BRITISH NATIONALITY AND STATUS OF ALIENS ACTS, 1914 AND 1918.

In the Matter of Ludwig Hollerbusch.

Revocation of Certificate of Naturalization.

Whereas I am satisfied as the result of an enquiry conducted by the Certificates of Naturalization (Revocation) Committee that Ludwig Hollerbusch, to whom a certificate of naturalization, numbered 17,813, was granted on the 14th January, 1909, has during the late war unlawfully traded and communicated with subjects of enemy states, and has been associated with business which was to his knowledge carried on in such manner as to assist the enemy in such war, and that the continuance of his certificate is not conducive to the public good.

Now, therefore, by this Order, made in pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by section 7 of the British Nationality and Status of Aliens Act, 1914, I revoke the said certificate, and I direct such revocation to have effect from the date hereof, and I further order the said certificate to be given up and to be cancelled.

NOTICE TO COMPANIES, MUNICIPAL AUTHORITIES AND BANKERS AS TO TRANSFER OF STOCKS, ETC.

With reference to the Notice in the London Gazette of June 23rd, 1916, as to the provisions of the Trading with the Enemy Acts and Proclamations in connection with the transfer of securities, the attention of all Companies, Municipal Authorities and Bankers who keep registers or branch or local registers of any annuities, Debenture stocks, Debentures, stocks, shares or securities is called to the fact that as from the coming into force of the Treaty of Peace with Germany on the 10th January, 1920, the provisions of the Treaty of Peace Order, 1919, made in pursuance thereof, now apply to the property, rights and interests of German nationals, wherever resident.

Therefore, while the position as regards persons or body of persons resident or carrying on business in Austria, Bulgaria, Hungary and Turkey has not at present altered and they remain "enemies" subject to the Trading with the Enemy legislation until a Treaty of

Peace with each of those Powers comes into force, as regards Germany the position has been altered as from the date on which the Treaty came into force—viz., January 10th, 1920, by the Treaty of Peace Order, 1919, made in pursuance of the Treaty of Peace with Germany, and the following provisions, *inter alia*, came into force:—

(a) By Article 297 (b) of the Treaty and Section 1 (XVI.) of the Treaty of Peace Order, 1919, all property, rights and interests within His Majesty's Dominions or Protectorates belonging to German nationals, wherever resident, at the date when the Treaty came into force (not being property, rights or interests acquired under general licence issued by or on behalf of His Majesty) are charged to meet, *inter alia*, certain claims by or debts due to British nationals. Section 1 (XVII.) (e) of the Treaty of Peace Order requires that if any person called upon to pay any money or to transfer any property, rights or interests has any reason to suspect that the same are subject to such charge he shall before paying, transferring or dealing with the same report the matter to the Custodian.

It follows from this that all securities (British, Allied, Neutral, Enemy or ex-enemy) held in the United Kingdom at January 10th, 1920, by or on behalf of a German national, wherever resident, cannot be transferred without the consent of the Custodian.

(b) Under paragraph (10) of the Annex to Articles 297 and 298 of the Treaty, Germany will, within six months from the coming into force of the Treaty, deliver to each Allied or Associated Power all securities, certificates, deeds, etc., held by its nationals and relating to property, rights and interests situated in the territory of that Allied or Associated Power, including any shares, stock, debentures, debenture stock or other obligations of any Company incorporated in accordance with the laws of that Power, and will furnish on the demand of any Allied or Associated Power information with regard thereto.

In order to make these provisions effective it is necessary to restrict the transfer in the United Kingdom of securities issued by or in British, Allied or Associated Countries belonging to or held by or on behalf of German nationals, wherever resident, at the coming into force of the Treaty in whatever part of the world they were held.

Accordingly the Form of Declaration by Transferors prescribed by the Notice in the London Gazette of June 23rd, 1916, has been revised, and in future

All Companies, Municipal Authorities and Bankers are required before registering or allowing any transfer of any annuities, Debenture, Stock, Debenture stocks, shares or other securities to obtain from the Transferor a declaration in the form or to the effect of the declaration following.—

I/We declare that the within-written Security has not been in enemy ownership at or since the outbreak of war or alternatively since it was transferred in accordance with the Stock Exchange Temporary Regulations, and was not held by or on behalf of a national of an ex-enemy Power on the date on which the Treaty

of Peace with the ex-enemy Power concerned came into force.

NOTE.—The expression "Enemy" means any person or body of persons of whatever nationality resident or carrying on business in an enemy country with which a Treaty of Peace has not yet come into force, viz., at present Austria, Bulgaria, Hungary and Turkey.

In the case of Incorporated Bodies, enemy character attaches only to those incorporated in an enemy country.

The expression "national of an ex-enemy Power" means the subject of a State with whom a Treaty of Peace has come into force wherever resident other than a person or corporation which, under the Treaty of Peace with that Power, has acquired *ipso facto* Allied or Neutral nationality.

The Board of Trade announce that their consent will no longer be required to the allotment or transfer of any share, stock, debenture or other security issued by a company to or for the benefit of an enemy subject under Section 10 (2) of the Trading with the Enemy Amendment Act, 1916, and accordingly in this connection no declaration by Transferees will in future be required.

