W HEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 6th day of April, 1920, in the words following, viz. :---

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's N'aval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas by Order in Council bearing date the 29th day of June, 1900, we were authorized to pay a special allowance of £100 per annum to Engineer Officers of the rank of Chief Inspector, or Inspector, of Machinery (now designated Engineer Rear-Admiral and Engineer Captain) whom it might be necessary to appoint for service in Your Majesty's Ships afloat:

"And whereas the scheme of pay and allowances which Your Majesty was graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council bearing date the 22nd day of January, 1920, to sanction for Officers of the Royal Navy, includes no provision for the continued payment of this allowance or its equivalent, and it is necessary to ensure that Engineer Captains serving afloat shall not receive less in total emoluments than Senior Engineer (Commanders:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the grant to Engineer Captains of less than three years' seniority who may be required to serve afloat, and who are actually accommodated afloat, and therefore are not in receipt of Lodging and Compensation Allowance, of an allowance of 4s. a day in addition to full pay, with effect, where requisite, as from the 1st July, 1919:

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 27th day of March, 1920, in the words following, viz. :--

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas by Your Order in Council bearing date the 11th day of February, 1913, Your Majesty was pleased to make provision for the promotion of Warrant Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Men of the Royal Marines to Commissioned rank, and to sanction certain arrangements for their rank and promotion whilst undergoing training:

"And whereas by Your Order in Council bearing date the 22nd day of January, 1920, Your Majesty was further pleased to sanction, *inter alia*, that Commissioned Officers promoted from Warrant Rank or from the ranks under the foregoing provisions should receive pay on the ordinary scale:

"And whereas we consider that, on promotion to Second Lieutenant R.M., and prior to their promotion to the relative rank of Lieutenant R.N.—viz.: Lieutenant R.M. after four years' Commissioned service—these Officers should receive pay at the rate laid down for Mates R.N.:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to approve of Warrant

Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Men of the Royal Marines promoted to Commissioned rank under the provisions of Order in Council of the 11th February, 1913, receiving pay at the rate of 16s. a day on promotion to Second Lieutenant, and whilst serving as Lieutenant R.M. until such time as they attain four years' Commissioned service, this arrangement to have effect as from the 1st February, 1919:

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal."

W HEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 7th day of April, 1920, in the words following, viz. —

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter' alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased by Your Order in Council bearing date the 22nd day of January, 1920, to provide, *inter alia*, that the period of service in Warrant Rank required to qualify Warrant Officers, Royal Navy, and Warrant Officers, Royal Marines, for promotion to Commissioned Officer from Warrant Rank should be reduced from fifteen to ten years, and, further, that Commissioned Officers from Warrant Rank who were advanced to such Commissioned Rlank after more than ten years' service in Warrant Rank should count for purposes of increase of pay all time in excess of ten years served as Warrant Officer before retirement as time served as Commissioned Officer from Warrant Rank:

"And whereas we are of opinion that such time should count similarly for purposes of increase of retired pay:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to approve of Commissioned Officers from Warrant Rank, R.N. and R.M., who have been advanced to that rank after more than 10 years' service as Warrant Officers counting the time served by them as Warrant Officers in excess of 10 years as time in the Commissioned Rank for purposes of

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the following retired pay, subject to provisos :

(i) Account to be taken of any time lost by being passed over for promotion or by sentence of Court Martial and of acceleration given for special War or other distinguished service

(ii) No Naval Officer retired before the 1st October, 1918, and no Marine Officer retired before the 1st February, 1919, to be allowed to count more service as Commissioned Officer from Warrant Rank than he was allowed to count on his retirement.

(iii) Naval Commissioned Officers from Warrant Rank retired on or after the 1st October, 1918, and before the 1st April, 1919, and Marine Commissioned Officers from Warrant Rank retired on or after the 1st February, 1919, and before the 1st April, 1919, to count time in excess of 10 years in Warrant Rank as Commissioned Officer's time and their retired pay to be re-assessed as from the 1st April, 1919, on the scale prescribed in Schedule V., Section IX. of Your Majesty's Order in Council of the 22nd January, 1920. Those retired and in receipt of retired pay on or after the 1st April, 1919, to be eligible for retired pay under the scale laid down in that Order in Council.

(iv) In the case of Royal Marine Warrant Officers the concession to apply only to officers who retired from or after the 1st February, 1919.

HEREAS His Majesty, by virtue of the VV authority conferred on Him by the Copyright Act, 1911 (1 and 2 Geo. 5, c. 46),

and having regard to the provisions of the revised Berne Copyright Convention of 1908, was pleased to make an Order in Council, dated the 24th day of June, 1912, Statutory Rules and Orders, 1912, No. 913 (hereinafter called the Principal Order), extending the protection of the said Act to certain classes of works to which protection is guaranteed by the said Convention:

And whereas Poland has acceeded to the said Convention:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority conferred upon Him by the Copyright Act, 1911, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:---

The Principal Order shall extend to Poland as if that country were amongst the Foreign Countries of the Copyright Union therein named, subject to the following modifications:---

(a) The provisions of Article 2, proviso (iii) (a) shall apply as if Poland were included amongst the Foreign Countries named in those provisions.

(b) In the application of the provisions of Article 3 of the Principal Order to works of which the country of origin is Poland the date of this Order shall be substituted for the Commencement of the Act and for the Commencement of the Principal Order.

(c) In the application to such works of Sections 1 (2)  $(\vec{a})$  and 19 of the Copyright Act, 1911, the date of this Order shall be substituted for the Commencement of the Act in Section 19 (7) and 19 (8) wherever that expression occurs, and the 28th January, 1920, for the passing of the Act.

(d) In the application to such works of the provisions of Section 24 of the Copyright Act, 1911, the date of this Order shall be substituted for the Commencement of the Act wherever that expression occurs in Subsection 1 (a) and for the 26th July, 1910, in Sub-section 1 (b).

