#### PRESENT,

The KING's Most/Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS in pursuance of the powers conferred on Him by the Treaty of Peace Act, 1919, His Majesty in Council was pleased to make the Treaty of Peace Order, 1919, and it is expedient that the said Order should be amended in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The provisions of the Treaty of Peace Order, 1919, set out in the first column of the Schedule to this Order shall be amended in the manner shown in the second column of that Schedule.

- 2. Paragraph (xvi) of Article one of the Treaty of Peace Order, 1919, shall have effect and shall be deemed always to have had effect as if for the proviso to that paragraph the following proviso were contained therein:
  - "Provided that any particular property rights or interests so charged may at any time be released by the Custodian acting under the general direction of the Board of Trade from the charge so created."
- 3. This Order may be cited as the Treaty of Peace (Amendment) Order, 1920.

1 (xviii)	For the words "Article 300" where those words secondly occur there shall be substituted the words "Article 301," and for the words "six months" where those words secondly occur there shall be substituted the words "ten months."
<b>3.</b>	For the words "except the Dominion of Canada" to "and India" inclusive there shall be substituted the words "except India and the self-governing Dominions, "that is to say, the Dominion of Canada, the Commonwealth of Australia (which "for this purpose shall be deemed to include Papua and Norfolk Island), the "Union of South Africa, the Dominion of New Zealand, and Newfoundland." WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, Chapter 77, and of the Act of the 5th year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria (Session 2), Chapter 26, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 17th day of June, 1920, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—
"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, Chapter 77, and of the Act of the 5th year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria (Session 2), Chapter 26, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for authorizing certain improvements at the Episcopal House of Residence belonging to the See of Worcester, which is known as Hartlebury Castle:

"Whereas the Right Reverend Ernest Harold, now Bishop of Worcester, is desirous that certain improvements should be made at the said Episcopal House of Residence and has submitted to us the particulars of such proposed improvements and we have approved the

"And whereas the said Bishop is also desirous and it appears to us to be expedient that towards the cost of effecting the said proposed improvements a sum of Two hundred and Fifty Pounds (being a sum which, together with the outstanding balance of the sum already borrowed upon the same security, does not exceed two years' income of the See) should be provided by the borrowing of the same sum by way of mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands, tenements and hereditaments, endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to the Bishop of Worcester:

Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Ernest Harold, Bishop of Worcester (testified by his having affixed his signature and Episcopal Seal to this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that the said Bishop be authorized to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne and that the said Governors be empowered to lend under the provisions of the above mentioned Acts any sum not exceeding £250, and that as a security for the same the said Bishop do mortgage all and every part of the lands, tenements and hereditaments, and endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to his said See to the said Governors by Deed for the term of Fifteen years, or until the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid with the interest for the same as hereinafter mentioned and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof shall be fully paid and satisfied and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in the manner following: that is to say, during and in respect of the first period of Twelve months of the said term, computed from the day of the date of the mortgage, no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable, but the said Bishop or his successors shall yearly, at the end of the second period of

Twelve months so computed and at the end of every such like period of Twelve months thereafter, pay to the said Governors, their successors or assigns, one tenth part of the said principal sum until the whole thereof shall be repaid and shall also at the end of the first and each succeeding period of Twelve months, computed as aforesaid, pay interest at the rate of Four Pounds per centum, per annum, on the said principal sum or on so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid, and that if and when it shall happen that either the principal or the interest directed to be paid as hereinbefore mentioned shall be in arrear and unpaid for the space of Forty days after the same shall become due, it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors, their successors and assigns, to recover the same and the costs and charges attending the recovery thereof by distress and sale in the like manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from their tenants by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale and that such mortgage deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be approved by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and shall bind as well the said Ernest Harold, now Bishop of the said Diocese of Worcester, as every succeeding Bishop of the same Diocese until the principal money and interest, costs and charges shall have been paid

off and discharged.

"And we further recommend and propose that the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid shall be paid to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, that the said Governors and their successors shall not be bound or required to see to the application thereof and that upon the receipt of the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid the whole or any part or parts thereof shall be applied by us at such times and in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient towards effecting the said proposed improvements at the Episcopal House of Residence aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Worcester.