In pursuance of the powers conferred on him by the Trade Boards Acts, 1909 and 1918, the Minister of Labour is pleased to establish a Trade Board for the Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods Trade in Great Britain, as specified in the Trade Boards (Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods) Order, 1920, namely:—

1. The making of such articles as are specified in (a) and (b) below, from linen or cotton or mixed linen and cotton fabrics (excepting knitted fabrics), or from other textile fabrics when the work is carried on in establishments mainly engaged in the making of such articles from the before-mentioned fabrics; viz.:—

(a) Handkerchiefs (including. Mufflers

or Flags when made in association or conjunction with Handkerchiefs);

(b) Bed-linen, Towels, Dusters, Table-napery, Bed-spreads, Tea-cloths, Table-centres, Sideboard-covers, Cushion-covers, or similar household articles; including all or any of the following operations:—

(i) Hooking, cutting or tearing the material;

(ii) Vice-folding;

(iii) Machine hemming, hem-stitching, spoking, over-locking, tambouring, button-holing, and other plain or fancy machine stitching;

(iv) All processes of embroidery or decorative needlework done by machine whether before or after the making of the articles of the description specified above;

(v) The following processes if done by machine:—Thread-drawing, thread-clipping, top-sewing, scalloping, nickelling and paring;

(vi) All processes of laundering, smoothing, folding, ornamenting, boxing, finishing, warehousing, packing, and other similar operations incidental to or appertaining to the making of the articles of the description specified above.

2. The making up in linen warehouses or in establishments mainly engaged in linen lapping, of linen or mixed linen and cotton or other textile fabrics in the piece, or of linen or mixed linen and cotton or other textile articles cut from the piece, including:—

Measuring, cutting, lapping, ornamenting, boxing, warehousing, packing, and similar operations.

TRADE BOARDS ACTS, 1909 AND 1918. STAMPED OR PRESSED METAL WARES TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

PROPOSAL TO FIX MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR FEMALE AND MALE WORKERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October 1918, the Trade Board established in Great Britain under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Stamped or Pressed Metal Wares Trade as specified in the Trade Boards (Stamped or Pressed Metal Wares) Order, 1919, hereby give notice as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they propose to fix general minimum time rates and overtime rates for male and female workers, and also piece-work basis time rates for female workers, and to declare the normal number of hours of work in the trade for the purpose of the application of the overtime rates, as follows:—

PART I.

Proposed General Minimum Time Rates for Male and Female Workers.

SECTION (I.).

Male Workers.

Workers of 21 years of age and over, 1s. 4½d. per hour.

Workers of 20 and under 21 years of age, 1s. 2d. per hour.

Workers of 19 and under 20 years of age, 11½d. per hour.

Workers of 18 and under 19 years of age, 9d. per hour.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 8d. per hour.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 7d. per hour.

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 6d. per hour.

Workers under 15 years of age, 4½d. per hour.

SECTION (II.).

Female Workers.

Workers of 18 years of age and over, 9d. per hour.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 7½d. per hour.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 6½d. per hour.

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 5½d. per hour.

Workers under 15 years of age, 4d. per hour.

Provided that in the case of Female Workers entering the trade for the first time at or over the age of 18 years the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable during the first two months of employment shall be 8d. per hour.

PART II.

Proposed Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates for Female Workers.

Workers of 18 years of age and over, 10d. per hour.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 8½d. per hour.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 7½d. per hour.

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 6½d. per hour.

Workers under 15 years of age, 5d. per hour.

In the case of Female Workers employed on Piece-work each Piece-Rate paid shall be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker at least the equivalent of the appropriate Piece-work Basis Time-Rate.

PART III.

Proposed Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers (All Ages).

SECTION (I.).—In accordance with Section 3 (i) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board propose to declare the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—

In any week	47
On Saturday	4½

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and on Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION (II.).—The Trade Board propose to fix for all Male and Female Workers, Overtime Rates in respect of hours worked by a worker in excess of the declared normal number of hours in the trade as follows, that is to say:

(a) For all hours worked on Sundays and Statutory Holidays the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to Double Time (that is to say, Twice the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable)

(b) For all hours worked in excess of four-and-a-half on Saturday, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to Time-and-a-half (that is to say, One-and-a-half times the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable), notwithstanding that the total number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 47.

(c) For all hours worked in excess of 47 in any week, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to Time-and-a-quarter for the first two hours and Time-and-a-half thereafter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of Sub-sections (a) and (b) of this Section.

NOTE.—The hours which female workers and young persons are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901.

PART IV.

The above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts and of this Notice, to all workers who are employed during the whole or any part of their time in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Stamped or Pressed Metal Wares) Order, 1919, that is to say:—

The manufacture from metals (other than precious metals) by the processes of cold stamping or cold pressing (including cutting or piercing) of cabinet fittings, window fittings, curtain accessories, stationers' sundries, drapers' sundries, fittings for gas or electric light, fittings for suit-cases or handbags or purses, buckles, eyelets, ferrules, labels, collar studs, tie-clips, thimbles, photograph frames, stamped chains, bells, fancy nails (excluding the shanks), parts of safety razors (excluding the blades), parts of braces or suspenders, corset steels or busks, whistles, tin-openers, medals or any similar articles or metal parts of such articles;

including:

(a) The operations of annealing, hardening, barrelling, polishing, bronzing, nickelling, lacquering, japanning, non-vitreous enamelling, tinning or assembling, where these operations are carried on in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of such stamped or pressed metal articles;

(b) The operations of carding, boxing, packeting, labelling, weighing, packing, warehousing or despatching, where these operations are incidental to or appertaining to the manufacture of such stamped or pressed metal articles;

but excluding:

(a) The operations specified in the Trade Boards (Hollow-ware) Order, 1913;

(b) The making of buttons or any operations incidental thereto;

(c) The making of coffin furniture or any operations incidental thereto;

(d) The making of pins, hairpins, hooks and eyes, hair-curlers, snap fasteners or safety pins or any operations incidental thereto;

(e) The making of steel pens and the making of stationers' metal sundries or other similar metal articles when carried on as a subsidiary branch of work in association with or in conjunction with the making of steel pens, so as to provide a common or interchangeable form of employment for the workers;

(f) The minting of coinage of the realm;

(g) The process of hand-embossing.

