**W**HEREAS by Section 13 of the Air Force (Constitution) Act, 1917, it is provided that His Majesty may, by Order in Council, apply, with the necessary modifications and adaptations, in relation to the Air Council, the President of the Air Council, and the Air Force, and the officers and men thereof, and Air Force property or institutions, any of the enactments relating to the Army Council, the Secretary of State for the War Department, the Army, or the officers and soldiers thereof (including enactments conferring any powers, rights, exemption or abatement from taxation or immunities or imposing any duties or disabilities on such officers or soldiers) or to military property or institutions:

And whereas by certain Orders made under the said Section certain enactments have been applied in relation as aforesaid, and it is expedient so to apply the further enactment mentioned in the first column of the Schedule to this Order:

And whereas the provisions of Section 1 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The enactment mentioned in the first column of the Schedule to this Order, being an enactment relating to the Army Council, shall apply in relation to the Air Council, subject to the modifications and adaptations specified in the second column of that Schedule.

2. This Order may be cited as the Air Force (Application of Enactments) Order, 1920.

**W**HEREAS by virtue of an Order in Council, dated the 16th day of *June*, 1915, made under the Ministry of Munitions Act, 1915, certain functions and work of the Army Council and the Secretary of State for War have been transferred to, and certain powers of the Army Council have become exercisable concurrently by, the Minister of Munitions:

And whereas the said Act provided that any Order in Council made thereunder might be varied or revoked by a subsequent Order in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

As and from such date as may be agreed between the Army Council and the Minister of Munitions the said Order in Council of the 16th day of *June*, 1915, shall be revoked so far as it relates to functions and work of the Army Council or the Secretary of State for War, and any functions and work which under Order in Council have been transferred from the Army Council or the Secretary of State for War to the Minister shall be re-transferred from the Minister to the Army Council or Secretary of State for War as the case may require.

Provided that nothing in this Order shall affect the completion by the Minister of Munitions of any such transaction which in pursuance of such transfer he has entered into or for which he has become responsible, as may be agreed between the Minister of Munitions and the Army Council, or affect any powers of the Minister of Munitions with respect to the disposal of surplus Government property.

This Order may be cited as the Minister of Munitions (Re-Transfer of Powers) Order, 1920.

**W**HEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 15th day of *May*, 1920, in the words following, viz.:—

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas under existing Regulations Officers' Chief Stewards and Cooks and Officers' Stewards and Cooks First Class, in Your Majesty's Navy are not eligible, when employed on extra duty, for extra pay at the

rates applicable to other ratings of equivalent rank:

"And whereas we consider that this anomaly should be removed:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the payment of extra pay, when employed on extra duty, to Officers' Chief Stewards and Cooks at the rates applicable to other Chief Petty Officers, and to Officers' Stewards and Cooks First Class, at the rates applicable to other Petty Officers:

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas your Majesty was graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, bearing date the 22nd day of January, 1920, to sanction, *inter alia*, the grant of allowances to Officers and Warrant Officers and Commissioned Officers from Warrant Rank, of the Engineer Branch when in charge of machinery of ships in commission, and otherwise of Senior Allowances when below the relative rank of Commander, and senior of a ship in commission in which an Engineer Commander is allowed in the complement:

"And whereas we are of opinion that these allowances should be payable to the Engineer Officers of vessels which pay off out of commission for refit except in the cases of vessels whose machinery is taken entirely in charge by Dockyard Officers for 'Thorough Repair':

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to approve of Machinery Allowance and Senior Engineer's Allowance being issued respectively to the following classes of Engineer Officers in ships paid off out of commission for refit:—

Officers in charge of machinery of such ships;

Officers when senior of such ships in cases where an Engineer Commander is allowed in the complement,

at the rates and under the conditions laid down for ships in commission in Schedule V. (Section VI.) of Order in Council dated the 22nd January, 1920, subject to the proviso that when the Dockyard Officers take over entire charge of the machinery of a vessel for 'Thorough Repair,' Machinery Allowance and Senior Allowance shall not be payable until the Engineer Officer is satisfied with the result of the 'Thorough Repair Trial' and again accepts responsibility for the engines and boilers:

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 27th day of May, 1920, in the words following, viz.:—

"Whereas by section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased by Your Order in Council bearing date the 22nd day of January, 1920, to approve, *inter alia*, of Paymasters and Barrackmasters, Royal Marines, who have been promoted to the substantive rank of Lieutenant-Colonel being eligible to receive a maximum rate of retired Pay of £750 a year, if on retirement they have attained five years' seniority in the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel:

"And whereas we are of opinion that commensurate provision should be made for the Retired Pay of a Paymaster or Barrackmaster who retires as a Lieutenant-Colonel with less than five years' seniority in that rank:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to approve of Paymasters and Barrackmasters, Royal Marines, being allowed on promotion to Lieutenant-Colonel to earn an increment to their Retired Pay at the rate of £30 a year for each year in the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel up to the maximum of £750 a year, the increment to be additional to Retired Pay at whatever rate the Officers might have earned by age and service at the date of their promotion, on the scale applicable to Majors, R.M., within the maximum of £600:

"The Lords Commissioners of Your

Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

**W**HEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 31st day of May, 1920, in the words following, viz.:—

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council bearing date the 22nd day of January, 1920, to sanction, *inter alia*, the grant of allowances to certain Officers of the Engineer Branch when in charge of machinery and when Senior Engineer of a Ship in which an Engineer Commander is allowed in the complement:

"And whereas we are of opinion that allowances should be paid to ratings under similar conditions:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the grant at our discretion of the allowances set forth in the annexed Schedule, with effect as from the dates on which Charge Pay and Senior Allowance cease to be payable under former Regulations.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals.

