TRADE BOARDS ACTS, 1909 AND 1918.

COFFIN FURNITURE AND CEREMENT-MAKING TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

PROPOSAL TO FIX MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established in Great

Britain under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Branches of Trade specified in the Trade Boards (Coffin Furniture and Cerement-Making) Order, 1919, hereby give Notice as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they propose to Fix General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates, and Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers, and to Declare the Normal Number of Hours of Work in the Trade for the purpose of the application of the Overtime Rates as set out in the Schedule below.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

*Proposed General Minimum Time-Rates for Male and Female Workers.
Coffin Furniture Section of the Trade.*

MALE WORKERS.

Section I.—For Male Workers employed as:—

Dressers, Stampers, Polishers or Planishers.

A.—Workers of 21-years of age and over.

(a) Dressers and Stampers.

Workers of Grade I as hereinafter defined, 70s. 6d. per week of 47 hours.

Workers of Grade II as hereinafter defined, 78s. per week of 47 hours.

Workers of Grade III as hereinafter defined, 84s. per week of 47 hours.

(b) Polishers and Planishers.

Workers of Grade I as hereinafter defined, 72s. per week of 47 hours.

Workers of Grade II as hereinafter defined, 81s. per week of 47 hours.

Workers of Grade III as hereinafter defined, 86s. per week of 47 hours.

Provided that a Male Worker entering the trade as a Dresser, Stamper, Polisher or Planisher for the first time at or over the age of 21 may be employed, during the first three months of his employment, at a rate of 10s. per week less, and during the second three months of his employment at a rate of 5s. per week less than the minimum rate otherwise applicable as set out above.

Definitions.—For the purpose of the above rates the following definitions shall apply:—

Dressers.

A Dresser of Grade I is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on Dressing and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II or Grade III next hereinafter respectively defined.

A Dresser of Grade II is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Dresser and who turns, screws inside and out, files flat and square at the vice, and finishes his own work throughout.

A Dresser of Grade III is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II as above defined, is also an expert in all processes or is a Charge Hand with the duty of being responsible for all work and order in the shop.

Stampers.

A Stamper of Grade I is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on Stamping and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II or Grade III next hereinafter respectively defined.

A Stamper of Grade II is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Stamper and is an

expert in all processes, and who undertakes all classes of work of all strengths of metal used.

A Stamper of Grade III is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II as above defined, is an expert in all classes of Stamping, Pressing and Cutting-out by hand or who is a Charge Hand with the duty of being responsible for all work and order in the shop.

Polishers.

A Polisher of Grade I is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on Polishing and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II and Grade III next hereinafter respectively defined.

A Polisher of Grade II is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Polisher and is an expert in all processes of any class of common work and can emery-bob and mop best work.

A Polisher of Grade III is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II as above defined, is also an expert in all processes of both common and best work or is a Charge Hand with the duty of being responsible for all work and order in the shop.

Planishers.

A Planisher of Grade I is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on Planishing and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II or Grade III next hereinafter respectively defined.

A Planisher of Grade II is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Planisher and is an expert in all processes and is able to do good class work.

A Planisher of Grade III is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II as above defined, is employed in making Mitred Breast Plates or handles a Plate of any design.

B.—Workers of under 21 years of age.

1. Workers under 15 years of age, 16s. 6d. per week of 47 hours.
2. Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 23s. 6d. per week of 47 hours.
3. Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 27s. per week of 47 hours.
4. Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 33s. per week of 47 hours.
5. Workers of 18 and under 19 years of age,
 - (a) who have had less than 2 years' experience in the branch of trade in which they are engaged, 33s. per week of 47 hours.
 - (b) who have had 2 years and less than 3 years' experience in the branch of trade in which they are engaged, 39s. per week of 47 hours.
 - (c) who have had not less than 3 years' experience in the branch of trade in which they are engaged, 42s. per week of 47 hours.
6. Workers of 19 and under 20 years of age:
 - (a) who have had less than 3 years' experience in the branch of trade in which they are engaged, 39s. per week of 47 hours.
 - (b) who have had 3 years' and less than 5 years' experience in the branch of trade in which they are engaged, 45s. per week of 47 hours.
 - (c) who have had not less than 5 years' experience in the branch of trade in which they are engaged, 49s. 6d. per week of 47 hours.
7. Workers of 20 and under 21 years of age:
 - (a) who have had less than 3 years'

experience in the branch of trade in which they are engaged, 45s. per week of 47 hours.