PART V.

SECTION I.—The above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of Wages, or to agreements made or that may be made between Employers and Workers for the payment of Wages in excess of these Minimum Rates of Wages.

The Trade Board will consider any objections to the above Proposals which may be lodged with them within two months from the 5th June, 1920. Such Objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to The Secretary, Stamped or Pressed Metal Wares Trade Board (Great Britain), 5, Chancery Lane, London, W.C. 2.

It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES (AS VARIED AND FIXED) FOR CERTAIN CLASSES OF MALE WORKERS IN THE RETAIL BESPOKE TAILORING TRADE IN GREAT BRITAIN.

EFFECTIVE AS FROM 7TH JUNE, 1920.*

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Acts, 1909 and 1918, for that branch of the Trade specified in the Trade Boards (Tailoring) Order, 1919, which is covered by the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour and dated 12th December, 1919, with respect to the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade in Great Britain, having given due notice on 12th February, 1920, of Proposal, as therein shown, to vary and fix minimum rates of wages, hereby give notice that they have varied the General Minimum Time-Rates and Piece-work Basis Time-Rates for Male Workers at present effective and set out in the Notice dated 27th November, 1919, issued by the Tailoring Trade Board (Great Britain) in their application to Male Workers in any branch of the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade in Great Britain specified in Part II. of the Schedule hereof, and have fixed General Minimum Time-Rates and Piece-work Basis Time-Rates for Male Workers in those branches of the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade in Great Britain specified in Part II. of the Schedule hereof, to which the Minimum Rates of Wages set out in the above-mentioned Notice dated 27th November, 1919, do not apply, the Mini-

imum Rates of Wages as varied and fixed being as shown in the Schedule set out below which is incorporated herewith.

And the Trade Board further give notice that they have received notification from the Minister of Labour that he has made an Order dated 31st May, 1920, under Section 4 (2) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, confirming the Minimum Rates of Wages as varied and fixed by the Trade Board and specifying 7th June, 1920,* as the date from which such Minimum Rates of Wages shall become effective.

* Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full-pay period, but in any case not later than 13th June, 1920.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

General Minimum Time-Rates and Piece-work Basis Time-Rates for Certain Classes of Male Workers.

SECTION I.—For Male Workers.

(a) Who have completed not less than five years' apprenticeship or learnership and less than one year's subsequent employment in the trade, 1s. 5d. per hour General Minimum Time-Rate, 1s. 6½d. per hour Piece-work Basis Time-Rate.

(b) Who have completed not less than five years' apprenticeship or learnership and not less than one and less than three years' subsequent employment in the trade, 1s. 6d. per hour General Minimum Time-Rate, 1s. 7½d. per hour Piece-work Basis Time-Rate.

(c) Who have completed not less than five years' apprenticeship or learnership and not less than three years' subsequent employment in the trade, 1s. 7d. per hour General Minimum Time-Rate, 1s. 8½d. per hour Piece-work Basis Time-Rate.

Provided that in the case of Male Workers who are employed in the following branches of the trade, namely, the making up of (a) Military dress uniforms (excluding khaki); (b) Naval frock and dress uniforms; (c) Hunt coats and hunt riding breeches; (d) Frock and dress coats, and (e) Court and diplomatic garments, and who have completed not less than five years' apprenticeship or learnership in the trade, the General Minimum Time-Rate and Piece-work Basis Time-Rate applicable during such time as they are so employed shall be 1s. 9d. per hour General Minimum Time-Rate, 1s. 10½d. per hour Piece-work Basis Time-Rate.

In cases where a worker is employed on Piece-work, each Piece-Rate paid must be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker not less than the Piece-work Basis Time-Rate applicable as set out in this Section.

SECTION II.—For Male Apprentices (other than Indentured Apprentices whose Indentures (i) were made prior to 7th June, 1920, and (ii) provide for the Apprentice being supplied with board or with board and lodging).

Who are learning to make the various garments throughout under a contract in writing and are registered with the Trade Board in

accordance with rules† laid down from time to time by the Trade Board:—

General Minimum Time-Rate.

For the first year of Apprenticeship in the trade, 10s. per week of 48 hours.

For the second year of Apprenticeship in the trade, 12s. per week of 48 hours.

For the third year of Apprenticeship in the trade, 17s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.

For the fourth year of Apprenticeship in the trade, 25s. per week of 48 hours.

For the fifth years of Apprenticeship in the trade, 35s. per week of 48 hours.

† Copies of the Rules can be had on application to the Secretary of the Trade Board.

The Weekly Rates for Male Apprentices as set out in this Section are based on a week of 48 hours, and are subject to a proportionate deduction according as the number of hours spent by the Apprentice in the factory or workshop in any week is less than 48.

In cases where an Apprentice is employed on Piece-work, each Piece-Rate paid must be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker not less than the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable as set out in this Section.

PART II.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts and of this Notice, to all Male Workers employed during the whole or any part of their time in any branch of the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade in Great Britain as defined in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour and dated 12th December, 1919, that is to say:—

Those branches of men's, women's, boys' and girls' bespoke tailoring in which the tailor supplies the garment direct to the individual wearer and employs the worker direct.

A worker shall be deemed to be employed by the tailor direct, if employed by another worker in the employ of the tailor, to whom a Minimum Rate of Wages fixed under the Trade Board Acts is applicable, or if employed by a sub-contractor engaged in cutting, making or finishing garments exclusively for the tailor in the tailor's shop or in a building of which the shop forms part or to which the shop is attached;

Including:—

(1) (a) The altering, repairing, renovating, or remaking of men's, women's, boys' or girls' tailored garments where carried out for the individual wearer by a tailor who employs the worker direct as defined above.