*"Schedule.*

"The following allowances to be payable:—

"1. A Machinery Allowance of 1s. per diem to Engine Room Artificer and Mechanician ratings in charge of the Machinery of Your Majesty's Ships whether in commission or in reserve.

"2. A Senior Engineer's Allowance of 1s. per diem to Engine Room Artificer and Mechanician ratings performing the duties of Senior Engineer in Ships allowed an Engineer Commander, whether in commission or in reserve.

"3. Machinery and Senior Engineer's Allowances, each of 1s. per diem, under the above conditions to Engine Room Artificer and Mechanician ratings in Ships paid off out of commission for refit, except during periods when the Dockyard Officers take over entire

charge of the Machinery of a vessel for 'Thorough Repair.'

"4. A Machinery Allowance of 6d. per diem (in lieu of the Charge Pay authorized by Order in Council of 21st December, 1917) to Engine Room ratings, other than Artificers and Mechanician ratings (but including Motor Mechanic and Motor Boat Ratings), in charge of the machinery of Small Craft, whether steam or motor driven, the horse-power of which exceeds 100, such allowance not to be paid in respect of boats forming part of the equipment of Your Majesty's Ships or of vessels maintained in reserve.

"5. A Machinery Allowance of 1s. per diem (in lieu of the Charge Pay authorized by Order in Council of 3rd February, 1916) to the rating in charge of engines at Your Majesty's Wireless Telegraph Stations abroad."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

**W**HEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 2nd day of June, 1920, in the words following, viz.:—

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas by Orders in Council bearing dates the 29th day of November, 1881, and the 18th day of May, 1897, it is provided, *inter alia*, that a Lieutenant-Colonel, Royal Marines, with six years' service in that rank may, at his option, be placed upon a special Half Pay List, receiving £300 per annum, and be eligible for promotion and employment up to the age of 54 years:

"And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council bearing date the 6th day of February, 1917, to approve of the establishment of a Half-Pay List for Majors, Royal Marines, who, in the ordinary course, would be retired on account of age, or who are physically unfit for general duty, with a view to their retention as Lieutenant-Colonels on half pay and to their further employment, and also to define the conditions under which they were to be borne on this list, providing, *inter alia*, for these Officers to receive an addition of £25 per annum to their retired pay as Majors for each year of employment as a Lieutenant-Colonel, within a maximum equal to the retired pay of a Lieutenant-Colonel:

"And whereas Your Majesty was graciously



pleased, by Your Order in Council bearing date the 22nd day of January, 1920, to approve, *inter alia*, of revised scales of full pay, half pay and retired pay, and of revised regulations for the retirement of Officers of Your Majesty's Naval and Marine Forces, with a view to the assimilation of the conditions of service of such Officers and their emoluments during active service and on retirement:

"And whereas we consider that, in view of the assimilation of the conditions of service of Officers of Your Majesty's Naval and Marine Forces, Officers of the Royal Marines should no longer be placed upon special Half-Pay Lists with a view to subsequent employment and promotion, but should be dealt with in future under the appropriate Regulations laid down for Naval Officers in the event of its being desired to employ them when they have passed the age for compulsory retirement of their rank:

"And whereas we are further of opinion that service in the substantive rank of Lieutenant-Colonel rendered by Majors who have already been placed on the Half-Pay List as Lieutenant-Colonels should be recognised by the award of increased retired pay:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to approve of the Half-Pay List for Lieutenant-Colonels, R.M., of six years' seniority established by Order in Council of the 29th November, 1881, and the Half-Pay List for Majors, R.M., established by Order in Council of the 6th February, 1917, being allowed to lapse, and further, of Majors who have been placed on the Half-Pay List as Lieutenant-Colonels under the last-named Order in Council being granted the maximum rate of retired pay prescribed in Order in Council of the 20th January, 1920, for a Major, with additions at the rate of £30 for each complete year of employment in the substantive rank of Lieutenant-Colonel, provided that retired pay under this Order be not granted at a rate in excess of £750 per annum, or from a date earlier than the 1st day of April, 1919, or to an Officer retired before that date unless he served during the present war in a service capacity:

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals."

**W**HEREAS by section 1 of the Injuries in War (Compensation) Act, 1914, it is enacted that His Majesty may by Order in Council frame a scheme as to the pensions, grants and other allowances in the nature thereof, to be paid to persons (not being officers or seamen of the Royal Navy, or officers or soldiers of any of His Majesty's land or marine forces) in respect of injuries suffered by them whilst employed afloat by or under the

Admiralty or Army Council in connection with warlike operations in which His Majesty is engaged, and in the case of their death to their widows and other dependants:

And whereas by section 2 of the Injuries in War (Compensation) Act, 1914 (Session 2), it is enacted that the Injuries in War (Compensation) Act, 1914, shall extend to pensions, grants and other allowances in respect of disablement by sickness specifically attributable to the nature and conditions of the employment in like manner as it applies to pensions, grants and other allowances in respect of injuries:

And whereas a scheme under the Injuries in War (Compensation) Act, 1914, as extended by the Injuries in War (Compensation) Act, 1914 (Session 2), was framed by an Order in Council bearing date the 27th day of May, 1915:

And whereas such scheme was amended by an Order in Council dated the 8th day of June, 1916:

And whereas by paragraph (b) of sub-section (1) of section 1 of the War Pensions (Administrative Provisions) Act, 1919, it is provided that, notwithstanding anything to the contrary in the said Injuries in War (Compensation) Acts, where a scheme framed under the said Acts is to be administered by the Minister of Pensions, such scheme may be so framed as to provide that pensions, grants and other allowances in the nature thereof may be granted in the like circumstances and on the like terms and conditions as are set forth in the Regulations annexed to any Order in Council relating to Pensions under section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, and administered by the Minister of Pensions:

And whereas it has been represented to His Majesty by the Minister of Pensions that it is desirable to vary the above-mentioned scheme bearing date the 27th day of May, 1915, as amended by Order in Council dated the 8th day of June, 1916, in the case of certain classes of persons thereunder so as to grant to such persons, as from the first day of May, 1918, benefits in the like circumstances and on the like terms and conditions as are set forth in the Regulations attached to certain Orders in Council under the said Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, and administered by the Minister of Pensions:

And whereas the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty and the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, having taken the said proposals into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the scheme framed by Order in Council bearing date the 27th day of May, 1915, as amended by Order in Council dated the 8th day of June, 1916, be amended by excluding therefrom the persons specified in the Schedule hereto annexed, and by extending to such persons the provisions of the scheme set forth in the said annexed Schedule as from the first day of May, 1918.

#### *Schedule.*

#### PERSONS TO WHOM THE SCHEME APPLIES.

1. The following Scheme of pensions, grants and allowances in the nature thereof shall

apply as from the 1st day of May, 1918, to all officers and men of Fleet Auxiliaries and other vessels (other than ranks and ratings in receipt of Naval pay) employed afloat in the service and pay of the Admiralty under agreements to serve under the provisions of Section 90 of the Naval Discipline Act for the period of the Great War who may be injured or disabled whilst employed afloat in connection with war-like operations in which His Majesty is engaged and who would be eligible in the like circumstances for a pension, grant, or other allowance in the nature thereof under the respective Regulations hereinafter specified if they were officers or men in the Naval Service of His Majesty; and in the case of such officers and men who are killed or who die, to such of their widows and other dependants as would be eligible in the like circumstances for a pension, grant, or other allowance in the nature thereof under the respective Regulations hereinafter specified if they were the widows or other dependants of officers or men in the Naval Service of His Majesty. Provided that the Scheme shall only apply to injuries sustained and disablements arising and deaths resulting from injuries sustained or disablements arising during the continuance or in consequence of the Great War, and not due to serious negligence or misconduct, and shall not apply to such officers and men of the Royal Naval Reserve, Royal Fleet Reserve, or Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve, or to such Naval Pensioners as may be serving in the Fleet in receipt of naval rates of pay during such service, or to any officers or seamen of the Royal Navy or officers or soldiers of any of His Majesty's Land, Marine, or Air Forces.

#### GRADING OF OFFICERS AND MEN.

2. The officers and men of the Fleet Auxiliaries and other vessels above specified shall be graded in such appropriate ranks and ratings corresponding with the ranks and ratings of the Royal Navy as the Minister of Pensions may determine.

#### SCALES OF PENSIONS, GRANTS, AND OTHER ALLOWANCES, AND CONDITIONS OF PAYMENT IN THE CASE OF OFFICERS CORRESPONDING TO COMMISSIONED OFFICERS.

3. The Regulations annexed to the Order in Council dated the 29th day of September, 1917, relating to the pensions of Commissioned Naval Officers and of the families and dependants of such officers deceased in consequence of the Great War, shall apply to officers of corresponding rank of the Fleet Auxiliaries and other vessels above specified, and to their families and dependants: provided that—

(1) "Retires" shall mean ceases to be in the pay and service of the Admiralty as aforesaid.

(2) Any case in which the said Regulations do not exactly apply may be dealt with by the Minister of Pensions with the concurrence of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury in accordance with the intention of the Regulations and this Scheme.

#### SCALES OF PENSIONS, GRANTS, AND OTHER ALLOWANCES, AND CONDITIONS OF PAYMENT IN THE CASE OF OFFICERS CORRESPONDING TO COMMISSIONED WARRANT OFFICERS AND WARRANT OFFICERS.

4. The Regulations annexed to the Order in Council dated the 29th day of September, 1917,

relating to the pensions of Commissioned Warrant Officers and Warrant Officers and the families and dependants of such officers deceased in consequence of the Great War, shall apply to officers of corresponding rank of the Fleet Auxiliaries and other vessels above specified, and to their families and dependants: provided that—

(1) "Discharge" shall mean ceasing to be in the service and pay of the Admiralty as aforesaid.

(2) Any case in which the said Regulations do not exactly apply may be dealt with by the Minister of Pensions with the concurrence of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury in accordance with the intention of the Regulations and this Scheme.

#### SCALES OF PENSIONS, GRANTS, AND OTHER ALLOWANCES AND CONDITIONS OF PAYMENT IN THE CASE OF MEN.

5. The Regulations annexed to the Order in Council dated the 14th day of January, 1919, relating to the pensions of Seamen and Marines disabled and of the families and dependants of Seamen and Marines deceased in consequence of the Great War, shall apply to men of the corresponding ratings of the Fleet Auxiliaries and other vessels above specified, and to their families and dependants: provided that—

(1) Article 1 (4) of the said Regulations shall not apply, but men shall receive such an addition to their pension for each grade of rating as the Minister of Pensions with the concurrence of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury may fix; but so that the disablement pension for the highest degree of disablement of the highest rating shall not exceed under the said Order in Council of the 14th day of January, 1919, 42s. 6d. a week.