"Whereas under and by virtue of a certain indenture bearing date the 12th December, 1910, and made between Richard Duppa de Uphaugh, of Hollingbourne House, in the County of Kent, Esquire, of the first part, William Gladwin Turbutt, of Oyston Hall, in the County of Derby, Esquire, and Alured Faunce de Laune, of Sharsted Court, Sitting-bourne, in the said County of Kent, Esquire, of the second part, and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the third part, the lands, tenements and hereditaments situate in the Parish of Stoke aforesaid, and particularly described in the first, second and third parts of the first schedule to the said indenture and shown by the red, yellow and green colours on the plan drawn thereon, subject as to the premises described in the third part of the said schedule to the reservations set out in the said indenture became with their appurtenances and

charges, tenements or hereditaments, or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid, and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary Stock or other public securities in England.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parlia-

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 7th and 8th Years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 94; of the Act of the 13th and 14th Years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 94; and of the Act of the 32nd and 33rd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 94, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme or Representation, bearing date the 17th day of June, 1920, in the words and figures following, that is to

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the 7th and 8th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 94; the Act of the 13th and 14th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 94; and the Act of the 32nd and 33rd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 94, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme or Representation for altering the boundaries of the New Parish of Saint Martin, Brighton, and of the New Parish of Saint Alban, Preston, Brighton, both in the County of Sussex and in the Diocese of Chichester:

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council, bearing date the 26th day of October, 1875, and published in the London Gazette on the 29th day of the same month, part of the Parish of Brighton, in the said County and Diocese, was assigned as a District Chapelry to the consecrated Church of Saint Martin, situate in the said Parish of Brighton, and the said District Chapelry was named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Martin, Brighton ':

And whereas by the authority of an Order

of Your Majesty in Council, bearing date the 3rd day of February, 1915, and published in the London Gazette on the 9th day of the same month, part of the Parish of Preston, in the said County and Diocese, was assigned as a District Chapelry to the consecrated Church of Saint Alban, Preston, situate in the said Párish of Preston, and the said District Chapelry was named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Alban, Preston, Brighton ':

"And whereas the said District Chapelry of Saint Martin, Brighton, and the said District Chapelry of Saint Alban, Preston, Brighton, have under the provisions of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104, become New Parishes of the character contemplated by that Act, by the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 37, and by the above-mentioned Act of the 32nd and 33rd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 94:

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said New Parish of Saint Martin, Brighton, and of the said New Parish of Saint Alban, Preston, Brighton, should be altered in the manner which is hereinafter

mentioned:
"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Winfrid Oldfield, Bishop of Chichester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme or Representation) We, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme or Representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said New Parish of Saint Martin, Brighton, and of the said New Parish of Saint Alban, Preston, Brighton, shall be altered so that all those portions of the said Parish of Brighton and of the said New Parish of Saint Martin, Brighton, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth upon the Map or Plan hereunto annexed and are thereon coloured pink, shall be dissevered from such Parish and New Parish respectively and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said New Parish of Saint Alban, Preston, Brighton.

"And we further represent, recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts, or of any of them, or

of any other Act of Parliament.

"THE SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be annexed to the New Parish of Saint Alban, Preston, Brighton, in the County of Sussex and in the Diocese of Chichester, comprising:—

"All those contiguous portions of the Parish of Brighton and of the New Parish of Saint Martin, Brighton, both in the said County and Diocese, which, taken together, are bounded upon the north by the said New Parish of Saint Alban, Preston, Brighton, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the east, upon the south and upon the north-west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint

Alban, Preston, Brighton, from the said Parish of Brighton at a point in the middle of Bearhill Road opposite to the northern end of the wall forming the western boundary of the Brighton Extra Mural Cemetery, and extend-ing thence south-westward first to and then along such wall for a distance of 81 chains or thereabouts to the point where it meets the wall forming the northern boundary of the roadway in the Brighton Cemetery, and extending thence first westward and then southward along the last-mentioned wall for a distance of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  chains or thereabouts to the gateway at the entrance to the said Brighton Cemetery, and extending thence first southward to the middle of the roadway leading from the last-mentioned cemetery to Lewes Road and then north-westward along the middle of such roadway for a distance in all of 91 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Lewes Road, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Lewes Road for a distance of 12 yards or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the Viaduct which carries the Kemp Town Branch Line of the London, Brighton and South Coast Railway across Lewes Road, and extending thence first north-westward and then westward along the middle of such Branch Line of railway for a distance of 23 chains or thereabouts to its junction with the East Coast Line of the same railway; and extending thence northeastward along the middle of the lastmentioned line of railway for a distance of 8 chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries such line of railway across Hollingdean Road where the boundaries of the said New Parish of Saint Martin, Brighton, the New Parish of Saint Matthias, Preston, Brighton, in the said County and Diocese, and the said New Parish of Saint Alban, Preston, Brighton, all meet."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme or Representation have been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbents of the Cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such Scheme or Representation and such Patrons and Incumbents have respectively

signified their assent thereto:

And whereas the said Scheme or Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme or Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like

advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Chichester.