W HEREAS by the Isle of Man (War Legislation) Act, 1914, His Majesty has power to extend to the Isle of Man any Act which, in the opinion of His Majesty, was passed for the purpose of meeting any emergency created by the present War, subject to adaptations for the purpose of making the Act applicable to the Isle of Man:

And whereas by Order in Council dated the 17th day of December, 1914, His Majesty was

pleased to order that the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act. 1914, and the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Regulations, 1914, should extend to the Isle of Man, subject to the adaptations therein contained:

And whereas the said Act and Regulations have been amended by certain other Acts and Regulations, which said Acts and Regulations have been extended to the Isle of Man by various subsequent Orders in Council, subject to the adaptations therein contained:

And whereas the said Regulations have been further amended by Order in Council of the 9th February, 1920:

And whereas it is expedient to extend portions of the said Order in Council of the 9th February, 1920, to the Isle of Man

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Regulations (except paragraphs 1 and 2 thereof) contained in the Order in Council of the 9th February, 1920, shall extend to the Isle of Man.

HEREAS by Section 30 of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, as amended by Section 2 of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1893, it is (amongst other things) provided that, if a majority of the whole Council of a Borough agree to petition, and the Council thereupon petition; the King for the alteration of the number and boundaries of the Wards of the Borough, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, from time to time, by Order in Council, to fix the number of Wards into which the Borough shall be divided, and that the Borough shall be divided into that number of Wards, and that where an Order in Council has been so made the Secretary of State shall appoint a Commissioner to prepare a Scheme for determining the boundaries of the Wards and apportioning the Councillors among them :

And whereas a majority of the whole Council of the Borough of Chatham did, on the 30th day of July, 1919, agree to petition, and the Council of the said Borough thereupon petitioned, His Majesty for the alteration of the number and boundaries of the Wards of the said Borough:

And whereas His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 9th day of October, 1919, to fix the number of Wards into which the Borough of Chatham should be henceforth divided, and to order and direct that the number of the said Wards should be six:

And whereas on the 24th day of October, 1919, the Right Honourable Edward Shortt, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, did appoint Stephen Philpot Low, Esquire, Barrister-at-Law, a Commissioner to prepare a Scheme for determining the boundaries of such Wards, and for apportioning the Councillors of the said Borough among such Wards:

And whereas by Section 30 (5) of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, it is provided that, in case of alteration of Wards, the Commissioner shall so apportion among the altered Wards the Councillors for those Wards as to provide for their continuing to represent as large a number as possible of their former constituents :

And whereas the said Commissioner has accordingly prepared the following Scheme, dated the 22nd day of January, 1920:-

SCHEME FOR THE PURPOSE OF DETERMINING THE BOUNDARIES OF, AND FOR APPORTIONING THE COUNCILLORS AMONG, THE WARDS OF THE BOROUGH OF CHATHAM.

#### i. Number of Wards.

By Order of His Majesty in Council made in that behalf on the 9th day of October, 1919, the number of the Wards of the said Borough was fixed at six.

#### iii. Boundaries of Wards.

#### 1. LUTON WARD.

Commence at Magpie Hall-road with the junction of the New-road at Luton Arch thence in a southerly direction up and along the centre of Magpie Hall-road to the Hook and Hatchetroad continuing on along the centre of the Hook and Hatchet-road to the junction of the Hook and Hatchet-road with Robin Hoodlane and thence in a south-westerly direction along the centre of Robin Hood-lane to the boundary of the Borough near Robin Hood Farm (or House) then following the Borough Boundary in an easterly direction to Lordswood-lane down the centre of Lordswood-lane in a northerly direction to the junction of Sharsted-road thence in a north-westerly direction down the centre of East Hill to the junction of Capston-road thence in a westerly direction to the junction of Street End-road continuing up and along the centre of Street End-road to the junction of Third-avenue thence along the centre of Third-avenue in a westerly direction until it cuts the War Department Boundary and continuing in a westerly direction along the centre of Alexandra-road to the junction of Connaught-road thence in a northerly direction down the centre of Connaught-road to the junction of Luton-road thence in a north-westerly direction along the centre of Luton-road to the starting-point in Magpie Hall-road.

#### 2. ST. PAUL'S WARD.

Commence at junction of New-road and Frederick-street thence in a southerly direction along the centre of Frederick-street to a point in the centre of the line of Railway of the London Chatham and Dover Railway Company thence in a westerly direction along the centre of the said line of Railway to the centre of the Bridge at Chalk Pit Hill thence in a southerly direction along the centre of Chalk Pit Hill to its junction with Magpie Hall-road thence in a northerly direction down the centre of Magpie Hall-road to the junction of the New-road at Luton Arch thence in a westerly direction along the centre of the New-road to the point of commencement.

#### 3. CHRIST CHURCH WARD.

Commence at the Luton-road with the junction of the New-road at Luton Arch thence in a south-easterly direction along the centre of Luton-road to the junction of Connaught-road and Luton-road thence following the boundary of Luton Ward along the centre of Alexandra-road to the War Department Boundary thence along the centre of Third-avenue to Street End-road continuing to follow the boundary of Luton Ward to the junction at Lordswood-lane thence following the Borough Boundary in an easterly direction to Capstonroad following the Borough Boundary to the junction of Rainham-road (or Watling-street) and thence in a westerly direction down the centre of-Rainham-road and Chatham Hill to the junction of Luton-road to the point of commencement.