(2) The widow's pension under Article 11 of the widow of a man shall be half of the disablement pension to which her husband would have been entitled for the highest degree of disablement.

(3) The provisions with respect to separation allowance shall not apply but, provided that analogous conditions are fulfilled—

(a) Under Article 8 (1) the children's allowance shall begin from the date of discharge;

(b) Under Articles 14 and 15 each child under the age of 16 may receive the allowance of £1; and

(c) It shall not be necessary for a dependant under Articles 20 and 22 to have drawn or to have been paid separation allowance or to have been eligible for such an allowance.

(4) "Discharge" shall mean ceasing to be in the service and pay of the Admiralty as aforesaid.

(5) Any case in which the said Regulations do not exactly apply may be dealt with by the Minister of Pensions with the concurrence of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury in accordance with the intention of the Regulations and this Scheme.

#### BENEFITS UNDER SUPERANNUATION ACTS AND GREENWICH HOSPITAL ACTS.

6. No person who is eligible to benefit under this Scheme shall lose by virtue thereof any gratuity or any superannuation or other allow-

ance for which he may be eligible under any provision of the Superannuation Acts, 1834 to 1914: provided that any person who, if the Injuries in War (Compensation) Act, 1914, had not been passed, would have been entitled to any gratuity or allowance in respect of injury under Section 1 of the Superannuation Act, 1887, or to any pension or allowance under the Greenwich Hospital Acts, 1865 to 1898, shall remain entitled to the gratuity, allowance or pension, as the case may be, but shall be entitled to benefit under this Scheme only to the extent, if any, by which the value of the benefits it confers exceeds the value of the gratuity, allowance or pension.

#### BENEFITS NOT ASSIGNABLE.

7. A pension, grant or allowance under this Scheme shall not be capable of being assigned, charged or attached, and shall not pass to any other person by operation of law; and where the Minister of Pensions shall consider it desirable, in the interest of any person to whom any pension, grant, or allowance is payable, he may appoint a Trustee or Trustees and pay the money to him or them to be administered for the benefit of such person, or his dependants, or any of them, and the receipt of the Trustee or Trustees shall be a good discharge to the Minister of Pensions for the same.

#### RESERVED RIGHT TO SCHEME UNDER AGREEMENT.

8. Any other Scheme endorsed on the Agreement of an officer or man with the Admiralty may, if more beneficial, be applied in lieu of this Scheme in the case of such officer or man, or the widow or other dependants of such officer or man (other than the widow or dependants of an officer or man who was at the time of his death in receipt of the benefits of this Scheme).

The pension, grant, or allowance of any person claiming under such Scheme shall be administered by the Minister of Pensions in accordance with the terms of such Scheme, but such person shall not be eligible for any benefits beyond those contained in such Scheme.

#### AMENDING ORDERS IN COUNCIL.

9. The provisions of any Order in Council in amendment of or in substitution for any Order in Council specified in this Schedule may be applied in lieu of the corresponding provisions of any such last-mentioned Order in Council.

#### ADMINISTRATION AND INTERPRETATION.

10. The Minister of Pensions shall be the sole administrator and interpreter of this Scheme.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 37, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 13th day of May, 1920, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 37, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property in the Parishes

of St. Peter's in Maldon and Langford, in the County of Essex, now vested in us:

"Whereas under and by virtue of a certain Indenture, bearing date the 22nd day of July, 1870, and made between The Honourable Charles Wentworth George Howard, of Park Street, Grosvenor Square, in the County of Middlesex, Henry Robertson, of Overstowey, in the County of Somerset, Esquire, and The Honourable Arthur Edward Hardinge, of Kibworth, in the County of Leicester, a Captain and Lieutenant-Colonel in Her Majesty's Regiment of Coldstream Guards, of the first part, Arthur Edward Augustus Ellis, of Chester Square, in the County of Middlesex, Esquire, a Captain and Lieutenant-Colonel in Her Majesty's Regiment of Grenadier Guards, and The Honourable Mina Frances Ellis, his Wife, of the second part, and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the third part, the lands, tenements and hereditaments situate in the Parishes of Saint Peter's in Maldon and Langford aforesaid, containing two hundred and seven acres three roods and thirty-four perches or thereabouts, particularly described in the said Indenture and shown by the pink colour on the plan drawn thereon, became with their appurtenances and are now vested in us:

"And whereas none of the said lands, tenements and hereditaments is subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant, but the same are now in our possession, but some portions thereof on account of their character or situation are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed:

"And whereas with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the same or of the proceeds thereof for the ultimate improvement of our Common Fund it is expedient that the said lands, tenements and hereditaments or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit should be sold or disposed of, and accordingly that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest in such lands, tenements and hereditaments, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell or dispose of and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands, tenements and hereditaments so vested in us as aforesaid, under and by virtue of the said Indenture with their appurtenances and all our estate, right, title and interest therein or in any part or parts thereof unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same and his or their heirs, executors, administrators or assigns or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and enquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable, it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time as occasion may arise in the purchase of other lands, tithes, rent charges, tenements, or hereditaments or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid, and in the meantime to invest the

said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary Stock or other public securities in England.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the Diocese of Chelmsford.

and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the Patron or Patrons of the Benefice or Benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof, as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend William, Lord Bishop of Exeter, hath made a Representation in writing, dated the 9th day of January, 1920, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"There is in the County of Devon and Diocese of Exeter the Benefice or Vicarage of Lamerton the Parish whereof contains a population of 635 persons or thereabouts, with accommodation in the Parish Church for 250 persons.

