

that the debts of the debtor have been paid in full the Official Receiver shall make and file four days before the day appointed for hearing the application a report as to the debtor's conduct and affairs (including a report as to his conduct during the proceedings), and the Court on the hearing of the application shall hear and consider such report and such further evidence as may be adduced by any party and any objections which may be made by or on behalf of the trustee (if any) or any creditor whom the Court may order to be served with notice of the application or may permit to appear thereon. For the purpose of the application the report shall be *prima facie* evidence of the statements therein contained.

(2) For the purposes of this rule the expression "creditor" includes all creditors mentioned in the debtor's statement of affairs or who have notified to the Official Receiver or Trustee that they have, or at the date of the receiving order, had claims against the debtor.

2. Rule 229 of the Bankruptcy Rules, 1915, shall be read as if there were added thereto the following words:—

"or upon an application for rescission of a receiving order or annulment of adjudication on the ground that the debts of the debtor have been paid in full."

3. The following new Form shall be inserted in Part 1 of the Appendix to the Bankruptcy Rules, 1915, after Form No. 104:—
