon Commander to be made.

(e) The period of sea service required to qualify an Officer for promotion to the ranks of Surgeon Lieutenant-Commander and Surgeon Commander to be reduced from 3 to 2 years.

(iii) Instructors.

(a) Instructor Lieutenants to be promoted to Instructor Lieutenant-Commander after 6 years instead of 8 as at present.

(b) Instructor Lieutenant-Commanders to be promoted to Instructor-Commander after 8 years instead of 7 as at present.

(c) The seniority of Instructor Commanders on the list on the 1st July, 1919, to be antedated by 1 year.

(iv) Paymasters and Barrackmasters, Royal Marines.

These Officers to be eligible for the substantive rank of Lieutenant-Colonel without additional emoluments, after 12 years' service as Major.

"2. Officers who are promoted, or whose seniority is antedated, under any of the preceding rules, not to receive any advantage in respect thereof as regards pay from a date earlier than the 1st July, 1919, but to be granted the increments of pay, if any, to which their new rank or seniority may entitle them as from that date.

"3. The foregoing alterations to be applicable to Accountant Officers and Medical Officers of the Royal Naval Reserve and Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve serving on 1st July, 1919.

Any Officer to whom the rates of pay and allowances authorized under these regulations are less advantageous than the rate of pay and allowances of which he was in receipt on the 19th July, 1919, may continue in receipt of the latter rate of pay and allowances during the period of the appointment held by him on that date or until such time, if earlier, as the rate of pay and allowances under these regulations, either on account of increment or promotion, equal or exceed the old rates, provided that an Officer who has once accepted the rates of pay and allowances under these regulations be not allowed to revert to his former pay and allowances, and that an Officer whose promotion is accelerated under this Order must accept the new rates of pay from the 1st July, 1919, and come under the new conditions for allowances from that date.

9. The rates of full pay, unemployed pay, half pay, retired pay, allowances and gratuities authorized under these regulations to be subject to review on or after the 1st July, 1924."

PATENTS.

THE REGISTER OF PATENT AGENTS RULES,
1920. DATED 30TH JANUARY, 1920.

By virtue of the provisions of the Patents and Designs Acts, 1907 and 1919, hereinafter referred to as the Acts, the Board of Trade, hereinafter referred to as the "Board," do hereby make the following Rules:—

1. These Rules may be cited as the Register of Patent Agents Rules, 1920.

2. The Register of Patent Agents hitherto kept by the Chartered Institute of Patent Agents (hereinafter called the Institute), shall continue to be kept by the Institute, subject to the provisions of these Rules and to the Orders of the Board, for the registration of patent agents in pursuance of Section 84 of the Acts.

3. The Register shall contain in one list all patent agents who are registered under the Acts and these Rules.

Such list shall be made out according to the surnames of the registered persons, and shall also contain the full name of each registered person, with his address, the date of registration, his qualification for registration, and a mention of any honours, memberships, or other additions to the name of the registered person which the Council of the Institute may consider worthy of mention in the Register. The Register shall be in the Form 1 in Appendix A., with such variations as may be required.

4. The Institute shall cause a correct copy of the Register, but with the names arranged alphabetically, to be printed under their direction and published and placed on sale. Such correct copy shall be printed and published not later than the end of February in each year. A copy of the Register for the time being purporting to be so printed and published shall be admissible as evidence of all matters stated therein, and the absence of the name of any person from the Register shall be evidence, until the contrary is made to appear, that such person is not registered in pursuance of the Acts or any Act repealed by the Acts.

5. The Council of the Institute shall continue in office or appoint a Registrar, who shall keep the Register in accordance with the provisions of the Acts and these Rules, and, subject thereto, shall act under the directions of the Council of the Institute, or the Board.

6. A person who is desirous of being registered in pursuance of the Acts, on the ground that prior to the 1st day of August, 1917, he had been *bonâ fide* practising as a patent agent in accordance with the provisions of the Acts, shall produce or transmit to the Board before the 1st October, 1920, or where, in the opinion of the Board, the circumstances justify a later application, the 1st October, 1921, a statutory declaration in the Form 2 in Appendix A.; provided that the Board may, in any case in which they shall think fit, require further or other proof that the person had prior to the 1st day of August, 1917, been *bonâ fide* practising as a patent agent as specified. Upon the receipt of such statutory declaration, and, if required, of such further or other proof to their satisfaction, as the case may be, and unless after giving the applicant an opportunity of being heard the Board are satisfied that he has whilst so practising been guilty of such misconduct as would have rendered him liable, if

his name had been on the register, to have his name erased therefrom, the Board shall transmit to the Registrar a certificate that the person therein named is entitled to be registered in pursuance of the Acts, and the Registrar shall on the receipt of such certificate cause the name of such person to be entered in the Register.