"The net annual value of the Benefice of Lamerton is £316 or thereabouts.

"There is also in the same County and Diocese the Benefice or Rectory of Sydenham Damerel the Parish whereof contains a population of 271 persons or thereabouts, with accommodation in the Parish Church for 165 persons.

"The net annual value of the Benefice of Sydenham Damerel is £262 or thereabouts.

"That it appears to me and I do hereby represent to your Grace that under the provisions of the said Pluralities Act, 1838, a small portion of the Parish of Lamerton (the boundaries of which are more particularly described in the Scheme annexed to this Representation and also delineated on the Ordnance Map annexed thereto and thereon edged with red) may be advantageously separated therefrom and be annexed to the said Parish of Sydenham Damerel to which it is contiguous.

"The Patron of the Benefice of Lamerton is John Claude Lewis Tremayne, Esq., O.B.E., of Heligan, St. Ewe, Cornwall, and the Reverend Arthur Cornwallis Evans is the Incumbent thereof. The Patron of the Benefice of Sydenham Damerel is John Carpenter Garnier, Gentleman, of Rookesbury Park, Wickham, Hants, and the Reverend James Farmer Rowley is the Incumbent thereof.

"There is also in the same County and Diocese the Benefice or Vicarage of St. Paul, Tavistock, the Parish whereof contains a population of 602 persons or thereabouts, with accommodation in the Parish Church for 270 persons.

"The net annual value of the Benefice of St. Paul, Tavistock, is £233 or thereabouts.

"That it appears to me, and I do hereby represent to your Grace, that under the provisions of the said Pluralities Act, 1838, a small portion of the Parish of St. Paul, Tavistock (the boundaries of which are more particularly described in the Scheme annexed to this Representation and so delineated on

the Ordnance Map annexed thereto and thereon edged with blue), may be advantageously separated therefrom and be annexed to the said Parish of Lamerton to which it is contiguous.

"The Patron of the Benefice of St. Paul, Tavistock, is the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Exeter, and the Reverend John Alexander Crum is the Incumbent thereof.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the 26th Section of the Pluralities Act, 1838, I, the said Lord Bishop, have drawn up a Scheme in writing annexed to this Representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alterations above proposed may best be effected and how the changes consequent on such alterations in respect of Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Glebe Lands, Tithe Rent-Charges, and other Ecclesiastical Dues, Rates and Payments, and in respect to Patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested, and I do hereby submit the same, together with the consents in writing of the said Patrons and Incumbents of the said Benefices, to the intent that if your Grace shall on full consideration and inquiry be satisfied with such Scheme you may certify the same and such Consents as aforesaid to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the Consents referred to in the said Representation are as follows:—

#### "SCHEME.

"It is proposed to separate from the said Parish of Lamerton and annex to the said Parish of Sydenham Damerel all that part of the Parish of Lamerton the boundaries of which are delineated on the Ordnance plan hereto annexed and edged with red.

"That the Incumbent of Sydenham Damerel shall have sole and exclusive Cure of Souls within such portions so to be separated from Lamerton.

"That any Inhabitants of such portion shall be entitled to accommodation in the Parish Church of Sydenham Damerel, but shall cease to be entitled to any right or accommodation in the Parish Church of Lamerton.

"That any Inhabitants of the aforesaid portion shall have such and the same right to have Marriages, Baptisms, Churchings and Burials solemnized and performed in the Parish Church of Sydenham Damerel as they might have had in the Parish Church of Lamerton.

"That all fees, ecclesiastical offerings and emoluments which may arise from the said portion so to be separated from Lamerton shall belong to the Incumbent of Sydenham Damerel.

"That the whole of the Tithe Rent-Charge arising out of land proposed to be separated from Lamerton and added to the Parish of Sydenham Damerel, together with all Glebe Lands, if any, within the said area to be separated, is to remain the property of the Incumbent of Lamerton as heretofore.

"It is also proposed to separate from the said Parish of St. Paul, Tavistock, and annex to the said Parish of Lamerton all that part of the Parish of St. Paul, Tavistock, the boundaries of which are delineated on the Ordnance plan hereto annexed and edged with blue.

"That the Incumbent of the Benefice of Lamerton shall have sole and exclusive Cure

of Souls within such portion so to be separated from St. Paul, Tavistock.

"That any Inhabitants of such portion shall be entitled to accommodation in the Parish Church of Lamerton, but shall cease to be entitled to any right or accommodation in the Parish Church of St. Paul, Tavistock.

"That any Inhabitants of the aforesaid portion shall have such and the same right to have Marriages, Baptisms, Churchings and Burials solemnized and performed in the Parish Church of Lamerton, as they might have had in the Parish Church of St. Paul, Tavistock.

"That all fees, ecclesiastical offerings and emoluments which may arise from the said portion so to be separated from St. Paul, Tavistock, shall belong to the Incumbent of Lamerton.

"That the whole of the Tithe Rent-Charge issuing out of land proposed to be separated from St. Paul, Tavistock, and added to the Parish of Lamerton, together with all Glebe Lands, if any, in the area so to be separated, is to remain the property of the Incumbent of St. Paul, Tavistock.

"That no alteration shall be made in the Patronage of the said Benefices or any of them.

"The Patron of the Benefice of Stowford is John Roger Wollocombe, of Stowford Cottage, Lew Down, S.O., in the County of Devon, Gentleman, and the Rev. John Henry Bidlake Wollocombe is the Incumbent thereof.