And whereas the Minister of Health, after giving to the Incumbent and Churchwardens of the said Parish of Brightside Bierlow (Sheffield), ten days' previous notice of his intention in that behalf, has made a Representation to His Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the public health, so much of the said Order in Council of the 3rd day of October, 1895, as relates to burials in the Wesleyam Chapel and Chapelyard, Grimesthorpe, in the Parish of Brightside Bierlow (Sheffield) aforesaid, should be varied so as to provide that burials should be discontinued forthwith and entirely in the said Chapelyard in the said Parish:

THE RULES OF THE SUPREME COURT (POOR PERSONS), 1920.

#### Order XVI.

Part IV. (Rules 22 to 31 (1), both inclusive) of Order XVI. of the Rules of the Supreme Court, 1883, as amended by the Rules of the Supreme Court (Poor Persons), 1914, the Rules of the Supreme Court (Poor Persons), 1915, and the Rules of the Supreme Court (Poor Persons), 1916, is hereby revoked, and the following Rules shall stand in lieu thereof,

#### IV.—Proceedings by and against Poor Persons.

22. Any person may be admitted to take or defend or be a party to any legal proceedings in the High Court of Justice as a poor person on satisfying the Court or a Judge that he has reasonable grounds for taking or defending or being a party to such proceedings, and that-

- (1) the applicant is not (or in matrimonial causes where the wife is the applicant, the applicant and her husband are not) worth a sum exceeding fifty pounds (excluding wearing apparel, tools of trade and the subject matter of such proceedings) or such larger sum not exceeding one hundred pounds as a Judge personally in special circumstances may direct;
- (2) the usual income from all sources of the applicant (or in matrimonial causes where the wife is the applicant, of the applicant and her husband) does not exceed two pounds a week or such larger sum not exceeding four pounds a week as a Judge personally in special circumstances may direct.

This Rule shall not apply to any bankruptcy proceeding or matter or to any criminal cause or matter except:-

- (a) applications to the Court to order a Justice or Justices to state a case under the Summary Jurisdiction Acts.
- (b) the hearing of cases stated under such Acts, and
- (c) applications for certiorari, mandamus, or prohibition directed to a Court of Summary Jurisdiction.
- 23. An applicant in a matrimonial cause shall deposit with the prescribed officer, upon making the application, in nullity cases involving medical examination [twenty] pounds, and in other cases five pounds, and if such deposit shall in the course of the case be found insufficient, such further sum as may be directed by the prescribed officer. The sum so deposited shall be paid into court by the prescribed officer, and shall be utilised for the payment of any necessary expenses of the case.

Any amount remaining over after all ex-penses properly incurred have been paid shall

be repaid to the applicant.

Such deposits may be forfeited by order of a Judge upon proof that the applicant has understated his means.

- 24. The prescribed officers in London shall keep lists:
  - (1) of solicitors and of counsel willing to be assigned to enquire into and report upon the application of any person to take or defend or be a party to any legal proceedings as a poor person;
  - (2) of solicitors and of counsel willing to be assigned to assist poor persons, when admitted, in the conduct of the proceedings.

It shall be the duty of such prescribed officers in London to furnish to each prescribed officer in the District Registries, on application, lists of all such solicitors and counsel willing to act within their respective districts. Solicitors and counsel willing to be so assigned may send their names either to the prescribed officers in London or to the prescribed officers in the District Registries.

25. A person desirous of being so admitted as a poor person shall make an application in the form set forth in the Appendix hereto (which may be cited as Form No. 1 J of Appendix K to the Rules of the Supreme Court, 1883), stating his means and the names of the parties or of any proposed parties to such proceedings and the nature of the applicant's case, and giving the names and addresses of two persons to whom reference can be made.