(b) The cleaning of such garments where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the repairing, renovating or remaking of the garments;

(2) The lining with fur of the above-mentioned garments where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the making of such garments;

(3) All processes of embroidery or decorative needlework where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the above-mentioned branches of tailoring.

(4) The packing and all other operations incidental to or appertaining to any of the above-mentioned branches of tailoring;

But excluding:—

(1) All or any of the above-mentioned operations where carried on in a factory where

garments are made up for three or more retail establishments;

(2) The making of head-gear.

PART III.

SECTION I.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers earning higher rates of wages, or to agreements made, or that may be made, between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of these Minimum Rate of Wages.

AERIAL ROUTE TRAFFIC CONTROL BY RADIO TELEPHONY.

It is hereby notified that:—

(1) Radio Telephony.

Radio Telephone Stations are open for work at Croydon and Lympne, for the London-Paris and London-Brussels routes. The French Authorities have also installed similar stations at St. Inglevert, Valenciennes, Paris (Le Bourget), and the Belgian Authorities are arranging to instal one at Brussels (Evere).

(2) Stations will shortly be opened for the London, Birmingham, Manchester, Glasgow route at Castle Bromwich, Didsbury, and Renfrew.

(3) *The wireless control of all the British stations, including stations licensed on private aerodromes, will be carried out by Croydon.*

(4) Wave length 900 metres.

(5) Procedure as in the Appendix to this Notice should be used

(6) Telephony will be used primarily for giving information as to the whereabouts of an aircraft travelling or about to travel along a route; secondly, for reporting weather conditions along the route to the machine.

(7) Routine.

Hours of Watch for British Stations are 0630 to 1930 G.M.T. (0730 to 2030 B.S.T.). The foreign authorities have kindly consented to put their stations in operation if due notification is given.

When aircraft fitted with radio telephones are scheduled to leave London, notification must be sent to C.A.T.O. Croydon as early as possible on the day of flight, and in any case at least one hour before starting. The C.A.T.O. Croydon is responsible for advising stations along the route for the name (distinguishing signal) of the aircraft and time of departure.

This notification is to be done as follows:—

Taking as an example Handley Page G.E.A.M.A. with telephony scheduled to leave Cricklewood at 0930 for Paris. As soon as C.A.T.O. Croydon receives notification, he informs Lympne and the French stations as follows:—

"Handley Page G.E.A.M.A. Cricklewood to Paris 0930."

Lympne passes this message to St. Inglevert; St. Inglevert passes it to Paris. All stations are thus warned for the flight.

The Aircraft.

Immediately after leaving its aerodrome, calls Croydon and passes the following message:—

"Handley Page G.E.A.M.A. clear Cricklewood to Paris."

Croydon replies:—

"Clear to Lympne."

The aircraft when approaching Lympne and about 20 miles away calls Lympne and passes the following message:—

"Handley Page G.E.A.M.A. London to Paris."

Lympne replies, if the weather conditions at St. Inglevert according to the last report received from that station are favourable:—

"Clear to St. Inglevert."

If unfavourable, Lympne replies in accordance with its latest report from the latter station—e.g., thick fog in Channel, clear south of St. Inglevert; or Channel clear, thick St. Inglevert to Abbeville, clear south of Abbeville.

On approaching St. Inglevert, the aircraft reports in the same way and receives a similar reply; again on approaching Paris the aircraft reports in a similar manner.

Paris replies:—

"Clear to land."

If conditions prevent the aircraft from landing at Le Bourget, Le Bourget replies to this effect and gives necessary instructions. The French language should be used for foreign stations.

(8) All radio-telephonic conversation must be kept as short and concise as possible.

2. *Call Signs.*—(This matter is under discussion at the present.)

3. *Procedure.*—Ground to air and vice versa ————.

The following illustrates the procedure adopted for work between a ground and an air station where preliminary tuning is probably required.

Station A has a message for Station B.

Declaration of Swine-Fever Infected Area.

1. The area described in the Schedule to this Order is hereby declared to be a Swine-Fever Infected Area for the purposes of the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1903.

Commencement.

2. This Order shall come into operation on the eighth day of June, nineteen hundred and twenty.

NORFOLK (EMNETH DISTRICT) (FOOT-
AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF
1920.

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

1. Parts I. and IV. of the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Control of Movement) Order of 1920, hereinafter referred to as "the Principal Order," are hereby applied to the district described in the Schedule hereto, which shall be a Scheduled District for the purposes of that Order.

Movement within the Scheduled District.

2. (1) Where an Inspector of the Ministry considers it necessary or expedient after enquiry that an animal in the Scheduled District should be permitted to be moved within the Scheduled District as often as occasion may require between different parts of the same farm, he may— notwithstanding any prohibition of movement contained in the Principal Order—authorise such movement by an Occupation Licence, and the Inspector may insert in the licence such conditions as he may consider necessary or desirable for the purpose of preventing the animals referred to in the licence from coming into contact with any other animals.

(2) If, in respect of any animal, the conditions of a licence granted under this Article are not complied with, the owner of the animal and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

3. This Order may be cited as the NORFOLK (EMNETH DISTRICT) (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1920.

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ISLE OF MAN HARBOURS.

At a Tynwald Court, holden at *Douglas*, on the 11th day of May, 1920.