#### 4. ST. JOHN'S WARD.

Commence at a point in the centre of the High-street of Chatham where the same is crossed by the Boundary of the Borough and proceeding thence in an easterly direction along the centre of the High-street to the junction of Clover-street with the High-street thence in a south-westerly direction along the centre of Clover-street to the junction of the same with the New-road thence in a westerly direction to the Gibraltar Inn past Alexandra Public House thence in a south-westerly direction over the Railway Bridge up and along the centre of Hills-terrace and Dale-street thence in an easterly direction up and along the centre of Wyles-road to the junction with Maidstoneroad thence in a south-westerly direction up and along the centre of the Maidstone-road to the Hook and Hatchet-road thence in an easterly direction along the centre of the Hook and Hatchet-road to the junction of Magpie Hall-road continuing along the centre of Hook and Hatchet-road in a south-westerly direction to the junction of the Hook and Hatchet-road with Robin Hood-lane and thence in a southwesterly direction along the centre of Robin Hood-lane to the Boundary of the Borough near Robin Hood Farm (or House) and thence in a generally north-westerly direction and thence in a northerly direction along the Boundary of the Borough to the point of commencement before described.

#### 5. ST. MICHAEL'S WARD.

Commence at the Gibraltar Inn thence in an easterly direction down the centre of the New-road to the junction of Frederick-street with the New-road thence in a southerly direction along the centre of Frederick-street to a point in the centre of the line of Railway of the London Chatham and Dover Railway Company thence in a westerly direction along the centre of the said line of Railway to the centre of the Bridge at Chalk Pit Hill thence in a southerly direction along the centre of Chalk Pit Hill-road to its junction with Magpie Hallroad thence in a south-westerly direction to Hook and Hatchet-road and from thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Hook and Hatchet-road to Maidstone-road thence in a northerly direction down the centre of Maidstone-road to the junction of Wyles-road thence in a westerly direction down the centre of Wyles-road to the junction of Dale-street thence in a northerly direction down the centre of Dale-street and Hills-terrace over the Railway Bridge past the Alexandra Public House to the Gibraltar Inn the point of commencement.

#### 6. St. Mary's Ward.

Commence at a point in the centre of the High-street of Chatham where the same is crossed by the Boundary of the Borough and proceeding thence in an easterly direction along the centre of the High-street to the junction of Clover-street with High-street thence in a south-westerly direction along the centre of Clover-street to the junction of the same with the New-road thence in an easterly direction along the centre of the New-road and Chatham Hill to a point in the Boundary of the Bor-ough in the centre of Chatham Hill opposite the thirty-first milestone thence first in a northwesterly direction and thence in a northerly direction along the Boundary of the Borough to the River and thence in a generally southerly direction along the same Boundary to the point of commencement before described.

W HEREAS by "The Weights and Measures Act, 1904," it is (among other things) enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by Order in Council, to specify new fees to be paid in respect of the verification and stamping of weights, measures, and weighing and measuring instruments in substitution for the fees specified in the First Schedule to the Weights and Measures Act, 1889, and that any Order in Council so made may be varied or revoked by a subsequent Order in Council:

And whereas His Majesty by Orders in Council dated the 19th day of July, 1918, and the 11th day of July, 1919, directed that the fees specified in the Schedules to those Orders should be taken in substitution for the fees specified in the Schedule to the Order in Council dated the 21st day of December, 1907:

And whereas the Board of Trade have represented to His Majesty that it would be expedient to vary the said Orders in Council of the 19th day of July, 1918, and the 11th day of July, 1919, and to substitute new fees to be taken in respect of the verification and stamping by Inspectors of Weights and Measures of the weights, measures, and weighing and measuring instruments mentioned in the Schedule hereto:

And whereas it has been made to appear that the fees specified in the Schedule hereto are reasonable and proper:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Him by the said Act, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to direct that the fees specified in the Schedule hereto annexed shall be taken accordingly in substitution for the fees specified in the Schedules to the Orders in Council dated the 19th day of July, 1918, and the 11th day of July, 1919.

This Order shall come into operation on the 1st day of July, 1920.  $\cdot$

(a) Where a marriage is intended to be solemnized or contracted in the United Kingdom between a British subject resident in England, Scotland, or Ireland and a British subject resident in that part of His Majesty's Dominions, a certificate of the publication of banns or a certificate of notice of marriage issued in accordance with such law shall in England have the same effect as a certificate for marriage issued by a superintendent registrar, and in Scotland and Ireland have the same effect as a certificate for marriage issued by a registrar in Scotland and Ireland respectively; and

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Robert Wynter Blathwayt (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme), with the consent of the said Frederick Baron Birkenhead, now Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme), and with the consent of the said George Wyndham, Bishop of Bath and Wells (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme and sealed the same his Episcopal Seal), iscopal Seal), we, Commissioners for with the said England, Ecclesiastical humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the two one-fifth parts or shares of and in the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of North Stoke with Langridge now vested in him the said Robert Wynter Blathwayt as aforesaid, shall be transferred to and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in Your Majesty, Your Heirs and Successors, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Frederick Baron Birkenhead, or other the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain for the time being acting on behalf of Your Majesty, Your Heirs and Successors in right of the Crown.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament." And whereas the said Scheme has been

approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

WHEREAS by Section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that Whereas Tithings, in some instances Hamlets, Chapelries, and other Places or Districts may be separated from the Parishes or Mother Churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and Places altogether Extra-Parochial may, in some instances, with advantage be annexed to Parishes or Districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted Separate Parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own Diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any Diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop, that any such Tithing, Hamlet, Chapelry, Place or District within the Diocese of such Archbishop, or the Diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any Parish or Mother Church, and either be constituted a separate Benefice by itself or be united to any other Parish to which it may be more conveniently. annexed, or to any other adjoining Tithing, Hamlet, Chapelry, Place, or District, Parochial or Extra-Parochial, so as to form a separate Parish or Benefice, or that any Extra-Parochial Place may with advantage be annexed to any Parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate Parish for Ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop, or Bishop, shall draw up a Scheme in writing (the Scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Glebe Lands, Tithes, Rent Charges, and other Ecclesiastical Dues, Rates and Payments, and in respect to Patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the Patron or Patrons of the Benefice or Benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such Scheme, or to such modification thereof, as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and Inquiry, be satisfied with any such Scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such Consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such Scheme, or modification thereof,

as the case may be, into effect." And whereas the Right Reverend Frederick Edward, Lord Bishop of Salisbury, hath made a Representation in writing, dated the 3rd day of October, 1919, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"I, the Right Reverend Frederick Edward, Bishop of Salisbury, in pursuance of the 26th Section of the Pluralities Act, 1838, do hereby represent to your Grace, that there are in the County of Dorset, and my Diocese of Salisbury, the Rectory of Ibberton with the Rectory of Belchalwell annexed and the Rectory of Fifehead Neville:—

"That the Parish of Belchalwell comprises in it the Hamlet of Fifehead St. Quinton or Lower Fifehead.