Such application shall be made: -

- (a) in matters proceeding or intended to proceed in London to the prescribed officer in London;
- (b) in matters proceeding or intended to proceed in a District Registry to the District Registrar.
- 26. The application shall be referred for enquiry to one or more solicitors or counsel willing to act in the matter, whether named in the dist to be kept pursuant to Rule 24 (1) or not, who shall report to the Court through the prescribed officer whether and upon what terms the applicant ought to be admitted as a poor person. For the purpose of their report the reporters may make such enquiries as they think fit as to the means and the position of the applicant and as to the merits of the case, and may require the attendance of the applicant, and shall, where possible, personally see the applicant, and may hear any other person, and may require facts to be proved by affidavit or statutory declaration, and in making their report they shall have regard to the probable cost of the litigation in relation to the matter in dispute, and shall state that they have personally interviewed the applicant, or shall give their reasons for not having done so. report and any documents or information obtained for the purposes of the report shall be treated as confidential, and shall not be shown or disclosed to the parties or either of them, nor (except to such extent and upon such conditions as may be directed by the prescribed officer) shall such report or any of the said documents or information be shown or disclosed to any counsel or any solicitor for either of the parties. In matrimonial causes the report shall be open to inspection by the King's Proc-
- 27. In matrimonial causes the applicant shall be required by the reporter to swear an affidavit [make a statutory declaration] in accordance with form No. 1 J (1), being the second form set forth in the Appendix hereto (which may be cited as Form No. 1 J (1) of Appendix K to the Rules of the Supreme Court, 1883).

Form No. 1 J (1) shall be forwarded to the reporter by the prescribed officer when sending the papers to him for report. The reporter shall have power to administer the oath for this purpose, and no fee shall be charged for taking such oath.

28. Upon the production of the report mentioned in Rule 26 the Court or Judge may, in their or his discretion, and upon such terms, if any, as the Court or Judge may think fit,

make an order admitting the applicant to take or defend or be a party to legal proceedings as a poor person, and the prescribed officer shall assign to the applicant a solicitor and counsel willing to act in the matter (whether named in the list kept pursuant to Rule 24 (2) or not) to assist him in the conduct of the pro-The prescribed officer may also assign to the applicant a solicitor or solicitors in London or elsewhere willing to act as agent for or to assist the first-named solicitor, and he may also assign additional counsel who may be willing to assist the poor person. No solicitor or counsel who shall have reported on the case shall be so assigned, nor shall any co-partner or clerk or employee of a solicitor who shall have so reported be so assigned. No such solicitor or counsel and no such co-partner or clerk or employee shall act for any other party to the litigation.

- 29. No person who is outside the jurisdiction of the Court shall be admitted to take or defend or be a party to any legal proceedings as a poor person without the direction of a Judge in person.
- 30. The Court or a Judge, in considering whether a person shall be admitted as a poor person under these Rules, shall have regard to such statutory provisions as confer on Inferior Courts concurrent jurisdiction with the High Court, and especially to the provisions of section 1 and section 2 of the County Courts Act, 1919.
- 31. The Court or a Judge may at any time (and whether or not any application be made by any person for such purpose) discharge any order made under these Rules whereby a person has been admitted to take or defend or be a party to any legal proceedings as a poor person.

31A. There shall be no appeal against an order refusing to admit a person to take or defend or be a party to any legal proceedings as a poor person without leave of the Court or a Judge.

31B. (1) No person admitted to take or defend or be a party to any legal proceedings as a poor person, nor any solicitor or counsel assigned to such poor person under these Rules shall discontinue, settle or compromise such proceedings without the leave of the Court or a Judge.

- (2) It shall not be lawful for any person admitted to take or defend or be a party to any legal proceedings as a poor person to discharge any solicitor or counsel assigned under Rule 28 without leave of the Court or a Judge.
- (3) A solicitor or counsel assigned under Rule 28 shall not be at liberty to discontinue his assistance unless he satisfies the prescribed officer or the Court or a Judge that he has some reasonable ground for so discontinuing.
- 31c. Every solicitor assigned under Rule 28 (hereinafter referred to as the conducting solicitor) shall send a report annually to the prescribed officer in the prescribed form showing the progress and result of all cases assigned to him for conduct.
- 31D. Should the conducting solicitor discover at any time that the applicant is possessed of means beyond those disclosed by him to the reporter he shall report the matter at once to the prescribed officer.
- 31E. When a person is applying or is admitted to take or defend or be a party to any

legal proceedings as a poor person he shall not be liable for any court fees nor, unless the Court or a Judge shall otherwise order, to pay costs to any other party, and except as provided by the Rules of this Order, no person shall take or agree to take or seek to obtain any payment, fee, profit or reward, either for inquiry or report or for the conduct of the proceedings, or for out-of-pocket expenses, and any person so doing shall be guilty of a contempt of court.