(b) who have had 3 years' and less than 5 years' experience in the branch of trade in which they are engaged, 51s. per week of 47 hours.

(c) who have had not less than 5 years' experience in the branch of trade in which they are engaged, 55s. 6d. per week of 47 hours.

Section II.—For Male Workers employed on:—

Packing, Rough Warehousing and Despatching, or other operations incidental to or appertaining to the manufacture of Coffin Furniture from any metal by any process:—

1. Workers of 18 and under 19 years of age, 34s. per week of 47 hours.
2. Workers of 19 and under 20 years of age:
 - (a) who have had less than 1 year's experience in the work on which they are employed or similar work, 34s. per week of 47 hours.
 - (b) who have had not less than 1 year's experience in the work on which they are employed or similar work, 40s. per week of 47 hours.
3. Workers of 20 and under 21 years of age:
 - (a) who have had less than 1 year's experience in the work on which they are employed or similar work, 40s. per week of 47 hours.
 - (b) who have had not less than 1 year's experience in the work on which they are employed or similar work, 47s. per week of 47 hours.
4. Workers of 21 years of age or over:
 - (a) who have had less than 1 year's experience in the work on which they are employed or similar work, 47s. per week of 47 hours.
 - (b) who have had not less than 1 year's and less than 5 years' experience in the work on which they are employed or similar work, 54s. per week of 47 hours.
 - (c) who have had not less than 5 years' experience in the work on which they are employed or similar work, 60s. per week of 47 hours.

FEMALE WORKERS.

Section III.—For Female Workers employed as:—

Polishers, Heavy Press Workers, Stampers and Blackers.

Workers of all Ages.

During the first year of employment in the class of work in which the worker is employed, 32s. per week of 47 hours.

During the second and third years of employment in the class of work in which the worker is employed, 36s. per week of 47 hours.

After the completion of three years of employment in the class of work in which the worker is employed, 38s. per week of 47 hours.

Provided that with respect to Polishers who have had not less than three years' experience on the operation of Polishing and are capable also of Roughing, by whatever process, and of Finishing, the minimum rate payable shall be 42s. per week of 47 hours.

Section IV.—For Female Workers employed as:—

Light Press Workers, Lace Cutters, and Lacquerers.

A.—Workers under 18 years of age.

1. Workers employed under 15 years of age, 15s. per week of 47 hours.

2. Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 16s. 6d. per week of 47 hours.

3. Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 18s. per week of 47 hours.

4. Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 21s. per week of 47 hours.

B.—Workers of 18 years of age and over.

2. Workers of 15 years of age and under 16, 16s. 6d. per week of 47 hours.

3. Workers of 16 years of age and under 17, 18s. per week of 47 hours.

4. Workers of 17 years of age and under 18, 21s. per week of 47 hours.

B.—Workers of 18 years of age and over.

Section VI.—All the above Weekly Minimum Rates; both for Male and Female Workers, are based on a week of 47 hours, and are subject to a proportionate deduction, according as the number of hours spent in the factory or workshop in any week under contract of employment is less than 47.

*Cerement-making Section of the Trade.
Female Workers.*

Section VII.—For all Female Workers (other than Pinkers and Choppers), including workers employed on Folding, Packing, Warehousing, Despatching or other operations incidental to or appertaining to the manufacture of articles in the Cerement-making Section of the Trade.

A.—Workers under 18 years of age.

1. Workers under 14½ years of age, 3d. per hour.

2. Workers of 14½ and under 15 years of age, 3½d. per hour.

3. Workers of 15 and under 15½ years of age, 3½d. per hour.

4. Workers of 15½ and under 16 years of age, 4d. per hour.

5. Workers of 16 and under 16½ years of age, 4½d. per hour.

6. Workers of 16½ and under 17 years of age, 5½d. per hour.

7. Workers of 17 and under 17½ years of age, 6d. per hour.

8. Workers of 17½ and under 18 years of age, 7d. per hour.

Provided that female workers entering the Cerement-making Section of the Trade for the first time between the ages of 16 and 18 years may be employed during the first twelvemonth at a minimum rate which is 1d. per hour less than the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

B.—Workers of 18 years of age or over.