"That the said Hamlet of Fifehead St. Quinton or Lower Fifehead is distant from the Parish of Belchalwell, measuring the distance by road from the Church of Belchalwell to the centre of the said Hamlet, about three and a half miles.

"That the said Hamlet of Fifehead St. Quinton or Lower Fifehead adjoins the Parish of Fifehead Neville.

"That the boundaries of the Hamlet of Fifehead St. Quinton or Lower Fifehead are well known and defined and the Hamlet is situate about one mile from the Church of Fifehead Neville measuring the distance by road from the centre of the said Hamlet to the said Church.

"That on the Map hereunto annexed the said Hamlet of Fifehead St. Quinton or Lower Fifehead is coloured red.

"That according to the last available Census Report the population of the united Parish of Ibberton with Belchalwell was 278 (two hundred and seventy-eight) excluding the said Hamlet of Fifehead St. Quinton or Lower Fifehead and the population of the said Hamlet of Fifehead St. Quinton or Lower Fifehead was 34 (thirty-four) and the population of the said Parish of Fifehead Neville was 106 (one hundred and six).

106 (one hundred and six). "That there is in each of the said Parishes" of Ibberton, Belchalwell and Fifehead Neville a Parish Church, but that there is no Church in the Hamlet of Fifehead St. Quinton or Lower Fifehead.

"That the Parish Church of Ibberton contains accommodation for 80 (eighty) persons, that the Parish Church of Belchalwell contains accommodation for 100 (one hundred) persons, and that the Parish Church of Fifehead Neville contains accommodation for 90 (ninety) persons.

"That the net value of the Benefice of Ibberton with Belchalwell including the Hamlet of Fifehead St. Quinton or Lower Fifehead is  $\pounds 521$  (five hundred and twenty-one pounds) or thereabouts, and that the net value of the Benefice of Fifehead Neville is  $\pounds 195$  (one hundred and ninety five pounds) or thereabouts.

"That there are houses of Residence belonging to each of the Benefices of Ibberton with Belchalwell and Fifehead Neville.

"That the Patronage of the Benefice of Ibberton with Belchalwell belongs to Alexander Edward Lane Fox Pitt-Rivers of Rushmore and The Reverend Lionel Seymour Plowman is the present Incumbent thereof.

Plowman is the present Incumbent thereof. "That the Patronage of the Benefice of Fifehead Neville belongs to Alexander Edward Lane Fox Pitt-Rivers and the Reverend Percy Temple Philipps Knott is the present Incumbent thereof.

" That it appears to me that under the pro-

visions of the said Pluralities Act, 1838, the said Hamlet of Fifehead St. Quinton or Lower Fifehead more particularly delineated on the Plan annexed to the Scheme appended to this representation may be advantageously separated from the said Benefice of Ibberton with Belchalwell and annexed to the said Benefice of Fifehead Neville.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the 26th Section of the said Act of Parliament, I have drawn up a Scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alterations may best be effected and how the changes consequent on such alterations in respect to Ecclesiastical jurisdiction, Glebe Lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other Ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect of Patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested, which Scheme together with the consents thereto of the before-mentioned Patrons and Incumbents I do submit to your Grace to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and inquiry you shall be satisfied with such Scheme certify the same and such Consents aforesaid to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the Consents referred to in the said Representation are as follows:----

#### " SCHEME.

"1. That the said Hamlet of Fifehead St. Quinton or Lower Fifehead (shown on the Plan annexed hereto and thereon coloured red) shall be separated from the said Parish of Ibberton with Belchalwell and annexed for Ecclesiastical purposes to the said Parish of Fifehead Neville.

"2. That the Incumbent of the Benefice of Fifehead Neville shall have the sole and exclusive Cure of Souls within the said Hamlet of Fifehead St. Quinton or Lower Fifehead so annexed to Fifehead Neville.

"3. That the Inhabitants of the Hamlet of Fifehead St. Quinton or Lower Fifehead shall cease to be entitled to any right or accommodation in the Parish Church of Belchalwell except nevertheless any person or persons (if any) possessing a legal right by Faculty or otherwise to any pew or sitting in such Parish Church and who may not desire to give up or relinquish the same. "4. That the Inhabitants of the aforesaid Hamlet of Fifehead St. Quinton or Lower Fifehead shall have such and the same right to have Marriages, Baptisms, Churchings, and Burials solemnized and performed and other rights in the Parish Church of Fifehead Neville as they might have had in the Parish Church of Belchalwell.

of Belchalwell. "5. That all Fees and other Ecclesiastical dues and payments for Marriages, Burials, Churchings, and other Ecclesiastical Offices, and all such other Ecclesiastical dues, offerings, and emoluments, usually payable to the Incumbent of a Parish or Benefice which shall arise or become payable for or in respect of the said Hamlet of Fifehead St. Quinton or Lower Fifehead when it has been annexed to the said Parish of Fifehead Neville shall belong and be payable to the Incumbent of the Benefice of Fifehead Neville with Fifehead St. Quinton or Lower Fifehead annexed.