If any such payment, fee, profit or reward shall be made, given or promised, the application or admission, as the case may be, may be dismissed or struck out, in which case the poor person shall not afterwards be admitted into the same case or any proceedings as a poor

person unless otherwise ordered.

Should any out-of-pocket expenses be incurred by a reporter or conducting solicitor he shall send a written statement to the prescribed officer showing the amount of expenses and the purposes for which they have been incurred, and upon receipt of such statement the prescribed officer shall in matrimonial causes pay to the solicitor, from the amount deposited by the applicant under Rule 23, such sum as he shall consider just, and in other causes shall, in writing, request the applicant to forward such sum to the prescribed officer as that officer shall consider just for payment over to the reporter or conducting solicitor, as the case may be.

In paying such out-of-pocket expenses the prescribed officer shall have regard to the following provisions:—

(a) no fee shall be allowed to the reporter

for the report;

(b) the conducting solicitor shall not be entitled to any payment on account of his office expenses (including charges for stationery or copying done in his office).

31r. In matrimonial causes every petition or answer shall be drawn by a barrister and signed by him, and proofs of the witnesses shall be furnished to him with the instruction to draw the petition or answer.

31c. Special days shall be set apart for the trial of poor persons' matrimonial causes.

31H. Costs ordered to be paid to a poor person shall, unless the Court or a Judge shall otherwise order, be taxed, having regard to Rule 31D, but in the event of the Court or a Judge certifying that the person ordered to pay such costs has acted unreasonably in prosecuting or defending or opposing the proceedings such costs shall include profit costs and charges, but shall not include any fees to counsel.

311. The Court or a Judge may order to be paid to the conducting solicitor out of any money recovered by the poor person, or may charge in favour of the conducting solicitor upon any real or personal property recovered by a poor person such sum in respect of costs (not including fees of counsel) as would have been allowed to the solicitor on taxation between himself and his client if he had been retained by his client in the ordinary manner (less such amount as may be recovered from any other party) or such other sum in respect of costs, as to the Court or Judge may seem fit, provided that the total amount so to be paid out for profits costs or so charged upon the said property for profit costs shall not in

either case exceed one-fourth of the amount or value recovered and remaining after the deduction therefrom of all proper disbursements made by the solicitor.

31J. Every notice of motion, summons or petition on behalf of a poor person (except an application for admission to take or defend or be a party to legal proceedings or for the discharge of his solicitor) shall be signed by his solicitor, and it shall be the duty of such solicitor to take care that no application be made without reasonable cause.

31k. There shall be no appeal as a poor person to the Court of Appeal by anyone admitted to take or defend or be a party to any legal proceedings under these rules without leave of the Court or of the Judge before whom the matter is heard or of the Court of Appeal.

31L. If any person who has not taken, defended or been a party to any legal proceedings as a poor person in the High Court shall desire to be admitted on an appeal to the Court of Appeal as a poor person the like procedure shall be followed as is provided by these Rules for the High Court and the application shall be referred by the prescribed officer of the division of the High Court from which the appeal is brought for enquiry, as if it were an application made in that Division, and upon production of the report the Court of Appeal may in their discretion make an order admitting the applicant to be a party to such appeal as a poor person.

Any party to proceedings in a Court other than the High Court from which an appeal lies direct to the Court of Appeal who desires to be so admitted shall make an application for that purpose under these rules to the prescribed officer on the Crown Side except in the case of an appeal from the Court of Chancery of the County Palatine of Lancaster or from the Court of Chancery of the Court of Chancery of the Courty Palatine of Durham and Sadberge the application in which shall be made to the prescribed officer in the Chancery Division.

The said application shall be referred and decided in the same manner as an application in an appeal from the High Court.

31m. The prescribed officers shall be (1) in the Chancery Division such one or more of the Masters as the Lord Chancellor shall from time to time nominate for the purpose; (2) in the King's Bench Division (excepting on the Crown side) such one or more of the Masters as the Lord Chief Justice shall from time to time nominate for the purpose; and on the Crown side the Master of the Crown Office for the time being; (3) in the Probate, Divorce and Admiralty Division such one or more of the Registrars as the President shall from time to time nominate for the purpose; and (4) in a District Registry the District Registrar.