For the purpose of exercising in any case the power of placing the name of a person on the Register, the Board may appoint a committee consisting of such persons as they shall think fit, and a report of the committee shall be conclusive as to the facts for the purpose of the exercise of the said power by the Board. The committee may require the attendance before them of the person applying for registration.

7. Subject to the provisions of the Acts in favour of persons who prove to the satisfaction of the Board that prior to the 1st day of August, 1917, they had been *bonâ fide* practising as patent agents, no person shall be entitled to be registered as a patent agent unless he has passed, and produces or transmits to the Registrar a certificate under the seal of the Institute that he has passed, such final examination as the Institute shall from time to time prescribe.

8. The Institute shall hold at least once in every year an intermediate examination and a final qualifying examination, and the Institute shall, subject to these Rules, have the entire management and control of all such examinations, and may from time to time make regulations with respect to all or any of the following matters, that is to say,

(a) The subjects for and the mode of conducting the examination of candidates;

(b) The times and places of the examinations, and the notices to be given of such examinations;

(c) The certificates, if any, to be given to persons of their having passed the examinations;

(d) The appointment and removal of examiners, and the remuneration, by fees or otherwise, of the examiners so appointed; and

(e) Any other matter or thing as to which the Institute may think it necessary to make regulations for the purpose of carrying out this Rule.

9. Any person must, in order to be entitled to present himself for the intermediate examination, be

A British subject who has passed one of the preliminary examinations which the Institute shall by regulation prescribe and has been engaged as a pupil or technical assistant to one or more registered patent agents for three years; provided always that the Institute may by regulation prescribe conditions under which such term of three years may be reduced; provided also that any British subject for the time being entitled to practise as a Solicitor of the Supreme Court of Judicature in England or Ireland, or as a law agent before the Court of Session in Scotland, shall be entitled to present himself for the intermediate examination without passing any of the preliminary examinations referred to above and without having been engaged as a pupil or technical assistant to a registered patent agent.

10. Any person must, in order to be entitled to present himself for the final qualifying examination, be

A British subject who has passed the intermediate examination prescribed by Rule 8 and has been engaged as a pupil or technical assistant to one or more registered patent agents for five years; provided that the Institute may by regulation prescribe conditions under which such term of five years may be reduced; provided also that the Institute in circumstances arising from hostilities between His Majesty and any foreign State may dispense with or modify any of the conditions imposed by this or the preceding Rule; and provided also that any British subject for the time being entitled to practise as a Solicitor of the Supreme Court of Judicature in England or Ireland, or as a law agent before the Court of Session in Scotland, shall be entitled to present himself for the final qualifying examination if he has passed the intermediate examination referred to in Rule 9.

11. The Registrar shall from time to time insert in the Register any alteration which may come to his knowledge in the name and address of any person registered.

12. The Registrar shall erase from the Register the name of any registered person who is dead.

13. The Registrar may erase from the Register the name of any registered person who has ceased to practise as a patent agent, but not (save as hereinafter provided) without the consent of that person. For the purposes of this Rule the Registrar may send by post to a registered person to his registered address a notice inquiring whether or not he has ceased to practise or has changed his residence, and if the Registrar does not within three months after sending the notice receive an answer thereto from the said person, he may, within fourteen days after the expiration of the three months, send him by post to his registered address another notice referring to the first notice, and stating that no answer has been received by the Registrar; and if the Registrar before the second notice is sent receives the first notice back from the dead letter office of the Postmaster-General, or receives the second notice back from that office, or does not within three months after sending the second notice receive any answer thereto from the said person, that person shall, for the purpose of this Rule, be deemed to have ceased to practise, and his name may be erased accordingly.

14. If any registered person shall not, within one month from the day on which his annual registration fee becomes payable, pay such fee, the Registrar may send to such registered person to his registered address a notice requiring him, on or before a day to be named in the notice, to pay his annual registration fee; and if such registered patent agent shall not within one month from the day named in such notice pay the registration fee so due from him, the Registrar may erase his name from the Register: Provided that the name of a person erased from the Register under this rule may be restored to the Register by direction of the Institute or the Board on payment by such person of the fee or fees due from him, together with such further sum of money, not exceeding an amount the annual registration fee, as the Institute or the Board (as the case may be) may in each particular case direct.