"6. That all the portion of the Tithe Rent-Charge belonging to the said Benefice of Ibberton with Belchalwell and arising from the said Hamlet of Fifehead St. Quinton or Lower Fifehead particulars whereof are set out in the Schedule hereto, and which is now payable to and received by the Rector of Belchalwell shall at and from the next avoidance of the Benefice of Ibberton with Belchalwell cease to be so paid and received and shall belong to and be attached to the proposed Benefice of Fifehead Neville with Fifehead St. Quinton or Lower Fifehead annexed and be held received and enjoyed by the Incumbent thereof for the time being accordingly. "7. That all Glebe Lands and buildings

"7. That all Glebe Lands and buildings situate in the said Hamlet of Fifehead St. Quinton or Lower Fifehead which now belong to the Rector of Belchalwell shall cease to so belong, and shall belong and be attached to the said proposed Benefice of Fifehead Neville with Fifehead St. Quinton or Lower Fifehead annexed for ever and be held and enjoyed by the Incumbent thereof for the time being accordingly.

"8. That no other alteration shall be made in respect of the Tithe Rent-Charges or any other endowments of any of the said Benefices.

"9. That no alteration shall be made in the Patronage of the said Benefices or any of them.

W HEREAS the Minister of Health, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the Parish of Longford, in the County of Derby, 10 days' previous notice of his intention in that behalf, did, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by subsequent enactments, make a Representation to His Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the public Health, the opening of any new Burial Ground in the Civil Parish of Longford, in the said County of Derby, save with the previous approval of the Minister of Health, should be prohibited, and that Burials should be discontinued therein as hereinafter directed :

And whereas by an Order in Council of the 11th March, 1920, Notice of such Representation was given, and it was ordered that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 20th April, 1920, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that no new Burial Ground shall be opened in the said Civil Parish save with the previous approval of the Minister of Health, and that burials shall be discontinued therein as follows, viz.:--

WINSLOW.—Forthwith and entirely in the Churchyard attached to the said Parish Church, as the said Churchyard existed prior to the year 1919: Provided that—

(a) In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said Churchyard burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b) In any earthen grave now existing in the said Churchyard the burial may be allowed of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

(c) In the said Churchyard in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place, the burial may be allowed of the body of any person for whom or of any member of a family for which such grave space has been reserved and appropriated as a burial place, with the exclusive right of burial therein, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

The KING has been graciously pleased to confer the Decoration of the Albert Medal upon Mr. Thomas Stratford Knill, Master of the steamship "War Pike," of London.

At Novorossisk on the 14th October, 1919, when the steamship "War Pike," laden with stores and several hundred tons of explosives, took fire, Captain Knill, although deserted by most of his crew, and in spite of the intense heat and frequent explosions, remained on board his ship, casting off hawsers from the quay and making fast others to a tug, only abandoning ship by order of the Captain of His Majesty's Ship "Grafton" as his vessel was being towed out of the entrance of the harbour. He then boarded a tug, stood by his ship after she had grounded; and later, though the bridge, boats and starboard coal bunker were a mass of flames, boarded her and assisted . in getting hoses to work, successfully preventing the fire from spreading aft, where there were still large quantities of explosives. The vessel was then towed towards shallow water, where she grounded. By his gallantry and devotion to duty Captain Knill undoubtedly averted an explosion, and thus probably saved many lives.

The following is the account of the services in respect of which the decorations have been conferred :-

While H.M.S. '' Tiger '' was undergoing repairs at Invergordon, on the 27th August, 1919, two dockyard fitters and an able seaman were overcome by noxious gas in the hold of the ship, and Stoker Petty Officer Bailey, accompanied by a sick berth attendant, made an unsuccessful attempt at rescue. Both he and his companion had put on respirators, but found them useless. Mr. Buckle, the officer of the watch, then arrived on the scene, and in spite of the grave risk to life, which it was now evident would be incurred by further attempts at rescue, immediately went down and succeeded in passing a rope round one of This man was got out, but Mr. the men. Buckle was considerably affected by the gas,

and could do nothing further. Stoker Petty Officer Bailey, though suffering from the effects of his previous attempts, repeated the operation, and succeeded in getting the other two men out, but all efforts to restore them were futile.

The wages payable for employment in agriculture within the meaning of Section 17 (1) of the Corn Production Act, 1917, in the area comprising the administrative counties of East Suffolk and West Suffolk and the county borough of Ipswich, of male workmen of 21 years of age and over employed wholly or mainly as Horsemen, Stockmen or Shepherds, whose whole time is occupied in looking after a flock of breeding sheep, shall be not less than wages at the rate of 42s. for a week consisting of 50 hours in "summer" and 48 hours in "winter," with, in addition, an inclusive weekly sum of 9s. in respect of employment which, by Clause 4 of this Order, is expressly excluded from ranking from overtime employment

Provided that where a whole-time workman is employed by the week or any longer period, the wages payable to him for the hours of work agreed between him and the employer in any week (excluding hours of overtime employment, and employment in respect of which the additional and inclusive weekly sum of 9s. is payable) shall not be less than 42s. notwithstanding that those hours are less than 50 in "summer" and 48 in "winter."

3. The differential rates for overtime employment shall be as follows :-

(a) In respect of overtime employment on weekdays, 1s. 1d. per hour.

(b) In respect of overtime employment on a Sunday, 1s. 3<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>d. per hour.

4. For the purpose of the above rates overtime employment shall mean :--

(a) All employment on a Sunday.

(b) All employment in excess of  $6\frac{1}{2}$  hours on a Saturday or on such other day (not being Sunday) in every week as may be agreed between the employer and the workman.