In the case of temporary absence or indisposition the prescribed officer may appoint a deputy with the sanction of the Lord Chan-

31n. Nothing in these Rules shall operate as a stay of any proceedings unless so ordered by the Court or Judge or Court of Appeal.

310. These Rules may be cited as the Rules of the Supreme Court (Poor Persons), 1920, or may be cited by the heading and number thereof with reference to the Rules of the Supreme Court, 1883. They shall come into operation on the 1st day of January, 1921.

#### Whitehall, July 26, 1920.

The KING has been pleased to award the Albert Medal to Gharib Shah, in recognition of his gallantry in saving life in June of last year.

On the 3rd June, 1919, a large Religious Fair was being held in India at Nariana, on the right bank of the River Beas, and a great many pilgrims were being conveyed across the river by means of a ferry boat. Two boatloads had been taken over successfully, and the boat was crossing a third time when it got out of control. The river was in flood and the rapids very dangerous, and the boat, which was filled to its utmost capacity, entered the rapids and was swamped, all the passengers being precipitated into the rushing water. Gharib Shah, a young waterman, 25 years of age, who was in charge of a timber raft some 30 yards away,

managed to get his raft close to the overturned boat, and immediately set to work to save the passengers as they were carried past him. Time after time he plunged into the river, and succeeded in rescuing fifteen drowning persons. Others in the water who had struggled to the raft were pulled on to it by him, and in this manner other lives were saved.

It is estimated that 150 passengers were on board the boat when it started, and of the forty-five saved it is certain that Gharib Shah was responsible for the rescue of at least thirty by his bravery and resourcefulness. The District Magistrate who held an inquiry into the occurrence highly commended Gharib Shah's conduct, and mentioned that this was not the first time that he had saved persons from drowning, for in the year 1914, at the risk of his own life, he had rescued five persons from the same river.

On the expiration of one year's service in the trade, these workers shall receive such rates as their age may entitle them to under the foregoing provisions.

#### PART II.

Proposed Variation of Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers.

Overtime Rates, calculated on the Proposed Minimum Rates specified in Part I of this Schedule, in the manner set out in Part III of the Schedule to the Notice issued by the Trade Board dated 26th November, 1919, shall apply in substitution for the Minimum Rates otherwise applicable, as set out in Part I of this Schedule, in respect of all hours worked in excess of the number of hours declared by the Trade Board, in the Notice above referred to, to be the normal number of hours of work in the trade.

#### PART III.

Section I.—The above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in respect of any time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Corset) Order, 1919, that is to say:

- (a) The manufacture of corsets, stays, children's corset bodices, infants' stay bands, bust confiners, such as brassières and bandeaux when boned or with elastic webbing in their construction.
- (b) The manufacture of support or abdominal belts and similar articles, except where

made in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of surgical instru-

- (c) The assembling of stocking suspenders in conjunction with or in association with the manufacture of any of the above-mentioned
- (d) All warehousing, packing, or other operations incidental to or appertaining to the manufacture of any of the above-mentioned articles.

#### PART IV.

Section I.—The above proposed General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-work Basis Time-Rates and Overtime Rates shall be paid clear of all deductions, other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act, to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

Section II.—The above proposed Minimum Rates are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages or to agreements made or that may be made between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of the minimum rates.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above Proposals to Vary which may be lodged with them within two months from the 22nd July, 1920. Such Objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Corset Trade Board, 5, Chancery Lane, London, W.C. 2.

It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

TRADE BOARDS ACTS, 1909 AND 1918 LINEN AND COTTON HANDKERCHIEF HOUSEHOLD GOODS AND AND LINEN PIECE GOODS TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

PROPOSAL TO FIX MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR FEMALE WORKERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Liabour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established in Great Britain under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods Trade, as specified in the Trade Boards (Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods) Order, 1920, hereby give notice, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they propose to fix General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for Female Workers and to declare the Normal Number of Hours of Work in the Trade for the purpose of the application of the Overtime Rates, as set out below:

#### Part I.

Proposed General Minimum Time-Rates for Female Workers

For workers of 14 and under 141 years of age, 15s. per week of 48 hours.

For workers of 14½ and under 15 years of age, 16s. per week of 48 hours.

For workers of 15 and under 15½ years of age, 17s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.

For workers of 15½ and under 16 years of age, 19s. per week of 48 hours.

For workers of 16 and under 162 years of

age, 21s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.

For workers of 161 and under 17 years of age, 24s. per week of 48 hours.