THIS Court, having on the requisition of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor considered the advisability of appointing, under the provisions contained in the Isle of Man Harbour Acts, 1872 to 1911 (Acts of the Imperial Parliament), the payment of dues by vessels entering the harbours of this Isle, or on goods landed from vessels in any harbour or on any quay or pier, or shipped by vessels in any harbour or from any quay or pier:

Resolved:—

(1.) That this resolution shall relate to such ports only of the several harbours of Castletown, Douglas, Peel, Ramsey, Port St. Mary, Laxey, Port Erin, and Derbyhaven as are hereinafter described (that is to say):—

Castletown Harbour.—The whole of the South Pier, commonly called “the New Pier,” and that part of the harbour which lies inside a straight line drawn due north to the shore from the outer extremity of the said pier:

Douglas Harbour.—The whole of the Victoria and Battery Piers, and that part of the harbour which lies inside a straight line drawn from the north-east corner of the outer end of the Victoria Pier to the

south-east corner of the outer end of the Battery Pier:

Peel Harbour.—The whole of the outer Breakwater, and that part of the harbour which lies inside a straight line drawn from the outer end of the Breakwater and at right angles to such Breakwater, in a southerly direction to the shore:

Ramsey Harbour.—The whole of the Queen's Pier and of the South and North Piers, and that part of the harbour which lies within a straight line drawn from the extreme end of the South Pier to the extreme end of the North Pier:

Port St. Mary Harbour.—The whole of the Alfred Pier, and that part of the harbour which lies within a straight line drawn from the extreme outer end of the said pier, north-west or thereabouts, to the gate entering into Chapel Bay:

Laxey Harbour.—The whole of the Pier and the Breakwater or Jetty, and that part of the harbour lying within the line of the south side of such pier produced until it meets at right angles a line drawn through the south-east side of such Breakwater:

Port Erin Harbour.—The whole of the Breakwater and that part of the harbour lying within such Breakwater and a straight line drawn due north from the outer end of the said Breakwater to the land:

Derbyhaven Harbour.—The whole of the Breakwater and that part of the bay lying within the said Breakwater and a line drawn from the south end of the said Breakwater in a due westerly direction to the shore.

all such parts of the said respective harbours hereinbefore described being herein-after called or referred to as “the said harbours.”

That, subject to the approval of the Lords of the Committee of His Majesty's Privy Council for Trade, from and after the expiration of one calendar month after the publication of this resolution in the London Gazette, the following dues shall be payable by vessels entering any of the said harbours or using any of the said piers, quays, or breakwaters, or on goods landed from any vessel in any of the said harbours or on any of the said piers, quays, or breakwaters, or shipped by vessels in any of the said harbours or from any of the said piers, quays, or breakwaters:—

On all goods landed or brought into a harbour from any vessel (other than fresh fish from a fishing vessel), and on all goods shipped by or on any vessel in a harbour or transhipped into another vessel except as provided herein, per ton, sixpence.

Minimum charge for each entry, on net register, per ton, twopence.

For every fishing vessel of not more than twelve tons, and for every vessel licensed by the Isle of Man Harbour Commissioners to ply for hire as a pleasure boat engaged as a fishing vessel during a portion of the year only, for the year, or any portion of the year commencing on any 1st day of April, one pound.

For every fishing vessel more than twelve tons and not exceeding twenty tons, as above, one pound ten shillings.

For every other fishing vessel for the year commencing on any 1st day of April, at the option of the vessel, two pounds.

For every lighter or barge owned by any local authority, leaving a harbour and re-entering such harbour without having entered any other harbour, per ton, one half-penny.

For every vessel used for purposes of exhibition, or any similar purpose, per ton, sixpence.

For every vessel windbound, or calling for sailing orders, stores for crew, or bunker coal, and not breaking bulk, and fishing vessels for which annual dues have not been paid, for each time of entrance, per ton, two pence.

Minimum charge for each time of entry, if not exceeding twenty tons, two shillings and sixpence.

Minimum charge if exceeding twenty tons, five shillings.

If from any place other than a port of Great Britain or Ireland, per ton, three-pence.

For every vessel not landing or embarking passengers, or being a vessel not made liable to dues under any of the foregoing clauses, per ton, three-pence.

Minimum charge for each entry, five shillings.

In addition to the aforesaid dues there shall be paid:—

For every vessel, other than a fishing vessel during the period for which an annual due has been paid, laid up or lying up in a harbour to which this resolution applies longer than three months, per ton, sixpence.

And upon the expiration of each subsequent period of six months, per ton, sixpence.

For every fishing vessel which has paid such annual sum laid up or lying up in a harbour after the expiration of the year in respect of which the said due has been paid, per ton, sixpence.

And upon the expiration of each subsequent period of six months, per ton, sixpence.

For the purpose of this resolution, the expression "local Authority" means within the borough of Douglas, the Municipal Corporation of such borough; and elsewhere within this Island, the Commissioners of the Local Government District; and the expression "fishing vessel" shall mean a vessel exclusively or chiefly engaged in fishing.

Provided always, that, with respect to the said dues, the word "goods" shall not be considered to include the stores or ballast of any vessel.

Provided also, that, with respect to goods consigned to one of the said harbours, and brought into another of such harbours, and transhipped therein for conveyance to the harbour to which such goods are consigned, no dues shall be payable at the harbour where such transhipment takes place; and, for the purpose of this proviso, goods shall be deemed to be transhipped whether directly transferred from one vessel to another, or indirectly by being landed in a harbour and shipped on the same or another vessel for the purpose before mentioned within seven days after having been landed therein.

Provided also, that the tonnage of vessels in

respect of which dues shall be payable shall be the registered tonnage, or the tonnage ascertained in the like manner as registered tonnage, and that this resolution shall not apply to any vessel used in navigation which is propelled solely by oars, or which is of a burden of less than five tons, or to any vessel exempt by law from the payment of dues.