(Transfer to and Vesting in Corporation of Llanelly of Certain Existing Works, &c., in Borough of Kidwelly and the Parish of Pembrey; Agreements with Minister of Munitions, the Secretary of State for the War Department and Nobels Explosives Company, Limited; Provision for Determination or Variation of Existing Agreements; Confirmation of Construction of and Maintenance, &c., of Existing Works; Construction of New Works in Parishes of Pembrey and Llanelly Rural, the Urban District of Burry Port and the Borough of Llanelly; Subsidiary Works; Deviation; Abstraction of Waters of Gwendraeth Fach River and Provisions with Regard Thereto; Compulsory Purchase of Lands and Easements; Part Purchase of Properties; Acquisition of Lands by Minister of Munitions on Behalf of Corporation; Modification of Lands Clauses Acts; Provisions for Securing Purity of Water; Discharge of Water into Streams, &c.; Breaking up of Streets and Roads; Extinguishing Rights of Way; Supply of Water to Minister of Munitions, the Burry Port Urban District Council and Other Local Authorities, Companies and. Persons; Rates, Rents and Charges; General Provisions as to Supply of Water; Borrowing of Money and Other Financial Provisions; Incorporation, Repeal and Amendment of Acts; and Other Purposes.)

N OTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the present Session by the Mayor, 'Aldermen and Burgesses of the Borough of Llanelly, in the County of Carmarthen (hereinafter respectively referred to as "the Corporation" and "the Borough") for an Act for all or some of the following objects and purposes (that is to say):--

1. To empower the Corporation to purchase and acquire and to provide for the transfer to and vesting in the Corporation of all or some of the existing works hereinafter described or some part or parts thereof, and the works, buildings, lands, easements, rights, privileges, title and interest of the Minister of Munitions (which expression where used in this Notice includes his successors and assigns), the Secretary of State for the War Department (hereinafter referred to as "the Secretary of State " which expression includes his suc-cessors and assigns) and Nobels Explosives Company, Limited, or any one or more of them in connection therewith and to and in the water of the river known as the Gwendraeth Fach on such terms and conditions as may have been or may be agreed upon or as may be prescribed or authorized by the intended Act and to authorize the Minister of Munitions, the Secretary of State and Nobels Explosives Company, Limited, or any one or more of them to sell and transfer the same to the Corporation.

2. To free and relieve the Corporation from all'liabilities and obligations of the Minister of Munitions, the Secretary of State and Nobels Explosives Company, Limited, under any agreements entered into by them or either of them in relation to the said works, buildings, lands, easements, rights privileges, title

and interest as aforesaid or the taking of water from the said river or otherwise, and to provide or make provision for the determination of all or any of such agreements.

3. To authorize the Corporation, the Minister of Munitions, the Secretary of State and Nobels Explosives Company, Limited, or any two or more of them to enter into and carry into effect agreements for or with reference to the purposes aforesaid and other the purposes of the intended Act, and to sanction and confirm any agreement already made or which may be made prior to the passing of the intended Act into law.

4. To sanction and confirm the construction of the existing works in the County of Carmarthen hereinafter described (which works are hereinafter referred to as "the Pembrey Works"), and to authorize the Corporation to continue, maintain, alter, repair, renew, reconstruct, enlarge, extend and use or discontinue the same, together with all incidental or ancillary works, machinery, and apparatus connected therewith and to retain hold and use any lands or interests therein acquired or which may be acquired by the Corporation for the purposes of or in connection with the said works (that is to say):---

Work No. 1.—An intake and weir situate wholly in the Parish and Borough of Kidwelly formed across the river known as the Gwendraeth Fach 1.5 chains or thereabouts measured in a south-easterly direction from the centre of the bridge known as the Old Forge Bridge;

Work No. 3.—'A line or lines of pipes (No. 1) commencing in the said Parish and Borough of Kidwelly in the said intake tank (Work No. 2) and passing into and terminating in the Parish of Pembrey in the rural district of Llanelly in the receiving tank (Work No. 4) next hereinafter described;

Work No. 4.—A receiving tank for water situate in the said Parish of Pembrey in the rural district of Llanelly at His Majesty's Explosives Factory the centre of which receiving tank is 7.5 chains or thereabouts measured in a southerly direction from the south-western corner of the enclosure numbered 3095 and 6 chains or thereabouts measured in a north-westerly direction from the north-western corner of the enclosure numbered 3171, both of such enclosures being delineated on the  $\frac{1}{2500}$  Ordnance Map Carmarthenshire Sheet LVII—7 (Edition 1915).

5. To authorize the Corporation to make and maintain, alter, repair, renew, enlarge, extend and use or discontinue the following works or some of them or some parts thereof all being situate in the said County of Carmarthen (which works are hereinafter referred to as "the new works") (that is to say):--

Work No. 5.—A line or lines of pipes (No. 2) wholly situate in the said parish of Pembrey in the rural district of Llanelly commencing in the said receiving tank (Work No. 4) and terminating in the pumping station (Work No. 6) next hereinafter described.

Work No. 6.—A pumping station situate in the said parish of Pembrey in the rural district of Llanelly in the lands lying to the east of the said Explosives Factory fence and bounded on the north by the enclosure numbered 3095, on the east by the enclosures numbered 3096 and 3139, and on the south by the enclosure numbered 3171, all such enclosures being delineated on the  $\frac{1}{2500}$ Ordnance Map Carmarthenshire Sheet LVII —7 (Edition 1915);

Work No. 7.—A line\_or lines of pipes (No. 3) commencing in the said parish of Pembrey in the rural district of Llanelly in the said pumping station (Work No. 6) and terminating in the parish of Llanelly Rural in the rural district of Llanelly in the existing Cwm Lliedi reservoir of the Corporation near the northern end of the embankment thereof, which said line or lines of pipes will be made or pass from, in, through or into the parishes of Pembrey and Llanelly Rural in the rural district of Llanelly, the parish of Burry Port Urban in the urban district of Burry Port, and the parish of Llanelly Urban in the borough of Llanelly;

Work No. 8.—A line or lines of pipes (No. 4) wholly situate in the said parish of Llanelly Rural in the rural district of Llanelly commencing by a junction with the line or lines of pipes (No. 3) at a point in the enclosure numbered 3373 on the  $\frac{1}{2500}$  Ordnance Map Carmarthenshire Sheet LIV—15 (Edition 1915) 7.5 chains or thereabouts measured in a north-easterly direction from the southernmost corner thereof and 4 chains or thereabouts measured in a north-westerly direction from the easternmost corner thereof and terminating at or in the existing filter beds of the Corporation at Felinfoel.