15. In the execution of his duties the

Registrar shall, subject to these Rules, in each case act on such evidence as appears to him sufficient.

16. The Board may order the Registrar to erase from the Register any entry therein which is proved to their satisfaction to have been incorrectly or fraudulently inserted.

17. If any registered person shall be convicted in His Majesty's dominions or elsewhere of an offence which, if committed in England, would be a felony or misdemeanour, or after due inquiry, is proved to the satisfaction of the Board to have been guilty of conduct discreditable to a patent agent, or having been entitled to practise as a Solicitor or Law Agent shall have ceased to be so entitled, the Board may suspend such person from acting as agent in respect of any business under the Acts for such time as to the Board may seem fit or may order the Registrar to erase from the Register the name of such person. Provided that no person shall be adjudged by the Board to have been guilty of conduct discreditable to a patent agent unless such person has received notice of, and had an opportunity of defending himself from, any charge brought against him.

18. Where the Board direct the erasure from the Register of the name of any person, or of any other matter, the name of the person or the matter shall not be again entered in the Register, except by order of the Board. The Board may in any case in which they think fit restore to the Register such name or matter erased therefrom either without fee, or on payment of such fee, not exceeding the registration fee, as the Board may from time to time fix, and the Registrar shall restore the name or matter accordingly.

19. For the purpose of exercising in any case the powers of erasing from and of restoring to the Register the name of a person, or an entry, the Board shall appoint a committee consisting of such persons as they shall think fit. Every application to the Board for the erasure from, or restoration to, the Register of the name of any patent agent shall be referred for hearing and inquiry to the committee, who shall report thereon to the Board, and a report of the committee shall be conclusive as to the facts for the purpose of the exercise of the said powers by the Board.

20. The name of any person erased from the Register at the request or with the consent of such person shall, unless it might, if not so erased, have been erased by order of the Board, be restored to the Register by the Registrar on his application and on payment of such fee, not exceeding the registration fee, as the Institute shall from time to time fix.

21. The Board may from time to time issue orders regulating the professional conduct of persons whose names are on the Register, and may delegate the power of enforcing such orders to the Institute, subject to appeal to the Board. Any orders of the Board under this Rule shall be published in the "Illustrated Official Journal (Patents)."

22. Any person aggrieved by any order, direction, or refusal of the Institute or Registrar may appeal to the Board.

23. A person who intends to appeal to the Board under these Rules (in these Rules referred to as the appellant) shall, within 14 days from the date of the making or giving of the

order, direction, or refusal complained of, leave at the office of the Institute a notice in writing signed by him of such his intention.

24. The notice of intention to appeal shall be accompanied by a statement in writing of the grounds of the appeal, and of the case of the appellant in support thereof.

25. The appellant shall also immediately after leaving his notice of appeal at the Institute send by post a copy thereof with a copy of the appellant's case in support thereof addressed to the Comptroller, Industrial Property Department, Board of Trade, 25, Southampton Buildings, London, W.C. 2.

26. The Board may thereupon give such directions (if any) as they may think fit for the purpose of the hearing of the appeal.

27. Seven days' notice, or such shorter notice as the Board may in any particular case direct, of the time and place appointed for the hearing of the appeal shall be given to the appellant and the Institute and the Registrar.

28. The appeal may be heard and decided by the Board, and such decision may be given or order made in reference to the subject-matter of the appeal as the case may require.

29. The fees set forth in Appendix B to these Rules shall be paid in respect of the several matters, and at the times and in the manner therein mentioned. The Board may from time to time alter any of, or add to, the fees payable under these Rules.

30. Any regulation made by the Institute under these Rules may be altered or revoked by

a subsequent regulation. Copies of all regulations made by the Institute under these Rules shall, within twenty-eight days of the date of their being made, be transmitted to the Board, and if, within twenty-eight days after a copy of any regulation has been so transmitted, the Board by an order signify their disapproval thereof, such regulation shall be of no force or effect; and if, after any regulation under these Rules has come into force, the Board signify in manner aforesaid their disapproval thereof, such regulation shall immediately cease to be of any force or effect.

31. The Institute shall once every year in the month of March transmit to the Board a report stating the number of applications for registration which have been made in the preceding twelve months, the nature and results of the examinations which have been held, and the amount of fees received by the Institute under these Rules, and such other matters in relation to the provisions of these Rules as the Board may from time to time require.

32. These Rules shall come into operation from and immediately after the 30th January, 1920, and all general rules relative to the Register of Patent Agents in force on the 30th January, 1920, shall be and are hereby repealed as from that date without prejudice nevertheless to any thing done under such Rules or to any application or other matter then pending.