For workers of 17 and under  $17\frac{1}{2}$  years of age, 27s. per week of 48 hours.

For workers of 17½ and under 18 years of age, 31s. per week of 48 hours.

For workers of 18 years of age and over, 36s. per week of 48 hours.

Provided that:

(a) In the case of workers entering the trade for the first time between the ages of 16 and 18 years, the General Minimum Time Rates payable during the first six months' period of employment shall be 2s. per week of 48 hours less than the General Minimum Time-Rates otherwise applicable as set out above. Such workers on completing six months' employment in the trade shall be entifled to the General Minimum Time Rates applicable to their age as set out in the foregoing Table.

(b) In the case of workers entering the trade for the first time at or over the age of 18 years, the General Minimum Time-Rates payable during the first twelve months' period of employment shall be as follows:

(i) During 1st three months' period of employment, 24s. per week of 48 hours.

(ii) During 2nd three months' period of employment, 27s. per week of 48 hours.

(iii) During 3rd three months' period of employment, 30s. per week of 48 hours.

(iv) During 4th three months' period of employment, 33s. per week of 48 hours.

employment, 33s. per week of 48 hours.

Such workers on completing twelve months' employment in the trade shall be entitled to the General Minimum Time-Rate of 36s. per week of 48 hours.

Section II.—The proposed General Minimum Time-Rates set out in Section I of this Part of this Notice are based on a week of 48 hours, and shall be subject to a proportionate deduction according as the number of hours spent by a worker in the factory or workshop in any week is less than 48.

#### PART II.

Proposed Overtime Rates for Female Workers.

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board Propose to Declare the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:-

In any week  $4\frac{1}{2}$ On Saturday On any other week-day ...

Provided that all hours worked by a worker on Sundays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

Section II.—The proposed Minimum Rates for Overtime for all Female Workers in respect of hours worked by a worker in excess of the normal number of hours of work in the trade proposed to be declared by the Trade Board as set out in Section I of this Part of this Notice, shall be as follows:—

(a) For the first two hours' overtime on any day except Sunday, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-Quarter.

(b) For overtime after the first two hours of overtime on any day except Sunday, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Half times the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-Half.

(c) For all time worked on Sunday, the Overtime Rate shall be Twice the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Double Time.

(d) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-Quarter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs (b) and (c) of this Section.

The Overtime Rates shall be payable where on any day (not being a Sunday) the number of hours worked exceeds nine, or in the case of Saturday exceeds  $4\frac{1}{2}$ , notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

SECTION III.—The provisions of this Part of this Notice are without prejudice to the payment of Overtime Rates after a lesser number of hours than those declared by the Trade Board to be the normal number in the trade, in cases where such lesser number of hours constitutes the number customarily worked in the establishment.

Note.—The hours which female workers, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts.

#### PART III.

The above proposed Minimum Rates shall apply subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts to all Female Workers in respect of any time during which they are employed in Great Britain in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods) Order, 1920, that is to say:—

1. The making of such articles as are specified in (a) and (b) below, from linen or cotton or mixed linen and cotton fabrics (excepting knitted fabrics), or from other textile fabrics when the work is carried on in establishments mainly engaged in the making of such articles from the beforementioned fabrics, viz.:—

(a) Handkerchiefs (including Mufflers or Flags when made in association or in conjunction with handkerchiefs);

(b) Bed-Linen, Towels, Dusters, Tablenapery, Bed-spreads, Tea-cloths, Tablecentres, Sideboard-covers, Cushion-covers, or similar household articles;

including all or any of the following opera-

- (i) Hooking, cutting or tearing the material;
  - (ii) Vice-folding;

(in) Machine hemming, hem-stitching, spoking, over-locking, tambouring, button-holeing, and other plain or fancy machine stitching;

(iv) All processes of embroidery or decorative needlework done by machine, whether before or after the making of the articles of the description specified above;

(v) The following processes if done by machine:—Thread - drawing, thread - clipping, top sewing, scalloping, nickelling and

paring;

(vi) All processes of laundering, smoothing, folding, ornamenting, boxing, finishing, warehousing, packing and other similar operations incidental to or appertaining to the making of the articles of the description specified above.

2. The making-up in linen warehouses or in establishments mainly engaged in linen lapping, of linen or mixed linen and cotton or other textile fabrics in the piece, or of linen or mixed linen and cotton or other textile cut from

the piece, including:—

Measuring, cutting, lapping, ornamenting, boxing, warehousing, packing and similar operations.