"That there is also in the County of Devon and Diocese of Exeter the Benefice or Vicarage of Marystowe with the Chapel of Thrushelton annexed the Parish whereof contains a population of 531 persons or thereabouts with accommodation in the Parish Church of Marystowe for 230 persons and in the Chapel of Thrushelton for 130 persons.

"The net annual value of the Benefice of Marystowe with the Chapel of Thrushelton annexed is £369 or thereabouts.

"That it appears to me and I do hereby represent to your Grace that under the provisions of the said Pluralities Act, 1838, a small portion of the Parish of Marystowe with the Chapel of Thrushelton annexed (the boundaries of which are more particularly described in the Scheme annexed to this Representation and also delineated on the Ordnance Map annexed thereto and thereon edged with green) may be advantageously separated therefrom and be annexed to the said Parish of Stowford to which it is contiguous.

"The Patrons of the Benefice of Marystowe with the Chapel of Thrushelton annexed is Hugh Neville, of Milborne Port, in the County of Somerset, the surviving Trustee of the Will of John Tremayne, deceased, and on the nomination of Onera Mary Georgiana Tremayne and Harriett Maude Tremayne, of Sydenham, Lew Down, in the County of

Devon, Spinsters, the Rev. Ernest Frederick Newman is the Incumbent thereof.

"That the whole of the Tithe Rent-Charge arising out of land proposed to be separated from Stowford and added to Lifton is to remain the property of the Incumbent of Stowford as heretofore.

"It is also proposed to separate from the Parish of Marystowe with the Chapel of Thrushelton annexed, and annex to the said Parish of Stowford all that part of the Parish of Marystowe with the Chapel of Thrushelton annexed the boundaries of which are delineated on the Ordnance plan hereto annexed and edged with green.

"That the Incumbent of the Benefice of Stowford shall have sole and exclusive Cure of Souls within such portion so to be separated from Marystowe with Thrushelton.

"That any inhabitants of such portion shall be entitled to accommodation in the Parish Church of Stowford, but shall cease to be entitled to any right or accommodation in the Parish Church of Marystowe or the Chapel of Thrushelton annexed.

#### TREASURY ORDER CALLING IN CURRENCY NOTES OF THE FIRST AND SECOND ISSUES.

Whereas it is enacted by sub-section (1) of section one of the Currency and Bank Notes Act, 1914 (hereinafter referred to as "the said Act"), that the Treasury may, subject to the provisions of the said Act, issue currency notes for one pound and for ten shillings, and that those notes shall be current in the United Kingdom in the same manner and to the same extent and as fully as sovereigns and half sovereigns are current, and shall be legal tender in the United Kingdom for the payment of any amount:

And whereas it is enacted by sub-section (4) of the said section that the Treasury may, subject to such conditions as to time, manner and order of presentation as they think fit, call in any currency notes under the said Act on paying for those notes at their face value in gold:

And whereas it is enacted by section one of the Currency and Bank Notes (Amendment) Act, 1914, that the power of the Treasury to

call in currency notes under the said sub-section (4) of section one of the said Act shall be extended so as to include a power to call in currency notes on exchanging the notes so called in for other notes of the same face value issued under the said Act:

And whereas in pursuance of the said sub-section (1) of section one of the said Act, the Treasury on the sixth day of August, nineteen hundred and fourteen, made provision for the issue of currency notes for one pound and ten shillings respectively (hereinafter referred to as "currency notes of the first issue"), and such currency notes were issued by the Treasury accordingly:

And whereas the Treasury on the twenty-second day of October, nineteen hundred and fourteen, directed that as from the twenty-third day of October, nineteen hundred and fourteen the issue of currency notes of the first issue for one pound should cease, and that the currency notes for one pound issued on or after that date (hereinafter referred to as currency notes of the second issue for one pound) should be of a new design:

And whereas the Treasury on the nineteenth day of January, nineteen hundred and fifteen, directed that as from the twenty-first day of January, nineteen hundred and fifteen, the issue of currency notes of the first issue for ten shillings should cease, and that the currency notes for ten shillings issued on or after that date (hereinafter referred to as currency notes of the second issue for ten shillings) should be of a new design:

And whereas the Treasury on the twelfth day of January, nineteen hundred and seventeen, directed that as from the twenty-second day of January, nineteen hundred and seventeen, or as soon as might be thereafter, the issue of currency notes of the second issue for one pound should cease and that the currency notes for one pound issued thenceforward should be of a new design, and the issue of currency notes of the second issue for one pound accordingly ceased on the first day of February, 1917:

And whereas the Treasury on the twenty-first day of October, nineteen hundred and eighteen, directed that as from the twenty-second day of October, nineteen hundred and eighteen or as soon as might be thereafter, the issue of currency notes of the second issue for ten shillings should cease, and that the currency notes for ten shillings issued thenceforward should be of a new design, and the issue of currency notes of the second issue for ten shillings accordingly ceased on the second day of November, 1918:

And whereas certain of the currency notes of the first and second issues still remain in circulation and it is desirable that they should be called in:

Now, therefore, the Treasury, in pursuance of their powers in that behalf, hereby call in all currency notes of the first and second issues, and direct that as from the date of this order all such currency notes shall cease to be current or legal tender within the United Kingdom:

Provided that the holder of any currency notes of the first or second issues shall, on application at any time before the first day of September, nineteen hundred and twenty, during office hours at any Money Order Office in the United Kingdom or at the Bank of England or the Bank of Ireland be entitled to receive in exchange for those Notes after due examina-



tion thereof other currency notes of the same face value which have been issued and are for the time being legal tender in the United Kingdom under the said Act.