TRADE BOARD ACTS, 1909 AND 1918.
MACHINE-MADE LACE AND NET
FINISHING TRADE.

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES (AS VARIED)
EFFECTIVE AS FROM 2ND FEBRUARY, 1920.*

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Lace Finishing Trade Board established under that Act for certain branches of the Machine-made Lace and Net Finishing Trade as defined in the Regulations made by the Board of Trade, and dated 16th March, 1914, having given due notice on 7th November, 1919, of Proposal to Vary, as therein shown, the General Minimum Time-rates and General Minimum Piece-rates then in operation and as set out in the Schedules of their Notices dated 19th June, 1919, and 6th November, 1919, hereby give Notice that they have varied such General Minimum Time-rates and General Minimum Piece-rates, such Variation to remain in operation until 2nd February, 1921, and that the Minimum Rates of Wages as Varied are shown in the Schedule set out below, which is incorporated herewith.

And the Trade Board further give Notice that they have received notification from the Minister of Labour that he has made an Order dated 29th January, 1920, under Section 4 (2) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, confirming the variation of the rates by the Trade Board, and specifying 2nd February, 1920,* as the date from which the variation of such minimum rates of wages shall become effective.

*Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in no case later than 8th February, 1920.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

General Minimum Piece-rates for the following processes in the Machine-made Lace and

Net Finishing other than the Finishing of the Product of Plain Net Machines:—

A. Lace other than Warp Lace.

1. Drawing:

(a) For one thread drawing: 6½d. per gross yards (the ties on both sides being counted).

Provided that in cases where there are not more than 12 ties of the draw-thread to the inch (ties on both sides of the draw-thread being counted) the minimum rate payable shall be 5½d. per gross yards.

(b) For two-thread drawing, 8½d. per gross yards.

(c) For drawing three or more threads, 3d. per thread per gross yards.

Provided that in Maltese, Honiton, Clunies and similar classes of lace where there are laced out purl effects in the body of the pattern, and where such laces are of finer count than 80/2, the rate shall be 3½d. per thread per gross yards for all such fine threads.

2. Roving:

(a) For one Rover, or for two Rovers which come out together, 1½d. per gross yards.

(b) For each Rover subsequent to the first, or to the first two which come out together, ½d. per thread per gross yards.

When drawing is done, all Rovers lying with the Draw-threads if removed, whether according to instructions or not, to be paid for at the above rates. The expression "Rover" includes "Drop-thread."

3. Ripping and Roving:

(a) For Ripping and one Rover, 1½d. per gross yards.

(b) For Ripping and two Rovers, 2½d. per gross yards.

4. Clipping other than Frame Clipping:

(a) For Lace up to and including 8 inches wide, 2½d. per 1,000 clips.

(b) For Lace over 8 inches and under 12 inches wide, 3d. per 1,000 clips.

(c) For Lace of 12 inches wide and over, 3½d. per 1,000 clips.

Two cuts shall count as one clip.

5. Scolloping:

I. Scolloping other than Scolloping which involves more than four cuts to the Scollop:

(a) For Scolloping Cross-band laces and for ripping and scolloping in cases where there are no parting or purl threads, and where the scollop is single, $1\frac{1}{2}$ d. per dozen yards.

In the case of Cross-band laces, the rate for Scolloping does not include the work of separating the breadths, which shall be paid at the rate of $2\frac{3}{4}$ d. for 12 breadths, 5 yards long, whether the separation of the breadths involves straight cutting or not.

(b) For Scolloping lace of 40 inches and over to the double rack, 2d. per dozen yards.

(c) For Scolloping lace of 24 inches to 40 inches to the double rack, $2\frac{1}{2}$ d. per dozen yards.

(d) For Scolloping lace finer than 24 inches to the double rack, $3\frac{1}{2}$ d. per dozen yards.

II. Scolloping involving more than four cuts to the Scollop:

(a) For lace of 40 inches and over to the double rack, $2\frac{3}{4}$ d. per dozen yards.

(b) For lace of 24 inches to 40 inches to the double rack, $3\frac{3}{4}$ d. per dozen yards.

(c) For lace finer than 24 inches to the double rack, $4\frac{1}{2}$ d. per dozen yards.

In the application of the above rates for Scolloping:

(1) The General Minimum Piece-rates shall not apply to any scollop more than 1 inch deep from purl edge to the dip of the scollop;

(2) Where the lace has 72 or more scollops to the yard, $\frac{3}{4}$ d. per dozen yards extra on the above rates for ordinary scolloping shall be paid.