9. Workers of 18 and under 21 years of age:

(a) Who have had less than 1 year's experience in the Cerement-making Section of the Trade, 7d. per hour.

(b) Who have had 1 year's and less than

2 years' experience in the Cerement-making Section of the Trade, 7½d.

(c) Who have had not less than 2 years' experience in the Cerement-making Section of the Trade, 8d. per hour.

10. Workers of 21 years of age or over:

(a) Who have had less than 1 year's experience in the Cerement-making Section of the Trade, 7½d. per hour.

(b) Who have had 1 year's and less than 2 years' experience in the Cerement-making Section of the Trade, 8d. per hour.

(c) Who have had not less than 2 years' experience in the Cerement-making Section of the Trade, 8½d. per hour.

Provided that with respect to workers of 24 years of age or over who have had not less than 4 years' experience in the Cerement-making Section of the Trade the minimum rate payable shall be, 9d per hour.

Section VIII.—Pinkers.—The Minimum Rates for Female Pinkers shall be those set out in Section VII. above, with the addition thereto of 1d. per hour in each case.

Section IX.—Choppers.—The Minimum Rates for Female Choppers shall be those set out in Section VII. above, with the addition thereto of ½d. per hour in each case.

PART II.

Proposed Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates for Male and Female Workers.

Section I.—The Coffin Furniture Section of the Trade.

The proposed Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates for Male and Female Piece-Workers in the Coffin Furniture Section of the Trade specified in Part IV of this Schedule shall be as follows:—

(i) For all Male Workers of 21 years of age and over, 15 per cent. above the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rates as proposed in Sections I and II of Part I of this Schedule.

(ii) For all Female Workers of 18 years of age and over, 15 per cent. above the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rates as proposed in Sections III, IV, and V of Part I of this Schedule.

The Cerement-making Section of the Trade.

The proposed Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates for all Female Piece-Workers of 18 years of age and over employed in the Cerement-making Section of the Trade specified in Part IV of this Schedule shall be 1d. per hour higher than the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rates as proposed in Sections VII, VIII, and IX of Part I of this Schedule.

Section II.—In cases where a worker is employed on Piece-Work, each Piece-Rate paid shall be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker not less than the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate or, in the case of male workers under 21 years of age and in the case of female workers under 18 years of age, not less than the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate.

PART III.

Proposed Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers (all Ages).

Section I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board propose to declare the normal number

of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—

In any week (exclusive of Sunday and any Customary Public or Statutory Holidays)	47.
On any day other than Saturday ...	9.
On Saturday	5.

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

Section II.—The proposed Overtime Rates in respect of hours worked by a worker in excess of the declared normal number of hours of work in the trade, in the case of workers employed on Time-Work, shall be equivalent to time-and-a-fifth, that is to say, one and one-fifth times the General Minimum Time-Rates otherwise applicable.

Provided that:—

(a) For all time worked on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to time-and-a-half, that is to say, one-and-a-half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable; and

(b) For all time worked on Sundays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to double-time, that is to say, twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable.

The Overtime Rate shall be payable in respect of all hours worked in excess of 5 on a Saturday and in respect of all hours worked in excess of 9 on any other day (not being a Sunday or Customary Public or Statutory Holiday), notwithstanding that the total number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 47.

Section III.—Workers employed on Piece-Work shall be entitled to receive in respect of each hour of overtime as defined above, in addition to Piece-Rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker at least the equivalent of the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable, or where no Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate has been fixed, the equivalent of the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable:—

As respects—

(a) All employment on a Sunday, a sum equivalent to the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate per hour proposed in Part I. of this Schedule.

(b) All employment on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, a sum equivalent to half the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate per hour proposed in Part I. of this Schedule.

(c) All other Overtime, a sum equivalent to one-fifth of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate per hour proposed in Part I. of this Schedule.