#### PART IV.

SECTION I.—The above proposed General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates shall be paid clear of all deductions, other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION II.—The above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to Workers who are earning higher rates of

wages.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages which may be lodged with them within two months from 27th July, 1920. #### ANIMALS (LANDING FROM IRELAND) ORDER OF 1920.

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:

Prohibition of Landing except for Slaughter within Landing Place.

1.—(1) Cattle, sheep, goats or swine shipped from Ireland shall not, unless and until it is otherwise ordered by the Minister, be landed after the date hereof at any port or place in Great Britain except in accordance with the following provisions of this Order.

(2) Cattle, sheep, goats or swine shipped from any port in Ireland which is mentioned in the First Schedule to the Animals (Landing from Ireland) Consolidation and Amendment Order of 1914 except Greenore, may after the date hereof be landed at any landing place defined by Order of the Minister as a landing place for Irish Animals, except Holyhead, but only for the purpose of slaughter within the landing place.

(3) The landing of any animals under this Order must be authorised by the Superintendent or person in charge of the landing place.

(4) Animals so landed shall be subject to the provisions of the Animals (Landing from Ireland) Consolidation and Amendment Order of 1914, except that the animals shall not be moved from the landing place, and shall be slaughtered therein within ninety-six hours after their landing.

Special Provision as to Animals Destined for Manchester Irish Animals Landing Place.

2. Animals, if intended to be landed at the Manchester Irish Animals Landing Place under this Order shall not be carried through the Eastham lock until they have been examined by a Veterinary Inspector of the Ministry, and unless and until the Inspector certifies that his examination and information do not show that there is, or during the voyage has been, an animal on board affected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease.

Local Authority to Enforce Order.


3. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority. Offences.

4. If any animal shall be landed or moved in contravention of this Order, or is not slaughtered as hereby required, the owner thereof and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of the place of landing, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the land-ing or movement, and the owner and person in charge of the animal which is not so slaughtered, and the owner and the charterer, and the master of the vessel from which the same is landed, as the case may be, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

WIRELESS METEOROLOGICAL INFOR-MATION TO AND FROM SHIPS AT SEA.

General Remarks.

Former Notice.—No. 1000 of 1920; hereby cancelled.

1. It is earnestly hoped that all concerned will assist in making the wireless meteorological service a success. Negotiations are now in hand to extend and unify the system of collecting weather data by wireless from ships at sea

all over the world, and at the same time to organise the free transmission of weather bulletins from a sufficient number of wireless stations to admit of ships being constantly supplied with reliable weather reports and fore-

casts wherever they may be.

2. It should be borne in mind that the needs of ships at sea in regard to information regarding the weather will march hand in hand with the requirements of aircraft. The importance of this service will therefore be constantly increasing, and its success or failure will largely depend upon the co-operation of ships at sea in providing the data without which accurate forecasting is impossible. The matter does not depend solely upon the efforts of the ships selected to furnish the data. The essence of success lies in rapidity in passing such data by wireless from the ship to the coast station, and thence to the central meteorological office. It follows, therefore, that all ships not taking an active part in supplying data should use the greatest care not to interfere with the transmission of the wireless messages to the shore.

3. The following particulars refer to the scheme now being undertaken by the British Meteorological Office. This Notice will, however, be subject to revision from time to time, and endeavours will be made to include in each revision all information available to date of the weather bulletins issued by the wireless stations of the world. Earnest endeavours are being made to obtain international agreement as to the form of these weather bulletins and to the methods and times of transmissions. It is hoped that the messages will eventually all be made in an international code at fixed times, so arranged that a ship with only one wireless operator will be able to read them. similar scheme for time signals is being evolved.

COLLECTION OF WEATHER DATA FROM SHIPS.

4. Certain ships are being asked to supply data regularly three times a day and in addition to the regular observations, which are taken at 0100, 0700 and 1300 Greenwich time and sent as soon as possible to Malin Head (GMH) or Valentia (GCK) coast stations. These ships may, on request from either of these coast stations, send special data messages at other times.

5. Precise instructions as to the procedure for ships which intend to send a data message, together with the necessary code, will be issued at an early date.

Issue of Weather Bulletins to Ships.

6. A wireless weather bulletin may contain both or either of the following:

(a) A weather report, which is an official statement of existing weather conditions; and/or

(b) A weather forecast, which is an official opinion of probable future weather condi-

- 7.