(3) The General Minimum Piece rates shall not apply to the scolloping of vandykes, galons and fancy shapes;

(4) Scolloping shall be held to include all cutting other than straight cutting;

(5) Where one cut clears two edges it shall count as one scollop.

The above rates for Scolloping include the necessary work of Drawing.

6. Cross-band Cutting:

(a) For Cutting Cross-band lace up to 50 inches to the double rack, $2\frac{3}{4}$ d. for 12 breadths, 5 yards long.

(b) For Cutting Cross-band lace over 50 inches to the double rack, $2\frac{1}{2}$ d. for 12 breadths, 5 yards long.

Breadths of other dimensions to be paid for in proportion. (For Cross-band Cutting and Scolloping, see 5 (1) (a) above).

7. Straight Snicking or Slotting:

(a) For Slots up to and including 1 inch in width (inside measurement), $4\frac{1}{2}$ d. per 1,000 slots.

(b) For Slots over 1 inch and not exceeding $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches in width (inside measurement), $5\frac{3}{4}$ d. per 1,000 slots.

B.—Lace which is the Product of Warp Machines.

1. Drawing:

(a) Bar Warps:

(1) For widths not exceeding $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches, $1\frac{1}{2}$ d. per thread for 12 breadths of 12 yards.

(2) For widths exceeding $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches:

(i) One thread drawing, $1\frac{1}{2}$ d. per thread for 12 breadths of 12 yards.

(ii) For drawing two or more threads, $1\frac{3}{4}$ d. per thread for 12 breadths of 12 yards.

(b) String Warps:

(1) Up to and including 16 gauge:

(i) For widths not exceeding 7 inches, $1\frac{1}{2}$ d. per thread for 12 breadths of 12 yards.

(ii) For widths exceeding 7 inches, 2d. per thread for 12 breadths of 12 yards.

(2) Over 16 gauge: All widths, $2\frac{3}{4}$ d. per thread for 12 breadths of 12 yards.

2. Plain Cutting:

(a) Bar Warps:

$1\frac{1}{2}$ d. per 12 breadths of 12 yards.

(b) String Warps:

(1) Up to and including 16 gauge, $1\frac{1}{2}$ d. per 12 breadths of 12 yards.

(2) Over 16 gauge, $1\frac{3}{4}$ d. per 12 breadths of 12 yards.

PART II.

General Minimum Piece-Rates for the following Processes in the Finishing of Hair Nets, whether they are the Product of Plain Net Machines or not:—

1. Threading Hair Nets:

A. Hair Nets which are the product of Warp Machines.

(a) Hair Nets up to and including $12\frac{1}{2}$ inches with 38 holes or less, $8\frac{3}{4}$ d. per gross nets.

(b) Hair Nets of over $12\frac{1}{2}$ inches but under 18 inches, with 48 holes or less, 11d. per gross nets.

(c) All sizes of 18 inches and over with 50 holes or less, 1s. $1\frac{1}{2}$ d. per gross nets.

(d) For every 8 holes additional to those above specified, $\frac{3}{4}$ d. per gross nets.

B. Hair Nets which are the product of Levers or Plain Net Machines:

The General Minimum Piece-Rates for Threading Hair Nets which are the product of Levers or Plain Net Machines shall be higher by 25 per cent. than the General Minimum Piece-Rates for Threading Hair Nets which are the Product of Warp Machines, as specified above.

2. Carding Hair Nets (whether the product of Plain Net Machines or not):

All sizes of cards, $1\frac{1}{2}$ d. per gross Nets.

The above rate shall apply also to Bundling in dozens without cards.

When Threading and Carding are done at the same time the rate shall be the sum of the respective rates specified above.

3. Ticketing Hair Nets (whether the product of Plain Net Machines or not):

For all Ticketing done at the same time as Threading, 1d. per gross nets.

Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained, the application of the General Minimum Piece-Rates set out in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule shall be subject to the following conditions:—

(a) The General Minimum Piece-Rates shall not apply in any case where special difficulty is caused by bad cotton, making or dressing. In all such cases the Piece-Rate paid must be such as will yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker at least the equivalent of the General Minimum Time-Rate.

(b) Workers who fetch their own work from the Warehouse, and do not receive it through a Middlewoman or Middleman, shall

be entitled to a Minimum Rate not less than 15 per cent. above that otherwise payable.

(c) The General Minimum Piece-Rates set out above apply to the actual workers and not to Middlewomen or Middlemen; the practice of good employers is to pay Middlewomen or Middlemen in addition to such rates a commission of 25 per cent.