Provided also, that in the case of fishing vessels the yearly dues payable shall, as provided by law, be considered as payable for all the said harbours and not for each harbour.

And provided also, that this resolution shall not apply to any vessel for which a composition in lieu of dues hereinbefore referred to shall have been paid during the time for which such composition shall extend.

Resolved also, that, on the foregoing resolution commencing and taking effect, the resolution of this Court, dated the 12th day of March, 1912, appointing the payment of dues by vessels on goods at the harbours of Castle-town, Douglas, Peel, Ramsey, Port St. Mary, Laxey, Port Erin and Derbyhaven shall be and stand revoked.

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ISLE OF MAN HARBOURS.

At a Tynwald Court, holden at *Douglas*, the 21st day of *May*, 1920.

THE Court having, on the requisition of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, considered the advisability of appointing, under the provisions contained in the Isle of Man Harbours Acts, 1872-1911 (Acts of the Imperial Parliament), the payment of a duty on passengers carried by vessels entering or leaving the harbours of Douglas, Ramsey, Peel, Laxey, Port St. Mary and Port Erin, at which Harbours improvements have been made for which it is considered reasonable to charge such duty,

Resolved,—That, subject to the approval of the Committee of His Majesty's Privy Council for Trade, from and after the expiration of one calendar month after the publication of this resolution in the London Gazette, the following duty shall be payable by the owner, or owners, or master of each vessel entering or leaving any of the said harbours, that is to say:—

For every passenger, whether carried for hire or not, embarked on or disembarked from vessels holding a Board of Trade certificate for the conveyance of passengers at any of the said harbours on Sunday between the hours of eight o'clock in the forenoon and five o'clock in the afternoon, the sum of one shilling.

For every passenger, whether carried for hire or not, embarked or disembarked from any vessel holding a Board of Trade certificate for the conveyance of passengers, during any other hours on Sunday than as aforesaid, or on any other day, at any of the said harbours, the sum of three-pence.

Provided always, that vessels driven into any of the said harbours through stress of weather on Sunday, between such hours of

eight and five o'clock as before mentioned, and vessels arriving in any of the said harbours between such hours on Sunday which, in the opinion of the Harbour Master, but for delay occasioned by stress of weather, fog or accident, would have arrived therein prior to eight o'clock in the forenoon, shall be subject only to the duty of threepence for each passenger embarked or disembarked during such hours.

Provided also, that in respect of passengers under the age of twelve years there shall be payable one-half only of the duties before prescribed.

Provided also, that such duties shall not be payable in respect of ferry or pleasure boats used or plying in or about any of the said harbours, or any of the bays of Douglas, Ramsey, Peel, Laxey, Port St. Mary and Port Erin, and licensed by the Isle of Man Harbour Commissioners.

And, with respect to all other times than on Sundays between the hours of eight and five, as before mentioned, the following provisions shall take effect, that is to say:—

(a) As to vessels carrying passengers between any one of the said harbours and any place at a distance of not more than ten nautical miles from such harbour (such distance being calculated on the length of the voyage), the duty payable in respect of each passenger shall be only three-fourths of the duty to which such vessel may be liable as above.

(b) As to any vessel carrying passengers on any single voyage or trip which begins and ends at any one of the said harbours, the said duty shall be payable in respect of disembarkation only.

(d) In the case of a voyage usually termed a voyage or trip round the Island, the same shall, as to passengers who make the whole voyage, be considered, as a single voyage or trip, notwithstanding that stoppages may be made and passengers permitted to land or embark during the course of the voyage at any place other than that at which the trip commences and ends.

Resolved,—That, on the foregoing resolution commencing and taking effect, the resolution of this Court, dated 29th January, 1918, appointing a duty on passengers at Douglas, Ramsey, Laxey, Port St. Mary and Peel, shall be and stand revoked.

The foregoing restrictions have been rendered necessary owing to danger of sunken mines on the bottom. Attention is drawn to the cautionary note on the charts on this subject.

The areas defined above, with the exception of a portion of No. 19 and the whole of No. 21 are shaded on the accompanying chartlet, which is intended to provide a ready means of reference.

II. GENERAL INFORMATION REGARDING MINES.

1. Mariners are warned that a certain number of mines have sunk without exploding. It is possible that some of these mines lying on the bottom may still be dangerous. Surface vessels navigating these areas should therefore, whenever possible, have a clear depth of at least six feet between their keels and the bottom when in the vicinity of shoal water or in the approaches to ports and harbours which were subjected to mining operations during the war.

2. In removing prohibitions upon vessels trawling, it is pointed out that a risk, although of a diminishing character, still exists.

The attention of all vessels trawling is drawn to the immunity which may be secured by the

use of a suitable protective device to prevent mines entering the trawl.

As can be readily understood, it is not possible to predict for how long a period sunken unexploded mines remain dangerous, and consequently no unnecessary risk should be taken.