Section IV.—The hours of Overtime which Female Workers and young persons are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901.

PART IV.

The Minimum Rates of Wages for Male and Female Workers proposed in Parts I., II., and III. of this Schedule shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in Great Britain who are employed during the whole or any part of their time in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade

Boards (Coffin Furniture and Cerement-Making) Order, 1919, that is to say:—

(a) The manufacture, wherever carried on, of Coffin Furniture from any metal by any process.

(b) The manufacture of Cerements, including shrouds, face curtains, face cloths, sidecloths, winding sheets, pillow covers, coffin pads, sleeves or frilling.

Including:

(c) The operations of folding, packing, warehousing, despatching or other operations incidental to or appertaining to the manufacture of any of the above-mentioned articles.

PART V.

Section I.—The General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates and Overtime Rates proposed in Parts I., II., and III. of this Schedule shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other Provident Fund.

Section II.—The above General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates and Overtime Rates are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above Proposals which may be lodged with them within two months from 12th February, 1920. Such Objections should be in writing, and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Coffin Furniture and Cerement-Making Trade Board (Great Britain), 5, Chancery Lane, London, W.C.2.

It is desirable that Objections should state precisely what is objected to, and, so far as possible, the reasons for the Objections.

TRADE BOARDS ACTS, 1909 AND 1918.

AERATED WATERS TRADE BOARD (SCOTLAND).

PROPOSAL TO FIX MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established in Scotland under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Aerated Waters Trade as specified in the Trade Boards (Aerated Waters) Order, 1919, hereby give notice, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they propose to fix General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers, and to declare the normal number of hours of work in the trade for the purpose of the application of the Overtime Rates, as set out below.

PART I.

Proposed General Minimum Time-Rates.

SECTION I.—*Male Workers.*

For Workers under 16 years of age 4½d. per hour.

For Workers of 16 years and under 17 years of age, 5½d. per hour.

For Workers of 17 years and under 18 years of age, 6½d. per hour.

For Workers of 18 years and under 19 years of age, 7½d. per hour.

For Workers of 19 years and under 20 years of age, 9½d. per hour.

For Workers of 20 years and under 21 years of age, 11½d. per hour.

For Workers of 21 years of age and over, 1s. 2d. per hour.

SECTION II.—*Female Workers.*

For Workers under 16 years of age, 4½d. per hour.

For Workers of 16 years and under 17 years of age, 5½d. per hour.

For Workers of 17 years and under 18 years of age, 6½d. per hour.

For Workers of 18 years of age and over, 7½d. per hour.

PART II.

Proposed Overtime Rates.

SECTION I.

In accordance with Section 3 (1) (o) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board propose to declare the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—

In any week 48

Provided that all hours worked by a worker on Sundays and on generally recognised district holidays not exceeding six in number in any one year shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.

The Minimum Rates for Overtime for all Male and Female Workers in respect of hours worked by a worker in excess of the normal number of hours proposed to be declared by the Trade Board, as set out in Section I. of this Part of this Notice, shall be as follows, that is to say:—

(1) For all time worked on Sundays and on generally recognised district Holidays not exceeding six in number in any one year, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to Double Time, that is to say, twice the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

(2) For all time worked in excess of 48 hours in any week the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to Time and a Half, that is to say, one and a half times the minimum rate otherwise applicable, except in so far as Double Time is payable under the provisions of paragraph (1) of this Section.

NOTE.—The hours of work which female workers and young persons are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901.

PART III.

The above minimum rates of wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in Scotland who are employed during the whole or any part of

their time in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Aerated Waters) Order, 1919, that is to say:—

The manufacture, wherever carried on, of mineral or aerated waters, non-alcoholic cordials, flavoured syrups, unfermented sweet drinks and other similar beverages, and the manufacture in unlicensed premises of brewed liquors,

including:

(a) the operations of bottle washing, bottling and filling and all other operations preparatory to the sale of any of the aforesaid liquors in bottles, jars, syphons, casks or other similar receptacles;

and including also:

(b) the operations of bottle washing, bottling and filling, and all subsidiary operations preparatory to the sale in bottles, jars or other similar receptacles of cider, ale, stout, porter and other alcoholic beers, where all or any of such last mentioned operations are, or is, conducted or carried on in association with or in conjunction with all or any of the operations specified under (a) above so as to form a common or interchangeable form of employment for workers, and whether the two sets of operations or any of them are, or is, carried on simultaneously or not.