Note.—As regards all work for which no general minimum piece-rates are fixed, the piece-rates paid by the employer must be such as will yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker at least the equivalent of the general minimum time-rate.

PART III.

General Minimum Time-Rates for the Trade of Machine-made Lace and Net Finishing, including the Finishing of those Hair Nets, Veilings and Quillings which are the Product of Plain Net Machines, but excluding the Finishing of all other Products of Plain Net Machines.

A. Workers other than Learners, 7d. per hour.

B. Learners as defined in Part IV of this Schedule.

(c) Are working on frame clipping in either a warehouse or a workshop.

(d) Hold a certificate from the Trade Board issued on an application made at the commencement of the employment or within such period thereafter as the Trade Board may in any case or class of cases allow. Provided always that in granting or withholding such certificate the Trade Board may take into consideration whether, having regard to the number of learners employed in any factory or workshop or under any journeyman or worker, the learner proposed to be certificated has a reasonable prospect of receiving due instruction. Provided also that any certificate may be withdrawn if the Trade Board consider that the conditions of employment have ceased to be such as would have originally justified the grant thereof.

The above minimum rates of wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, and the Trade Boards (Hat, Cap and Millinery) Order, 1919, for the Hat, Cap and Millinery Trade in England and Wales as defined in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour and dated 20th November, 1919, hereby give Notice as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they propose to fix General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-work Basis Time-Rates, and Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers and to declare the normal number of hours of work in the trade for the purpose of the application of the Overtime Rates, as shown in the Schedule set out below.

SECTION I.—For Female Workers (other than Learners, as defined in Section I. of Part IV. of this Schedule):—

The General Minimum Time-Rates for Learners under 14 years of age shall be 9s. per week of 48 hours, or 2½d. per hour, and from the age of 14 years they shall be entitled to the amounts shown in Column I. above as if they had commenced at 14.

(c) The Minimum Rates for Learners set out in Sub-sections (a) and (b) of this Section shall be subject to the following conditions:—

(i) The weekly rates set out above are based on a week of 48 hours, and are subject to a proportionate deduction according as the number of hours actually spent by the learner in the factory or workshop in any week is less than 48.

(ii) The advances to be given to learners commencing at under 21 years of age shall become due as from the first Monday in January and July of each year, the learner being entitled to her first advance from the first Monday in January or July as the case may be, provided that she has been in the trade at least three months.

(iii) A learner shall cease to be a learner and be entitled to the full General Minimum Time-Rate applicable to her under Section I. of Part I. of this Schedule, upon the fulfilment of the following conditions:—

Age of Entering upon Employment, and Conditions.

Under 15 years of age, the completion of not less than 3 years' employment, and the attainment of the age of 18 years.

15 and under 16 years of age, the completion of not less than 2 years' employment, and the attainment of the age of 18 years.

16 and under 21 years of age, the completion of 2 years' employment.

21 years of age and over, the completion of 1 year's employment.

(iv) No female learner shall be held to be entitled to the full General Minimum Time-Rate under Section I. of Part I. of this Schedule until she has attained the age of 18 years, notwithstanding any employment she may have had. Provided that in determining the age of entry and the length of employment, all service prior to the age of 14 shall be disregarded.

SECTION III.—Male Workers.

Workers of 22 years of age and upwards, 1s. 2d. per hour.

Workers of 21 and under 22 years of age, 1s. per hour.

Workers of 20 and under 21 years of age, 10½d. per hour.

Workers of 19 and under 20 years of age, 9d. per hour.

Workers of 18 and under 19 years of age, 7½d. per hour.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 6d. per hour.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 5d. per hour.

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 4d. per hour.

Workers under 15 years of age, 3d. per hour.

Workers commencing employment in the Hat, Cap and Millinery Trade for the first time at and over the age of 19 may serve a period of 6 months at 7d. per hour, and thereafter a period of six months at 8½d. per hour.

On the expiration of one year's service in the trade, these workers shall receive such rates as their age may entitle them to under the foregoing provisions.

PART II.

Proposed Piece-work Basis Time-Rates.

SECTION I.—Female Workers.

(a) All Female Workers other than Homewriters, 9½d. per hour.

(b) Homewriters, 9½d. per hour.

In the case of all female workers employed on piece-work, each piece-rate paid must be such as would yield in the circumstances of the case not less than 9½d. per hour, to an ordinary worker. Provided that in determining as to whether any piece-rate satisfies the foregoing condition, regard shall be had only to the earnings of workers other than learners.

