For gallantry and devotion to duty during the attack on Guillemont on 30th July, 1918, when in charge of two Lewis guns, he pushed forward under heavy fire and established his Lewis guns in a strong point, which was in a very commanding position. He again did excellent work during the fighting near Le Cateau 12th October, 1918.

He has always acted with conspicuous courage in action. During the operations on 19th September, 1918, near Mesha, he led his platoon with great skill and disregard of personal danger, and by his initiative turned the flank of a machine-gun post that was threatening to hold up the advance of the company.

For gallantry and devotion to duty, especially in the Cambrai battle. His fine leadership at all times has been responsible for getting ammunition up to the firing line, often under heavy shell fire.

During the period 17th September to 11th November, 1918, during the attack on Bruyelles on the 5th November he maintained an adequate covering fire without interruption, though his gun position was under intense shell fire. His gallantry and skilful leadership saved many casualties.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during the recent operations behind Gheluwe from 7th October to 15th October, 1918. When the battery was in an open position he brought up rations night after night without fail, frequently having to pass through very heavy fire. In addition to the shell fire he had to contend with difficult ground to get over. It was entirely due to his determination that the battery was kept supplied with rations.

For consistent gallantry and devotion to duty while acting as signaller, particularly during the period 17th September to 11th November, 1918. The splendid example he set his comrades by his fearlessness in always volunteering for dangerous work in the communications between brigade headquarters and batteries under the heaviest shell fire and most trying conditions was most praiseworthy.

107741 Gnr. G. H. Guise, 1/1st (Kent) Hy.

For conspicuous gallantry and disregard of personal safety on many occasions, especially on the night of 26th October, 1918, at Pont-a-Pierre, when the battery was being heavily shelled. He was almost completely buried in a shell crater; three other men were entirely buried. Although unable to move,

he continued to draw attention to the spot where the men were buried, and he directed the operations of the rescue party, and refused to be moved himself till satisfied that his comrades' safety was assured.

For consistent gallantry and steadiness under fire during the last advance when acting as No. 1 of a medium trench mortar detachment. At Englefontaine on 4th November, 1918, he volunteered and carried orders to a detached gun through heavy enemy barrage, and then returned in order to fire a mortar, the detachment of which had become casualties.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty previous to and during operations on October, 1918, at Hollebeke and Gheluwe. As non-commissioned officer in charge of brigade communications he worked incessantly under intense shell fire, repairing and laying telephone lines. On this occasion he succeeded in laying and maintaining lines during a very critical period.

For continuous good work and devotion to duty. In action he has invariably proved himself a capable leader and shown courage of a high order.

For consistent gallantry and devotion to duty, and especially, for his courage and resource at Noreuil on 23rd March, 1918, when as senior non-commissioned officer of headquarters, after the enemy had broken through on the left of the sector held by his regiment, he organised and led the men of headquarters. He was severely wounded, but continued fighting till he was hit the second time.

During the advance up to November 11th, 1918, he rendered very excellent services in the discovery and removal of enemy mines and traps, showing great disregard for personal danger. He is a most trustworthy non-commissioned officer, and his example at all times to his men was splendid.

For gallantry and devotion to duty while employed as a stretcher bearer during the operations in September, October and November, 1918. He displayed great coolness under very heavy fire in the battle of Neuville on 20th October, 1918, and set a magnificent example to all ranks.