PART IV.

SECTION I.

The above General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

SECTION II.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages.

The Trade Board will consider any objections to the above Proposal to Fix Minimum Rates which may be lodged with them within two months from 17th February, 1920. Such objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Aerated Waters Trade Board (Scotland), 5, Chancery Lane, London, W.C. 2.

It is desirable that objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF
1920 (No. 2).

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

Modification of Order.

1. The Flintshire and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1920, hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order," is modified in the manner hereinafter contained.

Continued Prohibition of Movement in certain Prohibited Area.

2.—(1) The provisions of the principal Order shall apply without modification to the area described in the First Schedule hereto hereinafter referred to as the Prohibited Area.

(2) If any farm (except any detached part) is partly within and partly without the Prohibited Area, the whole shall be deemed to be within the Prohibited Area.

Provision as to movement for slaughter into the parts of the Scheduled District not included in the Prohibited Area.

3.—(1.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved by railway without a licence from premises not situate within any District which is for the time being a scheduled district for the purposes of an Order of the Minister relating to foot-and-mouth disease to a railway station or landing place in the Scheduled District which is not situate in the Prohibited Area, and an animal so moved may be moved from the railway station or landing place to any slaughterhouse in the Scheduled District which is not situate in the Prohibited Area if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the railway station or landing place is situate.

(2) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved by road from any premises not situate within any District which is for the time being a scheduled district for the purposes of an Order of the Minister relating to foot-and-mouth disease to any slaughterhouse in the Scheduled District which is not situate in the Prohibited Area if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the slaughterhouse is situate.

Movement within the Scheduled District excluding the Prohibited Area.

4. Where an Inspector of the Local Authority considers it necessary or expedient that an animal in his district should be permitted to be moved from premises in the Scheduled

District not situate in the Prohibited Area to any other premises in the Scheduled District not situate in the Prohibited Area, he may authorise such movement by a Movement Licence.

Provisions as to Movement Licences.

5.—(1.) Where the movement authorised by a Movement Licence granted under this Order is movement to a slaughterhouse from premises other than a railway station or landing place an animal shall not be moved with the Licence unless before the movement is commenced it is marked by and at the expense of the owner in manner following:—

Cattle.—By the clipping of a broad arrow ↑ about six inches long on the left hind-quarter of each of the cattle and by the clipping of the hair off the end of the tail.

Sheep.—By the clipping of a broad arrow ↑ on the forehead of each of the sheep; and also by the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the sheep with the following composition, namely: Rosin, five parts; oil of turpentine, two parts; and blue or red ochre, one part; melted and used warm; or with some other adhesive composition of a blue or red colour.

Swine.—By the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the swine with the composition above mentioned.

(2.) A Movement Licence under this Order shall not be granted by an Inspector of a Local Authority unless he is satisfied that the proposed movement will not involve movement on a road in a Prohibited Area.

(3.) Where the movement authorised by a Movement Licence is movement as often as occasion may require, either between different parts of the same farm or between different farms, the Licence shall be marked with the words "Occupation Licence," and shall be in force until it is revoked by an Inspector of the Local Authority, or of the Ministry by a Notice served on the occupier of the farm on which the animals then are.

(4.) Every Licence shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted, the number and description of the animals authorised to be moved, and the name or description of the several premises to and from which the animals are authorised to be moved.

(5.) Where animals are moved with a Licence under this Order, unless the Licence is an Occupation Licence, the Licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up to an officer of the Local Authority or be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District by the person in charge of the animals at the time of completing the movement.

(6.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order, except where it is otherwise expressly authorised by this Order, shall be in force for four days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall be in the form set forth in the Second Schedule to this Order or to the like effect.

(7.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order shall not be available if granted by the owner of the animal to be moved, or by his agent, or by the consignee of the animal, or by the occupier of the farm or premises or slaughterhouse from or to which the animal

is to be moved, or by any individual member of an Executive Committee or Sub-Committee of a Local Authority.