SECTION II. Male Workers.

All Male Workers, 1s. 3½d. per hour.

In the case of all male workers employed on piece-work, each piece-rate paid shall be such as would yield in the circumstances of the case not less than 1s. 3½d. per hour to an ordinary worker. Provided that in determining as to whether any piece-rate satisfies the foregoing condition, regard shall be had only to the earnings of workers of 22 years of age and upwards.

PART III.

Proposed Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers (All Ages).

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade

Board propose to declare the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—

In any week, 48

On any day (other than Saturday), 9.

On Saturday, 5.

Provided that all hours worked by a worker on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by a worker, whether engaged on Time-work or on Piece-work, in excess of the declared normal number of hours, shall be as follows, that is to say:—

1. For the first two hours' overtime on any day, except Saturdays, Sundays, and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rates shall be equivalent to time and a quarter, that is to say, one and a quarter times the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

2. For overtime after the first two hours of overtime on any day except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, and for all overtime on Saturdays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to time and a half, that is to say, one and a half times the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

3. For all time worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to double time, that is to say, twice the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

4. For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48 the Overtime Rate shall be time and a quarter except in so far as higher overtime rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs 2 and 3 of this Section. The Overtime Rate shall be payable where on any day (not being a Sunday or a Customary Public or Statutory Holiday), the number of hours worked exceeds 9 or, in the case of Saturday, exceeds 5, notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

Provided—

(a) That where it is or may become the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on 5 days a week, the Overtime Rate shall only be payable where on any day the number of hours worked exceeds 9½.

(b) That where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the normal number of hours for the week in which attendance on Saturday is required shall be deemed to be 50.

(c) That where a worker who is of the Jewish religion and subject to Section 48 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, is employed on Sunday instead of Saturday the Minimum Rates for Overtime as set out above shall apply to such worker in like manner as if in the provisions of this Notice as to Overtime the word "Saturday" were substituted for "Sunday" and the word "Sunday" for "Saturday."

But in the application of these provisos, where the employer requires attendance on any day on which it is not the established practice of the employer to require attendance, all time worked on such day (not being a Sunday or a Customary Public or Statutory Holiday) shall be paid for at time and a quarter for the first two hours and time and a half thereafter.

Note.—The hours of work which female workers and young persons are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901.

PART IV.

For the purpose of this Notice the following definitions shall apply:—

SECTION I.—A female learner is a worker who—

(a) Is employed during the whole or a substantial part of her time in learning any branch or process of the trade specified in Part V. of this Schedule by an employer who provides the learner with reasonable facilities for such learning; and

(b) Has received a certificate or has been registered in accordance with rules from time to time laid down by the Trade Board, and held subject to compliance with the conditions contained in this Section, or has made an application for such certificate or registration which has been duly acknowledged and is still under consideration. Provided that the certification or registration of a learner may be cancelled if the other conditions of learnership are not complied with.

Provided that an employer may employ a female learner on her first employment without a certificate or registration for a probation period not exceeding four weeks, but in the event of such learner being continued thereafter at her employment the probation period shall be included in her period of learnership.

Provided that, notwithstanding compliance with the conditions contained in this Section, a person shall not be deemed to be a learner if she works in a room used for dwelling purposes and is not in the employment of her parent or guardian.

SECTION II.—The expression "Home-worker" shall be held to mean a worker who works in her own home or any other place not under the control or management of the employer.

PART V.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in England and Wales who are employed during the whole or any part of their time in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Hat, Cap and Millinery) Order, 1919, that is to say—the making from any material of men's, women's or children's headgear, or the trimming thereof;

Including:—Warehousing, packing or other operations incidental to or appertaining to the making or trimming of men's, women's or children's headgear;

But excluding:

1. The casting and making of solid metal helmets;

2. The making of rubberised or oilskin headgear where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making of other rubberised or oilskin articles;

3. The making of nurses' or servants' caps, chefs' caps, hospital ward caps, or similar articles;

4. The making of field bonnets, sun-bonnets, boudoir caps, or infants' millinery where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making of dresses, non-tailored skirts, wraps, blouses, blouse-robots,

jumpers, sports coats, neckwear, tea-gowns, dressing gowns, dressing jackets, pyjamas, underclothing, under-skirts, aprons, overalls, nurses' and servants' caps, juvenile clothing, baby linen or similar articles;

5. The making of fur hats, where made in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of furs or furriers' skins into garments, rugs, or similar articles;

6. The making of knitted headgear and the making of headgear from knitted fabrics where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of the knitted fabric;

7. Warehousing and packing of men's, women's, and children's headgear and other similar operations carried on in shops mainly engaged in the retail distribution of articles of any description that are not made or trimmed on the premises.