6. To empower the Corporation on any lands belonging or which may belong to them or over which they may obtain easements to make and maintain all such embankments, overflows, intakes, weirs, outfalls, waste-water, channels, culverts, shafts, drifts, adits, tunnels, discharge pipes, cuts, channels, aqueducts, conduits. reservoirs, water towers, banks, walls, piers, bridges, roads, ways and approaches, drains, sluices, byewashes, washouts, tanks, softening plant, wells, bores, tramroads, sidings, tele-graphic, telephonic and electric and other apparatus, pipe-lines, pipes, valves; filters, pumps, machinery, buildings, gauges and other apparatus, appliances, works and conveniences as may be necessary or convenient in connection with or subsidiary to the Pembrey Works and the new works (hereinafter together referred to as "the intended works") or any of them or incidental thereto or consequent thereon or in connection with or subsidiary to any other watenworks of the Corporation or necessary or convenient for inspecting, maintaining, repairing, cleansing, managing working or using the same.

7. To empower the Corporation to deviate laterally and vertically from the lines and levels of the intended works shown on the deposited plans and sections hereinafter mentioned to the extent to be shown on the said plans and sections or to be defined in the Bill and from time to time to extend, enlarge, alter, reconstruct, renew or remove any of their works and plant and to increase the number, size and capacity of their conduits or lines of pipes.

8. To empower the Corporation to collect, impound, take, use, divert and appropriate for the purposes of their waterworks undertaking the waters of the river known as the Gwendraeth Fach and all the tributaries, streams, springs, and waters of the said river above the point at which the same are intercepted by the intake and weir (Work No. 1) which waters now flow directly or derivatively into the River Towy Carmarthen Bay and the Bristol Channel.

9. To make provision with respect to the quantity or amount of compensation (in water or otherwise) to be given by the Corporation in respect of the proposed impounding, taking, using, diversion and appropriation of waters under the powers of the intended Act, and to make such other provisions as to compensation in such other way and manner as the intended Act may prescribe or as may be agreed on or otherwise.

0. To empower the Corporation for the purposes of the intended works and for other the purposes of the intended Act to purchase or acquire by compulsion or agreement or to take on lease lands, waters, streams, springs, houses or buildings in the parishes, districts, boroughs and county aforesaid to acquire by compulsion or agreement rights or easements in, over or connected with any lands, houses or buildings and notwithstanding Section 92 of the Lands Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845, to purchase and take by compulsion part only of any house, building or manufactory without being required to purchase the whole thereof, and to confirm any agreements which may be made before the passing of the intended Act with regard to the purchase of lands and easements.

11. To provide for the acquisition of lands by the Minister of Munitions on behalf of the Corporation for the purposes of the intended works or any of them and to enable the said Minister for such purposes to put in force any compulsory powers of acquisition vested in him under the Defence of the Realm (Acquisition of Land) Act, 1916, or otherwise and to assure or procure the assurance of such lands to the Corporation.

12. To exempt the Corporation from the provisions of the Lands Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845, relating to superfluous lands and to make other amendments in the Land Clauses Acts in their application to the intended Act, authorize the Corporation to sell, lease and dispose of lands vested in them or acquired under the intended Act upon such terms as they may think fit reserving (if they think fit) any water rights in such lands; and to confer powers upon the Corporation with reference to the temporary occupation of lands near the intended works, the retention, sale and disposal of lands acquired by them and the erection of farm houses or buildings upon any lands which the Corporation may purchase, acquire or hold; to provide for the correction of errors and the notification of omissions or mistakes in the plans and book of reference deposited in relation to the Bill for the intended Act and to empower minors and other persons under disabilities to grant easements and rights to the Corporation.

13. To enact special provisions for determining the purchase money and compensation payable in respect of lands, easements and property required for the purposes of the intended Act, and amongst other things to limit the amount of purchase money or compensation payable in the case of recent buildings, improvements or alterations or recently created interests therein.

14. To make provision for the prevention of pollution, fouling and contamination of any waters over which the Corporation have powers of user, and of any watercourse through which any water may flow into such waters, and for securing the purity of all waters obtained by the Corporation or which they have power to obtain under the Llanelly Waterworks Acts, 1865 to 1909, or under the intended Act, and (amongst other things) to confer upon the Corporation power to execute such works as may be necessary and to exercise all or any powers of a local authority under the Public Health Acts and the Rivers Pollution Prevention Acts, 1876 and 1893; to enable them to acquire and hold lands and construct works for intercepting all impure water and preventing the same entering the waterworks of the Corporation, and to enter into agreements with the owners, lessees or occupiers of lands with reference to the execution of any such works, the draining of such lands, or the collecting, conveying or preserving the purity of the waters of the Corporation, and to empower the Corporation to make and enforce bye-laws for any of the said purposes.

15. To authorize the Corporation to discharge water from their existing and proposed aqueducts, conduits and other waterworks into any available stream or watercourse.

16. To authorize the Corporation for and in connection with the proposed waterworks to lay down, maintain, alter and renew mains, pipes, culverts, discharge pipes, telephone or telegraph conductors, wires and posts and other works in, through, along, under, across and over highways (whether dedicated to the public or not, and whether situate within or without the limits of the Corporation for the supply of water), streets, roads, streams, paths and railways, and for those purposes to extend to such works all or any of the provisions of the Waterworks Clauses Acts, 1847 and 1863.