(iv) All processes of embroidery or decorative needlework done by machine, whether before or after the making of the articles of the description specified above;

(v) The following processes if done by machine:—Thread-drawing, thread-clipping, top-sewing, scalloping, nickelling and paring;

(vi) All processes of laundering, smoothing, folding, ornamenting, boxing, finishing, warehousing, packing, and other similar operations incidental to or appertaining to the making of the articles of the description specified above.

2. The making up in linen warehouses or in establishments mainly engaged in linen lapping, of linen or mixed linen and cotton or other textile fabrics in the piece, or of linen or mixed linen and cotton or other textile articles cut from the piece, including:—

Measuring, cutting, lapping, ornamenting, boxing, warehousing, packing, and similar operations.

#### PROPOSAL TO VARY AND TO FIX MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR FEMALE WORKERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Acts, 1909 and 1918, for that branch of the Trade specified in the Trade Boards (Tailoring) Order, 1919, which is covered by the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour, and dated 15th January, 1920, with respect to the Ready-made and Wholesale Bespoke Tailoring Trade in Great Britain, HEREBY GIVE NOTICE, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they PROPOSE TO VARY the General Minimum Time-Rates and Piece-work Basis Time-Rates for Female Workers at present effective and set out in the Notice dated 27th November, 1919, issued by the Tailoring Trade Board (Great Britain) established under Regulations made by the Board of Trade and dated 10th January, 1914, in their application to certain classes of Female Workers in any branch of the Ready-made and Wholesale Bespoke Tailoring Trade in Great Britain specified in Part V. of the Schedule hereof, and to FIX General Minimum Time-Rates and Piece-work Basis Time-Rates for Female Workers in those branches of the Ready-made and Wholesale Bespoke Tailoring Trade in Great Britain specified in Part V. of the Schedule hereof to which the said Minimum Rates of Wages set out in the above-mentioned Notice dated 27th November, 1919, do not apply, and also TO FIX Overtime Rates for Female Workers in any branch of the Ready-made and Wholesale Bespoke Tailoring Trade in Great Britain specified in Part V. of the Schedule hereof, the proposed Minimum Rates of Wages being as shown in the Schedule set out below.

 (ii) The advances to be given to Learners commencing at under 21 years of age shall become due as from the first Monday in January and July of each year, the Learner being entitled to her first advance from the first Monday in January or July, as the case may be, provided that she has been in the trade at least three months.  
 (iii) A Learner shall cease to be a Learner, and be entitled to the full General Minimum Time-Rate applicable to her under Section I. of this Part of this Schedule, upon the fulfilment of the conditions appropriate to her, as set out below :—

For Female Workers (other than Cutters, Trimmers and Fitters-up, as specified in Section I. (b) of Part I. of this Schedule, and other than Learners occupied in Fitting-up and Hooking-up, as specified in Section II. (B) of Part I. of this Schedule):—

(a) Workers (other than Home-workers), 10½d. per hour.

(b) Home-workers, 10¼d. per hour.

In cases where a worker is employed on Piece-work, each Piece-Rate paid must be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, not less than 10½d. per hour to an ordinary worker. Provided that in determining as to whether any Piece-Rate satisfies the foregoing condition regard shall be had only to the earnings of workers other than Learners.

### PART III.

#### *Proposed Overtime Rates for Female Workers.*

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board hereby give notice that they propose to declare the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—

In any week	... .. 48
On any day (other than Saturday)	9
On Saturday	... .. 5

Provided that all hours worked by a worker on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The Trade Board give similar Notice that they propose to fix Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by a Female Worker, in excess of such normal number of hours, as follows; that is to say:—

(A) For Female Workers, as specified in this Notice, employed on Time-work:

(1) For the first two hours' Overtime on any day, except Saturdays, Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to Time-and-a-quarter, that is to say, One-and-a-Quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable.

(2) For the second two hours' Overtime on any day except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, and for all Overtime on Saturdays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to Time-and-a-Half, that is to say, One-and-a-Half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable.

(3) For all time worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays and for Overtime after the first four hours'

Overtime on any other day, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to Double Time, that is to say, Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable.

(4) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48, the Overtime Rate shall be Time-and-a-Quarter except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs (2) and (3) of this Sub-Section. The Overtime Rates shall be payable where on any day (not being a Sunday or a Customary Public or Statutory Holiday) the number of hours worked exceeds nine, or in the case of Saturday, exceeds five, notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

Provided that:—

(a) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on five days a week, the Overtime Rates shall only be payable where on any day the number of hours worked exceeds 9½.

(b) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the normal number of hours for the week in which attendance on Saturday is required shall be deemed to be 50.

(c) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance on Sunday instead of Saturday, the Minimum Rates for Overtime, as set out above, shall apply to such worker in like manner as if in the provisions of this Notice as to Overtime the word "Saturday" were substituted for "Sunday," and the word "Sunday" for "Saturday."

In the application of these provisos, where the employer requires attendance on any day on which it is not the established practice of the employer to require attendance, all time worked on such day (not being Sunday or a Customary Public or Statutory Holiday), shall be paid for at Time-and-a-Quarter for the first two hours and Time-and-a-Half for the second two hours, and Double Time thereafter.