(8.) A copy of a Licence which authorises movement to premises in a District other than the District for which the person granting the Licence acts as Inspector shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Local Authority of the District in which the place of destination is situate.

Movement through the Prohibited Area by Rail.

6. Nothing in this Order shall be deemed to apply to the movement of animals into or out of the Prohibited Area where they are moved through the Prohibited Area by railway from a place outside such Area to another place outside such Area without unnecessary delay and without the animals being untrucked within such Area except for the purposes of feeding or watering the animals within the railway station premises where such untrucking takes place.

General Provisions as to Movement.

7. Animals while being moved under this Order shall, so far as is practicable, be kept separate from all animals which are not being so moved, and shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay to the place of destination specified in the Licence, and where the place of destination is a slaughterhouse they shall be there detained until they are slaughtered.

Exception of certain Animals from Provisions as to Movement.

8. Nothing in this Order shall be construed as authorising—

(i) movement of an animal which is affected with foot-and-mouth disease, or which has during the preceding twenty-eight days been in any way exposed to the infection of such disease; or

(ii) movement into or out of a foot-and-mouth disease infected place; or

(iii) movement of an animal the movement of which is prohibited by notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Ministry given under any Order of the Minister.

Saving for Orders and Regulations.

9. Movement of animals under this Order is subject to any other Order of the Minister, and also subject to any Regulation made by a Local Authority under any Order of the Minister for prohibiting or regulating the movement of animals.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

10.—(1.) Any person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Ministry or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Licence, if any, necessary for the movement, and shall allow it to be read, and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address

to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Holding of Markets and Sales in the Scheduled District (except in the Prohibited Area).

11.—(1.) A market or sale of animals may be held on any premises in the Scheduled District, except in the Prohibited Area, if the Local Authority are satisfied that the market or sale will be restricted to animals intended for immediate slaughter and the market or sale is authorised by the Local Authority under this Article.

(2.) The Local Authority shall cause a Veterinary Inspector to attend at every market or sale authorised under this Article and examine the animals exposed thereat.

(3.) An animal exposed at a market or sale authorised under this Article shall not be moved therefrom unless before such movement it is marked, by and at the expense of the owner, in the manner described in Article 5 of this Order.

Offences.

12.—(1.) If a person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If any person, with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates; or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark painted on any animal as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

13. In this Order—

“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

“The Ministry” means the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries.

“Animals” means cattle, sheep, goats and swine.

“Slaughterhouse” means any premises where animals are habitually slaughtered and includes a bacon factory.

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

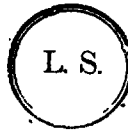

1920.

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

Movement into, out of, or within Scheduled District.

1.—(1.) No cattle, sheep, goats or swine shall be moved into or out of the District described in the Schedule to this Order, hereinafter referred to as the Scheduled District, or be moved along, over, or across, or be allowed by the owner or person in charge thereof to stray upon a highway or thoroughfare within the Scheduled District; provided that nothing in this Order shall be deemed to apply to the movement of animals into or out of the Scheduled District where they are moved

through such District by railway from a place outside such District to another place outside such District without unnecessary delay and without the animals being untrucked within such District except for the purposes of feeding or watering the animals within the railway station premises where such untrucking takes place.

(2.) If any farm (except any detached part) is partly within and partly without the Scheduled District, the whole shall be deemed to be within the Scheduled District.

Power to restrict Movement of Persons in Certain Cases.

2.—(1.) An Inspector of the Local Authority acting under their direction may serve a notice on the occupier of any field, shed, or other place in the Scheduled District, prohibiting the entry of any person into any such field, shed, or other place, and thereupon, notwithstanding the existence of any footpath or right of way, no person shall enter the field, shed, or other place to which the notice relates while any cattle, sheep, goats or swine are therein, otherwise than in accordance with the following regulations, that is to say:—

(i.) The owner of the field, shed, or other place, or of the animals therein, or the agent or servants of such owner, may enter such field, shed, or other place so far as may be necessary for the feeding or tending of the animals.