17. To authorize and require the Corporation to supply water to the Minister of Munitions for the purposes of and in connection with the site of His Majesty's Explosives Factory at Pembrey, and to enable the said Minister or the Corporation to supply water to the Burry Port Urban District Council.

18. To empower the Corporation and the Minister of Munitions and any local authority, company or person within or beyond the water limits of the Corporation to enter into and fulfil contracts and agreements in relation to the supply of water in bulk or otherwise to or by the Corporation by or to the said Minister or such local authority, company or person.

19. To authorize the Corporation to impose rates, rents and charges for the supply of water by the Corporation to alter existing rates, rents and charges, and to confer, vary or extinguish exemptions from the payment of rates, rents and charges.

20. To constitute the intended works part of the waterworks undertaking of the Corporation, and to extend and apply thereto all or some of the enactments relating to that undertaking, and to extend and apply all or some of the provisions of the intended Act to all or some of the existing waterworks of the Corporation.

21. To authorize the Corporation to break up, cross, alter, widen, divert, stop up (either temporarily or permanently) and interfere with streets, roads, highways, footpaths, bridges, canals, towing paths, railways, tramways, culverts, water-courses, sewers, drains, pavements, mains, pipes, wires, telegraphs, telephones and apparatus within the parishes, districts, boroughs and county aforesaid for the purposes of constructing and maintaining the intended works or any of them or otherwise for the purposes of the intended Act.

22. To extinguish all public and private rights of way and other rights over the lands acquired under the intended Act.

23. To authorize the Corporation to erect, maintain and provide huts or buildings and hospital accommodation for workmen employed in or about the construction of the intended works, and to erect or acquire dwellings for persons in their employ.

24. To make further provision with regard to the supply of water by the Corporation, and particularly with respect to the terms and conditions upon which and the pressure at which water is to be supplied and the filtration of water for domestic purposes. The contribution towards the maintenance of a common pipe by the owners and occupiers of houses supplied with water by that pipe; the laying and maintenance of communication pipes and other works and apparatus by owners and occupiers and by the Corporation; the execution of repairs to communication pipes in certain circumstances by the Corporation and the recovery of the expense thereof from the owner or occupier of the premises supplied; the conferring of power to open streets upon persons liable to maintain and repair communication and other pipes or apparatus in certain circumstances and recovery of expense; the prevention and detection of waste of water, the imposing upon owners and occupiers of premises obligations to provide cisterns and the regulation of the capacity and materials of such cisterns, the entering upon lands and premises, and the cutting off of supplies and removal of pipes, meters and fittings, and to empower the Corporation to refuse to supply water to persons in debt for water supplied to other premises.

25. To confer upon the Corporation with reference to their water undertaking all or some of the rights, powers and privileges of an urban authority under the Public Health Acts and (amongst other things) the powers of such an authority for the laying of mains within and without their district.

26. To authorize the Corporation to borrow money for the purchase of lands and the acquisition and construction of the intended works, for the extension and improvement of the water supply given by the Corporation, and for the general purposes of the waterworks undertaking of the Corporation, and for other purposes of the intended Act, and to charge the same on the borough fund and borough rate, the district fund and general district rate, and the undertakings, estates, rates, revenues and other property of the Corporation, or any of such securities, and to execute and grant and issue mortgages and other securities, and to authorize the Corporation to apply any of their corporate funds or other moneys authorized to be raised to any of the purposes of the intended Act, to invest all their sinking funds in statutory securities, including the securities of local authorities, and to use any sinking fund instead of borrowing, to borrow temporarily for current expenses, to exclude from application to moneys borrowed under the intended Act any limitation imposed by the Public Health Act, 1875, upon the amount which the Corporation may borrow to ensure that persons lending money to the Corporation should not be bound to inquire as to the application thereof, or to be answerable for loss, misapplication or non-application thereof, and to confer further powers upon the Corporation with regard to the borrowing, reborrowing and repayment of money and other financial matters, including the formation and application of sinking funds.

27. To authorize the Corporation to use one form of mortgage for all purposes for which they are for the time being authorized to borrow money, charging the loans upon all or any of the revenues, rates or property of the Corporation, to prescribe the rate of accumulation of the annual payments to sinking funds, and to exempt the Corporation from liability to see to the execution of trusts in certain circumstances.

28. To repeal, alter, amend or incorporate with the intended Act, with or without amendment, all or some of the provisions of the several local Acts following or some of them, namely, the Llanelly Waterworks Acts, 1865 to 1909, the Llanelly Local Board Act, 1888, and any other Acts or Orders relating to the Corporation or the Borough.

29. To enact all necessary provisions for giving full effect to the purposes of the intended Act or of the general or local Acts in force in the borough, including the making and confirmation of bye-laws, the imposition of penalties for breach of the provisions of the intended Act or any bye-laws thereunder, or for failure to comply with the terms or conditions of any consent given by the Corporation under any Act or otherwise the determination of compensation, the recovery, apportionment and application of damages, penalties and expenses, the recovery of demands in the county court, the qualification of judges, the entry of premises, the laying of informations and complaints, the evidence of appointments, authorities and resolutions, the authentication and service of notices, orders and other documents, and the exemption from personal liability of officers of the Corporation.

30. To vary and extinguish all existing rights and privileges which would or might in any way prevent, interfere with or delay the accomplishment of any of the objects of the intended Act, and to confer other rights and privileges.

31. To incorporate, with or without amendment, or to render inapplicable all or some of the provisions of the following Acts:—The Public Health Acts; the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882; the Local Loans Act, 1875; the Lands Clauses Acts; the Acquisition of Land (Assessment for Compensation) Act, 1919; the Railways Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845; the Waterworks Clauses Acts, 1847 and 1863; the Arbitration Act, 1889; and all other Acts amending those Acts respectively.

Plans and sections of the intended works and