3. Mariners are notified that a small percentage of drifting mines are known to exist in a waterlogged condition, a fraction of which may be dangerous. This type of mine is hard

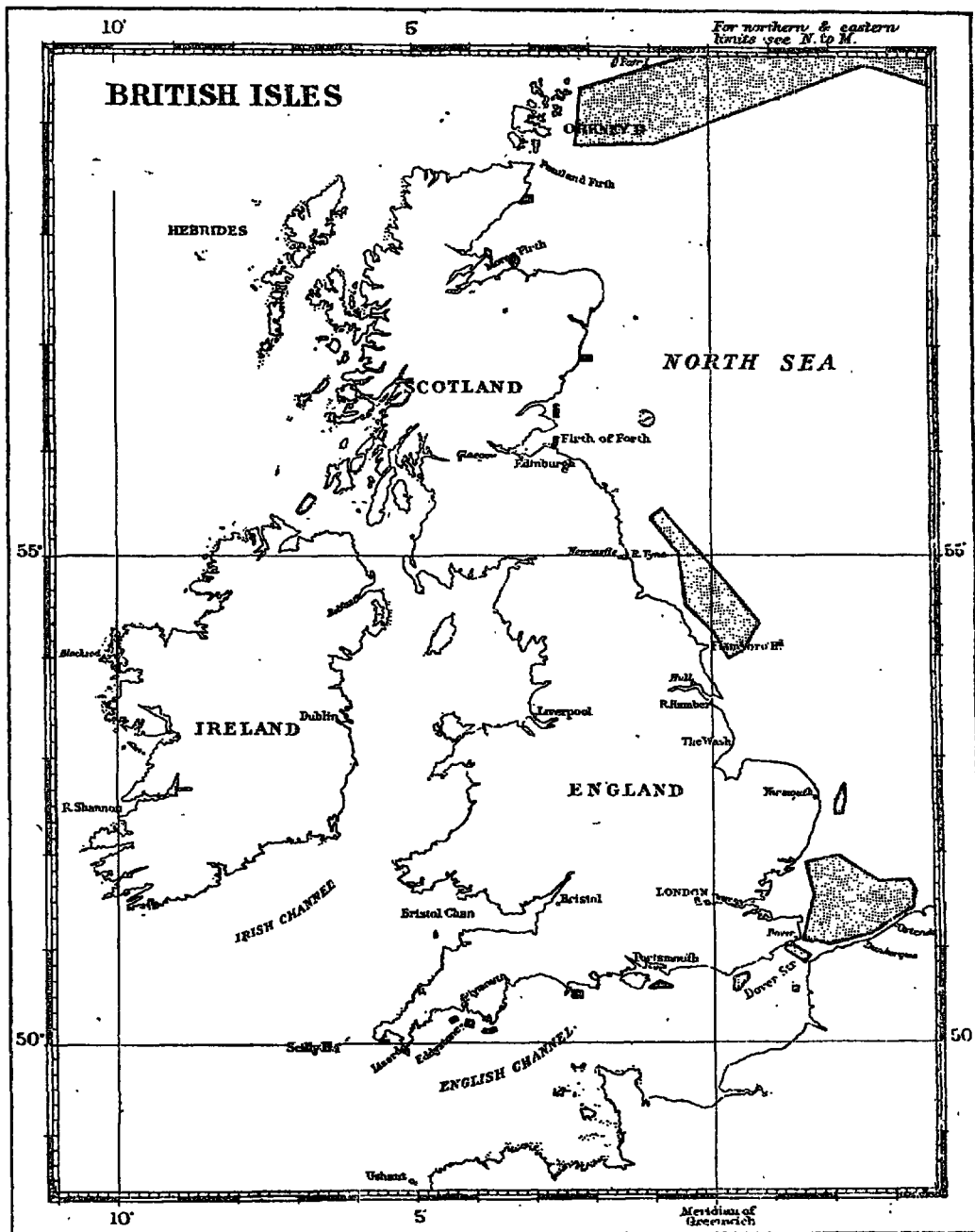

to see, and special precautions are therefore necessary to ensure that a good lookout is kept. The striking of low floating flotsam should be avoided.

4. A serious accident has occurred to a vessel at anchor from the explosion of a drifting mine which came into contact with an obstruction on the hull.

When vessels have to anchor in areas where drifting mines may be found it is necessary that all obstructions should as far as possible be removed and gangways triced up before dark in order to minimise risk.

EASTBOURNE WATERWORKS.

ADDITIONAL PROVISION.

(Purchase of Undertaking of Eastbourne Waterworks Company and Winding-up of the Company; Maintenance and Continuance of Undertaking and Supply of Water; Prevention of Pollution of Water; Water Rates and Charges and other provisions; Confirmation of Agreement; Incorporation, Amendment and Repeal of Acts.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the present Session by the Eastbourne Waterworks Company by petition for additional provision for leave to introduce into the Bill now pending in Parliament under the above title provisions and amendments to give effect to all or some of the objects and purposes hereinafter mentioned.

1. In this Notice "the borough" means the borough of Eastbourne, "the Corporation" means the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the borough, "the Bill" means the Bill for the intended Act, and "the Company" means the Eastbourne Waterworks Company.

2. To empower the Corporation to acquire the undertaking of the Company (including their property, goodwill, assets, effects, powers, rights, privileges, liberties and authorities) to provide for the transfer to and vesting in the Corporation of the said undertaking, the issue (if necessary) by the Corporation of stock, bonds or mortgages to the shareholders for a

limited period, the payment of the Company's debts and liabilities, the continuance of their debenture debt charged upon the present security or some other security or the substitution of Corporation stock or mortgages therefor (if necessary), the compensation of directors, the employment of or compensation to officers and servants of the Company, and the winding-up and dissolution of the Company, and to confirm and authorize the carrying into effect of the agreement entered or to be entered into between the Company and the Corporation, and any other agreements that may be entered into by the said parties before the passing of the Bill for or relating to the sale and purchase of the undertaking or otherwise.

3. To confer upon the Corporation all or some of the powers contained in the Acts relating to the Company's undertaking or the Bill, or to repeal the said Acts, and to re-enact with amendments, and to make applicable to the Corporation and to their proposed limits of supply, all or some of the enactments contained therein.