(ii.) Any other person may enter such field, shed, or other place with a licence of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries.

(2.) Copies of such notice shall be affixed or exhibited by the Inspector in such manner as he shall think desirable for ensuring notification of the restrictions thereby imposed.

(3.) A copy of every such notice shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, Whitehall Place, London, S.W.

Power to restrict Movement of Dogs and Poultry in Certain Cases.

3.—(1.) An Inspector of the Ministry, or of the Local Authority acting under their direction, may, for the purpose of preventing the spread of Foot-and-Mouth Disease, by a notice served on the occupier of any premises in the Scheduled District, require him:—

(a) to keep in confinement, or under control, as may be prescribed by the notice, dogs on such premises;

or (b) to confine live poultry on such premises in a pen or other like enclosure;

or (c) to prevent the access of live poultry to any specific part of the premises to which cattle, sheep, goats, or swine have, or recently have had, access;

and if any occupier after service of any such notice shall fail to comply with the requirements thereof, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(2.) An Inspector of the Ministry, or of the Local Authority acting under their direction, may, for the purpose of preventing the spread of Foot-and-Mouth Disease, by notice affixed or exhibited by the Inspector in such manner as he shall think desirable for ensuring notification of the restrictions thereby imposed, require dogs to be kept by the person in charge thereof under control while passing along any road or footpath specified in such notice, and if any person in charge of a dog while passing along any road or footpath to which any such notice relates fails to keep the dog under control, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(3.) Every notice served on an occupier of premises shall remain in operation until it is withdrawn by a further notice served by an Inspector of the Ministry or of the Local Authority.

(4.) A copy of every notice served by an Inspector of the Local Authority under this Article shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the General Secretary, Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, Whitehall Place, London, S.W.

Local Authority to Enforce Order.

4. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

5.—(1.) If an animal is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal, and the con-

signee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the animal is moved shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(2.) If any person enters any field, shed, or other place in contravention of this Order, or of a notice served thereunder, such person shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(FOOT - AND - MOUTH DISEASE)
ORDER OF 1920 (No. 2).

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

Movement of Animals into certain Boroughs, etc., for Immediate Slaughter.

1. Notwithstanding anything in the Gloucestershire and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1920, an animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved without a licence by railway or by vessel from outside the Scheduled District described in the Schedule to that Order to a railway station or landing place situate within any borough or urban district mentioned in the First Schedule to this Order; and an animal so moved may be moved from the railway station or landing place to any slaughterhouse or bacon factory situate within the same borough or urban district, as the case may be, if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the borough or urban district.

Provisions as to Movement Licences.

2.—(1) The movement of an animal with a Movement Licence under this Order shall be subject to the following conditions:—

(i.) The animal shall be moved to the slaughterhouse or bacon factory specified in the Licence, and not elsewhere, and shall be there detained until it is slaughtered.

(ii.) The animal during the movement to the slaughterhouse or bacon factory shall, so far as is practicable, be kept separate from all animals not being moved with a Licence under this Order.

(iii.) After completion of the movement the Licence shall forthwith be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest police station in the same district by the person in charge of the animal at the time of completing such movement.

Abingdon (*excluding the parishes of Fyfield, Kingston Bagpuise, Draycott Moor, Lyford, and Garford*), and the parish of Harwell; and

In the administrative county of Hertford.

The parishes of Tring Rural, and Puttenham.

And also comprising—

The city and county borough of Oxford.

(2) A Movement Licence granted under this Order shall be in force for not more than four days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall be in the form set forth in the Second Schedule hereto, or to the like effect.

Exception of Certain Animals from Provisions as to Movement.

3. Nothing in this Order shall be construed as authorising movement of an animal the movement of which is prohibited by Regulation of a Local Authority or by notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Ministry given under any Order of the Minister.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

4.—(1.) Any person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Ministry or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Licence, if any, necessary for the movement, and shall allow it to be read, and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Commencement.

5. This Order shall come into operation on the seventeenth day of February, nineteen hundred and twenty.

Short Title.

6. This Order may be cited as the GLOUCESTERSHIRE AND DISTRICT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1920 (No. 2).