PART VI.

SECTION I.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages, or to agreements made, or that may be made, between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of the Minimum Rates.

The Trade Board will consider any objections to the above proposals to fix which may be lodged with them within two months from the 31st January, 1920. Such objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Hat, Cap and Millinery Trade Board (England and Wales), 5, Chancery Lane, London, W.C. 2.

It is desirable that the objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

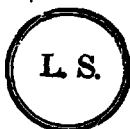

FLINTSHIRE AND DISTRICT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1920.

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders, as follows:—

Movement into, out of, or within Scheduled District.

1.—(1) No cattle, sheep, goats or swine shall be landed in or moved into or out of the District described in the Schedule to this Order, hereinafter referred to as the Scheduled District, or be moved along, over, or across, or be allowed by the owner or person in charge thereof to stray upon a highway or thoroughfare within the Scheduled District; provided that nothing in this Order shall be deemed to apply to the movement of animals into or out of the Scheduled District where they are moved through such District by railway from a place outside such District to another place outside such District, without unnecessary delay, and without the animals being untrucked within such District except for the purposes of feeding or watering the animals within the railway station premises where such untrucking takes place.

(2.) If any farm (except any detached part) is partly within and partly without the Scheduled District, the whole shall be deemed to be within the Scheduled District.

Power to Restrict Movement of Persons in Certain Cases.

2.—(1.) An Inspector of the Local Authority acting under their direction may serve a Notice on the occupier of any field, shed, or other place in the Scheduled District, prohibiting the entry of any person into any such field, shed, or other place, and thereupon, notwithstanding the existence of any footpath or right-of-way, no person shall enter the field, shed, or other place to which the Notice relates while any cattle, sheep, goats or swine are therein, otherwise than in accordance with the following regulation, that is to say:

(i) The owner of the field, shed, or other place, or of the animals therein, or the agent or servants of such owner, may enter such field, shed, or other place so far as may be necessary for the feeding or tending of the animals.

(ii) Any other person may enter such field, shed, or other place with a licence of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries.

(2.) Copies of such Notice shall be affixed or exhibited by the Inspector in such manner as he shall think desirable for ensuring notification of the restrictions thereby imposed.

(3.) A copy of every such Notice shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, Whitehall Place, London, S.W.

Power to restrict Movement of Dogs and Poultry in Certain Cases.

3.—(1.) An Inspector of the Ministry, or of the Local Authority acting under their direction, may, for the purpose of preventing the spread of Foot-and-Mouth Disease, by a Notice served on the occupier of any premises in the Scheduled District, require him:—

- (a) to keep in confinement, or under control, as may be prescribed by the Notice, dogs on such premises;
- or (b) to confine live poultry on such premises in a pen or other like enclosure;
- or (c) to prevent the access of live poultry to any specific part of the premises to which cattle, sheep, goats, or swine have, or recently have had, access;

and if any occupier after service of any such Notice shall fail to comply with the requirements thereof, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(2.) An Inspector of the Ministry, or of the Local Authority acting under their direction, may, for the purpose of preventing the spread of Foot-and-Mouth Disease, by Notice affixed or exhibited by the Inspector in such manner as he shall think desirable for ensuring notification of the restrictions thereby imposed, require dogs to be kept by the person in charge thereof under control while passing along any road or footpath specified in such Notice, and if any person in charge of a dog while passing along any road or footpath to which any such Notice relates fails to keep the dog under control, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(3.) Every Notice served on an occupier of premises shall remain in operation until it is withdrawn by a further Notice served by an Inspector of the Ministry or of the Local Authority.

(4.) A copy of every Notice served by an Inspector of the Local Authority under this Article shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the General Secretary, Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, Whitehall Place, London, S.W.

Local Authority to Enforce Order.

4. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

5.—(1.) If an animal is landed in contravention of this Order, the Owner, and the charterer and the master of the vessel from which it is landed, and the owner of the animal and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing or permitting the landing, and the person landing the same, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been landed in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(2.) If an animal is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the animal and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which

the animal is moved shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(3.) If any person enters any field, shed, or other place in contravention of this Order, or of a Notice served thereunder, such person shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Short Title.

6. This Order may be cited as the FLINTSHIRE AND DISTRICT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1920.

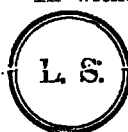