(B) For Female Workers, as specified in this Notice, employed on Piece-work:

(1) (a) Cutters, Trimmers and Fitters-up (as specified in Section I. (b) of Part I. of this Schedule), and (b) Learners (as specified in Section II. of Part I. of this Schedule), employed on Piece-work shall be entitled to receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked, in addition to Piece-Rates, each of which would yield in the circumstances of the case to an ordinary worker not less than

the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable, the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, One-half of the appropriate General Minimum Time-rate, or One-quarter of the appropriate General Minimum Time-rate, according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of paragraph (A) of this Section, if the worker had been employed on Time-work, were Double Time, Time-and-a-Half, or Time-and-a-Quarter respectively.

(2) All other Female Workers employed on Piece-work shall be entitled to receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked, in addition to Piece-rates, each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary Worker, not less than the Piece-work Basis Time-rate applicable, the appropriate Piece-work Basis Time-rate, One-half of the appropriate Piece-work Basis Time-rate, or One-quarter of the appropriate Piece-work Basis Time-rate, according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of paragraph (A) of this Section, if the worker had been employed on Time-work, were Double Time, Time-and-a-half or Time-and-a-quarter respectively.

NOTE.—The hours which females and young persons are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts.

#### PART IV.

For the purpose of this Notice the following definitions shall apply:—

SECTION I.—Cutters, Trimmers and Fitters-up shall be deemed to be workers who are substantially occupied in one or more of the following processes, that is to say:—

(a) Marking-in or marking-up cloth or linings, or other materials.

(b) Laying-up, hooking-up or folding cloth or linings, or other materials.

(c) Cutting cloth or linings or other materials.

(d) Trimming, that is, the process as ordinarily carried on of cutting and assembling together the linings and fittings of garments.

(e) Dividing, that is, the process as ordinarily carried on by Cutters or their Assistants, of dividing, parting or separating the parts of garments after being cut, and of assembling them into suitable bundles for making up.

(f) Fitting-up, that is, a process between that of cutting and that of sewing, baisting, or machining, which consists of preparing and fitting accurately the various parts of the garment before being baisted, sewn or machined, such work of preparing and fitting being always done by shears or knives or other cutting appliances; sewing, baisting or machining forming no part or process of fitting-up.

SECTION II.—A Female Learner is a worker who:—

(a) Is employed during the whole or a substantial part of her time in learning any branch or process of the trade by an employer who provides the learner with reasonable facilities for such learning; and

(b) Has received a certificate, or has been registered in accordance with rules from time to time laid down by the Trade Board, or has made an application for such certificate or registration, which has been duly acknowledged and is still under consideration. Provided that the certification or registration of a learner may be cancelled if the other conditions of learnership are not complied with.

Provided that an employer may employ a Female Learner on her first employment, in the branch or branches of the trade described in Part V. of this Schedule, without a certificate or registration for a probation period not exceeding four weeks, but in the event of such learner being continued thereafter at her employment, the probation period shall be included in her period of learnership.

Provided that notwithstanding compliance with the conditions contained in this Section, a person shall not be deemed to be a Learner if she works in a room used for dwelling purposes, and is not in the employment of her parent or guardian.

SECTION III.—A Home-Worker is a worker who works in her own home, or in any place not under the control or management of the employer.

#### PART V.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Act and of this Notice, to all Female Workers in Great Britain who are employed during the whole or any part of their time in any branch of the Ready-made and Wholesale Bespoke Tailoring Trade as defined in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour and dated 15th January, 1920, that is to say:

Men's and boys' ready-made and wholesale bespoke tailoring; and all men's and boys' retail bespoke tailoring carried on in a factory where garments are made up for three or more retail establishments; and any other branch of men's and boys' tailoring which is not included within the scope of the Regulations dated 12th December, 1919, with respect to the Constitution and Proceedings of a Trade Board in Great Britain for Retail Bespoke Tailoring;

*including*

(1) (a) The altering, repairing, renovating, or re-making of men's or boys' tailored garments, except where included within the scope of the above-mentioned Regulations with respect to Retail Bespoke Tailoring.

(b) The cleaning of such garments where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the altering, repairing, renovating or re-making of the garments.

(2) The lining with fur of the above-mentioned garments, where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the making of such garments.

(3) All processes of embroidery or decorative needlework, where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the above-mentioned branches of tailoring.

(4) All warehousing, packing and other operations incidental to or appertaining to any of the branches of tailoring in question.

*but excluding*

(1) The making of head-gear.

(2) The making of rubberised or oilskin garments.

(3) The making of boys' ready-made washing suits or sailor suits where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the making of garments to be worn by women or girls, or by children without distinction of sex.

#### PART VI.

SECTION I.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers earning higher Rates of Wages, or to agreements made, or that may be made, between employers and workers for the payment of Wages in excess of these minimum Rates of Wages.

The Trade Board will consider any objections to the above proposals to vary and fix which may be lodged with them within two months from 11th June, 1920. Such objections should be in writing, and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to The Secretary of the Ready-Made and Wholesale Bespoke Tailoring Trade Board (Great Britain), 5, Chancery Lane, London, W.C. 2.

It is desirable that the objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF  
1920 (No. 2).

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

1. Part II. of the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Control of Movement) Order of 1920 is hereby applied to the several boroughs described in the Schedule hereto.

2. This Order may be cited as the NORFOLK (EMNETH DISTRICT) (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1920 (No. 2), and shall be read with the Norfolk (Emneth District) (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1920.

3. This Order shall come into operation on the ninth day of June, nineteen hundred and twenty.