4. To empower the Corporation to carry on the undertaking acquired by them, and to maintain, alter, improve, enlarge, renew or discontinue the Company's works, to authorize the Corporation to supply water for public, domestic, trade and other purposes within the Company's limits of supply, comprising the borough and the parishes of Norway, Willington, Jevington, West Ham, Pevensy, Hailsham (except the portion of the parish of Hailsham included within the limits of the Hailsham Water Act, 1885, for the supply of water), East Dean, Friston, West Dean, Litlington, Lullington, Wilmington, Folkington, and so much of the parish of Arlington as lies to the south of the Brighton and Hastings Branch of the London, Brighton and South Coast Railway, all in the county of Sussex, and to enable them to supply water in bulk or otherwise beyond those limits.

5. To provide for the continuance of the undertaking acquired by the Corporation and to empower them to provide additional and other works, including mains and pipes, to take and intercept water at the Company's wells, pumping stations, adits and waterworks and elsewhere; to empower the Corporation to exercise the powers of a local authority under the Public Health Acts as if their water limits were their district under those Acts to hold lands and execute works for the preservation of water and the purity thereof, and to enter into agreements with landowners in respect thereof, to impose conditions on the sale of lands, to make bye-laws for the prevention of the pollution of their water, both within and without the borough, to discharge water from any of their works into any available stream or watercourse, to lay down and erect discharge pipes, telephone or telegraph posts, wires, conductors and apparatus, to break up public and private streets for the purpose of laying pipes and other works and appliances, and for the purpose of providing meters for detecting waste.

6. To make further provision and to confer all necessary powers upon the Corporation for the preservation of the purity of their water supply and the prevention of pollution of the wells and other sources of supply of the Company; to authorize the exercise by the Corporation of the powers of local authorities under the Public Health Acts and the Rivers Pollu-

tion (Prevention) Acts, and other Acts, not only within but also without the borough, and to enact provisions or authorize the making of regulations or bye-laws for preventing pollution from the adjoining or neighbouring lands.

7. To transfer to the Corporation the powers contained in the Bill with regard to West Dean and Friston Farms in the parishes of West Dean and Friston respectively, in the county of Sussex, and to authorize the Corporation to retain, and use any lands of the Company for purposes other than those relating to water-works.

8. To confer further powers upon the Corporation with regard to the supply of water, including the following:—

The pressure of water and the exemption from obligation to supply at greater pressure than that prescribed; to prescribe and alter the rates for the supply of water for domestic and other purposes, and to empower the Corporation to fix the dates for the payment thereof; to require the rates for the supply of water to small houses to be paid by the owners; to require the supply to buildings used partly for business purposes and certain other premises to be by measure; to define "domestic purposes" and to exclude certain purposes therefrom; to fix the rate for the supply for washing horses, carriages and motor-cars; to make further provision with regard to communication pipes and fittings, and to confer powers upon the owners thereof and upon the Corporation in regard to the maintenance and repair thereof, and to require the owners to bear the cost; to require the provision of a separate communication pipe for each house; to make provision for the maintenance of a common pipe; to authorize the Corporation to make bye-laws for preventing the waste, undue consumption, misuse or contamination of water, and to prescribe the requirements in regard to water fittings; to regulate the supply of water by meter; the connection and disconnection of meters, the registration thereof to be prima facie evidence; penalties for injuring meters, or fittings or fraudulently altering the same; the supply by the Corporation of water fittings, and the notice to be given by a consumer for the discontinuance of a supply.

9. To empower the Corporation to borrow or raise money for the purpose of the purchase of the water undertaking of the Company and for all or any of the purposes of the said undertaking when transferred to the Corporation (including the provision of working capital, or of the Bill), and to charge the money so borrowed or raised upon the security of the said undertaking or the revenues thereof, the

borough fund and rate, the district fund and general district rate and all or any property and revenues of the Corporation, and to empower the Corporation to grant and issue mortgages, debentures and debenture or other stock in respect thereof.

10. To empower the Corporation to issue further classes of stock for the purpose of giving effect to their agreement with the Company and for the exercise of any statutory borrowing powers.

11. To vary or extinguish all rights, powers and privileges inconsistent with or which would or might in any way interfere with any of the objects of the Bill and to confer other rights, powers and privileges.

12. The Bill will, so far as it may be necessary or expedient, repeal, alter or amend or incorporate (with or without modification) the provisions or some of the provisions of the several Acts and Orders following (that is to say):—

The Eastbourne Water Works Acts, 1859 to 1897; the Eastbourne Improvement Act, 1879; the Eastbourne Improvement Act, 1885; the Eastbourne Corporation Act, 1902; the Eastbourne Electric Lighting Order, 1899; the Eastbourne Corporation Act, 1910; the Eastbourne Orders, 1895 to 1917; and all other Acts and Orders relating to the Company, the Corporation and the Borough.

13. To incorporate, with or without amendment, or to vary or render inapplicable all or some of the provisions of the following public Acts:—

The Lands Clauses Acts; the Waterworks Clauses Acts, 1847 and 1863; the Municipal Corporation Acts, and the Public Health Acts; the Arbitration Act, 1889; and all Acts amending those Acts respectively.

In the Administrative County of Berks.

The boroughs of Wallingford and Abingdon ; the petty sessional divisions of Wallingford and Abingdon (except the parishes of Garford, Lyford, Frilford and its detached part, Tubney and its detached part, Fyfield, Kingston Bagpuize, Draycott Moor, Appleton with Eaton, Bessels Leigh, Cumnor, North Hinksey, South Hinksey, and Wytham), and the parishes of Harwell, Chilton, Compton, Aldworth, Streatley, Basildon, and Ashampstead.
